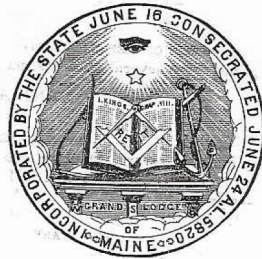

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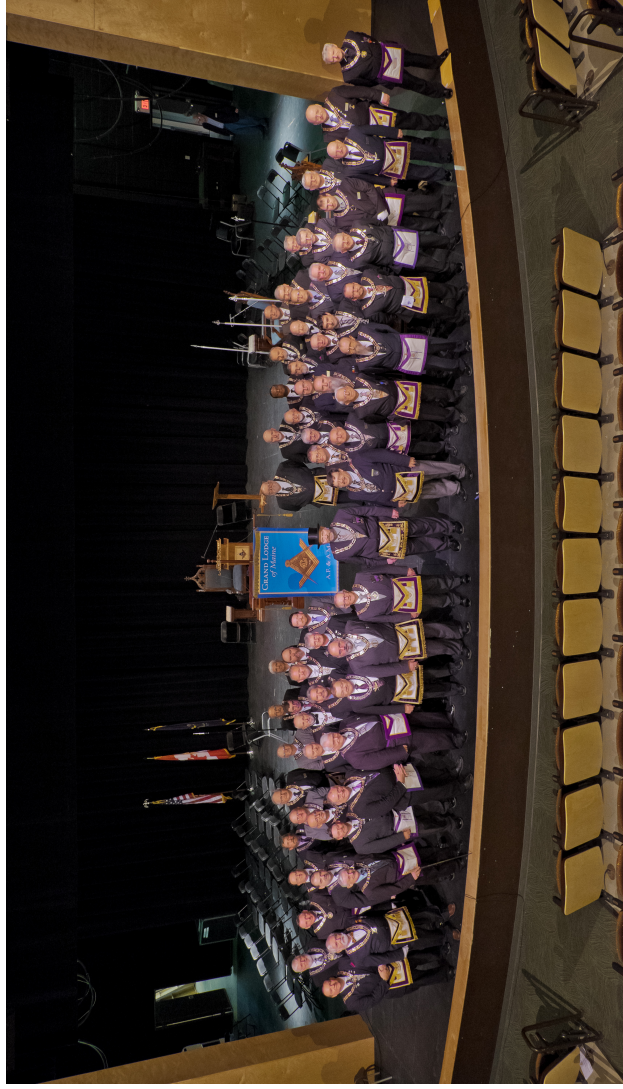

At Thresher Memorial Park Kittery, Maine

M. will be held at Thresher Memorial Park, Memorial Circle, in Kittery on Monday, May 26 2014, at 10:00 AM for the purpose of participating in the dedication of this new memorial and honoring the Brethren who were on board the submarine Thresher when it was lost during sea trials.

A Special Communication of the Grand Lodge of Maine, A.F. & A. M., was held on Monday, May 26, 2014, for the purpose of laying a Memorial Stone during the dedication of Thresher Memorial Park. Grand Lodge Officers present were, MW David Walker, Grand Master; RW Thomas Pulkkinen, DGM; RW Christopher DiSotto, SGW; RW Brian Messing, JGW; RW Mark Rustin, GS; RW William Layman, Grand Marshall; along with other appointed Officers and Masons. Most Worshipful David A. Walker, Grand Master of Masons in Maine, opened the Grand Lodge in Ample Form at 9:00 AM.

At the appropriate hour, the Grand Master symbolically set the Memorial Stone in place with mortar. The Deputy Grand Master inspected stone and reported that it was **square**. The Senior Grand Warden inspected the stone and reported that it was **level**. The Junior Grand Warden inspected the stone and reported that it was **plumb**. The Grand Master then declared the corner stone to be square, level and plumb, thus duly laid.

The Grand Master ordered that the cornerstone be consecrated with the elements of Corn, Wine and Oil. The Deputy Grand Master scattered the **Corn of Nourishment** on the stone. The Senior Grand Warden poured the **Wine of Refreshment and Peace** on the stone. The Junior Grand Warden poured the **Oil of Joy** on the stone.

The Public Grand Honors were given, the Grand Marshal made his official proclamation, and a Benediction was offered.

At the conclusion of the dedication of Thresher Memorial Park the Grand Master closed the Special Communication in Ample Form.

The Grand Master and his Officers opened the 196th Annual Communication of the Grand Lodge of Maine in Ample Form.

The Grand Chaplain invoked the presence and guidance of the Supreme Architect during this Annual Communication.

The Grand Master called for the communications from the Grand Secretary. He replied that there had been three Special Communications during the Masonic year: on May 26, 2014 at Thresher Memorial Park to lay a commemorative stone; on September 13, 2014 at Freeport Lodge to celebrate that Lodge's 200th Anniversary; and on April 23, 2105 at Delta Lodge in Lovell for the presentation of the Ritual Lodge of the Year Award.

The Grand Master called for regrets received by the Grand Secretary. He replied that there were none.

The Deputy Grand Master made the following motions:

Sammi Getchell, Grand Worthy Advisor, International Order of Rainbow for Girls of Maine, Debbie Redmond, Supreme Deputy of Maine, Mrs. Cora-Ellen Moody, Supreme Charity and Supreme Inspector for Maine, International Order of Rainbow for Girls, Brother Steven Farrington, State Master Councilor for Maine DeMolay, and Worshipful Gordon L. Kimball Jr., State Executive Officer for Maine DeMolay were introduced by the Grand Marshal.

The Grand Master invited Miss Michelle L. Walton, Grand Worthy Advisor to address the Grand Lodge:

Grand Worthy Advisor, Order of the Rainbow for Girls

As many of you know the Rainbow girls as a whole share many of the same values that are instilled by our other Masonic orders such as Faith, Hope and Charity. For those of you who don't know, we share these similar values because the Rainbow girls were founded by a 33rd degree Master Mason named Rev W. Mark Sexson in 1922 after he recognized the need for a girls youth group. Feeling that young women needed additional lessons he created our seven additional virtues represented by our color stations. We learn of Love, Religion, Nature, Immortality, Fidelity, Patriotism, and Service. Beyond these lessons Rainbow girls also learn other skills that will help them succeed in their everyday life such as confidence, public speaking and leadership.

This year Maine Rainbow Girls everywhere have been learning these core values while celebrating our theme of "We Are One". This theme has been encouraging the strengthening of our bonds between our fellow Masonic bodies. We have focused this year on bringing all the bodies closer together as the one family that we truly are, a very similar focus to your mission this past year.

Along with this these we have been raising money for two charities this year which are the Lupus Foundation of America and the Merrill Rainbow Campground. The Lupus Foundations of America has led the way in the fight in discovering what Lupus is and how to cure it. This painful autoimmune disease is very difficult to detect and doctors still know little about how to diagnose and treat the disease. Our hop was to raise awareness and money in the hope that we can one day live in lupus free world.

We have also been raising funds for the Merrill Rainbow Campground. This campground provides a gorgeous place for the girls to getaway during our annual camping weekend. The campground has also been used by the DeMolay boys and the Order of the Eastern Star for events that are better spent out of doors and we encourage others to use the campground as well.

It was my hope over the past year that we could cross paths many times and we have. Without the support of Masons, Rainbow would be no more. It is for that on behalf of Rainbow girls, I thank you for all that you do, especially in supporting your Masonic youth groups. At this time I would like to invite you all to our "We Are One" Grand Assembly Sessions on May 29th through the 31st at Husson University right here in Bangor, Maine. Thank you for the invitation to be here today and for this opportunity to talk to speak to all of you and I'd like to leave you with on last thought, which is my motto for the year, "We may not have it all together, but together we have it all.

The Grand Master ordered the Presentation of the Colors of our Nation which was done by a color guard from the Grand Encampment of Knights Templar of Maine under the direction of S.K. John D. Baggett. This was followed by the Pledge of Allegiance and the singing of the national anthems of the United States of America

and Canada. The Grand Master introduced the members of the color guard after which they exited the auditorium.

The Grand Master invited Mrs. Deborah Redmond, Supreme Deputy in Maine to the podium.

Another year for our Masonic Family has gone by and Michelle and I are enjoying our time visiting with the appendant bodies as they celebrate at their annual conventions the successes of the previous year and setting goals for the year to come.

Maine Rainbow is preparing for Grand Assembly and Michelle and I are reflecting on the past “We Are One” Grand year. We have had a very full year and while we lost in membership again this year- by 12 and we lost one Assembly- we are now at 11 Assemblies, we did not lose any enthusiasm.

We left Grand Assembly last year with a very full summer planned, including several out of State Grand Assemblies and our big trip to Baltimore where 67 of our Maine Delegations, including our Grand Master, WGM Executive officer descended on the city as our very own Mum Moody was installed as the 2014-2016 Supreme Worthy Advisor and was escorted to the Supreme East as we sang “Grand State of Maine”. Michelle served us proud as the Page to Past Supreme Worthy Advisor, Linda Freimann and performed impeccable ritual as she delivered the “Dad Talk” after initiation. I was privileged to attend a few district meetings where I was asked to speak on my favorite subject – Maine Rainbow! I was always welcomed with open arms and always made to feel a “part of the team”. We were also privileged to have some of you with us at Michelle’s homecoming Grand family where we performed the “Dad to Dad” program – if you have not heard this program, I encourage you to contact me and I will have a team visit your individual lodges and have someone prepared to give the dad to dad talk with all of you!

As I personally prepare for Grand Assembly, with all of the administrative things that I have to do, I am brushing up on my ritual also—while very limited as an adult--the girls do most of the ritual, I do perform the Majority Rainbow age of 20 or 21, I always think about the words as I say them to the girls...It has been more than 20 years some of the most important things in international life have happened, events so great as to change the course of human history and to make the world in which you shall live as a young woman quite a different place than the world of 20 years ago. One of the most significant things that has happened and one which prophecies untold blessings for the future is the interest manifested in Youth....These words strike home and touch my heart as I think of my own experience with our Maine Masonic Family. Your interest in both Rainbow and DeMolay will be what helps us to continue and to grow your Masonic Youth groups.

I have to say that I truly cherish the opportunity to address the Grand Lodge annually not just to update all of you on Maine Rainbow but also because this is my opportunity to thank, not only Rainbow's Sponsors---those lodges who actually Sponsor Rainbow Assemblies, but also each of you who is an advisor---maybe you serve on an advisory board and maybe you don't---but if you attend and support Rainbow in any way, on behalf of Grand Assembly and your Rainbow daughters, I thank you. It is also my opportunity to thank Grand Lodge for your support of Maine Rainbow. The purpose is not to make these young DeMolay boys into masons; that is just one of the great side effects that usually occurs. The purpose of DeMolay is to take the young men in society and transform them into better men and leaders in today's society. DeMolay does this by instilling the seven cardinal virtues inculcated by the order into the hearts of the young men. These seven virtues are: Filial Love, Reverence for Sacred Things, Courtesy, Comradeship, Fidelity, Cleanliness, and Patriotism. DeMolay teaches these principles, principles that were exalted by our martyred hero, Jacques DeMolay, the last Grand Master of the Knights Templar. DeMolay does this not only in the chapter room, but in the young member's daily lives.

I looked back upon the beginning of my journey about 5 years ago. I joined at the age of 15, a shy and timid child who had no responsibilities. Over the course of the 5 years I was given tasks, given a chance to lead, and had a blast while doing it. Through all of this I was able to become the man I am today.

Over the last year many young men have had the opportunity to grow and prosper in DeMolay. Maine DeMolay has been able to do great things this past year. This year the boys went to a Red Claws game, a Seadogs game, a Portland Pirates game, snow tubing, bowling, camping, and much much more. The members were able to fundraise for their chapters, participate in various parades, raise money for the Diabetes Association, as well as complete various other community service projects. The young men have had new chances to lead their chapters and plan fun, civic, and masonic events that they enjoy. Throughout this last year Maine DeMolay was able to achieve positive growth and will hope to do it again this coming year.

But we cannot do it alone. Maine DeMolay thrives on all of the masonic support given from the local lodges. DeMolay greatly benefits from the time and energy that masonry gives into helping us out. I cannot speak enough about how crucial masonic support is for this organization. Without the masonic support we get from the masons it would be impossible to do all of the great things DeMolay does for the youth in this state.

I thank you all for your support and thank you for the chance to speak tonight.

The Grand Master invited W Gordon Kimball, Jr., State Executive Office of DeMolay in Maine to the podium.

Executive Officer, Maine DeMolay Association

It is a great pleasure to once again be able to come here and bring you the greetings of DeMolay International, its Grand Master and the Supreme Council of DeMolay as well as my own warm and Fraternal greetings, and to wish you a most successful session.

Maine DeMolay experienced positive success last year with our membership as we grew by one and we added one new chapter. Our wreaths across America was once again a success and with the continued support of all the masonic Family we were able to raise enough money for more than 500 wreaths last year. But once again I am going to ask for your help in growing DeMolay across this state. DeMolay is a Youth fraternal group for boys between the ages of 12 to 21 and we are sponsored by masons and Masonic bodies. We currently have 5 active chapters here in Maine and that is a very low number considering the size of this state. With 24 Masonic Districts in Maine and just under 190 lodges we should have more youth groups. ie DeMolay Chapters and or Rainbow Assemblies.

Every year I speak about this but this year it seems even more important. Masons are a very generous group and it shows with the Chips Program and Bikes for Books program etc. I stand here now and ask you most sincerely that you consider strongly starting a DeMolay Chapter or club where some of our youth may come and learn and enjoy the benefits of Brotherly love and friendship not to mention the rewards you yourself would realize.

All of our towns and cities could benefit if we would open our doors and our hearts to the kids in our community and offer them something new, a new place to come and meet, do new activities and make new friends not to mention the warm feeling you yourself would feel from knowing that you had a part in bringing these young people together.

I will not stand here and tell you that it is easy but I will tell you that it is very rewarding work and that your heart will fill with much pride and joy just as it would with your own children when you see these kids excel rather it be ritual or a sporting event or a community service project. I have never had one adult advisor come to me and say that they wished they had never gotten involved or wished that they had done something different with their time. I would ask you that when you get home please go back to your lodge and have this discussion and seriously consider inviting the youth into your hearts be it boys, girls or both. I am more than willing to come speak and I know Mom Redmond is also.

Presentation of the Josiah H. Drummond Award

RW Mark E. Rustin

R.W. Brother Mark Edward Rustin was born in Old Town, Maine 4 January 1948 the first child of Jim and Fran Rustin. He attended Old Town schools graduating from Old Town High School in 1966. While in school Mark worked as a police cadet.

Mark went on to receive an associate degree in Criminal Justice and worked at the Orono Police Department and the University of Maine Police Department. In 1972, he taught a class on "The Student and the Law" at Orono High School.

In the mid 70's Mark was ready for a change. He took a position as a Captain in the Public Safety Division of the Medical College, in Augusta Georgia. While living in Georgia Mark met and married his wife LaVerne. Also while living in Georgia, Mark opened a Rec Center, which he named Kaleidoscope. It included an Olympic size swimming pool, which the children all loved. Mark gave swimming lessons to the young children and was a lifeguard. It also had a rec room with pool tables and pinball machines. Many hours were spent with teens, pool tournaments and loud music.

In 1978, Mark and LaVerne made the decision to return to Maine. Mark took a job as a patrolman at the University of Maine. As luck would have it, a small restaurant went up for sale on Route 2 in Veazie. This looked like a good opportunity so he bought the restaurant and that began a lifetime of cooking.

Across the street from the restaurant was a little Congregational church. On Sunday people attending church would park in the restaurant parking lot, which was not very big, leaving no place for customers Mark, not being shy, confronted the Pastor about the situation. After several heated chats, the two became friends and Mark started attending the church services and eventually became a trustee. He even preached on occasion. It was obvious at that point that Mark had found his calling. He sold the restaurant and started classes at Bangor Theological Seminary and the University of Maine to get his Bachelor's degree. When the Pastor left the church, Mark was installed as their new Pastor. A couple of years later, Mark accepted a call from the Congregational Church in Warren, Maine where he was ordained, all the while continuing with his education. In 1986 Mark received a call for the North Deering Congregational Church and started there in 1987.

While in Warren Mark and Laverne were foster parents for a handicapped teenager. They also opened their home to a church member whose husband passed. They made these two people members of their family and moved them with them to Portland when Mark accepted a position at the church there.

Mark received his Bachelor's degree, with honors in 1989. He also pastored at Hiram Congregational Church. In addition to pastoring at Hiram and North Deering churches, Mark also did weekly services at Birchwood Assistant Living, where some of his members lived.

In the early 90's Mark started a weekly haddock chowdah/lobster roll luncheon and a roast beef buffet to help the less fortunate and create fellowship among church members. In the mid 90's Mark was instrumental in the development of Guardian Youth Escort Services, in Falmouth. The mission was to provide parents with a service which ensured safe and secure transportation for out of control adolescents to highly structured schools and programs in an environment which supported the goals of the parents for their children.

Mark was not only the spiritual leader of his church, but a real working part of the organization. He was the business manager, organized and participated in work parties and car washes. He was the head chef, shoveled the walks in the winter and was willing to do anything that needed to be done. One can't count the number of times he has helped homeless people and others with severe needs, usually not members of the church. He did this with no fanfare.

Mark was raised to the sublime degree of Master Mason on December 14, 1985 at St. George Lodge #16 in Warren, Maine. After moving to Portland he affiliated with Comer Stone Lodge #216 in Portland. In 2007 he joined Howard Lodge #69 in Winterport, where he served as Chaplain from 2010-2013 and widows coordinator from 2011-2013. Mark affiliated with Seminary Hill Daylight Lodge #220 in Bangor on October 14, 2013. He is currently Master of the lodge.

Mark served as Assistant Grand Chaplain from 2001 – 2012.

In 2012 M.W. A. James Ross appointed Mark Grand Secretary. While in this position Mark spearheaded the Library Buildout project. He spent many tiring hours to help raised the money needed for this project. The project goal has been reached and construction has begun.

Bro. Mark, for your tireless efforts for the Craft, for the Charitable Foundation and to me as Grand Master, it is indeed my great pleasure to present you with this Josiah Hayden Drummond Medal for Distinguished Service.

Grand Master's Address to the Craft

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Free and Accepted Masons of Maine:
It is a singular honor for me to address this Grand Assemblage as your Grand Master. I have been and still am awed and humbled by the faith placed in me by all of you.

I would like to officially welcome our out of state guests. It is a special pleasure for me to greet you as friends of the Grand Lodge of Maine and especially as friends of mine. You honor us by making the journey to sit with us at this 196th Annual Communication of our Grand Lodge. You have made my special lady, Audrey and I very happy that you came.

When I was installed last May, which seems as though it was yesterday and 10 years ago at the same time, I told you of several items I planned on addressing during this past year. I have done as much as I physically could to make those plans come to fruition.

Item 1 was communications and I have to give myself a C for that. I have tried to keep up my calendar and communications through the District Deputies, but have only been partially successful. I pledge to you that I will strive to improve in this area during the coming year. You all deserve better in this regard than I have provided.

Item 2 was District Calendars. Most Districts have been using the free calendar which our Webmaster, Wor. Ed King provided and I owe him a debt of gratitude for his efforts. A few Districts are using them only partially and a couple of Districts not at all. I have stressed this more than once this past year and my question to those District Deputies is, why aren't these being used? I will be speaking to each of you very soon, so be forewarned.

Item 3 was ritual. The ritual I have witnessed this past year have been very good overall and in a few instances, outstanding. I applaud the work of the Lodges, the Assistant Grand Lecturers and the District Grand Lodge Officer teams. I also owe a thank you to your Junior Grand Warden, Brian s. Messing for his presentation on our ritual and the impact it has on us all at most of the District Meetings. It is a pleasure to share that love of our ritual with you Br. Messing! As you might imagine, this item will again be key for me going forward.

Item 4 was Civility. As with ritual, I owe most of my success in this area to one of your elected Grand Lodge Officers, R.W. Mark Rustin. He has spoken on this topic at District Meetings and even at Masonic meetings in other Grand Jurisdictions. Thank you, Br. Rustin! I have spoken about civility often, especially when addressing other bodies in our Masonic family. The feedback I have received is very positive and gratifying. As I said at last year's installation, in an increasingly uncivil world, it is imperative that we as Masons lead the way in becoming more civil. Differences of opinion are common and in most cases, a good thing but we can disagree with one another and not be hostile about it. At the end of the day, we are still Brothers and that has to count for something. Let the world see that we can and do run our lives and conduct our actions with others and be civil. It should be a hallmark of all Masons.

Another area I intended to concentrate on is regarding relations within our Masonic Family. At times it has appeared to me that each of us in our own Masonic circle has been working as though we were in a bubble, separate entities with our own agenda and not really relating to other members of our family. I have said from the first that we are one big Masonic Family and we should act like one. I have visited many times with other Masonic bodies including but not limited to, the Shrine, York Rites, Eastern Star, Rainbow and DeMolay. I have made the same offer to each that I would use whatever influence I have to improve how we work together. I am pleased to promote their activities and also that they have reciprocated. Last summer, Kora Shrine and the Grand Lodge teamed up to attend a Portland Seadogs game as a group and made it available for non-Masons to attend with them. That same event is planned for this year, on June 6th. I am open to joint events with other Masonic bodies as well. I have offered each body to take advantage of the online District calendars and the opportunity to have an article placed in the Maine Mason. I hesitate to single out any one group, but find that I must. I have been to several Installations of the Daughters of the Nile and have been stunned to learn about what

they do and that I had never heard about. Brethren, these ladies, all related in some way to Shriners, have but one goal. That is to support the Shriners hospitals, with money, visits and with homemade toys. As a national group they donated nearly \$3,000,000 to Shriners hospitals last year. They second only to Shriners themselves in donations to Shrine hospitals. In my opinion that merits our esteem, applause and more importantly, our recognition.

I have also attended several events for Rainbow and DeMolay this past year. What exceptional young men and women are in those groups! I have witnessed extraordinary ritual be each, ritual that would be the envy of any Masonic Lodge. The poise, grace and courtesy they have exhibited leave little doubt that they will achieve great things in their lives and the Rainbow and DeMolay certainly have a place in our society. Indeed, in today's society, there is as great a need as has ever existed. If you have not attended one of their functions, you owe it to yourself and to them to make that effort. You will be amazed.

I traveled to Baltimore in July to attend the installation of our own Cora-Ellen Moody as Supreme Worthy Advisor of the International Order of Rainbows for Girls. Cora-Ellen has worked for many years and invested countless hours supporting these remarkable young ladies. The ceremony was indeed spectacular and there were many Maine supporters of Rainbow and Cora-Ellen in attendance. The installation was conducted by Maine's Deborah Redmond, Supreme Deputy for Maine and she did a flawless job, entirely from memory. The whole event was special, befitting a special lady, and it was an honor for me to be present, representing the Grand Lodge of Maine.

I also noted last year that I was and still am an ardent supporter of the annual MS Ride. I know far too many friends and Brothers who have been touched by this deadly disease. I have ridden my bicycle each of the past 7 years to raise money for this cause. Thanks to many of you, I managed to raise several thousand dollars this past summer. I have to confess that I only managed to ride for 30 miles each day, due to the deterioration of my hip. I have signed up to ride again this August and I reach out to you for support.

Now that I have mentioned my hip issue, I need to tell you that while I limped along with the aid of a cane this past fall, I had replacement surgery in December and can get along quite well now. I had District Meetings on Friday and Saturday evenings prior to my Monday surgery and was back at a District Meeting 3 weeks after. I owe a great deal of thanks to all of the Grand Lodge Officers and other Brethren who were so good to me during this entire ordeal. It slowed me up, but thanks to you all it never completely stopped me. Of course, I owe the biggest debt to my wife, Audrey. She took care of me far better than I deserved and not surprisingly kept me from overdoing it.

The Dirigo Leadership Committee under the leadership of R.W. Jeff Sukeforth has continued to conduct seminars on request and has already started scheduling for the coming year. Every District in this Grand Jurisdiction has lodges that could really

benefit from leadership training. I once again strongly recommend that District Deputies take a look at the possibility of scheduling one in their area. This is not a mandate, but a request. There are many lessons that can be learned at one of these seminars which can be used by a lodge or not, depending on the perceived needs by the Brethren.

V.W. Richard Nadeau has taken over the leadership of the Mentoring Committee and has been working hard with local coordinators.

The Membership Committee, with R.W. Richard Bergeron as chairman, has been working to jumpstart our efforts. One of the first tasks I gave him was to create a video ad that would replace the Ben Franklin video that has been in use for a few years. I asked the opinion of the Franklin video of a few men in the 20 to 30 year age group who were not masons. The response was unanimous that it gave them a negative impression as it presented Masons as old men who were stuck in the 1700s. I asked the committee to create a video that would more accurately reflect who we are today. They brought in a Mason who, at the time he began working on this project was still a FC. That is Br. Chris Jones and what he put together still awes me each time I see it. As much as most Masons regard the Ben Franklin video, I have pointed out to them that the goal of this video is to impress those who are not yet masons and not those who are already. One tool that the Membership has offered is being used by far too few Lodges. That is the Masonic Rookie Program. We recently held the second annual recognition dinner for new Masonic Rookies in Bangor. Brother after Brother spoke about how engaged they felt as a result of taking part. The statistics show that greater than 80% of Masonic Rookies have become officers in their Lodge. 80% Brethren. There are very few Lodges in this Grand Jurisdiction that would not benefit from that kind of result. I find it baffling that every Lodge is not taking part and disappointing and frustrating that some profess a total lack of awareness of it. We can do better!

There are many projects that Lodges are engaged in, some of which qualify for matching grants from the Charitable Foundation. Far and away the most popular project is Bikes for Books. This program, under the direction of Wor. Michael Theriault, has exploded here in Maine. In District after District I have heard from Brethren who are using this program. They describe how it has energized Brethren in their Lodge and how the children, parents and school employees rave about it. One Mason who is a school administrator told me about a young boy, 10 or 11 years old, had read 30 books because of Bikes for Books. My wife, a school librarian noted that it is notoriously difficult to get young boys to read, but that once this habit is begun it usually is a lifelong habit. We all have heard about the lack of name recognition that Masonry suffers from. In the communities that offer Bikes for Books, there are hundreds of children who are growing up knowing exactly who we are! Thank you, Br. Theriault!

Your Charitable Foundation has been busy this past year. One item that will relate directly to the Lodges is that the Grant Programs, Bikes for Books, Community Betterment, Youth Activities and Project Graduation will now match Lodge contributions up to \$1000 instead of \$500.

Other news from the Charitable Foundation is that through it, a new Masonic Library addition is under construction at the Grand Lodge Office in Holden. Many thanks go out to Brethren who have donated to make this possible. The greatest impact on our fundraising for this addition was made by our Grand Secretary, R.W. Mark Rustin. Br Rustin put in countless hours and many, many miles to speak to Brethren, Lodges and others in support of this goal. A tip of the Grand Master's hat to R.W. Rustin and a hearty round of applause is in order!

The issue of insurance has been on the table for what seems like forever. This is due in no small way to the ever changing landscape of the insurance world and what was a lack of awareness on the part of the Fraternity. We labored under the false impression that we could insure all bodies of Masonry under one umbrella. As it has been explained to us, that is like trying to cover a neighbor's home under our own policy. Since other bodies operate under their own rules and constitutions, they cannot be considered child accounts. There were and still are some issues with insurance in lodges around the state. Our DGM has been very diligent in working with our Insurance Committee (Br. Fred Lunt in particular) to address these issues. I wish to acknowledge their tenacity in working on each issue to find a resolution and offer my sincere thanks. Another result of the changes in how we insure lodges was that it was discovered that some lodges were operating as building owners. This is not legal or wise. M.W. Wayne Adams has been working with many lodges to address this issue and we all owe him our thanks. One of my goals for the coming year is to establish a task force to review the practices of ownership, insurance and tax filing for all lodges in our Grand Jurisdiction. We need to get this under control before a serious issue befalls us.

Table Lodges have been another area of concern. A few weeks ago, I issued instructions to each District Deputy that the serving of alcohol at Table Lodges must be monitored by them at every event. We have become a little lax about following the rules that require no more than seven toasts and no more than 2 ounces of wine for each toast. I have reminded them of SR 75 which reads in part "The Grand Lodge Representative at each Table Lodge is authorized to intervene to assure that only two-ounce glasses are used and to personally intervene to halt dispensation of wine to any person more than the seven two-ounce toasts and to personally prevent any service of wine to a minor under any circumstances." We cannot allow ourselves to fall victim to the false notion that these rules can be bent in the name of having a fun event. Should any accident befall a Brother who has attended one of these events and had more to drink than allowed, the consequences could be devastating. More than that imagine how you might feel if you turned a blind eye to these abuses and a friend and Brother was injured or worse. I do not want that on my conscience and will not allow any Lodge or Brother to put us all in jeopardy!

We must also be increasingly vigilant about our conduct in the online world. It is too easy to post a picture or a comment on a web site that is not appropriate for a Mason. Let us not fall into that trap. As Masons we need to do our best to keep our passions and prejudices within due bounds, remembering that each one of us is the world's perception of our craft.

We have suffered the loss of many Brethren across the state this past year. Two of them were Past Grand Wardens, R.W. Douglas B. Taylor, PSGW and R.W. N. James Coolong, PSGW. The loss of these two Brethren has been felt throughout this Grand Jurisdiction. They were lifelong supporters of the Craft and I counted them as close personal friends. They can never be replaced but we can honor them by continuing to conduct ourselves as good men and Masons, as they did for their entire adult lives.

Another personal loss was that of R.W. Randy S. Raymond, who passed away while serving Grand Lodge and his District as District Deputy Grand Master. The Brethren of the 9th Masonic District will be trying to deal with that loss for some time to come. This loss seems all the more devastating because it came so suddenly and was unexpected. I was speaking to Br. Raymond at length only 2 nights before his passing. At that time he was just as full of life and enthusiasm as ever.

On a more positive note, I have been honored to participate with M.W. Wayne Adams and other past and present members of the Armed Forces to sit in as guest officers at MM Degrees. These degrees have made a special night for a new Brother even more so. M.W. Adams recently performed the MM Degree on an active duty serviceman for the 50th time. The work has been outstanding! I wish to thank M.W. Adams and all those guest officers for allowing me to be a small part of these degrees and to offer them and all other past and present Brothers of the Armed Forces my deepest respect and gratitude.

I would like to thank all of the Officers of the Grand Lodge of Maine for their time and hard work in doing the business of this Grand Lodge to the benefit of the Craft. I especially wish to thank R.W. Tom Pulkkinen, R.W. Chis DiSotto, R.W. Brian Messing, R.W. Scott Whytock and R.W. Mark Rustin for all of their support. No Grand Master could ask for better.

As I have said many times over the past year, Masonry special. One of the things that makes it so special is the bonds we all share because. We all took the same vows at the altar of Masonry. At that altar we promised to live our lives by the principals of Masonry and to be true to one and other. Let us never forget that those promises we made are binding and not mere words spoken as a part of our degree journey. So long as we keep the vows we made to each other and to the Grand Architect of the Universe, Masonry will remain the greatest Fraternity that the world has ever seen.

Finally I would like to thank the Brethren of the entire jurisdiction. Remember. Brethren, it is about you, not me. Masonry resides first in every Lodge in the State and in every Brother. God Bless you all.

The Grand Secretary moved that:

1. The Grand Master's address be referred to the Committee on Doings of Grand Lodge Officers.
2. The reports of the Deputy Grand Master, Grand Wardens, Grand Secretary and Grand Lecturer be referred to the same Committee without reading.

Both motions were seconded and approved.

The Grand Master then directed the Grand Marshal to present RW John T. Irovando to the Grand East.

Report of the Committee On Masonic Jurisprudence

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine:

The Grand Master was presented with sixty-eight Dispensations, most of them asking him to waive certain provisions of our Constitution and Standing Regulations when the clear language of those documents permit and in such other cases where similar Dispensations have been permitted by custom and usage.

From March 31, 2014 thru January 16, 2015 a total of 14 Applications for Dispensation were approved by the Grand Master for the Masonic Trustees of Portland authorizing the use of the first floor of the building for various functions to be hosted by licensed caterers, Blue Elephant Catering.

Two Applications for Dispensation (September 19, 2014 and December 15, 2014) were approved by the Grand Master for Union Lodge # 31 allowing the Lessee, Andrew Cunningham, to allow patrons of a dance to consume alcoholic beverages in the dining area.

One Application for Dispensation (December 24, 2014) was approved by the Grand Master for the Bangor Masonic Foundation allowing the consumption of alcoholic beverages during a dinner dance.

One Application for Dispensation (November 25, 2014) was approved by the Grand Master for Bethlehem Lodge # 35 allowing the serving of alcoholic beverages at an event honoring the Most Illustrious Grand Master and Grand High Priest.

One Application for Dispensation (March 9, 2015) was approved by the Grand Master for Triangle Lodge # 1 to host a small reception on March 10, 2015 and March 15, 2015 allowing the serving of alcoholic beverages.

One Application for Dispensation (February 20, 2015) was approved by the Grand Master for Tranquil Lodge # 29 allowing the serving of an alcoholic beverage to be used as a toast at a Scottish Rite event.

One Application for Dispensation (January 21, 2015) was approved by the Grand Master for Amity Lodge # 6 allowing wine to be served at an annual ladies day catered event.

One Application for Dispensation (July 10, 2014) was approved by the Grand Master for St. Paul's Lodge # 82 allowing the serving of alcoholic beverages at a weekend dinner of the Scottish Rite to be held at the Rockport Masonic Center.

One Application for Dispensation (May 28, 2014) was approved by the Grand Master for Rabboni Lodge # 150 allowing the serving of alcoholic beverages at the Scottish Rite Council of Deliberation taking place at the Auburn Masonic Hall.

All of the above Applications dealing with the serving of alcohol on lodge premises were accompanied by proper Certificates of Insurance and the requirements of Standing Regulation 75 complied with and we recommend that they all be ratified.

An Application for Dispensation was approved by the Grand Master (February 6, 2015) for Mystic Lodge # 65 to conduct a Table Lodge of Instruction at the Bangor Masonic Center. We recommend that this be ratified.

An Application for Dispensation (April 3, 2014) was approved by the Grand Master for Belfast Lodge # 24 authorizing the Low XII Riders, Central Maine Chapter, Widow Sons, Motorcycle Riding Association to perform an Entered Apprentice Degree on (May 12, 2014) wearing vests/regalia. It was subsequently found that this organization was not certified by the Grand Lecturer as a Degree Team. Therefore it is recommended that this not be ratified.

An Application for Dispensation (March 19, 2014) was approved by the Grand Master for Morning Star Lodge # 41 allowing the conferring of a degree prior to the required time restriction for a member of the US Navy who would be returning to his duty assignment prior to that requirement.

An Application for Dispensation (November 22, 2014) was approved by the Grand Master for Nezinscot Lodge # 101 allowing the conferring of a degree prior to the required time restriction for a member of the US Navy who would be returning to his duty assignment prior to that requirement.

Per Sec. 130. The Grand Master on being satisfied of the necessity may issue a dispensation to permit degrees to be conferred in less than the required time. Therefore, it is recommendation that both be ratified.

Ten Applications for Dispensations were approved by the Grand Master authorizing lodges to conduct Outdoor Degrees. These included the following:

Seven Applications for Dispensation were approved by the Grand Master authorizing the wearing of full regalia for presentations of Bikes for Books or other awards at schools, holding a church service, participating in a Memorial event honoring local veterans, and conducting a fund raiser for Christmas meals. These included:

All of these applications appear to contain the proper requirements therefore, it is our recommendation that they be ratified.

An Application for Dispensation for Eastern Lodge # 7 was approved by the Grand Master (March 10, 2015) authorizing the holding of an International Night by the 2nd Masonic District of the Grand Lodge of Maine and the 5th Masonic District of the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick Canada at the Eastport Youth Center. We recommend this be ratified.

An Application for Dispensation for Arundel Lodge # 76 was approved by the Grand Master (March 11, 2015) authorizing their tradition and pilot program of holding a Fourth Night in which newly raised masons receive the Master Mason Lecture, deliver proficiency, and receive the Charge along with other information. We recommend that this be ratified.

Three Applications for Dispensation were approved by the Grand Master allowing a different date for the Annual Election of Lodge Officers. All three came about due to

the fact that there was a lack of a Quorum at the scheduled Annual Meeting. These lodges included:

1. Dirigo Lodge # 104 (December 5, 2014)
2. Howard Lodge # 69 (December 14, 2014)
3. Parian Lodge # 160 (January 3, 2015)

Under the circumstances described it appears proper that a dispensation was requested and the Grand Master did approve the election of the lodge officers to take place on another date. (1886 p.155) Therefore, it is our recommendation that these be ratified.

An Application for Dispensation for Bristol Lodge # 74 was approved by the Grand Master (March 30, 2015) authorizing a special election for the purpose of electing a Junior Warden. The elected but not yet installed lodge member was not able to serve. This was found to be proper (1866p155) and we recommend it be ratified.

An Application for Dispensation for Siloam Lodge # 92 not hold the Annual Election of Lodge Officers on January 1, 2015 was approved by the Grand Master on December 29, 2014. It does appear that the only reason not to hold the Stated Communication and Annual Meeting on that date was due to the fact that it was New Year's Day and for the convince of the lodge members. It does not appear that there was a failure for any reason to elect the lodge officers and there does not appear to be any emergency to disregard the by-laws of the lodge. As a result it is the recommendation that this dispensation not be ratified.

An Application for Dispensation for Washington Lodge # 37 (May 5, 2014) approved by the Grand Master authorizing the lodge Stated Communication on May 8, 2014 to be opened at 7:00 pm instead of 7:30 pm due to the Master, Senior Warden and Junior Warden attending the Grand Lodge session. It is the recommendation that this dispensation not be ratified.

An Application for Dispensation for Limestone Lodge # 214 was approve by the Grand Master (November 24, 2014) authorizing the lodge to temporally hold its meetings at a different location; this due to the fact that the Limestone Masonic Building Association had closed the building due to the fact of not having funds to supply heat, electricity, and water. A second Application for Dispensation was approved by the Grand Master (March 24, 2015) allowing the extension of the first application. Both applications appear to meet the requirements and it is recommended that they be ratified. (Note: One Committee Member being a member of Limestone Lodge # 214 did not vote on this recommendation).

An Application for Dispensation for Kenduskeag Lodge # 137 was approved by the Grand Master (March 5, 2015) to hold a Special Communication at the Bangor Masonic Center due to problems with the furnace at the Kenduskeag Lodge Building.

An Application for Dispensation for Lewy's Island Lodge # 138 was approved by the Grand Master (January 23, 2015) to hold a Special Communication at St. Croix Lodge # 46 due to the fact that Lewy's Island building would be dark until spring.

It is recommended that both of these be ratified.

An Application for Dispensation for United Lodge #8 (November 7, 2014) was refused (denied) by the Grand Master authorizing that the 1 year resident requirement be waived due to the fact that applicant had lived in Maine prior. The Committee finds the action taken by the Grand Master to be proper and in accordance with the Constitution.

The committee found that there were two Applications for Dispensation submitted to the Grand Master which he found inappropriate and as a result took no action on. These included:

Composite Lodge # 168 (Requested July 6, 2014) and Excelsior Lodge # 151 (Requested July 19, 2014).

An Application for Dispensation for York Lodge # 22 was approved by the Grand Master (March 11, 2015) allowing for the first reading of two applications for membership to take place at a Special Communication to be held on March 16, 2015. Although the Committee had questions concerning why this would be necessary it was found that the action taken by the Grand Master was proper. Therefore it is recommended that this dispensation be ratified.

No other matters have been referred to the Committee involving questions of Masonic law and practice for consideration. In conclusion, your Committee unanimously moves the acceptance of this Report and the adoption of the recommendations contained therein.

Of this number 94 were Past Masters of their lodges, 18 were Grand Lodge Officers, 2 of which were elected to the office of Senior Grand Warden. Their loss is deeply mourned by the brethren, and their families to whom we all extend our heart-felt sympathy.

It is with much sorrow that we make this report on the deaths of so many brethren. Your Grand Chaplains sent 152 letters of sympathy to Widows of whom we have

current addresses. Let me now express my grateful appreciation to the Grand Chaplains who have worked with me and taken upon themselves this most important responsibility. They are; RW Dwight C. Whitney, Sr.; RW Ken Hanscomb, Jr.; RW Neal R. Haines; RW Leslie M Gray; RW Rev. Dr. Stephen M. Tolander; RW Bakhtawer Bilal; RW Rev. Jack Cole; RW Robert A. Hancock; and RW Mark S. Zimmerman.

With profound sorrow I would be pleased to make special mention of three particular past Grand Lodge Officers.

RW N. James Coolong: Born in Houlton, Maine on January 10, 1936. Passed away at Bangor Maine Hospital on February 11, 2015. Jim was raised to the sublime degree of a Master Mason at Aroostook Lodge #197, Mars Hill, Maine on June 27, 1963. He affiliated Monument Lodge #96, Houlton, Maine on March 24, 1999 and also affiliated Caribou Lodge #170, Caribou, Maine on December 10, 2013. Jim was also affiliated with the Ancient and Accepted Scottish Rite of the Northern Jurisdiction, Valley of Bangor, Valley of Portland and the Supreme Council. Jim served our Grand Lodge as an Assistant Grand Lecturer in 1977, Grand Lecturer in 1988, District Deputy Grand Master of district #1, 1972 to 1974, and was elected Senior Grand Warden in 1980. He served on several Grand Lodge committees; On Ritual as chairman from 2007 to 2011, on Masonic Jurisprudence from 2010 to 2012, Commissioners of Trials from 2008 to Death. Jim was awarded a Past Masters Certificate on February 6, 1970, Simon Greenleaf Medal on May 3, 1983 and the Josiah Hayden Drummond Distinguished Service Medal on May 3, 1988. He was presented his 50 Year Service Medal on June 22, 2013. Jim served on many other committees within his church and was well respected statewide as an educator.

RW Douglas Byard Taylor: Born in Lincoln, Maine on May 26, 1920. Passed away in Auburn, Maine on February 5, 2015. Doug was raised to the sublime degree of a Master Mason on March 14, 1957 at Siloam Lodge #92 in Fairfield, Maine. He joined Waterville Lodge #33 in 1967 where he served as Master from 1973 to 1974, Chaplain from 1974 to 1992, and Treasurer from 1993 to 2011. He was District Education Representative of the Grand Lodge of Maine's 12th Masonic District from 1987 to 1988, District Deputy Grand Master of that district from 1988 to 1990, and elected Grand Senior Warden of the Grand Lodge of Maine from 1993 to 1994. Doug was very active as a member of the York Rite Bodies in which he served as Grand High Priest of Grand Chapter in 1991, Grand Illustrious Master of Grand Council in 1990 and Grand Commander of Grand Commandry in 1977. He also served Augusta Valley as Treasurer from 1978 to 2008. On September 30, 1981 he was coroneted a Sovereign Grand Inspector General, 33°, Honorary Member of the Supreme Council of the Northern Masonic Jurisdiction of the Ancient Accepted Scottish Rite of the United States of America in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania.

RW Randy Scott Raymond: Born February 15, 1959. Passed away January 3, 2015. Randy was raised to the sublime degree of a Master Mason on June 13, 1994 at King Solomon's Lodge #61 in Waldoboro, Maine. He served as Master of

King Solomon's Lodge from 2002 to 2004. He was appointed District Education Representative of the Grand Lodge of Maine's 9th Masonic District from 2005 to 2007 and again from 2011 to 2014. He was appointed District Deputy Grand Master of the 9th District from 2007 to 2009 and again served as District Deputy from 2014 until his death. Randy was affiliated with the Ancient and Accepted Scottish Rite - Northern Masonic Jurisdiction, Valley of Rockland and Valley of Portland. He was also a member of Kora Shrine.

As a point of note I would like to relate to a letter I received from Randy's widow, Sharon Raymond. In it she refers to how much Randy loved our fraternity and the time he devoted to teaching other lodges what being a Mason really means. She relates to his funeral being attended by over three hundred people and that the funeral director had never seen so many Mason's at a brother's service. She ended her letter with a most grateful and loving recognition of King Solomon's Lodge #61 for the devoted attention she is receiving from them and asks if there is a way that they could be recognized. I think today we would do well to recognize King Solomon's Lodge #61 as a fine example of what being a Mason really means.

Report on the George Washington Masonic Memorial

It was a humbling honor to be elected as the 3rd Vice President which puts me in line to be president in 6 years I believe, that too is a humbling honor and I look forward to representing Maine, hopefully very well and you will be proud of what we can do down there.

I should also say that each state, jurisdiction has a representative to the memorial, an ambassador if you will. Our ambassador is Brother Tom Emery. Either he or I would be happy if you would like a program put on at any time, just give us a call. Or if you have any questions about the memorial, or if we can help you in any way visit

the memorial or answer any questions you may have, please give us a call. We are both here to help you. We have a variety of materials to provide as well.

That being said I would like to give you a little update on the memorial. Those of you that have been there probably appreciate as I felt the first time I visited. I brought along a young mason about a year ago or so. As we rounded the road where you could see the memorial in full view, I heard from him a bit of a gasp, a sigh, a wow and an “Oh my GOD” or something like that. It reminded me of the feelings I had the first time I had viewed this amazing tribute to our first president and mason. I was moved by the structure as well as by the exhibits to George Washington. I was moved by the importance Freemasonry had in Brother George Washington’s life. It’s humbling to have the honor and privilege to be a part of the memorial and Brother Washington’s life and to learn more about him because every time I’m there it’s just a marvelous experience to learn about who he was. He was the go to guy at that point in our history. To be a part of the mission of the memorial which is to inspire humanity through education, to emulate and promote the virtues, character and vision of Brother George Washington, the man, the mason and the father of our country. Well today our mission is to focus not only on maintaining the memorial but further to educate our members and the general public about George Washington, the man the mason, as well as the impact freemasonry had on his vision on the future, his integrity, his perspectives on living and his relationships with his fellow man.

Today our strategic plan focuses on this larger mission. It was the generosity and hard work of freemasonry of the United States that made the George Washington Masonic National Memorial a reality. What began as a dream and a desire to emulate and perpetuate the virtue, character and the vision of this great, and perhaps greatest American and father of our country, Brother George Washington, an enduring stone monument resulted in this beautiful memorial. That is a memorial I might add is more than just a stunning edifice. What it is about is perhaps more important than what it looks like.

The directors have formulated a long term plan, now in its 5th year. We have accomplished much but there is much more to do. The stabilization and restoration of the memorial that has deteriorated over the years is well in on the way. The most difficult and the most expensive restoration and repairs have been made. In the Maine Mason you probably saw me 330 feet off the ground on a scaffold looking at those repairs. Much has been accomplished but there is much more that needs to be done. None of this would be a reality if not for freemasonry in America and all of you free masons in Maine. The generosity of the Grand Lodge that is individual free masons is pulling us forward. So on behalf of the board of directors and myself I extend our sincere thanks and appreciation to each and every one of you. The memorial is yours my brethren, so take the time whenever you are down there and please come visit it and enjoy it. Thank you, Thank you Most Worshipful.

The Grand Master called W Glenn Mower, Chairman of Committee on Finance, to the Grand East.

Report of the Committee On Finance

To the Most Worshipful Grand Master and Brethren of the Grand Lodge of Maine, as your chairman of the Grand Lodge Committee on Finance, I am charged to present the operating budget for the ensuing year and to propose the appropriate per capita assessment to fund that budget. Before I explain the proposed Grand Lodge Operating Budget for FY2016, I would like to report on the Committee's work since our last annual communication.

The Annual Audit

The annual audit is an import item for me, as a professional accountant and serving on several non-profit boards, it is sometimes overlooked. The constitution charges your Committee on Finance to engage an outside auditor and to examine the accounts of the Grand Treasurer. The annual audit for FY2013-14 was completed on July 17, 2014. The CPA firm of Macpage issued the Auditor's report. They found the Grand Treasurer's accounts in order and issued a non-qualified opinion or clean audit.

Highlights from our audited Balance Sheet:

Total Assets grew by 9.5% or \$141K

Invested Funds appreciated by 13.5% or \$128K

Unrestricted Fund Balance increased by 9.1% or \$120K

Totaling \$1.4 million.

Historical Record Preservation:

Your Grand Secretary brought to the Committee a proposal to digitize our historical records, which are entrusted to his care. Your Committee on Finance thought that this was an important strategic project using 21 century technology to preserve our most valuable records and offer to the craft the ability to search them on line without going to Holden. One important benefit of the project is that a back up file will be stored at the vendor's secured facility. After much discussion the project was approved by a 4-1 vote. The project will be funded using proceeds from the Moody Fund and therefore there was no cost to the craft which equates to a \$4.30 per member value.

Lease Renewal:

The Lease agreement with Holden Masonic Associates LLC was negotiated through the due diligence of your Grand Secretary. A 6-year lease agreement was crafted in which several items were modified that were contained with-in the current lease. The most important change however, is that the agreement is between the Grand Lodge of Maine and the Holden Masonic Assoc LLC and that the Maine Masonic Charities Foundation will sub-lease from the Grand Lodge. Therefore, the Grand

Lodge will be reimbursed by the MMCF for 50% of the rent payment as a shared expense. Also, after this next year the lease agreement allows for an annual 5% increase starting in year 2 (FY2017).

The 2015-16 Proposed Budget Overview:

Your Committee on Finance with the input from our Grand Master, Grand Lodge Officers and those who have committee responsibility has developed a budget that **for the forth consecutive year does not increase the per capita assessment of \$14.10.**

Contain in this Proposed Budget are prudent increases in compensation paid to our Grand Lodge Secretary, Treasurer and Staff in recognition of the excellent work and responsibilities required from the Grand Lodge; a 6-year lease agreement with Holden Masonic Associates, LLC with modifications to protect the building investment that we have made; a one time expenditure for the printing and distribution of the proposed amended Constitution and Resolutions to each lodge and required member at no charge to the brethren; also to ensure the Grand Masters' initiatives of membership recruitment and retainment, leadership development, mentoring & education are funded with the available financial resources ensuring positive outcomes.

I have reformatted the budget presentation to help with your comments or questions by using line numbers and have grouped the expense section into four categories.

Income Section:

Your Committee on Finance has budgeted for a decrease in membership of 500 or 2.7%. This reduces the Member Based Revenue (line 2) by \$ 8,550 which includes the per capita, Maine Mason and Washington Masonic Memorial assessments remitted by the subordinate lodges. Interest/Investment income (line 5) is increased based on are current projections with very good market conditions. Sales and Service Income (line 6) is reported as a net amount after the reduction in Cost of Goods Sold. Dedicated Fund Transfers (line 8) include those receipts from the Maine Mason and Washington Masonic Memorial assessments.

Decrease in Membership of 2.7% reduces the per capita revenue (net of transfers) by \$ 7,058

Total Gen Fund Revenue \$ 271,720 a decrease of \$ 2,255

Shared Expenses

An increase is proposed in Total Payroll Expense (line 15) of 5% for the excellent work that the Grand Secretary, Grand Treasurer and Office Staff have done for the craft. The increase in Rent (line 16) of \$12,000 is due to the accounting treatment of the lease renewal agreement with HMA LLC and it represents the MMCF portion of the lease payment. The increase in the Total Net Shared expenses (line 25) includes new Directors & Officers insurance coverage and an increase in the cost of printing the Annual Proceedings. The MMCF contribution (line 24) will increase by 37.4% to cover the 50% share of the lease renewal agreement (line 16) and increases in

other shared costs. The contribution amount of \$84,931 has been discussed and approved by the MMCF Finance Committee.

Overall payroll increase of \$ 6,713

Rent increase \$12,000 is the Sub Lease charge to MMC

Total Net Shared Expense \$ 148,175

An increase of \$ 2,939 in the Grand Lodge allocation

General Expenses

An increase in Lodge Supplies/Veteran Medals (line 27) of 8.4% based on our current lodge requests and membership statistics. The Grand Secretary is required to provide to each Lodge in the jurisdiction, free of charge, four printed copies plus one printed copy to each Grand Lodge member of the revised Grand Constitution and Resolutions. Therefore, a one-time expenditure (line 29) is proposed in this budget for the printing and distribution costs if this proposal is adopted at this 2015 Annual Communication.

Grand Constitution proposal \$ 11,000 (one time expense)

Total General Expense \$ 39,142 a net increase of \$ 3,252 (less \$11,000)

Administrative Expenses

Total Administrative expenses, which include Grand Master, Grand Lodge Officer, and the Annual Communication expenses (line 38) remain the same as in FY2015.

Total Admin Expense \$ 61,000

Program Expenses

Your Finance Committee is committed to adequate funding of the Grand Master's program initiatives to the Craft that are advanced by the various Grand Lodge Committees. However, the Committee on Finance has made some adjustments to the budget requests that were submitted by the Program Committees with a net decrease of \$3,425 or 6.6% in the overall total Program Expenses (line 44). This decrease includes a reduction in expenses for our October Open House promotion (line 40) and the MEALS committee for lodge recognition (line 41) with additional funding for the Rookie and Mentoring programs (line 42). This will ensure the continued positive outcomes of our programs while balancing the available financial resource

Total Program Expense \$ 48,450 a reduction of \$ 3,425

The Bottom Line

The proposed budget expenditures of \$ 297,267 (line 45) is more than the projected budget income of \$ 271,720 (line 9) which leaves a deficit of \$ 25,547 (line 46) which includes the one time expense of \$11,000 (line 29) for the printing and distribution of the revised Grand Lodge Constitution and Resolutions. The Committee recommends that this deficit will be funded through surpluses attained from FY2014 (\$22,948) and projected FY2015 (\$1,919)

Committee on Finance Motions

That the Grand Lodge of Maine approves the Grand Lodge Committee on Finance's recommended budget for FY 2016 that begins on April 1, 2015.

That the Grand Lodge of Maine approves the Grand Lodge Committee on Finance's recommendation of the current per capita assessment of \$14.10 for the ensuing year.

It has been a pleasure to serve the craft of this great fraternity dedicated to the advancement of brotherly love and charity.

A motion was made, seconded, and passed to approve the Budget as submitted.

Presentation of the Maine Masonic Charitable Foundation

RW Mark Rustin presented a brief overview of the fund raising done by the Foundation during the previous year. He noted that enough funds were raised to allow the Foundation to remain a 501c3 Public Foundation. The majority of funds raised were given to allow the expansion of the Grand Lodge Library. He also stressed the necessity of continued efforts to maintain this status going forward. He encouraged the Brethren and Lodges to generously respond to appeals during the year.

Committee on Amendments to the Constitution

To the Most Worshipful Grand Master, Officers, Members and Brethren of this Jurisdiction:
Our Constitutional amending responsibilities are few in number this year, but nonetheless important to the successful operations of our Grand Lodge. We must

consider six amendments offered in their first reading last year, and now ripe for final determination. We also will be asked to consider one new proposal being offered this year for the first time.

Each of the six articles was accepted, referred to the appropriate committee, entered upon the records of Grand Lodge, and sent to the several lodges for their consideration. They were, in fact, tabled for final action this year, and each must be removed from the table before being considered today.

Voting on these, then, is a two-step process. This body of Masons must first vote to remove each proposed amendment from the table. Once done, we can vote on actual disposition of the proposal.

Let us begin.

The first proposal presented last year to be considered at this hour is the revision of our Constitution. Back in 2013, Grand Master Jim Ross and then-Deputy Grand Master David Walker charged your Amendments Committee to reorganize our Constitution – our Maine Masonic guiding document – in such a way that it would be easier for all to use. Committee members believe that goal has been accomplished.

During his installation, every lodge master is charged to study the Constitution and cause it to be read in his lodge that none may profess ignorance of its requirements.

Your Amendments Committee members, R.W. Brother Alan Heath, R.W. Brother Bradford Blake and I are certain that this reorganized Masonic Code will make that responsibility more enjoyable and therefore more productive and beneficial to the Craft.

I would entertain a motion to remove this revision of our Constitution from the table.

Your Committee on Amendments to the Constitution recommends adoption of this corrected revision and I would entertain a motion to that end.

Motion passed. New Code adopted.

Let us now consider first the four amendments proposed last May by our Grand Secretary, R.W. Brother Mark Rustin. The proposed changes all have to do with the duties of the Grand Secretary, and, more specifically, processes for meeting those responsibilities.

These proposed amendments take reference to the Constitution in effect last May. If approved, they will be positioned in the appropriate sections of your newly revised Constitution.

As proposed, Section 23 would read as follows: “He (the Grand Secretary) shall make available printed proceedings of the Grand Lodge, blanks for applications for the Charity Fund, blanks for returns with a circular stating when they must be returned, and diplomas from his office directly to the lodges.”

What this proposal does is replace the directive that the Grand Secretary send the items, replacing the word “send” with the words “make available.” This is possible because forms are now available from the Grand Lodge website and other electronic means.

I would entertain a motion to remove from the table this proposed amendment to Sec. 23, paragraph six.

Your Committee on Amendments recommends adoption of this proposal and I would entertain a motion to that end.

motion passed

The next proposal would amend SEC. 23, paragraph ten, which now directs that he forward two copies of the Grand Lodge proceedings to every Grand Jurisdiction recognized by our Grand Lodge, as well as one copy to each Grand Lodge Officer and Permanent Member of the Grand Lodge and two copies to each lodge.

As proposed the words forward to would be replaced with the word provide. Accepting this amendment will not affect distribution of Annual Proceedings in this State. Every Permanent Member and Grand Lodge Officer will continue to receive a printed copy, and each lodge would still receive two printed copies as has been the practice for decades. The change affects distribution only to other jurisdictions. They will receive pdf copies rather than printed copies.

So, as proposed, SEC. 23, paragraph 10 would read: The Grand Secretary shall provide copies thereof to each of the Grand Lodges of the United States and such other jurisdictions as are recognized by this Grand Lodge, one copy to each Officer and Permanent Member of this Grand Lodge and two copies to each lodge.”

I would entertain a motion to remove from the table, this proposed amendment to SEC, 23, Paragraph ten.

Your Committee on Amendments recommends adoption of this article and I would entertain a motion to that end.

motion passed

The Grand Secretary also offered an amendment to SEC. 90.3 which, if adopted, would read as follows:

SEC. 90.3 Every Master Mason raised by a constituted lodge in this Grand Jurisdiction is entitled to a diploma that shall be prepared and provided by the Grand Secretary's office.

This amendment would eliminate the issuance of a diploma certificate if the original diploma is lost or otherwise destroyed.

I would entertain a motion to remove from the table, this proposed amendment to SEC. 90.3.

I would entertain a motion to accept this proposed amendment, and, if offered, invite the Grand Secretary to explain his reasoning.

motion passed

The Grand Secretary's final proposal would, if adopted, be SEC. 92A and would read as follows: "When allowed by its by-laws, a lodge Master may, when weather conditions cause reasonable concerns for the health and welfare of the brethren of his lodge, postpone a stated meeting for up to 48 hours with due notice to the membership."

I would entertain a motion to remove from the table, this proposed amendment identified as SEC. 92A.

I would entertain a motion to adopt this proposed amendment.

motion passed

Our Grand Lecturer, R.W. Brother Harland Harnden, in an attempt to enhance and maintain quality ritual throughout this jurisdiction, submitted the following proposed amendment:

SEC. 24B. A District Ritual Instructor will be appointed annually by the Grand Master for each Masonic District. The District Ritual Instructor shall, under the direction of the Grand Lecturer and his staff, ensure the correct mode of work and lectures within the several districts. He shall be entrusted with such materials as are necessary to provide accurate instruction, and shall attend all such Schools of Instruction as are provided for in his District. He shall make periodic reports to the Lecturer assigned to his District as may be required by the Grand Lecturer.

I would entertain a motion to remove this proposed amendment from the table.

I would entertain a motion to adopt this proposed amendment.

motion passed

We have one final piece of Constitutional business to consider. An amendment to SEC. 33 (21 in the new Constitution) has been presented that would, if adopted, allow for appointment of one Assistant Grand Lecturer in each Masonic District. This amendment would consolidate all ritual related instruction and assessment in one District officer who will work for the Grand Lecturer and with his District Deputy Grand Master and District Education Representative.

SEC. 33, (21 in the new Constitution) paragraph two would read: The Grand Master shall appoint an Assistant Grand Lecturer in each District. This officer would assume duties and responsibilities of the District Ritual Instructor, instruct on ritual text and meaning, schedule and oversee District Schools of Instruction, encourage initiatives to enhance ritual proficiency and understanding, and assume responsibility from the District Deputy for annual assessments of lodge ritual proficiency.

Brethren, I would entertain a motion that this proposed amendment be entertained, referred to the appropriate committee, entered upon the records of the Grand Lodge, sent to the several lodges for consideration, and be deemed in order to take up at the next annual communication.

Report of the Masonic Bikes for Books Program

Most Worshipful Grand Master, Distinguished East, Brethren all,
Good Afternoon. Bikes For Books has grown rapidly here in Maine since it started in Madison in 2008, and this year was a banner year for lodge participation. As of this Grand Lodge session I have had contact with 52 lodges. We will award over 1500 bicycles and helmets this school year. Bikes for Books is a perfect opportunity for your lodge to become more visible in your community. For those of you who are unfamiliar with the program, here is a quick overview.

Bikes for Books is a reading incentive program for students in grades K-8. Students are asked to read as many books or selections as they can. Individual schools and grade levels have the freedom to tailor the program to the needs and abilities of the student, so it is fair for everyone. For every completed reading they receive a ticket that they place in the box for their grade level. At the end of the program, usually 5-6

weeks, one girl's name and one boy's name are drawn from each grade. The winners receive a new bicycle and helmet.

I have a good contact with Huffy Bicycle Corporation, and can order bicycles directly from Huffy at cost, which saves a lot of money, especially when I order many at one time. I am working on a better way to streamline the ordering process, and working to acquire a few more buildings to use as pick up sites. That will make delivery easier as well.

The Grand Lodge Charitable Foundation continues to support this program by purchasing all the helmets for the program, and I thank the members for their help. If your lodge is running a Bikes for Books program, I do not need to tell you how much fun it is. If your lodge is not, then you are missing out on a most enjoyable experience. Right from the start, kids get excited about the chance to win a new bicycle and helmet. I always enjoy the final assembly.

We roll into the school with a truckload of new bicycles and line them up in the gym. We gather the ticket boxes and bring them to the gym. Always in the final minutes before the students are called down, kids rush in with a few more tickets, hoping for that one last chance to win. When a name is drawn and called out, the cheers for the students is outstanding. The kids are genuinely happy for the winners, even though their names were not chosen. The winners race down the get their new bike. This is when the most rewarding thing happens. The child will look at you and say, "Thank You," or "This is the first new bike I have ever had!" or "I've been trying so hard to win!" Then there are the children that through all the cheers for winning the new bike, will say to you, "I have a nice bike at home so please give this one to someone else who needs it." or "Could you draw another name? I have a good bike at home." I have even had a winner donate his bicycle to a local safe house for survivors of domestic abuse.

Not only is this program expanding the child's reading level and habits, but it is giving them the opportunity to do a good deed for someone else. I could go on for hours about the wonderful stories shared with me from this program. Lodges often receive thank you letters from students and parents, and this is another highlight of the program for me. This letter from a parent sent to Arundel Lodge# 76 stood out.

"Hello,

My son Marston, was one of the lucky winners of the Bikes For Books at Kennebunkport Consolidated School. He is a 5th grader, and was very excited to win! Marston's win is extra special because he has profound Autism, and the school went WILD when his name was called. Although he cannot read at the level of his peers, he works very very hard on his reading. We did not have a bike for Marston, because it has been difficult for his to learn to ride alone. He LOVES riding on a "tag along" bike with his Dad, but riding alone has been hard for him, and we had yet to make the investment for a bike he might not ever use. But after winning the bike in your program, it motivated us again to help him learn to ride! Stability is an issue for

him, so we ordered some fancy "adult training wheels" for his bike. They came yesterday, and we put them on. YOU SHOULD HAVE SEEN THE LOOK ON HIS FACE WHEN HE FIRST GOT ON!!! Absolutely priceless ... He will be representing (with his big new training wheels) at the parade on Saturday. He and his Dad will not be there right at 12:30 due to a baseball commitment in Biddeford, but Marston will be there before the parade starts! This program, Bikes For Books, is absolutely AMAZING. Marston is just one of the great stories created due to your fundraising efforts and volunteer work! Not only is reading an essential life-long skill to value and foster, but I believe riding a bike is the RIGHT of all children everywhere ... and also great exercise. Your Bikes for Books program accomplishes so much!

The vote for Junior Grand Warden was opened and the tellers set to work.

In the uncontested balloting for Grand Treasurer, MW Pulkkinen asked the Grand Lodge to elect RW Whytock by acclamation. The Craft responded favorably and RW Whytock accepted.

In the uncontested balloting for Grand Secretary, MW Pulkkinen asked the Grand Lodge to elect RW Rustin by acclamation. The Craft responded favorably and RW Rustin accepted.

The vote for Directors of the Maine Masonic Charitable Foundation was opened and the tellers set to work.

Report of the Committee on Masonic Education and Lodge Services

The MEALS Committee started the year by conducting a full day of training for the District Education Representatives. The attendees were very attentive and it was obvious from the beginning that they were highly motivated and eager to provide top quality Masonic Educational Programs to their constituent lodges.

As you know, last year we developed and distributed a new Protocol Manual to all lodges within this Masonic jurisdiction. Our greatest accomplishment this year was to complete the filming of a new Protocol video that will be distributed to all lodges on memory sticks as soon as possible. Expedient completion of this extremely useful Masonic tool was accomplished by PRAXIS Production Studios, which is a two man operation, one of which, Brother Chris Jones, is a relatively new Maine Mason. This highly talented two man team was contracted to do the Protocol Video because of the extraordinary Membership DVD that they produced for the Membership Committee.

We also developed three Masonic Education Toolbox Items which focus upon the lessons that are taught during the Entered Apprentice, Fellowcraft and Master Mason Degrees. These products will be distributed to the 24 DER's very soon and will hopefully be utilized to conduct short Masonic Educational Programs for all lodges. Although there are numerous short interactive educational programs in the toolbox that is given to every DER already, there seems to be a tendency to over use only a select few of them. All of these programs have been written in such a way that they can be given in 15 – 20 minutes after a Stated Meeting within or outside of the lodge room and very little preparation is required. These programs can easily be led by the DER or the lodge educator. If any lodge wishes to see a list of what programs are included in the toolbox and/or want copies of any or all programs available, please

don't hesitate to ask your DER to see what is available or contact me, Tim Martel, at 729-1433 and I will do my best to help you. All that I ask is that the lodges first try to work with your DER's and if you need further assistance, don't hesitate to contact me. Also, anyone can write a Masonic Educational Toolbox Item and I encourage you to do so but if you do write one, please share it with me and the MEALS Committee so we can share it with all of the DER's and lodges.

Raymond Rideout Award

There were only seven submissions for the Raymond Rideout Award this year and two lodges stood out from the rest, i.e. Amity Lodge #6 at Rockport was nominated by V.W. Steven E. Gibbons, the 7th District's DER. The other outstanding lodge is Tranquil Lodge #29 at Auburn and they were nominated by V.W. Richard M. Nadeau, the 23rd District DER. Both lodges are doing an outstanding job of educating both their candidates and their membership alike. Furthermore, both lodges are very involved with their respective communities and have proved themselves to be excellent Ambassadors for Freemasonry. After a thorough review of all nominations, the M.E.A.L.S. Committee has unanimously selected Amity Lodge #6 as the Raymond Rideout Award Winner and Tranquil lodge #29 as The Runner Up.

The following is a sample of some of the activities that made Amity Lodge stand out:

- Amity Lodge #6 invites potential candidates and their families to dinner prior to being voted on. This enables lodge members to get acquainted with potential members and vice versa. This small gesture of Brotherly Love and Friendship says volumes about Amity Lodge and its members.
- After each man becomes an Accepted Candidates, both he and his family are invited to dinner, regardless of what degree work is being done that night.
- They publish a monthly newsletter and distribute it by email and U.S. Mail.
- They have a Facebook page. This enables the outside world to get a glimpse of Freemasonry and hopefully, causes some good men to petition the lodge for membership. Facebook is very popular among men of all ages but is especially interesting to younger men.
- All candidates are assigned an Elder Brother to help them learn their lesson strongly encouraged to give their lessons in Open Lodge along with their Elder Brother. After a Brother demonstrates proficiency of the Master Mason Degree in open lodge, he is given a lodge coin with the appropriate dates engraved on it.
- They have a very active Masonic Education Program and all brethren are encouraged to recommend, develop and present topics of interest to the lodge. Some of the topics that have been presented recently are:

- The Morgan Affair
 - Fun with Numbers
 - Trivia
 - The Immortal 9 who kept Amity Lodge going during the anti-Masonic era
-
- Recently, multiple members learned portions of the Master Mason Lecture. This provided some relief to the members who usually do these lectures and allowed more brothers to get involved with the degree.
 - Education has been a regular agenda item at every Stated Meeting for several years.
 - Guest Speakers have been invited to give presentations. Recently, one speaker gave a presentation on The American Flag and another spoke about Prince Hall Masonry.
 - Amity Lodge and St. Paul's Lodge maintain a common library that makes all sorts of educational materials available to the brethren. Recently, the two lodges teamed up and bought the first volume of Short Talk Bulletins. These will be utilized to conduct Masonic Education programs for the membership of both lodges.

In closing, the MEALS Committee and Masonry in Maine recently lost one of the hardest working and most devoted Masons in this jurisdiction when the Grand Architect of the Universe suddenly called R.W. Randy Raymond home. He was always calling me to bounce some of his ideas off of me and anyone who knew him would agree that not only did he "Think Outside of the Box", oftentimes he wasn't even close to the box. I used to tell him that and we would always get a good chuckle out of it. He was my good friend and brother and I will always miss him.

I want to thank all of the DER's who served the Craft this year. Each of you made a significant contribution to Masonry in Maine and I sincerely hope that this has been a positive experience for you.

I wish to thank all members of the MEALS Committee for their dedicated support and say that I am honored to serve with each of you.

Lastly, thank you Grand Master for everything that you have done to support me and the MEALS Committee. We would not be able to accomplish anything without your support.

Report of the Committee on Membership

The following is the annual report of the Membership Committee for the Grand Lodge of Maine for the period January 1, 2014 through December 31, 2014. During the past year, your membership committee has worked hard trying to provide tools for the craft for the purpose of building membership.

Under the leadership of our Grand Master, the Membership Committee has developed a promotional video. It was our goal to show this video through social media outlets and also at lodge public events. A copy of the video was mailed to every lodge earlier this year. Hopefully all have had a chance to view it. We also have more copies available for you at our membership table. You can also view it at askamainemason.org. The membership committee would like to publically thank Bro Chris Jones from Morning Star Lodge in Litchfield for his invaluable contribution to this endeavor.

This past year, lodges in this Grand Jurisdiction Initiated 460, Passed 398 and Raised 385 new Master Masons. We affiliated 146 and restored 101 for a total of 632 additions to this Grand Jurisdiction. However, we lost 398 to suspensions for non-payment of dues, 114 demitted, 14 expulsions and 544 to deaths for a total of 1,070 losses. The net loss for 2014 was 438.

Our current membership as of January 1, 2014 is 18,994 of which 859 are plural members leaving us with a distinct count of 18,135 masons in Maine. Over the past five years, we have had losses of 3,421 to deaths, 1,891 to suspensions for non-

payment of dues, 661 to demits and 41 to expulsions for a total of 6,041 total losses. During this same period we have raised 2,157 new masons for a net 5-year loss of 3,884.

Through the leadership of M.W. Ross and M.W. Walker this committee started a Masonic Rookie program. As of today, we have 103 brethren achieve that status. We held a banquet in their honor each year. The Rookie Program is designed to try to lower the amount of demits and suspensions from non-payment of dues by teaching good masonic habits to our newest brethren. It seems to be making a difference. Of these 103 brethren, all are still active. None have demitted or been suspended. In fact, many are currently lodge officers and taking active roles in their lodges. There are still others who may not have completed all 11 requirements to the program but have also developed those good masonic habits.

The rate of demits and NPDs have been declining. Two years ago we lost 541 from demits and NPDs and this past year we lost 384. We must continue to try and do a better job in keeping the masons we already have. Retention is not only the key to a good membership development plan. Retention is the key to our survival.

If you take out deaths, those districts that have embraced the Rookie Program have shown the greatest growth. Districts 6, 18 and 23 have shown the greatest growth on the past 5 years. All three of these districts have embraced the Rookie Program. We must continue to emphasize this program and try and get those lodges who do not endorse it to see its benefits.

We must also continue our efforts to attract new brethren. Fellowship events and public lodge events should continue. We must also think of ways to attract new brethren. Nearly ¼ of our lodges (44) have raised 5 or less brethren over the past 5 years. Two of those 44 have not raised a new mason in 5 years.

We have been holding statewide open houses the past few years with varying results. The lodges that plan a community event on those days have made this a successful event while those lodges who do nothing more than put out a banner and hope people come in have not been so successful. In addition, many lodges have chosen to hold their open houses on days other than the statewide October event for different reasons. It's more productive to hold an open house on a day when there may be a special town event. Lodges should have more than one opportunity each year where you invite the public. Public suppers, honoring a local teacher or emergency personnel, flea markets, farmers markets, summer concerts, board game day, or a cribbage tournament are just a few of the events lodges are doing. We would rather you schedule your open house around a special event you hold at your lodge.

In addition to events open to the public, lodges should consider other ways to attract potential members. Fellowship events have been very successful for many. If your lodge has never held a Fellowship event, consider it. Your membership committee is committed to assist you in planning one if you so desire.

There are many lodges doing great things. Visiting any of these lodges one can only go away feeling inspired and proud to be a Maine Mason. This year, we have continued our approach to honor those lodges that not only raised the most Master Masons but also recognize those lodges that showed positive growth. Report of the Maine Masonic College

As in the recent past, the Maine Masonic College scheduled twelve regular classes during the year. All were well received and most were well attended. In addition, the College made six additional presentations, some in response to requests from Masonic districts or individual Blue Lodges. We are continuing our efforts to reach a wider audience in all parts of Maine. This year, classes were held in Districts 1, 3, 6, 8, 10, 11, and 17. In an effort to find a date that would be more suitable to the Craft, the College moved the Annual Convocation from July to October. This year's Annual Convocation was held in Bangor and was well attended.

Another annual event is the College's Annual Celebration of the Arts & Sciences, which is aimed at adding interest in and elaboration of the seven arts and sciences that are introduced to the Candidate in the Fellow Craft degree. This event consistently draws a large crowd and has been warmly received by the attendees. Suzanne Nance's presentation in April of 2014 on the importance and influence of music in our lives was particularly appreciated. The 2015 theme for the Annual Celebration is the importance of the liberal arts and sciences in today's society and will be addressed by a team of professors from the University of Maine at Orono. There will, of course, be obvious implications for the Craft. We have been fortunate to be able to draw upon the skills and experience of the University throughout our early years and we hope to continue our association with UMaine in the future.

The first Maine Masonic College diplomas were awarded at the Convocation 2014. The diploma program has attracted increasing attention from the Craft during the past year. Additional Masons have shown an interest in entering the program, each in his own specialty. The program is not limited to Masons and at least one non-Mason has already received this recognition.

Last year we reported that we had received an inquiry from Connecticut about our experience in setting up the Maine Masonic College. This year we heard from a Prince Hall lodge in Arkansas asking similar questions. These requests reinforce our conviction that there is a widespread desire for more light in Masonry and that we are on the right track in our pursuit to provide that light in Maine.

Regent Brother Donald McDougal is leading the way to bring new technology to some of our presentations. While not new to everyone, Power Point programs have demonstrated that we can offer lessons that are more vivid and more illustrative

when we draw on tech-nology that is available to us but which we have heretofore largely neglected. We look forward to incorporating still more modern tech-niques to further enhance our teaching efforts.

In 2014, our first Dean of Academic Affairs, MW Walter Macdougall, handed over those responsibilities to RW Eric Kuntz. Brother Macdougall continues to labor in the vineyards of our endeavor and to lend support to the new Dean.

Not to be isolated from reality in our search for truth, we have brought some more administrative order to our organization. The addition of our board secretary, Theresa Hatch, has allowed us to better organize our plans and our records. In addition, we have consolidated our real property at the Grand Lodge office in Holden. Our financial archives have been stream-lined by Regent Brother Guy Chapman so that our planning is founded on a more precise appreciation of our capabilities.

Throughout our work of the past year, we have tried to sustain our emphasis on the need for civility in our Masonic fraternity and in our communities. Following the guidance of our Grand Master and drawing on the writing of RW Russ Charvonja, Grand Master of the Grand Jurisdiction of California, we are committed to including the concept of civility in our classes and our other presentations

We are deeply grateful for the unwavering support of our Grand Master. The Deputy Grand Master and the Grand Secretary have also lent their assistance to our efforts, attending our board meetings and our classes, and offering constructive suggestions for the improvement of our curriculum and the overall direction of the College. Without the generous funding by the Maine Masonic Charitable Foundation we could not continue our work and we wish to thank that body for its contribution to our successful programs.

MW, whereas Michael Callahan was referred by Tyrian Lodge #73 for disciplinary action, and whereas the Grand Master concurred and expelled him due to seven felony convictions in Maine District Court while a member of the Fraternity, I move that he be expelled from the rights and privileges of Freemasonry, for un-masonic conduct.

Gary R. Dorman

MW, whereas Gary R. Dorman plead guilty to a felony in Maine District Court while a member of the Fraternity, I move that he be expelled from the rights and privileges of Freemasonry, for un-masonic conduct.

Benjamin Frenette

MW, whereas Benjamin Frenette was referred by Mechanics Lodge #66 for disciplinary action, and whereas the Grand Master concurred and suspended him for unlawful conduct while a member of the Fraternity, I move that he be expelled from the rights and privileges of Freemasonry, for un-masonic conduct.

Kyle R. Green

MW, whereas Kyle R. Green has been charged with four felony counts in Maine District Court while a member of the Fraternity, and whereas he has been suspended by the Grand Master pending adjudication of the cases, I move that the suspension be continued and he be expelled from the rights and privileges of Freemasonry, for un-masonic conduct if convicted.

Michael E. Paul Jr.

MW, whereas Michael E. Paul Jr. was convicted of a felony in US District Court while a member of the Fraternity, and whereas he was expelled by the Grand Master for un-masonic conduct, and whereas a trial was conducted by the Commissioners of Trials who found him guilty of un-masonic conduct, I move that he be expelled from the rights and privileges of Freemasonry, for un-masonic conduct.

Report of the Grand Historian

"Since history has no proper scientific value, its only purpose is educative. And if historians neglect to educate the public, if they fail to interest it intelligently in the past, then all their historical learning is valueless except in so far as it educates themselves. " George M Trevelyan

"266 VOTE TO ABROGATE OBLIGATION OF A MASTER MASON."

Such might the headline of a muckraking daily newspaper have read on May 7, 2014 had a reporter had access to the proceedings of Grand Lodge the prior day. The vote of a few, approving the confessed violating of the chastity of a Brother Master Mason's wife, does not supercede Maine's ritual. It was but the action on one matter that does not establish precedence. Why, one may ask, is this to be addressed as

history only a year later? It is done for the very reason that it is part of our history as a Grand Lodge. It will be part of that by which we are judged. It will be a factor which we must address as we go forward and answer the question "What came we here to do?" More to the point perhaps: "What does it say of our commitment to a Brother?"

THE HISTORICAL SETTING

This was a case in which a sitting Master of a lodge preferred charges against a Past Master of another lodge for having sexual intercourse with his wife while they were still living together. The charge had to be filed in the lodge of the alleged wrong doer where it was unanimously denied. The matter was appealed to the Commissions of Trials and a hearing was held. The accused and the wife both testified and admitted the charge. It was further admitted by the accused that after his wife died he continued the relationship while the Mason's wife obtained a divorce. The accused was unanimously found guilty of the charge by the Commissioners of Trials. This decision was affirmed by the Committee on Grievances and Appeals which recommended his expulsion from Masonry.

The seriousness of the charge against the Brother and of the profound importance of the vote about to be taken was put forth by Grand Master A. James Ross in his Grand Master's Annual Address. While what follows was printed in last year's "Proceedings of the Grand Lodge," it needs to be put forth yet again as G.M. Ross' comments are to the point on the issue under consideration.

"The Entered Apprentice Degree clearly demonstrates that we have entered the ground floor of an association or union of men; an environment of fraternalism. The Fellowcraft Degree expounds on these same principles while it is preparing us for a greater calling and for a higher expectation which speaks to our moral conduct and truths. Those truths are demonstrated as we become skilled workmen on the edifice we call life and which will ultimately be challenged in the Master Mason Degree. In the Master Mason Degree we swear to uphold specific obligations toward one another. In the second section of this degree, those obligations and our principles and values are challenged by the three Ruffians who have strayed from those same teachings. The Ruffians represent those external forces in life which constantly pull on us in all directions. Like the Ruffians, those forces are challenging us to compromise or throw away entirely our high standards of conduct we hold for one another and for the people we care about in our lives. In the end, Hiram Abif gave the ultimate sacrifice rather than compromise the truths of being a Free Mason."

While no man and Mason are perfect, we do find ourselves facing an ever-increasing challenging world where our values and truths for one another are put to the test. Though minor infractions of our conduct may be corrected by aid and reformation through the good offices of a Brother, more severe infractions have direct and lasting negative consequences which may be deemed intolerable and moreover, unforgivable. Be mindful that we who are Free Masons have sworn to uphold, perpetuate and live by the highest standards of moral conduct which is richly entrenched in our Ritual. Our Ritual is not to be taken lightly. Our oaths (or

obligations) are not to be considered archaic sound bites merely to wow a candidate while he kneels at our altar. They are not subject for self-interpretation to be applied when they are convenient to make a self-righteous point or to be used to mitigate or soften the errors of a Brother.

Today, you will hear the reports of the Commissioners of Trial and the Committee on Grievances and Appeals. You will be asked to either uphold or reject their decisions. One case that has been particularly troubling for me is the appeal of a Brother who was expelled for unMasonic conduct - violating the chastity of a Brother's wife. There will be those who speak for upholding the decision of those two committees and those who will advocate for restoring the expelled Brother to good standing. I am afraid that the very oaths or obligations that every one of us swore to uphold will be challenged - those oaths or obligations that we swore to abide by unequivocally and without reservation will undergo a very serious test for all of us today. Mitigating circumstances which lead up to the decision for a Brother to have sexual relations with another Brother's wife are not excuses justifying the wrong-doing that was committed." Several Mason spoke on his behalf of the accused attesting to all he had done for Masonry and his community. They also attempted to justify his conduct because of the difficulties he had been experiencing with his sickly wife and the deterioration of the other Brother's marriage. Only one stepped forth to condemn his conduct as a violation of his oath and obligation as a Master Mason.

At Grand Lodge the recommendation of the Committee on Grievances and Appeals was rejected by a vote of 266-230 or 53% of the 496 who voted. A total of 576 were eligible to vote but 80 or 15% did not vote. Eighty Master Masons who were either sent by their lodges to conduct the business of their Grand Lodge, or current officers or permanent members of Grand Lodge failed to fulfill their obligation.

OBSERVATIONS

Masonry has and will continue to have to make small adaptations to meet changes in society if it is to remain a meaningful organization in which men can share a fraternal experience. Different eras and changes in society present new challenges for consideration. The basis of sexual mores in Maine have descended from the Judaic teaching of the Torah and of the Christian teachings in the New Testament. With the advent of "the pill" to avoid unwanted pregnancy and the rise of feminism in the past half century, basic mores have changed for many in our society. For a Mason, the question is how does he govern his conduct with a woman whose husband or father is a Mason.

One question posed in defense of the accused at Grand Lodge was from a Mason who was cohabiting with a woman whose father was a Mason. He professed to be worried that such conduct might be grounds to exclude him from Masonry. The online dictionary, Wikipedia, speaks of "Chastity" as the sexual behavior of a man or woman that is acceptable to the moral standard and guidelines of their culture,

civilization or religion. It further states: "The words 'chaste' and 'chastity' ... entered the English language around the middle of the 13th century, at that time they meant slightly different things. 'Chaste' meant 'virtuous or pure from unlawful sexual intercourse' (referring to extra-marital sex), while 'Chastity' meant 'virginity'. It was not until the late 16th century that the two words came to have the same basic meaning as a related adjective or noun."

A Mason must address the question of whether the beneficiary of his oath or obligation is the woman or his fellow Brother Mason. Therein lies the rub. A woman must be free of rape and untoward sexual contact. A woman, though, is free to make her own determinations relative to her conduct. In this day and age, conduct recently considered unthinkable by young girls and women is now the fodder for Facebook or sexting. A Mason's oath or obligation is much more. It is a commitment to a fellow Mason in an organization of which they each choose to belong. Having received their third degree, every Mason knows what he has bound himself to do towards others. If he does not wish to or feels that he cannot abide by his oath then he may resign his membership. It is his choice whether he will be bound by what fellow Masons have the right to expect of him.

A Mason's oath is not a smorgasbord for picking which obligations one will abide by and which ones he will ignore if not convenient for him. As M.W. Bro. Ross said: "What do we as Free Masons have if we do not have truth, respect and adherence for our Masonic principles and high standards of conduct for ourselves and for one another?" How can we align ourselves with others in the spirit of true fraternalism if we apply a set of standards contrary to what we would expect from others? Fraternalism can only flourish when we are mindful of our own actions and inclinations and remembering that every day, we are somebody's impression of what and who a Freemason is, including the considerations and expectations that one Brother has toward another. "

LIGHT FROM THE PAST

The word of a Freemason to another Freemason is beyond value. It is everything between two men. Men who may never have met but who know they can trust the other because of their sacred bond. In the mid-19th century there was a most gifted Mason from Pacific Lodge No. 64 in Exeter. W. Bro. David Barker, (1816-1874), was a lawyer and poet of such renowned ability that he was known as "The Burns of Maine." He was also the son-in-law of M.W. Timothy Chase and brother-in-law of M.W. Hiram Chase. He wrote several poems which related to his beloved Freemasonry. One of his best for historical consideration today was entitled "The Craftsman's Confession, or Courting a Mason's Daughter." It was first published in "The Freemason's Monthly Magazine," 1853, published by Charles W. Moore. Its message is as strong today as it was one hundred-sixty-two (162) years ago.

"Courting a Mason's Daughter"

*In my earlier years
(And the thought brings tears,*

*For horrible 'tis to say,
 I was false as the pit
 To each girl that I met,
 Till meeting with Caroline Ney.
 Each time that I strode
 To her father's abode
 The neighbors were struck with dismay:
 At morning and even
 A prayer went to heaven
 For the innocent Caroline Ney.
 The old matrons winked
 And the old maids blinked
 And tuned up a sorrowful lay,
 And nodded the head
 While they gravely said
 "He'll ruin that Caroline Ney!"
 The young country "Squire"
 In his dreams would perspire,
 In counting his bountiful pay
 For conning the laws
 And pleading the cause
 Of beautiful Caroline Ney.
 The old village Priest
 Not doubting the least
 The gossips who threaded the way,
 Bid the father beware
 Of the terrible snare
 I was setting for Caroline Ney.
 But the father cared not
 For the idle report
 Which haunted him every day,
 For the old man knew
 I should ever be true
 To the innocent Caroline Ney.
 For I whispered a word
 Which the old man heard,
 'Twas a magic word, though simple,
 'Twas a word which we caught
 On a sacred spot
 Just west of King Solomon's Temple.*

OUR FUTURE

If the word of a Mason was that strong to a Masonic father, how much stronger should it be to a Mason as regards his wife? What came we here to do? To build our future as men of honor. Let us move forward in Masonry with our history, for better

or worse, serving as a light and a guide for our conduct.

Our history is our future.

Report of the Committee on Histories

The Committee on Lodge Histories met at the Grand Lodge Office on April 2nd and reviewed one hundred thirty-five (135) lodge histories. Of these, one hundred five (105) were submitted before March 1st and were considered for selection as the five best histories.

As of today, one hundred eighty-five (185) lodge histories have been filed and one (1) has not been filed. As of March 1st, one hundred seven (107), or 57.5%, of lodge histories had been filed on time.

The committee believed that histories not submitted in a timely manner in accordance with the Constitution should not be considered for special recognition. Tardiness has its price of more than having to pay the constitutionally required fine of \$10.00. One submitted lodge history might very well have been selected as the best had it been timely.

M.W. Grand Master, I wish to publicly recognize the invaluable assistance your District Deputies have been relative to getting lodge histories filed. Starting in mid-February they were advised every Thursday of the lodges which did not have their histories filed. They would then follow up with lodges and some would keep checking with me as to how their lodges were doing.

Early into the reporting season, I received an Historian's report from W. Bro. Scott A. Johnson, of Crescent Lodge No. 78. Copies of his history were sent out to the District Deputy's to share as example of how a short and meaningful history could be written. If you still are not sure how to undertake the writing of your lodge's history, consider using this general format for guidance of how to make your history more meaningful. (See attached copy).

R.W. Richard Wark of the First District had all of his lodges reported before March 1st. R.W. Walter F. Riley, Jr. of the Eighth District and R.W. Kevin K. Kugell of the Sixteenth District where the next two to have all lodges reported. Will those three Brothers please stand and be recognized. Brethren, I thank you.

Reports Not Read at the Annual Communication

Masonic Charitable Foundation

2015 ANNUAL MEETING

President David Walker called the meeting to order at the Cumberland Club in Portland at 6:00PM. Tom Pulkkinen, Wayne Adams, Brian Messing, Claire Tusch, Ralph Knowles, Scott Whytock, John Irovando, and Mark Rustin were present. A guest, Richard Smith, was also present.

The minutes from the last meeting were accepted as presented.

The Board reviewed Maine Day in Florida and the fund raising effort for the Library Expansion Project. Dave Walker mentioned the tireless effort Mark has put in for the fundraising effort. He asked the committee for a round of applause for Mark. Mark thanked the committee.

A motion was made and seconded to empower Mark to spend up to \$165,000.00 to finish the library project. The motion was made by Dave Walker and seconded by John Irovando. Dave asked for any discussion on this matter and if anyone was not aware of the findings of grants requested to Alford Foundation and the Steven and Tabitha King Foundation. Mark explained that the Alford Foundation turned us down. He had applied for a \$25,000.00 grant from the King Foundation and they came back with a \$50,000.00 check with the stipulation that the money was spent within one year for the purposes for which we stated. With no further discussion, the motion was put to a vote and passed.

Tom Pulkkinen moved that the Grand Secretary receive a one-time \$5000.00 after tax bonus in recognition of all the hard work and effort that Mark put in to the raising of money to build the library, raising donations to help meet necessary demands this year, and all of other time he has put in for the betterment of Masons in Maine. Wayne Adams seconded the motion. After a short period of discussion, the motion passed.

Treasurer Scott Whytock reported on several items:

1. Income -- pretty much on target there.
2. Fundraising -- we exceeded our \$120,000.00 goal for the year.
3. Operating expenses -- are right on within \$200.00 of budget.
4. Program section, matching grants and relief -- there is a little room for the most part. Bikes for Books continues to grow by a lot. Shipping problems and Mike being overwhelmed by the growth and is in need of help. The CHIPS program, did not spend a lot of money in this current fiscal year.
5. Handling of the Cutter fund with Saccharappa Lodge -- There has been some discussion that Saccharappa Lodge thinks the money is theirs but it clearly belongs to the foundation. Scott met with the Lodge and they were rude and hostile. Scott feels they need to be told how things are going to run and how things are. The President asked that Scott not entertain another meeting with them unless he was present. He made a motion that Scott present Saccharappa Lodge with a letter stating what

was required of them in reference to the Cutter fund and that the Foundation is behind him 100 percent. Seconded and passed.

6. The 501/C3 program -- how things went and what they may want to consider going forward.

A motion to accept the Treasurer's report was made seconded and approved

John Irovando presented next budget. Total operating expenses budgeted are \$83,641.00 which includes \$9000.00 to cover the mailing of the Grand Master's Appeal letter.

Income budgeted is \$548,515.00 which does not include the committed funds from the fundraiser money already received.

Wayne Adams said that he believed that it was a matter of policy for the budget to consist of what was available through interest and dividend income. It was decided that the Board could change the policy by a vote on the budget.

John stated that he had made many attempts to reach the CHIPS committee though emails and letters for information on their needs and expenditures for the coming year. It was moved, seconded and passed that the CHIPS program be terminated and leave enough funds available to cover outstanding obligations.

The Matching Grant Program -- It has been suggested that the program move to a 2 for 1 match of the first \$500.00 up to the total cost of the project. The committee believes this is the most successful project to date. The increase was approved.

The President asked if they possibly could ask the lodges to help with the district grant project next year. Tom suggested that some lodges may not be financially able to afford this and to leave the program as is. John Irovando agreed. Mark suggested that maybe we could ask the more substantial and organized districts, to do their own fundraising to add to the 2000.00 grant and maybe make them a 3000.00 grant. Motion was made, seconded to keep the district grant program going again another year and keep it the same. Passed.

It was discussed and decided to keep the Maine Day program in Florida for another year.

A motion was made and seconded to accept the budget as amended. Motion Passed.

Tom discussed a program for Students. He said there is a program run by the National Foundation for Children. He said they have professionals work with children on such problems as drugs, low self-esteem, and health issues. Twenty four states throughout the country utilize this program. Tom said he feels it would be a great publicity exposure for the Foundation and he believes the program speaks for itself. Mark agreed. Tom will gather more information for their next meeting.

A motion was made and seconded to approve the Budget for the LLC. Motion Passed.

Scott Whytock was nominated for and elected to Foundation Treasurer for the coming year.

A motion was made seconded and passed to authorize the Grand Treasurer to sign proxies for securities owned by the Foundation and Stock Certificates, Resolutions and other documents pertaining to the sale of securities.

A motion was made seconded and passed to accept the Report of the Committee on Investments.

A motion was made seconded and passed to ratify and confirm all actions of the Investment Committee as reflected in the HM Payson report for the year ended March 31, 2015.

A motion was made seconded and passed to authorize the Committee on Investments to purchase and sell securities on behalf of the Foundation during the coming year, as it deems prudent.

A motion was made seconded and passed to accept the verbal report of the Committee on Distributions as presented by Wayne T. Adams.

A motion was made seconded and passed to accept the Report of the Committee on Gifts as presented by Mark Rustin.

A motion was made seconded and passed to empower the Grand Treasurer to make financial transactions on behalf of the Foundation for the coming year.

A motion was made seconded and passed to invest funds in income accounts beyond the needs of cash flow for the budget in the Charitable Foundation account with HM Payson.

A motion was made seconded and passed that the Sub-committee appointments be made at the next special meeting.

The President thanked the Board members.

Meeting adjourned at 9:00PM.

Committee on Fraternal Relations

The Grand Lodge of Albania was consecrated on October 14 2011 in Tirana by the Grand Lodge Italy. The Grand Lodge of Albania meets the criteria for recognition

and has requested amity with the Grand Lodge of Maine. Your committee recommends we grant recognition to the Grand Lodge of Albania.

Several Grand Lodges in the United States and Europe withdrew recognition of the National Grand Lodge of France. It appears that the National Grand Lodge of France has resolved its problem and is being welcomed back by those who chose to sever ties with them.

We have a request from the Most Worshipful, Prince Hall Grand Lodge of Rhode Island for recognition. They have a mutual relationship with the Grand Lodge of Rhode Island and Providence Plantation. We have voted to extend recognition to any Prince Hall grand Lodge that establishes a mutual relationship within its jurisdiction. We would ask the Grand Secretary to communicate our amity to the Grand Lodge Prince Hall of Rhode Island

Out of respect to our Brethren in other jurisdictions remember there are several Grand Lodges that do not recognize Prince Hall Masonry.

Committee on Doings of the Grand Lodge Officers

The Committee on Doings of Grand Lodge Officers has reviewed the reports of all officers and committees required to file reports and offer this summary.

The Committee on Doings of Grand Lodge Officers complement the Grand Master and his Officers for the completion of a very successful year.

The Grand Master and his Elected Officers this year, have again proven that their primary obligation is to the craft within this jurisdiction.

We commend the Grand Secretary for his careful attention and dedication to the duties of his office. The Grand Secretary has been in this position for a couple of years now and seems to have the Grand Lodge office and staff all working together efficiently. This task has not been easily completed in the short span of only two years and he as well as his staff should be applauded for his efforts.

The Grand Treasurer has also shown careful attention and dedication to his office. He has taken a very difficult job and converted it to his own format. This system seems to be working very well as is reflected in the Finance Committee's Report.

The District Deputy reports seem to vary greatly in length and format. In prior years a certain format has been used for these reports, they covered such items as administration, ritual, education, lodge activities etc. It is unknown to this committee if this format is still in use as many reports were not submitted in this manner. This made it much harder to compare than in the past. Said reports also varied greatly in length from one and a half pages to fourteen pages. This being said, many District Deputies did complete their duties to the high standards set forth by the Grand Lodge of Maine.

Most Worshipful David Walker has also completed his year with the grace and dignity of many Grand Masters of Masons in Maine. Although hampered with a slight medical issue, almost all members of the Craft never even noticed any changes in his performance of his duties. The position of Grand Master is an extremely difficult position to hold under any circumstances, and Most Worshipful Grand Master has done it with ease.

The issue of the timely submission of reports by many of the officers required to do so is still an issue. Late submissions and the ability for this committee to receive the reports as soon as they come in should to be addressed. The members of this committee have served together many years and it is their opinion, that the timely submission of these reports is directly affected by the effort the Grand Master puts forth in requiring them to do so.

Many of the programs initiated in past years such as Bikes for Books and the Child ID Program still seem to be a mainstay of all Grand Masters' programs. This along with new programs such as Mentoring seems to be keeping the fraternity in the focus of the public.

It is the recommendation of this committee that it be stressed to all officers required to do so to submit their reports on time and that they be immediately forwarded to the Committee on the Doings of Grand Officers. To the Grand Lodge of Maine:

Your Grand Office has endeavored to provide service to the Lodges and Brethren of the Craft during the last Masonic year. Much has been accomplished. We have endeavored to streamline our procedures and remove “red tape” where applicable.

Additionally, we have reviewed and updated many of the forms and publications of the Grand Lodge to make them more user friendly. As part of that process we worked to make the changes as transparent as possible thus improving service to you while at the same time not causing any undue burden on the users of our services.

Part of the Constitutional responsible of this Office is to maintain and protect the vital records of Grand Lodge. These include Proceedings, membership records, and Annual Returns. To that end, all of these vital records have been digitized and stored in several electronic locations thus insuring, if a catastrophe should strike destroying the paper records, the data contained therein will never be lost. The member cards from 1820 through 1995 are electronically available via the genealogy section of the Grand Lodge website and the Proceedings are available via the Proceedings section of that website.

We have begun the process of placing barcodes on the dues cards beginning with the 2016 dues year, As barcode reading technology has greatly improved, this innovation will make registration for and reporting on the Annual Communication far more efficient thus allowing the Credentials Committee to function more effectively.

This Office is keenly aware of its role in the Grand Lodge – service. We look forward to fulfilling that role as effectively and efficiently as possible.

Grand Librarian

This report highlights one of the many component pieces of a productive Masonic year for this jurisdiction. Your Grand Lodge Library has both grown in size and

learning opportunities. Its development has been positive and provides even more opportunities for Brethren to make their daily advancement in Masonic education.

During the past year, we've added over 800 books, both physical and electronic, to our collection. Digital rights management is a thorny issue for all libraries and the ability to lend our electronic works is, by law, severely limited. Publishers, instead of selling electronic works to libraries, do what can most easily be compared to renting: they restrict the number of times the book can be read before it must be purchased all over again. This is SO different from the standard process through which libraries operated for centuries and everyone in the library field is trying to adapt while readers crave more electronic options and publishers try to wring additional income from technology. We're on top of this issue and watching it carefully.

Libraries are for learning and reference. To that end, we've added a collection of books that will enhance personal and community development. We also offer a number of genealogical resources for those tracing their ancestry. Still further, we've begun several longer-term archival projects. Some examples: cataloging and keeping the Annual Proceedings of other Grand Lodges as they arrive now electronically; scanning older copies of the Maine Mason Magazine and making them available online through our library catalog; weeding material that only takes up space (things like the Iowa Masonic Code of 1913 and the Scottish Rite Proceedings of the Valley of Albuquerque for the 1950s are just not EVER going to be used by anyone – and if they were, could be obtained from their respective origins); scanning the many papers written by Masons for the Maine Lodge of Research; and much more including the addition of subjects to the volumes already in our collection.

A big 'thank you' goes out to two Brothers who have volunteered many hours to helping 'set things straight': William Connell and Jonathan Canfield, both of Seminary Hill Daylight Lodge #220 have been just terrific in doing whatever was needed, regardless of how menial. It's helped considerably. THANK YOU, Brothers.

And a big 'thank you' as well to those who've donated books this year. While some were duplicates, many were not. It's this type of help that helps others as well – and our community outreach is being expanded as a result.

Finally, the Library Expansion Program. WOW! When our Grand Secretary and I first talked about this over lunch at a Chinese restaurant, I thought he might have overdosed on MSG. He was confident we could – and SHOULD – expand library services but wanted me on board 110%. Well, it's FAR more than that and we are now moving forward. You'll be receiving periodic reports as things progress but for now, for all of those who have supported this endeavor and to Mark Rustin for his fundraising acumen, a thousand thanks on behalf of Maine Masonry's future – as well as the many Masons, friends, family and community members who are part of our great state! This is VERY exciting!

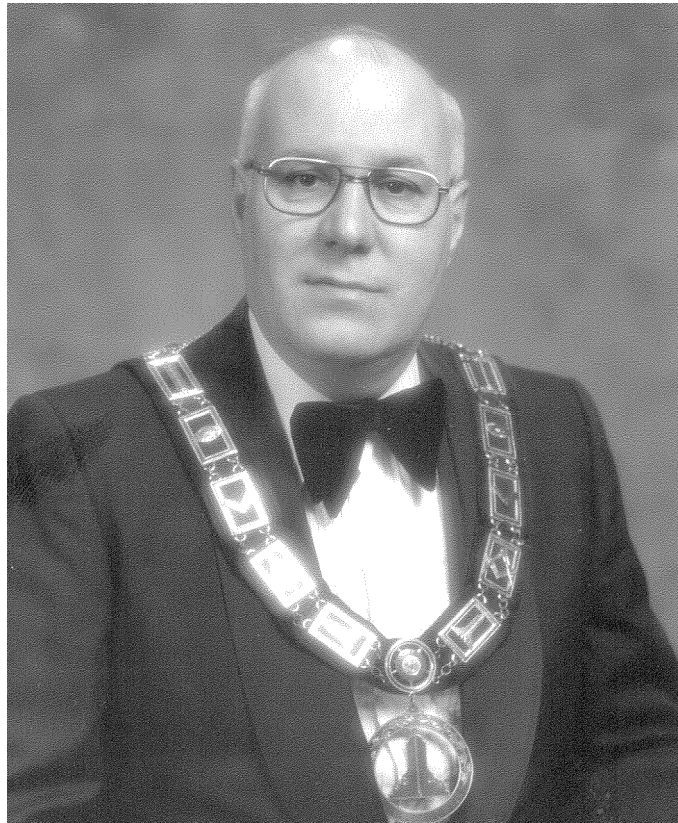

Royal Arch

Add 530 years to the Vulgar Era. Thus 2012 and 530=2542.

Royal and Select Masters

Add 1000 to the Common Era. Thus 2012 and 1000=3012.

Knights Templar

From the Christian Era take 1118. Thus 1118 from 2012=894.

Order of High Priesthood

To the Christian Era add 1913, the Year of the Blessing. Thus: 2012 and 1913=3925.

Masonic Calendar

Ancient Craft Masons commence this era with the creation of the world, calling it **Anno Lucis (A.D.)**, "in the year of light."

Scottish Rite, same as Ancient Craft, except the Jewish chronology is used, **Anno Mundi (A.M.)**, "in the year of the world."

Royal Arch Masons date from the year the second temple was commenced by Zerubbabel, **Anno Inventionis (A.I.)**, "in the year of the discovery."

Royal and Select Masters date from the year in which the temple of Solomon was completed, **Anno Depositionis (A. Dep.)**, "in the year of the deposit."

Knights Templar commence their era with the organization of their Order, **Anno Ordinid (A.O.)**, "in the year of the Order."

Order of High Priesthood dates from the year of the blessing of Abraham by the High Priest Melchisedec, **Anno Benefacio (A.B.)**, "in the year of the blessing."

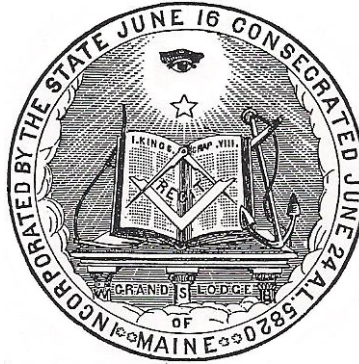
