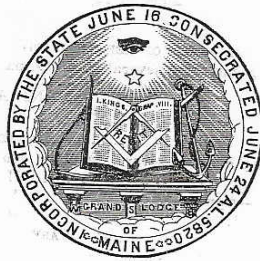

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Craft Banquet Friday Evening

Grand Master Mark Rustin invited the RW Asst. Grand Chaplain, Bro. Neal Haines to say a few words about our Brethren lost during the during the past year.

Good evening Ladies and Gentlemen, friends and Brethren, one and all.

I am Assistant Grand Chaplain RW Br. Neal R. Haines. I hail from Caribou Lodge #170, from way up there in Aroostook County, and yes there was still snow on my lawn when I left home this morning.

With his apologies, the Grand Chaplain, Br David D. Walz, is not able to be here this evening.

In his absence, MW Rustin asked me if I would give a brief "Committee of Memorials" report, and to recognize our Brethren who have passed to the Celestial Lodge above since our last annual communication.

Just to reiterate MW's request was for me to be brief and so it will be.

It is with a profound sadness that since our last annual communication the Committee on Memorials reports to you this evening that 493 members of the constituent lodges of this Grand Jurisdiction have passed to the Celestial Lodge above where the Supreme Architect of the Universe presides.

I have been informed, that none of the 493 members were permanent members of the Grand Lodge of Maine. If you recall, at our last annual communication we reported the loss of three Past Grand Masters: MW Harland Hitchings, MW Gerald Leighton, and MW Robert Damon.

As we remember those Brethren who have passed before us, I would ask each of you and our Lodges to remember also the families of those who have passed. We can no longer assist a departed Brother: God is taking care of him. But we can offer help his widow, his family, and even his Lodge support and encouragement.

Annual Address of the Grand Master

Good Morning Brothers. It is truly good to be back with all of us here today to reaffirm friendships that we have known in the past and also to build new friendships beginning this day.

I need to start today by thanking some people. As most of you are aware, this time last year, and on for about 4.5 or 5 months after that, my health was less than what one could have hoped for. I had to rely upon, we had to rely upon, the fine group of elected officers and appointed officers that are part of this Grand Lodge to fulfill some of the duties so necessary for a Grand Lodge of confer. I thank RW Bro. Deputy Grand Master Rich Nadeau, RW Bro. Senior Grand Warden Kevin Campbell, RW Bro. Junior Grand Warden Richard Holman, RW Bro. Grand Secretary Dan Bartlett and RW Bro. Grand Treasurer Scott Whytock for their able assistance in a time when I really needed it. The works of the Grand Lodge never was wanting to be completed when I wasn't around. I also need to thank all of you. To the vast number of you who sent messages, mailed cards, individually or as lodges or called and checked on me and lifted prayers on my behalf. I am certain that I am here today partially in response to your efforts and the Brotherly love that you extended to me. I am truly and eternally grateful in more ways than I can say for the outpouring of Brotherly love that you extended to me during that period. I thank you all very much.

Since I took upon myself the oath and obligation to serve you as Grand Master of Masons in Maine, I have drawn upon a philosophical compass of understanding that I believe has been at the very core of this Fraternity from its operative beginnings, through our speculative enlightenment, and empowers us yet day. My actions have been conformed to this consistent philosophical understanding so that in doing the work that I have set out to do those actions would be consistent and show a continuity throughout the time I serve you. This philosophy informs us of the tenants of our profession. And the eternal truth contained in our teachings. These items, bound together by the spirit of the Brotherhood, the Brotherhood of men with whom we share an obligation of seeking to become better men each day. To become fully developed human beings. That isn't genius that is the core of what it means to be a Freemason. It is the core of our entire fraternity. We are in our best days and at our best time on a quest, on a quest to learn the extent of the claim that our tenants lay upon us. To understand what Brotherhood relief and truth truly mean. In the broader philosophical sense, and in the sense of the view of the Grand architect of the Universe. We are on a quest to build the bonds of Brotherhood that can withstand the winds of upheaval, time and change. Where's that Brotherhood that allows us to be friends with people, to be close Brothers with people who would of otherwise stood at a perpetual distance from us. We are on a quest to grow as men and reveal that

growth to the communities in which we live. Because we have been called through our Fraternity, its Tenants, and its teachings to be exemplars of true manhood in the world around us. To show an example of what it means to be a man in our communities so others may too respond and build up our communities day by day. We bind ourselves to this quest that the horizon we see each day beckons us forward toward greater growth as men. The day that we decide that we have grown enough is the day that we begin to regress to a place we don't want to be. To increase the awareness of all or to encourage others to bond with us in our endeavors. For we learn that those teachings and those Tenants and that Brotherly love requires us to recognize that all people, all people have a claim on our good offices. To bind ourselves together in our quest to be vibrant builders of men, builders of communities as we go forward such in my view is our place in the world.

The District meetings that we had last year, were held in a tyled format. This was done to allow for uninhibited conversation among the Brothers attending. In almost all cases the results were gratifying. They revealed much about our Fraternity, it's Lodges, and about the strength revealed in our Lodges. We learned the depth and strength in all of our Lodges to their commitment and their purposes of Freemasonry as they saw it played out in their communities. During those meetings we saw revealed innovated thinking and innovated programming across this state that have help some Lodges who have done that work to become more vibrant and more purposeful in their work. It revealed the need to reinforce the symbiotic relationships between the Lodges and the Grand Lodge. If you take a cursory reading of our Constitution, you recognize very quickly that the Lodges and the Grand Lodges are part of a greater whole. There are symbiotic relationships. They provide sustenance and care and future and purpose to one another. Without the other they will wither and die. Without that relationship our Fraternity has no future. They revealed the need for member retention and increased the attendance in lodges and in some cases membership growth. You have seen the results over time a survey that Scottish Rite Freemasonry did. Across the country a random sampling of people gaged their understanding of what it is to be a Mason or what even what a Mason is. The results were sort of disheartening. Eighty percent of the people thought they knew what a Mason was but when pressured for an answer, precious few could go further with the answer they gave to begin with. Only thirty percent of that eighty percent had some cognitive idea of what our Fraternity is all about and what it means to be a Mason. The Scottish Rite took that survey and set up the path forward designed to help them increase membership within Scottish Rite. I want to suggest to you today that a fair reading of that survey, and I want you to know that I read it a couple of times, also offers to another understanding that needs to be paired with the path forward. That understanding that we need to do whatever we can do within the Tenants of our Fraternity to build awareness in the general population about what it means to be a Mason. To do all the things that are possible for us to do to allow our communities, our population at large to rediscover what they knew fifty years ago. What was going on in that dark Lodge hall once a month. Not so many know that anymore. That's on us. We have the tools and we have the possibilities to make a difference in that. I

firmly believe that if we pursue the track of awareness in our communities and across our state, that the retention of the members that we already have will increase and new members will follow that awareness. It's hard to encourage someone to join an organization about which they don't even know that it exists. We have as a Brotherhood, as a Fraternity, tools at hand. We have ourselves, we have one another, we have our Lodges, we have the tools and the resources available at Grand Lodge and the Masonic Charitable Foundation to make a big effort out there to increase the awareness of Freemasonry in our state. This administration has used available to it on that quest to allow a man to find full manhood.

The Masonic Educational and Lodge Services Association this group of volunteers are bound together along with the DER's to provide Masonic education has been busy this year. They have been updating and equipping the DER's with educational material available to the lodges through the DERs at meetings. Encouraging awareness by placing "Seasons Greetings" in newspapers around the state sponsored, you guessed it, US. They sponsored Maine Mason Day at the Seadogs last summer where 359 Masons and their families gathered to watch a ball game, eat popcorn and hot dogs and just have a good time in Brotherhood and fellowship. Everybody in that ball park knew we were there. They have sponsored special programming on Maine Public Broadcasting. To allow the knowledge of Freemasonry and our involvement in the community to be known across the breath of this state. MPBM is the only broadcasting network state wide in our state. When we sponsor broadcasting there, we increase the awareness of who we are. They are also sponsoring a social media support for Freemasonry. They provided a daylong seminar on best practices open to all lodges that was well received down in Waterville. The key to that was bringing together knowledgeable instructors not only from the Grand Lodge ranks but from the lodges that are showing great work and great futures in their lives. Also providing reimbursement for the Lodges who use the Fellowship night programs that they choose to run so the cost of the meal for their candidates and their wives can be defrayed by the Meals committee and assist our lodges.

Our Maine Masonic Charitable Foundation has continued to work to increase Relief and assistance to the Fraternity. We had a sad happening this year with the Foundation. Our first part-time executive director Amanda Larson, left us, not because she didn't like us, but she went and got married and moved to Rhode Island. However, when things are going your way in Rhode Island and smiling upon you, good things happen. We managed to interview a number of people and found a woman named Susan Scacchi with a broad basis of experience in all of the kinds of work that our foundation needs. So, we have hired Susan to be our first full time Executive Director of the Foundation. I look forward to working with her. She already has her feet on the ground and churning to get our work accomplished and get our name out there and to seek support and to offer support on our behalf in appropriate ways. We have at the end of the fiscal year; we have a market value of \$19,503,899.00. We changed two years ago how we invested those funds. We set it up under total return investing so we can invest in stocks that have potential not only dividends and interest but in growth as well. We have seen our value move steadily

upward. The board has taken the last five years of market value average those out and call it the rolling average and committed itself to spending less than 5% of that market value each year. In so doing we invest more into the future than we spend each year and yet we spend more each year spreading it out into the Lodges and the community. If you look at this list of grants that I'll help translate for you, for relief, brotherhood, bikes for books, community betterment, project graduation and youth activities, the foundation wrote the Lodges checks or individual checks totaling \$319,146.00. Now take the matching grants and add into those matching grant totals that the foundation sent you the seed money that you put in and you come up with a total of \$421,137.00 that the Lodges have put into the lives of their communities and into the hands of the Brothers who have been hurting and into the families of Brothers who truly need assistance. When you add into that \$421,137.00 the support we put into the two dyslexia programs, the Masonic youth groups, Maine Public Broadcasting to help with the state wide emergency broadcast network, NAMI, the youth and adolescent suicide assistance program, the Multiple Sclerosis Society, disaster relief that has been sent directly on your behalf by the foundation, the summer reading program and the Boy Scouts of America our impact on the state of Maine goes from \$421,137.00 to \$523,127.00. Collectively, you have done well! I look forward to the new horizons of service which will open to us going forward with the new Director of our Foundation increasing the awareness of the vital presence of Freemasonry in our State and to do the things we should be doing in the lives of the people of this state.

The need to impose discipline is the most disquieting of the Grand Master's duties, as far as I'm concerned. The idealist in me wants to believe that men who have affirmed our obligations should not be found wanting when it comes to proper Masonic conduct. The realist in me recognizes that the members of our Fraternity are drawn from the world at large and will, on occasion, act in an un-masonic manner that cannot be ignored.

I have initiated several disciplinary actions this year. They will be reported upon later in this Grand Session by the Commissioner of Trials, the Committee on Grievances and Appeals, and the Grand Secretary. Though troublesome, discipline is a necessary part of maintaining the ethical and moral rectitude of the Craft. The actions I took were based on fairness, firmness and consistency.

The integrity of the work we do is based upon voluntary compliance with our Tenants and teachings. When Brothers fail to comply, appropriate discipline is necessary to ensure the proper functioning of the Craft is not impeded. The actions of one person cannot be allowed to bring disgrace upon us all—thus defeating our common purpose.

Conversely, the actions of the vast majority of Masons in this state are laudatory. I have had the privilege to meet and work with giants among men—no not just the tall ones. To interact with and lead men of such vision and purpose reaffirms my belief in the purpose of Freemasonry daily. Later in the Grand Session I will introduce

several such men to you as they receive specific awards. I encourage you to join with me in affirming the work they do on behalf of the people of the world.

So where do we go from here... Did you hear the story about Jesus and Moses went out in the morning to play some golf? So, Moses gets out there at a 450-yard par 4 and Moses gets out there and smacks a drive about 375 yards right down the center of the fairway and he's feeling good and he's smiling. Jesus gets up and gives it the ole wind up, swings and smacks the ball and it heads down the fairway and then starts to hook to the right. Just about the time it goes into the tree line you hear this whack...the balls comes back and sails across the fairway still going down the fairway and hits a rock on the right hand side of the fairway bounces back into the fairway and rolls up within a couple of inches in front of the green 450 yards away. An eagle swoops down grabs the ball and flies up over the green, drops the ball and it falls just a couple inches from the cup and a squirrel scurries on the green grabs the ball and drops it in the hole. "Hole in one" Jesus says, and Moses looked at him and said, "Are we here to play golf or are you just going to screw around?"

What are we here to do Brethren? Are we here to play golf? If any of you have got the pull it takes to make all those extra happenings happen in Freemasonry, please see me after I'm done talking because I'm going to enlist you. In the meantime, we need to understand that the work we are about is serious and the work we are about is as different today as it was 20 years ago or 40 years ago or 100 years ago. Think about it in the written records of our Fraternity, you don't have to strain yourself to get there. We have gone from a group of operative builders who set aside their old building regimens of rounded arches and thick stone walls under the belief that the Supreme Architect of the Universe offered them this new vision of Architecture. They set about to build Cathedrals the likes of which the world has never seen before. Freemasonry grew in respect and importance. As the building boom in Europe tailed off the Lodges allowed speculative Masons to join. Wouldn't you have liked to vote in the first lodge that elected a speculative Mason into this Fraternity? I sure would have. But because they made that choice, because they exercised the courage to say that Freemasonry is more than physically piling stones, one upon the other that its more about using those same tools in a speculative way to improve the lives of individual men and the lives of the world that we see. To build men the likes of what we have never seen before. When Freemasonry came to these shores our Brother, Deputy Grand Master from Massachusetts knows all about that. When Freemasonry came to these shores it lived under the thumb of the Aristocracy of England. But we had this thing called the Revolution and we had some giant Masons. George Washington, Benjamin Franklin and others who saw that it was far from an organization to be controlled by the Aristocracy but rather was an organization that could inform and help build a brand-new place in the world. A city on a hill that others could gain light from and grow. Over time in each manifestation we have seen Masons redefine what we do in practical matters without changing our Tenants or our teachings. We have seen men demonstrate the moral and the ethical courage to place tenants and teachings above order, above tradition, above as I'm known to say in the church world, we never did it that way before. We are here today

as heirs of those men. Those men who at critical junctures have been willing to reassess and to review and when found wanting to make changes in order to further lift up and honed the skills of being a Mason. For you lodges when we leave this meeting here today, we will be living in the 200th year of Freemasonry in Maine. My wife says that there are times when you ought to do things, when it's spring cleaning time stay away cause it's going to get done one way or another. And don't ever come in the house with the lights off because you will trip over something, I guarantee it. For us it seems to me is an ideal opportunity within our Lodges to do our spring cleaning, our 200th year cleaning. To wrestle with and come to recognize the difference between our Tenants and our teachings and the things we have always done. To recognize the things that we do simply out of rote because at some place 50 or 100 years ago it made sense and it was comfortable. We had never taken the time to think it through or change it. To present to the new Brothers who come into our craft a vision of Freemasonry that recognizes who they are. Recognizes their gifts and their abilities and offers them the opportunity to get involved and to be part of this Brotherhood. Because as I said earlier you can have all of the Tenants and all of the teachings, if you don't have the relationships it doesn't matter. It's all for not. Go to the library at the University of Maine and there are hundreds of volumes filled with words, but they don't become knowledge and wisdom until somebody reads them, thinks about them and makes them whole and makes them part of who we are. I am going to finish with a short story only because I know the Deputy Grand Master wants to hear it. Michelangelo painted the ceiling of the Sistine Chapel and he did so, I knew you'd like it Rich, and he did so on a tall staging and he laid on his back because there wasn't much room between the staging and the ceiling and Michelangelo was up there painting away and he got a cramp in his finger and the brush fell off the staging and onto the floor and he looked down there and said "I'll be damned". So, he climbed down off the staging, got the brush and about the time he's going to start back up a nun came out of the side of the Sistine Chapel in a dark area and she gave him the business. "What are you doing talking like that in the mist of the Sistine Chapel, this holy place.? Where is your faith Michelangelo?" "Yeah, Yeah, yeah whatever" he said. Back up he goes. He's painting along and he moves the wrong way and the brush falls again. Looks down over the edge, and you got it, "I'll be damned". Climbs down gets the brush and the same nun comes out of the shadows one more time and blisters him. "Where is your faith Michelangelo, what are you doing?" "Yeah, yeah" he says and climbs back up. He is doing the cuticle on GOD's finger you know right in the center of the ceiling and that little one hair brush slipped over the edge. He pulled himself over and he looked all around to see if the nun was around cause he's about to let fly one more time and he thought about what she said and he propped himself up on his elbow at the edge and pointed down at that brush and he wiggled his finger and he prayed to GOD to bring that brush back up to his hand. Slowly the brush began to move, and it began to levitate, and it came up and landed in his hand. Now out of the darkness of the Sistine Chapel the little nun says, "Well I'll be damned!"

My Brothers, do we have the courage to take the value of what we know as Freemasonry and exercise that same faith in the supreme guidance of the Supreme Architect of the Universe to set aside the things that hold us back and develop new things that we could use to move forward and pass on to other generations? Do we have the courage and the willingness to say to the people of this state: Look at us! Here we are! We're Masons and were proud of it! This is what we do and wait for them to come and join us. Do we have the courage in our Lodges month in and month out to do the work that it takes to keep our Lodges running effectively and make sure we reach out to the Brothers who no longer come to lodge who joined and suddenly slipped away into that quiet oblivion? Do we have the courage and the faith to reach out to them and find out why? To find out if it's just because it just sort of slipped away and nobody reminded them or, are we willing to hear that going to a lodge meeting is dead, dull and I'm not going. Are we willing to do something about the response regardless of what we hear? Are we willing to work as lodges and individuals in our community to be exemplars of what it means to be a Mason? What it means to be a man in quest of complete manhood. To be a man working each day to become a better man. My Brothers for the next year I invite you to join me on that quest. That quest to reach out and to make everyone in this state aware of what it means to be a Mason and the principals that we stand for and the good works that we do. Not because we have to but because doing so makes us better men each day. I thank you all for your attention this morning. I thank you all for the opportunity to serve and I look forward to working with you to make Freemasonry in the future what it has been in the past. A vital place where the people of the world can look to find better men to guide them in better directions to build better communities. Communities of safe havens of peace and prosperity for everyone who lives there. I thank you.

The Deputy Grand Master calls for the Report of Masonic Jurisprudence

The duty of the Committee on Masonic Jurisprudence is to review the directives, dispensations and decisions of the Most Worshipful Grand Master, determine if they are in compliance with our Constitution, Standing Regulations and Digest of Decisions and recommend to the Craft at the Annual Communication whether or not they should be ratified.

DISPENSATIONS

The Committee on Masonic Jurisprudence reviewed 49 Dispensations which were approved by the Grand Master. There were 34 for the consumption of alcohol on Lodge premises, 6 for a change of venue for meetings, 1 to confer Degrees in a shortened time period for a member in the Armed Forces on Active Duty, 3 for outdoor degrees and 5 for wearing regalia in parades and other Masonic events.

All were deemed proper and within the prerogative of the Grand Master to grant and we unanimously recommend their approval.

There were no decisions or other matters presented to the Committee for review.

The Committee on Masonic Jurisprudence moves the acceptance of this Report and the adoption of the recommendations contained therein.

Report of the Committee on Amendments to the Constitution

The Committee on Amendments to the Constitution shall have referred to it all proposed amendments to the Constitutions and Standing Regulations entertained by Grand Lodge.

Today, there are six proposals that were presented before Grand Lodge last year and voted to be held over until now for your consideration for either acceptance or rejection by your vote.

#1

SEC. 74.5 now reads: Each Lodge shall remit its share of the cost of the Grand Lodge Blanket Liability Insurance, which covers members while engaging in Masonic activities.

As proposed, SEC. 74.5 would read: Grand Lodge shall arrange for blanket liability coverage for all Masonic Lodges and buildings owned by Masonic-based building associations and related organizations. Each Lodge and building association shall remit the cost of insurance on its members and properties.

I will entertain a motion to remove this proposed amendment from the table.

Motion made and seconded. Motion carried.

I will now entertain a motion to accept this proposal to amend SEC. 74.5.

Motion made and seconded. Motion carried.

#2

Proposed SEC. 74.5a would replace Standing Resolution 19, and would read: SEC. 74.5a: In addition to the coverage afforded by the Grand Lodge blanket liability insurance for Lodges and Masonic building associations, each Lodge or building association shall obtain documentation of suitable liability coverage, including liquor liability coverage, if applicable, from parties leasing or renting Masonic premises, with the Lodge, building association and Grand Lodge named as additional insureds.

The proposed change in SEC. 74.5 and the new SEC. 74.5a will result in bringing all insurance related items together in our Constitution and will codify the Insurance Directive of 2016 with which Maine Lodges and building associations are now in conformance. It also clarifies the need for third party insurance for parties that lease or rent Masonic-based facilities.

I will entertain a motion to remove this proposed amendment from the table.

#3

SEC. 2.1 Officers and Members of Grand Lodge. This section includes all elected and appointed officers. It also includes a list of “Other Members” which now includes Very Worshipful – District Education Representatives; Worshipful – Masters of the several chartered constituent Lodges; Brother – Wardens of the several chartered constituent Lodges. To this list would be added by this amendment: Brother – Members of the Committee of Finance.

I will entertain a motion to remove this proposed amendment from the table.

Motion made and seconded. Motion carried.

I will now entertain a motion to accept this proposal to amend SEC. 2.1.

Motion made and seconded. Motion carried.

#4

As proposed, it will be additional language to SEC. 36.6 *On Amendments to the Constitution*, and would read as follows:

“It shall be the Committee’s duty to:

1. Examine all proposed amendments to the Constitution and Standing Regulations in an impartial manner, without regard to opinion as to their bearing or merit. (This does not preclude a member from speaking, apart from the committee and report, on any amendment in his own right as a voting member).
2. Examine all proposed amendments to ensure that they do not conflict with any other portion of the Masonic Code.
3. Ensure that any proposed amendment is clear and concise, without any ambiguous wording that would knowingly render the amendment itself, or any existing provisions of our Masonic Code, open to differing opinions.
4. Determine if the Constitutional amendment being offered addresses the correct section and/or subsection.
5. Stand ready to assist any brother in drafting new legislation.”

I will entertain a motion to remove this proposed amendment from the table.

Motion made and seconded. Motion carried.

I will now entertain a motion to accept this proposal to amend SEC. 36.6.

Motion made and seconded. Motion carried.

#5

Proposed amendment to SEC. 35 which would strike SEC. 35.5 from our Constitution.

35.5 Committee members, who are not otherwise voting members of Grand Lodge, shall have the same status as other officers of Grand Lodge, while serving on the committee.

I will entertain a motion to remove this proposed amendment from the table.

Motion made and seconded. Motion carried.

I will now entertain a motion to accept this proposal to strike SEC. 35.5.

Motion made and seconded. Motion carried.

#6

Amend that portion of SEC. 7.1 which currently sets the hour for annual Grand Lodge elections at 3:00 PM. Most Worshipful Grand Master Rustin's proposal would change the voting hour for future Grand Lodge elections to 1:00 PM.

By virtue of this proposal, SEC. 7.1 would read: The Grand Master, Deputy Grand Master, Grand Wardens, Grand Treasurer and Grand Secretary, shall be chosen by ballot at the Annual Communication; as shall vacancies incurring or occurring on the Committee of Finance; and Board of Trustees of the Masonic Charitable Foundation. Ballots shall be printed, or electronic voting opportunities prepared, by the Grand Lodge for all who have made their candidacy for the above positions known in writing to the Grand Secretary before the election but not later than March 15th. The election shall commence at 1:00 PM, and a majority of the votes collected shall be necessary for a choice. If a majority is not obtained for any office, a further ballot shall be collected as soon as convenient, the election taking priority over all other matters.

I will entertain a motion to remove this proposed amendment from the table.

Motion made and seconded. Motion carried.

I will now entertain a motion to accept this proposal to amend SEC. 7.1.

Motion was made and seconded. After discussion, motion made and seconded to amend the proposed time from 1:00pm to 2:00pm.

Amended motion for 2:00pm carried.

This concludes the portion of those amendments presented last year and tabled for your consideration this year.

There is one new proposed amendment presented by R.W. Brother David Walton for your consideration this year. If accepted by your vote, it will be tabled for one year when action will be decided by you at the next annual session of Grand Lodge. If you reject to table this proposal it dies today.

Brother Walton's proposed amendment deals with the subordinate Lodges. More specifically SEC. 111.

As it reads now SEC. 111 governs that: One Lodge cannot confer a degree at the request of another Lodge in this Grand Jurisdiction, unless the requesting Lodge waives jurisdiction and the other Lodge accepts the candidate in the usual manner and for its usual fee.

Proposed amendment to the constitution:

Sec. 111.2 This provision may be waived, by dispensation from the Grand Master, in cases of special need. When the dispensation is granted, the Master and at least two other officers of the requesting lodge must be present and participate in the degree.

Brother Walton reasons are that it is unfortunate that some Lodges are struggling to survive. I am proposing this change to help those Lodges. Our other Masonic bodies have been doing this for many years. The Shrine, Scottish Rite and York Rite have been helping other valleys do degrees. This is not meant to have someone else do all the work for a Lodge but to assist a Lodge when a candidate has been waiting too long to progress when he is ready or because the Lodge is struggling to get officers and members to attend. I do not see a difference if we do degrees this way or have guest officers fill stations. Our goal should be to give a candidate the best and most meaningful degree we can give them. It is hard to retain new members when a Lodge has fewer members in attendance than a more active Lodge. We as a fraternity should keep the larger goal in mind. We should remember that we are taking good men and helping them make themselves better. These are his words.

I will now invite a motion to either accept or reject this proposal.

The motion was made and seconded. After discussions, motion carried.

Report on the Condition of the Fraternity

Most Worshipful Grand Master, Brethren, all. The report on the condition of the Fraternity you must understand where this information comes from. This comes directly from the District Deputy Grand Master's reports. The don't deal in ritual and they don't deal with the other parts of the everyday workings of our lodges. Most of

this information comes from the inspection report forms. In Grand Lodge, Bangor Maine May 4th 2019.

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine, the committee on the condition of the Fraternity has examined the reports of the District Deputy Grand Masters of the several districts that comprise this Grand Lodge. We have studied these reports and attempted to sort the information and to conclude how is Masonry in Maine really doing. We find from these reports that the condition of the Fraternity in Maine is good. There are many positive things happening around the state and of course we are not without many problems. Some of these problems we have struggled with for many years. Most District Deputies reported that the ritual was performed in a satisfactory manner but also reported that many of the Lodges had very few if any candidates. Some Lodges for fortunate enough to have multiple candidates. It appears that most districts are very involved within their communities and that their work within those communities is making a positive impact on Freemasonry. This activity is bringing Masonry to the forefront and attracting new men to the craft. Although these activities within our communities is extremely important we caution Lodges that we are not just a service club and that we must not lose sight of what we are all about. Our basic Tenants are still the foundation stones of our craft. Our membership numbers should still be a major concern for all Lodges. Our numbers continue to decline and many of our Lodges are suffering the effects of declining membership. This suffrage has forced some Lodges to consolidate or consider returning their charters to Grand Lodge. This problem should be addressed with hard work to slow this membership decline. Grand Lodge has programs and Brethren standing ready to help. The fellowship nights program is still tremendously effective and Grand Lodge will help financially to hold these programs. Take advantage to what is available to you. From these reports it appears that some Lodges may not be holding the number of stated meetings mandated by the Constitution or the Lodge by-laws. We must remind the Lodges that if any stated meeting is called off for any reason, it must be made up unless the Lodge by-laws state otherwise. Lodges must hold at least 9 stated meetings per year. We also see that many Lodges state their attendance at 7 or 8 and one Lodge stated their attendance at 5. Although 3 Master Masons makes a Master Mason Lodge, business cannot be conducted without a quorum of 7. At the time of this printing of this report we find that there are still 4 District Deputy Grand Masters that have not filed reports to the Grand Lodge. This is unacceptable and unfortunate to the Lodges that have worked long and hard to present a favorable report to Grand Lodge. Although many, many Lodges are still struggling with few if any candidates others are exceeding our expectations. One that stands out is Arundel Lodge #76 in Kennebunkport. They held a total of 32 meetings last year with an average attendance of 25. Although the District Deputy Grand Master did not detail their activities, it is obvious that they are busy within as well as without their lodge. Another Lodge that deserves notice is Triangle Lodge #1 in Portland. They are extremely busy raising new candidates this past year. There is much excitement in Triangle Lodge and that draws good men to the Fraternity. Excitement breeds excitement. One more Lodge success story belongs to Paris

Lodge #81 in South Paris. They recently took on the task of completely remodeling their Lodge room and dining hall. This seemed to excite the members to new standards. Within a very short period of time, men were once again knocking at the door for admission. The enthusiasm in Paris Lodge seems to grow. There are many other Lodges that deserve recognition but unfortunately this report doesn't allow listing them all. To those Lodges we say Good Job!! Well Done!! Many Lodges throughout the state have large, very large to huge charity accounts. Some of these Lodges large charity accounts spent a considerable amount on charity within the Lodge of aid an ailing Brother or to support out-reach programs. Some Lodges with these large accounts show no expenditures from these accounts. These types of accounts when properly expended could reap huge benefits to the Lodge. There is much work to be done. Recommendations, we recommend that every district have some type of officer association. Districts that have active associations appear to show a strong and active district. We recommend that each district consider holding ritual Challenge. These are not to challenge each other but more to challenge ourselves and participate in good fellowship. The 16th District have been holding these for years and the attendance grows with time. Not only are these great time of fellowship, they attract men from other Lodges or districts and it's a good tool to honor a worthy Brother. We recommend that more detail be added to the District Deputy inspection report form to let the committee know what the lodges are doing. Let us spread the word on what is working and aid the Lodges with problems before these problems become too great to fix. I would add that if at all possible these reports be typed because it was very hard to read some of the handwriting. In closing let us say again that Freemasonry in Maine is good with many positives to talk about and some problems to fix. Be positive! Look to the future! Be the best that you can be. Hard work and dedication will reap you many benefits.

Report of the Committee on Fraternal Relations

In Grand Lodge, 04 May, 2019 (5019), Bangor, Maine.

Most Worshipful Grand Master and Brethren all,

This committee has reviewed three communications requesting recognition by the Grand Lodge of Maine.

The Grande Oriente de Minas Gerais is the Grand Lodge working in the state of Minas Gerais in Brazil. It was founded on September 12, 1944 by 6 lodges belonging to the national Grand Lodge called Grand Orient of Brazil and currently has 218 constituent lodges with 6061 Masons. They are a member of the Interamerican Masonic Confederation (CMI). The Commission on Information for Recognition during the Conference of Grand Masters of Masons in North America, held in Rapid City, SD in February 2019, determined that this Grand Orient practices regular Masonry and recognition would be appropriate.

The Gran Logia Simbolica del Paraguay requested recognition last year but was not considered at that time due to concerns regarding a schism that had developed several years earlier secondary to a problem with the sovereignty of this Grand Lodge. This appears to have been corrected to the satisfaction of the Commission on Information for Recognition. Over 40 Grand Lodges in the United States as well as the United Grand Lodge of England and others currently recognize this Grand Lodge which is listed in the current *List of Lodges---Masonic*.

The aforementioned Grand Lodges meet the standards for recognition and are in amity with numerous Grand Lodges around the world. Your Committee recommends that the Grand Lodge of Maine recognize these Grand Lodges in the pursuance of interjurisdictional Masonic unity and cooperation.

The Grand Lodge of Kosovo has requested mutual recognition, but there is insufficient information to make a determination and we therefore do not recommend taking any action at this time.

I move the acceptance of this report and the adoption of its recommendations.

Report of the Grand Historian

Section 75.3 of the Constitution states – Not later than March 1st annually, each lodge in the Jurisdiction shall prepare its history for the preceding year. Permanent copies of which shall be on file with the lodge and Grand Lodge; provided, however, that any lodge whose annual meeting falls in the month of February shall have until April 1st of each year to comply with the above requirements.

On May 2nd 2017 at the Annual Communication in Northport a proposed amendment to encourage lodges to prepare its history was soundly defeated. That being said, at this time only 55% of the lodges are in compliance with the constitution. Several of these lodges have compiled some very nice history reports. Some are bare bones and a handful went all out with outstanding reports that left no questions of the on-goings of their lodges. These histories will be able to be viewed 100 years from now and the future brethren will know and understand exactly what was going on in their lodge in 2018.

The question moving forward is what the Committee on History of Masonry in Maine can do to aid lodges in compiling their reports. Do we need to formulate some form of a template to assist lodge historians, at least to give a baseline for information? I do believe in having the histories be all the lodge wants to make of them and wouldn't want a template to discourage lodges from compiling a signature report unique to their interests. Please email us your thoughts and ideas to try to improve this so that we can preserve what we have done in our lodges and so future ages will know, understand and possibly learn from these events.

The Report of the Grand Lecturer

This report is divided into three areas that I would like to address. Number one would be the Schools of Instruction themselves. Number two the certification of degree teams and number three the goals I have set for myself and the Lecturing team in general.

We did not successfully complete the number of schools that we should have. There are several reasons for this but the biggest one was lack of being proactive in scheduling. Also there was the problem of communication between the AGL's and the DDGMs. There was at least one DDGM that did not respond to phone calls or emails and no schools were held in that district. Other districts waited until late in the year to schedule schools. There was also a hesitancy on the part of Lodge Masters to take on hosting a school. These are issues that as a team we need to discuss and make a better effort to schedule schools early and to educate our DDGMs that it is their responsibility to see that said scheduling is completed early in the Masonic year. That being said, the majority of schools were held and I received a great deal of positive feedback from participants. Attendance was varied throughout the jurisdiction and there is certainly much room for improvement of that statistic.

During the course of the year I was contacted by representatives of three different degree teams. I was fortunate to observe each of these teams confer the Master Mason Degree on worthy candidates. The teams I observed were the Kora Craftsmen, The Anah Temple Past Masters and The Low XII Riders of The Widow's Sons. Each performed exemplary degree work. Therefore, I certified each group.

I have set the following goals for the coming year. This past year has been a learning year for me and though I have truly enjoyed it, I finish the year with concern that I could have done much better. My first task will be to develop a job description for the Grand Lecturer and the Assistant Grand Lecturers. Each district is different but there are commonalities throughout that we should capitalize on. I also would like to see the development of a set of criteria for Ritual Lodge of the Year. This will be discussed by the team and will be part of an effort to improve communication between team members. It will also give us a chance to share problems and successes so we can improve how we are doing our job. The last thing is the opportunity to have a brief period at the training session for DDGMs and DERs. I believe it will help all of us to put names with faces and share the expectations we have of each other.

Masonic Education & Lodge Service Annual Report

Grand Lodge of Maine

May 4, 2019

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine:

The Masonic Education & Lodge Service (M.E.A.L.S.) Committee has been busy and this is what we have accomplished:

1. We began the 2018 Masonic year just prior to Grand Lodge by conducting an all-day training session for DER's at the Grand Lodge in Holden. Most DER's attended, all attendees received an updated DER Manual and were taught how to use it. They were also offered numerous handouts that were intended to give them ideas for the development of short Masonic Educational Programs that they could offer to their assigned lodges. The Grand Master informed us prior to the training that he had 6 IPADS and Projectors available for use by the DERs to present programs to their lodges. Brother Dave Higgins provided excellent training to the MEALS Committee with regard to how to use these IPADS and Projectors and six members of the MEALS Committee assumed custody for these systems. The six members of the MEALS Committee who assumed custody of these systems were expected to offer training to their assigned DER's. The Grand Master had hoped that if these 6 systems were fully utilized that he would have justification for the purchase of a set for each of the 24 districts to use. The Grand Master also directed the MEALS Committee to assign one of its members to mentor each DER. We tried valiantly all summer and well into the fall to get the IPAD Program up and operating but regretfully, we were not able to do so and our efforts to make the IPAD Program successful hindered our work in other areas. The Grand Master finally directed us to recall the IPADS to Grand Lodge but by that time, a few of the districts had finally started using the IPADS and requested that they be permitted to continue to use them. The Grand Master agreed and the rest were turned in to the office. There are currently no plans to purchase additional IPADS. This was a wonderful opportunity to advance the use of technology within this Masonic jurisdiction but unfortunately, many of our Brothers are not ready to go "High Tech".
2. The Grand Master placed additional responsibilities on the MEALS Committee this year, including Membership Development and Retention and Publicity.
3. I attended my first Rookie Banquet this year and I was so impressed by the extremely high level of motivation by these new Master Masons. If we could only harness the attitudes and genuine desire for more light and implant it in all of our members, we would have no problems with membership or retention.
4. Our first and all subsequent MEALS Committee meetings were held online using the ZOOM remote meeting system. It seems that every time that I scheduled a meeting on ZOOM, we encountered some sort of unexpected technical difficulties. In fact, there were some meetings that system has become a necessity, I much prefer meeting in person. The old fashioned way.

5. We responded to several requests from DER's and lodges to assist them with Fellowship Nights, etc.
6. The Grand Master asked the MEALS Committee to create and deliver an all-day seminar entitled, How to Keep your lodge vibrant and alive. We held it in Waterville at the Governors Banquet Room and over 100 Masons attended, including the Grand Master, two Past Grand Masters and the Deputy Grand Master. Brother Chris Camire was the keynote Speaker and on that day, he became a "Masonic Rock Star". We were also fortunate enough to have Ray Roberts and Ray Quimby introduce us to the numerous videos and Masonic Programs that have become extremely popular in their lodge and in their district. R.W. Jim Cunningham had told the MEALS Committee that Ray and Ray really had some great educational programs and he was so right. Every DER will receive a copy of these wonderful programs and I can personally guaranty that if presented statewide, attendance, retention and membership will all rise dramatically.
7. Prior to Grand Lodge in 2019, the MEALS Committee held a half day of training for DER's. Most of the attendees have already served as DDER's for at least one year, so the training was offered in two tracks, i.e. one for the experienced guys and another for the new DER's.

Raymond Rideout Award

I now have the pleasure of announcing the 2018 -2019 Raymond Rideout Award Winner and Runner-Up. The competition was very keen this year but two lodges stood out from the rest, i.e. Trinity Lodge #130 in Presque Isle and Kemankeag Lodge #213 in Rangeley. After carefully analyzing the accomplishments of both lodges, the MEALS Committee unanimously agreed that Kemankeag would be the Runner-Up and Trinity is the Rideout Award Winner. Congratulations to both lodges. Trinity Lodge #130 stood out for the following reasons:

- Assign mentor to each Accepted Candidate. He informs candidate of his acceptance and answers questions about the journey ahead.
- Night of EA Degree, Mentor meets with candidate prior to dinner and introduces him to all attendees. Candidate receives warm welcome by all and made to feel wanted and special.
- Tyler takes good care of candidate prior to starting his degree and candidate is seated with his mentor after the degree.
- Prior to leaving the lodge following his degree, the mentor reviews his lesson while it is fresh in his mind.
- New member and his mentor meet several times prior to next degree to ensure that he is thoroughly prepared for the next degree.
- This process continues for all three degrees.
- All members offer their assistance to the candidate each time he comes to

the lodge.

- All Ritual and Lessons are delivered with feeling and sincerity. It is more than memorization and the reciting of lines.
- The Mentor stays with the candidate as he continues his Masonic journey by visiting other lodges, completes the Rookie Program, etc.

In Summary, Trinity is outstanding for four reasons;

- Excellent Ritual
- Number of MM Raised each year
- Use of Mentor Program
- Excellent Community involvement and public relations

Next year, the Grand Master has requested that the MEALS Committee develop and deliver three all-day seminars in various locations throughout the state like the one held in Waterville and one special event that he has called “A Masonicon”.

I would like to thank the Grand Master for his untiring support and guidance and MEALS Committee members for their various contributions to the Craft.

In closing, I would like to take this opportunity to thank the members of the M.E.A.L.S. Committee for their extraordinary dedication to Masonic Excellence and for their untiring support. The M.E.A.L.S. Committee would like to thank the District Education Representatives for their service to the craft. We also wish to thank the Grand Master for his guidance and support. Masonic Education is obviously one of his highest priorities.

Report of the Committee on Finance

FOR THE FISCAL YEAR ENDING MARCH 31, 2019 AND BUDGET FOR THE 2020 FISCAL YEAR

In Grand Lodge, Bangor Maine, May 4, 2019, to the Grand Master, Past Grand Masters, Grand Lodge Officers, Permanent Members and Brethren of the constituent Lodges.

Pursuant to Sec. 35.2 of the Grand Lodge Constitution it is the responsibility of this Committee to examine all of the financial records of Grand Secretary and Grand Treasurer, also to see that an audit is performed by a public account; these directives have completed. The Committee has examined the Grand Lodge warrants, for the fiscal year ending March 31, 2019, and found them to be in order. An audit for the fiscal year ending March 31, 2018 was completed by MACPAGE, LLC and the important paragraphs from their report are as follows: “We have audited the accompanying financial statements of Grand Lodge of Maine Ancient Free and Accepted Masons, which comprise the statements of assets, liabilities, and net assets – modified cash basis as of March 31, 2018 and 2017 and the related statements of revenue collected, expenses paid, and other changes in net assets – modified cash basis, for the years then ended, and the related notes to the financial statements. In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the assets, liabilities, and net assets of Grand Lodge of Maine Ancient Free and Accepted Masons as of March 31, 2018 and 2017, and its revenue collected, expenses paid, and other changes in net assets for the years then ended, on the modified cash basis of accounting described in Note 1.” An audit of the Grand Lodge records for the fiscal year just ended is under way, by MACPAGE, LLC and it is expected that it will be completed by mid-July, 2019.

Assets of Grand Lodge at March 31, 2018 totaled \$1,878,445. As of March 31, 2019, the unadjusted total assets were \$1,939,712.

Concerning the budget for the current year, projected income is based on membership of 16,000, down from 16,400 last year. Income from the per capita tax, at \$14.10 is estimated to be \$225,600. The assessments of \$2.00 and \$1.00 per member, for the Maine Mason and for the George Washington Memorial donation respectfully, will remain the same. A total of \$30,200 from investments will be taken as income; this amount is based on three- and one-half percent of the rolling five-year average of the total of Grand Lodge unrestricted assets. Total estimated income is \$312,200, less the dedicated funds of \$48,000, resulting in a total available of \$264,200.

Again, the Committee, deems it prudent to point out that there is a possibility next year of an increase in the per capita tax, due primarily to the continued decline in membership.

Expenses shared with the Maine Masonic Charitable Foundation are estimated at \$264,900. The Foundation's share is \$101,400, or approximately 38%. Grand Lodge's portion is \$163,500.

Included in the shared cost are salary increases for the Grand Treasurer and Grand Secretary of five percent. Staff wages, on average, are proposed to increase by four percent.

Rent for the Grand Lodge office increases by five percent according to the terms of the lease.

Other Grand Lodge expenses are \$29,100, bring the estimate to \$192,600 needed to cover the cost of administration.

Estimated cost of the annual communication is not expected to exceed \$30,000.

Grand Lodge officer expenses is estimated at \$35,500.

Committee expenditures are proposed at \$35,500.

Total projected expenditures for Grand Lodge are estimated at \$293,600.

With income projections at \$264,200 and expenditures at \$293,600 the difference is \$29,400, which will be covered by applying \$30,000 from the unused appropriated funds account.

On behave of the Committee I would like to take this opportunity to thank Scott Whytock, Grand Treasurer and Dan Bartlett, Grand Secretary, for their effort in keeping the administrative side of Grand Lodge operating smoothly. The efforts of both of these individuals is exceptional.

And, it should also be noted that the work of the two ladies in the Grand Lodge office contribute to keeping things running on an even keel. Thank you, Theresa and April.

Report of the Masonic Service Association

Most Worshipful Grand Master, RW Deputy Grand Master, Grand Lodge Officers, Past Grand Masters, and distinguished East, Brethren all, good afternoon. First of all thank you Grand Master for the courtesies over your Grand Lodge Session. It is a pleasure to be here. It is sort of amazing and made me realize last night as we were

Because through your Grand Lodge, whether you are aware of it or not, through your Grand Lodge paying their fees to the MSA each one of you are represented by the Masonic Service Association. Therefore by our programs. Our programs, the most visitable one is the one you have seen, the short talk bulletins, the MSA notes which most lodges get and few read. It is the perfect opportunity to spread some light and information in your Lodge. Another is the disaster relief program particularly in recent years have seen the states of Florida, and Texas that have natural disasters they ask MSA to reach out to all our Northern jurisdictions and ask for relief and we funnel that's a strict pass through of money to the effected jurisdictions. Perhaps the most effective of our programs is the veterans visitation program. We visit veteran's hospitals and veteran's homes throughout the country and North America and find out who our veterans are there and what they need and what we can do to help meet those needs. And so, the three hundred and sixty five days a year, seven days a week, MSA is indeed Freemasonry at work. You have to look no further than to answer our tenants of friendship, morality and brotherly love, relief, truth and charity than the Masonic Service Association that the Grand Lodge of Maine supports tremendously. Grand Lodge Office, Holden, Maine, 10:00 A.M., July 31, 2018, GRAND LODGE OF MAINE, A.F. & A.M. vs. ANTHONY JAMES BESSEY # M002635.

On the above date and approximate time, the Commissioners of Trials for the Grand Lodge of Maine, A.F. & A.M. convened and took over 3 ½ hours of testimony concerning the Petitioner being suspended by the Grand Master of Masons of Maine for un-masonic conduct with 4 total specifications of misconduct charged.

The Commissioners heard testimony offered by the Judge Advocate, the Petitioner, Masonic brother witnesses, and Non-Masonic witnesses, much of which was not available to the Grand Master of Masons of Maine prior. Documentary exhibits were also presented to the Commissioners and entered into the record.

After examining all the testimony and all the documentary evidence presented, the Commissioners of Trials unanimously concluded that the 4 charges of un-masonic conduct, as described in the listed specifications of charges, against ANTHONY JAMES BESSEY # M002636 have not been proven, therefore, he is not guilty of un-masonic conduct.

The Commissioners of Trials unanimously concluded that in all the Specification of Charges the Petitioner displayed poor judgement, choice of words, and actions and could have dealt with each circumstance in a more civil and respectful manner, however the Petitioner's conduct did not rise to the level of what has been previously considered un-masonic conduct requiring suspension from membership.

By a unanimous vote the Commissioners of Trials recommend that the Suspension from Membership be Rescinded and that Brother ANTHONY JAMES BESSEY be

restored to his previous status with all the rights and privileges allowed; this as soon as possible.

The Commissioners unanimously find that the first charge of forcing an unwanted French kiss upon an adult woman, not his wife was proven. The Commissioners find her testimony credible and the fact that she did not disclose the details of the unwanted contact when questioned by members of Kora Shrine explainable given the manner in which she was questioned. The Commissioners find Mr. Boucouvalas' denial and lack of memory of the event not credible.

The Commissioners unanimously find that the second charge of engaging in misogynistic and racist humor was not proven.

Therefore, it is the unanimous recommendation of the Commissioners of Trials that the suspension by the Grand Master be upheld.

1. In that the Petitioner had entered a plea of guilty in Houlton Superior Court to unlawful sexual touching, a crime of moral turpitude.

The Commissioners of Trials heard testimony from the Grand Lodge officer who investigated the complaint, from the Petitioner, from a brother Master Mason, and from a Past Grand Master of Masons in Maine. The Commissioners reviewed court documents establishing Mr. Dewitt's criminal conviction.

The Commissioners unanimously find that the conviction from the Houlton Superior Court on September 7, 2006 for Unlawful Touching, a class D misdemeanor, is in fact a crime of moral turpitude. The Commissioners unanimously find that there is no statute of limitations for the Grand Master or the Commissioners to apply in reviewing this matter. The fact that the conviction of Brother DeWitt is just now being brought to Grand Lodge's attention does not render it in anyway non-actionable.

Since the crime Mr. DeWitt pled guilty to is in fact a crime of moral turpitude, the Commissioners unanimously recommend that Mr. DeWitt be suspended from the fraternity. Given the passage of time since the conviction and evidence presented that since his conviction Mr. DeWitt has otherwise conducted himself in accordance with the masonic code of conduct the Commissioners recommend a suspension instead of expulsion.

RW Brother Kevin Campbell, Brother Ken Crump, RW Brother Harry T. Lowd, MW Brother Claire V. Tusch and MW Brother David A. Walker.

The first ballot results were that both Brother Tusch and Brother Walker both received sufficient votes and were declared the winners.

recommendation of the Commissioners of Trials, I move that the action of the Grand Master be ratified.

Motion seconded. Grand Master Rustin directed that three would speak for and three against the motion with a two minute time limit each. Upon completion a vote by show of hands was conducted. Grand Master Rustin called for an electronic vote.

Freemasonry: The Journey and the Making of Uncommon Men

Over the years, when my recollection of old Greek myths needed refreshing, I have returned to Charles Kingsley's book, The Heroes. There, among those good pages, is the illustration shown above. Since I have been a Freemason, this painting has reminded me of a Masonic Lodge in action. Muscles flex to accomplish the task

while blessing, inspiration and wisdom find words and song to guide and cheer the brethren.

A mission lives in this painting. This band of chosen heroes push and roll their ship, the Argo, toward the cerulean blue of the Aegean. There they will launch its sleek hull into the dangers and the amazement that await. These men have been chosen by their leader Jason to sail to the far off Colchis and once there to bring back the Golden Fleece. One feels in this illustration the calling to journey beyond the comfort of home fires, to find new wonders and understandings and to do a greater work than one has so far managed.

We stand amazed when we consider the richness and the opportunity which Freemasonry encompasses and presents to the brethren especially to those who take its long journey seriously. It is the opportunity to be truly human in the fullest sense of that term. As Masons, we are bonded together by a vision of a finer habitation for human kind. We have promised to labor upon this possibility. We believe that a mason's journey is both a "duty and a happiness." We know that through the pursuit of this arduous journey, we have already discovered joy.

So here we are truly journey-men and upon an odyssey which takes us beyond self-interests. We sense the affirmation of the Light over the darkness, and we feel the strength for good which lies in being rational creatures. As Jason and his heroes or Ulysses and his companions, we venture forth not to find an old age home for ourselves, nor a place to hide or to be personally rewarded, but to find what is possible in the far reaches of human experience. **More than curiosity drives us;** there is a sense of mission. We explore to understand; we seek understanding that we can better build, and we strive to build a new tomorrow of human well-being. It is this vision and aspiration which makes us what we are and which forges the strong bond and the spirit among us. Shoulder to shoulder we are on a quest for the truth!

In the largest sense this voyage and the vision which guides us belong to all humankind. There is no deeper nor older image imprinted upon our human psyche than that of the journey toward a goal **which is worth it all**. We must partake in an odyssey if we are to discover the truth, find a better place or reach a worthy goal. Often in the old stories of such passages, the pathway begins between two great, mythic pillars. These ancient pillars persist in our collective literature with all their multiplicity of gathered significance. For instance here is the title page of Francis Bacon's Novum Organum Scientiarum published in 1620.



Organon is a Greek term meaning a tool of the hand or an instrument of thought.

Organon was the title given to Aristotle's work on logic which for centuries had been the scholars' text of choice on that subject. Bacon's is proclaiming his work takes a stride forward from Aristotle. It is a *Novum Organum*- a new instrument. A new enlightenment was afoot; the scientific age was dawning. Yet look closely at the above engraving. There is a palpable connection between this new adventure and past human voyages of the mind and spirit. Two pillars stand where the known ends and the unknown begins. A galleon passes between the two columns and sails out into a vastness. A new age is beginning yet any age of consequence is a sharing in the long, long heritage of our human odyssey. Like so many ventures before, it will be an exploration taken in risk and fueled by the expectation of new understandings. Bacon glimpsed the new age of science, but he realized the similarity in old voyages such as the one taken by Ulysses. Look just below the two columns. There is a long, narrow inscription in Latin which may be translated "Many will travel and knowledge will be increased." This thought is the connective tissue between all the best intentions to learn, to build and to care throughout the long annals of human progress. This could be a Masonic motto.

Let us slip back a little more than three thousand years from where we are today. If there had been newspapers in the Mediterranean world at that time, the Trojan War would have been front page. It was a heroic and brutal affair made worse, Homer tells us, by the gods taking sides. In those times, as often in our own, being "clever"

was considered a virtue while deceitfulness was expected at least by those who benefited. Those who did not profit cried “foul” as did the Trojans and their god-supporters when they found they had been tricked by the Greeks who left for the taking a giant wooden horse. You remember the story. Ever after there has been the saying “Beware of the Greeks baring gifts.” With its belly full of gate-opening Greek soldiers, this horse was part of Ulysses’ clever plan to take and destroy the Trojan’s city. As a punishment for such low trickery, those gods who favored the Trojans made certain that Ulysses’ homeward way at the close of the war was long, weary and littered with whirlpools and with potholes. For ninety generations the *Odyssey*, Homer’s great tale of a hero’s adventurous voyage home, has been as active ingredient in our imagination and storytelling. The story was too good to be let alone.

Some seven hundred years ago and some 2300 years after Homer, the Medieval poet Dante wrote his version of Ulysses’ final experience. In Dante’s allegorical account of his journey through the region of the dead, he and his guide meet our hero, Ulysses, still condemned for his clever duplicity and this time confined in a forked flame. Despite this fiery existence, Ulysses is able and willing to talk. He tells Dante that he never returned home. Years of travel had filled him with an “ardor” to discover what lies beyond the bounds of the known world. His passion is to experience and understand “the vices of men and of their virtue.” With one boat manned by a small but faithful crew he sails west toward the Pillars of Hercules, that gate-like place symbolized on Bacon’s title page, where the waters of the Mediterranean mix with a vast, unknown Atlantic Ocean.

[As Ulysses recounts to Dante, both he and his crew were “growing old and slow.” This detail may be one reason I find Dante tale so compelling. However, Dante’s version of the epic is not age dependent neither in terms of human life spans nor by historical era. It is an inevitable tale universally relevant to our human experience. In Dante’s account of Ulysses’ admonition to his men as they approach the Pillars of Hercules there is a message which speaks to Freemasonry with a ringing pertinence in our own corrosive times.]

As the boat’s prow splits apart the gray sea mile upon mile, the **apprehensions** of Ulysses’ crew rise until there is fear in their eyes. What lays about them and ahead seems no longer a great, exciting and unknown world but a threatening oblivion. Ulysses sees and knows that look. Here they are on the edge of their greatest adventure; they are about to discover what lies beyond. Ulysses must rouse his men or lose the opportunity to travel on. Below a wind filled and lead-gray sky, he shouts,

“O Brothers, who though a hundred thousand perils have reached the West... consider your origin: ye were not made to live as brutes, but to pursue virtue and knowledge.”

No doubt there is brutishness around us. It may even be growing. But Ulysses' vision and that of Freemasonry is that humankind was not made to live as do the brutes. We were made to live as humans, as builders, as heroes if we dare. What we have yet to discover and yet to build are, in fact, noble possibilities. This is the admonishment we Masons need to hear: **Remember, you were made to be uncommon human beings!** We were not made to cower over our oars. We are **bonded** together by a grand vision born and nurtured in pursuit of that which is greater in wisdom, virtue and creative compassion than our present selves possess. We were made to continue a voyage of achievement for ourselves and others out upon the vastness of human possibility. It is our intent to find and preserve those just and constructive relationships which we call truth! Such is our privilege- our “duty and our happiness.” This we came here to do!

Let us remember all the uncommon human beings who we have met and who have given us so much in our Masonic Journey. Let us celebrate this young generation of Masons who, all around us, are taking the rowing bench in their rosy fingered dawn to smite the gray sea and sweep us into the wonders of a third century of Freemasonry in Maine.

Reports Not Read at the Annual Communication

Grand Master Report

TO: The Committee on the Doings of Grand Lodge Officers

FROM: Brother Mark E. Rustin, Grand Master of Masons in Maine

Despite being seriously debilitated by health issues for the first half of my term, the work of the Grand Lodge in terms of fraternal relations, special communications, and celebratory events held by some Lodges has continued in the normal fashion. I am indebted to the other elected Grand Officers for providing representation on my behalf at several functions during the year.

During this Masonic Year, the Grand Lodge joined two Lodges for 150 Year Anniversary celebrations and one Lodge for a 200 Year Anniversary of the issuance

of their charter; held five Special Communications -- three to dedicate cornerstones, one Veteran's Park Bench, and one Lodge consolidation; and was represented at the Northeast Conference of Grand Masters, Maine Mason Day in Florida, and the North American Conference of Grand Masters.

We successfully conducted 23 tyled District Meetings (one brought together two Districts) where Brothers were invited to offer comments and ask questions regarding Mane Masonry and the Grand Lodge operations. I had the opportunity to stress the centrality of the Lodges in Freemasonry. I encouraged the Lodges to be responsible for their business and brotherhood within the "guardrails" of the Maine Masonic Code and their bylaws. Overall, the response was positive and encouraging for the future of the Craft.

In response to the inspection reports filed by the DDGMs, I initiated three meetings with Lodges who were unable to demonstrate compliance with the Constitutional requirements implicit in the Charter they received. All have been good meetings with action plans developed by the Lodges to bring themselves into compliance. Several more of these meetings will take place in the immediate future.

I have attended numerous Lodge meetings either by invitation to events or simply dropping into a meeting for fellowship. In general, our Lodges are doing well. Special attention has been and will be given to Lodges who appear to be struggling.

I have initiated several disciplinary actions this year. They will be reported on at the Grand Lodge session. Though troublesome, discipline is a necessary part of maintaining the ethical and moral rectitude of the Craft. The actions I took were based on fairness, firmness, and consistency. The integrity of the work we do is based upon voluntary compliance with our tenets and teachings. When Brothers fail to comply, appropriate discipline is necessary to insure the proper functioning of the Craft is not impeded.

We planned and executed the "Maine Mason Day at the Seadogs" event last summer. 259 Masons, family, and friends gathered at the Seadogs Baseball Park in Portland to enjoy a game and great fellowship. The event also featured yours truly throwing out the first pitch. A great time was had by all!

My goal is to spend at least part of each business day at the Grand Lodge Office. This provides me the opportunity to properly handle mail, e-mail, and telephone communications in a timely fashion. Additionally, I am able to stay current with reading and conversations with Brothers which allow me to offer timely, current service to the Craft. This office time, coupled with Lodge visitation, provides me with an up to date understanding of the challenges faced and accomplishments of the Brothers I serve.

It has been an honor and a privilege to serve as Deputy Grand Master for the last 12 months. The time has gone by very quickly as time usually does when you are busy. I thank all the Brethren throughout the State whose hospitality has been inspiring and whose friendships I will cherish forever.

Shortly after Grand Lodge installation on May 1st & 2nd 2018, until the present, the Deputy Grand Master's calendar has been very busy. As Deputy, I have participated in and attended many Blue Lodge Installations, Awards nights, and other celebrations throughout the state. I was given the opportunity to represent the Grand Lodge of Maine at the annual communication of The Order of the Eastern Star, Rainbow Assembly, Scottish Rite Consistory, Council of deliberation and the Summer Ceremonial of Kora Temple. Most Worshipful Mark E Rustin and the Grand Lodge of Maine

The 2018-2019 Masonic year saw many highlights for the office of the Grand Treasurer. The duties of the Grand Treasurer are split fairly evenly between the duties to the Grand Lodge of Maine and the Maine Masonic Charitable Foundation. The finances for the Foundation owned Holden Masonic Associates as well as the Maine Masonic College are also part of the responsibilities of this office.

Grand Lodge Budget: For the Grand Lodge of Maine, we once again saw a continued adherence to a well-crafted budget created by the Grand Lodge Finance Committee and related parties. The Finance Committee receives a monthly financial package with some commentary highlighting items of note for their review. The Finance Committee Chair and/or its members often have questions or points of clarification to ensure that the transactions processed are accurately understood and reflected.

Charitable Foundation Budget: The Foundation Finance Committee has again this year seen an increase in number and dollar value of all four matching grants offered by the Foundation showing that lodges appreciate the program and the opportunities to be involved with the needs of their communities. The popular and nimble

Brotherhood Relief grant continues to grow as it has been made use of to give speedy \$500 relief to those in need. Masonic relief has seen roughly the same number of relief applications this year yet the distribution committee involved with relief has seen some very complex cases. The Trustees and Finance Committee remain committed to supporting this line item due to its commitment to assisting a worthy brother in need. The Foundation's investment assets are substantial and produce much of the Foundation's operating income, but we're continuing to see a healthy level of donations to the Foundation to help stay within IRS limits on fund raising amounts. This is mainly led by the Grand Master's Annual Appeal as well as other opportunities managed by our Executive Director.

200th Anniversary: Preparations continue in anticipation of the 200th anniversary of the Grand Lodge of Maine. Challenge coin sales continue in order to raise funds for plans being made for the 200th. These funds are held separately for accounting purposes for future spending for the 200th celebration with more fund raising to come.

Insurance: The insurance program through the Grand Lodge continues to expand. We're seeing more lodges who are finding cheaper and better coverage in this program than their old providers. We're also seeing quality brought to the system by ensuring that buildings are covered properly.

Investments: The 2018 calendar year and into 2019 we saw a mixed return. The market was productive for most of the year, but the 4th quarter of 2018 resulted in market wide losses, most of which were gained back during the 1st quarter of 2019. The Grand Lodge and Charitable Foundation investment funds managed by HM Payson have been handled with the utmost care and skill. Investment committees for both entities have been continually pleased with the investment policies and performance relative to the major markets.

Maine Masonic College and Holden LLC: Prudent financial controls continue to be brought to each entity as they continue under the care of the Grand Treasurer. By incorporating these entities into the same reporting process as the Grand Lodge and Charitable Foundation, they all receive the same approval, warrant and transmittal system, budgeting, and general processing. Each organization continues to remain in a solid financial position.

Audit: Both the Grand Lodge of Maine and the Maine Masonic Charitable Foundation and their associated entities were audited by the accounting firm MacPage located in South Portland. Both organizations received a favorable audit result and highlighted suggestions have been considered by the Grand Treasurer and related Finance Committees. Each organization previously negotiated a three-year commitment between themselves and MacPage in an effort to obtain more favorable pricing. A new pricing contract will be reached with the audit company soon to enhance savings for both entities.

Report of the Grand Librarian and Museum Curator

In Grand Lodge, Bangor, Maine *May 4, 2019*

A change in our goal – but still not enough time to get there!

Last year, we went through a major reorientation, weeding (as Librarians call it) our collection to eliminate certain books which were simply not being borrowed. This primarily involved ALL of the fiction books unrelated to Freemasonry. They were simply sitting here collecting dust so as the year ended, we removed them via a donation to the Kiwanis for their annual sale. Several shelving units were freed up and put in the basement as a result. A large conference table was placed where the Librarian's desk was. And no, despite the many pleas from my fans, I wasn't put in the cellar with that shelving.

A large monitor/tv flat screen has been installed making teleconferencing a real pleasure. As this coming year moves on, we'll be trying to integrate this more with things like Library learning programs, MEALS activities, and community groups. Although it's not a big meeting space, it's FAR better than having elderly and inform members struggling to get downstairs for a meeting. As time moves on, this should become more and more useful.

As a result of this, you may have heard – INCORRECTLY – that we're no longer accepting donations of books. Nothing could be further from the truth. There are, though, some updated policies. We will ALWAYS take Masonic books, the only exception being Mackey's Masonic Encyclopedia, originally published in the mid-1800s and now well out of date. (That's not an original signature inside the front cover, believe me!) We already have several of this multi-volume work and don't need any more. Other Masonic books received as duplicates will likely find a home at some lodge looking to start their own library for members to peruse. The reality is, though, that passing along books with 'shaky' information ("Born in Blood" is the example I always use for this category) isn't always the best course of action since it just serves to confuse those who're just beginning their Masonic learning journey.

Masonic-related fiction (think: 'The Last Symbol', for example), history (except non-factual, biased or politically-oriented works), esoterica, religion, and non-fiction are welcome. Biographies of Freemasons and books written by Freemasons are also sought (we need to know the name and location of the lodge so that we don't 'assume' things as with, for example, Heinlein. We also welcome books that might enhance the lives of our members and community (how to do an oral history or what makes a strong historical society are good examples).

For a while, we had a number of folks who saw us as an opportunity to clean out their attics but we just don't have the call or space for indiscriminated collecting. I know you'll understand.

Sickness of my own and in my family has been a drag on my efforts this past year. As a volunteer who spends at least 25 hours each month on the library and museum, it's sometimes discouraging to not get further ahead but it's also lots and lots of fun.

For the future? We're going to make more opportunities for you to appreciate electronic reading/learning and do some history-telling via our museum assets. We'll also be reaching out to tell YOUR stories and hopefully providing better communications from your Grand Master via a podcast, a delayed project from last year due to his health. We'll be working hard and having fun, all with the goal of providing a better Masonic experience for you and yours. Thanks once again for the fun you give me – and remember, constructive criticism is welcome and appreciated!

Masonic College

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine:

The Maine Masonic College has worked its way through another year and is prepared to launch into our next year with all the enthusiasm and vigor that we have displayed in this past year.

Once again we scheduled twenty-four courses and with the exception of one or two lost to illness, we have made those a reality. We did this in spite of losing five presenters over the course of the year. We have rebounded from this loss and now have five new instructors on our roles. We welcome these new faculty with open arms and wish those who retired or were forced by illness to step aside all the best in their retirement or our best wishes for full recovery from their illness.

With new people in our faculty some of the older courses we presented will now have a new face and a different look. In addition we will be offering two brand new courses in the upcoming year, one on geometrical figures and a second on geometry in art.

As has been our practice for the past few years we have tried to spread these courses over as wide a geographic area as possible. We are at times limited by either the health or the age of our presenters but by and large we get into most corners of the State.

Convocation was again held in October and our program was headlined by Russ Charvonja, Past Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of California. His topic and specialty is civility and we believe the timing of his lecture was very auspicious. With the amount of disrespect seen every day by all of us in every level and walk of life all the way to our most public celebrities, a good talk on the necessity of civility in a harmonious civilization was much appreciated. Most Worshipful Brother Charvonja capped his presentation by holding a panel discussion, moderated by himself, on a reasonably divisive topic to show how even people with widely different opinions on a subject can sit down with a few basic rules and civilly discuss that topic.

Our Celebration of the Arts and Sciences was held in April at the Anah Shrine Temple. The topic of the day was logic. Our key note speaker for the day was Dr. James H. Page who is the Chancellor of the University of Maine System. What that means is that he is the chief administrative and academic officer for Maine's seven public universities, a law school, over 50 research facilities, extension officers and education outreach centers throughout the State. Our own Regent Luke Shorty will precede the Chancellor with a presentation on mathematical logic. Following their presentations we will once again get to hear about the various studies being done by our Honors students at the University of Maine. It was a wonderful day.

The Maine Masonic College has again reached out and maintained our links with other educational bodies. We again supported the Honors Reads program at the University of Maine by purchasing the books for that program. We also supported the National History Day with a cash donation as well as once again purchasing T-shirts for the local winners that they will wear as they compete at the next level. We also made a contribution to the Planetarium at the University of Maine, Orono. In addition to direct financial support we are still employing teaching talent from the University. We supported a two part Bicentennial Program put on by Liam Riordan as well as using University staff for such courses as ethics, rhetoric and astronomy.

Administratively we have made a few changes to the Board of Regents for the upcoming year. Worshipful Brother Luke Shorty will be the new Dear of the Maine Masonic College and Worshipful Brother Dan Gaucher will assume the role of Associate Chairman of the Board. We have also slightly enlarged the Board of Regents by welcoming onto the Board Worshipful Karl Furtato and welcoming back to the Board Worshipful Don McDougal. Although these are all active and busy men they feel strongly enough about the efforts of the Maine Masonic College to add it to their already heavy workloads. Our thanks and appreciation goes out to them.

Once again we thank the Maine Masonic Charitable Foundation for financing our activities. Without their support we would be a mere shadow of what we are today. We sincerely hope they believe in our honesty and integrity as we spend their money to maintain our programs and our connections within the academic community.

We need to once again thank our faculty for stepping up when called upon and keeping the program running. Both those who have with for years and those who

Committee on Doings of the Grand Lodge Officers

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine:

It is this Committee's pleasure to provide this report on the Doings of Grand Lodge Officers. With but a few exceptions, nearly all reports were received in a timely fashion. There were only four Districts whose report had not been received by this Committee in time for Grand Lodge's annual communication. In reviewing recent historical reports of this Committee, it seems this has been an area of significant improvement, as reports in the past appeared to be lacking.

Having read all of the reports received, it is delightful to learn of all the good work being conducted across this Grand Jurisdiction, by the Grand Lodge team of officers, to the several districts that cover our state, to specific lodges, and even down to individual members. There is something special that resides in the heart of this fraternity and it is being exemplified in all directions.

It is clear that many in the Craft are busy, even very busy – from required visitations, to dedications, presentations, receptions, community events – it is clear there is no lack of things for Freemasonry to be engaged in beyond the walls of our home lodges.

Business affairs at the Grand Lodge level appear to be in line with the spirit of its duty and, more importantly, the folks that run the day-to-day operations are clearly providing much-appreciated and valuable support to their constituent lodges.

Some of the positive activities that have been gleaned from the several reports show several commonalities. The Bikes for Books program is clearly a popular program all over Maine. The Masonic Rookie program also seems to produce favorable outcomes, not only for candidates, but for their lodges and the Fraternity overall. Community involvement is also an overriding theme found in almost every report, demonstrating that Charity is still clearly an important tenet in action for the brethren. Those Districts that employ an active District Association appear to have stronger family of member lodges that are producing results. Use of the Charitable Fund and the matching grants program, while doing well, probably could be even more utilized. However, it is worth noting that it seems to be making a difference in any Districts.

It is evident that many of the same struggles of the past continue. While many are doing well, there were reports of difficulties with membership, ritual work, Masonic protocols, minor code infractions, finances, building issues, among others. Some of these lodges strive to improve while others seem to lack initiative. Some District Deputies conveyed very open and honest assessments about the conditions of their districts and should be commended for doing so.

As has been mentioned in the past, report formats from each of the District Deputies varies greatly. Some were very elaborate and detailed in there reviews. Some provided brief but concise reports. Others provided short reviews that perhaps come up short in providing a clear picture of their district's overall health. Perhaps a recommended format with guidelines on what to cover may benefit those officers who could use the assistance. This serves not only to appease the Craft and create consistency, but also serves as a great opportunity for reflection and introspection, which ideally leads to positive action.

In summary, although Masonry in Maine continues to have the same ongoing challenges, it does not deter or take away from the many good deeds that so many good men involve themselves with. Despite our shortcomings, our Fraternity in this State has much to be proud of. We should continue to work to improve those areas that pull us down, but celebrate all the great successes we have along the way.

Royal and Select Masters

Add 1000 to the Common Era. Thus 2019 and 1000=3019.

Knights Templar

From the Christian Era take 1118. Thus 1118 from 2019=901

Order of High Priesthood

To the Christian Era add 1913, the Year of the Blessing. Thus: 2019 and 1913=3932.

Masonic Calendar

Ancient Craft Masons commence this era with the creation of the world, calling it **Anno Lucis (A.D.)**, "in the year of light."

Scottish Rite, same as Ancient Craft, except the Jewish chronology is used, **Anno Mundi (A.M.)**, "in the year of the world."

Royal Arch Masons date from the year the second temple was commenced by Zerubbabel, **Anno Inventionis (A.I.)**, "in the year of the discovery."

Royal and Select Masters date from the year in which the temple of Solomon was completed, **Anno Depositionis (A. Dep.)**, "in the year of the deposit."

Knights Templar commence their era with the organization of their Order, **Anno Ordinid (A.O.)**, "in the year of the Order."

Order of High Priesthood dates from the year of the blessing of Abraham by the High Priest Melchisedec, **Anno Benefacio (A.B.)**, "in the year of the blessing."

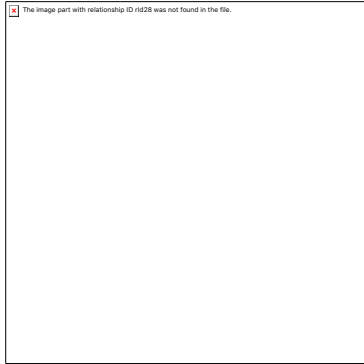
