The Grand Master solicited opening comments from the Potentate of Kora Temple, III Dr. Paul Poulin.

Most Worshipful thank you very much. Most Worshipful Sirs, Right Worshipful Sirs, Very Worshipful Sirs, and brethren all. I want to welcome you to our Shrine Building. There are 22 hundred Shrine Masons who are your Brothers, who are hosting you today. This Shrine was built in 1908 but the wealthy and powerful men that ran the state of Maine at that time. They did not think themselves to level themselves to the fraternity and to be members of our craft. They wanted their buildings to reflect the honor and glory of our fraternity. That is why this building is so sumptuous and beautiful. It is a jewel of the past and we as Kora Shriners not only keep this building going but also support our 22 hospitals and children around the country. I want to point out to you that there is Oriental architecture, the Arabic type within the building. This reflects the invented past of the Noble Order of the Mystic Shrine. The Nobles of the Mystic Shrine, naturally originated in 1872 in New York City, with Freemasons who were trying to develop a more liberal social club for Freemasons. Hence because the Ottoman Empire was thought to be exotic and cool and get to wear cool hats called Fezes, that they would base their social club on that. Hence you will find also Arabic and Islamic decoration throughout our temple. In addition, downstairs where you will go for lunch, you will find some gorgeous murals. These murals were originally developed by Brother Harry Cochrane in 1922. He painted them over a three-year period. Harry Cochrane, for his day in his 20's, was considered a very famous muralist and artist in this area. In fact, if you want to see his other murals you would have to go up to Monmouth, at the Grand Master's Lodge where he has done extensive painting of the walls, as well as in Cumston

Hall. I wanted to give you a little history of this grand building. We hope you enjoy your time here. If you need anything you can search me out or you can search out Tony Perkins who is our superintendent here. Thank you very much.

The Grand Master called for the communications from the Grand Secretary.

They also put on a Grand Master's initiation class with the DeMolay working four young men in the morning and the Rainbow four young ladies in the afternoon. Brethren, these young people do fantastic ritual! Moreover, they are learning skills that will last them for a lifetime of achievement. Brethren, we should be supporting these youth groups, not because we may gain new Masons from them, but because it is the right thing to do for these young men and women!

I also was privileged to help with the placing of wreaths at Veterans Cemeteries in Augusta alongside several from Rainbow and DeMolay. Earlier in the year I found that these youth groups had been raising money for this project for a few years, gradually bringing in enough money to pay for 500 wreaths at Christmas time in 2014. I put the challenge to you Brethren to better that total and you came through! Through your generosity we upped that total to a little over 1,000! Congratulations and thank you.

Another event of note this past year was the consolidation of Blazing Star in Rumford with Bethel Lodge in Bethel. Unfortunately, Blazing Star was finding it impossible to find officers to carry out the business of the Lodge. With this consolidation, the Brethren in that area of the State are moving forward and hopefully they will thrive as a result. I want to thank RW Michael Lowe, DDGM of the 20th District and RW Gary Young, DER of the 20th District for all of their hard work to get these Lodges and Brethren through this difficult process.

On a positive note, Brethren in the Limington area have been working to reinstate a Lodge there. The Brethren of Adoniram Lodge gave up their charter in 2007. I granted a Charter under Dispensation to allow Brethren to pursue a reestablishment of Masonry in Limington. We will hear more about this later in this session from the Committee on Dispensations and Charters.

We dedicated the Library addition at the Grand Lodge Office in Holden this past fall with many Brethren and friends on hand. We have established a strong relationship with the Holden community and having our new library there and available to them has been very well received.

It has been my honor to participate as Grand Master in the Raising of several active duty military men along with MW Wayne Adams and his cadre of men from our Armed Forces. I have been humbled to have even a small part in getting these Brethren into our Fraternity. Many of them will travel the globe in their duties and it is pleasing to know that wherever they go, they will be taking a piece of Maine Masonry with them.

Several of the Grand Lodge Officers, along with Brethren from Cumberland Lodge, journeyed to a nursing home in Freeport to present a fifth star to Br. Alfred Kinsman

Fogg, 100 years old at the time. It was a wonderful afternoon and having a chance to speak with this Brother who has been a Mason for 75 years and served our country at Iwo Jima and other places during WW II was a special treat.

This spring, it was Maine's turn to host the New England Brotherhood dinner. RW Richard Bergeron spearheaded the planning and RW Frank Palmer spent the day making sure everything went off as planned. RW Mark Rustin did his usual fine job as Grand Secretary pulling all the strings together and also arranged for the Maine Masonic College to present two short programs during the afternoon. The programs and the dinner were very successful and I want to thank these Brethren for all of their hard work.

I journeyed to Florida this past February to take part in the Maine Day celebration at Sahib Shrine in Sarasota. The program and the invitations to the snow birds were again handled by RW Jack Lagerquist and RW Pete Forrest. Thanks to those Brethren for making this happen. I was able to present six 50 Year Medals to Brethren at that event. After the dinner, we traveled across town to present another 50 Year Medal to a Brother who was physically unable to attend the dinner. The following day, Audrey and I traveled to Inverness where I was honored to present a 50 Year Medal to a Past Master of my home Lodge and a long time personal friend. While in Inverness, we also were able to meet with a Masonic Widow from my Lodge, who also happens to have been the 1st grade teacher for both of us. It was an extraordinary trip.

A few weeks ago, I attended a Portland Pirates hockey game where over one hundred young people were recognized by the State of Maine for doing at least 50 hours of documented volunteering to their community. The Charitable Foundation was the sponsor of this initiative and as Masons we were well recognized at that event. The young were very happy to be there and I was happy to greet them as your representative. One young lady was selected as a representative of the grade school age group. She was there because she had raised over \$1,000 for a local food pantry. A teenage boy was selected to represent that age group as well. This young man had struggled with life from a very early age and finally found a place to grow at an alternative school in Portland. I presented both of them with a 200 Year Challenge coin which they both enjoyed. The young man was so taken with it that he could be seen showing it to everyone he saw, parents and other young people. It was a very gratifying day and a very positive one for Maine Masonry.

We held our annual Masonic Rookie dinner recently and recognized those new Rookies who were able to attend. It still amazes me that there are Lodges who do not take advantage of this program. Over the 4 years it has been in existence, more than 90 percent of those who attained rookie status have become Officers in their Lodge. If your Lodge does not participate, why not?

I also issued a Decision this past year. Every year Lodges participate in the Bikes for Books program and attend school presentations where the bikes are drawn. Most Lodges attend wearing their aprons and jewels and it has been the practice of Grand Masters to grant a blanket dispensation for this to happen. I felt that since this was an ongoing practice, it should no longer need to be done under dispensation, but rather

it should always be done by Lodges, without wondering if that dispensation had been granted. This is a wonderful opportunity for us to put a positive face of Masonry to the community.

On a more somber note, we mourn the loss of two giants of Maine Freemasonry this past year. MW Roger P. Snelling, PGM and RW Gordon L. Kimball, Sr. have passed to the Celestial Lodge Above. They will be dearly missed but their contributions to us all will go on. Let us be thankful to have had them as our Brothers and live our Masonry as they did.

One issue that has recently been dominating much of the discussions in Grand Lodges all over the world is that of the actions taken by the Grand Lodge of Georgia and the Grand Lodge of Tennessee. Both Grand Lodges saw fit to expel gay members of the Craft. Brethren, I find those actions reprehensible based on the tenets of Freemasonry.

We are taught that Masonry 'unites men of every country sect and opinion'. We also profess that our Society of Freemasons subscribes to no one religion but rather accepts men of all religions whose belief is a 'Supreme Deity'. To quote from a letter from the Grand Master of Washington, D.C., an ordained Christian minister who states, 'Many faiths, including my own denomination of Christianity, are divided on several social and moral issues, yet it is our duty as Masons to ensure these disagreements do not spill over into our fraternity and sow disharmony.' Moreover, in reading the Ancient Charges, you will find that the laws of Masonry are subordinate to the civil law. Being gay is legal according to the civil law in this country.

Brethren, while I feel that these Grand Lodges have acted contrary to Masonic teachings, I feel strongly that at this time, breaking off relations with them would not be productive. I feel that we should condemn their actions, strongly and in writing and work to convince them that these actions should be reversed. I say this, remembering that our closing charges states 'Remember that around this altar we have promised to befriend and relieve every Brother who is in need of our assistance. You have promised, in the friendliest manner, to remind him of his errors and to aid a reformation.' Brethren, I believe that breaking off relations with those Grand Lodges is not aiding in a reformation, but rather turning our backs to their problems.

As you can see, there is a lot going on in Masonry in Maine. I have but scratched the surface. There are many very positive things going on in Lodges throughout the Jurisdiction that we all can be proud of and I am.

I would like to thank the GL Officers who have served me and the Craft so well this past year. The District Deputy Grand Masters deserve my special thank you. I would also like to thank the Past Grand Masters who have always been ready to share with me their thoughts and insights. That has been invaluable.

Later today we will elect a new slate of Grand Lodge Officers, who will lead our Fraternity for the next year and beyond. I want to express my gratitude to all of the Districts that held candidate nights this year. The Brethren who have offered

themselves as candidates are all capable, but it is up to all of us to get to know them, their individual capabilities and their way of thinking. They will be setting the course of Freemasonry for the future and we all should be sure who we are voting for. Thank you Brethren for offering yourselves and your time as candidates.

A very special thank you goes to RW William Layman and to RW Mark Rustin, who have been my sounding boards throughout the year. You are the best friends a Brother could ever have. I am not sure I could have made it without you. I also offer my best wishes to Br. Thomas Pulkkinen and all of his officers. May your two years be filled with sweet success.

I will close with these final thoughts.

Dare to do great things in Masonry. Be the kind of man that when your feet hit the floor each morning the devil says "Oh Crap, he's up!"

Finally, this Annual Meeting marks the end of my term as your Grand Master. As with all Grand Masters before me, the time has flown by. It has been busy, at times daunting but always a privilege and pleasure. The Brethren in Maine are the best anywhere and I am proud to have served you. You have made this journey something I will treasure always and I am proud to be,

MW Roger P. Snelling

Born in Haverhill, Massachusetts, March 21, 1920 Passed away in Scarborough, Maine at the Veterans Home, May 11, 2015

He was educated in the Haverhill public school system and graduated from Haverhill High School, and McIntosh Business College. From 1939 to 1942 he was with the Metallurgical Department, Watertown Arsenal. From 1943 to 1945 he served in the WS Army Ordnance Department in the European Theater during World War II and at Aberdeen Proving Grounds, Maryland.

MW Brother Snelling was raised to the sublime degree of a Master Mason on April 10, 1944 at Aberdeen Lodge #187 in Aberdeen MD. He affiliated with Deering Lodge #183 in Portland, ME later to demit and become a charter member of Gov. William King Lodge #219 in Scarborough, ME where he served as Master from 1964 to 1965. He served the Grand Lodge of Maine as District Deputy Grand Master for the 17th Masonic District from 1974 to 1976; Grand Junior Warden from 1969 to 1970; Deputy Grand Master from 1978 to 1980.

The Grand Lodge of Maine awarded MW Snelling the Simon Greenleaf Medal in 1969, the Josiah Hayden Drummond Distinguished Service Medal in 1980, and the 50 Year Service Medal in 1996.

MW Snelling was also a member of the York Rite Bodies, a 33rd degree member of the Northern Jurisdiction of the Scottish Rite, a member of Kora Temple, and a member of the Order of the Eastern Star.

MW Brother Snelling is survived by his wife Rosemary (Hawley) Snelling. They were married in 1945.

Report of the Committee On Masonic Jurisprudence

In Grand Lodge Lewiston, ME May 3, 2016

It is the duty of the Committee on Masonic Jurisprudence to review the directives, dispensations and decisions of the Most Worshipful Grand Master, determine if they are in compliance with our Constitution, Standing Regulations and Digest of Decisions and recommend to the Craft at the Annual Communication whether or not they should be ratified.

DISPENSATIONS

Your Committee on Masonic Jurisprudence was presented for review with fifty-five (55) requests for Dispensations, which had been approved by the Most Worshipful Grand Master. Most of them asking him to waive certain provisions of our Constitution and Standing Regulations when the clear language of those documents permit and in such other cases where similar Dispensations have been permitted by custom and usage. Fifteen (15) dealt with the serving of alcoholic beverages at events. Eighteen (18) with wearing regalia at public events. Twelve (12) with conducting out door degrees. Five (5) Allowing special elections of lodge officers and change of location for holding the Lodge Installation of officers due to emergency conditions. Two (2) concerning 4th night programs. One (1) allowing a lodge to hold Stated Communications at another lodge for 3 months due to emergency conditions. Two (2) dealing with guest officers and degree work. One (1) authorizing a 48 hour delay of a Stated Communication due to an emergency condition.

The Committee in its review found that all dispensations did comply with the provisions of our Constitution and Standing Regulations and in such other cases where similar Dispensations have been permitted by custom or usage and recommends that all be ratified.

DECISION

On November19, 2015 our Most Worshipful Grand Master issued a decision that read: "In response to a question posed to me it is my decision that it is not necessary for a Lodge to apply for and receive an Approved Request for Dispensation allowing brethren to wear aprons and jewels while taking part in a Bikes for Books presentation".

After much discussion and review of Sec. 86 of the Constitution of the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine that says in part, The apron is a part of Masonic clothing and cannot be worn in public outside the lodge room without dispensation from the Grand Master, - nor is it proper for a lodge as such to take part in any public demonstration except to perform some Masonic Labor sanctioned by the Grand Lodge. It is the Opinion of this Committee that as The Bikes for Books program is supported by the Grand Lodge through its inclusion in the work of the Committee on Youth and is partially funded by the Grand Lodge through its

inclusion in the matching grant program of the Maine Masonic Charitable Foundation and that children involved in this program become better educated and informed individuals through reading, That involvement in this program is truly "Masonic Labor" that is sanctioned by the Grand Lodge and we therefore support this decision and recommend that it be ratified by the Craft.

No other matters have been referred to the Committee involving questions of Masonic law and practice for consideration. In conclusion, your Committee unanimously moves the acceptance of this Report and the adoption of the recommendations contained therein.

Fraternal Relations

In Grand Lodge May 3, 2016

This year we have a request from the Grand Lodge of Paraguay for recognition by the Grand Lodge of Maine. Six years ago the Grand Lodge suffered from a split that left them with two Grand Lodges using similar names and mailing addresses. This problem has been resolved and the Grand Lodge Symbolica.

We recommend the Grand Lodge of Maine recognize the Grand Lodge Symbolica of Paraguay.

As an Entered Apprentice we learn that the tenets of our profession are brotherly love, relief and truth.

"By brotherly love we are taught to regard the whole human species as one family; the high, low, the rich, the poor, who as children of one Almighty parent and inhabitants of one planet are to aide support and protect each other. By this principle Masonry unites men of every country sect and opinion and conciliates true friendship among those who might otherwise have remained at a perpetual distance."

Also from the Entered Apprentice Charge, "In the State, you are to be a quiet and peaceful subject, true to your government and just to your country, you are not to countenance disloyalty or rebellion, but patiently submit to legal authority and conform with cheerfulness to that government of the country in which you live".

Wouldn't it be wonderful if all masons lived by this tenet? If every mason worked on living this tenet it would effect a great change in society.

I will now ask Most Worshipful Claire V, Tusch to present the remainder of the Fraternal Relations Report.

Report on the Actions of the Grand Lodge of Georgia And the Grand Lodge of Tennessee

Recent actions have been taken by the Grand Lodges of Tennessee and Georgia to deny membership on the basis of openly expressed sexual orientation. These regrettable actions have resulted in the decision by three jurisdictions, the Grand Lodge of California, the Grand Lodge of the District of Columbia and the Grand Lodge of Belgium, to suspend fraternal relations with these two Grand Lodges. The public response and that of anti-Masonic groups has been widespread and has adversely affected initiatives and public opinion of the Craft.

BACKGROUND

The Grand Lodge of Tennessee has had a prohibition as part of their Masonic Penal Code (6.204 (27)) for over 30 years that it is a punishable offense to "Promote or engage in homosexual activity." Two openly gay brothers were suspended, and subsequently expelled, after posting photos of their wedding on Facebook. A change to the code that would have resolved the situation was a proposed at the Annual Communication, held March 23-24, 2016. The motion was to delete the sentence above based on the argument that on June 26, 2015, the Supreme Court of the United States determined that marriage between two consenting adults is a fundamental right guaranteed by the Fourteenth Amendment of the United States Constitution (Obergefell v. Hodges). The supremacy clause prevents any appeal and the ruling applies to all fifty states. The Grand Lodge of Tennessee must operate within the laws of the State and in accordance with the United States Constitution. Furthermore, beliefs and practices that attack or malign an entire class of people, typically for their immutable characteristics, and without rational justification, are antithetical to the tenets of Freemasonry and should be eliminated. Unfortunately, after much discussion, this proposal was soundly defeated.

The Past Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of Georgia, MW Douglas MacDonald, issued an edict in 2015 that homosexual activity subjected the offending brother to "discipline". In personal communication with the current Grand Master of Georgia, MW Drew Lane, he related that this action was apparently taken after a brother in a north Georgia lodge applied for a marriage license following the Supreme Court decision legalizing gay marriage. Another brother in that lodge complained about having an openly gay member. The gay brother requested and was granted a voluntary demit. The edict received much discussion at their Annual Communication and was approved by a "clear majority". It is now part of their Penal Code. MW Brother Lane emphasized that this action has not resulted in any brother being charged or suspended as of our conversation. He stated that no one has been banned from membership. There has been no change in information requested on the membership application---there is no question as to sexual orientation. There has been no change in wording of the ritual. And a brother would only be subject to disciplinary action if a complaint was filed and processed by the usual procedure. It seems a don't ask, don't tell policy that keeps a brothers' sexual orientation in the shadows is the standard.

The growing public awareness of the actions of the Grand Lodges of Tennessee and Georgia has resulted in numerous and widely scattered adverse repercussions across the United States. Anti-Masonic groups that have slandered the Fraternity unjustly in publications and online have made use of these events to refocus and redouble their attempts to discredit Freemasonry. Several protests have been staged in California including one that threatened attendees to the World Conference of Grand Masters in San Francisco. Other protests have taken place in schools, universities, and other public places where the Grand Lodge of California has developed programs enriching the education of the public on subjects of Masonic and civil importance. Public events with Masons have been cancelled by school districts. Protests have taken place at the House of the Temple in Washington, DC interfering with the enjoyment of visitors and the peace of neighbors. No doubt many other unreported events have occurred.

SOVEREIGNTY

The homophobic reactions in Tennessee and Georgia extend far beyond their borders. The general public is not aware of the principle of sovereignty; that each grand lodge is fully independent and sovereign in the management of the internal affairs of its jurisdiction. However, as stated by the Grand Lodge of the District of Columbia in a position paper, "Every Grand Lodge shares a joint responsibility with all others: a common obligation to preserve the integrity of the Craft in a manner that preserves our shared heritage and avoids harm to the reputation of its fellow Grand Lodges. When a Grand Lodge ignores that responsibility, especially in a manner that causes direct harm to another Grand Lodge, its fellow Grand Lodges may respond by taking action within the conduct of their own affairs to counter that harm. In this case to withdraw recognition or suspend fraternal relations."

OPTIONS

It seems clear that there are three options that our Grand Lodge must consider:

Do nothing at this time, monitor and assess the situation as it unfolds. This would leave us in the untenable position of explaining to the public, candidates and ourselves how we can condone such exclusionary and prejudiced behavior.

Communicate our concern and position clearly to the Grand Lodges of Tennessee and Georgia that we vehemently disagree with their position and actions.

Suspend fraternal relations or withdraw recognition.

SUMMARY DISCUSSION

The actions of the Grand Lodges of Tennessee and Georgia clearly threaten the regard and vitality of the Grand Lodge of Maine and all of Masonry on many levels. As well, those actions disregard the most fundamental Masonic principles. We are taught that Masonry unites men of every country, sect and opinion; that we regard

the whole human species as one family under the Fatherhood of God; that no man's religion or beliefs take precedence over another's. We are taught to respect and embrace brethren of every race, creed, religion and socioeconomic class. In the jurisdictions of Tennessee and Georgia, although a gay man may be a Mason, as a brother, he must live in the shadows, not being free to openly express himself, living in fear that he could be tried and expelled from the Craft because of his sexual orientation. This is clearly inconsistent with our most fundamental beliefs, tenets and foundations and is seemingly based on a narrow religious interpretation that has no basis in Freemasonry.

The position paper previously referenced eloquently posits what is at stake if we do not address these actions.

For almost 250 years our Fraternity has played an integral part in the establishment and preservation of the great experiment of the United States. As the trustees of such a legacy, and the architects of its future, actions that we undertake today as Freemasons will either advance or destroy this long-standing and historic public partnership. Especially at this juncture in the history of our country and the Craft, the actions of the Grand Lodges of Tennessee and Georgia pose a significant peril to this partnership. The future of the Craft is bound to the current increase in membership interest from the millennial generation. As in earlier eras, the new generation's understanding of the urgent need for the growth of Masonic values and principles founded upon tolerance, reason and civil discourse can be directly related to the state of civil discourse outside of the lodge (abroad in the world). However, if we are to fill our unique role of serving the nation at this critical time, the values we espouse must be true to those principles. This generation's views and sexual orientation are much different and more accepting than previous generations and are in keeping with the traditional precepts of our Institution. If Freemasonry is seen as discriminatory on the basis of race, religion or sexual orientation the loss of members of every generation who may leave in protest will imperil our ability to serve the country at this critical time.

And I would add to the list, the loss of public respect and exclusion from educational and civic functions as has been experienced in California.

The repercussions of the seemingly sovereign and local actions of the Grand Lodge of Tennessee and the Grand Lodge of Georgia are serious and far reaching. The Grand Lodge of Maine should take a clear and definitive position.

Perhaps most important has been the revision of the Memorial's mission which emphasizes a major change in the direction and focus of the Association. It acknowledged the completion of the initial organizational purpose. The vision and mission of the founders of the Memorial Association was to, Create a suitable Memorial Temple to George Washington the Mason; which expresses in durability and beauty the underlying esteem of the Freemasons of the United States for him in whose memory it shall stand throughout the coming vears. That vision and mission were accomplished and now we have this magnificent Memorial to Brother Washington for the world to see. The new mission statement is an acknowledgement that the foresight of our predecessors provided us with an incredible edifice capable of perpetuating the memory of the greatness and character of the Man and Mason it memorializes. Our new statement reflects the fact that the work of promoting his virtue, character and vision is just beginning as we labor to provide outreach programs to our members and to the general public in accordance with that new mission: To inspire humanity through education to emulate and promote the virtues, character and vision of George Washington, the Man, the Mason and the Father of our Country.

The history of the founding of our country is getting clouded, and the memory of our greatest American and Mason, George Washington, is fading with the passage of time. As he is one of the best representatives of Masonic principles in action and the epitome of what it means to be a public servant working for the good of all, we need to work tirelessly to fulfill our mission. To that end, your Memorial Trustees have developed a strategic plan to help attain our goals that is focused in four major areas:

• Attaining financial stability to support our mission. I'm delighted to report that Hawaii and California Masons have recently adopted the one-dollar per member annual contribution which makes 28 Grand Jurisdictions participating in this program. I'm proud to say the Grand Lodge of Maine was the 25th on that list. Your

- contributions are much needed and very much appreciated. Your continued support, whether monetary or through participation in events and programs, is essential.
- Perpetuation of the Memorial building and grounds---it is our legacy. Masons of this country conceived the Memorial, built the Memorial and are maintaining it. Critical restoration and improvement projects are moving ahead to restore and preserve this building for the next one-hundred years, but are costly.
- Advocacy towards promoting the virtues, character and vision of George Washington as a relevant example of ethics, civility and behavior for the world today.
- Education of our Masonic family, friends and the general public about George Washington, the Man, the Mason and the Father of our Country. As restoration projects are completed, emphasis and funding will shift to this most important goal.

We are making great progress. Exhibits and displays have been created, redesigned and freshened through the expertise of our director of Collections, Mark Tabbert. Our Director of Communications, Shawn Eyer, works to produce and provide material and communications and to integrate tools that further our mission. The Executive Director, George Seghers, who works tirelessly, is overseeing the restoration and repair of the building both inside and externally. I am Chairing the Committee to redevelop our Ambassador Program to actively provide our constituent voting members-the Grand Lodges of the United States-educational information and relevant services that can be of great use and support to Freemasonry and its mission in our world in this century. Case No. 2015-1

Grand Lodge Office, Holden, Maine, 11:00 A.M., January 4, 2016, FRATERNAL LODGE # 55 vs. WOODWORTH BAIRD SHUTE.

After examining the evidence, hearing testimony offered by the principle and witness, the Commissioners unanimously concluded that WOODWORTH BAIRD SHUTE is guilty of unmasonic conduct, to wit Violation of the Grand Lodge of Maine Social Media Policy; Amassing a motor vehicle record of numerous violations with indifference to public order and safety; following his arrest for motor vehicle violations was photographed at the York County Jail in Masonic attire that clearly displayed Fraternal Lodge # 55, Alfred, Maine; and did remove from Fraternal Lodge # 55 one Milwaukee Sawzall which was to be sold as a yard sale fund raiser for the benefit of the lodge; this without permission.

By a unanimous vote the Commissioners of Trials recommend that BROTHER WOODWORTH BAIRD SHUTE be suspended from Freemasonry.

No other matters were referred.

Grand Master Dave Walker took a moment to thank RW C. Herbert Annis for his work on the committee on Fraternal Relations. Brother Annis is retiring after many years of service.

Report of the Special Committee on the proposed AGL Amendment

Most Worshipful Grand Master, Grand Lodge officers, Lodge officers, proxies and members all,

The Grand Master has asked that I touch on legislation that will be voted upon today, and I am honored to be before you at this time. Last year the following proposal was presented, accepted and laid over for final consideration at this Communication:

Proposed:

"Sec. 33.2 The Grand Master shall appoint an Assistant Grand Lecturer in each District. This officer would assume the duties and responsibilities of the District Ritual Instructor, instruct on ritual text and meaning, schedule and oversee District Schools of Instruction, encourage initiatives to enhance ritual

proficiency and understanding, and assume responsibility from the District Deputy for annual assessments of lodge ritual proficiency."

This represents a modest restructuring of the workings in a district from the current practice. Presently, there are up to six Assistant Grand Lecturers that must cover over 100 schools of instruction and assist in the learning of ritual throughout the state. Because they are thinly spread, schools tend to be "cookie-cutter" in nature and the opportunity to provide an understanding of the underlying meaning of the ritual is unavailable due to the time constraints and limitation on both the schools and the lecturer's availability. With this change, the Lecturers now become part of each district.

The Grand Master established a committee (Harland Harnden, Bill Layman, and Victor Oboyski) to examine the proposal in detail. The committee generally agreed with the intent of the legislation and found that:

Overall, the proposed change positively affects the education in a district. Today, schools are generally taught by a Lecturer who is often not be part of the district. Under this proposal, the Lecturer will be part of the district. This seemingly small difference is actually not insignificant.

- 1) Under the present system, Lecturers are responsible for multiple districts, so scheduling schools may be more at the convenience of the Lecturer rather than that of the district. Since the lecturer would now only have one district and is a part of it, schools can be more readily scheduled when the district needs it.
- 2) Today, Lecturers rarely are involved with the districts to which they are assigned except at the schools; they are spread too thinly across multiple districts. As a result, they may not be familiar with the particular needs or shortcomings of a particular district, and tend to simply have attendees read portions of the ritual, there is no time to focus on anything else.

With this change, it is more likely that the DAGL will know where the district lodges need reinforcement and will be able to tailor the schools as needed.

In many cases, the DRI does not participate in the schools, or if he does, it is only as an attendee. This legislation tweaks the make-up of the districts by having the Lecturer assume the duties of the DRI and then expand upon those duties. The Lecturer, as the district officer responsible for the ritual would not only be attending but scheduling, overseeing and actively participating in the instruction of the district as it pertains to the ritual

What sets us apart from every other fraternity is our ritual, yet we rarely give it any consideration except trying to learn the words. We almost never give thought to what the words actually mean or why we say what we say.

Last year as the Junior Grand Warden, I briefly spoke at each District Meeting about our ritual, and how it relates to our lives today. This seems to have resonated with many of those attending as many came up to me after each meeting to agree with the need to teach an understanding of the ritual to our members.

The intent of this legislation is to provide the resources that would enable each district to not only learn the words of our ritual and how to convey them to our candidates, but for each of us, even those who have been members for decades to explore who we really are as Masons by learning the meaning of those words.

As chair of the committee, I recommend the proposed legislation and sincerely ask you to approve it.

Committee on Amendments to the Constitution

To the Most Worshipful Grand Master, Officers, and Brethren of this Jurisdiction:

My brethren we have six Constitutional matters to consider at this session; one proposed amendment requiring a final vote, three proposed amendments being offered for their initial consideration, and two proposed Standing Regulations changes, one to S.R. 14 and one to S.R. 18.

For the purpose of expediency, let us first move to consider the proposed amendment to

SEC. 21 – Of the Grand and Assistant Grand Lecturers.

As proposed, paragraph 2 of Section 21 would read: In addition to the Grand Lecturer, the Grand Master shall appoint an Assistant Grand Lecturer in each district. This officer would assume duties and responsibilities for the District Ritual Instructor, instruct on ritual text and meaning, schedule and oversee District Schools of Instruction, encourage initiatives to enhance ritual proficiency and understanding, and assume responsibility from the District Deputy for annual assessments of lodge ritual proficiency.

As required by our Constitution, this proposed amendment was entertained at Annual Communication last year, referred to the appropriate committee, entered upon the records of Grand Lodge, sent to the several lodges for consideration, and is now deemed in order to be taken up at this annual communication.

To that end, I would entertain a motion to remove this proposed amendment from the table.

Before we precede with discussion on this proposal, under SEC. 44 rules 11 and 12, your COMMITTEE ON AMENDMENTS TO THE CONSTITUTION would offer an amendment to this proposal, namely:

'Adoption of the foregoing shall also serve to repeal SEC. 33.2, which calls for the appointment of District Ritual Instructors; also that the Table of Contents, cross references to SEC. 33 and the subheading for SEC. 33 be properly edited to reflect this change.'

Brethren, this further requirement is strictly a matter of housekeeping. The original proposal, if ratified, would effectively transfer all the duties of the now extirpated District Ritual Instructors to the Assistant Grand Lecturers. If SEC. 33.2 Is not eliminated, constitutionally the Grand Master would still be required to appoint twenty-four individuals to what would now be a meaningless position. I would move that this amendment to the proposed amendment be accepted.

So Voted.

I would now entertain a motion to adopt the proposed amendment (as amended) to Section 21 of our Constitution.

Proposal defeated.

Now let us move to the three Proposed Amendments offered for the first time this year,

The first is to replace existing Section 75.3, which now requires each lodge to submit an annual history not later than March 1st under penalty of fine, with the following:

75.3 LODGE HISTORIES – Each lodge in this jurisdiction is encouraged to prepare its history for the preceding year and especially for significant anniversary years. Copies of histories filed with the Grand Lodge by March 1st will be reviewed by the Committee on History of Masonry in Maine for its report and recognition of Lodge histories at the Annual Communication.

I would entertain a motion that this proposed amendment be entertained, referred to the appropriate committee, entered upon the the records of the Grand Lodge, sent to the several lodges for consideration, and be deemed in order to take up at the next annual communication.

Proposal accepted.

The second Proposed Amendment is to the first paragraph of **SEC. 86** – APRONS.

As proposed, SEC. 86 would read:

The apron is a part of the Masonic clothing and cannot be worn in public outside of the lodge room, except to participate in Memorial or Divine services, Grand Lodge approved processions, ceremonies to recognize Masonic veterans or to present Grand Lodge approved awards, moreover no lodge shall form a public procession – funeral processions and processions for attendance upon divine service excepted – without dispensation from the Grand Master. Nor is it proper for a lodge, as such, to take part in any public demonstration except to perform some Masonic labor sanctioned by the Grand Lodge.

The second paragraph of SEC. 86 would remain unchanged and in force.

I would entertain a motion that this proposed amendment be entertained, referred to the appropriate committee, entered upon the records of the Grand Lodge, sent to the several lodges for consideration, and be deemed to be in order to take up at the next annual communication.

Proposal accepted.

The final proposed amendment is to

SEC. 105.1 COMMITTEE OF INQUIRY, and would follow paragraph three of Sec. 105.1 as now in force. The proposal to be considered is as follows:

"Each applicant for the degrees shall be subject to a verification of facts reported on his petition for membership relating to his criminal background. The petitioner shall personally obtain and pay for a background verification by a recognized company contracted by the Grand Lodge, with the report sent by the vendor directly to the applicant. The Committee of Inquiry shall review the report to determine any matters of concern that might weigh on its recommendation to the lodge, and record its review on the petition signed by committee members prior to a ballot on the application."

I would entertain a motion that this proposed amendment be entertained, referred to the appropriate committee, entered upon the records of the Grand Lodge, sent to the several lodges for consideration, and be deemed to be in order to take up at the next annual communication.

Proposal defeated.

Let us now move to the two proposed changes to our Standing Regulations. I would remind you that there is no year-long layover when voting on Standing Regulations. An affirmative vote today will make the changes effective immediately.

S.R. 14 *Resolved:* That all written or printed notices of lodge communications or other matters of lodge business containing any Masonic information beyond the time and place of stated or special communications shall be mailed in sealed envelopes. Such sealed notice should include the name, physical address, age and occupation of an applicant for any of the degrees, together with the names of the brethren who have recommended him.

Email or other electronic messaging cannot be considered sealed.

I would entertain a motion to accept this proposal.

Proposal accepted.

Final piece of "Amendments to the Constitution business" falls within S.R. 18 which provides for a lodge, when its by-laws allow, to sponsor a Chapter of the International Order of DeMolay, and to use its Charity Funds to support DeMolay and the Pine Tree Youth Foundation.

One proposed change in S.R. 18 would allow for a lodge, when its by-laws allow, to also also sponsor and use its Charity Funds for the support of the International Order of Rainbow for Girls.

A new paragraph in this proposal would also allow any chartered lodge under this jurisdiction to vote use of its general funds to contribute to the support of the International Order of Rainbow for Girls.

Here is the language that has been presented for your consideration:

- **S.R. 18** *Resolved:* That 1. Any chartered lodge under this jurisdiction may vote to become a sponsoring body for a Chapter of the International Order of DeMolay or the International Order of Rainbow for Girls, provided such proposal has been before the lodge one month and notice of the intended vote is included in the summons for the meeting at which said vote is to be taken.
- 2. Any chartered lodge under this jurisdiction may vote to use its Charity Funds to contribute to the Support of the DeMolay and Pine Tree Youth Foundation or the International Order of Rainbow for Girls, provided the lodge's by-laws so permit and that such proposal has been before the lodge one month and notice of the intended vote is included in the summons for the meeting at which such vote is to be taken.
- 3. Any chartered lodge under this jurisdiction may vote to use its general funds to contribute to the support of the International Order of Rainbow for Girls provided the lodge's by-laws so permit and that such proposal has been before the lodge one month and notice of the intended vote is included in the summons for the meeting at which such vote is to be taken.

I would entertain a motion to accept this proposal and have its contents spread across the records. Motion seconded.

Proposal accepted.

Committee on Amendments to the Constitution

The Grand Master called RW James May, Chairman of Committee on Finance, to the Grand East.

Report of the Committee On Finance

To the Most Worshipful Grand Master, other officers and Brethren of the Grand Lodge of Maine in Lewiston, Maine, May 3, 2016, following is the report of the Committee of Finance.

In accordance with The Grand Lodge Constitution, Sec. 35.2, it is the responsibility of the Committee to see that the financial records of Grand Lodge are audited by a public accountant and to examine the records of the Grand Secretary. These functions have been performed by the Committee. The warrants compiled by the Grand Secretary of invoices to Grand Lodge for payment by the Grand Treasurer have been examined and found to be in order. The public accounting firm of Macpage, LLC, was engaged to conduct an audit of the financial statements of Grand Lodge. The results of the audit, dated August 11, 2015, are as follows: "In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the assets, liabilities, and net assets of Grand Lodge of Maine Ancient Free and Accepted Masons as of March 31, 2015 and 2014 and its revenue collected, expenses paid, and other changes in net assets for the years then ended, on the modified cash basis of accounting ..."

For the year ending March 31, 2015 Grand Lodge assets increased to \$1,704,310, a 5.8% increase.

The second major function of the Committee per Sec. 35.3 of the Grand Lodge Constitution is to prepare and present a budget for approval by the Craft at the Annual Communication. A draft of the proposed budget was sent to the Permanent Members of Grand Lodge and the constituent lodges for review back in February.

The proposed budget has revenue based on membership of 17,700. The per capita assessment will stay the same at \$17.10 per member; \$14.10 of which is used for the operation of Grand Lodge, \$2.00 for the Maine Mason and \$1.00 for the George Washington Memorial. Other sources of income are: fines, initiation fees, sale of items from the Grand Lodge Office, and interest and investment income. After the transfer of funds to the Maine Mason and GWM accounts operating revenue is projected to be \$266,620.

On the expense side of the budget is a proposed salary for the new Grand Secretary of \$33,000 per year, plus an additional \$5,000 for a transitional period of training with the current Grand Secretary. Total budget for the Grand Secretary's office is \$38,000. The Grand Treasurer's salary is proposed to increase to \$19,000 per year. The budget for the office staff includes modest increase in wages and totals \$83,042. The rent for the Grand Lodge office is currently \$24,000, half of which is paid by the Charitable Foundation. Insurance costs are projected to be \$8,440 and includes directors and officers coverage as well as the contents of the Grand Lodge office. Other office cost total \$\$102,164. Total shared cost with the Charitable Foundation is \$242,206. The Foundation's share of which is \$94,150. The balance of the Grand Lodge office expense is estimated at \$21,190.

Projected expense for the annual communication is \$28,000.

Grand Lodge officer's expense is budgeted at \$38,300. This includes travel expenses for the Grand Master, Deputy Grand Master, Grand Secretary and other Grand Lodge officers.

The budget for the various committees totals \$48,200, which is the same as last year's budget. However, responsibility for leadership and mentor development will be divided between the Membership and MEALS committees. Leadership development will be administered by the MEALS committee. The mentoring program will be under the direction of the Membership Committee. Budgeted amount for the Membership Committee is \$24,000, which will be used for: advertising, mentoring program, fellowship nights, retention of older members, Masonic Rookie program, membership brochures and awards. The budget for the MEALS committee is \$21,700, which will be used for: Dirigo Leadership seminars, district officer training, district education representative support, Masonic excellence award and educational materials.

In summary, total proposed expenditures for the Grand Lodge of Maine in fiscal year 2017 is \$283,746. Revenue is projected to be \$266,620. The deficit of \$17,126 is to be covered by applying funds (\$18,000) from retained earnings.

At the annual communication two years ago \$10,000 was appropriated from retained earnings for the purpose of setting funds aside for the celebration of the two hundredth anniversary of this Grand Lodge in 2020. This money was used to purchase commemorative coins; some of you may have already acquired one of the coins as a memento of the anniversary. In order to insure adequate funding of other anniversary functions the committee has voted to recommend the appropriation of \$20,000 from retained earnings for such use.

I would like to express my thanks to the committee for electing me chairman and for their participation in the work at hand. A special thank you to RW Mark Rustin for all his efforts as Grand Secretary, he has been a pleasure to work with. And also, a thank you to the Grand Treasurer, RW Scott Whytock for his work in looking after the Grand Lodge investments and paying the bills. The two ladies who work in the Grand Lodge office, Theresa and April, deserve recognition for their efforts in the work that they do. Thanks to all of you for your efforts in making the Grand Lodge office run smoothly.

Proposed motions by the Committee of Finance:

We move the acceptance of the proposed budget for the fiscal year 2017. **Seconded and passed.**

We move the approval of the per capita assessment of \$17.10 per member for the fiscal year 2017. **Seconded and passed.**

We move the appropriation of \$20,000 from retained earnings to the 200th Anniversary Committee fund. **Seconded and passed.**

For any of you that have had any business dealings and calling the Grand Lodge office, and I do it how many times a day? A lot yes. They make it a real pleasure to do business with the Grand Lodge of Maine. We all owe them a huge debt because each and every person who calls our Grand Secretary's office is greeted with the same warm welcome and thank you from each one of these ladies. The impression it makes to each and every one that calls the Grand Secretary's office you cannot measure the value. We all owe them just a huge, huge debt. Towards that end, I didn't do this by myself, my wife had a hand in it, tells me what's right and what's wrong with these things. So she told me don't get them cut flowers, give them something that will last. You ladies are the best! Right after my wife, you're the best.

The Grand Master called the Craft from Refreshment to Labor Report of the Masonic Education and Lodge Services

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine:

The Masonic Education & Lodge Service (M.E.A.L.S.) Committee has been busy meeting monthly in Augusta. We accomplished the following:

The MEALS Committee started the year by conducting a full day of training for the District Education Representatives, as usual. The attendees were very attentive and it was evident from the beginning that they were all highly motivated as Masonic Educators. This group of DER's did an outstanding job for "The Craft" and I am taking this opportunity to thank them for their extraordinary efforts and to say that it has been both an honor and a pleasure to work with such a dedicated group of Masonic Brothers

I reported last year that we had completed the new Protocol Video and that a copy would be distributed to each lodge as soon as possible. Well, it didn't happen and here is why. Although our video crew did a good job of meeting all requirements of their contract, once the final draft was presented for review, we realized that the speaking parts could have been done better. That said, we made a decision, with the approval of the Grand Master, to re-do the entire video utilizing the installed and well-rehearsed officers from a single outstanding lodge, rather than the ad-hoc cast of speakers who were video-taped the first time. We selected Village Lodge #26 in Bowdoinham to perform most of the speaking parts and "Floor Work" and they did an outstanding job. As I am writing this report, the video has not been released but I have been promised that it will be completed prior to this Grand Lodge session in

May. The additional filming was completed under the original contract and did not cost this Grand Jurisdiction additional monies

We continued the development of new Masonic Toolbox items.

V.W. Brother Brian Ingalls, DER of the 19th District, introduced us to a program that he developed called the "Traveling Crew Contest". Some of the reasons for developing this program are as follows: to encourage traveling both within and outside the district, stimulate all Masons to get away from the TV and visit other lodges, encourage teamwork and competition among the lodges within the 19th District. The Grand Master wants the DER's in all districts to aggressively support this effort. We collectively decided that the MEALS Committee, with the support of the Grand Master and Brian Ingalls, need to hold two informational meetings, one North and one South to kick off this initiative. Both the Grand Master and Brian Ingalls have agreed to speak at each of the two meetings. This is an initiative that also needs support by all DDGM's, Lodge Masters and all Masons. Brian told us that this initiative has already made a major impact on the 19th District. Masons throughout the district are getting excited about traveling again, it has stimulated competition among his lodges and everyone is having fun. I contacted the DER's about this program and quickly learned that similar programs are already being utilized throughout this Masonic Jurisdiction. The bottom line, in my opinion, is that Lodge Masters and Grand Lodge Officers in general should encourage the Craft to try new things. We should do whatever it takes to keep Masonry alive and well.

The Grand Master told us about a newly raised Master Mason and how this newly raised Brother had demonstrated proficiency in an alternative manner. This brother, like many men, has great difficulty with memorization but wanted to demonstrate his proficiency. He did considerable Masonic research and documented his findings in a paper that he read in open lodge prior to his 3rd degree. The Grand Master said that this brother had learned things about the meaning of the Entered Apprentice degree and the Fellowcraft degree that he didn't learn until years later. The Grand Master was so impressed with this new brother's level of understanding as opposed to rote memorization that he asked the MEALS Committee to brainstorm alternative methods that could be used to demonstrate proficiency.

This is what we came up with:

- Essay
- ➤ Lead the candidate through a series of questions and answers about what the candidate went through
 - o Could be done with the questions and answers in cypher
 - Could be done by casually walking him through the degree in the lodge room, asking questions along the way to ensure that he understands what we tried to teach him
- Ask him what some of the words and customs mean to ascertain his level of understanding could be done in private or in open lodge
- Read the cypher lesson to the SW, Mentor or whoever in private

We reviewed the draft Masonic Funeral Booklet and submitted recommendations for revision to the Grand Secretary.

Raymond Rideout Award

Once again this year, we had 8 nominations for the coveted Raymond Rideout Award. They were: Pioneer #72, Pythagorean #11, Village #26, Hiram #180, Mt. Olivet #203, King Hiram #157, St. Croix #46, and Marsh River #102.

There were two that stood out from the rest; Pioneer Lodge #72 from the 1st District and Pythagorean Lodge #11 from the 16th District. After considerable thought and extensive analysis, we are proud to announce that the Winner of this year's Raymond Rideout Award is Pioneer Lodge #72 from Ashland and the Runner-Up is Pythagorean Lodge #11 from Fryeburg.

Here is a sample of what Pioneer Lodge does:

The prospective candidate is invited to the lodge and greeted by the Worshipful Master with a hearty hand shake and a smile. The applicant is then led into the lodge to meet the members of the Inquiry committee. The Committee of Inquiry consists of 2 members (usually past masters) and a member who has not served on the committee in a while or never has (usually a new mason). This insures that the leadership of the committee is passed on to other brethren in the lodge. Coffee and a few refreshments are set out and the conversation begins with question from the application, and the prospective candidate answers. After some discussion the applicant is then lead into the lodge for a tour. The applicant is informed that he will be contacted after the stated meeting and know of his acceptance or not. The evening of the E.A Degree there is a good home cooked meal with desserts and fellowship. A past master or member of the lodge will stay downstairs with the candidate while the rest go upstairs and open lodge. Upon receiving his E.A degree the Worshipful Master hands the New Brother the Pollard Plan and a lesson book. He then introduces the new Brother to the lodge and the new Brother is given the floor for any comments. After the Lodge is closed the Master and a Brother (mentor) will take the new Brother aside and work out a plan on learning his lesson. The new Brother is contacted often by the Master to see how the lessons are coming and given positive reinforcement, so that he can attain knowledge about the craft and keep him engaged. Also the new brother is invited to all stated meetings and lodge is opened in "his" degree so as to get this brother welcomed and engaged in lodge activities. W.M. Bessey believes that this gesture makes a new brother feel that his presence is important and appreciated. This also transpires to the officers of the lodge and in turn they are energetic and this breeds success.

If this Lodge Uses the Elder Brother program, Please describe it.

The Elder Brother is usually the first line signer or a Past Master who volunteers. As with most lodges in the first district there is a "core" of dedicated past masters and brethren who will assist the candidate in their masonic knowledge and education. Wor. Chris Bessey has completed his first year in the East. He owns a business in town and does what is needed to insure that the candidate is being helped in his journey towards masonic knowledge. As Master he has learned to delegate and ask for help from time to time. This strong work ethic is like a virus that everyone catches and he is over-run with eager mason willing to help at a moment's notice. He also served as the President of the Masters and Wardens Association this past year. He took this on with equal enthusiasm and has been active in traveling throughout the district. Because of his business in town many Candidates will stop in and go through a lesson or even degree work. The newly elected Master, Bro Jim Ball has the same drive to succeed and is looking forward to ascending to the East. One last note, if at any time there is a candidate that needs assistance, there is not one, but several knowledgeable brethren in the lodge that are willing to explain the lesson and pass-on the knowledge they have learned.

Describe what the Lodges use for Candidate Education resources and how used.

The Pollard Plan booklets are explained and the mentor(s) meet with the candidate and go over the lessons. The mentors fully explain the symbolism in each degree in detail. There is also a core group from every lodge that travels through-out the first district. They always invite a new brother to attend their meetings. This is so that a new brother learns the value of travel and it broadens him with new friendships and strengthens the bonds of Masonry and its teachings. This also lets a new brother see with his eyes open, the degrees that were just taken, and helps him learn his lesson faster. The Candidate also gets a feeling of acceptance and importance of the teachings of Free Masonry.

Describe any presentations used for General Membership Education.

Worshipful Bessey always had a program ready for most meetings. There was a lot of degree work this year and when there was not, he would call upon the D.E.R for a program. The D.E.R was not the only one who did a program this past year, as he called on the JW and SD for a short program of their choosing. It was the circle of ambulation of the F.C degree. The D.E.R. did a small play on the action of the committee of Inquiry and the due diligence needed to make a lodge successful. This created lots of discussion and we had lots of fun with it. The incoming Master has not yet contacted the D.E.R for programs, but has told me he will.

Describe why this Lodge merits your recommendation.

Every April Pioneer Lodge hosts a Blood drive with the Red Cross at the local recreational center in town and the lodge usually receives about 25-35 donors annually that come in and donate. The lodge has done this for the past 8 years or so, and the community knows that they will receive a warm greeting from the brethren

and will be attended to quickly. There are 3-4 members that are retired that are at the building to help the Red Cross set up. Then there is 4-5 more that come out after work too help tear down. A Lodge member provides a hearty soup and rolls that is made available to the Red Cross personal. The Red Cross personal look forward to traveling to Ashland for this stew.

Four years ago Pioneer Lodge decided to sponsor the "Bike for Books Program". Wor. Bessey who was the Junior Warden at the time had an idea on how Pioneer Lodge could sponsor this program. Wor Bessey put together a Golf Tournament. He was able to get sponsors for each hole on the course and get a Ford Dealership to give a vehicle away for the "Hole in 1 shot". Together with the entry fees and the sponsored hole Pioneer Lodge was able to fund this program. Several Brethren in the Lodge join with Wor. Bessey to make this event very successful. This program has been growing more and more each year as word gets around town that the dollars are going for the "bikes for Books". Several Members meet at the School for the unavailing and last year every child in the 2nd grade received a bike. See pictures below.

Pioneer Lodge also has several annual Fundraisers that have been very successful. The Pancake Breakfast around the 4th of July in conjunction with Summerfest. Everybody in town looks forward to this Breakfast. The Moose Hunters Supper is another good fundraiser for the lodge that has been getting better every year. 10 Fried turkeys are done at the lodge for this fundraiser and will feed about 70 people or so. The reviews that the lodge receives are excellent and hunters traveling into the area have started to become regulars and schedule there hunt around this supper. The proceeds from these events keep the lodge warm in the winter and help out with building expenses. In the last couple of years, the Lodge has put a new metal roof on and bought a newer stove from the Shrine club in Presque Isle and recently a new fridge. The Lodge also sponsors several "special" suppers where ATLC and Project Grad students are asked to assist with serving and clean-up. The proceeds from these suppers goes to these two youth organizations. This gives Pioneer Lodge a chance to meet and greet the students that will be graduating from high school and may become future Masons.

911 Memorial

The 911 Project was 2 plus years in the making. This project started with a simple conversation with R.W Rich Wark (member of Pioneer) and the Fire Chief of Ashland (Don Bouley). They found a piece of scrap metal from the world trade center. This scrap piece was at Freeport Lodge and was a piece that they had to remove that their memorial would fit their design. R.W. Wark and Don Bouley approached the Freeport Lodge and asked if they could obtain the scrap piece of steel so that the Ashland Fire Dept. and Pioneer lodge could make a joint project for the community and recognize the men and woman who gave their lives to save others. Freeport Lodge released the piece of steel to Pioneer Lodge so that they could also create a memorial of their own. Once the steel was received the Pioneer Lodge and AFD (Ashland Fire Dept.) had to come up with the money to support this

project. Pioneer Lodge and the AFD decided to put on a joint supper in the community to raise fund for this memorial. This was not a big success which we hoped for but, we were in competition with 3-4 other local suppers that night throughout the surrounding communities. But have faith we raised \$343.00 dollars that night. This is the **EXACT** number of emergency personal that gave their lives on that faithful day. Several of us counted the money several times and we all were just amazed. This had to be fate for this memorial to happen. Don Bouley and a committee for Pioneer lodge got started with concept drawings and started to plan out a design and costs. Once word of this memorial spread through town, the community came together and assisted in the building of this memorial. All the labor was from volunteers in the community both mason's and non-mason's worked hours on this project. Nelson Craig, a stone mason by trade, volunteered his time to help us cut and assemble the stones for the platform which the monument stands on. Pioneer Lodge and AFD received a cooperate grant from Lowes for \$750.00 of material at their cost and they sent laborers over for 30+ hours of work, on top of that. Pioneer Lodge also applied for a community betterment grant through Grand Lodge to help raise funds for this memorial. This was completed and ready for an unveiling on September 11, 2015. Fire and Police Depts. from all over Aroostook County came to assist with the dedication. Two ladder trucks were present (Ashland and Van Buren) and put their ladders in the air and hung the Flag of our nation high and proud. This was an emotional time as "taps" was played to remember those who gave their lives to save others.

Presentation of the Josiah Hayden Drummond Medal Brother William Markey Layman Grand Marshal of the Grand Lodge of Maine

Brother William Markey Layman, Grand Marshal and RW Past District Deputy of the 11th Masonic District of the Grand Lodge of Maine was raised as a Master Mason in Tuscan Lodge #106 in Addison, Maine in April of 1996. He progressed through the chairs and served as Worshipful Master of that Lodge in 2005-2006.

After relocating to Central Maine, Brother Layman affiliated with Monmouth Lodge #110 and once again progressed to the East and served as Worshipful Master in 2008. In 2009 he was appointed as District Educational Representative for the 11th Masonic District and in 2011 he was appointed District Deputy Grand Master of the 11th Masonic District. Brother Layman is well known throughout the 11th Masonic District as an excellent ritualist and is frequently called on by Lodges to give a part of the degree or a lecture.

Brother Layman and his wife Mary Alice reside in Augusta.

Brother Layman for your many hours of travel and counsel to me personally and as Grand Master and for your tireless efforts on behalf of the Craft and Charitable Foundation, it is indeed my great honor and pleasure to present you with this Josiah Hayden Drummond Medal for Distinguished Service.

Report of the National Masonic Foundation for Children

Visitors, my Brethren all, good afternoon.

I stand here as the Executive Director of the National Masonic Foundation for Children and Maine has taken now a serious look at trying another stab at establishing in this Grand Jurisdiction, a Masonic Student Assistant Program.

We have been in business for 30 years. In over those 30 years, we made a lot of changes in the program that has evolved today into one the best, into the best, student assistant training across this country. There is no question in my mind about it. In 1986, the Conference of Grand Masters created this foundation to oversee the functions of the Masonic Model Assistant Program, which teaches how to recognize at risk behavior in our children. In those days, because I attended in 1987 in Maryland, to observe for our state of Vermont. We have been doing it since 1990, twenty six years. I went down there and it was a five day, four night program. Basically and alcohol and drug abuse program. We have evolved into an expanded menu of offerings. Our Cadillac program is a three day core group program which teaches our teachers how to recognize these behavior changes and how to intervene. We have the condensed version, a two day program. Teachers can't get out of the classroom like they used to so we offer the two day program. We also offer a 1 day safe school, which is our bullying, which started I'm thinking 5 years ago. I will tell you that thing is exploding on to the scene across America because bullying is such an issue in all of our schools nowadays. We also have an administrator academy which teaches school systems how to lock down. How to change policy to deal with the issues that our young people have today. My Brothers, we have no idea what our young children go through today. In our generation, in my generation it was pretty easy. We took bullying aside and took care of it ourselves. It is not the way it is now. I will tell you this, would you call this a weapon? It certainly is. The Prince girl in Hadley Mass, and I'm talking 6 or 7 years ago now, committed suicide. She found out, they found out that several students were bullying her. Through what? The internet, the emails, the text. She went home. I cannot imagine walking into my home and discovering my son or daughter had hung them self. That's tragic. It should have never happened. And you know what her fault was? She was a

sophomore. A beautiful young lady who went to the prom with a senior jock. Some of the senior girls were upset with her and campaigned to smear her name. At 15 years old she didn't have anything left to live for. That is what your Grand Lodge is looking into now. Bill and Sawin came over to Vermont to observe our training. I think they were pretty well impressed. You know what they're going to bring back to your state, your schools, for your teachers but most of all for your students? It's an extraordinary program that actually saves lives. It truly does. I'm going to quote Winston Churchill who said "Success is not final; failure is not fatal. What counts is the courage to continue." I want to congratulate this Grand Lodge because we went through this with Grand Master, Bob Landry, and your Education Department, I want to thank you for regenerating interest in the Masonic Student Assistant Program. Grand Master, on behalf of the National Masonic Foundation for Children and your Brethren, I want to give you this Certificate of Appreciation for making a positive difference in the lives of children. This Assistant training can help change the classrooms which ultimately changes culture in schools and the community. Thank you Grand Master and all Maine Masons for picking up this program.

Grand Master Walker asked that the Craft recognize RW Tom Pulkkinen for all he has done with this program.

Elections Continued

The results for Junior Grand Warden are as follows, Ken Caldwell received 224 votes, and Don Pratt received 304 votes. Donald Pratt declared the winner. Brother Pratt accepted.

The results for Deputy Grand Master, Brother Hoyt 98 votes, Brother Murphy 145 votes and Brother Mark Rustin, 291 votes. Mark Rustin declared the winner. Brother Rustin accepted.

In the uncontested balloting for Grand Treasurer, MW Pulkkinen asked the Grand Lodge to elect RW Whytock by acclamation. The Craft responded favorably and RW Whytock accepted.

In the uncontested balloting for Grand Secretary, MW Pulkkinen asked the Grand Lodge to elect RW Daniel Bartlett by acclamation. The Craft responded favorably and RW Bartlett accepted.

In the contested balloting for the Directors of the Maine Masonic Charitable Foundation there are 2 openings and there are 4 nominees. MW Claire Tusch, MW David Walker, RW Rick Bergeron, and RW Ron Fowle. The Ballot was declared open and the tellers set to work.

In the uncontested balloting for one opening on the Grand Lodge Finance Committee has one nominee, Jim May. It was moved and seconded to declare Jim the winner by acclimation. Motion carried and Jim accepted.

Presentation of the Josiah Hayden Drummond Medal Brother Donald Walter Pratt

Brother Donald Walter Pratt, Grand Senior Deacon and RW Past District Deputy Grand Master of the 11th District of the Grand Lodge of Maine is a valued member of Dirigo Lodge #104 being raised as a Master Mason on April 27th, 2002. Brother Pratt soon became Junior Deacon and worked his way through he chairs and was elected as Master of Dirigo Lodge in October 2007 an office in which he has served for seven terms.

Brother Pratt was appointed District Deputy Grand Master of the 11th Masonic District of the Grand Lodge of Maine in 2011. He was named Mason of the Year in the 11th Masonic District in 2010 and 2014. Additionally, he has served as a District Resource Coordinator, member of the Committee on Child Identification, and Grand Representative to the Grand Lodge of Iceland.

District Deputies who nominated these lodges, if you are still here, please approach the East. Bethlehem Lodge will be awarded the Benjamin Gleason award. This was put together by RW Christian Ratliff, when he was Grand Lecturer. RW Benjamin Gleason was the first Grand Lecturer that worked in Maine back before Maine became a state. He came from Massachusetts. Each year, the lodge that receives it, their name is etched on the side of this. I will tell you the night you did the Master Mason's degree for the Grand Master, was a great night and some of the best ritual I had heard in a long time. It was excellent. It is with pleasure to award this the Bethlehem Lodge.

Report of the Committee on Membership

Afternoon Brethren, I am Richard Bergeron, the current Senior Grand Warden, but I am also the membership person for the Grand Lodge for the last few years. We have some lodge that are struggling but we have quite a few lodges that are doing very well. It is my pleasure to present, recognize these lodges that are doing well. There are two things that we look at, one is that those lodges that raise the most Master Masons but knowing that that is not the only criteria which we like to look at. We always like to look at lodges that showed a positive gain. This year there were 33 lodges that showed a positive gain. Each of the District Deputies coming in to their new assignments have received certificates to recognize all of those lodges when they get back to their districts. However today I want to do is recognize three lodges for a few things. Brother Grand Marshall, would you please bring to the East, a representative from Fraternal Lodge #55, in addition please bring a representative from Lygonia Lodge #40, representative from Ralph J. Pollard Lodge #217, Triangle Lodge #1 and lastly this lodge is already up here, he is getting two. We have representatives on the stage from, Lygonia Lodge, and Triangle Lodge. Before I give them their awards, is there no representative from Fraternal? Fraternal Lodge not only raised the most Master Masons in the state of Maine in the last year, but they also showed positive gain, greater than any other Lodge in the State of Maine. Part

of that is in addition to raising 11 Master Masons, they restored 4 and they only suspended 1 and only 1 or two passed away. So they showed the greatest gain of any lodge in the state this last year so they will be getting a certificate for raising the most Master Masons and showing the greatest positive gain. With us this afternoon we have Triangle Lodge and Lygonia Lodge. I would also like to mention that Triangle Lodge has been doing some tremendous work the last couple of years under a young group of officers. They have done a great job. Lygonia was up on the stage last year for actually raising the most Master Masons, and this year they came in second. So continue to do good work Brothers.

The Grand Master asks the Grand Marshall to escort to the East, RW Richard Rhoda.

Report of the Grand Historian

MW Grand Master and Brethren All,

Today I submit my last history to the Grand Lodge of Maine as your Grand Historian. Over the past nine (9) years I have submitted seven (7) histories in accordance with Section 30 of our Constitution. One year I was not Grand Historian and the other year the Grand Master did not feel that a narrative history was needed at that time.

This history is meant to be narrative but not in the sense of providing you a list of dates and times of events which have transpired this past year in Maine Masonry. Such information may be ascertained in the various reports which are required to be filed by the constituent Lodges and officers of The Grand Lodge.

A narrative history is meant to tell a story of value in greater detail so as to hopefully, tell the "whole story" or at least as it is viewed by the presenter.

I hope in this report to meaningfully share with you, for the greater good of Grand Lodge as it goes forward, observations and reflections gained over the past nine (9) years relative to lodge histories and the mandatory annual reporting of the same under penalty of a repressive fine system for non-compliance.

Initially being asked to serve as Grand Historian, I was shortly thereafter appointed to and as Chairman of the Committee on the History of Masonry in Maine.

Legislation has been filed to amend 75.3 of our Constitution relative to the annual reporting of lodge histories. The essence of the proposed amendment is to strongly encourage each lodge to prepare and annual history and to file it with Grand Lodge. Such action will not be mandatory nor shall there be an imposition of a penalty as retribution for failure to do so.

This amendment will be voted upon next year at Grand Lodge. As you consider the pros and cons of this amendment, you may wish to review this report in the Grand Lodge transactions for a more in-depth understanding concerning lodge histories.

A survey of Grand Lodge Secretaries in the United States was responded to by fourteen (14) Grand Lodges. Of them only one Grand Lodge has such a policy. The response noted "the lodges are not diligent in sending in reports and the Grand Lodge does not have a strict enforcement policy regarding this." Another Grand Lodge has a provision similar to the one being proposed.

Whence came our requirement for the annual filing of lodge histories with Grand Lodge? This is a fair question for it must be remembered that Grand Lodges first came into existence to help coordinate and assist various individual lodges between their quarterly, semi-annual and annual meetings. Grand Lodges existed for the lodges, not vice versa.

When we became a Grand Lodge in 1820there were thirty-two (32) Lodges. By 1828, just before the onset of the Morgan era, there were 58 lodges. It was to be some 13 years before the light of Masonry was to be brightly seen again and 20 years before another lodge was to be constituted.

The Brethren of that revival era realized their lack of knowledge of the founding and initial growth of Masonry in Maine.

In 1858, Grand Master Hiram Chase took the first step promoting the preparation of a lodge's history. A resolve was passed at Grand Lodge that "The Grand Master requests the W. Master, Wardens, and Secretaries of each subordinate lodge, as a historical committee, to secure the important facts in the history of their lodges...as their voluntary contribution to a full and complete history of Freemasonry in Maine..."

In 1859, another resolve was passed which recognized that"...a good beginning has been made..." in obtaining lodge histories.

It seems that things did not continue as hoped would happen for in 1860 a committee on the History of Masonry was formed with the appointments to it of Joseph Covell, O. J. Fernald and David Bugbee. A resolve was passed by Grand Lodge "That each and every Lodge under this jurisdiction is hereby directed to prepare a full statement of all interesting and important matters, such as extracts from their Records and all oral reliable facts in relation to their lodge or Masonry previous to and since the date of their charter – the preliminary organization of the lodge – and all anecdotes, accounts of celebrations, sentiments, and everything connected with Masonry, that occurred before, during and subsequent to the Anti-masonic crusade, that can be collected by the Lodge from written or printed books or manuscripts or from old Masons, relating to its past history, on or before the first of Marc 1861, and to forward the same to its District Deputy Grand Master.

As this did not meet with success a circular was sent out in 1861 to 94 lodges to submit their histories before February 1, 1962.

Lodges did not respond for the same resolve was passed in 1862 with a due date of the first day of January, 1863.

By 1866 a new approach was taken by the Committee which had found that 33 lodges still had not filed their histories. A resolve was passed "That after all the Lodges shall have furnished their histories to the present time, it shall be their duty once in ten years, commencing with 1870, to furnish their history for the preceding decade, or so much as shall be lacking. Which report was accepted, and the resolution adopted."

It was further stated by the Committee that "The labor bestowed upon this matter by the Lodges, deserves from the Grand Lodge that proper care shall be taken to revise and collate them, so that they may become, as was intended, the Masonic History of our State, and not be thrown among the rubbish of the Temple.

In 1867 it was reported that out of 139 lodges, 32 lodges had delinquent histories.

It was not uncommon for lodges to hire a brother to write those "catch up histories". It was not considered a duty of the secretary to do it. As an example, in 1874 Monument Lodge #96 paid \$10.00 to a member to write its history when the records were still easily accessible. Depending upon which consumer price index one uses, that \$10.00 fee would be the equivalent of \$177.00 to \$189.00 in 2015! It would appear that it was recognized that it took ability, commitment and time to write a suitable history.

Also, it was not uncommon for a lodge to appoint a committee, generally of past masters, to prepare its histories. This apparently, had the advantage of having long term and committed members, with personal reputation at stake, working together as a team to get the history done for the prior decade.

Again, using Monument Lodge No. 96, as an example, I find that after 1870 another history was not written until 1939 when an 89 page one was done. Thereafter decade histories were written by a committee of Past Masters of which two were overseen by MW Ralph J. Pollard. The text of the histories tended to be about 17 pages long; not much but enough to hit the highlights of each year. There were several other pages listing the officers and the names and dates of new members, deceased brethren, WW II Veterans and 50 year Veteran's Medal recipients.

The above quoted resolve remained the standard until 1981 when a quantum change was made. Let us first look at what was happening in the late 1970s. A contact member of the Committee for the following years was RW Charles S, Brown who reported that in 1977 (9) lodges were delinquent between 13 & 20 years; in 1978 16 lodges were delinquent; in 1979 43 lodges were delinquent; and in 1980 37 lodges were delinquent.

In 1980 RW Brown reported that "Possibly a penalty for late Histories similar to that now in effect for late Returns might be the answer."

The following year 37 lodges were delinquent. W. Brother Edwin E. Cummings reported, in part, "Your Committee reluctantly concludes that some sort of a financial penalty for delinquent lodges is the answer. Only by this means will we have all lodges up to date."

The Committee on Amendments to the Constitution proposed to delete all of the old Standing Regulation No.2 (from 1866) and replace it with our current regulation:

75.3 Not later than March 1st annually, each lodge in this Jurisdiction shall prepare its history for the preceding year, permanent copies of which shall be on file with the lodge and Grand Lodge; provided, however, that any lodge whose annual meeting falls in the month of February shall have until April 1st of each year to comply with the above requirements.

And subsequent to 1983 any lodge that fails in any year to complete and submit its history to the Grand Lodge by the day due shall be fined ten dollars for each year in arrears, and each year thereafter on the day due shall be fined an additional ten dollars for each year in arrears.

MW Leon M. Sanborn, Chairman, observed "Something must be done other than persuasion. We hope the above accomplishes the desired results."

The next response was the imposition of a fine of \$10.00 for each year a lodge history was delinquent. One on line consumer price index provides that \$10.00 of 1981 dollars would be worth \$2639 in 2015 or \$10.00 of 2015 would be worth \$3.79 in 1981.

The 1982 report showed 27 lodges being delinquent under the former way of reporting only lodges eleven or more years delinquent in their histories.

The 1983 report was the first time lodges delinquent by only one year were included in the 70 named lodges. Of these, twelve were only late for one year and forty-six were between 2 and 10 years late.

That same year, MW Donald Gardner spoke to the issues of "the fines being imposed this year on those who had not brought their histories up to date. "Some of the histories received in the Grand Secretary's office are nothing more than statistics rather than an interesting account of what had happened during the year. He felt that the Committee should prepare a form of history and circulate it among all lodges and say "this is what we are looking for." He recommended that the Committee prepare and outline as a guide to all lodges telling specifically what they expect in those histories. He also moved that the fines imposed this year be remitted. The motion was carried."

In 1984, no statistical report was given but RW Brown reported in regards to MW Gardner's recommendation that an outline be prepared as a guide to all lodges. He stated "The preliminary draft of that document is now available for review and discussion. The results of which will be incorporated and distributed to all Lodges in September or sooner. Basically it will contain a Forward, Background, Purpose, Scope, Responsibilities, Inductions, and a Preparation check-list. It is admittedly all encompassing but it is an attempt to provide the preparers with every conceivable bit of information that will facilitate the desired result. Words that will defy the ravages of time when committee to the printed page.

A guideline for preparation of lodge histories was completed and distributed to lodges. Its paragraphs were summary in nature and did not provide a cookie cutter example.

In 1990 a 29 page booklet entitled "The Lodge Historian" was compiled by W. Bro. Wallace Gage, Grand Historian.

He wrote, "In response to these, (request on how to write lodge histories), the Grand Lodge has recently issued a publication entitled THE LODGE HISTORIAN for the purpose of providing some information, background, suggestions and a number of articles on the subject of Masonic history gathered from various sources."

No specific directions were given but rather he gave his observations of how histories could/should be written. Again no cookie cutter outline was given for the writing of a lodge history.

He wrote, "Section two, called How to go about it provides guidelines for preparation of a lodge history, sample forms for gathering biographical data, and examples of well written and well prepared sections taken from actual lodge histories."

Each lodge was to receive a copy of the publication from their District Deputy.

A new twist had entered the picture in 2003 when MW Charles Ridlon, then serving his last year as Grand Master, direct the Grand Secretary to impose the mandatory fine of \$10.00 on late histories. Then, after a careful reading of the Constitution, it was found that each year a history was delinquent a \$10.00 fine would be assessed year after year after year.

By 2004 134 of 192 lodges owed 657 years of histories to Grand Lodge.

If a lodge did not file a single history for ten (10) years, its fine would not be \$100.00 but rather \$550.00. By 2007 there were lodges over twenty (20) years behind in their histories.

By 2006 the \$10.00 fine would have been worth \$11.56 in 2015 dollars. Lodge historians or even the lodge itself were rather cavalierly saying "I'll just pay the fine."

At Grand Lodge in 2006, the before MW Gerald Leighton was to become Grand Master, it was proposed to amend Standing Regulation No. 2. The change was to establish a fine of ten dollars. This charge was to remove the ten dollar assessment each year that a history was late. It was further moved that "Any lodge that has heretofore paid and accumulated fine for more than ten dollars for the late filing of a Lodge History for any given year should be entitled to a rebate." The proposed amendment was defeated by a voice vote.

While fines were to be imposed if a history was not filed by March 1st, with some exceptions, the practice of the Grand Secretary was not to impose the fine if the history was filed by the time that the fine notices went out, usually in late June.

The benevolent oversight ceased in 2014 when the Grand Secretary ran his office in compliance with the Constitution as well he was required to do. This, again, has caused some consternation among the Craft and has resulted in way too many totally unacceptable histories being submitted to avoid a \$10.00 fine. Some feel if their history was submitted before, or in some cases, during the Grand Lodge session they should not be fined. Unfortunately, for that point of view, that is not what the Standing Regulation provided.

Hopefully this review of the history of Lodge Histories will provide you a better background to consider the pending Constitutional change.

Brethren, I close this report with an example of the importance of preserving the histories of your lodge and its special events. There has recently been uncovered in the archives of Grand Lodge in the file for Kennebec Lodge No. 5 a complete 20 page copy of "A Masonic Address, delivered before the Worshipful Master, Officers and Brethren, of the Kennebec Lodge, in the new meeting house, Hallowell, Massachusetts, June 24th, ANNO LUCID, 5797 by Brother Amos Stoddard.

I believe our future can be found in our past. During my Masonic Career over the past fifty years, we have had special programs for Blood Drives, Child Identification, and now Bikes for Books. These are all good programs but they come and go. They are not the core principles of Masonry meant to help us grow as an individual.

As stated in prior annual reports, a history can serve as a reference to the past and a guide to the future for the Mason who wishes to be well prepared in his undertakings, especially an incoming Master.

Stoddard presented the history of Masonry as a parable from the formation of EARTH by Deity and Adam as the first Grand Master to its place of leadership in the community in 1797.

Remember, this is a parable concerning the three greatest lessons we are taught in Masonry. Bro. Stoddard presented a smattering of historical happenings and of people telling how these best of human's values were brought down to 1797 and now to 2016.

He stressed the lesson of Masonry, not to be found in the emblems of the Square and Compasses, but rather in the practice of FAITH, HOPE AND CHARITY - Actions not symbols.

He told how these lessons were preserved in the rays of light remaining after man's fall from a solitary act of disobedience. He told how the early male inhabitants of the globe founded a "Lodge on The East of Eden".

He continued to tell how the true Mason pursues the dictates of justice, temperance, fortitude, charity and brotherly kindness and how he acknowledges the one supreme Governor of the world.

In his conclusion he gave a picture of Masonry more needed to be remembered today than it was in 1791. He wrote:

"These principles were established at the first dawn of

Light in the East, and govern, at this day, every legitimate LODGE under Heaven. Christians, Jews, Turks, and even The untutored Savages, feel and acknowledge their influence. They can all assemble at the alter (sic), and mutually salute By the tender name of brother."

His view of the ultimate teachings of Masonry may only be surpassed by Bro. James Anderson's "First Charge: Concerning GOD and Religion" in his "Masonic Constitution of 1723" and by Bro. Gottholt Lessing's parable of "The Three Rings" as told in his epic poem "Nathan the Wise."

Bro. Lessing was an 18th century German philosopher. His writings were so important that a Grand Lodge was named in his honor in Czechoslovakia between World Wars I and II before it was shut down by Hitler.

We would not have Bro. Stoddard's gem of Masonic writing today were it not for the endeavors of his lodge to preserve its Masonic history.

I hope this example has instilled in you the importance of keeping good histories of happenings in your lodges and of keeping meaningful artifacts of special events.

Remember, your lodge history may be the light that will, in some way which you cannot now imagine, show a young Mason a "new" old path in 10, 20 or even 219 years hence.

Look well to your lodge histories. Finally, I bid you a fond adieu. Shalom, Peach, Saleem be upon you."

Report of the Committee on Histories

The Committee on Lodge Histories met at the Grand Lodge Office on March 2nd and reviewed lodge histories. One hundred thirty (130) or 70% were submitted by March 1st and were considered for selection as the five best histories.

The committee believed that histories not submitted in a timely manner in accordance with the constitution should not be considered for special recognition. Tardiness has its price of more than having to pay the constitutionally required fine of \$10.00

M.W. Grand Master again this year, I wish to publicly recognize the invaluable assistance your District Deputies have been relative to getting lodge histories filed.

Starting in mid-February they were advised every Thursday of the lodges which did not have their histories filed. They would then follow up with lodges and some would keep checking with me as to how their lodges were doing. Four districts had all their histories reported by March 1st.

R.W. Paul B. Grondin of the 22^{nd} District had all of his lodges reported before March 1^{st} . R.W. Richard M. Wark, Jr. of the 1^{st} District, R.W. William Pinkham of the 5^{th} District and R.W. Charles Billings of the 10^{th} District each had their last lodge history filed on March 1^{st} . MW, whereas Travis J. Card was referred by Orchard Lodge #215 for disciplinary action, and whereas the Grand Master expelled him due to his convictions on two felonies in Maine Courts while a member of the Fraternity, I move that he be expelled from the rights and privileges of Freemasonry, for unmasonic conduct.

Scott D. Darville

MW, whereas Scott D. Darville was referred by Morning Star Lodge #41 for disciplinary action, and whereas the Grand Master suspended him due to his

attendance at a Lodge meeting while under the influence of alcohol or drugs and exhibiting unmasonic behavior, I move that he be expelled from the rights and privileges of Freemasonry, for unmasonic conduct.

William L. Dawson

MW, whereas William L. Dawson plead guilty to two felony theft charges and three charges of failure to pay State income taxes in Maine District Court while a member of the Fraternity, I move that he be expelled from the rights and privileges of Freemasonry, for unmasonic conduct.

Lonnie R. Holloway

MW, whereas Lonnie R. Holloway falsified his Petition for Degrees by not revealing a conviction for Drug Trafficking in his answers thus falsely attesting to completeness and accuracy, I move that he be expelled from the rights and privileges of Freemasonry, for unmasonic conduct.

Kulmiye Idris

MW, whereas Kulmiye Idris was referred by Rabboni Lodge #150 for disciplinary action, and whereas the Grand Master concurred and suspended him due to guilty pleas on charges of Operating under the Influence, Forgery, and Violating Terms of Release in Maine District Court while a member of the Fraternity, I move that he expelled from the rights and privileges of Freemasonry, for unmasonic conduct.

Woodworth B. Shute

MW, whereas Woodworth B. Shute was referred by Fraternal Lodge #55 for disciplinary action, and whereas the Grand Master concurred and suspended him for violating the Grand Lodge Social Media Policy; amassing a large number of motor vehicle violations while a member of the Fraternity; bringing disrepute on the Fraternity by being arrested in and photographed in a garment prominently displaying a symbol of the Fraternity; and theft of a Sawzall from the Lodge, and whereas he was tried and convicted by the Commissioners of Trials on these violations, each of which are unmasonic conduct, I move that he be expelled from the rights and privileges of Freemasonry, for unmasonic conduct.

Remarks from Grand Master Pulkkinen

There is definitely a lot of people to thank on a day like this. Parents, siblings, Brethren in the Craft all who we have worked with over our years. They make a difference. They shape us into who we are. There are many others as well. I would like to thank the Potentate of Kora Temple for allowing us to use this beautiful edifice for this Annual Communication of this Grand Lodge.

W. Brother Paul Poulin asked to speak.

Most Worshipful, on behalf of the 2200 shrine masons that call this building home we actually want to thank you for allowing us to host the Grand Lodge this past three days. As you well know, you have been invited by Kora and Anah to join us at the Imperial Shrine session in Tampa, Florida this year. At that Shrine session, it is incumbent that all the Grand Masters who assemble there, usually around thirty or thirty-five, to wear a Fez of their temple. Hence, I'm presenting you with your Kora Fez.

At that time, Brother Poulin placed the Fez on Grand Master Pulkkinen's head. The strap on the Fez is appropriately embossed "Grand Master".

Grand Master Pulkkinen continues speaking: A session like this just doesn't happen. It takes a lot of work. It required so much work that our Grand Secretary decided he didn't want to do it anymore and decided "I'll run for Deputy Grand Master" or something like that. I would like to thank Anthony Perkins, not only for that parking space out there with my name on it which was was special and a real surprise but for all he did in making this happen. Putting in extra hours, helping to set up all the chairs and tables, which all have to be taken down after the meeting. We are doing some things a little differently this year. We are going to have a luncheon after the Annual Communication. Not fancy but many of you travel long distances. Both in state and out of state. We thought it most appropriate for Grand Lodge of provide a lunch like yesterday for all of you. We also have pictures for all the officers' right here after the session. So while all of our guests go down and eat food, hopefully they will leave a little bit for you. Our photographer will be setting up and will take about a half an hour. All officers please stay here and help us get chairs on the stage.

The Grand Master asked that the Grand Marshall escort the ladies of the Grand Lodge office to the East.

Theresa and April presented Mark Rustin with a gift. They also presented Audrey Walker with a plant and MW David Walker with the gift of a pen set with the words he spoke to them each time he came to the Grand Lodge office; "Where's my hug"?

MW Thomas Pulkkinen present MW David Walker with a shirt embroidered with "Past Grand Master" as well as the seal of the Grand Lodge of Maine.

MW Thomas Pulkkinen spoke of the three lodges he belongs to: One, here in Maine, Bayview in East Boothbay in which that experience brought me to where I am here. I also belong to a lodge north of Boston, called Independence Lodge. It's a unique lodge perhaps in that several years ago when I was leader of the Masonic Leadership Institute, a Brother said he would like to belong to a lodge that he could speak the great lessons of Free Masonry in the tongue of his native brethren. He is an immigrant from Brazil and he wanted a lodge where the ritual would be portrayed in Portuguese. He could understand the ritual so much more easily if it was in the native tongue. The Grand Lodge of Massachusetts said let's make it happen. They translated the Massachusetts ritual from English to Portuguese. I am a charter member of that lodge. I am very proud to be a part of the fastest growing and active lodge in that jurisdiction. The third lodge, my mother lodge is St. Johns Lodge in Newburyport. It was chartered in 1766, celebrating its 250th anniversary this year. It's the 33rd oldest lodge in America. Can you imagine Masonic Brothers going to church on a Sunday morning in the old south Church in Newburyport, with the minister, Jonathan Parker, after Mass when the ladies went home and the men formed the first militia in the center isle of the church to go to Boston and fight the Brits? That's what happened with a number of members from that lodge and from

the Newburyport area. It is a tremendous old lodge that spirit travels from one lodge to another. Thank you my Lodge Brothers making the journey and being here.

Since coming here from a Massachusetts lodge, I am often ribbed about being a Massachusetts Mason. You're bringing Massachusetts ways up here. This isn't Massachusetts. The first lodge charted in the province of Maine, was in Portland, Falmouth in 1762. The Grand Lodge of Massachusetts charted 33 lodges in this state before Maine became a state with the Missouri compromise. When the Grand Lodge of Maine was formed by the fifth piece of legislation in this state there were 31 lodges remaining and they formed the Grand Lodge. I bet from the 1762 date to 1820 to 2016 this Grand Lodge has never seen the delegation from the Grand Lodge of Massachusetts that we have today.

It is a great pleasure and honor that so many of my friends from that Grand jurisdiction are here, many of them sitting in the front row. After I have introduced everyone we can give them the Maine welcome. We have the Grand Master of Masons in Massachusetts, MW Harvey Waugh and his lady Margaret. We have Past Grand Master, MW Donald Hicks, Jr. and his lady Nancy. We have one heck of a good ping pong table opponent who you never win but it's fun to play him, MW Arthur E. Johnson, Past Grand Master, Grand Secretary and his lady Barbara. We have another Past Grand Master, who asked his wife that got hurt if she could ask someone to watch over her while I go to Maine. It's a true story and he is here and I was happy to see him in the hotel yesterday, MW Richard J. Stewart, Past Grand Master. I was initially appointed DDGM by another Past Grand Master, who would often and always tell his brethren that before he undertook any action, before he made any decision, he would ask himself, is what I am about to do going to help me move from a rough ashlar to the perfect ashlar. Will my thoughts, acts, deeds be worthy of what God would have me do. Special friend for many years, his lady, what we would call special lady, his widow, Mrs. Fred Kerby Bower, Lady K. Most Worshipful Brother Waugh, it is customary in Freemasonry when we have visiting dignitary, offer someone the opportunity to speak. Would you or someone from your delegation like to address the brethren?

MW Harvey Waugh came up to speak.

Most Worshipful Grand Master, Most Worshipful Past Grand Masters, Illustrious officers, Brethren, ladies and guests. It is certainly a pleasure to be here today. It's been a wonderful weekend, very well organized and presented and we have had a wonderful time meeting all our friends throughout the northeast and other places in the states. We appreciate your hospitality very, very much. You know it was back in 1820 that it was suggested and noted, but in 1819 this was the district of Maine from the Grand Lodge of Massachusetts. There was a 200th anniversary at Freeport Lodge and I believe Most Worshipful Chuck Ridlon was the sponsor of that. That was certainly a wonderful occasion. This Grand Master was originally as you know from Massachusetts and there might be a couple of things that might be of interest. But this is all good. He has had a wonderful experience rising through the ranks in the Grand Lodge of Maine and becoming your Grand Master. You know he has a

history in Massachusetts and I'm going to tell you all about it. I don't know if you know it but Tom was raised in St. John's Lodge in Newburyport on January 5 1989. Master of the Lodge in 1994 and 2009. Secretary 1995-2007. Grand Steward 1997. Grand Representative to Norway 2000-2008. DDGM Newburyport 10 2000-2002. Junior Grand Warden of the Grand Lodge of Massachusetts 2004, which makes him a permanent member of the Grand Lodge of Massachusetts which means he is eligible someday to be the Grand Master of Mason in Massachusetts. He received a couple of great honors. One is the Joesph Warren Medal in 1999 and that medal is only requested by the Master of the Lodge then sent to the DDGM and then be approved by the Grand Master. He also received the highest honor and the gift of the Grand Lodge, the Henry Price Medal in 2004. He became a member of Bay View lodge in 1996 in East Boothbay and affiliated with Independence Lodge as you had mentioned in 2009. He had some real, real important jobs at the Grand Lodge. He was editor of our Trowel magazine. Which is a big position to hold and to put together all that information for a wonderful magazine that we do have. He was on the committee called the Flick committee. That committee selects future leaders. They seek out Brethren who could be future leaders. A very important committee, he was on the membership committee, charters and by-laws committee, the education and training committee and the long range planning committee. So you can see the service he performed in the Grand Lodge of Massachusetts, before he became really involved with the Grand Lodge of Maine. It is certainly wonderful tribute to his dedication to our craft. And now I would like to recognize our Past Grand Master, MW Arthur Johnson.

I was pleased to hear all the accomplishments you have in Massachusetts being a permanent member. It feels like if this doesn't work out, you may be able to come back. You know we all wait until a new Grand Master comes in to see what he is going to be doing. There is one thing I can tell you now is you never know what he is going to do. (Pointing to MW Pulkkinen). I have known him a lot of years and the one thing about him is that he is never going to do what you expect. You will have a great two years. So if you get an occasional night when you get to sit at home, think back on what you have. I picked up a Grand Master's clock and if you read it it says Thomas E. Pulkkinen Grand Master and it has today's date. As you look at it I hope you reflect on some of the accomplishments you had, how they went and maybe enjoy that. The clock is set so that it will notify you when your two years are up. I'm hoping then that not only do you think back on the two years you had but that you remember where the clock came from. Remember the things you have in Massachusetts and you will think of those things too. You have made us so proud. Congratulations.

Grand Master's Closing Statement

To the officers of Grand Lodge, to the committee men and to Masons all, the recent article of the Maine Mason had an article on the Washburn family. I hope you read it and considered well some of the lesson contained therein. The articles spoke of

Patty, Benjamin Washburn's wife instructing her husband to take their newborn son to the highest point in the house and like an obedient husband he did it and asked why. She said because I want him to learn to rise in the world. She also told her sons, shoot for the stars even if you miss you will have the pleasure of watching your arrow go up and your arrow come back to earth. In your years of service to your lodges, to the Grand Lodge, to the Brethren all, aim high. Much more is accomplished when you have high expectations then when you have low expectations. Try new things. Remember our Grand Lodge Constitutions doesn't say you can't do it, it says find a way to make it happen. As long as it is consistent with the ancient charges and regulations. We need a powerful fraternity working for the good of all. So aim high. We learn through the use of symbolism as Benjamin Washburn conveyed. We also learned from Holy Scriptures. A few weeks ago I spent the day in a hospice setting with a dear friend and Brother from St. Johns who lived in Brunswick Maine. His minister read a couple passages from scripture and when she was done I then spoke about the anchoring arc, our ritual, and how I knew that arc gave him safe passage through life facing all the challenages that he had. It made him such a great contributor to society, by all the people he touched in a special way as a hospice chaplain and in other ways as well. I told the family I was confident that that anchor of hope would be realized in his life as he passed from this earthly figure to that house not made of hands, eternal in the heavens. That he had been a good Mason. He'd been a good man. He was a major believer in the power and wisdom of GOD. His lessons are important. Besides talking about the anchor and arc, I reminded of the words of the preacher, Solomon in the book of Ecclesiastes, to everything there is a season, there is a time for every matter under the heavens, there is a time to be born and a time to die. A time to plant, a time to pick up which has been planted. A time to dance, a time to mourn. Clearly at that time there was a time for him to pass, and for the family and friends to mourn. We have such a caring Fraternity and one of our roles is reaching out to our brethren and their families at times of need. That needs to be the charge of everyone in here. Not just the Grand Chaplain. Find people in your lodges and in your districts that need the helping hand, a kind word. Not the charity of pocketbook but the charity of your heart. That is what Freemasonry is special for. Hopefully not to be taken religiously I would like to use some of the phraseology of Solomon and remind the officers there is a time for paperwork and the job is not done until the paperwork is completed. Now is the time to inspire your Brethren. To let them understand what Freemasonry is all about and how it can change their lives and the lives of everybody around them. There is a time to push new programs but now is the time to lead the Craft forward. To make it more vibrant and more important in our society. Clearly much of what the Charitable Foundation is trying to do is to put our resources to work. To make in particular, children's lives better. There is a time to reflect upon our history. How Freemasons and Freemasonry has created a country and a society with values makes it a special place to live. All around the world because it's a worldwide Fraternity. As we approach our 200th anniversary, clearly we will be hearing more and more about the history of Freemasonry here in Maine. Now is the time for us to pursue the great inspirational vision of Maine Freemasonry. To enrich lives through education, charity, and spiritual growth. That is our vision. That is on the poster

outside. It's on the brochures we can give to men who are interested in becoming a Freemason. Enriching lives through education and spiritual growth. There is a time for us to teach what the ritual really means. It's time to help lodges pursue Masonic excellence. Time to attract hundreds, thousands of good men to the craft who share our values. There is a time to add value to our position as Senior Grand Warden, Junior Grand Warden, District Deputy or whatever your position. Add value. Make sure that your role in your lodge, your district is better because of the added value you bring. There is a time to build symmetry and order to the lodges so they are all working together within a district because a rising tide lifts off boats and our districts and our lodges will be better if we work together. Brethren we have a great Fraternity and it can be greater. It can touch more lives. It can make us better individuals. It is what you make of it. That is my charge to you. A friend of mine often would say, yesterday is history, and tomorrow is the future. Today is God's gift to us. That is why we call it the present. God has given us this great Fraternity and our brethren have given us the opportunity to lead. To make a difference. Make the most out of that great opportunity. Those collars will not wear out with use, they will only grow in luster. In a year, two years, only God knows, we will regift our leadership positions to another generation of Masons. Let us leave it better than it was transferred to us. No denigration of powers before us but the opportunities that are before us. Ladies and Brethren there are two items on this pedestal. One was crafted for me when I was installed as Master of St. Johns Lodge. It was given to me by the Worshipful Master Jody Wentworth, of Union Lodge 31, in Union Maine. He manufactured it and the lodge gave it to me on the occasion of my being installed Master of the Lodge, and it says, Worshipful Thomas E. Pulkkinen, Master of the Craft, MW George P. Pulkkinen, Grand Master of Masons in Maine. That token of friendship from the Master of the last lodge chartered in the province of Maine, the district of Maine before we became a state will be on the Grand Masters desk for as long as he is in office. The second item is a single red rose in a bud vase. It is there for a reason. More than 35 years ago, a young boy named Mark had a paper route. He was only ten or eleven years of age. Each week he would collect his wages and his tips. On occasion he would go to Knapp's Florist in downtown West Newbury, if there is such a thing as downtown West Newbury. There was a green house and a store and he would buy a single red rose and he would take it to his mother, or his teacher, or his Sunday school teacher as a gift. As an expression of love and an expression of saying thank you for being my friend. Thank you for being there for me. Thirty five years ago this coming September 9th, we lost Mark. When we arrived at the funeral home, there was a single red rose. It was so different from the sprays. So simple, and there was a card that said from the ladies at Knapp's Florist. There was nothing they could have done, there was nothing they could have arranged that would have been more beautiful or more meaningful than that single red rose. I was installed Master of St. Johns Lodge back in 93. We invited all the special ladies and the ladies of our brothers that had passed. We invited them all to the installation and we gave each of them a single red rose, and we told them the story and we told them that part of our obligation as Masons is to watch over, to remember the widows of our brothers. We wanted to make sure they understood that we would be there for them, and hopefully every lodge here is doing the same thing. I can still

see Laura Crooks and Helen Dow and others sitting in the South East corner with a tear in their eye holding their rose. It was touching. And since that time we created this bud vase with the seal of St. Johns lodge on it and every time we lost a Brother we gave it to his widow. Why is this so important to us? Hopefully it makes us better individuals and true believers in God. Better fathers, better husbands, better contributors to society. We recognize Masons are told that we traditionally are out one night a month. That's not really the case, especially when you assume an office in Grand Lodge or the Master of a lodge. You're out and that means time away from family. I have told most of the officers that attended the training session and certainly every new Mason that I meet that one of the first lessons to which they are exposed is the 24inch gauge, divided into 24 equal parts. It's a lesson about dividing your time. You divide your time based on your priorities in life. There will always be times when there is going to be a degree and you've got a degree part and sometimes there is going to be something conflicting with that. Maybe it's a ball game for your son. Maybe it's a dance or singing recital for your daughter. Brethren when you go to lodge and miss an important event, it is an event you will never be able to make up. We have other Officers who can do ritual. If you choose the lodge over that personal event, you're sending the message that Masonry is more important than your son or daughter is. While Freemasonry is important, it is never more important than them. Set your priorities and keep them straight. Use that 24inch gauge as a good lesson. Ladies, if you feel as though your husband is out too much and it is affecting what goes on in the house, remind them the Grand Master talked about it right here. We've got to. But also ladies, we do appreciate the time you give of yourselves to the Craft. The time you give up with your husbands, so they can be active in our great Fraternity. As an expression of love and appreciation I would ask our Stewarts to pass out a single red rose to each lady here. I would like to acknowledge the hard work of the arrangements committee, most particularly Ken and Linda Richardson and Harriet and Bill Stratton. They just work so, so hard for so long and they will be starting their endeavors for next year really soon so we can have another Grand Lodge Session that will be long remembered. Thank you all for being here.

Closing prayer was given.

The 127th Grand Lodge Session was closed in ample form.



Reports Not Read at the Annual Communication

Maine Masonic College

MMC had a year of changes, adjustments, and altered directions. 14 Courses were offered during the GL year which provided 210 Brothers and others with educational insights in various aspects of Freemasonry. Our Annual Celebration of the Arts and Sciences offered the 28 participants with insights into the world of Astronomy. Due to a desire to increase the number of courses annually and disperse them in more geographic regions of the State, this year's Convocation was cancelled. The cancellation allowed the remaining budget funds to be used for Course presentation.

When he made the decision to move from Maine to North Carolina Brother Steve Nichols retired as Chair of the Board of Regents. He provided able leadership and direction to the College for many years. The Board of Regents sponsored a retirement event to honor his service. At this event the Grand Master, Brother David Walker, presented Brother Nichols with the Joshua Chamberlain Medal for his life achievements including his service to Freemasonry in Maine.

The Board of Regents spent significant time reordering the operation of the College. They established a goal of presenting at least twenty-four Courses per year. These Courses are to be scheduled in geographically diverse areas which will allow for attendees to travel shorter distances. (Previously, most Courses were along the Interstate 95 in Bangor, Augusta, and Portland.) The new approach puts the Courses within reasonable distances of those wishing to attend and, with a new course in each area each year, allows for progression of one's educational goals.

The Board projected the cost of College operation based upon the changes and including the revival of Convocation. Additionally, financial operations were

transferred to the Grand Treasurer who now writes checks and maintains the account thus relieving the Board of the need to have a Treasurer. To date, these changes have proceeded smoothly.

There is an increasing quest for knowledge among the Brothers of the Craft. MMC has positioned itself to be increasingly responsive to this quest. We look forward to serving the Craft with excellence in the coming year.

Grand Treasurer

Most Worshipful David A. Walker and the Grand Lodge of Maine

The 2015-2016 Masonic year saw many highlights for the office of the Grand Treasurer. The duties of the Grand Treasurer are split fairly evenly between the duties to the Grand Lodge of Maine and the Maine Masonic Charitable Foundation.

Grand Lodge Budget: For the Grand Lodge of Maine, the year saw a continued adherence to a well-crafted budget created by the Grand Lodge Finance Committee and related parties. The Finance Committee receives a monthly financial package with some commentary highlighting items of note for their review. The Finance Committee Chair and/or its members often have questions or points of clarification to ensure that the transactions processed are accurately understood and reflected.

Charitable Foundation Budget: The Foundation Finance Committee has seen a great improvement in the number and dollar value of matching grants offered by the Foundation. Recently, the Trustees have approved grant matches in the amount of \$2 for every \$1 raised up to the first \$500 raised. This applies to the Bikes for Books grant, Project Graduation grant, Youth Activities grant, and Community Betterment grant. These budget line items are continually challenged due to the popularity of these programs. Masonic relief has also been used more than in past years. The Trustees and Finance Committee remain committed to supporting this line item due to its commitment to assisting a worthy brother in need. While the Foundation's investment assets are substantial and produce much of the Foundation's operating income, IRS regulations pertaining to the fund raising requirements are equally substantial. With the overwhelming success of the Library Expansion project undertaken by R.W. Mark Rustin, the Foundation met its fund raising goal for the 2015-2016 fiscal year.

200th Anniversary: Preparations have begun in anticipation of the 200th anniversary of the Grand Lodge of Maine. Challenge coins have been purchased and are currently being sold to raise funds for plans being made for the 200th. These funds

are held separately for accounting purposes for future spending for the 200th celebration with more fund raising to come.

Insurance: We continue to push through the difficulties involved in working with the insurance agency and administering our side of the insurance program and accurately reflecting the insurance activity relating to blue lodges, the Grand Lodge, Charitable Foundation, and the Holden LLC.

Investments: The 2015 calendar year was shown to have some periodic notable volatility, but in the end, returns were relatively flat. The Grand Lodge and Charitable Foundation investment funds managed by HM Payson have continually been managed with the utmost care and skill. Investment committees for both entities have been continually pleased with the investment policies and performance relative to the major markets.

Maine Masonic College and Holden LLC: This year, the Grand Treasurer undertook responsibility for regular accounting for the Maine Masonic College and the Holden Masonic Associates, LLC. This consolidation will help to bring consistency to the regular accounting of each organization and help to make the audit process smoother.

Audit: Both the Grand Lodge of Maine and the Maine Masonic Charitable Foundation were audited by the accounting firm MacPage located in South Portland. Both organizations received a favorable audit result and highlighted suggestions have been considered by the Grand Treasurer and related Finance Committees.

To the Grand Lodge of Maine:

Your Grand Office has continued to provide service to the Lodges and Brethren of the Craft during the last Masonic year. While doing so, we have improved our operational protocols and implemented efficiencies to provide more value added to the Craft. We have reviewed and updated many of the forms and publications of the Grand Lodge to make them more user friendly. As part of that process we worked to make the changes as transparent as possible thus improving service to you while at the same time not causing any undue burden on the users of our services.

The vital records digitization and storage is complete. They are stored in several electronic locations thus insuring, if a catastrophe should strike destroying the paper records, the data contained therein will never be lost. The completed project was accomplished at a cost that came in \$20,000.00 under budget. The resulting electronic genealogy available on the Grand Lodge website has been well used and most appreciated by those seeking out past relatives who were part of the Craft.

The process of placing barcodes on the dues cards is complete. Registration for and reporting on the Annual Communication this year should be far more efficient and accurate thus allowing the Credentials Committee to function more effectively. As with any "new" technology, we will learn of its effectiveness together at the Annual Communication.

The servers at the Office have been replaced. The originals, gifts of outdated technology when we moved, have surpassed their effective life and were taken down before they left us in the lurch. The new system which has four terabytes of capacity with redundancy in the server, the backup (in a fire proof location) and a cloud based failsafe is larger, faster, and more adaptable should meet our needs into the foreseeable future.

We are currently researching an electronic voting system for the Annual Communication. If appropriate, this system could save significant time and effort is casting ballots. We are eyeing a possible test run at the 198th Session.

This Office is keenly aware of its role in the Grand Lodge – service. We look forward to fulfilling that role as effectively and efficiently as possible.

Moving forward, this coming year we even hope to institute a story hour program during the summer. Coupled with the expanding Bikes for Books program being sponsored in the area by Seminary Hill Daylight Lodge #220, we're hoping to make literacy truly accessible for all.

We've added many new books relating to Masonry which, with the burgeoning of self-publishing outlets are now more abundant. Brethren are reminded that ANYONE can borrow books from the Grand Lodge Library. We have our catalog online so you can access it from anywhere at any time. Call or email for what you'd like and it'll be on its way to you promptly. We ask only that you pay any return postage. Also, if you're looking for something to read either for pure pleasure or to 'drill down' on some particular aspect of the Craft that interests you, give a shout. It's been a joy to see new Masons, in one case, a Brother initiated the previous evening, stop by to see what's available and to begin their 'daily advancement of Masonic knowledge' at the very start of their Masonic journey. It's never too late (or early) to begin!

Each day, there are new advances in accessibility and archiving, through software and physical technology. Your Grand Lodge Library, through professional organizational membership and extensive reading, is staying abreast of these advances and will try to utilize them to the benefit of our members, your families and your communities. As 'a rising tide floats all boats', we seek to empower you!

GRAND LODGE MUSEUM

At the last Annual Communication, the adoption of the Maine Masonic Code occurred. It contained a change which moved the position of Curator for the Museum from the Grand Secretary to the Grand Librarian. The job of Museum Curator is one which, under a succession of Grand Secretaries, was well down on the list of important tasks to be accomplished. As a result, for nearly all of its century-long existence, it was more a collection of trinkets, pushed aside into little corners and ignored. With the move of the Grand Lodge Administrative offices to Holden, there arose the opportunity to display some of this material and an attempt has been made to catalog what is available. This is an ongoing process and far from perfect. During the past year, the emphasis of the (volunteer) Grand Librarian has been on the Library expansion but as 2016 moves forward, design of an engaging display with meaningful labeling, telling the story of Freemasonry with an emphasis on Freemasonry in Maine is an important goal.

It's a massive project and additionally will require a policy and procedure manual for donation and curation guidance. This is not something that we can or should ignore: our history is worth remembering and it is through the preservation of our artifacts that we do this. Sharing our past can make others aware of not only our rich heritage but our bright future.

MOVING FORWARD

Although we were fortunate to have a couple of very committed volunteers to assist in the beginning, the scythe of time worked its destruction during this past year. Brother William Connell passing his 90th birthday was recognized as an Honorary Assistant Grand Librarian at the November dedication ceremony but due to health issues, is no longer able to contribute as he so vigorously did for nearly two years. We also lost Brother Jonathan Canfield far too early in his life. He had undertaken an important project of preserving digital proceedings from other jurisdictions and was so enthusiastic about it. He is sorely missed. Both of these Brothers deserve special mention for their many hours of volunteer service to our Grand Lodge.

As we begin a new Masonic year, there are many, many tasks on the 'To Do' list. They'll be prioritized in a way which will hopefully benefit all in the most positive ways possible.

Thank you, Brethren, for your support and encouragement. My strongest wish is that I could devote far more hours to these tasks. Serving you in this way is a gift you've given me that I never realized I'd appreciate SO very much. Thank you. Thank you!!!

Report of the Webmaster

Being a Grand Lodge Webmaster is a unique challenge. No matter what's done or how, some are enthusiastic while others are less so. Beyond that, our website is designed not only for members but to encourage those who might be interested or just 'passing through' to stop and consider the possibility of becoming a member of our great fraternity. It can't be all one way or the other – but it's hard trying to appeal to such a diverse audience.

That having been said, after several years of a simple, basic design we've put on a new 'face' at mainemason.org. Although some would have preferred no change whatsoever, trying a makeover seemed to be appropriate, if for no other reason than to cause a second look. Generally feedback has been positive but there has been some negativity as well. I'm afraid we'll never be able to fully and completely please our 18,000 members along with those we can't count who're coming to 'check us out'.

We've created a single 'forms' page which lists every Grand Lodge form or document we've got – and lists them in multiple ways. Not only is the membership application listed under "Application" but also under its former designation as "Form 13" and also "Petition for Membership". Hopefully this redundancy will make it easier if you don't happen to think of the 'right' word – as sometimes happens to us all! Give a shout if find something that should be listed in some fashion that we haven't considered.

And a few words about social media. Nowadays, it's SO easy to use social media anywhere/anytime to express our opinions, particularly about 'hot-button' issues involving politics and religion, subjects that are taboo within the sanctity of our lodges. Often it's done without thinking about how many others will read what's been written – or the fact that these comments, cartoons, etc. will be there for decades and more, attached to our name. They can, perhaps, even ruin our chances of being selected for some position at work, in our community or even in Freemasonry. You simply don't know where you'll be in the future, whether you're 55 or 25.... Once your good name is squandered, it's difficult to regain.

In addition, it's like the old saying, "YOU are someone's impression of Masonry!" Sure, it's your life. No, nobody's trying to run it for you. But think, Brother: when you became a Mason, didn't you promise to practice TEMPERANCE? Did you not promise to subdue your PASSIONS? Didn't you agree to take the moral high ground? Please, please: don't give in to those baser instincts. I can't think of a single Brother who would dress in rags (with Masonic patches), get raging drunk, and scream profanities in the downtown square — and yet, that's essentially what a few Masons are doing regularly online. Racism, homophobia, hatred, and viciousness: these are not Masonic virtues and you shame us all when you behave that way. A Grand Master in a neighboring jurisdiction several years ago witnessed a man

driving down the road drunk, making obscene gestures to everyone he passed. There was a big Masonic decal on the back of the car. That Grand Master noted the impression this must have made on everyone who saw it and he wished he'd recognized the perpetrator so that he could have taken action. Nowadays, social media can expand recognition of 'bad behavior' (or 'socially inappropriate' behavior) to tens or hundreds of times the number of people who saw that drunk — and moreover, you can be personally identified. Young men in DeMolay are taught in their ritual to think twice before speaking once. (Their raps at the door are ** * as a reminder of that!) It's a very good lesson which all of us can benefit from. Don't just react. Don't go for the one-upmanship award. Think about what you're doing.

We all make mistakes or errors in judgement. Please, remember, though, that identification of your behavior will reflect on ALL of Masonry. We will – all of us - be painted with the same brush, be it good or bad. Thank you for doing your part to keep social media venues square and upright – and protecting MY reputation as a Mason!!!

On a related note, many lodges now are moving to Facebook and abandoning or ignoring websites despite the fact that younger folks are using it far less. What you set up can determine how things work out there. There's a difference between Pages and Groups, for example, and once you get going, it's darn difficult to change. Despite my highly advanced age and senility {stop nodding in agreement!}, I can help. And don't forget the standing offer that you can add the Grand Lodge Webmaster as a page Administrator on any social media or website so that you've got a backup in the event the person now in charge is suddenly missing in action. Let me know when you're doing it so I can be sure I've got all the info (logins, passwords, etc.).

Finally, if there are things you think can/should be done relative to the Grand Lodge websites or if you need some direction/help/guidance of any kind related to 'matters online', don't hesitate to reach out. Helping my Brothers is a truly rewarding experience.



Born Haverhill, Massachusetts March 21, 1920 Departed this life Scarborough, Maine May 11, 2015 MW Snelling was raised to the sublime degree of a Master Mason on April 10, 1944 at Aberdeen Lodge #187 in Aberdeen, MD. He affiliated with Deering Lodge #183 in Portland, ME later to dimit and become a Charter Member of Gov. William King Lodge #219 in Scarborough, ME where he served as Master from 1964 to 1965. He served the Grand Lodge of Maine as District Deputy Grand Master for the 17th Masonic District from 1974 to 1976; Grand Junior Warden from 1969 to 1970; Deputy Grand Master from 1976 to 1978; and Grand Master from 1978 to 1980.

The Grand Lodge of Maine awarded MW Snelling the Simon Greenleaf Medal in 1969, the Josiah Hayden Drummond Distinguished Service Medal in 1980, and the 50 Year Service Medal in 1996.

MW Snelling was also a member of the York Rite Bodies, a 33rd degree member of the Northern Jurisdiction of the Scottish Rite, a member of KORA Temple, and a member of the Order of the Eastern Star.

MW Snelling is survived by his wife, Rosemary (Hawley) Snelling. They were married in 1945.

Royal and Select Masters

Add 1000 to the Common Era. Thus 2012 and 1000=3012.

Knights Templar

From the Christian Era take 1118. Thus 1118 from 2012=894.

Order of High Priesthood

To the Christian Era add 1913, the Year of the Blessing. Thus: 2012 and 1913=3925.

Masonic Calendar

Ancient Craft Masons commence this era with the creation of the world, calling it Anno Lucis (A.D.), "in the year of light."

Scottish Rite, same as Ancient Craft, except the Jewish chronology is used, **Anno Mundi (A.M.)**, "in the year of the world."

Royal Arch Masons date from the year the second temple was commenced by Zerubbabel, **Anno Inventionis (A.I.)**, "in the year of the discovery."
