ANNUAL ADDRESS
GRAND MASTER, PETER C. SCHMIDT

**To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge Ancient Free and Accepted
Masons of the State of Maine:**

This, my Brethren, is my report for my first year as your Grand Master. I think most of you know that I have been a very happy Grand Master and that I want all of you to be happy with me. It gives me a great deal of pleasure to welcome all of you to this, our 166th Annual Communication. I am particularly happy to welcome our out-of-state guests, since most of them have come a long way to be with us. We have shared many happy moments with them in their own jurisdictions and we hope they will enjoy being with us here in the State of Maine.

The Fourth Annual Fellowship Night for the New England States was held in Brattleboro, Vermont, this year. Unfortunately, I was out of the country at that time and could not be with my fellow New Englanders. The Grand Lodge of Maine, however, was represented by 14 of our Brethren and the Deputy Grand Master, R. W. Ernest H. Curtis, brought my greetings to the Brethren assembled there. Next year it will be in Rhode Island and I fervently hope to be there.

During the past year we have lost many of our Brethren to the Grim Reaper, and at this time I would ask Brother and Reverend Edward Fenderson to give his report on Memorials.

MEMORIALS

To the M. W. Grand Master, members of Grand Lodge, officers and members of the subordinate lodges, and to all Grand Lodges with which we are in Fraternal Correspondence:

Brethren:

It is with profound sorrow that we are called upon to announce the deaths of two Past Grand Lodge officers of the M. W. Grand Lodge of the State of Maine since May 1, 1984.

Rt. W. Isaiah J. Jackson died October 27, 1984 at the age of 82, at a Belfast, Maine hospital. He was born in Montville, Maine, January 31, 1902, son of Arthur and Susie Jackson. For many years he was a machinist at the Freedom Canning Factory. He served as deputy sheriff of Waldo County, as a selectman in Freedom for many years and was a director of Freedom Academy.

He was raised in Unity Lodge #58, December 29, 1926; served as W. Master in 1934, and as Secretary for the years 1937-38, and 1951-1980. R. W. Brother Jackson served the M. W. Grand Lodge of Maine as Jr. Grand Warden in 1957; as D. D. Grand Master of the 12th District in 1949, and was a Grand Representative of the State of Michigan.

He is survived by his wife of 53 years, Arlene L. (Bradstreet) Jackson of Freedom; one brother Frank of Belmont; several nieces, nephews and cousins.

Funeral services were held at the Freedom Congregational Church with the Rev. Douglas Showalter officiating. Burial took place in Pleasant Hill Cemetery, Freedom, Maine. Masonic Services were conducted by his home Lodge, Unity #58.

Rt. W. Elmer J. Russell died at the age of 79, December 17, 1984 in Waterville, Maine. He was born February 20, 1905, in Ludlow, Maine, son of James E. and Essie May Smith Russell.

He married Blanche Bosworth in 1938 who survives him. They had two daughters, Miss Rhonda Russell of Lawrence, Massachusetts, and Mrs. Richard (Cheryl) Lattinville of Methuen, Mass. He is also survived by one brother, Willis J. Russell of Madison, Maine; two grandchildren, and several nieces and nephews.

He was raised in Euclid Lodge #194, June 1, 1936; served as W. M. in 1943, Marshal 1944-46, Chaplain in 1954, and as the Secretary from 1970-1983. He was a member of the Minerva Chapter Order of Eastern Star and the Board of Directors of the Rainbow Assembly.

R. W. Russell also served the Grand Lodge well as D. D. Grand Master in 1957, 58, and 1969; Grand Steward 1964-65; Jr. Grand Warden 1967, and as Assistant Grand Lecturer 1970, 71, and 1972-75. He was a Grand Representative to New Zealand.

He was employed by the Anson Stick Company as a night watchman until his retirement. He also worked for the Great Northern Paper Company of Madison, as a night watchman.

These two brethren let the Great Lights of Masonry rule and govern their lives and rightly deserve the tribute we now bestow upon them. May they rest in peace in their eternal home, that House not made with hands, eternal in the heavens, with the Supreme Architect of the Universe.

I move the acceptance of this report and that it may be properly recorded for all eternity.

We grieve for these departed Brethren, but Death, the Grand leveler of all greatness, will eventually reduce us all to the same state.

During the past year we held 24 District meetings, and although the attendance left a little to be desired, by and large they were very satisfactory. I managed to get to several more Lodges I had not attended before and that now brings the total of Lodges I have visited to 164 out of the 200 Lodges we now have. Before we held any of our District Meetings, a School of Instruction for District Deputies was held in Waterville. It gave me a deep sense of satisfaction to see that most of my Grand Lodge Officers were in attendance also.

Masonic Education in the State of Maine is in good hands under the influence of our Committee on Masonic Education. Walter Macdougall, as Chairman, has led us further along the path of Education than we have travelled for many years. The courses in advanced Education under the leadership of R. W. Ernest Curtis have resulted in many meetings

where many of our Brethren have learned much about Masonry above and beyond the normal schools of instruction. There is no doubt that Education leads a Brother to understand what Masonry is all about and makes him want to come back and attend meetings of his Lodge and of many Lodges around him.

Our Annual visitation to Togus was well attended by the Grand Lodge Officers and was indeed a stirring experience. A few of us attended the Catholic Service in addition to our own and the exchange between our Catholic Brethren and ourselves is very heart warming, to say the least. I would urge all of our Brethren to make at least one visit to Togus to see how the other half lives. It is an emotional experience that makes us realize how lucky we are.

The Dispensations I have issued are listed in this report and need not now be read. Most of them this year were for Table Lodges. To all of you who have not yet attended a Table Lodge, I would urge you to do so. It is a unique experience and will show you how Masonry originated in our Taverns and the flow of good fellowship and brotherly love will make you want to relive the experience.

I have made only a few decisions this year, but they are very important to me and I hope will be to you. They are as follows:

The question of using Charity Funds of Constituent Lodges for Widow's Programs has come up many times. It is my decision that such funds may be used for any part of the Widow's Program, including Banquets for the widows in the Lodge Hall.

It is difficult to find evenings on which to put on programs for Lodges, since so many things are happening all at the same time. Since I feel that Masonry is really a family affair and that it is difficult to invite the family to a Lodge Installation on a week night, it is my decision that Semi-public Lodge Installations may be held on a Sunday afternoon or evening.

For many years, when the Wayfaring Man was used in the second section of the third degree, a costume of sorts was used, together with a beard and staff. It is my decision that a cape of plain material, a staff, and a beard will be appropriate for the use of the Wayfaring Man.

I do not feel that the use of a joint trestleboard in a Lodge in conjunction with an appendant body is done with anything beyond economy in mind. It is my decision that such joint trestleboards may be used, providing the Lodge adheres to the restrictions concerning the listing of names of candidates as shown in the Constitution, Standing Regulations and Decisions of the Grand Lodge.

Balloting for officers in a constituent Lodge has always been a matter of concern to me, since nominations are not allowed. It is my decision that Lodges may use a printed ballot, similar to the one

used in Grand Lodge, listing the names of those officers who are desirous of being elected to a specific office. A good example of such a ballot can be obtained from Bristol Lodge #74.

I recently received a letter from Bristol Lodge #74 as follows: "If a member of a lodge in another state has long ago been accepted as a dual member in a Maine Lodge, but maintains his residence in Maine for only six months of each year, is his Maine Lodge membership "grandfathered" or must he be somehow removed from Maine Lodge membership?" It is my decision that once a Mason becomes a member of a Maine Lodge, his membership stays intact, even if he moves to another state completely. This refers to dual membership as well as regular membership. This, of course, applies only as long as he is in good standing in either or both lodges.

The word "Solicitation" has always had a bad name in Masonry. I have searched the Constitution, Standing Regulations and Digest of Decisions and can find no reference to this word. I have come to the conclusion that it is a custom and not a law. None of the Landmarks adopted by the Grand Lodge of Maine contain any reference to this subject. A recent letter from one of our Past Grand Masters has asked me for some definitive action on this subject and here it is: It is my decision that there is no objection to a neutrally-worded approach being made to a man who is considered to be a suitable candidate for Freemasonry. After the procedure for obtaining membership in a Masonic Lodge is explained, the potential candidate should be left to make his own decision and come of his own free will. Neither shall it be unlawful for the Mason to remind the non-Mason of the offer, but if no favorable response is made to the offer and the reminder, no further offer shall be made to the non-Mason.

A lot of education will be required and it is not our purpose to stop every man on the street and explain the procedure for obtaining membership. We want to talk to men who are already Masons at heart.

I have been informed that the Grand Lodge of England as well as the Grand Lodges of Louisiana and Florida have adopted a method similar to the above.

The Northeast Conference of Grand Masters, Deputy Grand Masters and Grand Secretaries was hosted this year by the Grand Lodge of Connecticut and was a great success. Although these Conferences are smaller than the Conference of North America, they cover a lot of territory and seem to deal with the immediate problems which beset all Grand Lodges, but particularly those in the New England States. It is also a chance to renew acquaintances with our neighbors and discuss the happenings of

the past year. The subject which seems to come up each year is that of declining membership and what we can do about it. One of the aspects of that subject is covered by one of my decisions. I trust it is the right one and that it will bear fruit.

The Conference of Grand Masters of North America was held this year in Myrtle Beach, South Carolina. I chose to combine that with a visit to Washington, D.C. to attend the Conferences of the Allied Masonic Degrees, then on to Roanoke, Virginia to attend the Annual Communication of the Grand Lodge of Virginia, and from there on to Myrtle Beach. We drove all the way and I added almost 2500 miles to my new Dodge. On Sunday we were invited to the Annual Dinner given by the Grand Lodge of Pennsylvania after attending the reception at the Conference Hotel in Myrtle Beach. Myrtle Beach is a real resort town, right on the ocean, and with miles of white sand beach. It was a bit too cold to go in swimming, but the beach provided walking tours for many of the Brethren who attended. The Monday meeting of the George Washington Masonic Memorial Association was well attended, at the head of which was our own M. W. Charles R. Glassmire as President. In the evening, the Grand Secretaries Banquet was also well attended. Unfortunately, about two o'clock in the morning I was stricken with what we diagnosed as the 48 hour flu and from that time on I spent the rest of the Conference in my hotel room. Luckily, R. W. Ernest Curtis was able to present my paper to the Conference. The paper covered our own Team Action Program and was well received. By the time we arrived home I was well on the road to recovery. The Conference next year will be in Arlington, Virginia.

We have had two Grand Lodge Tours this year, one to Switzerland and one to the Island of Margarita off the coast of Venezuela. The trip to Switzerland was indeed breath-taking, from Geneva to Jungfrau to the Matterhorn to Lucerne, all on Switzerland's finest railroads and with the expert care of Toby Andersen. The trip to Margarita was one of relaxation and basking in the sun. Unfortunately, Olive was looking up when she should have been looking down and the result was a broken wrist. That gave me a bit more rest than I had anticipated. It was also a bit difficult to deal with natives who spoke no English and couldn't understand it either, but we managed and she is well on the road to recovery.

We have reached an all time high in giving out Masonic Relief this year, to the tune of \$130,700. Few of us realize just how much Masonic Charity is doing for the world today. The total of Masonic Charity in the United States is over a million and a half dollars per day! Most people know about the Shriners Hospitals for Crippled Children and about the Burns Institutes, but not many realize how much Masonry contributes to Society.

To R. W. Jim Coolong and his staff of Assistant Grand Lecturers, we owe a lot. The schools were well conducted and our Brethren learned much about Ritual and also about non-ritual subjects in the fourth round

of schools. Masonic Education is very important and could be the difference between a lost Mason and one who does return to his Lodge after he has been raised.

DeMolay and Rainbow are on the upswing in Maine. Several new Chapters have been formed and others are in the offing. I have pledged my wholehearted support to both of these youth organizations and am asking my brother Masons to help me by attending their meetings and asking them to attend ours and put on some of their degrees. I have attended several Rainbow and DeMolay installations and have been well received. The Pine Tree Priory of DeMolays has been revived and is going strong under the able leadership and guidance of Ted Stanton, himself a Senior DeMolay. Clyde Ferris, our new Executive Officer for DeMolay in the State of Maine has completely reorganized the DeMolay structure and is making great progress in reactivating defunct Chapters and starting new ones. Rainbow has had some difficulties, but under the able direction of "Mum" Higgins is gradually getting back on its feet. Most of these difficulties seem to arise from the Assembly Advisors rather than from the girls themselves.

I have made so many visitations to Lodges here in Maine that to list them would be senseless and rather monotonous. I will tell you, however, that I am putting almost four thousand miles a month on my new car. It is a joy for me to meet my fellow Masons, to break bread with them, and share with them some of my experiences as their Grand Master. We have made a few innovations this year; namely, I have installed several Lodges, one Chapter, and have presided in the East for a Master Masons Degree a couple of times. The last time we did this, all but one or two of my Grand Lodge officers worked with me. On the first occasion, in Oxford Lodge in Norway, we had 165 Masons present and in the last one, there were over a hundred present. I realize that some of my Brethren visit in order to see the Grand Master foul up, but when I make a mistake in my ritual, I do it on purpose just to see if the Brethren are paying attention. Anyway, we all have a great time and it does pep up the Lodge attendance.

On August 5, 1984, we attended the relaying of the Cornerstone of the foundation of the Statute of Liberty on Liberty Island, formerly Bedloes Island. The Grand Lodge of New York laid the original cornerstone on August 5, 1884 and in 1984 they celebrated the 100th anniversary of this by doing it again, this time by erecting a bronze plaque commemorating the event. They tried to duplicate everything which happened a hundred years ago and they did a good job. They even duplicated the weather. It rained in 1884 and it poured in 1984. I had about decided not to start any new programs in the Grand Lodge this year because the many programs we have were doing so well, but this incident in New York made me want to back up the Grand Lodge of New York in their hope that every Mason

in the United States would give one dollar to the renovation of the Statute of Liberty. I pledged the Grand Lodge of Maine to contribute \$37,000 over the next two years. So far our Trust Fund is over \$16,500 and still going strong. For donations of \$10.00 or more we are giving a beautiful lapel pin or a key ring with a Statue of Liberty Medallion, registered in the owner's name. If the keys are lost, they can be dropped in any mailbox and will be returned to the owner free of charge for two years. I have asked the Lodges to contribute \$1.00 for each member and 31 have already completed their quota. The \$10.00 contributions are credited to the Lodges of the donors and thus bring up the total donated. The key rings are in the Grand Lodge office and will be sent to any who sends in a check for \$10.00 or more. This program has been very well received.

There have been no Lodge Dedications this year, but several new lodge temples are being built and I expect the coming year will bring several dedications.

I was invited to attend the Imperial Shrine Session in Boston last July and since the Imperial Potentate was our own Dick Olfene, they pulled out all the stops for your Grand Master. I had a car and a driver and attended all of the many functions, including a private concert by the Boston Pops Orchestra. We visited the Boston Burns Unit and participated in two parades, one in the daytime and one at night. The Mayor of Boston told me that over a million Bostonites saw the parades according to police estimates. The 33° of the Northern Jurisdiction of the Scottish Rite was also held in Boston during the last week of September and we were again invited to attend. It was indeed a pleasure for me to see some of my good friends receive this high honor.

The Maine Mason, one of the finest of Masonic periodicals, has several times been singled out as one of the leading Masonic Magazines in the United States. Under the able leadership of M. W. Charles Glassmire and Wor. Arthur Griffiths, every Mason in Maine is able to read what is going on in Masonry here in Maine and in the World. The quality of the articles continues to be of the finest.

A new newspaper has been born in the Southern part of the State and it is called "The Voice of the Bee." It is struggling along, but is gradually gaining strength. It covers several of the Southern Districts and several thousand Masons living in those Districts. One of the best features is a calendar of events of the various Lodges in these Districts and gives the Brethren a chance to plan visitations to Lodges other than their own. I would urge all of you who receive "The Voice of the Bee" to use it to your advantage and to the Secretaries or Masters of these lodges, please send in your calendar well in advance so it can be published. Cooperation is needed and is most essential for the life of this project.

The History of the Grand Lodge of Maine ends with the year 1970 and I have appointed Wor. Wallace M. Gage as a Committee of One to bring this history up to date. It may be well to be thinking about a new Grand

Lodge officer with the name of Grand Lodge Historian. Such an officer could keep the History up to date. This would require an amendment to the Constitution, so I have appointed Wally as an Ad Hoc Committee to bring us up to date in the meantime. The Committee on Lodge History has prepared an excellent report on how to make up a Lodge History and this will be sent to all Lodges in the near future.

I have many people to thank for their help during my first year as your Grand Master. The Past Grand Masters for their advice, many of my Brethren for their suggestions and above all those two ladies in the grand Lodge office, Lib Tupper and Gracie Field. They helped me when I first became grand Secretary and have been a big help ever since. To Ed George for his support and the excellent work he has done in bringing the Grand Lodge office up to date with Microfilming and indexing. To Bruce Tornquist for keeping me in line and also his good advice. To my officers who followed me so faithfully to my District Meetings and who always show up in the most unexpected places to support me.

Lastly, but far from the least, I owe so much to my good wife that were it not for her, I would not be standing here before you today. I know most of you have a faithful, patient and helpful wife, so you know whereof I speak.

And now, my Brethren, the conclusion. I've had a very happy year and I look forward to another one. God bless you all.

REPORT OF ACCOUNTANTS AND AUDITORS

We have examined the statements of assets, liabilities and fund balances arising from cash transactions of the Grand Lodge of Maine, A.F. & A.M. at March 31, 1985, and the related statements of operating receipts, disbursements and changes in fund balances for the year then ended. BRUCE STEVENS TORNQUIST

He retired from this last position on April 30, 1975. Bruce is a member of the Long Island, Maine Civic Association and has been Treasurer since 1968. He is also a member of Citizens Who Care, Inc. (Environmental Group) and has been Treasurer of that group since 1970. He is a member of the Universalist Church.

Brother Bruce was raised in Deering Lodge No. 183 on May 7, 1951, was Worshipful Master in 1964 and has been Secretary since 1970. He was exalted in Mt. The Grand Secretary's Report was presented, accepted and referred to the Committee on Doings of Grand Officers.

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine:

This year has been one of mixed emotions. Frustration, aggravation and especially impatience have at times hampered our sense of urgency but it has not curtailed our enthusiasm or tenacity. Innovations and equipment provided by our Finance Committee have greatly improved our ability to provide services, material and information above and beyond our normal requirements. For example, Lodge annual reports were received and recorded well ahead of normal schedules.

We have:

Adopted procedures that have enabled us to identify and address areas never before open to our limited retrieval capability. We are now able to document the names of applicants that have never advanced in their degrees.

Adopted a modified version of a questionnaire, utilized by the Grand Lodge of Colorado, that discusses reasons why the above individuals did not wish to advance in Masonry. Our Deputy Grand Master has set his sights on conceivably reducing, if not eliminating our suspended N.P.D. members.

Encouraged Lodges to include the Grand Lodge Office in their Trestle Board distribution list. This office, by virtue of its location in the organizational structure, is a virtual storehouse of data and general information. The Grand Secretary and staff are here to provide support and address your needs.

Adopted a Service Letter System. As we continue to maintain custody and distribution of all manuals, it behooved us to establish a procedure whereby individual detail sheets, such as those included within the above documents may be photocopied, serialized and distributed singly in lieu of the entire manual. A valuable saving in labor, paper and postage.

Continued to interchange lists of our Sojourners residing in other Grand Jurisdictions, a practice that is proving to be an effective method of recognizing the possible need for assistance to sojourners of both jurisdictions. Our sincere appreciation to Brother Lawrence Hathorne for his immediate response and visits to Special Ladies, shut-ins and sojourners in the Auburn/Lewiston hospitals, nursing homes and private homes. A tremendous service rendered.

Accepted the high quality suggestions and cooperation from the many Lodge Secretaries. This year seminars were held in (6) Masonic Districts. All have been well attended. The personal involvement has been encouraging and enlightening. The First District seminar, held at Presque Isle, was outstanding. Every Lodge Secretary and Worshipful Master (100%) participated in a Saturday afternoon "round table" discussion. A "tip of the hat" to R. W. Lou Greenier, D.D.G.M. and R. W. N. James Coolong, our Grand Lecturer. Equally productive sessions were held in the 6th District (R. W. Merrill Megquier), 5th District (R. W. David C. Morrill), 14th District (R. W. Bruce Heywood), 18th District (R. W. Lawrence N. Davis), 19th District (R. W. Stephen C. Kemp), 12th District, (R. W. Bruce A. Hutchins).

Received Code Books from other Grand Jurisdictions. They are being scanned for content, meaningful numbering systems, format, etc. It is felt that a standard numbering system would be a tremendous assist to all users. Recent issues include excellent documents from Tennessee, California and Vermont, to name a few.

Scanned Annual Proceedings from all sources. Addresses, orations, provocative issues, jurisprudence, Masonic trials, life memberships, etc., etc., are photocopied, serialized and placed in files for ready reference. All periodicals receive the same review. Admittedly we have only scratched the surface but "hope springs eternal." Someday our vision of a state-wide Masonic Library may become a reality.

Rearranged our security vault. File cabinets installed, the entire vault painted and inventory lists updated. Lodge histories have been separated from envelope folders that also contain by-laws and miscellaneous documents. Histories are now readily accountable, scanned and refilled with a minimum loss of time and space.

The cooperation and responses from other Grand Jurisdictions continues to amaze and please me. It is terrific. The annual Grand Secretaries' Conference, by virtue of the continuity of its members, is truly an outstanding and productive meeting of provocative issues, ideas and meaningful dialog, one that cements a common bond between Grand Jurisdictions.

Scheduled items:

Microfilming inactive files - scheduled completion date, June 1985.

Secretary's Manual - scheduled completion date - October, 1985.

Form Revision Program - continuing function.

Computer Installation - held in abeyance - needs have been defined. Collapse in the public demand could conceivably produce price reductions. Preparation of a standard system for Lodges being considered. Utilizing expertise of several existing installations.

Secretaries' seminars - planned for each district. Presiding secretaries are providing excellent information, improvements, working documents, etc. A terrific assist to our new secretaries, one that will lessen "take over" problems resulting from illness, retirements, etc. Further, it has fostered a greater rapport between Lodge Secretaries.

As to our Staff - Mrs. Field, Mrs. Tupper and Bruce Tornquist, our Grand Treasurer, we are truly indebted. May God bless and guide them always.

GRAND LECTURER

To the Most Worshipful Grand Master, Officers, and Brethren of M. W. Grand Lodge of Maine:

The time has arrived to review with you our work within the Craft during the past Masonic year - a time to examine the areas in which we need to be more successful, and a time to evaluate our efforts and set goals for the coming Masonic year.

It is our Masonic duty to be sure our candidates are properly educated, but before we can presume to provide that education through our degrees, we must be certain we, ourselves, understand what we are trying to teach. We cannot expect a new brother to feel an obligation to the fraternity if we do not fulfill our duties to him, and it is up to us to bring him to understand, at least partially, the depth and beauty of Masonic symbolism as taught by the ritual.

Attention to detail, careful study, a willingness to work hard, and perform good work are among the qualities of a Freemason; let us, therefore, use these to perform the work of the Craft with the spirit of the Craftsmen. In accordance with the Constitution and under the direction of the M.W. Grand Master, three ritualistic Schools of Instruction were held in each of the twenty-four (24) districts by your Grand Lecturer and the six (6) Assistant Grand Lecturers.

Tabulation of Schools

The following table is the tabulation of the registration at the various District Schools of Instruction. The numbers in parenthesis indicate the number of lodges from the District in attendance at that particular School of Instruction. The rightmost percent column indicates the percentage of officer attendance at the three (3) ritualistic schools from that district.

This year total attendance was down by 8.2 per cent. The average officer attendance at the three (3) ritualistic schools dropped from 32.5 percent to 30.7. We have been experiencing a gradual decline in the percentage of officer attendance. In studying the summary sheets from the schools. I am alarmed by the number of principal officers from several districts which are not attending. When the Master and Wardens are consistently absent, one cannot help but wonder if the Craft is suffering "for want of proper instruction."

Last year it was necessary to report four lodges had not been represented at any school in their district; this year, there are seven I am unhappy to report - three of these are repeats. Those lodges not represented by any of its officers at any school of the ritualistic Schools of Instruction are as follows:

Officer attendance ranged from 47.6 percent in District 6 to 19.2 percent in District 11. Far better than average attendance was obtained in Districts 1, 2, 4, 5, 6, 14, and 19. The Sixth District for the second year in a row, had a perfect record, having been represented by all eleven (11) lodges at each school. We commend the officers of these districts for their fine record and dedication to their lodges and Freemasonry.

The success of the schools depend on the work, interest, and effort of many brethren. We express our special thanks to the District Deputies for sending the cards notifying officers of the schools, and those who help in various ways to make the schools successful.

District Educational Meetings

A District Educational Meeting was conducted in each of the 24 Districts. These non-ritualistic meetings focus on topics of general interest, and information, and are intended for all brethren, not just officers of a lodge. A letter was sent by your Grand Lecturer to each lodge encouraging them to attend and informing the lodges of the agenda for these meetings.

The agenda was prepared and outlined for the Grand Lecturer and the staff. We wish to thank R. W. Bro. Walter Macdougall for the outline he prepared for the presentation by the District Representative, and the outline on Characteristics of a Good Leader. This Grand Lodge is fortunate to have such a dedicated Mason to chair the Committee on Masonic Education and Lodge Service.

Each Assistant Lecturer had latitude with the topics and was assisted by the Deputy and District Representative and other brethren from the Districts. The program this year included the following topics:

- A. Candidate and New Master Mason Instruction Presented by District Representative
- B. What Makes a Good Leader?
Characteristics with Ritual Sources
- C. 1. The Committee of Inquiry - Its Duties and Responsibilities
2. How Do We Ballot?
- D. A Masonic Short Talk - History, Philosophy, Symbolism

These District Educational Meetings were well received and they are fun to conduct. It is amazing the amount of discussion they generate. There is not always 100 percent agreement, but if we generate Masonic thinking we are moving toward our goal. Hopefully these meetings provide the brethren with good instruction, if not, I expect I will hear from the Grand Master.

Table Lodges

The Grand Master has issued twenty (20) Dispensations during the year for the purpose of holding Table Lodges. In compliance with my duties, I have appointed a Grand Lodge Representative to attend. Some lodges have requested certain brethren to be their Representative and the Grand Master has appointed some Grand Representatives himself. I have continued to send a letter to each lodge informing them as to who has been appointed their Grand Lodge Representative, and asking them to include him on the printed program, and provide appropriate time for him to bring official greetings from the Grand Master and the M. W. Grand Lodge of Maine. Reports received indicate the Table Lodges are being conducted according to the Ritual and the brethren enjoy the good fellowship.

Degree Teams

There have been eleven (11) authorized Degree Teams performing ritualistic work within this Grand Jurisdiction the past year. I have authorized these Teams to perform ritualistic work in accordance with the policy established by Grand Lodge in 1960, and their permission is valid until May 7, 1985. Reports indicate the Teams have done excellent work and always promote good attendance. They do much to foster visitation in our Lodges. For example, during early March the Maine State Police Degree Team were at Fort Kent Lodge to do the Master Mason degree on one of their fellow officers, and there were more than 100 brethren in attendance at our most northern lodge. A sincere thanks to those so freely giving to the Craft their time, energy, and talent. A list of approved Teams is as follows:

Their first year has been a learning experience and they have done a great job. Arno Day is completing his tour of duty. It has been a great pleasure to work with Arno. He is a super Mason, and has done an excellent job in the districts he has served. I will miss him. To veteran members: R. W. Gerald C. Pickard and R. W. Reginald Wing, I consider it a privilege to work with such great Masons. To each I offer my sincerest thanks for excellent work, dedication, and their complete cooperation.

The staff met twice during the year for full day work sessions. The meetings proved very helpful and insure our presentation is consistent and uniformity of the ritual is preserved.

Recommendation

I recommend that the official inspection report form be amended to provide space to record attendance of the officers at Schools of Instruction, and that this be considered as a

factor in the total evaluation of the rating given the lodge at inspection. It is difficult to imagine a lodge which has not had a single officer present at any school of instruction for two or more years, receiving a rating of excellent.

Conclusion

May I express my sincerest fraternal thanks to all who have contributed to the success of our Schools of Instruction.

We offer appreciation and thanks to the District Deputies for promoting the Schools and the encouragement they give the Lodges. Without this effort we would not have been nearly as successful.

To the Most Worshipful Grand Master—my deep thanks for the faith and trust you have placed with me. It has been my pleasure and privilege to serve my brethren and our Grand Lodge.

An active church and civic leader, Bro. Carpenter is a member and former deacon of the First Baptist Church, Middletown, PA. He is a past president of the Pennsylvania Baptist Convention and has served on various national committees for the American Baptist Convention.

He served as auditor for the Borough of Upland for several years and was a member and the secretary of the Upland Borough School Authority from 1952 to 1982.

He has been a member of the Board of Directors of the Delaware County Branch, Pennsylvania Association for the Blind, since 1950 and has served as a trustee for the Pennsylvania Association.

A past Master of Chester Lodge No. 236, Bro. Carpenter is also a member of Chester Royal Arch Chapter No. 258, Excelsior Mark Lodge No. 216, Riblah Council No. 59 and Chester Commandery No. 66, Knights Templar.

A member of the Valley of Philadelphia, A.A.S.R. and a past Most Wise Master of Kilwinning Chapter of Rose Croix, he was coroneted an Honorary Thirty-Third Degree Mason in 1969.

He is also a member of Lu Lu Temple, A.A.O.N.M.S. and was made a Tall Cedar at sight.

Other Masonic affiliations include DelVal Council No. 60, Allied Masonic Degrees; Arin Council No. 6, Knight Masons, U.S.A.; the Pennsylvania College, Societas Rosicruciana; the High Council, S.R.I.C.F.; Grand College of Rites, U.S.A.; The Philaethes Society, and several lodges of research.

He was awarded the Honorary Legion of Honor by the Supreme Council, International Order of DeMolay, and received the Christopher Champlin Medal from the Grand Lodge of Rhode Island.

Bro. Carpenter is married to the former Dorothy Taylor Roberts of Upland.

GREENLEAF MEDAL

The Grand Master asked the Grand Marshal to escort Brother Maurice L. Hutchins to the East where he presented him with a Simon Greenleaf Medal. Bro. Hutchins responded with appropriate remarks and thanked the Grand Master for the honor conferred upon him.

MAURICE LEROY HUTCHINS

Maurice Leroy Hutchins, known to his friends as "Hutch", was born on November 6, 1916 in Boothbay Harbor, Maine. He attended the Boothbay Harbor schools and for four

years walked 5 miles each way to school, in all that time missing only one day. When asked about this he replied "nobody's perfect." As a boy he dug clams and sold them at 35c a bushel.

After graduating from the Boothbay schools he worked for the Rice Brothers until he was drafted into World War II. Hutch was in the 718th Railroad Battalion in England, France and Luxemburg, Germany, serving overseas for three years. Upon his return he was employed by Bath Iron Works for 28 years, retiring in 1978.

Hutch is married to Rachel Macpherson Hamilton and over the years acquired a daughter, 3 grandsons and a granddaughter, all of whom live in Cape Elizabeth. Hutch and Rachel are members of the United Church of Christ in Bath.

Maurice Hutchins was initiated on June 18, 1956, Passed on October 1, 1956 and Raised to the Sublime Degree of a Master Mason on November 12, 1956 in Solar Lodge No. 14, Bath. He went through the chairs from 1957 to 1965 and became Master in 1966. He is also an honorary member of Polar Star Lodge No. 114 in Bath. Hutch is a member of Montgomery & St. Bernard Royal Arch Chapter No. 2 and Dunlap Commandery No. 5, both of Bath; Mount Vernon Council No. 2 of Brunswick; Oxford Lodge No. 1, Ark Mariners of Norway, the 14th District Masters and Wardens Association, Bath Masonic Building Association, and Genesta Chapter No. 76, Order of the Eastern Star.

Brother Hutch received the Outstanding Masonic Award from the 14th District Masters and Wardens Association, of which he is a Past President. He was President of the Bath Masonic Building Association for four and a half years and did an outstanding job. He was also instrumental in the Association's very successful Endowment Fund. He has been the only Chairman of the Endowment Fund and in three years over \$49,000 has been raised. He has completely catalogued all books in the Building Association Library and is the Librarian for Solar Lodge and the Building Association. This has become his present hobby. In Dunlap Commandery he has been their Recorder for the last three years and has been doing work far above and beyond the call of duty.

Brother Hutch is presently the Lodge Chairman for the Blood Program in Solar lodge, the Assistant Grand Lodge Program Chairman and is now also serving the Grand Lodge as Grand Senior Deacon.

To the Brethren who know him, Hutch is a hard worker, always ready, willing and able to assist and never one to say "No", no matter how he feels. For his dedication to Masonry and his outstanding service to his Lodge, the Grand Lodge of Maine and for his devotion to his family, the Grand Lodge of Maine is most happy to award him the Simon Greenleaf Medal.

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine:

This year's numerical loss of 690 was slightly higher than last year, the percentage being 1.85.

At the close of the calendar year, the total membership was 36,649. Thirty-six lodges reported a gain in membership, 148 a loss and 16 remained the same.

Hiram Lodge No. 180 remains the largest with a membership of 823. Naskeag No. 171 remains the smallest with 42 members. Tyrian No. 73 shows the largest gain (8), while Triangle No. 1 suffered the greatest loss (47). Average membership is 183.2 and 49 lodges report fewer than 100 members.

There were 541 raised, 114 affiliated, 91 reinstated, 171 demitted, 329 suspended N.P.D. and 933 deceased.

RESOLUTIONS - PROPOSED

M. W. Roger P. Snelling presented the following proposed amendment to the Constitution from the floor, which was rejected.

Be it resolved that the mailing list or names of members of this Grand Lodge be not communicated in any manner, to any person or persons without the full consent of the members of the Finance Committee.

If full consent by the Finance Committee is obtained then a certified letter shall be obtained from party or parties using such list, stating that it shall not be copied in any manner for further use.

Be it further resolved that inasmuch as this list is the property of the Grand Lodge of Maine that it not be furnished to Trans National Travel or any other travel agency for the purpose of promoting funds for the George Washington Memorial until all particulars and correspondence relative to this venture be reviewed at the next meeting of the Finance Committee.

The word "particulars" shall be determined as follows—Remuneration to the George Washington Memorial or any person or organization. Other jurisdictions participating and the manner in which their membership list shall be handled and used by the contracted tour operator, shall be ascertained by the Finance Committee before their final decision in every case.

FIFTY-YEAR VETERAN'S MEDAL

The Grand Master called upon M. W. C. Ross Buzzell to approach the East where he presented M. W. Brother Aubrey L. Burbank with his Fifty Year Veteran's Medal. Bro. Burbank responded with appropriate remarks and thanked his long time friend, Bro. Buzzell, for presenting his Fifty-year Medal to him.

At 4:30 p.m. the Grand Lodge was called from Labor to Refreshment until 9:00 a.m. Wednesday, May 8, 1985 at Corinthian Hall. Bro. Lawrence W. Hathorne, Grand Chaplain offered the closing prayer.

JURISPRUDENCE

M. W. M. Donald Gardner, for the Jurisprudence Committee, presented the following report, which was not accepted.

In Grand Lodge
Portland, Maine
May 8, 1985

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine:

The Committee on Jurisprudence to which have been referred those portions of the Grand Master's Address dealing with "Decisions" and "Dispensations" report as follows:

All dispensations granted are within the constitutional powers and prerogatives of the Grand Master, and the Committee recommends their approval.

1. The Grand Master's decision to permit the use of the Charity Funds of Constituent Lodges for the Widows Program including banquets for widows does not conform to the long established Masonic Law adopted and followed by this Grand Lodge for decades. The basic principle underlying Masonic Charity has been relief of the poor and distressed. This is clearly stated in the Constitution and reaffirmed on several occasions in decisions approved by Grand Lodge.

The only exception to the use of charity funds for other than Masonic charitable purposes as above defined was made by legislative action of the Grand Lodge when it adopted Standing Regulation 56 permitting contributions to the DeMolay and Pine Tree Youth Foundation.

The Committee, therefore, recommends that this decision not be approved.

2. The Grand Master's decision to permit special communications on the Sabbath for the purposes of the installation of Lodge officers is contrary to Masonic Law and practice and in direct contravention of the law established by Grand Lodge in 1980. See Grand Lodge Proceeding 1980 for the same decision thereon at Page 581, and approved by Grand Lodge at Page 620.

Accordingly, the Committee recommends that this decision not be approved.

3. The decision of the Grand Master concerning the use of the Wayfaring Man in the second section of the Third Degree is not supported by the Constitution or Standing Regulations. In fact, since 1895 the wearing of robes by the officers of a lodge has been prohibited. See 1895 Proceedings, Page 176, and the approval thereof by the Grand Lodge in 1896 at Page 71 of the Proceedings for that year.

The use of the Wayfaring Man had been prohibited for several years until the vote of Grand Lodge in 1982 permitted optional use thereof under direction of the Committee on Ritual. See Page 241 of the 1982 Proceedings. That vote did not authorize the use of costumes or robes and therefore the legislation adopted by the Grand Lodge remains valid and unrescinded.

Accordingly, the Committee recommends that this decision not be approved.

4. The Committee does not concur with the Grand Master's decision allowing the use of a joint trestleboard with an appendant body. This is directly contrary to the established law of this Grand Lodge. The issue has been raised twice in recent years. In 1979 and again in 1980. On each occasion the Grand Lodge determined that joint trestleboards were improper.

The Committee, therefore, recommends that this decision not be approved.

The Committee on Jurisprudence adheres to its statement made in 1980. A law once adopted by the action of Grand Lodge may be interpreted by a decision of the Grand Master, but he cannot revise or revoke the law so established. To effect a change in Masonic Law, once established by Grand Lodge, can only be done pursuant to the amending Section 137 of the Constitution or by the proposal of a Standing Regulation favorably acted upon by Grand Lodge.

5. The Grand Master's decision permitting the use of the printed ballot by constituent lodges is in accord with the practices and procedures of Grand Lodge and the Committee recommends its approval.

6. The Committee recommends approval of the Grand Master's decision concerning dual membership. Residence of the applicant is pertinent only at the time of petitioning for degree or affiliation.

7. The Committee on Masonic Jurisprudence considers the Grand Master's decision on Solicitation an opinion subject to misinterpretation and should not be adopted by the Grand Lodge as a decision. The words "neutrally worded approach" and the word "offer" may be easily misconstrued.

It has been the longstanding custom, tradition and practice to prohibit proselytizing. It has been expected that a person would petition of his own free will and accord, uninfluenced by oral representations made by a member.

If it is deemed desirable to establish guidelines or to define what is or is not permissible in the act of solicitation, than it is the opinion of this Committee that it should be done by legislative action of Grand Lodge. The matter should be referred to an appropriate committee for study and the drafting of appropriate language and guidelines to be presented to Grand Lodge for action.

The Committee, therefore, recommends that this decision not be approved.

DeMOLAY

Bro. Clyde L. Ferris, Executive Officer in Maine for DeMolay, read the following report, which was accepted.

In Grand Lodge
Portland, Maine
May 8, 1985

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine:

It has been just over a year that I was fortunate of being appointed the Executive Officer in Maine of the Order of DeMolay, the largest and best fraternal youth organization in the world for young men.

When I gave my report to this Grand Lodge last year, I stated that my two main priorities were membership and chapter development with a very close third priority of improving Masonic Relations to educate Masons about the Order of DeMolay while educating DeMolays about the Masonic Fraternity.

This has been an excellent year for Chapter Development and with development of chapters comes an increase in Membership. We have made progress in both of these areas this year and have set the pace for future years. We started the year with 9 active chapters. We now have 11 active chapters and several other areas ready to start new chapters. We have helped several existing chapters to reorganize and they are now stronger chapters. Our new chapter last year, Springvale Chapter is doing well and we are re-activating Forest City Chapter of Portland. On March 31st, we instituted our newest chapter, that being Houlton Chapter. Their Advisory Council has 19 Master Masons and/or Senior DeMolays and they had 36 young men initiated into DeMolay. This was one of the most rewarding events I have witnessed since being involved in DeMolay. I understand they have received eight more petitions since then.

There is very strong interest in re-activating Skowhegan Chapter and North Star Chapter in Caribou and starting new Chapters in Presque Isle, Waterville, Rockland and Westbrook. In addition to these, we want chapters in Millinocket, Lincoln, the Milo-Dover Foxcroft area, Calais, Machias, Ellsworth, Belfast, Bridgton, the Norway-South Paris area, Livermore Falls and the Biddeford-Saco area. At one time, Maine had a total of 30 chapters. Our speaker at the Banquet Monday night said it is alright to have dreams. Well, I am dreaming of the day when we will again have 30 active DeMolay Chapters in Maine, and brethren, we **will** have 30 chapters and it won't be too long from now.

On Masonic Relations, we have been fortunate to have space in practically every Masonic publication published in Maine. We have been given very good coverage in these publications.

Pine Tree Priory has been re-activated and is a very active organization. The Priory is for young men who have been active in DeMolay, who are Past Master Councilors or are between the ages of 16 and 21 which normally would be lost, however, by keeping them active in Priory until they reach the age of 21, they are more apt to join Freemasonry. Over 50% of DeMolays become Master Masons. . . More than 150 DeMolays have become Grand Masters of Grand Lodges and over 250 DeMolays have attained the 33rd Degree in Freemasonry.

State Master Councilor Wayne Lobley presided over a very successful Conclave last June which was held on the campus of Bates College in Lewiston, Maine. State Councilors elected and installed for 1984-1985 were as follows: State Master Councilor, Mark E. Ryder; Deputy State Master Councilor, Ernest V. Kneeland; State Senior Councilor, Christopher J. Ragno; and State Junior Councilor, Gregory D. Stevens.

The State Softball Tournament was held in July and again was won by Valley Chapter of West Buxton. The DeMolay Field Day sponsored by Kora Temple and put on by Lake

Region Shrine Club was held on Sunday following the State Softball Tournament and was again very successful.

We had a "DeMolay Night At The Ballpark" in Old Orchard Beach and watched Maine's new Triple A baseball team, the Maine Guides beat the Syracuse Blue Jays. This Maine DeMolay Fund Raiser was such a success, that we are having the Second Annual "DeMolay Day At The Ballpark" on Sunday afternoon, June 23rd. I hope many of you can attend the game.

The social highlight of the DeMolay year was again the State DeMolay Sweetheart Pageant held on April 27th at Kora Temple. Miss Kimberly Stacy, representing William Whipple Chapter of Kittery was crowned State DeMolay Sweetheart. The Pageant was followed by the Sweetheart Ball honoring the new DeMolay State Sweetheart.

We have recruited more Masonic brethren and Senior DeMolays to help us in our efforts to make Maine DeMolay continue to grow. If we are going to see our dream come true, however, we desperately need more help in manpower.

Kora Temple has given us assistance by forming the Kora DeMolay Council. The purposes and objectives of this Council are:

1. To provide and train a pool of Advisors capable of founding new Chapters and to serve in temporary and permanent positions as necessary.
2. To create and develop new DeMolay Chapters.
3. To promote the Order of DeMolay.
4. To recruit members and leaders of Maine DeMolay.
5. To participate in fund raising for the Order.
6. Support DeMolay functions and activities, such as Shrine/DeMolay Field Day, DeMolay State Sweetheart Pageant, DeMolay/Rainbow Dances, Shrine Hospital visitations, provide transportation and participate in Parades promoting DeMolay.

MASONIC EDUCATION AND LODGE SERVICE

R. W. Walter M. Macdougall, for the Committee on Masonic Education and Lodge Service, presented the following report which was accepted.

In Grand Lodge
Portland, Maine
May 8, 1985

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine:

For the Committee on Masonic Education and Lodge Service, the past year has been one of experimentation, evaluation, organization and renewed effort to assist the Craft in meeting Masonic challenges in this era of challenges.

Again, three major objectives have been paramount in the labors of this Committee and its District Representatives: namely, Masonic education for new Masons and members with longer standing, sound training in Masonic leadership and the support of those programs of service by which the tenets of Freemasonry may become a reality.

Training Programs

We have held two area seminars and four district-cluster meetings. We have also participated in the formulation and presentation of the twenty-four District Educational Schools. These two seminars were the Committee's first attempt to present extensive training in leadership, lodge program organization and motivational theory. The mode of presentation for these two seminars was purposefully different, thus giving the Committee a better grasp of effective means for presenting future seminars.

The Committee is indebted to Wor. Brother Carl Trynor for conducting the seminar held in Auburn and for his counsel and the expertise given to the Committee. Special thanks also go to the members of the Committee and to Brother and Dr. Theodore Vrooman, who joined in presenting the seminar held in Bangor.

The district-cluster meetings were designed to give fuller explanation and demonstrations of our revised education program for candidates and new Master Masons. The work of the demonstration team, headed by R. W. Bro. Wilbur Loveitt and staffed by brethren of District Fourteen, illustrates what can be accomplished by such demonstrations.

The increasing cooperation and coordination of the Committee's efforts and those of the Grand Lecturer and his Assistants has been evident in the planning and presentation of the District Educational Schools. This united effort has been achieved through the energy and dedication of our Grand Lecturer, R. W. James Coolong and the Assistant Grand Lecturers, District Deputies and the District Representatives, all of whom have ably shouldered their responsibilities.

Publications

R. W. Brothers Clyde Ross and Charles Plummer, together with the Committee Chairman, have revised *The Instructors Manual*. This revised draft has been read by M. W. Brothers Charles Crossland and Roger White, acting as editorial readers. This manual is being printed.

A *Lodge Officers Manual* has been published and distributed to masters and wardens of the lodges within this Jurisdiction. This excellent tool is the work of R. W. Brothers Reginald Wing and James Coolong. R. W. Bro. Reggie's service to the Craft in the producing of this manual extends beyond its compilation. Through his efforts the manual was printed at very small cost to the Grand Lodge.

R. W. Brothers Charles Plummer, James Coolong and Reginald Wing are presently working on a *Guide for District Deputies*. At this time a preliminary guide has been printed. This guide will greatly assist new District Deputies in preparing for the duties of their office while providing a format for coordination of the efforts between the Deputies and other Grand Lodge Officers.

The Committee has continued to publish its bi-monthly newsletter, *Parallel Lines*. This newsletter is now being mailed to the District Deputies, Assistant Grand Lecturers and the District Representatives. The newsletter will continue to be the Committee's communicator in our effort to establish a team effort among the field officers of Grand Lodge.

Surveys

As fellows of the Craft, the members of this Committee have endeavored to present an attentive ear to the perceived needs of the brethren as well as offer an instructive tongue. Two surveys, designed by R. W. Bro. Charles Plummer, and widely distributed by the District Deputies and District Representatives, have been conducted this year. The first survey polled lodge officers, to find the areas of lodge leadership and motivational training

most desired. The results of this survey have been compiled by the Committee and will be utilized in planning future seminars and schools. The second survey, which is still in progress, is designed to give data on the effect of our revised program in candidate and new Master Mason education.

Special Programs

(1) *Masonic Education for the Candidates and New Master Masons:*

Evaluative data collected thus far, demonstrates that wherever this program is being provided, whether in part or in whole, the benefits to both individuals and the Craft are great.

While much is left to be done in promoting this program, in providing greater support and in the training of instructors, an important fact has been established. A growing dedication to the Fraternity is awakened wherever candidates have been assisted in a search for understanding amidst a fellowship of concerned brethren.

(2) *Advanced Masonic Education:*

The Advanced Masonic Education Program is under the direction of R. W. Bro. Ernest Curtis. Four districts have established this program: the 9th District with R. W. Bro. Arthur Frieder serving as coordinator; the 14th District with R. W. Bro. Raymond Boyden coordinator; the 19th District with R. W. Bro. Stephen Kemp coordinator, and the 23rd District with Robert Damon as coordinator. The 14th and 19th Districts have now completed the first cycle of study topics. Attendance at these advanced study groups has been excellent, with a high figure of sixty brethren. Average attendance for the five meetings held in the 14th District was 36. R. W. Bro. Ernie presented thirty-two certificates to brothers having attended all five meetings in the present cycle.

The Committee expresses its gratitude to the following brothers who have acted as presentors: M. W. Bros. Paul Powers (philosophy), M. Donald Gardner (jurisprudence) and Charles Glassmire (jurisprudence and leadership); R. W. Bros. Alfred Neff (symbolism), Ernest Curtis (jurisprudence and history), John Anagnostis (philosophy) and W. Bro. Wallace Gage (history).

(3) *Lodges in Action and Care and Share Programs:*

These excellent and promising programs have been developed by R. W. Bro. Edwin George, and have been placed under his direction with the support of the members of the Committee. R. W. Bro. Ed's own report will cover the service and the progress of these programs.

(4) *Youth Support:*

The Committee's coordination with undertakings in support of DeMolay and Rainbow is under the direction of R. W. Wilbur Loveitt, whose service to the Craft and to youth has been Herculean. R. W. Bro. Wilbur has asked the District Representatives to organize visitations to DeMolay chapters and Rainbow assemblies and to encourage these youth organizations to present work in our Lodges. Reports from the District Representatives show that these suggestions have been carried out where possible and with much appreciated results.

(5) *Masonic Resources and Lodge Program Materials:*

R. W. Bro. John Anagnostis has been directing this phase of our service to the Lodges. Besides organizing our Speakers Bureau, R. W. Bro. John has been writing a feature for the *Maine Mason* as part of our attempt to keep Masons informed of programmatic materials and sources of Masonic information.

(6) *Coordination and Effective Teamwork:*

In our last committee meeting, considerable time was spent in analyzing and planning more effective means of uniting the labors of the District Representatives with those of the District Deputies and other Grand Lodge officers. As a result of these deliberations, a much more structured description of the District Representative's duties has been

developed. R. W. Bros. Clyde Ross and Wilbur Loveitt are presently developing further recommendations to be submitted to the Grand Master.

Recommendation:

The Committee submits the following recommendation for consideration by Grand Lodge:

Serious consideration be given to the need for a Grand Lodge Education and Lodge Service Officer who would work closely with lodge officers and educational coordinators and instructors under the direction of this Committee.

Commendations:

In conclusion of this report, we express our gratitude to the Grand Master, the Grand Secretary and the Grand Lodge office staff for their help and support. We would also like to express our thanks and high praise to the District Representatives who have given their full and indispensable support to our programs and to the District Deputies and many other brothers who have joined in these undertakings. Our expression of appreciation must be extended outside this Grand Jurisdiction to the Masonic Service Association and to Macoy Publishing Company, which have donated materials and books for display at our area seminars.

With our continued thanks for the opportunity of serving the Craft within this ancient and noble Fraternity—and with the conviction that the impossible becomes possible when the hearts of men are changed—

DISTRIBUTION OF THE CHARITY FUND

M. W. Peter C. Schmidt, for the Committee on Distribution of the Charity Fund, presented the following report, which was accepted.

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine:

Our Grand Lodge Charity Fund received 60 applications from 49 Lodges to which \$130,700 was granted during the fiscal year ended March 31, 1985. This is the largest amount ever paid by our Charity Fund in any fiscal year. The grants varied from \$200 to an exceptional \$7,500. Every application was carefully examined and the amount granted was fully justified and approved by the Trustees.

A question that bothers our Committee members at times is the value of the real estate which an application shows. It may be necessary in the future to give greater consideration to this phase of applications. Another point which may not be clearly understood is that Lodges may use their regular funds when their Charity Fund does not provide adequate relief to meet the needs.

The Charity Fund was pleased to give \$5,500 to the Masonic Service Association Hospital Program with an additional \$1,950 for related activities associated with this program.

The DeMolay and Pine Tree Youth Foundation received \$2,000 as compared to \$1,000 given in 1982-83. The Foundation was started in 1968 and now has assets in excess of \$200,000, all given by Masons and Masonic organizations.

Under our Grand Lodge regulations, the Charity Fund is required to pay the dues of U.S. Veterans who are financially unable to pay but who wish to keep their active status by vote of the Lodge of which he is a member. During the year ended March 31 we paid \$185 to five Lodges for the dues of seven members.

Since our Grand Lodge was founded in 1820, 165 years ago, we have paid \$2,314,355 to the several Lodges for relief. In addition the Lodges have paid from their funds a total of \$1,306,120 for a total of \$3,620,475. These figures are impressive.

Charity or Relief is a cornerstone of our great Fraternity. We hope to carry on the good work and to grant relief to an increasing number of members and others who need our assistance. We challenge the Lodges to be always on the alert to find those who hesitate to seek relief yet who merit our assistance.

We recommend that Lodges initiate an "every member canvass" of their membership, specifically those 60 years of age or over. We may be surprised at the number who need assistance, visitations, services etc. Let us return to being a real "caring Fraternity."

CONDITION OF THE FRATERNITY

R. W. Lewis E. Newell, for the Committee on Condition of the Fraternity, presented the following report, which was accepted.

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine:

Your standing committee on the "Condition of the Fraternity" has reviewed the reports of the District Deputy Grand Masters, as provided in Sec. 36, Par. 9 of the Grand Lodge Constitution.

Reports of District Deputies:

We have reviewed the individual lodge reports submitted by the District Deputies and the annual reports from each of the twenty-four districts.

Thirteen of these reports were very complete and contained the information needed to review lodge conditions in our jurisdiction. Nine were well done but left out some information, for example "Condition of Lodge buildings" and general conditions in their districts.

One report referred only to the numerous visits that were made in his district and adjoining districts. Another report was very brief, but contained the basic information necessary with the exception of condition of lodge property.

The District Deputies have been very active and report improvements in their districts with regard to degree work, masonic education, etc.

Several Deputies have made suggestions and recommendations as follows:

More thorough instruction should be given when transmitting the Grand Masonic Word.

Each new brother should be requested to learn the "Tyler's Oath" as well as his lesson within the sixty days.

Past District Deputies should be made "Permanent Members" with no expenses to Grand Lodge involved.

Suggestion made that Secretaries of lodges be informed to notify other bodies when a member is suspended for non-payment of dues.

More active participation in Masters and Wardens Associations.

Continuation of the Advanced Study of Freemasonry.

Lodge Inspection report forms should be redesigned so that they will be compatible with standard typewriters and that statistical information requested should be current.

A fund should be set up by Grand Lodge for all poor and distressed Lodges to draw from at low interest, for major repair of their temples.

Lodges should be advised to review their property insurance to make sure that there is adequate coverage.

Suggestion made that a special school of instruction be held for Lectures, especially those related to the Master Mason Degree.

The under-utilized Past Masters should be organized and assigned specific duties.

A simplified explanation, spelling out charity expectations, regulations and procedures is warranted.

Financial Conditions

Fifty lodges report outstanding dues of two hundred and fifty dollars or less, of these thirty have less than one hundred and fifty dollars, eight have less than fifty dollars and five have no outstanding dues. We would like to commend these lodge Secretaries for their accomplishments in keeping outstanding dues to a minimum.

It was noted that one lodge with 150 members had outstanding dues of over \$2,000 and another with 80 members had \$1,190 in arrears.

DeMolay and Rainbow

It was reported that DeMolay is back in Aroostook County with a Chapter at Houlton and two more Chapters being considered. Other districts report activities with the DeMolay and Rainbow Chapters and considerable support is being given in some areas.

Masonic Education and Educational Programs

The activities of District Representatives received very favorable comments by the District Deputies. Several references were made in regard to the Fourth Night Program and Advanced Study of Freemasonry. Both programs were highly recommended.

Most Schools of Instruction were well attended, but some were disappointing due to low attendance of those who are in real need of the instruction.

The "Pilot" Lodge Program is functioning in some areas.

Outstanding Meetings

A Master Mason Degree exemplified by the Maine State Police Degree Team at Fort Kent with over one hundred in attendance.

An International Night "to be held" at Lewy's Island Lodge in Princeton, Maine. Most Worshipful Peter C. Schmidt and Most Worshipful Gordon Coffey of New Brunswick are expected to be present. Eastern Lodge #7 will have a 75 year member in July and is planning a Special Night for the occasion.

Jonesport Lodge #188 observed their 100th Anniversary on October 26th with a very good attendance including R. W. Bro. Frieder, Junior Grand Warden.

There are several special events in the 5th District and were very well attended.

Two special events were noted in the 6th District when W. Merle Bradford of Olive Branch Lodge was presented his 50-year veterans medal and a Secretary's Service Pen for 28 years of service. Also when a Reception was given by Lynde Lodge for R. W. Linwood Littlefield who retired as Secretary after thirty years.

A Reception for R. W. William Oliver, Senior Grand Warden, was given by Mechanics Lodge on March 23rd.

A One Hundred Fiftieth Anniversary of Knox Lodge was noted in the Ninth District.

A Master Mason's Degree at Augusta Lodge by Past Grand Officers with excellent attendance.

On June 18th, 1984, Waterville Lodge raised a **fraternal** brother who is one of five brothers, each of whom has been raised in lodge by their father.

A Table Lodge was held on July 20th in District #16 for M. W. Peter C. Schmidt. Also on October 21st, the Ninth Annual Masonic/Eastern Star Sunday was held in South Paris with M. W. Peter Schmidt and his wife Olive present. Other heads of bodies were also present.

The 17th District celebrated George Washington's Birthday by exemplifying the Master Mason Degree with full colonial costumes.

Kora Kraftsmen degree team reportedly was very impressive at Kemankeag Lodge #213. Several Widow's Nights were held throughout the Jurisdiction.

Masters and Warden's or Officers Associations

The Districts that have active associations appear to benefit considerably by their existence.

Ritual

One lodge was given a "Poor" rating, six were reported as "Fair" and one was not rated as degree work was not performed. Thirty-four lodges were given "Excellent" ratings, eighty-four had "Very Good" ratings and all others were given "Good" ratings.

Masonic Widows—Caring and Sharing

Considerable activity was reported and numerous Special Ladies Nights were held. Some mention was made of the Care and Share Programs and in selected areas was very active.

Charity Funds

Thirty-one lodge inspection reports did not indicate that Charity Funds existed but in several instances charity was practiced by voluntary donations or physical assistance such as sawing and splitting wood.

The lodge inspection reports indicated that three hundred and eighty-six persons were assisted during the last year. This is certainly very commendable. It was also noted that some lodges with large charity funds had not used any of their funds during the last year.

General Conditions

Eastport Lodge #7 is looking for a site on which to build a new lodge hall.

Marine Lodge #122 is building a new lodge hall and expects it to be completed in September 1985.

Other activities concerning building either in planning stages or in progress were also reported.

A few lodges are weak and are struggling to keep going. The District Deputies are working with these lodges by offering their assistance where needed.

Summary

Your committee was **impressed** by the reported **successes** of the Advance Study Groups, Fourth Night Program and Pilot Lodges.

We also noted that Districts with the Traveling Gavel Program are experiencing greater attendance and interest in their meetings.

Recommendations

1. The recommendations and suggestions made by the District Deputy Grand Masters should be reviewed by the appropriate Grand Lodge Committees.
2. The District Deputies should be commended for the quality of the reports submitted this year. We would be remiss if we did not recognize the extra effort by the Deputies in the 19th and 23rd Districts in submitting supplementary information with their individual lodge reports.
3. We suggest that written guidelines be provided for newly elected District Deputies with references to the preparation of their annual report.

During the past few months this committee has been charged with the preparation of material to assist the Lodges in the transition from ten-year to annual histories. The responsibilities of your present Committee have remained the same: to encourage and assist all Lodges in the preparation of the required histories within the prescribed time frame. There has been much evidence of "confusion among the workmen," along with welcome comments both for and against the new requirements.

For all who have questions remaining, I am hopeful that all of the answers will be found in the material which your Grand Secretary has put together with the assistance of your Committee on History. Beyond supplying a list of the information which we require, the committee will continue work on a form with which you could report by filling in blanks. Lodges might then be permitted to submit histories in either a narrative or a structured format. It will be the work of this committee to make all necessary parties familiar and com-

portable with the new requirements, and to see that the histories are submitted in a form which includes all desired material in useable order. Your cooperation and patience will be appreciated during the transition.

female), the grand Masonic word and 4. did give to said congregation the spelling of the grand Masonic word, he was found guilty as charged and it was recommended that he be expelled from all the rights and privileges of Freemasonry.

Your Committee on Grievances and Appeals has met and reviewed the proceedings and finds everything in order. We unanimously recommend that he be expelled from Freemasonry.

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine:

Joseph R. LaBelle applied for admission to Saco Lodge and on February 2, 1977 he was rejected.

He moved to Scarborough, and on September 8, 1983 presented a petition to Gov. Wm. King Lodge for a Waiver of Jurisdiction in favor of Orchard Lodge, giving as his reason that he had a son and a brother in that Lodge. The waiver was granted and he petitioned Orchard Lodge, and was accepted, and the Entered Apprentice Degree conferred.

Shortly thereafter an objection was made to his advancement on the basis that on his petition he answered Questions 14 - NO. This is, of course, the one asking if he had previously petitioned for the degrees.

A meeting of Orchard Lodge was held on June 11, 1984 and formal charges were brought. The vote of the lodge was split evenly on allowing him to continue. The problem was referred to Grand Lodge through the D.D.G.M. and the Grand Master, Peter C. Schmidt, informed Bro. LaBelle that he was suspended. This was after a consultation with the Chairman of the Trial Commission, and a decision reached that no trial was necessary as there was prima facie evidence of guilt on his petition.

The suspension will expire with this session of Grand Lodge. The case has been forwarded to your Committee on Grievances and Appeals for recommendation.

We have interviewed some of the principal individuals concerned in this case, and have made certain conclusions. We feel that Bro. LaBelle has been the victim of some bad advice from members of his family, and from brethren in his lodge acquaintances who should have been able to give better advice. He was told that since over five years had elapsed since his initial rejection that he was free to apply to other Lodges, and that since he had "paid his debt" that the answer to question 14 should be "NO". There are other considerations involving personality problems which need not be discussed here.

Your Committee on Grievances and Appeals after much deliberation feel that Bro. LaBelle has been sufficiently punished for his error.

It is our recommendation that Bro. Joseph R. LaBelle be healed by the Grand Master, and that Orchard Lodge be empowered to Pass and Raise Bro. LaBelle at their convenience. We feel that as in all of our dealings that Justice should be tempered with Mercy.

M. W. Grand Master, we recommend that Bro. Joseph R. LaBelle be restored to membership, and allowed to continue with his degrees.

(3) Harold L. Chute, Chairman of the Committee on Investments, submitted an excellent report (copies distributed and analyzed). The following items were noted:

a. *General*—The total market value of Charity Fund on 12/31/84 was \$2,888,000. Of this total value 64.1% was in common stocks and the remaining 35.9% in AAA bonds of which 75.7% was in Government Notes and Bonds and the remaining in telephone, industrial, transportation and finance bonds.

It is interesting to note that a decade ago the market value of the fund was only \$1,013,000. The income from the fund has increased from \$64,388 (12/31/74) to \$157,621 (excluding named funds).

The common stock portfolio consists of approximately 34 stocks representing basic industries, capital goods, consumer durables, consumer nondurables, energy, health care, technology, financial services and utilities. In view of the fact that the Dow Jones Industrial Average (DJIA) has increased from 603 to 1211 over the past decade and our percentage of common stocks has remained about 65% we can now take pride in the good judgement of the total increase to \$1,875,000 in value. Some of this of course has been due to our per/capita dues from Grand Lodge and other new funds.

b. *Investment Policy*—Your committee maintains a very conservative policy. Guaranteed income is paramount coupled with the safety of principal. The size of the fund continues to guarantee safety. It is the old story of "not having all your eggs in one basket," however in spite of our conservatism and the advisers' recommendations occasionally an investment will turn sour.

The committee is very happy with the support we receive in that we are not condemned for things beyond our control. We could not operate without the tremendous support of the Grand Treasurer and Grand Secretary. It has been a fact as long as I have been associated with this Fund (15 years) that they have never made an investment which did not generate interest or dividends and we continue to maintain this policy.

c. *Investment Income*—Our total income including the Charity Foundation (\$157,621) plus the Named Funds (\$18,952) plus Cutter and Rich Funds is \$183,163. Besides our total invested funds we have a \$63,555 Stabilization fund which is used in emergencies.

The total amount of all the invested funds is approximately \$3,255,260. The reason one states the approximate value is that it changes daily with the stock market.

Voted—To accept the report.

Voted—To confirm and ratify all actions of the Investment Committee for the year ended March 31, 1985.

(4) Charles Crossland, Chairman of the *Committee on Distribution* gave a detailed account of the individual line item assistance grants for the year and was again commended for the statistical format, etc. His judgement, compassion and performance have been outstanding.

Voted—To accept the report with appreciation.

(5) **Voted**—To pay expenses incident to the work of the Committee on Distribution, including compensation of \$3,000.00 for the Chairman for the year ended March 31, 1985.

(6) **Voted**—to authorize percentage payments to the Grand Lodge for services rendered as follows:

- a. Salary of the Grand Secretary 10% (\$1,200.00)
- b. Salary of the Grand Treasurer 75% (\$5,625.00)
- c. Salaries of the Office Staff (\$1,500.00)
- d. Office supplies (\$500.00)
- e. Auditors' fee (75%)

(7) **Voted**—Donations to the Masonic Service Association Hospital Program and related activities:

- a. Masonic Service Association \$6,000.00
- b. M.S.A. Agent at Togus \$800.00
- c. Maine Veterans' Home at Augusta \$100.00
- d. Master/Wardens' Assoc. (11th & 14th Districts) - up to \$500.00
- e. Annual Togus Hospital visit - up to \$750.00
- f. Grand Lodge Masonic Blood Bank Program \$1,500.00

(8) **Voted**—To donate to the DeMolay & Pine Tree Youth Foundation, \$3,000.00.

(9) **Voted**—To donate \$1,000.00 to the M.S.A. 1984 Earthquake (Chile).

(10) **Voted**—That the Investment Committee be authorized to transfer up to \$50,000. From the Relief Account to the Grand Lodge Charity Fund (if and when available).

Add 1000 to the Common Era. Thus: 1985 and 1000 = 2985.

Knights Templar—

From the Christian Era take 1118. Thus: 1118 from 1985 = 867.

Order of High Priesthood—

To the Christian Era add 1913, the Year of the Blessing. Thus: 1985 and 1913 = 3898.

MASONIC CALENDAR

Ancient Craft Masons commence this era with the creation of the world, calling it **Anno Lucis (A.D.)**, "in the year of light."

Scottish Rite, same as Ancient Craft, except the Jewish chronology is used, **Anno Mundi (A.M.)**, "in the year of the world."

Royal Arch Masons date from the year the second temple was commenced by Zerubbabel, **Anno Inventionis (A.I.)**, "in the year of the discovery."

Royal and Select Masters date from the year in which the temple of Solomon was completed, **Anno Depositionis (A. Dep.)**, "in the year of the deposit."

Knights Templar commence their era with the organization of their Order, **Anno Ordinid (A.O.)**, "in the year of the Order."

Order of High Priesthood dates from the year of the blessing of Abraham by the High Priest Melchisedec, **Anno Benefacio (A.B.)**, "in the year of the blessing."

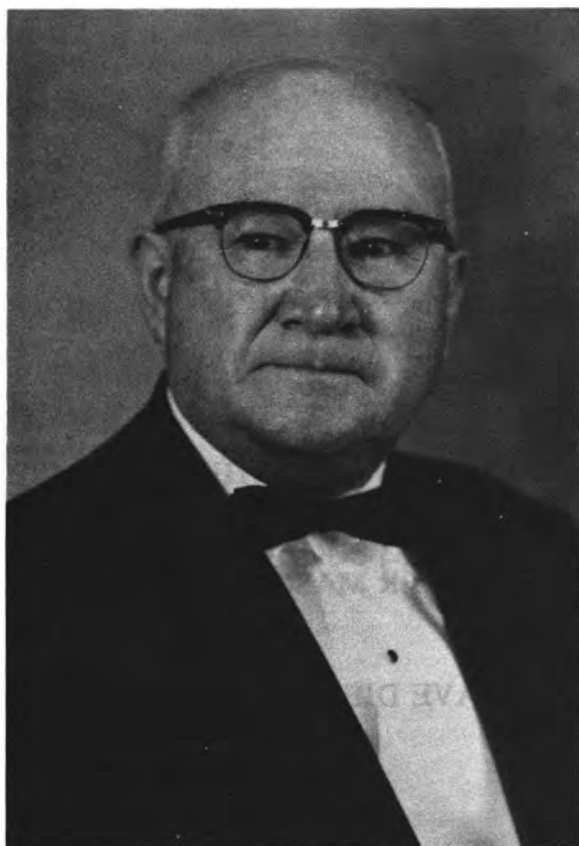

To the Most Worshipful, the Grand Lodge of Maine, Ancient Free and Accepted Masons:

We submit, herewith, our Annual Report on Fraternal Relations, consisting of a FOREWORD, Special Reports, Recommendations, and Reviews.

FOREWORD

OPTIMISM is the key word of this report in that while losses in membership continues to plague nearly every Grand Jurisdiction, yet a great majority of these Jurisdictions reflect a spirited and enthusiastic outlook in the Reports of the Grand Masters and other Orations. In many other Grand Lodges, including our Mother Grand Lodge of England, new Lodges are being constituted year after year, while here in America new Lodges are seemingly arising out of the ashes of former years.

True, many of our foreign Grand Lodges are still being jeopardized, their brethren persecuted and forced to leave their native lands, but they remain committed to the teachings and tenets of Freemasonry. It is difficult for us, living in a democratic and free country, to imagine our lodges being invaded, their possessions confiscated, and, in some instances, their leaders subjected to cruelty, ostracism, or even murder.

Among the greater sources of hope, there is evidence of greater numbers of young men applying to our lodges. This, in itself, bodes well for the future of Freemasonry.

Our greatest failure in terms of attendance appears to be apathy on the part of so many of our former active attendants, and we ask ourselves why this is happening. It is a challenge that we must face head-on and plan programs that will recapture their interest and support.

Let us join in the aforesaid "optimism" and look to the future with a positive attitude, always reflecting the virtues of Freemasonry by our public demeanor and service to mankind.

SPECIAL REPORTS**(a) BOLIVIA**

In a letter dated January 18, 1985, the Grand Lodge of Bolivia requests the establishment of Fraternal Relations with the Grand Lodge of Maine. This Grand Lodge was established in 1929, and as of August, 1984, enjoyed the recognition of 38 of our 50 U.S. Grand Jurisdictions, and that of the Grand Lodge of England.

After due inquiry and the usual investigation, your committee is satisfied that they meet all of the necessary requirements for such recognition and exchange of representatives, and hereby recommend the same.

(b) BRAZIL

Since our recognition of The United Grand Lodge of the State of Rio de Janeiro in 1983, its Sovereignty and Jurisdiction has been threatened by the establishment of two irregular Lodges in the City of Rio de Janeiro. These two lodges are endeavoring to re-establish the former Grand Lodge of Guanabara, now merged with The United Grand Lodge of Rio de Janeiro.

It is the recommendation of this committee that those two irregular lodges be ignored and that our fraternal relations with the aforesaid United Grand Lodge remain unchanged.

FRANCE

A letter received by our Grand Secretary February 15, 1985 from Geothe (Göyü) Lodge #95 noting their withdrawal from The National Grand Lodge of France by reason of alleged irregularities of said Grand Lodge in the election of the Grand Master over the past five years, and requesting our support of that lodge's action.

This committee recommends no action on this proposal, and that our existing recognition of the National Grand Lodge remain intact.

GREECE

A letter of information received from the Grand Lodge of Greece, April 9, 1985, in response to several inquiries as to whether or not they recognize a body calling itself the "Grand Chapter of Greece" is meant to inform us that such body is not recognized, its having been established by some foreign Jurisdiction without any previous knowledge or consent of the Grand Lodge of Greece.

This is simply a matter of information and requires no action by this committee or this Grand Lodge.

(c) ITALY

As a result of the scandals of the P2 situation and the Italian Parliamentary Commission's accusations resulting in the arrest and jailing of certain known Brothers of The Grand Orient of Italy, together with the confiscation of all the membership lists of all Blue Lodges working under obedience thereto, two groups have been organized, viz: "The General Grand Lodge of Italy," and "The Grand Lodge of Calabria," both seeking recognition by Grand Lodges throughout the World. The Commission on Information of the Conference of Grand Masters in No. America, after careful consideration has concluded that the Grand Orient continues to be regular and meets the standards for recognition.

Inasmuch as the Grand Lodge of Maine now recognizes said Grand Orient, this committee recommends no change in its present position.

Inasmuch as Reports, action and statistics of this Grand Lodge comprised in excess of 600 pages in the Proceedings, this report is condensed to the most pertinent matters.

R.W. Bro. William A. Whitcomb having retired during his 23rd year as Grand Secretary was elected Grand Secretary Emeritus, and was subsequently replaced by R.W. Bro. William J. Wolf.

The Grand Master's Address revealed that he had traveled 49,535 miles, attending 29 District Meetings, and 83 other visitations. The remainder of his Address dealt with his appreciation of the labors of Grand Lodge Committees, Officers, etc. Recommendations, Dispensations granted and refused, together with the usual duties and prerogatives of his office. Routine rulings, decisions and directives were in accordance with the Constitution, Rules and Regulations. Among motions made and adopted was one which fixed the per-diem at \$40. and mileage at 20¢ per mile to those so entitled.

Among Grand Representatives of Florida near other Grand Jurisdictions was our own M.W. Bro. Powers.

A special assessment of \$2.50 per member for 1984 was adopted, together with an increase of \$2.75 in per capita tax.

The Grand Lodge participates in the "Trans Nat'l Insurance Services Hospital Income Plan," with \$24,000. having been paid out in claims to date.

Great emphasis is placed on Education and Masonic Home.

The Budget of this Grand Lodge is in the neighborhood of \$5,000,000. and covers a multitude of Masonic activities, charitable and otherwise.

Bro. James A. Wilson was elected and installed as Most Worshipful Grand Master, and, as previously indicated, Bro. William J. Wolf was elected and installed as Grand Secretary.

Pollard, Executive Secretary, M.S.A., 4 Concordant Bodies and seven leaders of other related organizations, after which the Ladies and non-masons were excused and the Grand Lodge opened formally.

The Grand Master's Address, in addition to his words of appreciation to various fraternal Bodies, Officers and Committees, etc., made reference to his official acts and visitations which numbered nearly 200, and expressed high praise for the support of his programs. At the Grand Master's banquet, the Grand Orator delivered a most interesting and inspiring oration entitled, "The York Rite For Our Spiritual Evolution," lifting up the universality of Masonry, with each variation (Rite) contributing to the whole. Thus, the French rite, Scottish rite, the Mexican National rite, and the York rite, etc., neither excluding nor including any one, since Masonry is universal, thus emphasizing man's search for explanation and receptiveness to mental and emotional response to and for all forms of conduct. As the title indicates, the York Rite is lifted up as the strong force in Spiritual growth and Evolution using Dante's "Divine Comedy" as a basis of thought, he states that "only he who evolves spiritually can oppose the strength of the spirit to the mass of evil and incomprehension that menaces social stability." He further describes the York rite as "a state of life, a form of conduct in which every deed, every word and every attitude, shows that he is a free mason of good standing and good habits." Quoting the Apostle Paul, he further emphasizes examples of good works, and the fruits of the spirit as the goal of York rite masonry, all of which directs us toward obtaining the highest spiritual evolution, while

who seeks "material things without such spiritual evolution, descends to the mire of egotism, envy, personal convenience and inhumanity."

Following the opening of the annual communication, the reports of the Deputy Grand Master, Grand Wardens, D.D.G.Ms, Grand Chaplain, and Grand Librarian were presented and so recorded.

Fourteen Past Grand Masters were presented, welcomed, and properly honored.

A roll call of Grand Representatives was called with 58 foreign Jurisdictions responding, following which a number of brethren from Texas were introduced.

The Grand Lodge was then called to Refreshment in order to permit ladies of the O.E.S. to enter and present flowers to the Grand Lodge, after which a coffee break was enjoyed in the gardens.

The Grand Lodge then being called to Labor, the M.W. Grand Master delivered his Address, which, in many respects, complemented the oration of the previous evening, frequently referring to Spiritual Evolution.

In speaking of the declining membership, he expressed his view that the basic reason was lack of English-speaking material, and since, during the past five years the trend has been toward opening it up to more Spanish-speaking candidates. Defining "What We Stand For," as worked out by the P.G.Ms, and reviewed by the Jurisprudence Committee; the results were summed up by the words; "York Rite is an 'Initiatic Order,' meant to be understood as a spiritual process designed to wake up its initiates to those veiled forces that have awakened in us through Rites and Symbols with specific accent on the Brotherhood of Man.

To implement this program, a leaflet was issued in English, Spanish and German, describing York Freemasonry as discussed earlier. A further publication (Newspaper) covering the three areas of Blue Lodge, Royal Arch Chapter and Commandery, said paper to be shared with relatives and friends.

Under the State of the Craft, the Grand Master indicated that while English-speaking membership is slowly decreasing, Spanish-speaking membership keeps increasing. He recommended that two particular Lodges that were growing a bit fast limit their resident membership to 30 such members. He further recommended the adoption of Past Master's Aprons and Jewels.

The Grand Master visited all of their Lodges, most of them several times, as well as Chapters and Commanderies, the Grand Lodges of the Valley of Mexico and the Grand Lodge of Nuevo Leon.

The Reports of the several Committees were then presented. At the Past Grand Master's Advisory Committee meetings, the Grand Master consistently stressed as the first objective, getting closer to God. Some feelings were expressed that this might imply that Masonry is a religious organization and that it might be better to stress Charity and Brotherhood as the objective. The Grand Master agreed to include these, while still retaining the original.

A Special Committee was appointed to re-form DeMolay Chapters which are now extinct. A Civil Association was formed to implement a Corporate Body.

The new Grand Master is desirous of greater Public Relations with the profane world and intends to initiate programs to bring this about.

Bro. Guy P. Kruse was elected as M.W. Grand Master, and Bro. Derrick H. Hart, P.G.M. was re-elected as Grand Secretary.

This is another of Grand Lodges overseas which hold Quarterly Communications; that in June being the nearest to what we would consider the Annual, inasmuch as it is then that a review of the previous 12 month's 'doings' are presented.

They adhere closely to the tenets and practices of the "Mother Grand Lodge," The United Grand Lodge of England. Among matters of interest to many American Grand Lodges is that of 'solicitation' as understood and practiced by the "Mother Grand Lodge" and now adopted by this Grand Lodge. It is pointed out that such 'solicitation' must be of a proper nature, citing that it is the duty of each member to promote the Craft with this new approach in mind, thus inviting and seeking out the worthy, while not waiting for such persons to seek us.

The Deputy Grand Master, presiding in the absence of the Grand Master, at the December Quarterly, in the course of his Address, called attention to the words of Lord Swansea on the occasion of Commonwealth Night, as he said that "in England, Masonry is flourishing; membership in his District is growing apace, there being new Lodges consecrated every week." (This is of particular interest in view of recent attacks upon the Craft.)

Another matter of interest in Queensland is that the Board of General Purposes nominates the new Grand Master and other officers, and there being no further nominations, they are declared elected, the only exception being that the Grand Master appoints the Deputy Grand Master and Assistant Grand Master.

Several references are made to the religious nature of Freemasonry. General Omar Bradley, former Chief of Staff of the American Forces is quoted by the Grand Master as addressing his Staff as follows: "We have too many men of science and too few of God. We have grasped the mystery of the atom, and rejected the Sermon on the Mount." May such quotations be a guide to our lifestyle as Freemasons for the year 1982-83. —MWGM

The Grand Lodge was opened by H.R.H. Prince Alexander of Yugoslavia under the National Grand Lodge of France.

The Proceedings of this Grand Lodge contain no statistical records as do most Grand Lodges, but a figure derived from the Almoner's Toast to the "Daughter Lodges," plus a list of contributions from the Provincial, District and lodges would seem to indicate the number of Lodges as 1,109 as cited above. The Grand Master, in response to a toast, indicated the number of "Intrants" this past year as 7,600 (a slight drop) but that from April to November this year shows an increase of 150 over the same period last year. To confuse this writer further, the 1985 "List of Lodges" numbers 1161 Lodges within and without the Grand Jurisdiction.

Announcing the 250th Anniversary of the consecration of this Grand Lodge in just over two years, the Grand Master strongly suggested that the Lodges, through their members, make contributions to the Grand Lodge in the spirit of universal benevolence to assist not only their own members by supporting community and national projects.

New Lodges were organized during the past year in Nigeria, Transvaal and Barbados, all of course, under the Grand Lodge of Scotland.

The Proceedings devote the greater emphasis on their Masonic Homes and benevolence, and, obviously, noting the election and installation of their Grand Lodge Office-bearers.

During the past year, 6 Special Communications were held at various places for the purpose of Cornerstone Layings, Dedications, Consecrations, etc.

The Grand Master called the Brethren to order at 10:00 a.m. for a preliminary Religious Service prior to the Annual Communication which was convened at 11:00 a.m. Ten Past Grand Masters were presented, together with 313 of the 423 chartered Lodges represented. Following routine motions, Distinguished Guests from 10 sister Jurisdictions, plus 5 from additional Offices and Concordant Bodies were received with appropriate honors.

Before proceeding with his Address, the Grand Master brought to the attention of the Brethren the Tornado Disaster Relief Program and appointed a Relief Committee to address the situation. The Grand Master then proceeded with his Address, highlighting the problems as well as the achievements. He expressed his distress in the losses by N.P.D., and the increasing trend in unmasonic conduct, stressing the need for Quality above Quantity. He pleaded for more "Back to the Basics" programs, lifting up family programs and participation. Despite his verbal disappointments, his general attitude was optimistic. Statistics revealed in his Address indicates that Dual Membership is permitted within the same jurisdiction. He writes personal letters to all newly-raised Masons insofar as the information is made known to him. He lists the usual Dispensations, By-Law approvals, Trials, Special Workshops, out-of-door meetings, closing his address with words of appreciation.

Two Lodges consolidated. Walden Lodge, No. 274 is the largest with 1,084 members. Eleven Lodges have 42 or less members, with Sheppard, No. 320 as the smallest with 27 members.

A proposed amendment permitting concurrent Territorial jurisdiction by waiver failed to be adopted, with exception of the existing provision for 2 or more lodges in the same city or town.

The Grand Lodge Banquet was held on the evening of the first day with square-dancing following the entertainment.

Plans are moving forward for the observance of the 250th Anniversary in 1987.

M.W. Bro. T. Harry White was re-elected and installed as Grand Master, and M.W. Bro. Dwight McAllister continued as Grand Secretary.

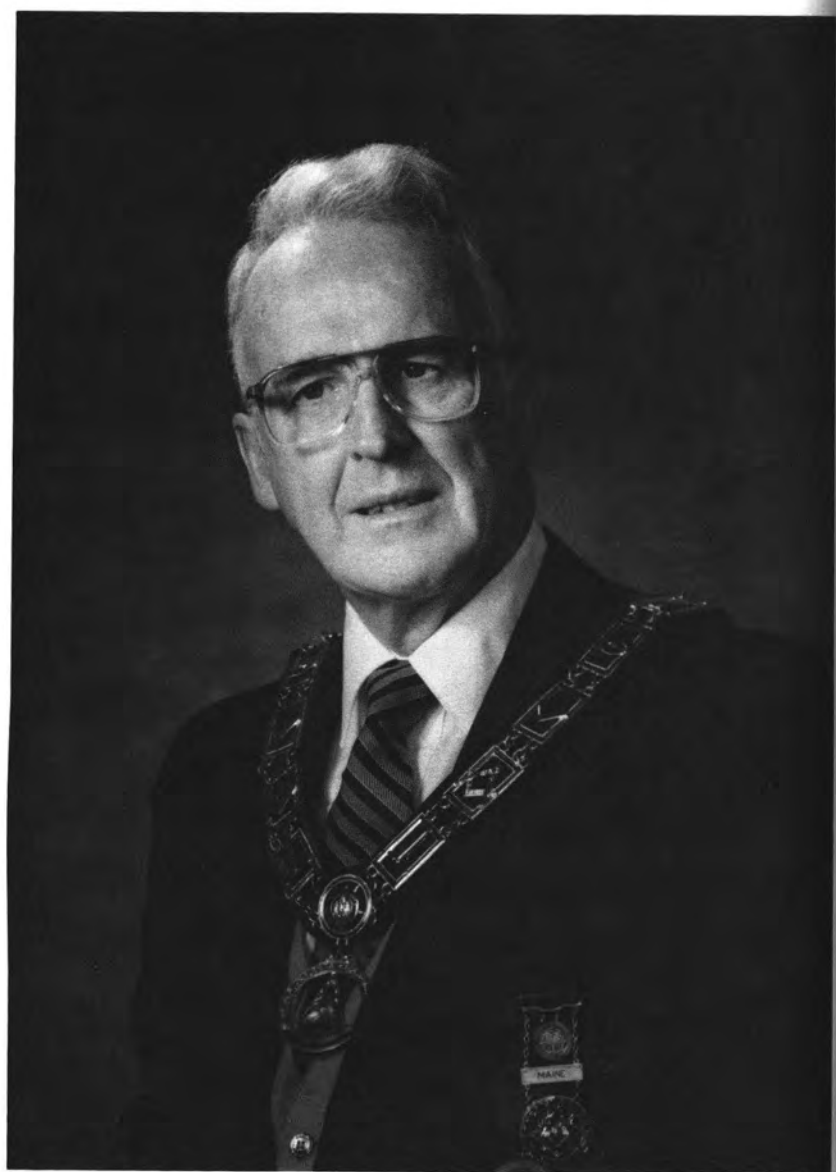

ERNEST HARRY CURTIS

Ernest Harry Curtis was born May 2, 1920 in Cornish, New Hampshire, the third son of Harry W. and Marion F. Curtis. He has one older brother, Roy and a younger sister, Mildred. He lived and attended school in Claremont, N.H., graduating from Stevens High School in 1938. He worked as a machinist at the Sullivan Machine Co. in Claremont until he enlisted in the Army Air Force in 1942, where he served in the 437th Troop Carrier Group of the 9th Air Force in the European Theatre as an Aerial Engineer, obtaining the rank of Master Sergeant.

Following his discharge in September 1945, he joined the wholesale hardware firm of Decatur Hopkins Co. of Boston, remaining with them for 40 years until his retirement December 31, 1985. Ernest came to Maine in January 1950 to represent his company as District Manager and has resided in Auburn ever since.

Ernest and Barbara Curtis were united in marriage on October 12, 1946 and have two children, Douglas E. and Susan M. They are members of High Street Congregational Church in Auburn.

Brother Curtis was raised a Master Mason in Ashlar Lodge No. 105 in October, 1952, served as Master in 1960 and has been Treasurer since 1967.

He received the Scottish Rite Degrees in the Valley of Lewiston-Auburn in 1953, served as Sovereign Prince of the Auburn Council Princes of Jerusalem in 1968-69; Thrice Potent Master of the Lewiston Lodge of Perfection in 1976-77 and was active in Maine Consistory for several years. He was coronated a member of the Supreme Council, 33°, A.A.S.R.N.M.J. at Detroit in September 1985.

Brother Curtis is also a member of the York Rite, including Bradford Chapter No. 9, Dunlap Council No. 8 and Lewiston Commandery No. 6, where he has served as Treasurer since 1976.

He joined Kora Temple Shrine in 1953 and has served in many capacities, including Ambassador several years, membership Chairman for ten years and is presently serving as Chairman of the Masonic Relations Committee. A member of the Androscoggin Shrine Club, he served as its first President in 1973. He is also a member of Put Stevens Court No. 107, Royal Order of Jesters.

Brother Curtis has been an active Grand Lodge Officer for many years. He was appointed Grand Steward in 1962, 63, District Deputy Grand Master of the 23rd District in 1964-65 and was first appointed District Representative in 1961 and again in 1966-67-68. He was named the first Assistant Grand Lecturer in 1969 and served in this office until 1974 when he was appointed Grand Lecturer, serving until 1980. He was also named Chairman of the Committee on Masonic Education and Lodge Service in 1974, serving until 1982.

In 1982 Brother Curtis was elected to the office of Senior Grand Warden and in 1984 to the office of Deputy Grand Master. His accomplishments in the Grand Lodge of Maine have been many, for which

he has been awarded both the Simon Greenleaf Medal and the Josiah Hayden Drummond Distinguished Service Medal for his outstanding service in Masonic Education in Maine. He organized the Maine Lodge of Research and served as its first Master in 1973. He is a member of several Masonic affiliated organizations, dedicated to further Masonic enlightenment, including the Philalethes Society, the Maine College Societas Rosicruciana and the Josiah Drummond Council No. 1, Allied Masonic Degrees, of which he is a past Sovereign Master. He is a member and past president of the Maine Past District Deputies Association.

At the One hundred sixty-seventh Annual Communication of the Grand Lodge of Maine, held in Portland on May 6, 1986, Brother Ernest Harry Curtis was elected and installed the 83rd Most Worshipful Grand Master of Masons in Maine.

NEW BRUNSWICK: M.W. J. William Murray, Grand Master, presented by R.W. Reginald W. Wing.

R.W. Stewart M. L. Pollard, Exec. Secretary-Treasurer, M.S.A., presented by M.W. Donald S. Smith.

The Distinguished Guests were welcomed individually by the Grand Master, accorded Private Honors and invited to seats in the East.

PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

The Maine State Police Color Guard presented the United States and Canadian flags to the East, the Pledge of Allegiance to our flag was given, followed by the singing of America, God Save the Queen, and Two Countries by the Sea.

The Grand Master then called the Grand Lodge from Labor to Refreshment and called upon R.W. Wilbur F. Loveitt to escort Lisa Dyer, Grand Worthy Advisor, Order of the Rainbow for Girls, and Mrs. Dorothy Merrill Higgins, Supreme Inspector in Maine, International Order of the Rainbow for Girls, to the East. Miss Dyer addressed the Grand Lodge, thanking them for their support of Rainbow and also asked Florian Clark to stand and be recognized for his generous donation to Rainbow.

M.W. Harold L. Chute escorted Mark E. Ryder, State Master Councilor, and Bro. Clyde L. Ferris, Executive Officer, DeMolay in Maine, to the East. Mark also addressed the Grand Lodge. Both young people were accorded a standing ovation.

The Grand Master then called upon M.W. Aubrey L. Burbank to escort Mrs. Grace L. Field to the East, where she was presented a check on her retirement from the Grand Lodge Office. Money for this check was received from present and past Grand Lodge Officers and from Lodges all over the state. She was given a round of applause and standing ovation. Her husband, Sumner, was invited to be present for the presentation.

The Grand Lodge was then called from Refreshment to Labor.

ANNUAL ADDRESS GRAND MASTER, PETER C. SCHMIDT

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge Ancient Free and Accepted Masons of the State of Maine:

This will probably be one of the most difficult reports for me to make. In concluding my two years as your Grand Master, probably the happiest two years of my Masonic Life, I find that there are many things I would like to have done, but I suppose that is true of any Master or Grand Master. I am sure all of you will remember me as one of the happiest Grand Masters you have ever had. I am proud to say that during my Masonic Career I have visited 187 of our 200 Maine Lodges and hope to visit all of them before I really retire.

It is a great pleasure to welcome all of you to this 167th Annual Communication of the Grand Lodge of Maine. I had hoped that all 200 Lodges would be represented here today, but we will have to wait for the report of the Committee on Credentials to see if this happens. I would also welcome our out-of-state guests, most of whom have come a long way to be with us. We have shared many happy moments with them and appreciate their taking time from their busy schedules to be with us. If we can do anything to make your stay more pleasurable, please do not hesitate to call on us.

Again, during the past year we have lost many of our Brethren to the Grim Reaper, and at this time I would ask Brother and Reverend Edward Fenderson to give his report on Memorials.

MEMORIALS

Rev. Edward L. Fenderson, Grand Chaplain, presented the following report, which was accepted:

To the M.W. Grand Master, members of Grand Lodge, officers and members of the subordinate lodges, and to all Grand Lodges with which we are in Fraternal Correspondence:

Brethren:

It is with profound sorrow that we are called upon to announce the death of one Grand Lodge Officer, John Burton Gooch, a Grand Lodge Organist of the M.W. Grand Lodge of Maine from 1979 to 1985.

Brother Gooch, 85, died February 13, 1986, at a Freeport nursing home. He was born in Yarmouth, Maine, March 20, 1900, a son of Fred and Annie Raynes Gooch, and attended schools there.

Brother Gooch was employed by S. D. Warren Co. of Westbrook, Maine, for many years as a chemist and also played in the S. D. Warren band. He was a member of the First Congregational Church.

Brother Gooch had a long and distinguished Masonic history. He was a 63-year member of Casco Lodge of Yarmouth; a 50-year member of Kora Temple Shrine of Lewiston, where he was a member of the band for many years; Commander of Portland Commandery No. 2 in 1974. He received the Knights Templar Cross of Honor in 1972. He was Grand Organist for all Grand York Rite bodies and was a member of the Scottish Rite bodies of Portland.

Brother John was a member of Portland Shrine Club, the Cumberland Royal Arch Chapter, the Portland Council and Order of the Eastern Star. He was also a member of the 60-Plus Club of Portland.

His first wife, Lillian Batty Gooch, died in 1964. He later was married to Nathalie Hutchins, who died in 1982. Surviving are a brother, Kendrick Gooch of Bethany, Conn. and a stepson, Bruce Heywood, of Durham.

A funeral was held at the First Congregational Church in Gray, with the Rev. Charles Whiston officiating. The burial was in Riverside Cemetery, Yarmouth, Maine.

Brother John Gooch was a gifted musician and he inspired and enriched the lives of people wherever he went. We are grateful for his gift of sharing and caring in Brotherly love and fellowship.

Committee on Memorials

We grieve for this departed Brother, but all too soon our own names will be listed among them.

Last Fall we held 24 District Meetings, one in each District, and the attendance this year surpassed that of last year, much to my satisfaction. The usual School for Grand Lodge Officers was held in Waterville on June 1st, and all but one or two officers were present. I might add that most of them supported me at our District Meetings and several of them didn't miss a single meeting. I was also pleased to see several of our Past Grand Masters at some of these meetings. Our Ladies were invited to 2 of these, a first in Maine.

Masonic Education in the State of Maine is still in good hands under the able leadership of Walter Macdougall. More and more Lodges are taking part in the advanced education program and the fourth night program. R.W. Ernest Curtis has been guiding our Advance Education Program for several years.

To make a list of the Lodges I have visited during the year would take up a lot of time and space. I'm sure you know that I was on the road many, many nights during the year. I have accumulated over 45,000 miles on a car that is a little over a year old. To save expenses we drove instead of flying, to all the Grand Jurisdictions outside the State of Maine, even as far as to Richmond, Virginia. It is always a pleasure to greet old friends at these visitations.

The Annual visit to Togus is always an inspiration. I strongly urge all of you to visit there at least once in your life. We cannot really appreciate what we have until we see how many of the rest of us live.

The Dispensations I have issued are listed in this report and need now be read. Again, most of them were for Table Lodges and if you have not already done so, attend one and see how brotherly love and affection is displayed. I have made some decisions, some interpretations of our Constitution and some recommendations. I will try to separate them for you as follows:

Decision: A Lodge asked if it was necessary to "vote" to refer an application to a Committee of Inquiry. It was my decision that a Lodge "may" vote to refer an application or have the Master simply refer it to the Committee of Inquiry after its initial reading before the Lodge.

Decision: A Lodge asked if a Candidate who received his E.A. Degree in another Jurisdiction and moved to Maine could continue to receive his degrees here if he understood, but could not speak, English. It was my decision that he could not be advanced, because if he could not speak English he probably could not understand enough to know what was going on. I suggested that he learn enough English to answer the necessary questions in the lesson. It was difficult for me to understand why he had been allowed to take the E.A. Degree if he could not speak English.

Decision: A Lodge asked me if a Navy or Coastguardsman could be considered a "seafaring man," as mentioned in Section 112 of our Con-

affiliation. My decision was that they could not be so considered, since they are usually stationed for a year or more in one place and could thereby obtain the necessary residence requirements.

Decision: (Could be interpretation) A Lodge asked if a Building Association which owned a Lodge Hall could allow some groups to use alcoholic beverages at social events. This took a little digging, but when I discovered that the members of the Building Association must be members of the Lodge and that, although the deed for the Building was given to the Building Association, the Association leased the building back to the Lodge for 99 years, my decision was easy. No alcohol could be permitted in the building at any time.

Decision: A previous Decision stated that "A member of a Lodge in a sister Jurisdiction applying for dual membership in a Maine Lodge should be considered in the same status as an individual applying for membership in one of our Maine Lodges." I believe the decision refers to an application for the "degrees" rather than "membership," since it states that if he is rejected he automatically becomes the property of said Lodge and cannot make application for dual membership in any other Lodge. In the Digest of Decisions on Page 6 under the general heading of "Applications" it states that when an applicant for membership is rejected he may immediately apply again to the same or another Lodge. It is my decision, therefore, that an applicant for dual membership in a Maine Lodge, if rejected, may immediately apply to the same or to any other Lodge. I feel that since he is a Master Mason he would come under the same rules as an application for affiliation.

Decision: Under the heading of "Jurisdiction" on page 64a in the Digest of Decisions, second paragraph, it states that the Grand Lodge of Maine has decided that it is necessary to have the permission from the Grand Master of the foreign jurisdiction before a candidate hailing from his jurisdiction can be received in a Maine Lodge. The date of 1976 is appended thereto. We cannot find any reference to this in the 1976 Proceedings. Since Section 113 of the Constitution covers this matter, I feel this should be eliminated from the Digest.

Decision: In "Affiliation" in the Digest of Decisions there is a conflict. One Decision says that the applicant for membership or affiliation must sign the by-laws before he can become a member and the other says, he "should" sign the by-laws. The third reference says that the membership is complete when the application is voted favorably even though the member has not signed the by-laws. I agree with M. W. Josiah H. Drummond who said in 1883 that a member should sign the by-laws. It is my decision, therefore, that a member **must** sign the by-laws before he can be called a member of the Lodge.

I have made a suggestion at all my District Meetings that it is highly appropriate for Brethren to give the sign of fidelity during prayer. To my

surprise and pleasure I find that it is being used in many appendant bodies as well as in our Lodges. I hope all of you will bear this in mind when at prayer.

By the time this report is read, we will have dedicated three new Lodge Halls. The first dedication was that of Marine Lodge #122 on Deer Isle. The second was Nezinscot Lodge #101 in Turner, the third was Harmony Lodge #38 in Gorham (This included a Corner Stone Laying) and the last one was to be Arion Lodge #162 in Goodwins Mills but there was some conflict with the Town Fathers and it could not be ready. In addition to these, our new Grand Master will have several more during his term. Oriental Lodge #13 is planning a new hall, as well as Governor William King #219, Eastern Lodge #7 in Eastport and Oxford Lodge #18 in Norway. And there may be several more in the near future. This portends well for Masonry in the State of Maine. New Halls mean new hope, new interest and new goals.

A very serious problem has come up in Grand Lodge which needs addressing. Inflation is taking its toll on expenses and at the same time the annual decrease in our membership has cut our income each year to the point where something must be done about it. For several years the Finance Committee has given us a deficit budget, but by economizing as much as possible and with the help of a small boost by income from other sources, we have managed to come out on top. This is no longer possible, so a raise in our per capita tax is now inevitable. Only two jurisdictions in the U.S.A. have lower average dues than Maine. Although the economy has driven prices up almost fourfold in the past forty years, most of our Lodge dues have remained the same. Any business which failed to raise their retail prices in accordance with the cost of raw materials would have failed long ago. Consequently I am recommending that the Committee on Amendments present legislation which will raise our per capita tax \$2.00, to take effect a year hence. I am also asking all Lodges to review their dues structure and bring them into line with the present economy.

My Commitment for \$37,000 from the State of Maine for the restoration of the Statue of Liberty has passed its goal. I hope every Lodge in our State will be able to reach the goal of \$1.00 per member before the dedication date. Many Appendant Bodies have made liberal contributions, as have many Rainbow Assemblies, and individual Masons.

Rainbow and DeMolay in Maine are not exactly flourishing, but they are making good progress. I strongly urge all of you to make an effort to visit their meetings and have them come to your Lodges and show you how well they can put on a degree. I was honored at several Rainbow meetings during the year and have now become an honorary member of Bridgton Assembly of Rainbow. My wife has promised to make me a white dress so I would not be too conspicuous when I join the girls in the

closing circle of Rainbow. Again, I pledge my support and the support of the Grand Lodge to all their endeavors. At the Annual Grand Assembly of Rainbow I was honored by receiving the Grand Cross of Color. At the New England Regional meeting of DeMolay Priories I was honored by being knighted in Pine Tree DeMolay Priory. I have also received the honorary Legion of Honor from DeMolay.

The Conference of Grand Masters of North America was held in Arlington, Va. this year. We drove first to the Grand Lodge of Virginia in Richmond, spent a few days at Williamsburg (a sight well worth seeing) and then drove to Washington, D.C. for the Allied Masonic Degrees and then on to Arlington for the Conference. This time I didn't get the bug and was able to attend the entire Conference. I did sneak over to the Grand Secretaries Conference long enough to hear our own Grand Secretary, R. W. Ed George, deliver his address on the Team Concept, an idea which was well received. Again this year we were invited to attend the Imperial Shrine session. It was held in Atlanta and although we were afraid it would be terribly hot (the first week in July) we were agreeably surprised to discover that it was hotter in New England than in Georgia. We were also invited to attend the Annual Meeting of the Supreme Council of the Scottish Rite, this year in Detroit. Both meetings were impressive and we were royally treated on both occasions.

I have also continued the practice of presiding at Master Mason Degrees with my Grand Lodge officers all taking part. It is always a thrill and it does bring out the Brethren. I have also installed several Lodges and love to do so. Several Lodges celebrated Anniversaries, but there are still many who do not and this is too bad. When a Lodge has been in existence for a hundred years or more, it should be celebrated.

On Aug. 17th, 1985, Olive and I were honored by a reception at the Holiday Inn in Portland, given by my Lodge, Oriental #13 of Bridgton. We were showered with gifts and the pleasure of seeing so many of our friends in attendance. It was a gala evening and one we will never forget. It brought to mind very forcibly how highly honored I am to be your Grand Master. Out of the 36,000 Master Masons in the State of Maine, only one man, every two years, is chosen to be Grand Master, and for this honor I am deeply grateful.

Although our own **Maine Mason** continues to be one of the finest in the U.S.A. I regret to announce that the fledgling "Voice of the Bee" has perished. Due to many unforeseen circumstances this worthwhile effort foundered in its infancy. Operation Bee Hive is no more.

Although our Grand Lodge trips didn't generate much extra money for Grand Lodge, those who traveled with us had a great time. Luckily my wife didn't have any accidents, although she did have a bowl of noodle soup dumped on her head in Heidelberg, Germany. Our trip to Germany took place during the first week in October, just in time to take

in the famous "Oktoberfest" in Munich. It was a sight well worth seeing, at least once. We had a boat trip on the Rhine and became official wine tasters in Rudesheim. We even discovered a street in Rudesheim named after your Grand Master - "Schmidt Strasse". Our final trip was to Hawaii and came during some of the worst winter weather in New England, while we had the benefit of 85 degree temperatures and no rain. We stayed on Oahu for a week and then transferred to Maui for three days.

The fifth annual Fellowship Night for New England was held in Cranston, R.I. this year and I was able to attend. Nine of us from Maine attended and we had the pleasure of hearing our own M.W. Charles R. Glassmire give the address of the evening. Next year this Fellowship Night will be held in Maine and we look forward to another evening of Masonic Fellowship.

Wor. Brother Wally Gage, who is the Committe on Grand Lodge History, has done an outstanding job by bringing the History of Grand Lodge up to date. Some time during the next year we will be printing a 16 year supplement to Grand Lodge History. I have also asked for an Amendment to the Constitution to provide for a Grand Lodge Historian. I think all Grand Lodges should have one, and this would make it official.

Your Grand Master has been received and given honors in many of our Appendant bodies, including York Rite, Scottish Rite and Shrine. The bonds between these Appendant Bodies and Blue Lodge Masonry is stronger every year, and the relationship between Grand Lodge and our Constituent Lodges is also much closer than ever before. When I became Grand Secretary in 1975 I vowed that I would try to bring Grand Lodge closer to the Brethren and I believe this has been accomplished. I have noticed how much more at ease our Lodge officers are when the Grand Master visits and how much at ease our Brethren are when they come up to speak to the Grand Master. During the meeting I am your Most Worshipful Grand Master, but before and after the meeting I am still "Pete." And that is as it should be.

I have so many people to thank I hardly know where to begin. First of all, I thank all my officers for the faithful support they have given me throughout my term as Grand Master. With support like that I couldn't fail. I am also indebted to the Committee on Arrangements (and their wives) for the work they have done to make this Annual Communication possible, both for us and for our guests from our sister jurisdictions. I am also indebted to the faithful crew in the Grand Lodge Office, Lib Tupper, Gracie Field, Ed George and Bruce Tornquist, for their support, help and advice. I have also gone to many of our Past Grand Masters for advice and have received it without the least hesitation.

Finally, to my faithful and long-suffering wife, who will have been at my side for 47 years come June 24th, I can but say that I couldn't

possibly have come this far in Masonry or in anything else without her loyal support, advice and yes, criticism. I am sure I have avoided many a pitfall because of her advice.

And now, Brethren, the conclusion. I fervently hope that I am leaving Masonry in Maine in as good condition as it was when I received the honor of becoming your 82nd Grand Master in 1984. I have been a very happy Grand Master, but I look forward to joining the ranks of your Past Grand Masters.

To the Most Worshipful Grant Master, Officers, and Brethren of the M.W. Grand Lodge of Maine:

The long winter has come to an end—spring has arrived and the promise of growing things just a short time ahead. So we are reminded of our Annual Grand Lodge Session fast approaching—we look forward to it. This is my sixth annual report as Grand Lecturer and I am happy for the opportunity to work within this great Craft of Freemasonry.

The ritual is the foundation upon which we teach the principles, philosophy, and symbolism of Ancient Craft Masonry. If we teach our candidates and new brothers that being a Mason in the fullest and complete sense is to exemplify in one's dealings with mankind those virtues of charity, of kindness, of tolerance which the ritual so forcefully inculcates by precept and by symbol, then we are in the proud position of being Master Masons.

In accordance with the Constitution and under the direction of the M.W. Grand Master, three ritualistic Schools of Instruction were held in each of the twenty-four (24) districts by your Grand Lecturer and the six (6) Assistant Grand Lecturers.

Tabulation of Schools

The following table is the tabulation of registration at the various District Schools of Instruction. The numbers in parenthesis indicate the number of lodges from the District in at-

attendance at that particular School of Instruction. The rightmost percent column indicates the percentage of officer attendance at the three ritualistic schools from that district.

This year total attendance by officers was up by 82. The average officer attendance at the three (3) ritualistic Schools of Instruction increased from 30.7 to 32.5. Upon studying the Summary Sheets from the Schools of Instruction, I note an alarming absence among the Masters and Wardens, particularly Senior Wardens. It is difficult to imagine how, when they are consistently absent, the Craft is provided with proper instruction. An added concern is their inability to effectively encourage and foster attendance by the junior officers of their lodge who invariably look to them for a standard of expectation. This is certainly not the most optimal situation for encouraging the conscientious Mason to become an officer. It is a concern which many of our lodges presently share, and which we must improve upon for the health of our Craft.

Last year it was reported that seven (7) Lodges were not represented at a single School of Instruction. We have a small improvement this year - six (6) Lodges were not in attendance at these Schools. In the 18th District, Greenleaf Lodge No. 117 at Cornish has not been represented by a single officer for the past two years. It would appear that our brethren need help.

Those not represented by officers at any Schools of Instruction are as follows:

Officer attendance ranges from 17 percent in District 12 to 46 percent in District 6. To be commended for their excellent attendance are the officers of Districts: 1, 2, 3, 14, 17, all of which were above 40 percent; far better than average attendance came from Districts 4, 15, and 21. Fifty (50) percent of the Districts were above the average of 32.5 which is pleasing to note. Districts 2 and 14 had representatives from all lodges at each School - a perfect record. The Sixth District missed a three year perfect record by one lodge at just one School - nevertheless, an excellent record. We commend the officers of these Districts for their fine record and dedication to their Lodges and to Freemasonry.

The success of the Schools depend on the work, interest, and effort of many brethren. We express special thanks to the District Deputies for sending the cards notifying the officers of the Schools, and those who help in various ways to make the schools successful.

District Educational Meetings

A District Educational Meeting was presented in each District again this year. These meetings are non-ritualistic and deal with topics of general interest to the brethren as well as the officers. They are well received by those in attendance, but we are still not attracting as many brethren (non-officers) as we would like to see at these meetings. Our objective has been to provide "something Masonic" as well as "good and wholesome instruction."

Each Assistant Grand Lecturer had latitude with the topics and was assisted by the Deputy, District Representative (in some Districts) and other brethren. The program this year included the following topics:

- A. Masonic Etiquette and Courtesy
- B. Masonic Charity - The Program
The Concept
- C. A Masonic Short Talk
 - 1. Geometry - "The 47th Problem of . . ."
 - 2. "The Dew Drop Lecture"
 - or 3. A Masonic Short Talk - Philosophy, Symbolism
- D. Masonic Questions and Answers

There were 164 of the 200 Lodges with attendance of 903 brethren present at these meetings. Our goal will be to improve this participation.

Table Lodges

Thirteen (13) dispensations were issued by the Grand Master for the purpose of holding Table Lodges. A number of these were held to honor veteran members, others to celebrate anniversaries of Lodges. In compliance with my duties, I have appointed a Grand Lodge

Representative to be present to extend the greetings of the Most Worshipful Grand Master, and the M.W. Grand Lodge of Maine. I have continued to send a letter to the Lodge informing them of their Grand Lodge Representative and asking them to include him on their printed programs, and provide appropriate time for him to bring official greetings. Reports received from Grand Representatives indicate the Table Lodges are being conducted according to the Ritual, and brethren enjoy the good fellowship.

Degree Teams

There have been ten (10) authorized degree teams functioning within the state during the Masonic year. I have authorized these Teams to exemplify the Master Mason Degree in accordance with the policy established by Grand Lodge in 1960, and their permission is valid until May 7, 1986. I have observed several of the Degree Teams and their work has been fine. The furthest away was when I traveled to Wells during July to attend the "Outdoor Degree" where the Master Mason Degree was exemplified by the York County Shrine Club. A most enjoyable afternoon; the work was excellent. These Teams do much to foster visitation among the brethren. A sincere thanks to those who so freely give to the Craft their time, energy, and talent.

To the veteran members: R.W. Brothers Reginald Wing, Gerald Pickard, Edward Emery, Linwood Burnham, and Charles Partridge, our special thanks for a job well done. I consider it a privilege to work with such good Masons. To each I offer my sincerest thanks for excellent work, dedication, and their complete cooperation.

As a staff we met three (3) times during the year for full day work sessions. These prove very helpful and enable us to present the ritualistic schools in a uniform manner throughout the state.

Recommendations

I recommend that the Assistant Grand Lecturers be invited as Associate Members (ex-officio) to the Committee on Masonic Education and Lodge Service. Since their positions do much to promote and enhance the programs of the Grand Lodge Committee, their direct participation is most desirable and beneficial to the Grand Lodge.

I recommend that the official inspection report form be augmented to provide the record of attendance of officers at Schools of Instruction, and that this be considered a factor in the total evaluation of the rating given the Lodge at inspection.

Conclusion

I express my warmest fraternal thanks to all who contributed to success of our Schools of Instruction, to the Deputies for promotion and encouragement they provide the Lodges. Without this effort we certainly would not be as successful. Ours is really a team effort.

Finally, to you Most Worshipful Sir - my sincere thanks for the faith and trust you have placed with me. It has been my pleasure and privilege to serve my brethren and this Grand Lodge.

GREENLEAF MEDAL

The Grand Marshal was asked to present Brother Roger Lincoln to the East where the Grand Master presented him with a Simon Greenleaf Medal. Brother Lincoln thanked Grand Master Schmidt for the honor conferred upon him.

ROGER BATES LINCOLN

Roger Bates Lincoln was born in Houlton, Maine, August 12, 1911. He attended the public schools of Houlton and attended the University of Maine at Orono for three years. He transferred to Bryant College, Providence, Rhode Island and graduated in September 1936 with a Degree in Business Administration.

Roger was a Cost Accountant from 1936 to 1946 in Providence, R.I. From 1946 to 1963 he was a potato grower in Aroostook County. He worked with the Maine State Library Book Mobile for 13 years.

He is a member of the First Congregational Church of Houlton since 1926, served several terms as Deacon, served on the Church Committee, Business Committee, Superintendent of Church School and Recording Financial Secretary.

He married Ruth May Williamson on July 27, 1940 and they have two children, Roger B. Jr. and Ruth Elizabeth. They have five special grandchildren.

Roger is a member of Civil Defense Watch on Garrison Hill and a past member of Town Budget Committee.

Brother Roger was raised a Master Mason on June 11, 1947 in Monument Lodge No. 96 in Houlton; served as Master 1957 and has served as secretary from 1968 to present, 18 years with distinction. He is certainly among our best secretaries. (His father, Levi B. Lincoln, was Worshipful Master of Monument Lodge in 1930) Roger was appointed Grand Junior Deacon 1970-72 by M.W. Roger I. White, which he enjoyed greatly and has been most appreciative over the past years.

He joined Aroostook Chapter, Royal Arch Masons on April 19, 1949 and was Treasurer 1984-85 and 86; St. Aldemar Commandery No. 17 February, 2, 1950; Aroostook Council of Royal & Select Masters; Anah Temple Shrine; August 11, 1950; A.A.S.R. Eastern Star Lodge of Perfection 12/1/1956; Council of Princes of Jerusalem 12/1/56 Rose Croix Chapter 4/16/60 and Maine Consistory, 32° 5/14/1960.

He is a Charter Member of Houlton Chapter of DeMolay 1925 and is presently a Rainbow Dad and has received the Grand Cross of Color. He was initiated in the Order of Eastern Star in 1949 and was Worthy Patron 1958.

Roger has served his Lodge and the Craft in the First District with distinction, but mostly the high principles of the Craft are demonstrated in his daily life.

CREDENTIALS

Bro. Mason Shaw, for the Committee on Credentials, presented a verbal report which was accepted. There were 183 Lodges represented, 17 not represented; 54 Grand Officers; 41 Permanent Members. Total votes: Lodges, 549; Grand Officers, 54; Permanent Members, 41; total votes 644, less 7 duplicates, leaving a final total of 637 votes. The Grand Master granted permission to amend and add before the final report, and urged any Lodges who have not registered to do so.

GREENLEAF MEDAL

M.W.: This is a little unusual, Brethren. Last week we presented a Simon Greenleaf Medal to Brother Warren Moulton, who is 99 years old, soon to be 100. He is in a nursing home in York and we taped the presentation. I hope most of you can see this.

Equipment was set up to show the video tape of the presentation. Brother Moulton responded with appropriate remarks, thanking the Grand Master for the honor conferred upon him. He then entertained with a few selections on the piano.

WARREN A MOULTON

Warren A. Moulton was born December 26, 1887.

He was raised a Master Mason in St. Aspinquid Lodge No. 198 on June 3, 1919. That same, 65 years ago, the presiding Master asked him to express his feelings about the ceremony he had just experienced. Looking around the room and seeing a piano, he remarked that the experience was a very moving one, and one that he should never forget, and stated that the only way in which it could be improved was if they had music accompanying it. When informed by the Master that he agreed with him, but that there was not a member in the Lodge who could play the piano, Brother Moulton said that he could play, and would be glad to. And play he did! For over 65 years he played the piano and later the organ which the Lodge acquired. In all that time, I am told he missed only a very few meetings and those due to illness. I am also informed that in all those years he never accepted a penny for his services.

Bro. Moulton was presented Mason of the Year Award by Most Worshipful Roger Snelling at his home in York. In 1985 he presented the Grand Lodge with a Masonic History Book that had been passed down through his wife's family. The book was a gift to his wife's family by one of Maine's governors. He also presented a table to the Grand Lodge Library, that was presented to him by Worshipful Doyle Sowerby as a special recognition for his many years of service as organist.

Warren has two daughters and one son. His hobbies were gardening, playing the organ, piano, Masons, Church and local history. He is 98 years young with a wealth of history and a great personality. Also his independent nature is very refreshing. He says "I want to do all I can to help other people."

Brother Moulton is a remarkable man—an individual who lives, rather than just professes, his Masonry.

GRAND SECRETARY

The Grand Secretary presented his report, which was accepted and referred to the Committee on Doings of Grand Officers.

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine:

Our tenacious pursuit of enlarging the flow of information to our constituent lodges continues. Specifically the information hidden in paper work.

Computer installation - Our R.W. Junior Grand Warden, Carroll B. Knox, undertook an assignment from this office to prepare a comprehensive computer program, specifically geared to the needs of an average lodge (200-300 members). It included details of labor costs, equipment, programs, etc. The output would consist of reports, personnel records, financial data, dues cards, trestle boards, etc.

That report has been finalized and will be available this year. An outstanding example of going that extra mile to provide assistance to lodges who unknowingly could conceivably afford such an operation as described above by Brother Knox. For his initiative, his capacity for thoroughness of detail and enthusiasm, we are indebted.

Monthly reporting - This year has been one of pleasant surprises. Our past frustrations at our inability to acquire current statistics in the Grand Lodge data files has taken a positive turn. In preparing the way for eventual computerization, by utilizing an abbreviated reporting form, ten Pilot Lodges (Tranquil #29, Howard #69, Standish #70, St. Andrew's #83, Polar Star #114, Pownal #119, Kenduskeag #137, Columbia-Doric #149, Caribou #170 and Deering #183) volunteered to forward personnel changes, etc., enacted at each stated meeting, within 7 days of that meeting. The results were outstanding. Our records became current and the time span now could conceivably reduce, if not eliminate, the "log jam" at year's end for all parties involved. By a continuous District Deputy follow-up, we can be alerted within a month, of Lodge Secretaries retiring, illness, absent from their duties, etc. - a situation that has plagued us for years. Records have been lost, many left unrecorded, resulting in utter confusion. The proposed monthly reporting is scheduled for implementation hopefully at the end of this third quarter of 1986, by all lodges. A hearty congratulation and thank-you to each of these participating Lodge Secretaries.

Indexing, the key to Information Retrieval. In continuing our primary function of expediting communications and data to our Lodges, we have once again ventured into the indexing field. We have gathered together every issue of the Maine Mason, placed them in an "Arco" binder and prepared an alpha index of every subject and author to date. There are 35 sets available. All owners shall also receive the future issues and an updated index. A valuable library gift and an educational tool for newly-raised brethren. \$10.00 per set.

The Grand Lodge Service Letter - We are continuing our progress (over 150 to date) of these brief informative notices and instructions taken from all Masonic areas. In taking "pot shots" at the common statement concerning manuals being "too long", "no-one reads them", etc., we have taken definitive guidelines, descriptions, duties, responsibilities, of individual teams, etc., arranged them alphabetically, indexed them accordingly, and are able to issue them in a minute's notice in lieu of the entire manual. We continually see in the Condition of the Fraternity, reports for data that is, and has been, readily available. Try us!

The Masonic Service Association, in answer to numerous requests, uniquely honored our Grand Lodge by suggesting that we prepare a Short Talk Bulletin entitled "Our Special Ladies". (Short Talk Bulletin # May, 1985)

The Northeast Conference of Grand Masters, Deputy Grand Masters and Grand

Secretaries invited us to prepare and discuss this Bulletin and program at their Annual Session at West Lebanon, New Hampshire on July 7-8, 1986.

The Grand Secretaries Conference, at Arlington, Va., invited us to prepare and discuss the Masonry-in-Action "Team Concept Program", with its impact on solving present day problems of "Officer fallout", "inactive past masters", "irate wives", "poor public image", "inadequate neglect of our shut-ins", etc. It was a provocative session.

Consolidations - We are equally proud that the Grand Lodge Office has, in a small way, been instrumental in preventing four lodges, in different sections, from consolidating. Each of them is now making a "go" of it. Many thanks to three District Deputy Grand Masters, a Past Grand Master and the present Deputy Grand Master. The lodges asked for help, they received positive help, and as a team, it worked. We are proud of you all - Lodges and helpers.

Grand Lodge Assistance - This program continues to amaze me. The cooperation of our other Grand Jurisdictions, especially that of Dave Carleton, the past Director in the Grand Lodge Office of Mass. We will certainly miss him. Grand Secretaries' responses from, and requests to them, are handled with speed and alacrity. Many times the information is sparse, but it somehow gets action and the limits taken to find people, and to alert us of that individual's plight, makes us proud to be a part of the network. If we could only do the same for our own brethren within the state. The difference in the above paragraph is someone had identified the individual. We have the tools. Our Team Concept tells us how. Our alibi is gone. The problem comes home to roost.

It would be fitting and proper to praise the work of the Masonic Relief Association. An example, we had a Maine man living in Martha's Vineyard in Massachusetts, who was having a kidney transplant in Minnesota. The Relief Association Representative there called Mass., who notified us. Our lodge received the word, and was reassured before the fact. Terrific! No "gimmicks" here, Brother, just plain old Masonic basics.

We have enlisted periodically (because of their proximity in the same building) the aid of Senator William Cohen's office, on numerous occasions, in resolving Social Security difficulties of our Brethren and Special Ladies. That office has identified and directed us to key individuals in the local Human Services Area and Veterans' Administration Office. I'm sure other Congressmen would do the same, but to date we have been dealt with fairly and expeditiously.

The above-noted accomplishments from our Grand Lodge team, specifically Mrs. Field, Mrs. Tupper and Bruce Tornquist, have been many, varied, time-consuming and rewarding. To them I am personally grateful and indebted, an opinion shared by all of us. May God bless and guide them always.

STATUE OF LIBERTY

M.W. Peter C. Schmidt reported orally on the Statue of Liberty project.

M.W. Schmidt: I have reported before and right now am very happy to report that the trust fund for the restoration of the Statue of Liberty has passed the \$37,000 mark and hopefully by July 1st it will be as high as \$40,000. The money is still coming in. Some lodges have not contributed and some probably never will - probably they can't, but the money is still coming in very well. This morning and last night, R.W. Bro. Haven McCrillis has sold ties, key rings and pins to the tune of almost \$300. For this I am very grateful. Thank you, Haven. The Commitment I made two years ago, kind of out of the blue, we had about 37,000 Master Masons at the time, and I said I would commit the Grand Lodge of Maine for \$37,000, and Brethren, you've come through. For this I am eternally grateful.

The report was accepted.

THE MAINE MASON

M.W. Charles R. Glassmire, editor of *The Maine Mason*, made an oral report. After the last issue came out, featuring the dedication of the new Lodge Hall of Harmony Lodge #38, there have been questions as to why other new halls were not mentioned. No material was sent in. If lodges want articles printed about them, they must send in the material and pictures. Pictures should be black and white, preferably glossy. Color pictures can be used, but they must be very clear. They usually do not come out as well.

For the first time, *The Maine Mason* went over its budget. This was due to increased costs in printing, postage, etc. He urged the increase in the per capita tax to bear the expense.

Material sent in cannot always be used in its entirety. Depending on the number of articles sent in, the editors must pick and choose.

He thanked Arthur Griffiths for all his assistance in putting out the magazine.

The verbal report was accepted.

MAINE MASONIC BLOOD PROGRAM

R.W. Edward I. Emery, Chairman of the Maine Masonic Blood Program, presented the following report, which was accepted.

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine, A.F. & A.M.:

At the last annual communication of this Grand Lodge I stated that this program was worth every dollar that we have spent on it and we should continue to support it. In 1985 I'm very pleased to report that we exceeded the total units of blood donated in 1984 by 388 giving us a total recorded number of pints donated of 1096. Eighteen districts showed an increase and six showed a loss.

The District Chairman and Brethren who had a part in the success of this program, I congratulate and thank you.

I stress the point of using your Lodge I.D. number when donating blood. The Red Cross total for 1985 showed 1015 units donated, from the District Chairman reports it was 1096 a difference of 81. Please use your I.D. numbers and also notify your Chairman when you donate.

AIDS or Acquired Immune Deficiency Syndrome has been in the lime light this past year and it will continue into the future. One of the Questions asked about this disease is, can I get AIDS by donating blood? The answer is No, AIDS cannot be acquired by donating blood.

I would like to explain a different kind of blood donation, it is called Pheresis and can only be done by special equipment which is located in Bangor and Portland. Pheresis is an unusual kind of blood donation. Instead of giving whole blood, as in a regular donation, you give a specific component of blood, such as plasma, platelets or white cells. In a regular whole blood donation, blood is drawn from one arm in about 6 to 8 minutes. Because your body needs time to replace its iron loss, an 8-week interval is required between whole blood donations.

A Pheresis donation takes 2 or more hours. Blood is drawn from one arm and passed through a blood-separating instrument that separates and collects a single blood component and a person can give weekly.

Who benefits from Pheresis donations? People who are under Cancer therapy and those who have Leukemia or Aplastic anemia having greatly depleted supplies of platelets or white cells. We have at least four brethren who now donate to this program and District Chairmen should note in their reports if they have a brother donating to the Pheresis program.

In 1985 we had 11 requests for blood out of State which was taken care of accordingly. If you or your family need blood out of State, please contact me.

To brethren all, thank you for your support to this program and to the brethren who can donate blood, I ask this question, when was the last time you donated blood?

Following a brief span of three years with the Bates Manufacturing Corp., Ed joined Central Maine Power and has been with them up to the present time.

Brother Emery was raised a Master Mason on September 27, 1967 in Polar Star Lodge No. 114, was Master in 1971 and has been Treasurer since 1972. Was elected President of the 14th District Master and Wardens Association in 1970 and Secretary/Treasurer in 1977. During this span he received the 14th District's "Outstanding Mason" award in 1973. He also holds membership in: Ancient Accepted Scottish Rite Valley of Lewiston, Maine Consistory 32°, Portland; Maine Council Order of High Priesthood; DeBoullion Conclave #2, Red Cross of Constantine; the Maine Lodge of Research; Maine College Societas Rosicruciana In Civitatibus Foederatis; Genesta Chapter #73, O.E.S. and an Honorary Member of Solar Lodge #14 F. & A.M. of Bath.

R.W. Emery presently is the State Chairman of the Grand Lodge Masonic Blood Program. It was his initiative that revitalized the program. He has prepared a comprehensive manual that includes the organizational structure with the corresponding functions, detailed guidelines and reporting procedures. His liaison efforts with the American Red Cross, the identification number assigned to each lodge, etc. have been a significant factor in this revitalization. Brother Emery is no stranger in the Blood Donor field. He has donated 86 pints to this cause.

He is married to the former Barbara Norwood and they have three sons, Rickie, Timothy and Thomas. He is presently a member and Treasurer of West Bath Grange, Honorary Member of the Municipal Band in Bath and is a member of the United Church of Christ in Bath.

For his dedicated and distinguished service to his Community and to Freemasonry, the Grand Lodge of Maine is pleased to award him the Josiah Hayden Drummond Medal.

Hiram Lodge No. 180 remains the largest with a membership of 803. Naskeag No. 171 remains the smallest with 45 members. Ocean No. 142 shows the largest gain (10), while Corner Stone No. 216 suffered the greatest loss (49). Average membership is 179.9 and 54 lodges report fewer than 100 members.

M.W.: Before I ask for this next report, which is on DeMolay, I would like to say that if I omitted from my report this morning that DeMolay helped in the Statue of Liberty project, they did help. DeMolay did help. I did mention Rainbow, I'm not sure that I mentioned DeMolay. All bodies, Shrine, Scottish Rite, York Rite, they all contributed to this program.

The Grand Master then read the report of Bro. Clyde L. Ferris, Executive Officer of DeMolay in Maine, which was accepted.

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine:

Maine DeMolay has had another very busy and active year, however, we do have one big problem. I'll go into this problem a little later in my report.

We have had several important advances in the Jurisdiction of Maine this year and it is difficult to determine which one has been the most important as they all have made Maine DeMolay better.

Kora Temple Shrine in Lewiston held the first Annual DeMolay Brunch on September 29, 1985 in which we realized a total of \$3,400. This additional revenue enabled us to hold a State-wide Advisors Training Session on February 2, 1986 in which we brought in 2 experienced Advisor Trainers to run it for us and put 35 Advisors through, which became Accredited Advisors. We taped the Training Session and plan to use it for Regional Training Sessions throughout the Jurisdiction of Maine during the year.

The same day, we held a Chapter Councilor Training Session which an Active Member of International Supreme Council from Massachusetts led for us. This was also very successful and there were about 28 Councilors from local Chapters taking part.

During the past two years since I became Executive Officer in Maine, we have re-activated or started 5 new chapters. A couple of other chapters that were about to go inactive have become stronger chapters.

We ended the DeMolay year in 8th place for % of Membership of our goal. We plan to do better this year.

We hosted the East Coast Priory Conclave in Portland last August and it was very successful. We had 8 Pories represented and about 100 Knights, Advisors and guests were in attendance. In addition to having meetings and degree work, we all enjoyed a good old fashioned Down East Lobster Bake.

At our Congress Session which was held on December 7th and 8th, Maine DeMolay decided it was time someone did something about the membership problem in DeMolay. The Congress delegates voted unanimously to have a year long Membership Campaign beginning January 1, 1986 and set a goal of doubling our membership in 1986. We further voted unanimously to challenge the other 51 Jurisdictions of the International Supreme Council, Order of DeMolay to exceed 100% of their goal for the year 1986.

Our membership is going very well now and we have already had a couple of new members bring in petitions of some of their friends and classmates.

Our Advisor Recruitment Program started on February 1st when we held our Advisor Training Session, which I mentioned before. It is a continuing program and is one of our most important programs. The hardest thing for us to do is to find Advisors. I have appointed Brother Wilbur F. Loveitt the Director of Advisor Recruitment, and I realize he is beginning a busy year as Grand Commander, however, he talks to a lot of Masons in his travels throughout the State of Maine and he already has signed up a couple of Advisors for us. I'm sure he will be a successful Director of Advisor Recruitment.

I have just returned last week from Jackson, Mississippi where I attended the Nineteenth International Congress Session and the Sixty-Sixth Annual Session of The International Supreme Council, Order of DeMolay with our State Master Councilor, Mark E. Ryder and our Deputy State Master Councilor, Scott Matthews. I served as an Advisor for the Appendant Organizations Committee at the DeMolay Congress and, believe me, this was a most rewarding experience watching these young men who are the leaders of DeMolay throughout the United States make the decisions of what they would like to have happen the coming year in DeMolay. Brothers, these young men will be the leaders of tomorrow for our cities, states and country and let me tell you, we are going to be in good hands. We should listen to these young men more often.

I have the pleasure to announce that DeMolay International has taken on a new Charity Project that of The DeMolay Dream Factory. The DeMolay Dream Factory Foundation was formed at a meeting held on January 18, 1986. The purpose of the DeMolay Dream Factory is to grant the wish of terminally ill children. Youth aiding youth, and this project is what is going to put DeMolay on the map. We are going to set up a DeMolay Dream Factory Chapter in Maine very shortly. I have appointed Brother John C. Stacy of Cape Neddick as the Director of the Maine DeMolay Dream Factory with State Master Councilor, Mark Ryder as the Chairman. Our goal is to be able to have the dream of any seriously ill child anywhere to be made to come true.

Now for our **BIG** problem I mentioned at the beginning of this report. My one big concern is that there are young men in Maine between the ages of 13 and 21 that are not receiving the opportunity and excitement of being a DeMolay. That is because there is no local DeMolay Chapter in their area. The reason there is not a DeMolay Chapter in there area is

because we do not have the manpower to have DeMolay Chapters in all areas where they are needed. These young men need DeMolay and the Masonic Lodges need DeMolay, but out of a Grand Lodge of 36,000 Masons, we have a hard time getting Advisors. Brethren, over 50% of DeMolays become Master Masons . . . More than 150 DeMolays have become Grand Masters of Grand Lodges and over 250 DeMolays have attained the 33rd Degree in Freemasonry. In the latest International DeMolay Cordon that just came out, it listed the Senior DeMolays who currently serve as Grand Masters of their State's Masonic Grand Lodges. They were American Canadian, Arizona, Delaware, Idaho, Illinois, Maryland, Michigan, Missouri, Montana, Ohio, Oklahoma, South Dakota, Tennessee, Texas and Wisconsin. That is 15 Grand Masters who were currently serving, that are Senior DeMolays. I think that is quite an impressive record and that proves to you that DeMolay is helping Freemasonry.

We appreciate the financial support we receive from this Grand Lodge and all the subordinate lodges, however, we sincerely need your support with manpower and I earnestly request that you Brethren submit some names to me or Brother Wilbur Loveitt, so that we can contact them.

DeMolay and Rainbow are the two greatest fraternal organizations for young men and young ladies in the world, but if we are going to remain that, we need your help in Manpower. Please help us so we can help you.

DISTRIBUTION OF THE CHARITY FUNDS

M. W. Charles E. Crossland, for the Committee on Distribution of the Charity Fund, presented the following report, which was accepted.

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine:

The fiscal year which ended March 31, 1986 was one of our best in recent years. It was not in terms of number of applications, nor of the amount of relief given, but in the heartwarming letters received from many of the beneficiaries indicating that our relief had really touched the spot. That is what Masonry is all about. We hope that we may carry on and increase our aid in the years ahead.

A total of 52 applications were received from 43 lodges during the past year. This is a decrease of about ten percent. Grants totalling \$114,900.00 were made. This is an average of \$2,210.00 per application, which is slightly more than the \$2,178.00 of the preceding year.

Relief was given to 33 members in the amount of \$74,400 while that given to others was \$40,500. New applications, that is those making application for the first time, were 17% which is about the usual percentage of the total. More younger Masons sought relief this year due either to accidents or temporary employment problems. There was only one non-Masonic related application received and assistance granted this year.

Three lodges requested payments of dues for five U.S. Veterans who could not pay the dues and wished to maintain their active standing.

Our Grand Lodge Charity Fund has paid a total of \$2,429,255. in relief since our organization in 1820. Incomplete returns from the lodges show that they paid \$1,365,194 presumably from their own treasuries thus making a grand total of \$3,698,576. paid for relief. This is an impressive figure for our Grand Lodge and the lodges. Unquestionably the total will increase more rapidly in the future.

Our Committee urges the lodges to search more diligently to find and assist those who need and merit our assistance. This is the major responsibility of Masonry.

CONDITION OF THE FRATERNITY

R.W. Lewis E. Newell, for the Committee on Condition of the Fraternity, presented the following report, which was accepted and the recommendations adopted.

In Grand Lodge
Portland, Maine
May 6, 1968

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine:

Your standing committee on the "Condition of the Fraternity" has reviewed the reports of the District Deputy Grand Masters, as provided in Sec. 36, Par. 9 of the Grand Lodge Constitution.

All of the individual lodge reports have been reviewed, and all of the annual reports, with the exception of three lodge reports and one annual report, which we did not receive. The annual reports were very well done this year with only two omitting over-all conditions in their districts.

The District Deputies have been busy this past year and have attended and promoted many interesting functions. Masonry should reflect their dedication to the improvement of the image of masonry in their areas.

Several Deputies have made suggestions and recommendations as follows:

More promotion of the Advanced Study of Masonry.

More and better communication between lodges.

Work should be done on the Maine Masonic Constitution to simplify the ability to find subjects.

That degree teams be required to maintain a proficiency of excellent or very good in the ritual to be allowed to work.

That lodges be penalized for not showing up or not having the three top officers present at Schools of Instruction.

Suggestion that a mock lodge could be performed at a District Education meeting showing how balloting should be performed, election of officers is held, candidates received and conducted, and dignitaries received and conducted.

Make greater use of the "Instructor's Manual."

That the Grand Lodge develop a Lodge Inspection format that will bring about more consistency in the way that District Deputies are rating and evaluating the work of a lodge.

That the Grand Lodge give higher priority to educational programs designed to improve the leadership skills of Masters, Wardens, District Representatives and District Deputies.

DeMolay and Rainbow

Five reports indicated Rainbow chapters.

Five also reported DeMolay Chapters in their districts. The nineteenth district reported three active Rainbow Chapters and three active DeMolay Chapters.

Masonic Education

Considerable effort has been expended in various masonic education activities, such as 4th Night Programs, Advanced Study of Freemasonry, the Pilot Lodge Program and use of the "Instructor's Manual." In addition, many varied programs, such as films, plays, and use of speakers have been held in the lodges.

Schools of Instruction

Slight increase this year in attendance. Districts 2 and 14 were represented by all of their lodges in each of the schools.

Six lodges were not represented at any Schools of Instruction.

Financial Conditions

Sixty-two lodges have two hundred and fifty dollars or less in outstanding dues, sixteen of these have less than one hundred dollars, eight have less than twenty-five dollars and four have no outstanding dues. These lodges are located in the 6th, 12th, 15th, and 17th districts. It was interesting to note that twenty-four lodges have only current year dues outstanding. Two of these have 500 members. The secretaries of these lodges are doing a fine job.

It was also noted that one lodge of 229 members has \$2,390 outstanding and one lodge of 72 members has \$1,830 in unpaid dues.

Ritual

Thirty-eight lodges were given "Excellent" ratings, ten received "Fair" and two were given "Poor" ratings. All others received "Very Good" and "Good" ratings. (Note: Three lodge reports were not received.)

Masters and Wardens of Officers Associations

Ten active associations were reported and one active Past Masters Association.

Fraternal Conditions of Lodges

Twenty-one districts reports indicated good conditions with only two weak lodges reported. Several of these reported excellent conditions in their districts.

Lodge Improvements

Several improvement projects were reported, such as heating system, new plumbing, insulation, roofs, interior and exterior painting, etc. New lodge halls in Eastport, Alfred, Scarborough, Dixfield, and Turner were reported.

Charity Funds

Thirty lodge reports did not indicate Charity Funds. Several reported many charitable acts were performed by our lodges that did not necessarily require the use or donations of funds. All lodges in the 14th District were commended by their District Deputy for their support of the Togus Veteran's Visitation program.

Mason Widows and Caring and Sharing Program

Many fine programs were reported by sixteen of the districts, and we presume that there were others that were not reported.

Outstanding Meetings

The following are examples of the types of outstanding meetings that were reported:

Caribou—Honored 90-year Veteran member, Archie Belyea.

Princeton—Lewy's Island Lodge hosted the 2nd District's "International Night" on April 27, 1985. M.W. Peter C. Schmidt of Maine and M.W. Gordon Coffey of New Brunswick were present.

Dover Foxcroft—Anah Temple's Past Master Unit worked the Master Mason Degree in a most impressive manner.

Islesboro—District Meeting with 50 members and their guests from the mainland. G.M. Peter C. Schmidt and several Grand Officers were in attendance. The ferry trip was made in good weather which was pre-arranged by M.W. Bro. Schmidt.

So. Thomaston—100th Anniversary of Knox Lodge #189.

Augusta—Bethlehem #35 and Augusta #141 sponsored a surprise testimonial for long time Tyler Bro. Harold P. Lee.

The 11th District sponsored a Table lodge hosted Rural Lodge #53 and honoring R.W. David Fairbairn at Kora Temple with 140 in attendance.

The 12th District reported a M.M. Degree conferred at Waterville by the State Police Degree Team, a Father's Degree by the Rainbow Girls at Fairfield and the 47th Annual Strawberry Festival of Unity Lodge in Thorndike with the latter having an attendance of 85 including M.W. Peter C. Schmidt.

John R. Zaiser, District Deputy raised his two sons on June 10th at the Past Masters' Night of Somerset Lodge #34.

Davis Lodge #67 of Strong celebrated their 100th Anniversary in September, 1985. Hiram Lodge #180 worked the M.M. Degree on five brothers.

Corner Stone Lodge #216 celebrated George Washington's Birthday this year in full colonial costumes.

The 18th District held a Mason's Sunday for Masons, their families, Eastern Star members, Rainbows and DeMolays. M.W. Aubrey L. Burbank gave the sermon and M.W. Peter C. Schmidt read the scripture.

A Masonic Fellowship Night was also held in the 18th District for Masons, their wives and invited guests.

Bethel Lodge #97, by special dispensation, conferred the M.M. Degree, holding lodge at the top of Barker Mt. on August 25, 1985.

Summary

It appears from the review of the reports this year that substantial progress has been made during the last few years by the development of Masonic Education and the implementation of the various new and old programs by the Masonic Education Committee, District Representatives, District Deputies and Lodge Officers.

Recommendations

1. Keep up the good work.
2. The suggestions and recommendations of the District Deputies should be reviewed in the appropriate Grand Lodge Committees.
3. We suggest that newly elected District Deputies be provided with guidelines for the preparation of their annual reports.

MASONIC EDUCATION AND LODGE SERVICE

R.W. Ernest H. Curtis, for the Committee on Masonic Education and Lodge Service, presented the following report, which was accepted.

In Grand Lodge

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine:

During the past year your Committee on Masonic Education and Lodge Service has labored with zeal and dedication to realize the aims of that mission with which it has been entrusted. One of the finest life experiences of the chairman of this committee has been the opportunity to work with the outstanding masons who comprise this committee, with those who have assisted in the committee's endeavors, and with the District Representatives. To all these brethren, the Craft owes a most sincere expression of thanks.

Reports received from those involved in the revised educational plan for candidates and new master masons give unquestionable evidence of the benefit of this effort. New brethren who have been involved in this program are becoming active and knowledgeable masons. In light of this evidence, the committee is moving from the initial pilot program to one of general dissemination and promotion.

Our Grand Master has requested that all masters of subordinate lodges appoint an educational coordinator to work with the District Representative. The *Instructor's Manual*, 80

revised, has been printed in quantity by our Grand Lodge. In addition, the District Representative's Manual has been revised to cover the advances in programs of masonic education and lodge service. In all of these steps, care has been taken to maximize the possibility of team effort and efficient organization upon the district level.

Our Advanced Masonic Education Program, under the direction of R.W. Brother Ernest Curtis is growing and has proven an important stimulator of interest in a series of masonic subjects. Districts nine, fourteen, nineteen and twenty-three have been especially active in this program. District seventeen has begun the cycle of study topics. More than fifty certificates have been awarded to brethren who have completed the study program.

Through the efforts of R.W. Brother N. James Coolong and his Assistant Grand Lecturers a close coordination has been established between the work of this committee and the programs presented at the District Educational Schools. This coordination promises to provide even more effective use of time and effort in the future.

In the past, the committee has attempted to meet the needs for instruction in leadership and in methods of lodge program organization as well as the general dissemination of masonic information through area seminars. In the future this service will be carried out through a team effort focused upon the district level. This new program is under the direction of R.W. Brother S. Clyde Ross. The district teams will include the District Deputy Grand Master, the District Representative, a committee representative and two past masters from the district concerned. This team will work directly with lodges and with district officer associations. In those cases where a district has no officer associations, the District Deputy is being asked to meet regularly with the officers of the lodges within his district and to involve the district team in their masonic endeavors.

An exciting new dimension in the committee's efforts to provide instruction and program materials is the use of video tapes. In this development, the committee has been greatly aided by the efforts of R.W. Brother Reginald Wing. Through his direction, the program of the Masonic Event held last fall in Bangor was taped and copies are being made for distribution. Included in these tapes are M.W. Brother Harlan F. Small's outstanding keynote address and the exceptional presentations of R.W. Brothers Stephen Kemp, Charles Plummer, Wilbur Loveitt, and Reginald Wing.

R.W. Brother John Anagnostis has continued his valuable service as coordinator of the Speakers Bureau. R.W. Brother John reports that this function continues to serve the Craft and that the program is "alive and well". In addition R.W. Brother John has served as our communicator to the Craft through his articles in the *Maine Mason*.

Along with his many other services to the committee, R.W. Brother Wilbur Loveitt has acted as our youth support liaison. Through his encouragement and with the cooperation of a number of District Representatives and lodge officers Rainbow Assemblies and DeMolay Chapters have been visited and asked to present work within our masonic lodges.

Special thanks is given to R.W. Brother Edwin George and to his office staff for their work in printing and sending out the newsletter, forms and other communications of the committee.

At this session of Grand Lodge, our District Representatives will receive an official apron to be worn during the term of their office. With this much deserved recognition of service and symbol of the importance of the Representative's role in the life of the Fraternity, the committee begins a new era of dedication to masonic education and lodge service within the Grand Jurisdiction.

It might be argued that an appropriate emblem for the District Representative's apron would have been that of the Greek mythological character who was condemned to forever push a huge rock up hill. While it is true that all masonic leaders find themselves in a position of not only building but rebuilding and rebuilding again, we are convinced that the stone within the circle was the proper symbolic choice for the new Grand Lodge apron. By a focus upon the individual brother and the individual lodge and by a continual rededication

to our spiritual and masonic trestleboards, we shall, as masons, acquit ourselves with honor, and that as a fraternity, we shall "lay up a crown of rejoicing which shall continue until time shall be no more."

GRAND LODGE HISTORY

Wor. Wallace M. Gage, for the Committee on History of the Grand Lodge of Maine, presented the following report, which was accepted.

In Grand Lodge
Portland, Maine
May 7, 1986

Grand Master, Officers and Members of the Grand Lodge of Maine, A.F. & A.M.:

The collection of material pertaining to the history of Masonry in Maine seems to have received serious attention in 1858, at a time when the Craft was still recovering from the effects of the Morgan affair, which very nearly destroyed it.

At the annual communication of the Grand Lodge of Maine that year, the Committee on Foreign Correspondence called attention to the fact that "... much of the history is yet unknown, and exists only in the memory of Brothers ... who will ere long ... have passed beyond our reach." Following this up, the Grand Lodge adopted a Resolution "That the Grand Master request the W. Master, Wardens and Secretary of each subordinate lodge, as a Historical committee, to secure the important facts in the history of their lodge, and furnish the same with the Grand Secretary."

It didn't take long for what was apparently intended to be a "one-time" measure, to evolve into the present Standing Regulation No. 2, which requires that each lodge compile and submit to the Grand Lodge annually, a historical sketch covering the past year.

In 1860, the first Grand Lodge Committee on History of Masonry in Maine was appointed, whose duty it was, and still is, to receive these lodge histories, and to review and file them in the Office of the Grand Secretary.

Maine, therefore has over the years, accumulated a considerable amount of historical material in its archives, including these lodge histories, the Grand Lodge Proceedings, more recently The Maine Mason, and other related publications, all of which are a valuable source for historical research. No provision was ever made however, for the digestion, coordination, enlargement or reduction of all this material into a useable form. Insofar as we have been able to determine, it was not until 1945, when the then R.W. Ralph J. Pollard produced his "Freemasonry in Maine" for the 125th anniversary, that any really comprehensive history of the Grand Lodge was ever put together. At the request of the Grand Master, M.W. Brother Pollard brought his history up to 1970, for the sesquicentennial celebration.

In 1985, the Grand Master appointed a special one-man ad hoc Committee on History of the Grand Lodge of Maine (not to be confused with the standing Committee on History of Masonry in Maine) to bring M.W. Brother Pollard's work up to date. This has been substantially completed, although some details are still incomplete. (We understand this Committee is to be continued for another year).

The period covered to date has been a relatively short one, from October 1969 to May 1985, yet upwards of 150 hours have been required to research, compile and prepare it. In a considerable number of instances, desired information was apparently never recorded, and is now lost and gone forever.

Historical events should be recorded as they take place. Things that are common knowledge today, will soon be forgotten if not written into the record.

We suggest that as is done in most Grand Lodges, that a Grand Historian be added to the list of Grand Lodge officers shown in Section 2 of the Grand Lodge Constitution, whose duties shall be to maintain on a current basis, the history of the Grand Lodge, and keep a running account of all events as they transpire, and other matters of importance and interest to future generations.

The budget herewith projects a deficit of \$12,420.00 in operations this year.

This next fiscal year our operating revenues will be approximately \$5,000.00 less than last year due to a decrease in the number of members to be assessed the per capita tax. Also, the drop in interest rates will further impair our revenues.

We are faced with increasing costs of operation. Postage, telephone, printing, workmen's compensation, FICA and unemployment taxes are ever increasing. In addition, costs of printing and publishing The Maine Mason edges up each year. We still are unable to fund the travel expenses of District Representatives who now pay their own expenses.

Whether it is an individual, a business operated for profit or a fraternal organization, it is poor financial management to exhaust principal savings and reserves to pay ordinary operating expenses. It is only prudent and sound fiscal policy to finance current operations from current income.

Therefore, the Finance Committee heartily supports the Grand Master's recommendation that we adopt an Amendment increasing the per capita tax. It is imperative that we do so, otherwise, the programs and projects of the Grand Lodge will be in jeopardy.

M.W. Grand Master Peter C. Schmidt then introduced the speaker of the evening, M.W. Jerry C. Rasor, Past Grand Master of Ohio. His address follows:

ADDRESS OF M.W. JERRY C. RASOR

Grand Master, thank you very much for the opportunity to come back to Maine and see all these great Mainers that I haven't seen in a while. The last time I was here I remember that I was not really aware of some of the idiosyncrasies of you Mainiacs, as I understand you are called, and I remember calling a gentleman on the phone, and as I chatted with him, he kept saying "Ayuh". I thought the poor guy was having a heart attack and needed air. He kept saying, "Ayuh, ayuh". Then I discovered that's the way it's done up here, and now I think I can say "ayuh" with the best of 'em, Pete. I'm working on it, anyway.

You know, they gave me a very nice picture and a nice story from the local newspaper. This was given to me - Stan, I think, gave me this this morning and I was very impressed and pleased to have this in the paper until I saw that right next to my picture it says "Death Notices." I don't know whether or not that has any implications as to what I'm going to do here tonight - I certainly hope not. I don't want to die here on this stage tonight.

I was going to start off with a story that would take the hair right off Paul Powers' head, but Paul has already heard this story, obviously. Speaking of bald-headed men, I like to tease bald-headed guys. I don't know why, I just do. They say that fellers in various stages of baldness, it says something about them. Now a guy that is bald in front is a thinker. A guy that is bald in back is a lover. Now a guy that is bald all over just thinks he's a lover.

The last time I was here, I met Ed Haskell. I see Ed's sitting right over here. Now I'm quite a guy. He's been very active for the Grand Lodge of Maine for a number of years. He's the chairman, I understand, of this event here tonight. And I want to say this. When a baby is born and his mother kisses him on the throat, that means he's going to be a speaker. When a baby is born and its mother kisses it on the lips, that means it's going to be a tremendous singer. I don't know where Ed's mother kissed him, but Ed's made a very good chairman for this event tonight.

The Grand Master was talking about People Express and I flew in here on People Express, from Columbus, Ohio. I tried to get on the plane in Columbus. People Express was overbooking its flights. That's exactly what they did in Columbus, and I was bumped. They said, Mr. Razor, you can take the next flight. Now the flight from which I was bumped left Columbus at 3:20, that was on Sunday. I said, "What time does the next flight leave for Newark?" and they said, "Would you like to come back Wednesday?" I didn't have any kind of time. I really was bumped. I had to get on U.S. Air and fly to Newark, and I had to make the People Express connection from Newark to Portland, and got in here Saturday night about 7:25.

You know when airlines come in to the control tower for time, to give you an indication of how the control towers look at the various airlines, if PanAm comes in and asks for time and it's 3 o'clock, the control tower will come in and say, "Pan American, it's 3 o'clock. Hundred hours." If it's TWA, they'll say, "TWA, it's 3 o'clock." Now if People Express comes in and asks for the time, they'll say, "The big hand is on 12 and the little hand is on 3." And if Ozark comes in, they'll say, "It's Thursday." Some of you have flown Ozark before. That is a real thrill, too.

Speaking about flying, I was on this US Air flight, as I told you, coming from Columbus to Newark, and suddenly we heard the conversation up in the cockpit. That's not supposed to be heard by the passengers in the plane, but we could hear the pilot and the co-pilot talking to each other. We heard a male voice say, "Man I've got to go to the bathroom so fast I don't think I can stand it until we get to Newark." We all heard that. The stewardess came running up the aisle and threw open the door to the cockpit and went in, and obviously there was a very hurried conversation because she came out very much relieved like "I've solved that problem". But they didn't shut it off, and as she started back, we heard the pilot say to the co-pilot, "Boy that's a good looking stewardess, I'd love to have an affair with her." The stewardess started running back up the aisle again when a little old lady put out her arm and said, "Honey, there's no need to rush, he has to go to the bathroom first."

I have a lot of good Catholic friends, and they're always telling me good Catholic stories to tell to the Masons. A good friend of mine is the Monseigneur at the cathedral in Columbus. He and I belong to the Kiwanis in Columbus, and he's always feeding me Catholic stories, and I thank him profusely because I do use them at some of these Masonic meetings.

There's a guy pulling out a sheet of paper. He's going to write them down. That's alright, sir.

I heard a good story about the Pope. The Pope received a telephone call in his office at the Vatican, picked up the phone, and it was God. He was so taken aback and he said, "Is this really the Lord?" And this ethereal voice said, "Yes, this is the Lord. I have some good news for you and some bad news." The Pope said, "Please, Lord, give me the good news first." The voice said, "Well, I've decided to abolish all religious groups - the Methodists, the Jews, the Hindus, the Moslems in favor of one universal religion." The Pope then said, "He's calling me, I must be the choice." and said, "Oh, thank you God, very much." What's the bad news?" and the voice said, "I'm calling you from Salt Lake City."

I suppose you've hear about the two Catholic nuns driving their automobile down a two-lane road, when they ran out of gas. They couldn't find anything to put gas in, so they opened the trunk and there was this old bedpan. They went back to the filling station.

the bedpan with gas and were pouring it into the car when a big semi-truck went by and the driver turned to his buddy and said, "Man, those Catholics got faith, ain't they?"

How about the two nuns pushing the shopping cart around through the store? When they went by the place the beer was placed, they picked up a couple of six-packs, put them in the shopping cart and covered them with other goodies, thinking no one would see. The manager of the store, who was also Catholic, saw them. He walked over and said, "Sisters, I don't mean to be rude, I'm a member of the faith, but did I see you put beer in that shopping cart?" The Mother Superior pulled herself together and said, "Young man, at the nunnery we use beer to wash our hair." So he threw in a bag of pretzels and said, "Here, you may want some curlers to go along with it."

How about the doctor who was tending to a nun in his office when the door opened and a Catholic sister ran screaming out into the street. There was a guy sitting in the waiting room and the doctor motioned to him and said, "You're next". The guy went in and said, "Doctor, did I just see a Catholic sister run screaming out of your office into the street?" "Yes, you did". He said, "What did you tell her?" He said, "I told her she was pregnant." The guy said, "Why, that's impossible." The doctor said, "I know, but it's a hell of a cure for the hiccups."

I used to travel all around the State of Ohio when I was Grand Master and you see all sorts of interesting things when you drive around a great state like the Buckeye State. Churches these days have become very public relations minded, have you noticed that? Years ago, if you saw a billboard in front of a church, all it said on it was Sunday School 9:30, Church 10:30, and that was about it - and the name of the preacher. Now, have you noticed, they have little clever public relation sayings to try to get you interested in coming to church on Sunday. I saw one in northwestern Ohio that blew my mind. It said, if you've given up sin, come right in. Someone had written underneath, If you haven't, call 221-0408.

Are there any United Methodists in the audience tonight? Hold up your hand if you're a United Methodist. I know Aubrey is. Hands down, Amen, Brother. Thank you very much. Do you know the ecumenical movement has finally arrived? Oh yes. You know what the ecumenical movement is all about - it means that our Jewish friends can eat pork now, that our Catholic friends can eat meat on Friday and we United Methodists can speak to each other in the liquor store.

I know Aubrey is a United Methodist minister, he gave me his little card that says he's retired. Not retired, just tired - that's what it said on the card. When Aubrey was first starting out, he went to a little church and they gave him a mule to ride back and forth to the church on, because it was kind of a little trek and the guy who gave him the mule said, "Now Aubrey, be very careful because I trained this mule very carefully to answer to two signals. When you say, "Praise the Lord" he will go. When you say, "Amen" he will stop. Got that Aubrey?" He said, "Yup, I got it." So, by golly, he started the next church day and he gets on the mule and he starts out. He goes, "Praise the Lord" and the mule takes right off and goes along and suddenly this great precipice looms ahead, and he goes "Egads" and he forgot what he was supposed to say to make the mule stop, and he kept thinking and thinking and when he got right to the edge he said, "Amen" and the mule stopped, right at the edge, and Aubrey said, "Praise the Lord!"

There's a Buckeye here tonight. When I travel all around the country, people ask me, "What the devil is a Buckeye?" Nobody seems to know what we mean when we say we're from Ohio and we're Buckeyes. There's a Buckeye here tonight. He honestly is from our great State of Ohio. He's now living in Maine and I'm going to call him up here right now. Rod, come up here real fast. I want you to see a real live Buckeye. Sometimes I make me a Buckeye when I'm in other states, but tonight I don't have to do that because we have a Buckeye right here. His name is Rod Swank. Rod and I were good friends back in Ohio until he moved up here to Maine and built a beautiful home up in the woods near Pemaquid. (Did I say that right?) This is a Buckeye. I want to tell you what a Buckeye is, this is

Webster's Dictionary definition of a Buckeye. A Buckeye is a hairless nut, with little commercial value. Well, he's got a lot of value but he doesn't have much hair, does he?

I was going to kid Aubrey about the United Methodist Church, but I'm a Methodist. I can't kid the Methodists too much, but I want to tell you something. In the Methodist church in Ohio, we move our preachers around with regularity. Do they do that up here? I mean like every couple of years they go to bigger and better things. They don't stay long. We've got a great little church and we have a tremendous minister, but I'm afraid we're going to lose him. I'll tell you what happened to the guy who preceded him. We had a minister that we didn't care for and I'll tell you why. I want to show you how he gave a sermon. He looked down, like this, all the time. All you saw was the top of his head. He had a little loose-leaf notebook and he read verbatim out of it. Never looked up. We were so bored that finally a friend of mine, who was on the Worship Committee, said, "I'm going to fool that guy. I see that every Sunday he goes up to the pulpit and he puts that loose-leaf notebook up there before he gives the sermon. Next Sunday I'm going to go up and tear a page out of it, so when he gets up there and starts to read out of that thing, he gets to that page, he'll really get a shock." So he did. The next Sunday the preacher came up and opened his little notebook, put his head down like he always did and said, "Dear Brothers and Sisters, this morning my sermon concerns Adam and Eve. Adam and Eve were in the garden, and Adam turned to Eve and he said," he turned the page and he said, "My God, there's a leaf missing!"

Aubrey laughed and I think I'm home. I think I'm home free!

This new minister we have, he's really great. He's very dynamic and enthusiastic. He's pulled that little church up—(pause) He did it again. You finished that ice cream. I just ate three gallons of ice cream non-stop. First time I came up here they said, "I want you to meet three Grand Masters from this area, one was named Small, one was named Fog and one was named Horn. I said, "Small Fog Horn." I'd never seen anything like that. Congratulations, Carroll, when will the services be held? A few years hence. That guy can eat ice cream like crazy.

Anyway, back to the great little preacher in Commercial Point, he's tremendous. The only problem is, many of you may live in small towns, I do. Pete was right, I live in a little town of 200 people, and we did get sewage, I'm not kidding, and now we have water. Oh yeah, we have water and sewage in Commercial Point. We have all the amenities that you need.

In our little church the preacher is so busy that he sometimes makes mistakes. He sometimes doesn't have time to correct. I collected one of his bulletins and I took this out of it because I wanted you to hear it. This is a church bulletin that he wrote and didn't have time to proofread, obviously. It says, we have a Little Mothers Club in our church, and the Little Mothers Club will meet right after church. All wishing to become Little Mothers meet with the minister in his study right after the service. They were lined up, as I recall.

Also we have a little electronic organ in our church. We have a wealthy parishioner who left us money to buy this beautiful organ for the church. The only problem is do CB radios feed through your television sometimes at home? We're close to Rickenbacker Air Force Base, which is just out of Columbus. The control tower feeds right through that organ on Sunday morning. I kid you not. A few Sundays ago the organist was playing "Nearer My God To Thee" when a voice came through and said, "Prepare to take off." And three people did, as I recall.

Rod knows that I live in Commercial Point - a great little town, and I'll tell you, kids are sharp in a small town. When I went to Ohio State University, a lot of fellow students said to me, "Aw, you're from a little small town. You're a bunch of jerks in a small town, you don't know what's happening. Kids in a small town are very very sharp. We have a grocery store and a kid works there after school and one day this guy came in and said to this kid, "I'd like to buy a half length of stovepipe." The kid said, "I've never heard of such a thing", so he went back to the manager of the store and the man followed him to

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 The kid didn't know it, and the kid said to the manager of the store, "Some idiot out here wants a half length of stove pipe." He turned around and the guy was standing right behind him, so he said, "and this gentleman would like the other half."

The store manager said, "Man, kid, you are really sharp. How'd you get to be so sharp?" He said, "Well, I'm from Scranton, Pennsylvania, originally. Everybody in Scranton is either a prostitute or a football player." The manager said, "Young man, my wife is from Scranton, Pennsylvania." And the kid said, "What team did she play for?"

I tell you, I could stand up here and tell stories all night, but we are running a little late. I did want to get serious for a moment about some of the things that are of interest to me and I hope of interest to everyone in this room, and that is, Quo Vadis, Freemasonry? Which masons, where are you going. It means where is this Fraternity going in 1986? Where will the Fraternity be in 2086? Or 2186? What is the future of this fraternity, and do we have a future? We are in a survival mode today. We are striving for our very survival in a very technical and difficult age.

I remember when I was a kid, in Commercial Point, I've told this story before but I think it bears repeating because there are young men in this audience tonight representing Dighton. My Dad was a truck driver. He was a common man, I suppose, but in this kid's eyes he was anything but common, because he was my Dad. He had a little black book, and he kept looking at that thing, reading, perusing. Finally one day I got up enough nerve and I said, "Dad, what is that little book?" He said, "Son, I've joined the little Masonic Lodge over in Lockbourne and I'm an officer, and this is the ritual and I'm studying my part, learning some beautiful lessons. It takes time, and I'm devoting that time." And he really did. Even after supper, out on the porch swing, he sat there reading that book. He said, "You know something, I've discovered that when I will be Worshipful Master of that Lodge, which is the top officer in that lodge, you will be just old enough to join. What a thrill it would be for me, as your Dad, to raise you to the sublime degree of Master Mason." I didn't know exactly what that meant, but I knew it meant a lot to him. He became Master of that Lodge. I became old enough to join and he died in the East very shortly after he assumed the office, so I never got that opportunity that few fathers and sons get. My mother said shortly after the funeral, "Son, nothing would have pleased your Dad more than for you to become a Mason. I know you have to make that decision, but it would please me if you did." And so I did.

I wasn't very active at first, then finally a friend induced me to go to a meeting, which I did, got in the line, became Worshipful Master of that Lodge, became a District Deputy Grand Master, joined the Grand Lodge line. I was Worshipful Master in 1968, Grand Master in 1978. Ten very short years, but when I stood in Cleveland in that Scottish Rite Auditorium at the first invitational installation in the history of the Grand Lodge of Ohio, I spoke his name, because he was there. I said, "Dad, can you believe it, that that skinny kid that you wanted to raise more than anything else, is standing here today as Grand Master of the largest Grand Jurisdiction in North America?"

Why do you think that happened? I know why it happened - because I had an example to follow, a man who walked straight and true and lived and acted as a Mason. And I wanted to emulate that example.

Therein lies our future. Are we willing to walk and talk and act in such a manner that these young men and thousands more like them will want to emulate our example?

There's one word that appears today to characterize much of our dealings in Freemasonry and I'm afraid it's 'lethargy'. Lethargy and apathy are what goes on in our midst. It seems to me that recently there's been too much apathy in this organization but who cares? That's about it.

There is one word that can lead us out of the abyss in which we find ourselves today, and lead us to a new horizon, and I firmly believe in it. I try to mold my life around this word, 'Enthusiasm'.

You can do anything, anything at all if you have enthusiasm. Enthusiasm is the yeast that makes your hope rise to the stars. Enthusiasm is the sparkle in your eye, the swing of your gait. It's the grip of your hand, the irresistible surge of your will and energy to overcome all obstacles. Enthusiasts are fighters. Enthusiasts are Masons, they have staying quality. Enthusiasm is at the bottom of all progress - with it there is accomplishment, without it there is only alibis. I don't intend to make alibis for anything I do in the name of Freemasonry.

A friend of mine said to me a while ago, "Jerry, you seem to be up and so enthusiastic. How do you do it?" I said, "I'm not up all the time, but I do try to greet the problems that confront me on a day to day basis with an enthusiastic approach to solving them. In the morning when I get up, I take the old family Bible, put it on the stand and let it fall. I run a finger down the page. Wherever it stops, that's my theme for the day. You try it." A few days later I said, "How'd it work?" He said, "It didn't go too well." I said, "What happened?" He said, "I put the old Book up on the stand, ran my finger down the page and where it stopped." I said, "Where'd it stop?" He said, "Judas went out and hanged himself." I said, "No, that wasn't too good. What did you do?" He said, I shut it real quick and let it fall open again, ran my finger down the page a second time." "Where'd it stop that time?" He said, "Go thou and do likewise."

Enthusiasm. I think of the farmer who bought the \$500 rooster because he wanted to have the best eggs in the country. Five hundred bucks he paid for this rooster, and he took him out in the lot and he said, "Now look, Buddy, you be good, now, don't wear your wings out. You be a nice rooster and do your thing." By golly, he watched him, and the rooster said, "Turn me loose." The farmer watched him and, my golly, he was chasing the chickens and the geese and going crazy. The farmer said to him, "Now I told you to mind your business and q's and not get carried away." The rooster said, "O.K." So the farmer went to work and he came home and went right out and looked in the chicken yard and sure enough there that rooster laid, flat on his back, with his feet straight up in the air. The farmer walked over to him and said, "I told you to take it easy." The rooster said, "Sit down. There are buzzards flying overhead, and you're scaring them away." . . . You have to have enthusiasm on that one, men.

Our chief want in life, what is it? It's to find someone or something that can help us help ourselves. Freemasonry can do that. It has the moral structure that many men are lacking. We have to find ourselves. We can find it in our churches, of course, and in our good church-going men, I know that. But we can also find it in our Fraternity.

Did you see "The Death of a Salesman" on T.V. lately? A great show. Willie Loman - when he died the epitaph on his tombstone said "Poor Willie, he never knew who he was." He never found any self-identity. He never found himself. He never knew who he was. In this Fraternity, must believe in our ability to work together as a cohesive unit. We need to use our individual talents, and we all have a special talent. God sends each person into this world with a special message to deliver, a special song to sing, a special act of love to bestow. And remember this, Brethren, no one can speak your message or sing your song or offer your act of love - these have been entrusted only to you.

It takes a complete commitment to the principles of this organization, on the part of every man in this room if we are to be successful and if we are to be a viable fraternity in the next hundred or two hundred years.

How about the chicken and the pig walking down the street. They passed the United Methodist Church where they were having a ham and egg breakfast. The chicken said to the pig, "Isn't that great, those members are having a ham and egg breakfast." The pig said, "It's all in the way you look at it. To you a ham and egg breakfast is a contribution, to me it's a total commitment."

Masonry is under attack today as perhaps never before in our history, maybe not since the Morgan affair in the 1840's. A committee of the American National Conference of Catholic Bishops concluded a study recently, which called Freemasonry irreconcilable not only with Catholicism but with all Christianity. A report prepared for presentation at the British Methodist Conference this past year says, "British Methodists should not have members of this secret worldwide movement and that Masonic Lodges should not be allowed to meet on Methodist premises. The article which appeared in the United Methodist

newspaper indicated that Masonic membership was also a live issue in the Church of England among British Baptists and in the Lutheran churches of Norway and Sweden. And have you seen the John Ankerberg show, out of Chattanooga, Tenn.? I saw a tape of one of those shows this past week that turned my blood cold. I saw our Masonic ritual being exemplified on television by a gentlemen who referred to himself as a former Worshipful Master of his Lodge. He wore an apron and he wore his top hat and he paraded as a Mason when he is no longer a member of this Fraternity, and attempted to divulge every secret he could think of, and I thought, "Oh you fool. You are making yourself look cheap. You are not doing anything to discredit us, you are discrediting your own Pentecostal Church, your own particular religion, especially when at the end, you know what he said? "Send in \$39 and we'll send you tapes and books, and you can learn more about this cult called Freemasonry." What are we going to do in this day and age to fight back?

If Masonry asks its initiates to acknowledge and confess Jesus Christ as Lord and true God, then Masonry's God is the true God. But if Masonry does not require its members to confess and acknowledge Jesus Christ as Lord and the true God, then the God of Masonry is not the true God. This is from an epistle that is being circulated called "Freemasonry and Christianity". Sounds like someone from another denomination saying to a United Methodist, "Well that's alright, we're both just trying to serve the Lord, you in your way and I in His."

A friend of mine, who goes to Florida during the winter, was driving down the street in Sarasota this past winter, when a car stopped next to him. He had a Masonic emblem on his car and the gentleman rolled down the window and yelled at him, "Brother", so he rolled down his window. "Here, take this, Brother, you'll want to read it." He handed it to him and drove off. It begins, "My Masonic friend." It has all sorts of filth about this Fraternity, all of which is untrue. But these are the kinds of things that are being circulated in 1986, in an attempt to discredit this great old Fraternity.

Let's make a basic statement about this, so the whole world will know that Freemasonry is not a religion, nor is it a substitute for religion. The names used for the Supreme Being enable men of different faiths to join in prayer to God, as they see fit. An open volume of the sacred law is an essential part of every Masonic meeting, but that volume may differ from country to country.

Here's the one on which the Catholic Church appears to be attempting to get us, and those are the penalties of the obligation. The physical penalties are simply symbolic. I don't see any of our members running around here with their tongues torn out. These are symbolic. We understand that and our world at large must understand it. Freemasonry supports religion. We are the greatest ally of the church in the world today, and our Grand Master in Ohio, last year, was a Methodist preacher. He was a great Grand Master, and questioned about this, here's what he said. "My Church never substitutes for my Fraternity, nor does my Fraternity ever substitute for my Church."

There are three things for which I am very, very proud, and I want to say it here in Maine tonight. I am proud to be an American, I am proud to be a Christian, I am proud to be a Mason, and I will continue to be the three all at the same time. Nothing can stop me from doing this.

And now we have to make some hard decisions. Decisions that are postponed are likely to be costly and we can't afford to postpone them much longer. Few really worthwhile things are ever handed to us, we get them by seeking them. We find them by growing into them and we can't have them unless we prepare for them. We've got to persevere, to press on. Perseverance is a great old fashioned word, I like it. Persevere. Jack Nicklaus proved that just a couple of weeks ago when he persevered and at 46 became the oldest man ever to win the Masters, and I'm proud to say he's a Buckeye, by golly.

Nicklaus comes back to Columbus regularly. Very few people know this. He's a great man. He goes to the Blind School to visit those kids. Very few people know that. He went back recently. One of the kids was learning to play golf, with the help of a pro, believe it or

not, even though he couldn't see. So he challenged Nicklaus, "Jack, I want to challenge you to nine holes of golf with a buck a hole." Nicklaus said, "Kid, I couldn't do that. I can't make my living playing this game." He said, "Jack, I've been practicing and practicing and practicing waiting for you to get here. Now come on, play me nine holes of golf." And Nicklaus said, "Well, okay, when do you want to play?" And the kid said, "How about 11:30 tomorrow?"

You know what we're doing in Ohio? Things that I think every State in the Union should do. The Masons of Ohio are going to respond, in a very positive way, on T.V. We're going to run a series of public service spots, telling the very positive things about our Fraternity over the State of Ohio. We're going to have an 800 number that interested men may call and they so desire 1-800-MASONIC, and we shall send those men information about Freemasonry, things such as "Freemasonry, A Way of Life," or "Should I Ask for This?" This kind of information that will be helpful. It's a gamble, but it's time we gambled. We're starting a campaign, we're going to wear badges in Ohio. The badges will say "I'm a Mason" or "YMHEM." And if someone says to me, "What does YMHEM mean", I'll say, "It means 'You Make Him a Good Mason'", and then I'll follow through and present him the vital information that he may want and need. Our Grand Master has issued an edict, permitting us to do this kind of thing in Ohio, not to solicit, but merely to give to interested men a little bit of information about the Fraternity so they can make up their minds about us.

We're having get-acquainted meetings in Ohio, bringing outsiders into the temples, showing them our beautiful Masonic edifices and telling them the story of Freemasonry. And this one is extremely important - we're having a night with the Clergy, and inviting the pastors and the priests and the rabbis to our temples and having a special night in their honor, and telling them the true story of Freemasonry, so that some of these temples that show may go by the wayside simply because they find out that what they're telling is not true.

And we feel this one is also terribly important, that we reach out beyond the confines of our temples, reach out into our communities and help those who need and want to be helped. And the Grand Lodge of Ohio is, I think, the first Grand Lodge in the Nation to do this for a charitable purpose as a tool of the Grand Lodge of Ohio. We are taking on the Special Olympics in Ohio, and each year in June, in Ohio, 3,000 retarded kids come to the State Stadium for the finals of the Olympics. This year the Masons of Ohio are sponsoring over 1,500 of those 3,000 kids and for the next few years we're going to sponsor each and every child and the Masons of Ohio are going to be able to say to the world at large, "We care and we're involved in what's going on in Ohio." We believe in the needs of Ohio.

Jesus said in John 21:17, "Feed my sheep." There are those among us who need us, who need the sustenance that only Freemasonry can provide. No man is an island, no organization is an island. I want the world to know I'm a Mason. I have no qualms about that. I'm soever. The day of secrecy is almost over.

I feel like the two bulls that were out in a field. A big truck pulled up and a Brahman bull was unloaded, weighed about two tons. One was an old bull, one a young bull, in the field. The old bull thought, "Oh boy, I'm not going to take on that guy." But the young bull started pawing and snorting and raising a rumpus, and the old bull said to him, "You man, you're not going to fight that two-ton bull are you?" And the young bull said, "No, no, I just want him to know that I'm a bull."

I want the world to know I'm a Mason. We must learn to communicate, that's extremely important. General Motors found that out when they sent their Nova down to Puerto Rico and tried to sell it and it wouldn't sell. They couldn't figure out why until they found out that in Spanish 'nova' means 'it won't go'.

We have to ask people their opinions. How much time do we devote to asking opinions? "What do you think?" "What is your opinion?" I think of the girl who was taking a bath in the summertime. It was hotter than Hades in Ohio, as it is in the summer. She saw a farm pond, took off all her clothes and jumped in and had a nice swim. When she came out of the water, there was a farm boy sitting there, right beside the pile of her clothes.

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ing, and she thought "Uh-oh, How'm I going to get out of here?" She reached around with her feet and she felt an old dishpan, so she picked it up, held it in front of her, and was stalking up out of the water and looked that young farm boy right in the eye and said "What do you think?" He said, "Well, I don't know what I think but I know what you think. You think there's a bottom in that dishpan."

I have followed the readings and writings of this guy sitting here to my immediate right, because the Maine Mason is sent to me, and Charlie, I appreciate that very much. Pete said in an article he wrote about youth, and it was a very good one, 97% of the American homes have television but only 96% have indoor plumbing. Then he had a great line, he said, "All that crap coming in and not enough to take it out."

We need our young people now as perhaps never before in history. We need to work with them in every way possible, but you know something? We need a combination of youth and experience. We need our older members. We can't just shove them aside and say, "Bring on the young guys and the heck with the old guys." Oh no. We need all of you. We need everyone we can get. Sometimes tilling in the twilight is just what men love to do. Stan Sampson was telling me, (he's retired now) he's probably more active in Freemasonry than he ever was when he was working. That's the way it is with some of us.

Michelangelo was in his 60's when he painted the Sistine Chapel. Winston Churchill was 66 when he became Prime Minister of Great Britain. And of course Grandma Moses, right up here in New England, was 76 when she started painting those wonderful, wonderful paintings.

I know when my mother retired, she said, "I don't know where I ever found time to go to work." She joined a bridge club and played bridge every Thursday. It was during the streaking phenomenon on all the college campuses. Remember when the kids were taking off all their clothes and running around stark naked? The hostess of the bridge club, one Thursday, said, "Well, I'll fool them, I'll see how it feels. So she went in the bathroom, took off all her clothes and ran through the room. My mother turned to her friend and said, "Ethel, was that Hazel that just ran through the room?" She said she thought it was. She said, "What did she have on?" Her friend said, "I don't know, but it needed pressing badly."

How about the two elderly sisters that lived together for many years and were convinced by a neighbor they ought to see a doctor for a checkup, so they made an appointment. They sat patiently in the waiting room 'til the doctor called in the first one. "Tell me," said the doctor, "have you ever had sex?" "Well, I'm not sure", she replied, "I'll have to go ask my sister." So she went out and said, "Sister, the doctor asked me if I ever had sex." "I don't know," answered the sister, "but if the doctor says you should have it, get it and Medicare will pay for it."

We're at the crossroads in our history. The Oddfellows were in a crossroads in their history in Ohio many years ago, and they stubbed their toes badly. It's hard to find an Oddfellows hall in Ohio. Hard to find a member of that great old organization. The Grand Master of the Oddfellows was interviewed recently, and here's what he said. "In the past, I guess, we kind of discouraged our younger members. We can't do that any more." Amen.

It's up to us, who have been Masons for a long period of time, to encourage our young men and to get them involved in Freemasonry at whatever level.

Pete said this - at the end of that article he wrote, "Brethren, our responsibilities are unlimited. When we adopt the tenets of our Fraternity and use friendship, morality and brotherly love in our daily lives, and in our attitude toward our young people, we will be fulfilling our responsibilities, both Masonic and otherwise."

I believe in tomorrow, and I believe there is a tomorrow for Freemasonry, but it depends upon every man in this room to assure that. I can't live in tomorrow. All I have is right now. What I do with this today that the Lord has given me, will determine the direction of my tomorrow.

I told Stanley Maxwell last night when we came in, I was going to quote him. Don't know he was going to be here, so I'll quote him anyway. Stanley said in one of his many fine articles in the Northern Light, "A few of the benefits of being a Mason—recognizing that how I live is all important, knowing that my character is my greatest possession, realizing that the good life is to be attained through my commitment to spiritual values. The richest reward is to be able to give myself to those in need." Remember that one. What I do today builds a better world tomorrow. Personal responsibility can never be neglected. The one that I started off with, my life, will always be an example to others.

When I was appointed to the line in Ohio, I guess I was one of the youngest Grand Masters in history, and I was appointed by one of the oldest Grand Masters ever to serve in Ohio, M.W. Bro. Fay L. Gullion. I guess he was trying to tell the Masons of Ohio something. He left me this, he handed it to me on the day he installed me in Cleveland. I've carried it with me for years. It's a little dog-eared now, but I wouldn't give it up for anything, and I want to read it to you in closing.

An old man going along the highway,
Came at the evening cold and gray,
To a chasm, vast and steep,
With water rolling cold and deep.
The old man crossed in the twilight dim;
The sullen stream had no fears for him,
And he turned, when safe on the other side,
And he built a bridge to span the tide.
"Old man," said a fellow pilgrim near,
"You're wasting your strength with building here.
Your journey will end with the closing day.
You never again will pass this way.
You've crossed the chasm, deep and wide.
Why build a bridge at eventide?"
The builder lifted his old gray head.
"Good friend in the path, I have come," he said,

(3) Harold L. Chute, Chairman of the Committee on Investments, submitted an excellent report (copies distributed and analyzed). The following items were noted:

a. *General*—The total market value of Charity Fund on 12/31/84 was \$2,888,000. Of this total value 64.1% was in common stocks and the remaining 35.9% in AAA bonds of which 75.7% was in Government Notes and Bonds and the remaining in telephone, industrial, transportation and finance bonds.

It is interesting to note that a decade ago the market value of the fund was only \$1,013,000. The income from the fund has increased from \$64,388 (12/31/74) to \$157,621 (excluding named funds).

The common stock portfolio consists of approximately 34 stocks representing basic industries, capital goods, consumer durables, consumer nondurables, energy, health care, technology, financial services and utilities. In view of the fact that the Dow Jones Industrial Average (DJIA) has increased from 603 to 1211 over the past decade and our percentage of common stocks has remained about 65% we can now take pride in the good judgment of the total increase to \$1,875,000 in value. Some of this of course has been due to our per/capita dues from Grand Lodge and other new funds.

b. *Investment Policy*—Your committee maintains a very conservative policy. Guaranteed income is paramount coupled with the safety of principal. The size of the fund continues to guarantee safety. It is the old story of "not having all your eggs in one basket," however in spite of our conservatism and the advisers' recommendations occasionally an investment will turn sour.

The committee is very happy with the support we receive in that we are not condemned for things beyond our control. We could not operate without the tremendous support of the Grand Treasurer and Grand Secretary. It has been a fact as long as I have been associated with this Fund (15 years) that they have never made an investment which did not generate interest or dividends and we continue to maintain this policy.

c. *Investment Income*—Our total income including the Charity Foundation (\$157,621) plus the Named Funds (\$18,952) plus Cutter and Rich Funds is \$183,163. Besides our total invested funds we have a \$63,555 Stabilization fund which is used in emergencies.

The total amount of all the invested funds is approximately \$3,255,260. The reason one states the approximate value is that it changes daily with the stock market.

Voted—To accept the report.

Voted—To confirm and ratify all actions of the Investment Committee for the year ended March 31, 1985.

(4) Charles Crossland, Chairman of the *Committee on Distribution*, gave a detailed account of the individual line item assistance grants for the year and was again commended for the statistical format, etc. His judgment, compassion and performance have been outstanding. His many years of service to this Committee was recognized and detailed. It is one that encompassed many years and touched many lives. Truly we are all the better for knowing him.

(5) **Voted**—To pay expenses incident to the work of the Committee on Distribution, including compensation of \$3,000.00 for the Chairman for the year ended March 31, 1986.

(6) **Voted**—to authorize percentage payments to the Grand Lodge for services rendered as follows:

- a. Salary of the Grand Secretary 10% (\$1,400.00)
- b. Salary of the Grand Treasurer 75% (\$6,000.00)
- c. Salaries of the Office Staff (\$2,500.00)
- d. Office supplies (\$1,000.00)
- e. Auditors' fee (75%)

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine, Ancient Free and Accepted Masons:

We submit, herewith, our Annual Report on Fraternal Relations, consisting of a Foreword, Special Reports, Recommendations and Reviews:

FOREWORD

The past year, as you need not be reminded, has been marked by political unrest in many parts of the world, which situation has threatened the existence of many of our sister Grand Jurisdictions and their members, causing many to refrain from fraternal fellowship, to hold "secret meetings" and to be extremely careful not to reveal their membership therein. The Grand Master of York Grand Lodge of Mexico is quoted as saying, "Last year the flame of Freemasonry was definitely extinguished in Afghanistan, and we can state, conservatively speaking, that half the world today, Masonically speaking, is in darkness." This seems like an extreme statement, but one cannot pass it off without concern.

In addition to this political intrigue, there arose, this past year, in England, the homeland of our "Mother Grand Lodge," a highly publicized inquiry, on the part of a Committee of the Methodist Church in that country, into the compatibility of Freemasonry and religion. This "inquiry" carried with it serious implications, totally unfounded, as to the ungodly obligations and teachings of Freemasonry. Accusations and rebuttals were played up by the news media in both Great Britain and this country, causing numerous letters of question and concern. This inquiry was further fostered by the General Synod of the Church of England with like results. I will not take up time or space to further comment on this issue, as each of you know within your hearts that the opposite is true, and to argue the point would only serve to add fuel to the fire. We do not and have never claimed to be a "religion," but do insist on Monotheism and a belief in immortality, using the Great Light upon the altar of Masonry as our guide and source of moral law. However, this act should prompt us to be more conscious of our own character and public demeanor as Masons.

All of the above has been reflected in the reviews of other Grand Jurisdictions as they have repeatedly recommended more "awareness" and greater visibility within the community and various relationships, thus exhibiting by action and deed the worthiness of our Craft.

With almost no exception, the reviews have noted the loss of members for N.P.D., and have sought ways and means to overcome these losses. The Grand Lodge of Nevada has a special program intended to lessen the number of S.N.P.D. For those lodges actively participating, a 55% measure of success was attained.

Brethren, the designs are plainly drawn on the Trestle Board of a new day. Let us pledge ourselves to pick up the working tools of our beloved craft, and continue the labor of those who, with unfaltering faith and diligence, have erected 'Solomonic' temples of the soul.

SPECIAL REPORTS

BRAZIL

(a) Parana

On August 27, 1985, a request for recognition was received from the Grand Lodge of Parana, located in Curitiba. Their Declaration Of Principals is in conformity with our requirements for such recognition. After due consideration, your committee recommends that this Grand Lodge be extended such recognition and exchange of representatives.

(b) State of Mato Grosso

A request for recognition was received on September 4, 1985 from the Grand Lodge of the State of Mato Grosso, seated at Cuiba, Brazil. This Grand Lodge, likewise, meets our requirements, and is considered by the Commission On Information For Recognition Of The Conference Of Grand Masters In No. America to be regular and entitled to recognition.

Your Committee, therefore, recommends that this Grand Lodge extend such recognition and exchange of representatives.

(c) State of Mato Grosso Do Sul

Again, on October 1, 1985, a 2nd request for recognition was received from the Grand Lodge of the State of Mato Grosso Do Sul, their first request having been received May 24, too late for action at our last Annual Communication. This Grand Lodge, like the former, conforms to our requirements, and is likewise stated by the Commission to be entitled to recognition. Your Committee, therefore, recommends recognition and exchange of representatives.

(d) Grand Masonic Lodge of Minas Gerais

Still again, your Committee received a similar request for recognition on April 22, 1986, only two weeks ago. This short period of time has not permitted your Committee sufficient opportunity to consider this request, and therefore recommends no action at this time.

ITALY

The Grand Orient of Italy was recognized by this Grand Lodge several years ago, and has been a source of some concern since the so-called P2 affair. During the past year, the Commission of the Grand Master's Conference has learned of a change in its (Italy) Constitution which eliminates reference to "monotheism" and the V.S.L., and while the Grand Master has stated that these concepts will be put back, it has not been done.

Consequently, its present failure to meet with our requirements prompts us (your committee) to recommend indefinite suspension of recognition until we are assured that the (the Grand Orient) comes into conformity therewith, and further recommends that, when and if this is done to the satisfaction of your committee, the Grand Lodge of Maine grant said committee permission to restore fraternal relations upon approval of the Most Worshipful Grand Master.

The Grand Lodge was opened in ample form by M.W. Bro. Jack Smith with 19 of the living Past Grand Masters present. Distinguished Guests from 8 other grand jurisdictions including four presiding Grand Masters and 5 Past Grand Masters, together with 3 present Grand Officers. Also present were 33 Grand Representatives of U.S. Grand Lodges, including M.W. Bro. Paul E. Bradford representing the Grand Lodge of Maine plus 38 Grand Rep's of foreign jurisdictions.

The Grand Master's Address cited visitations to 9 sister jurisdictions plus at least 10 national Conferences and other special occasions, together with several lodge visitations within and without the State.

Ten Corner-stone Layings and/or Dedication ceremonies were held.

It was the Grand Master's unfortunate responsibility to impeach a Worshipful Master for unmasonic conduct.

Among many dispensations granted, the Grand Master issued 18 permitting "inactive candidates" to receive the degrees of Freemasonry.

Amendments to the Constitution, as adopted, included stated responsibilities of the Grand Treasurer and Grand Secretary, together with Sec. 16, Art. VI, setting the election of officers in every lodge at the regular communication immediately preceding the Festival in June, with installation to take place within 45 days thereafter.

The Committee on Education and Public Relations expressed concern in reference to decline in membership as well as the lack of harmony existing within the Lodges in recent years, and strongly urged programs of re-evaluation and knowledge of Educational Seminars, with some sort of attendance requirements being placed upon the official lodges.

Considerable emphasis was urged in support of Youth Organizations.

The possibility of expansion of present facilities or the building of a new and better Masonic Home was given great attention, with the Building Committee recommending additional research on expansion of the present facility.

The Grand Historian centered his Report around our former U.S. President and the Grand Master of Missouri, M.W. Harry S. Truman, citing several quotations of Masonic interest and concern.

It is interesting to note that since 1945, the Grand Masters have served only one year their predecessors having served two years.

There appears to be no regular Committee on Fraternal Relations although there does exist an exchange of Grand Representatives.

The Grand Orator gave an inspiring talk on the subject of the decline in membership citing as one of the reasons the lack of living our Masonry outside the Lodge room. He urged it into the community by what we say and do, especially in this age of social turmoil and modern-day lifestyle.

Brother J. B. Robinson, Jr. was elected as Grand Master and Brother Joseph P. Jones continues as Grand Secretary.

The Grand Lodge being opened in ample form, the brethren joined in singing the national Anthem, followed by the Star Spangled Banner, and God Save The Queen.

Distinguished Guests from 20 sister jurisdictions, including our own M.W. G.M. Peter C. Schmidt, and 17 additional presiding Grand Masters. Ten Past Grand Masters were also presented, all of whom, including the aforementioned were accorded the Grand Honours and extended a warm welcome.

Following the usual preliminaries, the Grand Master addressed the Grand Lodge, at which time he recommended Honorary Rank of Past Grand Senior Warden upon one brother, and Past Rank upon additional brethren. One new Lodge was constituted and consecrated; one Lodge Room dedicated, and three Lodges recognized for 100 years of continued service to the Craft.

The Grand Master's Banquet featured M.W. Bro. George Baldwin, Grand Master of Columbia as speaker.

Among other observations noted by the Grand Master was the imprinting of likenesses of Masonic working tools (by request) upon T-shirts, caps, or other wearing apparel, and the displaying of Masonic decals on vehicles (some of which are in disreputable repair). Such shining and very noticeable display, and the discourteous driving habits of the brethren involved, were matters of concern to the Grand Master.

The number of visitations within and without the Grand Jurisdiction, together with the usual responsibilities of his office, reflect the busy schedule of a very busy Grand Master in a very large and busy jurisdiction.

The financial state of this Grand Lodge as reflected in the Grand Treasurer's Report is truly exceptional. Cash resources, including investments, amount to almost 2½ million dollars, representing a substantial surplus.

The financial picture among the Lodges is not as complimentary, many of whom suffer as a result of "Automatic" Life Memberships, and unsatisfactory property ownership arrangements.

The Report on Fraternal Correspondence began with a Forword by M.W. Bro. Bruce Foster followed by Reviews of several Grand Jurisdictions by R.W. Bro. John W. Auckland.

R.W. Bro. A. Lou Copeland was elected and installed as Most Worshipful Grand Master, and M.W. Bro. Robert E. Davies was continued as Grand Secretary.

The Grand Lodge was convened at 9:15 a.m. by the Worshipful Master of Hailey Lodge who received the M.W. Grand Master and his suite, following which the General Manager of the host resort was escorted into the Grand Lodge room to extend welcoming remarks, with response by the Wor. Junior Grand Deacon.

The M.W. Grand Master then proceeded to open the Grand Lodge in ample form. Following the presentation of the Flags of Canada, the State of Idaho, and the Star Spangled Banner, the appropriate anthems being sung after each presentation. The Grand Master directed the Past Grand Masters to assemble west of the Altar, 14 of the living 22 thus responding, being welcomed by the Wor. Junior Grand Deacon, with M.W. Bro. W. F. Smith responding for the PGMs.

The Grand Master then submitted his Report of activities, decisions, and actions of the past year. His visitations within the State numbered nearly 75, with an additional seven sister jurisdictions, plus three Conferences and one Corner-stone Laying ceremony. Regretfully, it was found necessary to expel one Worshipful Master of a Lodge for unmasonic conduct, while another case involving a Worshipful Master remains pending, both being reserved, obviously, and titles revoked. The usual dispensations were granted.

A visitation program on the part of Grand Officers from Grand Deacons to Deputy Grand Master, known as the "21 Lodge Visitation Program" has proved to be very helpful, even tho it was not carried out 100%.

The Grand Master initiated a Grand Lodge Executive Committee, quite similar to the Grand Master's Advisory Committee, which has proven to be most helpful, and the Grand Master recommended its continuance. He also emphasized encouragement and support to youth organizations.

The Report of the Board of Relief reflected an expenditure of \$11,385.00 to Masons and/or dependents.

At the first afternoon session, the Grand Master received guests from Concordant Associated bodies, each of whom presented floral or monetary gifts. The Grand Lodge having then been called to labor, Distinguished Guests from 12 sister jurisdictions were received, including 7 presiding Grand Masters.

The Committee on Research and Education spent much of their Report on evaluation of the increased practice of consolidation, even going so far as to consider "a scientific, practical, and logical reorganization of their entire jurisdiction." This "suggested" consolidation resulted from their observation of the social change in the territory since the inception of Freemasonry in its 118 years of existence in the State.

The Committee on Fraternal Relations in commenting upon the almost universal decline in membership, cited suggestive efforts on the part of several Grand Jurisdictions, opening the remarks of the Grand Orator of Utah (1984) who especially emphasized INVOLVEMENT.

From the Committee on Returns, we note that in this jurisdiction, dues range from a low of \$8.00 to a high of \$40.00, while fees range from a low of \$60.00 to a high of \$150.00. The Lodges reported gains in membership totaling 26 collectively. Six of those lodges reported no losses from N.P.D. Admission of 18 yr-old minimum is seen as advantageous.

Nearly \$6,000.00 has currently been contributed to the Statue of Liberty Restoration campaign, with \$4,000.00 additional yet to be raised to meet their goal of \$10,000.00.

The Committee on Jurisprudence approved the major portions of the Grand Master's Report, exceptions being two dispensations granted in violation of existing code of laws and non-concurrence of Grand Lodge involvement in travel programs. Four Resolutions were presented of which 3 were recommended for approval, the third being recommended for rejection. Subsequent action by delegates of the Grand Lodge rejected Resolution 1 and 4, having to do with distribution and disbursement of Interest-bearing Relief Funds.

A motion to terminate all association between Grand Lodge and Trans-National, Inc. was rejected by the delegates. A subsequent final vote on this issue resulted in cessation of all business with the aforesaid Trans-National, Inc.

R.W. Bro. Wallace S. Johnson was elected and installed as M.W. Grand Master in a semi-public ceremony and M.W. Larry R. Turner, PGM, was likewise returned to the office of R.W. Grand Secretary.

Nine Special Communications were held during the year; six for Correspondence Ceremonies, two funerals, and one Installation.

The Annual Communication was informally convened for the reception of Distinguished Guests, previous to which the flags of the U.S.A., Canada, and the State of Nevada were presented, with proper tributes being given for each. The special guests were present: past Heads of the O.E.S., Order of Rainbow for Girls, and Order of DeMolay.

All non-masons having been excused, the Grand Lodge was opened in ample form at which time the Grand Master received Distinguished Guests from 12 sister jurisdictions including 9 presiding Grand Masters plus 3 personal representatives of the other 3, and 10 additional past or present Grand Officers, each of whom received honorary membership and rank. The heads of Appendant Bodies, numbering nine were then received and welcomed. Eleven of the living Past Grand Masters were presented and appropriately welcomed.

Several Committee Reports were presented, after which the Grand Representatives present were welcomed individually by the Grand Master. Regrettably, The Grand Representative of Maine was not present. Further Committee Reports were presented before calling the Grand Lodge to Refreshment. An excellent Fellowship Dinner was enjoyed on the evening of the first day.

On the morning of the second day, the Grand Orator delivered an inspiring message entitled "Masonic-Minded Americanism."

Following the presentation of further Committee Reports, the Grand Master addressed the brethren, citing his many visitations which included 12 sister jurisdictions. It was interesting to note that on the occasion of the Imperial Council A.A.O.N.M.S. in Boston, the Grand Masters were welcomed by our own Brother and Imperial Potentate, Richard B. (Rene).

Two Past Grand Masters died during the year, one of whom M.W. Bro. Royal D. Crowell was the V.W. Grand Secretary for 20 years the other being M.W. Bro. Frank Logan, Jr. Brother Frank E. Hart was appointed and later elected and installed as V.W. Grand Secretary.

A recommendation (Edict) by the Grand Master which would delete the one-year waiting period before a M.M. could apply to the York or Scottish Rites, substituting therein a requirement of proficiency in the M.M. degree, failed to obtain the required 90% vote of approval and was consequently carried over for another year. The Grand Master's allowance was increased from \$5,000. to \$7,500. with little opposition.

Like so many Grand Lodges, Data Processing equipment was approved, to be paid for by a special contribution of \$1.25 per member for one year only.

An invitation was extended and accepted for the Grand Lodge to meet for its 121st Annual Communication at Reno, on November 10, 11 & 12, 1985.

Election followed, and R.W. Bro. Valdo A. Sei was elected as M.W. Grand Master, and, as mentioned earlier, Bro. Frank E. Hart was elected V.W. Grand Secretary.

Special Communications during the year included; Installation of two Grand Officers; Masonic Awareness Parade; United Methodist Church Cornerstone Laying, and Dedication of Lodge Property Enclosure.

Following a Banquet on the preceding evening, the Grand Lodge was convened on March 18, on the campus of New Mexico Southern University, at which time the President of the University extended a warm welcome, after which the Grand Lodge was opened in ample form.

The Grand Master introduced Distinguished Guests from 7 sister jurisdictions, including 4 Grand Masters and 3 Past Grand Masters, plus 7 guests from concordant and appendant lodges. Fifteen Past Grand Masters of New Mexico were also introduced.

The Grand Master addressed the brethren, noting his visitations which included two or more occasions in every lodge in their own Grand Jurisdictions, along with six sister Grand Jurisdictions, workshops, Conferences and Imperial Shrine. His term of office was marked by several changes, suggestions, and recommendations. Having acquired a computer,

several services, regular and new, were implemented. Masonic Leadership Training programs were emphasized along with Masonic Education and Public Relations. A Master's office was established in the Grand Lodge Building in Albuquerque. The Grand Lodge telephone system has been upgraded. He, (the Grand Master), strongly suggested encouraging of the use of Lodge properties for civic purposes, physical fitness programs, Senior Citizen functions, volunteer organizations, blood banks and additional possibilities with major emphasis on youth organizations, etc.

He further chastized, by edict, the so-called higher and appendant bodies for their use of the ballot upon a Master Mason, requiring the person who cast the black-ball to verify, in writing, within 48 hours, the reason for his vote, to the head of said appendant body, and for their dictating the policies of The Grand Lodge, which is the basic foundation of ALL Masonry.

He also elaborated at length on discriminating practices, lifting up the equality of all mankind.

He recommended an increase of \$4.00 in per capita tax.

A further Committee was appointed to review the format for petitions, with instructions such practices as the use of alcohol and/or narcotics.

A terminal cancer Entered Apprentice was made a Master Mason at sight, in order that he might be regarded as such should he not survive the prescribed time as normally required.

Several of the recommendations of the Grand Master were subsequently disapproved, as well as the "Edict" regarding appendant bodies' ballot, and plural membership without jurisdiction, together with a recommendation for 2 yr. terms for Grand Master, Deputy Grand Master, Grand Wardens, and Grand Deacons.

While it is not contained in the laws concerning election, it has been, and will likely continue to be, that the brother appointed as Junior Grand Steward will elevate eventually to the office of Grand Master.

R.W. Bro. Merlin C. Black was elected as Grand Master, and R.W. Bro. Ron Brinkman was re-elected as Grand Secretary.

An open Installation was held, with M.W. James C. Abbott, PGM, installing the new Grand Master and M.W. Bro. Bonar, the retiring Grand Master, installing the retiring Grand Officers.

Pollard, Executive Secretary, M.S.A., plus the heads of concordant bodies and representatives of A.A.S.R., DeMolay and the Mayor of Nashville, Bro. Richard Fulton who brought greetings from the City. Of particular interest, the Grand Master recognized the 23 50-yr. members present. It was also interesting to note that 246 Lodge secretaries were listed as present, 208 of whom were Past Masters. Added to this number, 375 additional Past Masters were present, a total of 583 Past Masters; certainly a supportive assembly of distinguished brethren. I congratulate the Grand Secretary and his staff for the listing of these brethren.

The Grand Master's Report was then presented, highlighting his theme, PEACE AND HARMONY. Despite his efforts to promote this practice, it is inevitable in a jurisdiction with an excess of 90,000 members that a few brethren will stumble and fall. As a result, 20 brethren were charged and brought to trial, fifteen of whom were found guilty of violating the regulations of Grand Lodge. One Worshipful Master was removed from office as a result of a felony. One Lodge was placed on probation for irregularities, but has since corrected the same and the Grand Master recommends restoration. One consolidation is recorded. A dispensation for a Lodge of Research was issued and the by-laws approved by the Committee on same. The usual dispensations were granted.

The Grand Master had a very busy year, having made more than 100 visitations, including six sister Grand Lodge Communications, plus the usual Conferences.

The Grand Treasurer's Report reflects payment of \$22.00 per day 22c per mile one way for eligible delegates.

The Grand Secretary's Report reflects average dues (low, \$5.00, high \$100.00). Fees (low, \$60.00, high, \$150.00).

Thirty-eight veteran M.Ms. are listed, the oldest having been a member for 86 years as of July 28, 1985.

If you are concerned about recent losses in membership, it is well to note that a compilation of statistics shows that in this jurisdiction, over the past 54 years, after losses over the period 1929-40, gains were shown for 36 consecutive years before losses reoccurred from 1977 to the present time. I, (your correspondent), am optimistic enough to predict another turn-around, and that if we evaluate our present circumstances, we will again be making gains.

The appointed time having arrived, the election of officers took place, with Bro. Samuel O. Chandler being elevated to the office of M.W. Grand Master, and subsequently installed as such.

The newly installed Grand Master then addressed the brethren, and after reminding them of their Masonic responsibilities, admonished them to AWAKE and REDEDICATE.

Bro. John R. Stracener was re-elected and installed as Grand Secretary.

The Grand Lodge was opened in ample form with 13 of the 20 living Past Grand Masters present and seven Distinguished Guests from sister jurisdictions. It's also interesting to note that 22 Lodges were represented by all three of their top officers present, together with 29 Past Masters of 29 lodges.

In his Address, the Grand Master expresses, with a few exceptions, a general attitude of optimism. Circumstances enabled him to attend only one Annual Communication outside the State. However, he did attend other functions in Idaho and Colorado. A unique celebration took place at the Four Corners National Monument where the States of Arizona, Colorado, New Mexico and Utah are joined at one specific location (hence the name). A special ceremony similar to a corner-stone ceremony, as prepared by the Grand Master of Colorado, took place with the four Grand Masters joining hands while each stood in his home State, thus signifying the Unity of Freemasonry, previous to which the Grand Masters had tried the Monument with the square, level and plumb, and poured corn, wheat and oil upon the same.

The usual dispensations were granted and decisions made, one proposal dealing with sale of property by a Masonic Association required an edict, while three requests, had not been refused in that they were not properly submitted.

The Grand Jurisdiction of Utah was successful in reaching its goal of \$1.00 per member for the Statue of Liberty restoration program.

Eight Resolutions were presented, four being accepted and four defeated. It is the opinion of this writer that good Masonic judgement prevailed.

This Jurisdiction publishes its roster of all Lodge officers and members.

R.W. Bro. Moffet E. Felkner was elected and installed as M.W. Grand Master, and M.W. Bro. Murray G. Stowe was continued as R.W. Grand Secretary.

The Grand Lodge being opened in ample form by M.W. Bro. Kruse, reports were presented by the Deputy Grand Master, Junior Grand Warden and D.D.G.M. A. Grand Chaplain and Grand Lecturer. The Grand Oration was delivered by M.W. Bro. E. V. Frankel, entitled, "Ye are the Hope of the World," lifting up "The Universal Brotherhood of Man under the Fatherhood of God." In emphasizing attendance, the Grand Master made several proposals including all business to be conducted in the E.A. Degree, working in the F.C. and M.M. degrees for degree work only; compulsory attendance of resident members at minimum number of meetings, newly admitted brethren to be required to attend at least three communications before being advanced to F.C. and likewise to M.M. degrees. He further addressed Education and Community action.

Fourteen Past Grand Masters responded to Roll Call, as did 47 Grand Representatives

The M.W. Grand Master addressed the brethren, lifting up Lodges of Instruction and Public Relations. He reported on the finances of the Grand Lodge, indicating an urgency to enlarge the Endowment Fund and use of all other lawful means to defray the operating costs of Grand Lodge. Other pertinent matters were reported upon, including the state of the Craft, reminding the brethren of the necessity of maintaining the high standards of their predecessors. His recommendations follow the references stated in the several reports.

The official language of the Grand Lodge is English with the least discrimination towards Spanish or other important languages being recognized.

The Committee on Fraternal Relations recommended recognition of the Grand Lodge of Gabon, and the Grand Lodge of Mato Grosso which was accordingly carried.

Brother Glen C. Hancock, Deputy of the International Supreme Council of DeMolay urged greater concern for DeMolay and moved that a Committee be selected to organize Advisory Councils to open Chapters in several major cities, which motion was carried.

R.W. Bro. Hans W. Asmus was elected M.W. Grand Master and M.W. Bro. Derrick H. Hart, PGM, was reelected as R.W. Grand Secretary.

Also 261 delegates representing 186 of the 200 chartered lodges; 9 of the living Past Grand Masters; 35 of the 53 Permanent Members; and 67 of the 104 Grand Representatives of other Grand Lodges, together with visiting brethren.

The Grand Lodge was opened in Ample Form, prayer being offered by Rev. Edward L. Fenderson, Grand Chaplain.

The Past Grand Masters were escorted to the West of the Altar and recorded Private Grand Honors and took seats in the East.

VOTED: To dispense with the reading of the records of the last annual Communication, and that, as corrected, they be confirmed.

VOTED: That all Master Masons in good standing be admitted as visitors to the Annual Communication.

Loveitt to escort to the East Miss Kathlyn Billings, Grand Worthy Advisor and Mrs. Ruth Smith, State Mother Advisor, International Order of Rainbow for Girls. M.W. Harold L. Chute presented Scott D. Matthews, State Master and Councilor of the Order of DeMolay. They were welcomed by the Grand Master and invited to seats in the East.

PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

The Kora Temple Legion of Honor presented the United States and Canadian flags to the East, the Pledge of Allegiance to our flag was given, followed by the singing of America, God Save the Queen, and Two Countries by the Sea.

Miss Kathlyn Billings was greeted with a standing ovation. She gave the following address:

I'm not sure if that applause is for me or maybe my speech. I hope I do a good job and you'll applaud me again, but if I don't, that standing ovation was very nice. And Grand Master, I have to admit that this is the first time in a long time that I've been in a room where the men outnumber the ladies, and I'm enjoying it, and I'd be more than happy to stay here all day with you but, I don't know, I don't have my pants with me, so I think I'll be kind of out of place.

I would like to bring the greetings of our Supreme Inspector, Mrs. Dorothy Merrill Higgins, who could not be with us today because she's in North Carolina visiting her grandson who, maybe in a few years, might join the Master Masons if she has anything to say about it - and she usually has a lot to say about it.

I was happy, this past weekend, to see your Grand Master at many of the State meetings that the Masonic Bodies held - Commandery, Council, Chapter and of course Grand Lodge. It's always fun to go. Each Masonic body has different uniforms and it's very nice, I don't know how you keep your medals all straight. I go in and close my eyes and pick out a few and go, "Oh, good, I'll wear them tonight," and go off to a meeting and you seem to get them all straight, and that's wonderful.

There are so many faces here that I know from Rainbow and from DeMolay. It's nice to see so many Dad advisors here and for those of you who are not Dad Advisors, well, you can become one. It's very easy. There are certain requirements - you have to be a woman, women are called Mother Advisors, It's a separate group. And also, you have to live with the Rainbow Girls, usually all night whenever we have slumber parties, and watch horror movies and talk about boys, if some of you can remember what it was like when you're all married now!—And what else do you have to do? You have to fix our uniforms, don't let you wear them, but you have to pin them and sew them back up, and you have to eat our food, which is sometimes quite sugary and not that great, but it's a lot of fun. Unfortunately, you don't get a lot of thanks. Sometimes we overlook the Dad Advisors because they're just the ones who sit on the sidelines, they don't take an active part in the ritual. But you do get a lot of love whenever you come to Rainbow, and I do hope a day when you who haven't come, will come.

Our Grand Assembly is the end of this month and it will be my time to do all the talking and to make other people, like myself, very nervous waiting for their speeches and I would enjoy seeing all of you there—

Mr. Curtis, it has indeed been a great pleasure to work with you this year. I hope your dreams and everything you had hoped for during your two years as Grand Master are working out well, and the Grand Assembly of Maine is going to be very honored to have you with us Friday night. Thank you.

Scott Matthews then addressed the Brethren:

Grand Master and distinguished guests, it is certainly my pleasure to stand amongst and address some of the most important men in my life - and my life which has been the Order of DeMolay.

You, you are the lawyers, the doctors, the clergy, the firemen, the insurance men, the shipbuilders, the vacuum salesmen - you are everything.

I am standing here to thank all of you as a group but I hope that each of you realizes that I'm talking to you personally. I'm standing up here to thank you for your support of my life - which has been the Order of DeMolay. Not only in Maine, but the Order of DeMolay has brought me to foreign lands such as England and Canada, and also to states within this region and states as far as California and Mississippi.

The leadership which I have been taught by you, as Masons, whether openly or by observing, has molded and sculptured me into what I believe I am today and I believe that you are the reason for this. I hope that this will continue so that each and every young adult may be enlightened by your wisdom and guidance.

I want to jog your memory for a moment and bring you back to Christmastime. There's a TV Special that they play every year, called the "Christmas Carol," and this is the part where Scrooge has just met the Ghost of Christmas to Come. Scrooge has just said something very ignorant and the ghost is very upset with Scrooge. He lifts his robe and underneath his robe there are two young boys about 4 or 5. Their faces are all black, their clothes all ragged, and the ghost says to him, "Scrooge, these are the faces of 'want' and 'ignorance' and written on their foreheads is 'doom'."

I am a young man of only—nineteen years. Many of you have lived to be two, three and perhaps four times as many as that, and the experiences you have learned and passed on to me have made me realize what life is really all about. And one thing in particular, which I feel I should speak of, is that many of you here today are veterans of a war, and whether that be World War I, II, Korea or Viet Nam, I think that the stories you have told me have made me realize that this is something that I would not want to have as an option. I feel that you have experienced this so that we, as your children, and their children, will not have to go through this pain.

The young people of today need you now, more than they ever have before. The local news has opened a lot of eyes. A lot of things you can say today were taboo many years ago. Out in California, at our International Sessions, we voted on a program that we would present to the Dad Advisors, which would allow them to speak of such areas as sexually transmitted diseases, parental problems, involvement with drugs. These areas are ones which we have decided need to be talked about. We cannot ignore them any more in our youth organizations. These are the basic facts of life and if we avoid them for the sake of embarrassment, then we have made a disastrous mistake.

I just want to leave you with one thing on a happy note. Everyone is talking of membership, membership is dying, etc. I would just like to say that after years and years of pushing, my father has finally petitioned for a lodge, and that makes me proud! Thank you.

Both messages were received with hearty applause.

The Grand Lodge was then called from Refreshment to Labor.

ANNUAL ADDRESS

GRAND MASTER, ERNEST H. CURTIS

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge Ancient Free and Accepted Masons of the State of Maine:

Brethren: I am delighted to have the privilege to welcome each of you to this 168th Annual Communication of the Grand Lodge of Maine this morning in this beautiful and magnificent Shrine Mosque. I believe this is the first time the Grand Lodge of Maine has ever held its Annual Communication at Kora Temple or in the Lewiston-Auburn area. I have considered for a long time that the facilities here at Kora Temple would be most appropriate for the Grand Lodge of Maine to meet in annual session.

I would take this opportunity, at this time, to express to you, Potentate Ken, our sincere appreciation and thanks to you and the Trustees for allowing the Grand Lodge of Maine to meet here in annual session. Many of you have been in this Temple before, but for many it may be your first visit here and I am sure you must be pleasantly surprised to discover such a beautiful building here in the middle of Maine.

Distinguished Guests

To our distinguished guests from our Sister Jurisdictions, a special welcome. It is so wonderful that so many of you could spare time from your pressing schedules to travel way up here to Maine to assist us in making this annual session of the Grand Lodge of Maine a memorable occasion. During the past year, Barbara and I have visited almost all of your Grand Lodges. The hospitality and courtesies we enjoyed at each one of these visits have been such that we will hold dear the pleasant memories near and dear to us for many years to come. We had the rare privilege and opportunity to discover a whole new circle of friends and Brothers. We pray that these friendships may long continue.

Today we have an opportunity to reciprocate and be your hosts. May your visit with us be a pleasing experience and one that you long remember. If there is anything we can do to make you more comfortable and your visit more enjoyable, please let us know.

To our in-state guests, we are delighted that you can be with us also. It has been our privilege to visit with, and be your guests at your annual communications. We are very appreciative of all the kindnesses that have been extended to us. In Maine, we are proud of the excellent relations that exist among all the Masonic-affiliated organizations. Freemasonry in Maine will remain strong as long as these good relations continue. Harmony must be the watch-word among all Masonic groups, always being mindful of an opportunity to strengthen these good relations. May your visit with us be a pleasant and enjoyable experience.

Last year, as I assumed the responsibility of this high office. I made mention that 1986 would see a "new beginning" of Masonry in Maine. Little did I realize, when I made that statement, just how many "new beginnings" there would be. I was aware of several changes that were being made in committees and personnel, however, with the untimely passing of M.W. Bro. Aubrey L. Burbank and R.W. Edward E. Haskell, several important committees had to be realigned.

Having been an active Grand Lodge Officer for several years. I was familiar with the time-consuming responsibilities of a Grand Master and I realized that in order to do the job to my own satisfaction, it had to be my first priority. The decision was finally made to retire from a life-long vocation and a company that I had represented for 40 years, and to sell my interest in a successful business to my associate of over 30 years. Now I was free to concentrate all my time and effort on being Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of Maine.

Necrology

As another year passes, we are reminded that many of our Brethren have departed to their eternal resting place. Since we last met, 906 Brethren have passed on to the Celestial Lodge above. We mourn their passing, as well as that of M.W. Aubrey L. Burbank and R.W. Edward E. Haskell, two permanent members of this Grand Lodge.

Charitable Foundation

After serving as Distribution Chairman of the Charitable Foundation for 31 years, M.W. Charles E. Crossland found it necessary to resign. Bro. Crossland reviewed all applications for relief and determined the amount to be awarded, from his home in Orono.

All applications are now being processed in the Grand Lodge Office by our new Chairman, R.W. Stanley F. Sampson, your Grand Master, Grand Secretary and Grand Treasurer. This has been a very rewarding

experience and a great responsibility. I can appreciate the tremendous burden this responsibility must have been for M.W. Brother Crossland, and sincerely believe that in the future, no one person should have to make these hard decisions by himself. I am pleased we were able to award in excess of \$150,000 in Masonic Relief, the most we have ever awarded in one year.

District Meetings

Twenty-three district meetings were held during the past year. The scheduled meeting of the 22nd District was cancelled because of the inclement weather. In an effort to upgrade district meetings, the District Deputies were encouraged to try different types of programs this year. Eight Lodges held a Brotherhood Night and invited non-masons as their guests; 95 non-masons attended these meetings, were treated to supper, entertained and heard the Masonic Story. I am confident that many more submitted applications by now. Five meetings were semi-public Ladies Nights and were well attended. Ten regular district meetings were held with varied programs. The over-all average attendance of 65 is higher than usual.

Ritualistic Instruction

The Grand Lecturer and his six assistants continue to do a commendable job. I believe that our Lodge Officers have the best ritualistic instruction available to them than we have ever had before. There is a School of Instruction in each Degree in each District each year, and in addition there is a non-ritualistic school. I think it is an excellent program, presided over by dedicated Brethren.

Masonic Education

The Committee on Masonic Education and Lodge Service is my favorite committee. I had the opportunity to reorganize this Committee in 1974 and guide it for eight years. We have come a long way and I am proud of everyone who has contributed their time and talents to Masonic Education through this Committee. I am also proud of the Brethren who have served on this Committee and have distinguished themselves in the Grand Lodge - including 4 Grand Masters, 1 Deputy Grand Master, 3 Senior Grand Wardens, 3 Junior Grand Wardens and 2 Grand Secretaries.

I reluctantly accepted the resignation of Brother Walter Macdonald as chairman of this Committee this past year, in order that he might devote more time to studying for his Doctorate at the University of Michigan. However, he agreed to remain on the Committee and Brother N. J. Coolong very ably assumed the Chairmanship. This Committee can provide any Masonic educational material a Lodge Officer may request.

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 assist in educational programs and provide speakers. One needs only to make known his request and this Committee will help. Keep up the good work.

Hospital Visitation

On Sunday, September 28, 1986 the Grand Lodge Officers and their Ladies made their annual visitation to the Togus Veterans' Hospital. An invitation was extended to all those brethren who regularly attend and assist in the Sunday Services to be with us on this special day. After service we adjourned to the dining room at the Augusta Masonic Temple to enjoy lunch.

After several years of dedicated and devoted service as the Togus Hospital visitation representative, Brother Rodney Pearl made the difficult decision to resign, in order that he and his wife may enjoy their retirement years together. We are deeply indebted to, and sincerely appreciative of all the years of unselfish and caring service that Brother Rodney Pearl has contributed to his Brethren and to mankind. We are indeed fortunate to have a qualified Brother who has volunteered to succeed Bro. Rodney Pearl. Wor. Brother Clyde Roth has been appointed and approved by the Masonic Service Association, as well as the Veterans' Administration. We wish Brother Pearl many healthy and enjoyable years in retirement and Brother Roth success in this most important undertaking.

Youth Groups

During the past year a new DeMolay Chapter has been formed in Winter Harbor and it is my understanding that there are others being organized. On Sunday, April 5th, it was my privilege to attend the concluding ceremonies of Pleasant Valley Assembly, Order of Rainbow for Girls in Buxton. This was an impressive ceremony and was well done. We have many devoted Brethren working with our Youth Groups, who are to be commended for their work, but the one thing DeMolay and Rainbow continually ask us for is for more advisory support from you Brethren. Let us do all we can to support DeMolay and Rainbow by helping and attending their meetings. It will pay big dividends.

Northeast Conference on Masonic Education and Libraries

The Grand Lodge of Maine had the special distinction of hosting the 11th Annual Communication of the Northeast Conference on Masonic Education and Libraries this past year. On May 22, 23, 24, forty-five out-of-state and 25 in-state delegates and their Ladies, met at the Ramada Inn, Lewiston. The theme of the Conference was "Masonic Education - Pathway to Excellence for the Craft". The major topics discussed were: "Candidate Instruction", "Officer Instruction" and

"Membership Instruction". Other important subjects on the agenda were "Public Awareness", "Practical Masonic Libraries" and Publications.

This conference was an information-packed session, with excellent input from all Jurisdictions in attendance. It was a rare opportunity to allow the members of our Education Committee, Assistant Grand Masters and other interested Grand Lodge Officers to meet and mingle with some of the Masonic leaders of Masonic Education of other Grand Jurisdictions, which happens about once in 15 years. We will all have fond memories of this meeting for many years to come.

Northeast Conference of Grand Masters, Deputy Grand Masters and Grand Secretaries

On July 13 and 14, your Grand Master, Deputy Grand Master and Grand Secretary attended the Northeast Conference of Grand Masters, Deputy Grand Masters and Grand Secretaries in Fairlee, Vermont. This conference is always beneficial because we have an opportunity to converse with our counterparts from the Northeast States. Although our problems and challenges may be the same, we do get ideas and solutions from the other jurisdictions, resulting from our discussions. We look forward to these meetings each year with great anticipation.

Conference of Grand Masters and Grand Secretaries

This national get-together of all the Grand Masters, Deputy Grand Masters and Grand Secretaries at Calgary, Alberta, Canada on February 15, 16 and 17, was a very impressive and rewarding experience. Sixty Grand Masters, seated in a square with 60 Deputy Grand Masters and behind their respective Grand Masters and a gallery of over 200 Grand Masters and interested Brethren, takes on the appearance of an international summit meeting of Heads of State. Your Grand Master had the distinct privilege of being elected to this Conference Committee and an opportunity to preside over a portion of the meeting. It was a truly rewarding experience.

Imperial Shrine Visitation

Grand Masters of North America were invited as guests to attend the Annual Imperial Shrine session, held in Los Angeles last July. About 50 Grand Masters accepted the invitation. The Imperial Shrine of North America is going all-out to do everything in their power to work with all Grand Jurisdictions. A special seminar was arranged for the Grand Masters, with many subjects relating to the well-being of the Fraternity discussed. We all enjoyed the session and the hospitality extended to us. I am most appreciative of the Imperial Shrine, Kona Temple and Anah Temple for sponsoring this trip.

Dedications

Two Special Communications of the Grand Lodge of Maine were called for the purpose of dedicating two new Masonic Temples. On October 11, 1986 we dedicated the Hall of Gov. William King Lodge No. 219, Scarborough and on November 22, 1986 we dedicated the Hall of Lebanon Lodge No. 116, Norridgewock. The members of these two lodges are to be congratulated for the time and hard work they have contributed to this worthwhile project and for their foresight in preparing for the future. For the most part, these buildings have been paid for as they progressed in the building process. Several other Masonic Temples are in various stages of construction and will be completed in the near future.

New England Brotherhood Night

The Grand Lodge of Maine was honored to be the host for the 6th Annual New England Brotherhood Night on March 21, 1987. 125 Grand Lodge Officers, present and past, assembled at Kora Temple for an evening of fellowship and refreshment. This is an annual event that moves from one New England State to the next. Grand Lodge Officers have an opportunity to meet and greet one another, share in a bountiful repast, hear a few words from each Grand Master and a selected speaker. Our speaker this year was M.W. Thomas R. Dougherty, Past Grand Master of New Jersey and Director of Hospital Visitation of the Masonic Services Association. Next year this event will be hosted by the Grand Lodge of New Hampshire.

Grand Lodge Night

On April 22, 1987 the Grand Lodge of Maine revived the old custom of inviting one of our Lodges to exemplify the Master Mason Degree before it. Years ago, the Grand Lodge, at its annual session, under the supervision of the Grand Lecturer, selected an outstanding Lodge to present a Masonic Degree. This year the Grand Lecturer selected Casco Lodge #36 of Yarmouth to work before a Special Communication of the Grand Lodge of Maine at Masonic Hall, Yarmouth. Over 100 Brethren witnessed superb work by these young officers of Casco Lodge. In preparation for this evening, they rehearsed several times with an Assistant Grand Lecturer present. To enhance the degree work, there was music and a quartet. This Degree was exemplified exactly as it should have been and the Officers of Casco Lodge #36 are to be congratulated for this outstanding evening. An appropriate plaque was presented to the Lodge by your Grand Master, to be displayed in the foyer of the Lodge, that all visitors might see it in the future. It is hoped that this might be an annual event of the Grand Lodge of Maine.

Reception

On January 17, 1987 my wife and I were invited to a reception for me in my old home town of Claremont, N.H. Hiram Lodge #9, with the assistance of the Grand Master of N.H., M.W. Paul W. Ricker and the Grand Lodge, entertained us and several past and present Grand Lodge Officers from Rhode Island, Connecticut, Vermont, Quebec and Maine at Hiram Lodge. We enjoyed an afternoon of entertainment and an excellent dinner. I was presented a framed certificate of Honorary Membership in Hiram Lodge #9, Claremont, N.H. It was a great afternoon and an occasion I will long remember.

Recommendation

I recommend that the delegates to this Grand Lodge give serious consideration to increasing the per capita tax from \$3.50 to \$5.50. Your Grand Master and Grand Lodge Officers have been very careful with expenditures, yet we find our expenses this past year were \$9,000 more than our income. This situation worsens a little each year. We are trying to progress in this Grand Lodge but if we are to move ahead, we must be sufficiently financed. As well as meeting our current budgets, we need funds to improve and computerize our office procedures. We need funds to promote public relations, to promote Freemasonry in Maine. This increase in per capita tax is essentially necessary for the future of Freemasonry. Your support is very much needed.

I recommend that we amend our Constitution to allow dual membership within this jurisdiction. Many of our members reside many miles from their home Lodge. They would like to be active in a Lodge where they reside but are reluctant to give up their membership in their home Lodge. This would allow a member to belong to two Lodges and become active.

I recommend that this Grand Lodge join other Grand Lodges by adopting and joining the "National Foundation for the Prevention of Drug and Alcohol Abuse Among Children". This program will be fully explained this afternoon.

Conclusion

Upon starting this report, it was difficult to recall the activities of the past year, but as I got into it, I could not believe that so many events have happened. In addition to those that have been highlighted, there have been many Table Lodges, Special Ladies Nights, receptions, festivals, St. John's Sundays, Awards Nights, Educational meetings and committee meetings, all routine activities of a Grand Master. My Grand Wardens have been very supportive and have traveled from one end of the State to the other with me, as have many of the appointive Grand Lodge line officers. I wish to express my heartfelt thanks to each of you for your ongoing support.

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To those District Deputies who will be retiring this year, we thank each of you for a job well done. GRAND LECTURER

To the Most Worshipful Grand Master, Officers, and Brethren of the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine:

The time has arrived to give an account of our Masonic labor. The conducting of Schools of Instruction in so large a jurisdiction is not a "one-man" operation. It is very much a team effort, and requires cooperation and effort on the part of a great many individuals. The success of any School, particularly in terms of attendance, can almost invariably be traced to efforts of District Deputies, Masters and others in laying the groundwork, without which support the Grand Lecturer and the Assistants would find their labors quite fruitless.

It is with pleasure and thankfulness for the opportunity to work closely with my brethren, that I submit my seventh annual report as Grand Lecturer.

We are entrusted to preserve the accuracy of the ritual, and not to permit innovations within it. It is the foundation upon which we teach the principles, philosophy, and symbolism of Ancient Craft Masonry. If we teach our new Master Masons that being a Mason in the fullest and complete sense is to exemplify in one's dealings with all mankind those virtues of Charity, of kindness, of tolerance which the ritual so forcefully inculcates by precept and by symbol, then we are in the proud position of being Master Masons.

By order and under the direction of the M.W. Grand Master, three ritualistic Schools of Instruction, one in each of the three degrees, has been conducted in each of the twenty-four (24) districts in this Grand Jurisdiction by the Grand Lecturer and the six (6) Assistant Grand Lecturers.

Tabulation of Schools

The following table is the tabulation of registration at the various District Lodges of Instruction. The numbers in parenthesis indicate the number of lodges from the Districts in attendance at that particular School of Instruction. The rightmost percent column indicates the percentage of officer attendance at the three (3) ritualistic schools from that district.

This year total attendance and officer attendance are very nearly the same as a year ago. Average officer attendance is down by a half percentage point. We seem always to be in a relatively small neighborhood of 32 percent, as if there were something mystical with this number. I am sure this is not an upper bound on our achievement, and we shall continue to mount an effort to improve upon this.

On reviewing the summary sheets of attendance at Schools of Instruction, I remain alarmed with the large number of lodges not represented by their Masters or Wardens. It is not unusual to see a District with eight lodges represented by three Masters, one Senior Warden and two Junior Wardens. When these officers are consistently absent at important Schools of Instruction, are candidates and brethren of their lodges receiving good and wholesome instruction? In a few cases the answer may be "yes", but for many I fear it is "no". In a number of Lodges the Master and/or the Wardens are Past Masters and they do not always feel they need to attend as they "know" the work. However, most of us do forget, and, most importantly, this method is not the most optimal situation with which to encourage the Junior officers and conscientious brethren to become effective and dedicated officers of the lodge. This remains a concern we must improve upon for the health of our Craft.

Last year it was reported that six (6) Lodges were not represented at a single School of Instruction. I am happy to report that only one of these appears again this year: Mt. Abram No. 204. The others had very marked improvement in their participation.

Officer attendance ranges from 19 percent in District 7 to 50 percent in District 2. To be commended for their excellent attendance this year are the officers of Districts 2, 1, 17, 5, and 18 respectively in that order, all of which were above 40 percent; far better than average attendance came from Districts 14 and 6. Eleven (11) Districts were above the average of 32 percent. Districts 2 and 14 had officers from all Lodges at each School - a perfect record for two consecutive years. We commend the officers of these Districts for their fine record and dedication to their Lodges and to Freemasonry.

The success of the Schools depend on the work, interest, and effort of many brethren. We express many thanks to District Deputies for sending the cards notifying the officers, and for promoting the Schools.

District Educational Meetings

The District Educational Meeting, a fourth non-ritualistic Lodge of Instruction was presented in each District again this year. They deal with a variety of topics of general interest to the brethren as well as the officers. Our objective has been to provide something Masonic for all the brethren.

Approximately half of the program this year was devoted to candidate and new Master Mason instruction with an actual exemplification of a segment of the Masonic Education Program being presented to the District by a team of the brethren. This presentation was for the most part coordinated by the District Representative, and reports indicate it was well received and appreciated. I am confident the program this year will do much to encourage more candidate instruction in many more of our lodges.

Lodges with Masonic Education programs in place are reaping the fruit of their effort with heightened interest, activity, and enthusiasm in their lodges. The agenda included items from the following topics:

- A. Masonic Education Program
 1. The Accepted Candidate
 2. The Entered Apprentice
 3. The Fellow Craft
 4. Master Masons
 5. The Fourth Night Program

Each Assistant Grand Lecturer and District Representative had latitude to select the topic to be exemplified which they felt would be of most help and interest to brethren of their District.

Activity with Degree Teams continues to rise: there have been eleven (11) authorized teams functioning in the state this year. I have authorized the teams to exemplify the Master Mason Degrees in accordance with the policy established by Grand Lodge in 1960, and the permission is valid until May 6, 1987.

The Grand Secretary presented his report which was accepted and referred to the Committee on Doings of Grand Officers.

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine:

It is again my pleasure to submit the report of the Grand Secretary for the fiscal year 1986-87.

The year has been one of mixed emotions. There were many heartwarming and caring instances of Masonry-in-action. The Aerovac flights that brought peace and tranquility to desperate families in their most trying times; the several lodges performing many outstanding unrecorded services for our Special Ladies, shut-ins, sojourners and members in distress; incidents that brought pride, respect and admiration to our Fraternity.

Northeast Conference on Masonic Education and Libraries. We hosted this Conference, held at the Ramada here in Lewiston. Our Grand Master prepared and conducted a well-organized and productive session, one that produced a unanimous comment from the attendees - specifically, "This session gained our respect by the quality of the group leaders, and especially as they were all members of the Maine Masonic Education Committee."

The Grand Secretaries' Conference at Calgary, Alberta, Canada provided another opportunity to meet with the 'Grand Secretary on the other end of the telephone or letter.' It's a powerful feeling when you realize you are sharing thoughts, problems, suggestions, goals, etc. on a first name basis, with Brethren from all over North America and some foreign countries.

Papers were presented on: "Drug and Alcohol Abuse Among Children", Carl W. Kemberg, Jr., G.M. of Penn.; "The Right Answer to the Wrong Problem", R. E. Peterson, Colorado; "Loss of Membership", Robert P. Dudley, N.C.; "Masonic Charities", C. David Haacke, P.G.M., Maryland; "The Present Insurance Crisis - Some Causes and Possible Solutions", J. Newman, Pres. Thompkins & Co., Ins. Brokers; "Working Relationship Between Jurisdictions (Chain of Command)", Tom Jackson, PA; "Statistical Analysis (Age of the Grand Lodge of Maryland)", Jack R. Frazier, MD.

It should be noted here that we have compiled an alphabetical listing of all the 'Papers' presented at the Grand Masters' Conferences, as well as the Grand Secretaries' Conferences - a valuable collection of material for lodge programs and study, (1928-1987). USE IT. It is bewildering why lodges do not utilize the material that is now available to them.

GRAND LODGE SERVICE (Grand Master):

A Grand Lodge 'Directory' was initiated, published and distributed to all elected and appointed Grand Lodge Officers, as well as Permanent and Committee members. The additional information (Lodge number and personal telephone number) etc. has proven to be a valuable, ready reference and emergency time-saver.

Past District Deputies - A list of all living Past District Deputies was compiled and added to the mailing list of correspondence issued to Elected, Appointed and Permanent Members - a well-deserved recognition of the services rendered by this group of dedicated past officers.

Weekly Conference. The Wednesday Grand Master's Conference has provided a viable communication process, one that encourages participation and unity. Examples are as follows: notable cost savings were reported by the Insurance Committee Chairman - instant savings by the participating lodges has been outstanding. The newly-formed Publicity Committee, utilizing radio, T.V., public notice spots, local newspapers, etc. will awaken many individuals as to "who we are" and "what we do."

GRAND LODGE OFFICE:

Clipping files - Over 1,000 items have been compiled and indexed. These have been gathered from other Grand Lodge periodicals, bulletins and proceedings, a valuable contribution to the monumental task. To him we are indebted.

Constitution and Standing Regulation - The proposed index submitted by the 11th Masonic District is being reviewed by our office for improved "finding of items". Brother Don Wilder, of Corner Stone Lodge #216 has volunteered for this task. Imagine by the minute a Masonic Standard Classification numbering system, using a standard numbering whereby everyone could, by that number, identify, study, possibly utilize what every Grand Lodge has on that subject, in record time.

Computerization: Fiscal restraints from our deficit this year and a forecast of another deficit, places a damper on the purchase, at this time, of a computer, the capacity of which requires further study, as well as definition of the total package of Masonic information to be entered.

However, local lodges should seriously consider obtaining a computer. The price of the required size, for lodges of 200 and 300 members, has declined considerably during the last two years. They are now within the price range for most lodges. Details and programs for some of these systems are available at this office.

Our Grand Master has stated he will appoint a Committee to investigate the requirements for components, programs, etc. for the eventual purchase and implementation of a new Grand Lodge system.

Masonic Service Association: We have accumulated the entire set of Short Talk Bulletins, dating back to 1923. The set is available to the Brethren for reference. Every lodge should have this complete set. It is the most comprehensive lodge-oriented collection of Masonic data available and is right at our fingertips.

Care & Share: As our hospital visitation program leaves much to be desired, results of the recently implemented program of "Masonic Inserts", mailed to our shut-ins, have been gratifying. Our mailing list now totals 160. While it is not equivalent to a personal visit, it is a visible reminder to the receiver that we do care.

It is obvious there are many more shut-ins that we have not identified. At a recent meeting of the Masters & Wardens Association of the 17th Masonic District, the formation of a district-wide hospital and nursing home visiting team was discussed - one that involves the members (other than Lodge Officers) of every lodge in the District. Sure would enhance our public image. By the same token, wouldn't it be terrific if every Lodge in the District would have a "Togus Sunday!"

Danger Signals: Over 500 Past Masters are presently holding Lodge office this year. The dropouts of line officers are too numerous to ignore. This fact is not lost on our Past Master brethren. The solution is evident - "Involvement." We have a detailed Team Concept program that reassigns many extra duties to non-officers. Masonry Is a Way of Life, and we proudly acclaim. However, being absent from our family every night at Masonic meetings, etc., is certainly not the intent of Masonry, and must be addressed.

Appreciation: I cannot minimize the extent of assignments involved in this year of productive conferences and meaningful office requests.

I would certainly be remiss if I did not express my appreciation to our Grand Master for his innovative and constructive suggestions. To the Finance Committee for their continued cooperation and advice. To our lodge secretaries who have continually assisted our secretaries in their area. To our retiring secretaries of several years service, a mere mention you would be out of style. Many have left their marks in their own lodges and in the Grand Lodge. We are truly appreciative and indebted.

Our staff, specifically Mrs. Tupper and Mrs. McLellan, are "gems". We are indebted to them for their personality, enthusiasm and productivity. As to our Grand Treasurer,

Bro. Clyde L. Ferris, Executive Officer of DeMolay in Maine, presented the following report which was accepted.

In Grand Lodge
Lewiston, Maine
May 5, 1987

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine:

It is a real pleasure to give this report to the Grand Lodge of Maine as it is a very optimistic report. We have some of the finest young men in Maine in Maine DeMolay.

I just returned from attending the Twentieth International DeMolay Congress and the Sixty Seventh International Supreme Council of the Order of DeMolay which was held, this year, in Anaheim, California. I am so proud of being associated with such a fine group of young men and I am convinced that The Order of DeMolay is the greatest youth organization in the world for young men between the ages of 13 and 21. The 2 young men I had with me from the Jurisdiction of Maine, State Master Councilor Scott Matthews and Deputy State Master Councilor Kevin Stoehr were a true representative of what DeMolay stands for and I was so very proud of them in California.

Maine DeMolay is having a great year so far in 1987 and it appears that we will show a net growth this year, which is the first year we have had a net growth for many years. We have turned the downward trend of membership around. We have done this in spite of having a severe shortage of Advisors from the 36,000 Masons in Maine. We are getting a few new advisors, however, we need many, many more to give more young men throughout the State of Maine the Excitement of DeMolay.

In addition to the 2 young men and myself attending the Sessions in Anaheim, I was happy and very pleased to have Brother & Worshipful Ronald C. Cogswell of Naval Lodge, who is the State Officer's Advisor and Past State Master Councilor and Past Grand Master and Past Executive Officer Harold Chute there with me. Brother Ron and I saw a different side of Brother Chute when we went to Disneyland as Brothers Chute and Cogswell went on the fast ride called the Mattahorn, which I wouldn't even go on. We found out that we all were young at heart. It was a very successful session though and the young men of DeMolay that were at the Congress Session, which are the leaders of DeMolay throughout the world, conducted their meetings in a very businesslike manner.

Since my report to the Grand Lodge last year, Maine DeMolay has made progress in several of its new programs. We are in the process of setting up a DeMolay Dream Factory Chapter in Maine. This is the project DeMolay International has taken on as its official international philanthropy. It gives DeMolay a chance to show they have a heart by fulfilling dreams for seriously or critically ill children between the ages of 3 and 13. Brother John C. Stacy is the Director of the Maine DeMolay Dream Factory and is in the process of setting up the Board of Directors and getting the legal work done and then you will hear a lot more about this Maine DeMolay Charity Project.

The other program we are starting is the DeMolay Alumni Association. I have appointed Brother Robert Brown, who is a Senior DeMolay and a Past State Master Councilor as the Director of Alumni Activities. We will be starting several Alumni Chapters throughout the State of Maine. I have compiled a list of more than 250 Senior DeMolays in the State of Maine and I'm sure there are probably, at least 250 more that I don't know about. I was surprised of some of the men throughout Maine I found were Senior DeMolays. This is another program you will be hearing more about.

On October 5, 1986, the Kora DeMolay Council sponsored the Second Annual DeMolay Brunch which was very successful and will give Maine DeMolay additional funds to assist financially in operating the many programs and projects Maine DeMolay has going.

I appointed Brother James Buss the State Director of Membership and he has been very busy this past year and his hard work is starting to show. Mid-Coast Chapter in Rockland was instituted on March 15, 1987 and a new chapter was started in Winter Harbor on March 29, 1987 with 25 new members and was instituted the same day. I have heard there are other areas up the coast that may also have interest in having a DeMolay Chapter.

We are also trying to re-activate Forest City Chapter in Portland, but, it's the same story, we can't get a Master Mason to serve as Dad Advisor. In view of this, I have taken over as Dad Advisor and the State Officers are going to fill in as the chapter Officers until we can get some young men in the Portland area initiated and trained to be officers. Hopefully, by that time, we can find a Master Mason willing to be Dad Advisor.

We held our annual Maine DeMolay Congress on Saturday and Sunday, November 15th & 16th, 1986 at the Auburn Masonic Hall. During the afternoon, we held the Grand Master Ernest H. Curtis State Membership Class. Both the Initiatory & DeMolay Degrees were performed on 10 candidates. The Initiatory Degree was put on by DeMolays from throughout the Jurisdiction of Maine and the DeMolay Degree was performed by the New England Regional Champion Degree Team from Medford Chapter, Medford, Conn. and both degrees were exemplified in an excellent and dignified manner. That evening, we held the Honors and Awards Night and the Legion of Honor was conferred on the following 9 Master Masons: Henry G. Talbot, James P. Archibald, Theodore Stanton, Thomas England, Grand Master Ernest Curtis, Burton Warren, Charles Glassmire, David St. Pierre and Byron Johnston.

Our Deputy State Master Councilor Kevin Stoehr won 2nd place in the New England Region in the 1987 Paul R. Kach/DeMolay Prize Essay Contest and received a check for \$200 at the Congress Session in Anaheim last week. The theme for this year's contest was "Why I Think We Should Celebrate the 200th Anniversary of the Constitution." The contest is sponsored by The Supreme Council, 33°, Ancient & Accepted Scottish Rite, Southern Jurisdiction, through a bequest of the late Paul R. Kach, 33°.

We will be holding our State DeMolay Sweetheart Pageant on Saturday evening, May 23rd right here in Kora Temple beginning at 7:00 P.M. and it is open to all Masons and their families. The cost is only \$3.00 per person and I know you would enjoy the program. It would be very nice to see you all present at this DeMolay social event.

Our Conclave '87 will be at Bates College in Lewiston, Maine on Friday, Saturday and Sunday, June 26th, 27th and 28th. It would be nice to have you drop by Bates College and look in on the activities during Conclave. Friday night is the formal opening and all day Saturday will be athletic events. The State Master Councilors Brunch and Installation of State Officers will be on Sunday. We have received great financial support again this year for our Conclave from the Masonic Lodges and other masonic bodies throughout the State of Maine and it is certainly appreciated.

There are many areas where we should have DeMolay Chapters, but we can't start the chapter, because we are unable to get Advisors. We appreciate your financial help very much and it is certainly needed, but what we need more than your money is for you to be Advisors.

Remember, brethren, A Hundred Years from now it will not matter what my bank account was, the sort of house I lived in, or the kind of car I drove. But the world may be different, because I was important in the life of a boy.

NOTES AND COMMENTS

Receipts

We project receipts from Grand Lodge dues to be less than last year because of expected decrease in membership. There will be fewer members to share the costs.

The fall in interest rates will have its impact on projected revenue.

On the plus side, the Charitable Foundation voted to increase its contribution toward the expenses to cover the costs attributable to the administration of the Charity Fund. These include salaries, wages, telephone, postage and professional services.

Appropriations

It should be noted that there are no salary increases provided for the Grand Secretary and Grand Treasurer.

There is a moderate increase in wages for secretarial help, but they receive no other employee benefits.

The appropriation for professional services pays for the annual audit and preparation and filing reports to Internal Revenue Service. The amount has remained constant for the last three years and is well below normal charges for these services.

The rent Grand Lodge pays includes utilities, heat and janitorial services and the occupation of the Grand Lodge offices and library and the use of the lodge rooms and auditorium.

The reserve for lodge services is established to provide funds for non recurring large ticket items. In prior years, \$10,000 has been reserved each year. The last two years we have set aside only \$5,000 in each year to help reduce the deficit budget. The Grand Lodge expended \$12,000 for a supply of rituals. We anticipate an expenditure of \$18,000 for 50-year medals and 25 and 50-year pins. We purchase in quantities in order to reduce per unit costs.

The money is tied up until recovered in sales. In the meantime, we earn no interest on these funds. The expenditure for 50-year medals and pins is never recovered.

The appropriation for the session payroll is to pay the mileage and per diem to the lodge representatives attending the Annual Communication.

The appropriation for the Annual Communication covers the costs of subsidizing the Blue Lodge banquet, local busing, meals and accommodations for the guests of Grand Lodge. This Grand Lodge, as all others with whom we exchange visitations, is endeavoring to reduce this expense. We have succeeded in doing so the last three years.

The cost of printing the Proceedings continues to increase each year, despite the fact we seek competitive bidding. We might be able to reduce this cost if Section 23 of the Constitution were amended to require fewer copies to be circulated.

The reserve fund established for capital outlay, is to provide monies for replacement of office equipment, such as typewriters and copier when the need arises. It is the desire of the Finance Committee to acquire a computer for the Grand Secretary's office some time in the future.

It should be noted that the cost of publishing the Maine Mason is \$25,000 while the assessment will bring in only \$17,500.

Your Finance Committee is very cost conscious. We meet regularly to review all bills and discuss ways and means to keep expenses under control. We became quite concerned last December, when the total assets in the general fund amounted to less than \$10,000 with which to operate Grand Lodge until the annual dues were received in January.

The funds held by the Trustees of the Charitable Foundations, cannot be used for general operations of Grand Lodge. The Constitution prohibits it. These funds must be used exclusively for charitable purposes except for "ordinary expenses necessary for the proper administration of the funds."

RICHARD B. OLFENE

After education in the Auburn public schools, he attended New Hampton School in New Hampshire.

The Olfenes are members of High Street Congregational Church. Dick is a member of the American Legion, the Lewiston-Auburn Chamber of Commerce and the YMCA. He is a former trustee of the Auburn Sewage District, a corporator of the Central Maine Medical Center and a former State Senator from District 12.

Bro. Olfene was raised a Master Mason in Tranquil Lodge No. 29 in 1950. He is a member of the Lewiston-Auburn Scottish Rite Bodies and Maine Consistory. In September 1982, he was coronated a 33°, Honorary Member of the Supreme Council for the Northern Masonic Jurisdiction. He belongs to Bradford Chapter No. 9, R.A.M., Dunlap Council No. 8, R. & S.M., and Lewiston Commandery No. 6, K.T. He is a member of Eusebius Conclave of the Knights of the Red Cross of Constantine.

He joined Kora Temple in 1951, was Potentate in 1966, was president of the Northeastern Shrine Association in 1966-67 and is a lifetime member of the Cabiri. He was director of Put Stevens Court, Royal Order of Jesters in 1970. He received the Honorary Legion of Honor of the Order of DeMolay in 1967, and is an Honorary Member of the International Supreme Council of the Order of DeMolay.

He was elected to the Imperial Divan in 1974 and was installed Imperial Potentate of the Shrine of North America in 1983. He is a member of the Board of Directors of the Shriners' Crippled Children Hospitals and Burns Institute, serving as Chairman for two years.

Grand Master: Now Brethren, I told you before lunch we had something a little special. You heard me mention in my address about the National Foundation for the Prevention of Alcohol and Drug Abuse in Children, this is a program that is under way in the State of Pennsylvania and several Grand Lodges of the Grand Masters Assoc. of North America have adopted this program, including five New England states. If we should adopt it, we would make it 100% of the New England states. At this time I would like to present the author of this program, the man who has been working on it for a number of years, has the best understanding, and I would like to have him tell you a little bit about the program before we proceed to talk seriously about adopting it. Brethren, Right Worshipful Brother Carl Stenberg.

DRUG AND ALCOHOL ABUSE AMONG CHILDREN

M.W. Grand Master, Grand Lodge Officers, Distinguished Guests and all of the great Masons of Maine:

I am delighted to be with you today and to have the opportunity to share my thoughts with you on the Foundation for the Prevention of Drug and Alcohol Abuse Among Children.

I want to call to your attention a very interesting article that appeared in the 1986 issue of the Prevention Parentline, which goes like this, "The top seven discipline problems in

public schools in the 1940s were: talking, chewing gum, making noise, running in the hall, getting out of turn in line, wearing improper clothing and not putting paper in waste baskets. The top 17 discipline problems in the 1980s are: drug abuse, pregnancy, rape, assault, arson, murder, vandalism, gang warfare, venereal disease, alcohol abuse, robbery, burglary, bombing, absenteeism, extortion and abortion."

My Brethren, it takes very little reflection on our part to recognize that we are living in a different world today, a world where challenges are different, a world where values have been altered, a world where issues, that at one time seemed important to us, are no longer important issues to young people.

A documentary on public television stations recently dealt with a subject they termed "A Generation at Risk." This documentary, while dealing with the problem of drug and alcohol abuse, expanded its concern to problems of suicide, pregnancy, dropping out of school and other issues. When a total analysis is made, however, it is impossible to separate drug and alcohol abuse from practically every other major problem which young people must face today.

It is characteristic of a complacent society to ignore that which we do not want to see or hear or which does not affect us directly. It is far too easy, when we eat three meals a day, go home to a warm house at night and sleep in a comfortable bed, to ignore that which is adversely affecting what is rapidly becoming a major problem in a majority of our population.

My brethren, if we needed a selfish reason to support our National Program, the potential loss to our Fraternity in members alone would justify our action. The potential can happen if we, as citizens of the world, fail to control this 'cancer' that is destroying our youth will provide all the incentive we will ever need.

In looking at the membership statistics of the Masonic Fraternity over the past several decades, we must realize that, to a great extent, we, as a Fraternity, have lost an entire generation through a lack of interest in the principles and philosophies for which we stand. What we are facing today could be far worse.

Probably the greatest philanthropy that has ever existed is the Shriners' Program for Crippled Children's Hospitals. The Shrine, however, is made up of a fraction of the Masons of the United States and Canada. Think how much more we should be able to accomplish with so many more members to draw from!

Our basic concern is not rehabilitation but rather, prevention, through education. At the present time, the Pennsylvania Foundation has established a working relationship with 35 different organizations within the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.

Some of the organizations we work with do involve rehabilitation, but we have made it a strict practice to deal only with the educational end of that organization's function. For example, one agency with which we work, is the Gateway Rehabilitation Center. Although their primary function is that of rehabilitation, our relationship with them has provided for the production of an educational film and a provision to hire a psychiatrist to work with children who are growing up in the homes of alcoholics and drug addicts to prepare them to deal with the re-introduction of that family member back into the home.

Our relationship with the Department of Health and Education has proven not only to be a highly beneficial portion of our program, but has exposed Freemasonry widely, not only to the public but to the State Government.

To give you an idea of the magnitude of this portion of our program, 1,129 participants took advantage of the opportunity of this training session involving a total of 84 days in 1986. The Foundation provided the room and board while the Department of Health and Education provided the training and personnel.

At two locations, the St. Francis Medical Center and Thomas Jefferson University Hospital, we are involved with prenatal and postnatal education of mothers of addicted infants.

At Mercyhurst Preparatory School, we support and underwrite the expenses for a group of young people who, through theatrical exemplification, express to their peers the effects of becoming involved with drugs and alcohol.

The Foundation has also awarded a \$6,000 scholarship to a registered nurse to complete work in the field of chemical dependency in pregnant women and their newborns.

Another type of program we are involved with is through "Gaudenzia, Inc. - Vantage House" in the support of an educational curriculum for children totally geared to prevention and education.

In recognition that our program is still in its infancy, we would certainly anticipate a continued investigation into the most effective means through which we can contribute to control this insidious disease.

We must never lose sight of the final objective of our efforts "to help children." The public exposure, however, which Pennsylvania Freemasonry has experienced since the formation of the Foundation has been an unanticipated side benefit outside the initial purpose of its origin. It is not predictable as to what lasting effect the success of the National Foundation may have on the history of Freemasonry. We can, however, say with little reservation in regard to another great foundation, that the Shrine did not make the Crippled Children's Hospital - the Crippled Children's Hospital made the Shrine.

Perhaps one of the great needs of the Masonic Fraternity has been a National cause to unite our efforts. Some day it may be said that Freemasonry did not make the Foundation, but that the Foundation made Freemasonry.

Brethren, I want to mention to you just where we stand in regard to the National Foundation, which was approved by the Conference of Grand Masters back in 1986. We are incorporated under the laws in Virginia. Our headquarters happen to be in the George Washington Memorial. We have opened an office in Virginia and we have hired a director, by the name of Larry Chisholm and yesterday was the first day our office was in operation.

Your Grand Master mentioned just briefly about the number of states that we have involved in the National Foundation at this point. I would like to call to your attention that there are 17 states who are charter members of this foundation, the National Foundation. They are Connecticut, Idaho, Illinois, Louisiana, Maryland, Massachusetts, Minnesota, New Hampshire, New York, North Dakota, Pennsylvania, Rhode Island, Vermont, Delaware, Washington and Wisconsin.

How it works. The working committees that we have will make several proposals at the next session of the Grand Masters' Conference. What we would like to see is that all of the jurisdictions would unanimously join the Foundation, that they would also establish a foundation within their own jurisdiction. Funds that we would receive from each jurisdiction, we were contemplating that we would consider returning a portion of them, maybe as much as a half of whatever we receive. These funds would then be used within your Jurisdiction for a program.

For instance, I have mentioned three of ours in Pennsylvania—and we're all working for a good program.

As a matter of information, the talk which included a portion of what I told you this afternoon was made to the Grand Secretaries at the Grand Masters' Conference and it will be in the May issue to complete the presentation. It's entitled "Masons Care About Children."

If you study the statistics as to the effect drugs and alcohol have on crime among juveniles, it's saddening. I'm sure that if we eliminate this dreadful disease, the case load of our lawyers would be manageable.

I sincerely hope that the Masons of Maine will take this to heart and take the appropriate action to join the 17 states that have become—members of the National Foundation. We will be making available to the states that join, a brochure and a little pamphlet on how to do it.

It's been very good to be with you and have the opportunity to tell you about this program that I think is so very very important to the fathers and mothers and grandmothers and grandfathers of this great country. We just cannot let these young people go down the drain. We're losing too much. I thank you.

The Grand Master then called upon M.W. Peter C. Schmidt to present a resolution to adopt the program.

RESOLUTION

M.W. Grand Master, Whereas the Conference of Grand Masters of North America have approved the establishment of a National not-for-profit Masonic Foundation to be known as the National Masonic Foundation for the Prevention of Drug and Alcohol Abuse Among Children, Inc., the National Masonic Foundation, which will support the elimination of drug and alcohol abuse among the youth of this Nation and

Whereas the undersigned Grand Lodge does hereby recognize the importance of eliminating drug and alcohol abuse among the youth, in order to insure the future for the generation of young men and ladies who are sound of body and mind, now therefore the Grand Lodge of Ancient Free and Accepted Masons does hereby declare its support and affirms its participation in the National Masonic Foundation, and does further vote to support and participate in the Foundation by becoming a Charter Member, and by further supporting the National Masonic Foundation in its efforts through a volunteer contribution by the Grand Lodge, or a solicitation of funds through the voluntary contribution of its membership and others who share our concern for the national epidemic which experimentation in the use of drugs and alcohol by the youth of our country has created.

Bro. Carl W. Stenberg, Jr. of Pittsburgh, a retired vice president of the Mellon Bank was installed as the 98th Right Worshipful Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of Free and Accepted Masons of Pennsylvania and Masonic Jurisdiction Thereunto Belonging. He was installed as the top leader of the more than 200 thousand Masons in that State on December 27, 1985.

AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION - ADOPTED

The Grand Master then called on M.W. M. Donald Gardner, who addressed the Brethren as follows, presenting a revised amendment which was adopted.

M.W. Gardner: My Brethren, I am really disappointed that you would not accept the amendment to the Constitution, after this morning having adopted a budget which projected a deficit of \$28,000.

Now the only way we're going to make up that \$28,000 is cutting some of the Grand Lodge programs. A few years back you wanted the Maine Mason to be published. We've

just going to have to cut it out because we're paying over \$25,000 to publish the Maine Mason. We can't afford it.

We can't afford repairs on our regalia. A lot of things we're not going to be able to do because you have defeated the amendment to increase the dues.

I just want to take a few minutes to reflect on what we've been doing. Some have suggested this morning that it was a little foolhardy to come in with a 40% increase in dues in one year. Now maybe the Finance Committee can take some responsibility for failing to do something about it in prior years. Perhaps if we'd kept nudging it up each year, but you have to recognize that in order to increase the dues, we have to go through the method of the Constitution, which means presentation at one Grand Lodge Session, laying it over until the next year, and it's into the second year before we get our dues and then they don't come in until the following January.

Maybe we should have been increasing our dues annually to reach the goal we're seeking, but let me just reflect with you for just a moment to see where we've been and where we are today.

When I was Grand Master in 1967, the annual dues were one dollar. We had a membership a little in excess of 46,000. True, we ran the Grand Lodge on something around \$63,000. Today it cost three times as much to run the Grand Lodge. And in those 20 years we have increased the dues, the per capita tax, for the operation of Grand Lodge \$2.50.

Do you know of any other product or any other service in the nation or in your community that has been increased so little in the last 20 years? Your own home economics tells you what it costs to run a home - what it costs to run the Grand Lodge.

And you, Gentlemen, you Brethren write in to Grand Lodge for this information, for that information, for this booklet, for this thing and that, and we give it to you because we've been able to provide it.

We're not going to be able to do that this year and I'm sorely disappointed because I think Grand Lodge has a great program and it's worth supporting and we shouldn't be so niggardly that we cannot afford an extra two dollars.

Let me go on a little bit more. In '68, at that time we had to levy an assessment because—why? You defeated an opportunity to raise the dues so you levied an assessment of 25 cents per capita so we could stay in the black.

Then in 1969 we finally were able to get an amendment in. We increased the per capita tax to \$1.25 and the membership was then 45,254. In 1973 the membership was 43,131 and the per capita tax was increased to \$1.50. It increased again in 1974, it was \$2 and the membership was 42,720. And then in 1977 it was increased to \$3 - the membership was 41,515.

That was the last increase in per capita except that in 1981 we levied a 50 cent increase solely for the preparation, the printing and circulation of the Maine Mason. It was not for the support of the Grand Lodge, it was for the support of the Maine Mason - which does not support it.

In 1984, desperate again for more money, rather than come in and say, "Brethren, we've got to raise the dues," - we knew what your attitude was, we can sympathize with you. Nobody likes to spend your money. We said, and this was when our membership was down to 37,339, that year we voted to decrease the amount levied for the Charitable Foundation by 50 cents and allocate it to the General Fund. So this was neither an increase nor a decrease in the overall levy against each member - the 50 cents was merely shifted from one fund to the other.

So in effect, in over 20 years, there has been an increase of only \$2.50 to support the operation of Grand Lodge.

I'm not going back over the other 20 years again, just the last 5 years, and tell you the average loss by death in this Grand Jurisdiction has been 363 per year and to that figure you've got to add the number of persons suspended that have not been reinstated, and you come up with a total average loss in membership of 673. That's just in the last five years.

Consider also that in the same 5-year period, the cost of operating Grand Lodge has gone up 16%. I told you this morning the cost of printing our Proceedings - we send them out to the printers for bid, you can't keep the deficit back because each year we have to pay more.

When you come to think of it, it is an alarming state of affairs, the total number of members diminishing each year and the cost of operation increasing.

Obviously there's only one conclusion - we've got to increase the pro rata share each one of us pays to operate the Grand Lodge. You must be willing to pay it.

We've got the possibilities. We've got to keep supporting the Grand Lodge and its programs and prove that Freemasonry is a real force of good in the community. It's worth doing the things necessary to maintain and continue the programs of this Grand Lodge.

Most Worshipful Grand Master, I move the amendment, the present amendment now standing, that we increase our dues this year by the sum of \$1 per capita. That will hold us out for one year.

MEMORIALS

Rev. Edward L. Fenderson, Grand Chaplain, presented the following report, which was accepted.

To the M.W. Grand Master, members of Grand Lodge, officers and members of the subordinate lodges, and to all Grand Lodges with which we are in Fraternal Correspondence:

Brethren:

It is with profound sorrow that we are called upon to announce the deaths of two Past Grand Lodge officers of the M.W. Grand Lodge of the State of Maine since May 1, 1986.

Rt. W. Edward Eugene Haskell, 57, died at a hospital in Boston, August 27, 1986. He was born August 8, 1929, in Bangor, the son of Gerald and Nellie (Garland) Haskell.

Following graduation from Bangor High School, he enlisted in the Marine Corps and served in Korea. He was wounded in action, and his tank group received a Presidential Unit Citation.

Upon discharge from the Marines he was employed by the Rideout Oil Co. of Augusta. In 1976 he formed the Haskell Energies Co. He was Past Pres. of Tri-City Fuel Dealers Assoc.; a member of the Augusta Chamber of Commerce; Past President of the Augusta Kiwanis Club; was on the Board of Directors for seven years and Treasurer for six years of the Kennebec Valley Medical Center, Augusta. He served on the Board of Deacons, Trustees and the Church Council of the S. Parish United Church of Christ.

R.W. Haskell was raised a Master Mason in Augusta Lodge No. 141 on January 27, 1953, and served as Master in 1964. In 1967 he served as chairman of the Augusta Lodge 100th Anniversary Committee.

He became a member of the Scottish Rite in 1953 and served as Thrice Potent Master of the Kennebec Valley Lodge of Perfection in 1969 and 1970, and was also a member of the Maine Consistory.

R.W. Haskell became a member of the Cushnoc Royal Arch Chapter No. 43 in Augusta in 1978, a member of Alpha Council No. 3 of Hallowell in 1979, and was Knighted in Trinity Commandery No. 7 in 1979. He was a member of Kora Temple Shrine in Lewiston, the Kennebec Valley Shrine Club and the Rose of Sharon Chapter, Order of Eastern Star.

Brother Haskell served the Grand Lodge of Maine as Grand Marshal in 1966 and 1967 and as Senior Grand Warden in 1968. He served on the Committee for the DeMolay Pine Tree Youth Foundation and for many years on the Standing Committee on Arrangements for the Annual Communication of the Grand Lodge of Maine.

He received the Josiah Hayden Drummond Distinguished Service Award in 1983 by M.W. C. Ross Buzzell.

Brother Haskell and Nancy Rideout were married in 1953 and were blessed with three children and three granddaughters. He is survived by his wife, three children, one brother, three grandchildren, several nieces and nephews.

Funeral services were held at the South Parish United Church of Christ, Augusta.

Most Worshipful and Reverend Aubrey Lemont Burbank was born in Palmyra, Maine, July 8, 1913, son of Stephen L. and Ethel (Getchell) Burbank. He was educated in the public schools of Hartland, Maine, graduating from Hartland Academy in 1930 and from Morey's Decorative Advertising School in Boston in 1931.

For several years he operated a gasoline station and was manager of Pineland Oil Company at Waterville. From 1942 to 1952 he was a poultry farmer.

He began his study for the ministry in 1953, serving churches in Brooks and Jackson until July of 1955, when he was called to the Methodist Churches in Clinton, Benton and Vassalboro. He was pastor of the Centenary United Methodist Church in Skowhegan from 1957 until his retirement in 1979.

In Waterville Lodge No. 33 on April 29, 1935, he was made a Master Mason and Worshipful Master in 1941. His activities in Grand Lodge started with the appointment as District Deputy Grand Master 1944-45, later serving as Grand Steward 1946-47; Grand Junior Deacon 1948; Grand Lecturer 1949-52; Deputy Grand Master 1954-55; Grand Master 1956-57; Grand Lecturer again 1958-61; and Grand Chaplain from 1958 to present. He received the Josiah Hayden Drummond Distinguished Service Medal in 1958, and was presented his Fifty-year Veteran's Medal in Grand Lodge May 7, 1985, by M.W. C. Buzzell.

Following his term as Grand Master, Aubrey remained very active in Grand Lodge affairs. At one time he was on seven committees simultaneously. His presence was felt on the Jurisprudence Committee, and as chairman of the Committee on Fraternal Relations. He carried on in the tradition of his illustrious predecessors. He was an integral part of the Grand Lodge Masonic Widows Program, heading the Grand Chaplains in ensuring every masonic widow receive a personal letter of condolence from the Grand Lodge.

Exalted in Teconnet Chapter No. 52, Royal Arch Masons, Sept. 21, 1940, he became High Priest in 1946, later becoming Grand High Priest of the Grand Chapter of Masons in 1953 and was their Grand Chaplain from 1954 to present.

Greeted as a Royal and Select Master in Mt. Lebanon Council No. 13 in 1942, and its illustrious Master in 1948, he went on to become Grand Chaplain from 1955-1960 and Grand Steward 1961-62.

On June 13, 1945 he was knighted in St. Omer Commandery, No. 12, Knights Templar and was its Eminent Commander in 1952-53. He served as Grand Prelate for the Grand Commandery of Maine from 1964-75, and was Grand Prelate Emeritus from 1975 to present.

In the Scottish Rite, he was a member of Augusta Valley and received the 32nd degree in Maine Consistory, Portland, in 1947. He was crowned an honorary member, Sovereign Grand Inspector General, 33rd Degree, at Buffalo, New York, in September of 1959.

He was a past president of the Maine District Deputies Association, past president of the P.O.A. of Maine, president of the Maine Council, Order of High Priesthood, honorary member of Legion of Honor, Order of DeMolay; honorary admiral, Bellingham Navy Yard (Masonic); honorary member of Portland Legion of Honor.

He was past patron of Martha Washington Chapter, Order of Eastern Star, Waterville; member of DeBouillon Conclave, Knights of the Red Cross of Constantine, Gardiner; member of Kora Temple, A.A.O.N.M.S.; member of South Shore Forest, Tall Cedars of Lebanon, Mass.; member of Vermont Priory No. 65 KYCH, Burlington, Vt.; member of Cross and Crown Tabernacle, Holy Royal Arch Knight Templar Priest; member of Masonic Veterans' Association of New Hampshire and Vermont; member of Central Maine Shrine Club; honorary member of Scottish Rite Bodies of Nova Scotia, Halifax.

While in Skowhegan, M.W. & Rev. Burbank served as an advisory board member of the Kennebec Valley Mental Health Center and was a board member of the Maine Community Mental Health Centers. He was the recipient of the Citizen's award, American Legion Post 16, Fraternal Order of Eagles awards, and the Skowhegan Chamber of Commerce "Man of the Year" award.

He is survived by one brother, Lynwood A. "Steve" Burbank of Waterville; one sister, Mrs. Albert L. (Betty) Smith of Waterville; and several nieces, nephews, grandnieces, and grandnephews. He never married.

A Masonic Memorial Service was held at the Centenary United Methodist Church Thursday evening, August 14, with Grand Lodge Officers officiating, M.W. Ernest H. Curran, Grand Master, Rev. Edward L. Fenderson, Grand Chaplain. M.W. Harlan F. Smith delivered the eulogy.

Funeral services were held at 11:00 A.M. Friday, August 15, at the Church, followed by a Masonic committal service at the graveside in Pittsfield. Past Grand Masters of the Grand Lodge of Maine served as honorary pallbearers.

We have had the privilege of sharing our lives with these two distinguished brethren. They both served the Craft beyond the call of duty and the light they have left for us to follow will shine forth forever. Their lives exemplified what Masonry is all about and brought glory to the Supreme Architect of the Universe and honor to our beloved fellowship where brotherly love prevails.

DISTRIBUTION OF THE CHARITY FUND

R.W. Stanley F. Sampson, for the Committee on Distribution of the Charity Fund, presented the following report, which was accepted.

In Grand Lodge

 May 1, 1987

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine:

For the fiscal year ended March 31, 1987 your committee on distribution received a total of 65 applications from 58 lodges. All 65 of these applications were considered and 63 were granted assistance. There were more requests for relief than in recent years and this is good as it is incumbent upon us as Masons to relieve the distress of those in need. It is a rewarding experience for your committee.

The total amount of relief granted for the year 1986-1987 was \$150,250.00 which is the largest amount distributed in the history of the Grand Lodge Charitable Foundation. Only as recently as the year 1971-1972 the total amount of relief given was \$50,300.00. This, of course, reflects the astute management of our charity fund by our investment committee and various donations to the fund. The 63 requests approved for 1986-87 averaged \$2,442.00 as compared to \$2,210.00 for the previous year.

In addition to the amount of \$150,250.00, the sum of \$367.00 was paid to 6 lodges for veterans' dues. This area of assistance should not be overlooked by our subordinate lodges as members sometimes might be too proud to ask for help with their dues and subscription request a demit or are suspended for non-payment of dues.

It is noteworthy here that the sum of \$9,000.00 has been contributed to the relief fund by the Grand Chapter for applicants who are Chapter members and the sum of \$2,700.00

the Scottish Rite to those who are members of the Maine Valleys as follows:—Bangor Valley \$250.00, Lewiston-Auburn Valley \$500.00, Portland Valley \$850.00 and Maine Consistory, \$1,100.00.

For the Committee on Masonic Education and Lodge Service, the past year has been one of change, historic moments, and a continued effort to realize the aims of that mission which it is entrusted.

During the latter part of 1986 it was necessary for R.W. Bro. Walter M. MacDonald to resign as Chairman of this Committee. Having two jobs and being enrolled as a Library Candidate in Educational Administration at the University of Maine at Orono seemed enough of a work load for him. Fortunately he did agree to remain on the Committee. I can assure you of one thing: his leadership and expertise to this Committee is a "Masonic act to follow". To this beloved brother, the Committee, our Grand Lodge, and the Craft offer a most sincere expression of thanks for the tremendous contribution he has given to the Craft.

District Representatives

The One Hundred and Sixty-seventh Annual Communication of this Grand Lodge was the presentation of the District Representatives new Grand Lodge apron. The emblem on the apron: the point within the circle bordered by the two parallel and perpendicular lines with its focus upon the individual brother and the individual lodge affirms the continued commitment of our Grand Lodge to the education of each brother and recognizes the District Representative as an integral and important component of the Grand Lodge on Masonic Education and service to the lodges.

From the reports of District Representatives we gather there is increased activity among more lodges with the revised program of candidate and new Master Mason instruction. These lodges are experiencing the benefit of their efforts with new brethren becoming active and knowledgeable Masons in their lodges.

The District Representatives are performing a great service to our lodges and have given valuable assistance to our District Deputies and this Committee. To each of them we offer our sincerest thanks for their dedication to the Craft and service to their districts. In particular, the Committee would like to recognize Bro. Jordan Fuller, 19th District, for the outstanding job he has done in his District. His reports are complete and most enthusiastic. Also to be commended are the District Representatives: Wor. Bro. Richard V. Beck, Ronald G. Forrest, and R.W. Bro. Louis Greenier from Districts 20, 6, and 1, respectively. The success of our program depends so much on the continuity of effort which our brethren bring to the constituent lodges.

Northeast Conference on Masonic Education and Libraries

The Grand Lodge of Maine was host to the 31st Annual Northeast Conference on Masonic Education and Libraries held May 22, 23, 24, 1986 at the Ramada Inn in Lewiston. There were 13 Grand Jurisdictions in attendance. Seventy-one delegates gathered, twenty-three of whom were from Maine. The theme of the Conference was *Masonic Education, Pathway Toward Excellence for the Craft*. The conference opened with a warm welcome from our own Grand Master, M.W. Ernest H. Curtis, who served as Co-Chairman on the Conference Committee. A most inspiring keynote address was delivered by M.W. Harlan F. Small, P.G.M., in which he gave real "food for thought". Each member of this Committee participated as a leader in the various topics presented during the Conference.

We were treated to an excellent banquet address by M.W. Harold L. Chute, P.G.M. of Maine. M.W. Peter C. Schmidt, P.G.M. who also served as Co-Chairman of the Conference, assumed the responsibility for the transcription, printing, and distribution of the Conference Proceedings with the efficiency we have come to expect from him - in record time! Brethren, as you can see, we really put our Past Grand Masters to work.

The Conference was most successful, interesting and informative. The Proceedings will continue to be a source of ideas, and the discussion by the other Grand Jurisdictions are helpful to us.

Advanced Masonic Education

Our Advanced Masonic Education has done much to stimulate interest in a number of Masonic subjects. The program has been successful in only a few districts; however, in those it has been enthusiastically received. In districts which are geographically large, traveling distance may be a factor in the lack of participation. R.W. Bro. Reginald Wing is exploring the possibility of instituting a reading correspondence course which should alleviate such a problem. It should also enhance the use of the Grand Lodge Library, which we are encouraging.

Lodges in Action and Care and Share Programs

Lodges would be well-advised to fully utilize these excellent programs. These were developed by R.W. Edwin V. George and for several years were placed under his direction. This is an area of District Representatives' reports which is hard for me to ascertain effectiveness. My impression is that the **Care and Share** program is not receiving the careful attention it must have. These concepts rest at the very foundation of our Craft, and must not be ignored.

Publications

The Committee has published a bi-monthly newsletter, "Parallel Lines". This newsletter is mailed to the District Deputies, Assistant Grand Lecturers, and the District Representatives. "Parallel Lines" is the Committee's communicating link with these officers. We have missed two issues for which I must shoulder the responsibility. The demand for time has been high. This is a deficiency which can and will be rectified.

For the Committee, R.W. Bro. Reginald Wing has prepared an excellent program entitled "The Making of the Constitution." This excellent program will be made available for lodges commemorating the 200th Anniversary of our U.S. Constitution. We commend Bro. Wing and offer our sincere thanks for a job well done.

DeMolay and Rainbow

R.W. Bro. Wilbur F. Loveitt has continued to serve as the Liaison officer between Rainbow Assemblies and DeMolay Chapters and this Committee, encouraging lodges to make visitations to the Assemblies and Chapters to provide support for our young people. DeMolay is growing in the state; it is a marvelous organization for these boys and wherever we can help such as serving as an advisor, or simply being present at meetings to indicate support and interest is strongly encouraged. We, as Masons, do make a difference in the lives of these young men and women. Bro. Loveitt has remained amazingly active with these youth groups on top of his high responsibility as Right Eminent Grand Commander of the Grand Commandery of Maine. Our special thanks to him.

A detailed report of the activities of Maine DeMolay will be included in the report of Bro. Clyde L. Ferris, Executive Officer of DeMolay in Maine.

Raymond M. Rideout Award

The recipient of the Raymond M. Rideout Award for Excellence in Masonic Education will be presented as an addendum to this report.

When I committed the Grand Lodge of Maine to \$37,000.00 in August of 1984, I kept my fingers crossed, hoping we could achieve at least \$35,000.00. Due to the efforts of countless Brethren and to the generosity of my brother Masons, the many Masonically affiliated organizations, the Appendant bodies, Rainbow, DeMolay, Eastern Star and many friends, we have reached and passed the goal. I am also deeply indebted to the workers behind the scene, the Brethren who sold ties, pins and key rings, to Lib Tupper, who kept all the records and sent out the certificates of awards and to R.W. Bruce Tornquist, our Grand Treasurer, who banked the money as it came in, gathered interest and paid it out as we reached milestones in our project. Without all of you working together we never could have made it. Thanks a million.

According to figures given me my Brother George Pulkkinen, although the Masons of Maine constitute about 1.2% of the approximate 3 million Masons in the United States, we have contributed over 2% of the total Masonic contributions to the Statue of Liberty Restoration Fund. The total Masonic national contributions came to \$1,961,595.29 as of March 31, 1987. This makes me very proud to be a Mason, especially a Maine Mason.

To help raise the \$40,000.00 we purchased and sold

R.W. Lewis E. Newell, for the Committee on Condition of the Fraternity, presented the following report, which was accepted and the recommendations adopted.

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine:

Your standing committee on the "Condition of the Fraternity" has reviewed the reports of the District Deputy Grand Masters, as provided in Sec. 36, Par. 9 of the Grand Lodge Constitution.

One hundred ninety-five of the individual lodge reports and all of the annual reports were reviewed.

The District Deputies of the 2nd, 5th, 6th, 8th, 10th and 17th should be especially commended for presenting outstanding reports. All other reports were very well done, with the exception of two, these were very brief and did not contain the needed information to determine the condition of the fraternity in their districts.

The District Deputies have been very dedicated this past year and have made many contributions to their lodges, in addition to their official visits. They have assisted and promoted many activities in their Districts and have also made suggestions and recommendations based on their observations as follows:

A suggestion that the Grand Lodge set up a low-interest revolving loan fund so that small lodges could make necessary repairs without paying high interest rates;

That degree teams be observed and rated by either the District Deputy or the Assistant Grand Lecturer;

That more utilization be made of the Advanced Study of Freemasonry;

That the lodge opening procedure for receiving the Grand Master be made clear to all lodges;

That a voluntary Training Program for Officers of lodges be made available with a Certificate of Proficiency awarded for successful completion;

That "Creative Meetings" be more widely used to stimulate greater attendance;

That more semi-public activities be held to help enlighten the public about Masonry and Masonic Fellowship.

Masonic Education

It was noted that there is an increase in 4th Night Programs and also in Advanced Study of Freemasonry.

A large number of other educational programs were presented due to the combined efforts of the District Deputies and District Representatives.

Schools of Instruction

Attendance at Schools of Instruction was about 32%. Nine lodges, three more than last year, were not represented at any School of Instruction.

Financial Condition

Eleven lodges reported no outstanding dues at the time of their annual inspection.

Eight were under fifty dollars, ten were under one hundred dollars and thirty were under one hundred dollars. The secretaries of these lodges should be congratulated for a job well done.

There were others that apparently have some problems and some may need some help. For example:

One lodge with 259 members with \$2,485 outstanding:

Others - 276 members - \$2,142

131 members - 925

138 members - 884

318 members - 7,641

328 members - 3,693

86 members - 1,200

76 members - 1,790

Ritual

Forty lodges were given "Excellent" ratings, seventy-six - very good, sixty-three - good, ten - fair and three - poor.

Masters and Wardens or Officers Association

Ten active associations were reported and one Past Master's Association.

Five districts reported that M & W Associations were either being reactivated or formed.

Several District Deputies praised the M & W Association for their help in planning and coordinating activities.

The Officers Association in the 2nd District has started a fund-raising project called "Masons Have A Heart" to raise \$10,000 to purchase a heart monitor for the Machias Hospital. One-fourth of the money has been raised so far.

The 5th District Officers Association plans to sponsor a "Newsletter". This semi-annual publication with news of participating lodges will be mailed to each member in the District.

Fraternal Condition

Twenty district reports indicated good to excellent conditions with only three weak lodges.

The other four reports did not address this subject.

Lodge Improvements

There is considerable upgrading of interiors and exteriors of lodge properties.

Amity #6 in Camden has acquired land for a new lodge; St. George #16 plans to build; Mt. Abram #204 in Kingfield is in the planning stages; Oriental #13 in Bridgton has purchased land for a new lodge; King Hiram #57 in Dixfield expects to be in their new temple by September 1987; Oxford #18 will complete their lodge this fall; Gov. Wm. King #219 at Scarborough has completed their new temple and Harmony #38 at Gorham is now completed.

One district reported one very weak lodge that was also facing serious building problems.

Charity Funds

One hundred sixty lodges' reports indicated Charity Funds from one hundred dollars to several thousand. Some take up donations or raise money in other ways when there is need for cash help. It was noted that help was given in many other ways.

The visitation program at Togus Veteran's Hospital was highly praised and, in particular, the work of Rodney Pearl.

Masonic Widows Program and Care and Sharing Program

Eighty lodge reports indicated ongoing widow's programs and the Deputies' reported activity in almost every district.

Very little comment was made about the Caring and Sharing Program.

DeMolay and Rainbow

The reports indicated that the support of DeMolay and Rainbow was increasing in several of the Masonic Districts. New DeMolay Chapters are being organized, eleven active DeMolay Chapters and twelve active Rainbow Chapters were mentioned.

Outstanding Meetings

1st District - St. Croix Lodge #46

The M.M. Degree was conferred by The State Troopers Degree Team in an outstanding manner. Attendance was 190 with many brethren being from New Brunswick.

4th District - Deer Isle

Marine Lodge #122 held a District Meeting, "Brotherhood Night" with Grand Master Curtis in attendance.

5th District

The District Fellowship Night and Past Masters Nights with the traditional roast beef, charcoal-broiled steaks and salmon supper drew very good attendance.

8th District - Marsh River Lodge #102 in Brooks

An outdoor degree was preceded by a chicken barbecue.

Mariners Lodge #68 in Searsport worked the Master Mason's Degree. The Master worked the first section in the Maine ritual and his brother worked the second section in the Massachusetts ritual. Both of these events were approved by special dispensation.

11th District

The M & W Association held a successful Table Lodge in Augusta.

15th District

The Colonial Degree Team of Brockton, Mass. performed at Farmington in August and the Annual Lobster and Steak Cookout at Rangeley in June were successful meetings.

17th District

An English-style lodge was opened and part of the work done as it is in England under the direction of Bro. Michael Knowland of Cadagum Lodge #162 in London, England.

Masonic Plays and several other interesting programs were presented.

18th District

Saco #9 held a District meeting on March 23rd with 160 present - the theme of the meeting was along the lines of a "Fellowship Night".

19th District

The Lodges, by special dispensation, marched in the parade celebrating the 175th anniversary of York County.

23rd District

A Brotherhood Night was held at Ashlar #105 in Auburn on November 20, 1966. The program consisted of a portrayal of health, sanitation and deadly diseases of the 19th Century. Grand Master Ernest H. Curtis was in attendance.

The above special events are examples of the many fine programs that have been presented during the last year.

Summary
It appears that continued progress is being made with regard to Masonic education, improvement of lodge facilities and support of youth activities.
Recommendations
Lodge Officers, District Deputies, District Representatives, Grand Lecturers, Masonic Education Committee and Grand Lodge Officers should be praised for their combined efforts.

Recommendations
1. The suggestions and recommendations of the District Deputies should be reviewed by the appropriate Grand Lodge Committees.

2. It is apparent that the most healthy and active districts have Officer's Associations. It is recommended that those districts without active Officer's Associations keep trying to get more organized. Even those that hold a limited number of meetings appear to be successful.

3. It is suggested that help can be offered to those lodges which have excessive amounts of outstanding dues. A team of successful secretaries could be formed to assist those that would like to have help.

Report of the Committee on the History of Masonry in Maine
as of May 1, 1987

During 1986-87 the rules changed regarding the due dates for Lodge histories. As of the end of March, 1987, all Lodges should have had their histories submitted to Grand Lodge through 1986.

Great progress has been made. Last year 162 Lodges owed 714 years of histories. This year 57 Lodges owe only 140 years of histories. Last year there were 18 Lodges which owe at least ten years of histories. This year there are only eight. Last year only 38 Lodges were caught-up. This year 143 Lodges are caught-up. Several other Lodges have advised Grand Lodge of their imminent compliance.

While these results are very pleasing, there is still a lot of room for improvement. An ongoing push will be sustained until 100% of the Lodges are current. As you hear the names of the delinquent Lodges read, please make a note of any Lodge whose history might be more quickly completed through your assistance. Your committee will be seeking further assistance through the various District Deputies and District Representatives. If anyone willing to work on histories, for his own or another Lodge, should make himself known.

GREENLEAF MEDAL

George served as an Artillery Fire Direction Computer in the U.S. Army in 1957-58.

Active in the publishing business for 25 years, he started at the York County Coast Star in Kennebunk, assuming responsibilities as editor, general manager and co-publisher. Brother Pulkkinen took over as general manager of James Newspapers in Norway and Skowhegan, Me. and North Conway and Berlin, N.H. For the past year he has served as Advertising Director of the Maine Sportsman, in Yarmouth, a position that provides rare opportunity to wet a line in various fly fishing rivers and streams of Maine. He also enjoys canoeing, sailing, skiing and photography.

George attends the Second Congregational Church in Norway, Maine, and served as chairman of both the Budget and Planning Boards in the Town of Arundel for many years.

Brother George was raised in York Lodge #22 March 1, 1963, becoming Master in 1965, served as an officer of Murray Chapter #33, R.A.M. for several years; is a member of St. Amand Commandery, K.T., and the various bodies of the Scottish Rite, Valley of Portland.

In Grand Lodge, he was appointed Grand Steward in 1982-1983 and is presently serving as Grand Pursuivant. He also serves on the Publicity Committee of the Grand Lodge of Maine, and is a frequent guest lecturer in various lodges of southern and western Maine.

GRAND LODGE HISTORY

Wor. Bro. Wallace M. Gage, for the Committee on History of the Grand Lodge of Maine, presented the following report, which was accepted.

To the Most Worshipful Grand Master, Officers and Members of the Grand Lodge of Maine, A.F. & A.M.:

This special Committee on History of the Grand Lodge of Maine was appointed in 1980 for the purpose of bringing the Grand Lodge history up to date, supplementing M.W. Ralph Pollard's published "Freemasonry in Maine," which covered the years up to 1968.

We are pleased to report that the work has now been completed and copies of the narrative are in the hands of the Grand Master and Grand Secretary. Following the format used in M.W. Bro. Pollard's work, this updated section contains nine chapters, covering the administrations of the nine Grand Masters serving from 1968 to 1986.

While the events and activities of the past year will be included in the next chapter covering M.W. Bro. Ernest Curtis' administration, 1986-1988, there is one which deserves particular mention as having a most favorable effect on many of our Maine lodges.

As most of us know, premiums for liability insurance on our Masonic Temples has risen drastically in the last 3-4 years, which has put a heavy financial burden on many lodges.

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 were therefore pleased when the Grand Lodge special Committee on Insurance was able to make arrangements with an insurance company whereby Maine lodges may obtain coverage at substantially reduced rates. (Taking advantage of this, our own lodge was able to save nearly \$6.00 per member through lower insurance costs.)

A final comment refers to Grand Lodge's Standing Regulation 2, which requires the Master of each lodge to appoint a Lodge Historian to prepare the Lodge history annually, and submit to Grand Lodge. Judging from the number of delinquent Lodges, it appears that all too often this requirement is overlooked, and in other cases, the job is done by the already overburdened Master or Secretary. The result is likely to be a perfunctory piece of work, done hurriedly to cover the law and avoid a fine. This is not as it should be!

It is quite possible that in the Lodge, there is a Brother who is a member of a local historical society or who has an interest in history and a flair for writing, who might be prevailed upon to serve as Historian.

There is in the latest printing of the Maine Masonic Text Book, a part for installation of the Historian. We suggest that as an incentive, a Brother so appointed should be installed along with the rest of the officers. Given proper recognition and status, he may be held accountable as are all the officers, for the performance of his duty.

INSURANCE

R.W. Edwin V. George read the following report for the Committee on Insurance, which was accepted.

In Grand Lodge
 Lewiston, Maine

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine:

We have reviewed the insurance that is carried by the Grand Lodge and found it is written correctly, with exceptionally good coverage, at a very reasonable cost.

The Insurance Committee agreed to extend its service to all lodges, to review their insurance coverages and their cost. We sent out insurance survey forms to all lodges, giving them the opportunity to have their insurance reviewed. As of April 4, 1987, 84 lodges have completed and returned the survey forms along with other information that was needed in order to make a complete analysis of the coverage each lodge should carry. As of this date we have reviewed and notified 57 lodges of our recommendations. Over 90% of the lodges were able to either reduce their cost or have more coverage without increasing their cost.

Twenty-six lodges have saved a total of \$6,231 on their insurance premiums and at the same time received better coverage. The remaining 31 lodges had a savings of over \$10,000 making a total savings thus far of over \$10,000.

Our recommendations have included but were not limited to the following:

1. Changing the titles on the policy to give coverage to all Masonic Bodies, including the same lodge.
2. Increase coverage on the building and contents to at least 80% of the insured value to comply with the 80% co-insurance clause.
3. Change their coverage from "Named Perils" coverage to "All Risk" coverage, if it is warranted to do so, or add optional perils.
4. In cases of multiple occupancy of the lodge building by more than one Masonic group to add liability coverage, because the Grand Lodge Liability insurance only covers a constituted lodge chartered by the Grand Lodge.
5. To negotiate with their present agent to get a reduction in cost, because Masonic lodges as a group are considered exceptionally good risks.

We even advise each lodge what the cost of their insurance and our recommendations are, to give them the opportunity to negotiate with their present carrier.

The Grand Lodge of Maine carries a one million dollar (\$1,000,000) liability policy which also includes all constituent lodges chartered by the Grand Lodge. The coverage is to protect the chartered lodges while holding rehearsals, masonic meetings, masonic education, etc. This coverage is limited to the constituent lodges and does not cover DeMolay, Rainbow, Eastern Star, etc. It does not cover Trustees of an association or a Charity Group that owns a building for a lodge to use. Therefore, in situations whereby the lodge building is owned by a Masonic Group of Trustees or a Charity Fund they are considered a separate entity and are not covered when this situation exists in any lodge. Any lodge sharing its location with other Masonic affiliated groups should have liability protection under a package policy, with all of the names of the various groups on the same policy.

We recommend all lodges to have this survey completed for them. It is entirely up to each lodge what they do with the information and recommendations we give them. Our lodges in Maine can save thousands of dollars in cost and at the same time improve their coverage extensively to protect their valuable property in time of loss. We know this is true because we have already done so with the 57 lodges we have reviewed.

GRIEVANCES AND APPEALS

M.W. Charles R. Glassmire, for the Committee on Grievances and Appeals, presented the following report, which was accepted.

HAROLD L. STODDARD on or about January 9, 1986 was found guilty of the crime of unlawful sexual contact with a thirteen year old child, and given a three year sentence.

On October 17, 1986, a hearing was held in the Masonic Temple in Auburn, Maine by the Trial Commissioners. The defendant was not present, nor was he represented by counsel.

He was found guilty of un-Masonic conduct, and it was recommended that he be expelled from all the rights and privileges of Masonry.

Your committee on Grievances and Appeals has met and reviewed the proceedings, and find that everything is in order, and we agree with the verdict and the recommendation.

Most Worshipful Grand Master, I move that Harold L. Stoddard be expelled from all the rights and privileges of Freemasonry.

SAMUEL ARTHUR HINDS on or about February 3, 1984 was found guilty in Cumberland County Superior Court of Sexual abuse of minors and aggravated furnishing of scheduled drugs (Class C). He was sentenced to 364 days in jail on count #1 and 10 months on Count #2. All but two months was suspended. Appeal was made to the Maine Supreme Judicial Court, and the judgment was affirmed on December 12, 1984.

Hearing was held at the Masonic Temple in Auburn, Maine on October 17, 1986. The defendant did not appear in person, nor was he represented by counsel.

He was found guilty of gross un-Masonic conduct, and it was recommended that he be expelled from all the rights and privileges of Freemasonry.

Your committee on Grievances and Appeals has met and reviewed the proceedings and find everything in order. We unanimously recommend that he be expelled from Freemasonry.

Most Worshipful Grand Master, I move that Samuel Arthur Hinds be expelled from the rights and privileges of Freemasonry.

DAVID PETER FLEMING on or about March 21, 1986 was found guilty of the crimes of Misappropriation of Postal Funds, and False entries and reports of monies. He was sentenced to 18 months in jail.

On October 17, 1986, a hearing was held by the trial commissioners at the Masonic Temple, Auburn, Maine. The defendant did not appear in person, nor was he represented by counsel.

He was found guilty of gross un-Masonic conduct, and it was recommended that he be expelled from all the rights and privileges of Freemasonry.

Your committee on Grievances and Appeals has met and reviewed the proceedings and find that all is in order. We unanimously concur in the verdict and the recommendations.

Most Worshipful Grand Master, I move that David Peter Fleming be expelled from all the rights and privileges of Freemasonry.

WADE E. RAINEY on or about February 22, 1985 was found guilty of the crime of aggravated assault (Class D), and was sentenced to 364 days in jail.

On October 17, 1986, a hearing was held by the trial commissioners at the Masonic Temple in Auburn, Maine. The defendant appeared in person, and was accompanied by several witnesses.

On being found guilty by the Oxford County Superior Court, the defendant had been suspended by the Most Worshipful Grand Master. He was found guilty by the trial commission on the charge of Gross Un-Masonic Conduct. It was felt by the commissioners that the punishment of suspension was the correct one, and that no further punishment be inflicted by Grand Lodge.

Your committee on Grievances and Appeals have reviewed the facts and the proceedings in this case. This case is a difficult and complex one, but we agree with the findings of the Trial Commission, and with the verdict and recommendations contained therein.

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine, A.F. & A.M.:

The last four years have been very rewarding to me, as your State Blood Program Chairman I see three years of gain in the donating of blood and one year of loss, which was last year. You donated 1051 units of blood last year and the total loss was 45 units and I take full responsibility for this. I did not travel to the District meetings and individual lodges as I had in the past and feel this contributed to the loss plus the fact that not every brother has his lodge I.D. number when donating blood.

There were three Districts that donated the same as last year, nine Districts showed a gain and twelve Districts reported a loss, most of these losses were very low but still a loss. I feel that this can be turned around if everyone pushed this program a little more.

(3) Harold L. Chute, Chairman of the Committee on Investments, submitted an excellent report (copies distributed and analyzed). The following items were noted:

General

Your investment committee together with the Grand Master, Grand Treasurer and Grand Secretary meet three times each year usually September, January and at Grand Lodge Sessions together with one adviser, Mr. John M. Wood, Jr., from Standish, Ayer & Wood of Boston. At these meetings the adviser brings us up to date on current economic conditions and we may discuss changes in the portfolio if there is money to invest or sales of assets. The Grand Treasurer remains in close contact with the adviser and also the investment committee if necessary.

As of February 29th, 1987, the book value of the Relief Fund was \$1,977,107 and the current market value was \$3,365,540 with an income of \$174,055 or 5.17%. This portfolio comprised 67.2% in stocks and the remaining 32.8% in bonds. It is interesting to note that this is a value increase over last year of \$646,240 and the total book value was only increased \$91,508. I have had a very active interest in this fund since 1970 and we have maintained the policy of approximately 65% in equities and the remaining in bonds. If you will study the attached sheet showing the increasing value of the Dow Jones industrials, Standard and Poor's 500 stocks, and the NYSE Composite over the past two years you will discover our huge profits have been in equities. I think this system has proven itself and trust we can continue to show you such fabulous gains. The bonds guarantee our income and the stocks maintain and escalate our growth.

Investment Policy

Your committee maintains a conservative stance. Again our income is paramount yet we must remain agile to make changes as necessary. Our Grand Treasurer is so important to our success to be on hand every day plus his judgment and advice is certainly invaluable. With interest rates relatively stable, merger activity robust, the economy showing signs of strength and foreigners, particularly the Japanese, pouring cash into U.S. stocks, all fuels our success. Just to warn you I see no way we can

continue to show such gains and when we get some dips, which we will, please be kind to your investment committee!

The Named Funds

You will recall that we pooled the 12 named funds last year because it was becoming increasingly difficult to manage successfully some of the smaller funds. This works like a mini-mutual fund. For instance, the Charles M. Farrar Fund receives or is credited with 26.8% of the income of the pooled fund. As of March 31st the total value of this pool was \$480,241 which included bonds \$111,639, stocks \$358,393 and cash \$10,209. A year ago the total value was \$437,014 and so we have advanced \$43,200.

Value and Investment Income

The total value of all Charity Funds now is: Relief Fund \$3,365,340; Named Fund Pool \$480,241; making a total of \$3,845,781. The total income is approximately Relief Fund \$174,055 and Named Fund Pool \$95,310 making a total of \$269,365.

- d. Office supplies (\$1,500.00)
- e. Auditors' fee (75%)

(7) **Voted**—Donations to the Masonic Service Association Hospital Program and related activities:

- a. Masonic Service Association \$6,000.00
- b. M.S.A. Togus Programs \$1,200.00
- c. Grand Lodge Masonic Blood Bank Program \$1,500.00

(8) **Voted**—To donate the DeMolay & Pine Tree Youth Foundation \$3,000.00.

To the Christian Era add 1913, the Year of the Blessing. Thus: 1987 and 1913 = 3900.

MASONIC CALENDAR

Ancient Craft Masons commence this era with the creation of the world, calling it **Anno Lucis (A.D.)**, "in the year of light."

Scottish Rite, same as Ancient Craft, except the Jewish chronology is used, **Anno Mundi (A.M.)**, "in the year of the world."

Royal Arch Masons date from the year the second temple was commenced by Zerubbabel, **Anno Inventionis (A.I.)**, "in the year of the discovery."

We submit, herewith, our Annual Report on Fraternal Relations, consisting of a Foreword, Special Reports, Recommendations and Reviews:

FOREWORD

Traveling throughout this country and abroad, attending Masonic Meetings, and in following the proceedings of the various Grand Lodges, two subjects are mentioned more than any others; loss of membership and loss of respect from the public with the resultant persecution which has been heaped on our beloved fraternity in recent years.

With the exception of very few Grand Lodges such as China and Nevada, decreasing membership is almost universal.

We are all familiar with the attacks on our Fraternity from sources widely divergent from usual historical detractors.

Too often we hear the same old cries, "Why us? What have we done to deserve this?"

We are not the single group with the loftiest of ideals? Look at all the good we do through our various charities amounting to almost two million dollars a day."

Yes, we are always quite ready to blame others for our problems, when what we really need to do is look inside for the causes of all of our problems.

For years we have been loath to tell anyone anything about our purposes, ideals, and, our accomplishments!

A good lesson can be learned from our Shrine Masons. That is a term coined by our Imperial Potentate, Dr. Russell Anthony. A survey showed that over two thirds of the public recognized the Shrine and its philanthropies, but fewer than half of that number realized that Shriners were also Masons.

Almost nobody knew of the Knight Templar Eye Foundation, the Tall Cedars and their work with Muscular Dystrophy, the Scottish Rite work with Schizophrenia and other mental diseases, or any other of the great charitable causes in which the Masons of America and the rest of the world are involved.

How often have you heard the response, "Nobody ever asked me" when asked if they had ever thought of becoming a Mason. This same reply, unfortunately, comes from sons of Master Masons, as detailed by one Brother in the poem, "The Tattoo" in the most recent issue of the Maine Mason.

The time has come to tell the world that we are not a secret, frivolous organization, worthy of the contempt in which we are held by many, but the best fraternal organization the world has ever known. We must dispell also the feeling that we are really a religion, as this separates us from so many in the world today.

Masonry has so much to offer a world struggling in the throes of immorality and dishonesty. Let us go forth and tell them about us, but more importantly, let us so act that we will be believed and respected. Then watch for the awakening of a new day, and the flood of those flocking to us for fellowship and participation.

SPECIAL REPORTS

ITALY

Once again we have a request from the Grande Oriente D'Italia to resume Fraternal relations which were suspended last year. They assure us that the irregularities which prompted our action have been corrected.

Unfortunately, despite representatives of this body appearing before the Commission on Recognition of the Grand Masters Conference of North America, they failed to convince this group that the irregularities had been corrected, and the conclusion was reached that the Grande Oriente D'Italia was not entitled to recognition at this time.

It is of interest that another organization claiming to be Masonic, The Grande Loggia Generale D'Italia, is also seeking recognition. There is, however, insufficient evidence available at this time on which to base a recommendation.

HAITI

Request for recognition has been received from the Grande Orient D'Haiti. Masonry has flourished in Haiti since 1749, having had lodges chartered by France, Pennsylvania, New York, and the Premier Grand Lodge of England. In 1823 the English Provincial Grand Lodge was transferred into an independent Grand Lodge of Haiti. There was some chaos in the Country until the late 1920s, when things were finally stabilized, but the biggest problem remained, as they continued to recognize the Grand Orient of France. This has frequently been discontinued.

In a letter requesting recognition they set out their guiding principles. The Grand Lodge of New York has long recognized the Grand Orient D'Haite, and based partly on these recommendations, the Commission on Recognition agreed that they met all of the requirements for recognition.

We, therefore, recommend that the Grand Lodge of Maine extend recognition to the Grande Orient D'Haiti, and the exchange of representatives.

GREECE

We have received a request for recognition from a group in Greece which is known as the National Grand Lodge of Greece. It claims to have acquired jurisdiction over a number of the Lodges of Greece, but this is denied by the Grand Lodge of Greece. The Grand Lodge of Greece is recognized by all of the Grand Lodges in the United States. We see no reason to make any change in our relationship with the recognized Grand Lodge of Greece.

BRAZIL

There are now 25 State Grand Lodges in Brazil, all of which are considered regular by the Commission on Recognition of the Grand Masters Conference.

We have received requests for recognition from the Grand Loja do Ceara, The Grande Loja do Brasilia, and the Grande Loja do Minas Gerais. Agreeing with the Commission we believe these Grand Lodges to be regular, and deserving of recognition. We therefore recommend that they be recognized, and an exchange of representatives be established.

We have also received from a group calling themselves the Grand Orient of Brazil, a copy of a treaty, signed between them and the United Grand Lodge of England in 1935 in which they claim to be the "Only true and regular National Masonic Power in Brazil." This copy of the treaty was not accompanied by any request, so no action is in order. Further information will be sought before the meeting next year.

TAMAULIPAS

A recent letter from this Grand Lodge in Mexico has been received, but so far we have no information about them, and do not make any recommendation at this time.

Letters have been received from the Gran Logia del Peru and the Gran Logia de Colombia. We have no English translation of these letters, and at the present time do not know their content. We shall attempt to determine this and report at a later date.

One of the problems which confront a chairman of the Fraternal Relations Committee is the many of the letters which we receive are in a foreign language. Your reviewer is not a linguist, so help is needed.

There are facilities for having a letter translated, but they are time consuming, and are also quite expensive. We know that there are many brethren in our Grand Lodge who are fluent in languages other than English. It would be a big help if we knew who they are. We are especially in need of individuals to help us with French, Spanish, Portuguese and Italian. If you are fluent in these, and any other languages, would you please convey this information to me for future use. You will be providing your Grand Lodge with an important service, and I can assure you that you will not be called upon frequently.

RECOMMENDATIONS

Most Worshipful Grand Master, I move that the Grand Lodge of Maine extend Fraternal Recognition to the Grand Lodges of Haiti, The Grande Loja do Ceara, The Grande Loja do Brasilia, and the Grande Loja do Minas Gravis, and that representatives be exchanged with these Grand Jurisdictions. I further move that the suspension of relations with the Grande Orient D'Italia be continued until such time as they meet the requirements of the Commission on Recognition of the Grand Masters Conference of North America.

Most Worshipful Grand Master, I move the acceptance of this report as a whole.

The address of welcome was given by Governor George C. Wallace.

The Grand Master read his address after the usual opening ceremonies. He reported that he had refused to allow a lodge to hold a raffle, even for charitable purposes.

He noted that he had given the Trans National Travel Company permission to operate a travel program and also to circularize the membership for a credit card program.

On request the Grand Master defined the term "Moral Turpitude" to mean a specific offense, and not simply the accusation that a person was immoral.

It was noted that 1,431 brethren had died during the year, and a suitable memorial service was held.

A great deal of attention was paid to the Masonic Home. There are eighty over residents. Fifteen entered during the year, twenty two died, and one withdrew. A budget of \$200,868.67 was adopted for the home. The Chapters of the Order of the Eastern Star gave \$43,000 for a bus.

It was felt that there was some ambiguity in the petition, so a question asking "Have you ever been convicted of a felony?" was added.

Four brethren were expelled for unmasonic conduct, and 1,297 were suspended for non payment of dues.

M.W. Brother R. Harris Henderson, Sr. was elected and installed Grand Master.

Three Grand Lodges, the Grande Loja do Rio Janeiro and the Grande Loja de Minas Gerais both in Brazil, and the Grand Lodge of Gabon were recognized.

There are 466 Lodges with 86,093 members, and a net loss of 1,594. The per capita was \$3.30 plus \$5.00 for the home. The home has an endowment fund of \$4,600,000, up from \$3,000,000 this past year. Minimum fees for the degrees was set at \$30, and maximum at \$150. The Grand Secretary announced that with the ever increasing insurance rates, they were seriously considering self insurance.

They restricted the use of the Grand Lodge mailing list, stating that it was to be used only for mailing of their magazine, and other pertinent Grand Lodge material, and not to be let to any other organization.

The distinguished service medal was presented to F. Lamar Pearson, editor of the Masonic Messenger.

In the trials, 24 brethren were expelled, 2 found not guilty, 250 suspended NPD, 6 petitions for reinstatement were granted and 2 were refused. 3 were remanded for retrial.

It was noted that the census in the Masonic Home had risen from 543 to 556 and the cost per guest was \$11,490.20 per year. The budget for the home is over nine million dollars yearly.

The per capita tax is \$12.65 with \$9.00 for the home.

A Grand Lodge scholarship fund was established.

A committee was appointed to study the feasibility of starting a new Masonic Home in the northern part of the state.

It was voted to start a District Deputy system.

Insurance was discussed at length. The Masonic Home is now self insured for group health and accident among the personnel, and a Grand Lodge Group liability policy established for the Lodges.

Changes were proposed in the ritual, but these were rejected.

The second home is called The Old Masons' Home. Here the average age is 79, and the average census is 111. There were 28 admitted during the year and 18 died.

It was noted that they will celebrate their 200th anniversary in 1999, and that they have \$7,541 in the fund for the celebration. They also have \$715,946 in their building fund.

Nine Brethren were expelled for unmasonic conduct, and 1,891 were suspended for non-payment of dues.

M.W. Brother Harold W. Downard was elected and installed Grand Master for the coming year.

\$30,000 had been donated to the Statue of Liberty fund, and it was expected that another \$5,000 would be received during the next year.

In addition to laying the cornerstones for two Lodges and the Masonic Complex in Heath, the Grand Master, an ordained Methodist Minister, noted that he reconsecrated a large number of lodges during the year.

The Grand Lodge of Ohio was the largest single contributor to the Special Olympics, sponsoring over 1,000 participants.

An edict was issued making it permissible to encourage suitable individuals to seek Masonic knowledge and membership.

Grand Lodge reinstated ten members of the Grotto who had been suspended for failing to appear for an imposed reprimand, but who subsequently appeared and were reinstated.

The need for a Grand Lodge publication was discussed at length, but no definitive action taken.

Two consolidations were held, reducing the number of lodges to 668.

Over \$30,000 was granted in scholarships to worthy students attending Ohio universities.

Following a devastating tornado, \$70,000 was granted to more than 100 victims of this disaster.

Twenty four Brethren were tried for Masonic offenses. Nineteen were found guilty. Twelve of these were expelled, six indefinitely suspended and one reprimanded. Two were found not guilty, and three cases were still pending. Following this the entire code of Masonic offenses was discussed and amended.

Four requests for reinstatement from previously suspended brethren were denied.

A resolution approving future Grand Lodge tours was passed.

The budget for the Masonic home was set at over ten million dollars, and a request for one million dollars to the home funds was announced, making this fund over forty five million dollars.

The Grand Master closed his address with these words, "The men who try to do nothing and fail are infinitely better than the men who try to do nothing and succeed." Perpetual membership was approved.

A new uniform code, constitution and By-Laws were adopted.

Approved the acceptance of advertising in The Oklahoma Mason, and approved a \$1 assessment for the magazine.

Changed the date of the Annual Meeting from April to November.

Adopted a per capital of \$6 and approved a budget of \$452,937.

Paul H. Dorsey, Jr. was elected and installed Grand Master.

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The Grand Lodge of Pennsylvania conducts its business in four quarterly meetings. The annual meeting on St. John's Day in December is a ceremonial function with the purpose of entertaining guests, and installing the Grand Lodge officers.

Among the items of business conducted at the quarterly meetings were the following. An income of \$1,847,473 and the expenditure of \$2,227,833 was reported. The budget for the year was adopted at \$3,700,000.

Mergers between two lodges was accomplished in three instances.

Recognition was granted to the Grand Lodge of Gabon, but since the Grand Lodge of Pennsylvania does not exchange representatives, none was offered to Gabon.

The Grand Lodge of Pennsylvania is particularly proud of its home and hospital at Elizabethtown. There are 665 residents. 132 were admitted during the year, and there were 141 deaths. There were eight withdrawals from the complex, but these were caused by graduations from the Patton School for orphans. The budget for this enormous complex was set at \$19,783,524 for the year. The average age of the adult residents is 85.3 years. The youngest resident is 58.7 years, the oldest 104.4 years, and there are four residents over the age of 100.

The Pennsylvania youth foundation is very active with DeMolay and Rainbow. Thirty thousand dollars was appropriated for a new chapel with a beautiful stained glass window at the Patton School.

The main project before the Grand Lodge is Solomon, II, a program designed to decrease membership loss and return the membership to the figure that it was during better days. The project encompasses many items, including an attempt at decreasing suspensions for non-payment of dues, encouragement to demitted members to reaffiliate, and encourage new applications by allowing the brethren to talk to nonmembers to learn about Freemasonry, and then to petition. The director of the project announced that he was encouraged by the results as the net loss fell to 1,865 this year compared to an average of over 4,000 for the preceding four years. Except for an unusually high number of suspensions for non-payment of dues (2,150) they would have had a gain. 17 were also suspended for unmasonic conduct.

At the annual communication, William A. Carpenter was again installed Grand Master for the ensuing year.

On motion, four brethren were expelled for unmasonic conduct.

The budget of \$88,740 was adopted, and it was announced that \$51,551 had been spent for relief of distressed brethren.

Three John Barney medals were awarded. The Philip Tucker Medal was awarded to M.W. The Grand Master presented the George Washington Distinguished Service Medal to Ernest Effron Borgnine in absentia and it was accepted by Brother Arthur Patton of Abingdon Lodge #48, the actor's home lodge. It was noted that Brother Borgnine had been very active in the BARTER THEATRE in Abingdon when he lived in Virginia. He has received an Oscar for "Marty," and many other awards. Brother Borgnine is a Scientist, and an honorary member of the Supreme Council, 33 degree, S.M.J.

The Grand Lodge recognized the Grand Lodge of Gabon.

They adopted a Uniform Ritual for Table Lodges.

They rejected advertising for their publication, The Masonic Herald.

They adopted a uniform code for Masonic Trials.

The Masonic Home has 17 male and 53 female residents, including three couples. 19 were admitted and 17 died during the year. One withdrew. One resident is over 100 years of age. The resident with the longest tenure has been there for 29 years.

Raised the per capita from \$5.25 to \$7.75.

They voted to hold the 132nd annual meeting of Grand Lodge in Spokane despite the estimate that the cost would be \$10,000 more than when held in Seattle.

A memorial Service was held for PGM Fred Silas Sandoz.

Jefferson J. Easworth was elected and installed Grand Master.

The Grand Master reported sending a check for \$10,131.15 to the Statue of Liberty fund.

The Grand Lodge home for elderly residents had 41, 13 men, and 28 women guests. The home was operated with a budget of over \$803,126.

The scholarship fund had a total of \$1,669,778.78 with more than \$147,000 available for scholarships to Marshall University and to the University of West Virginia.

A memorial service was conducted by the Grand Chaplain for the 1,032 brothers who had died during the last year.

One Lodge was reprimanded for finding a brother not guilty after he had been dismissed from the police force for wounding an individual unlawfully. The brother was then expelled by Grand Lodge.

Grand Lodge voted to increase the assessment to each newly raised brother from \$1 to \$3 for the George Washington Masonic National Memorial.

After passing an operating budget of \$173,137.02, the Grand Lodge voted to increase the per Diem from \$25 to \$30, and left the mileage at fifteen cents. The Grand Lodge assessment is \$3 plus \$8.50 for the Masonic Home.

Approval was given to the National Masonic Foundation for the Prevention of Drug and Alcohol Abuse in Children.

John Efstratios Anagnostis

John Efstratios Anagnostis

On November 19, 1929, a son was born to Sam and Katherine Anagnostis of Saco. This blessed event was a reason for celebration because he was the first born of the two children in the family.

Following the Greek tradition, his parents baptized him John Efstratios Anagnostis, the first name being his paternal grandfather's and the middle name being his father's first name.

John received his education in the Saco Public Schools and graduated from Thornton Academy in 1948. He attended the University of Maine at the Brunswick Annex during his freshman year and transferred to Gorham State Teachers college for the remainder of his undergraduate education.

A month after graduation from Gorham in 1952, John was drafted into the Army and served as an instructor at Fort Eustis, Virginia during the Korean conflict. He was honorably discharged from the service in 1954 but returned to Virginia to work on his master's degree at the College of William and Mary. While still working on his graduate degree, John also taught at York High School in Yorktown, Virginia and was a guide in Jamestown and Williamsburg during his vacations and summer breaks.

In 1957 John moved to Massachusetts, where he taught school for one year. During that year he met Jean MacKinnon, whom he married in 1959. A year later their daughter Katherine was born and three years later the Anagnostis family was blessed by the birth of twin sons, Efstratios John and John Efstratios II.

John was raised to the sublime degree of a Master Mason on November 7, 1962. He was appointed Junior Steward the following year and was Master of Saco Lodge #9 in 1971. That was the beginning of John's Masonic career, as he was appointed to the Grand Lodge Committee on Masonic Education in 1974. Following that appointment he served as an Assistant Grand Lecturer until May of 1980, when he was elected Junior Grand Warden. John was elected Deputy Grand Master in 1986 and Grand Master in 1988.

He is also a member of the Scottish and York Rite Bodies, the Philalethes Society, the Maine Lodge of Research, the Forget-Me-Not Society; Kora Shrine and is Grand Lodge Representative to the Grand Lodge of Greece near the Grand Lodge of Maine.

Twenty-eight of John's thirty-three years of teaching were spent at Kennebunk High School. He retired from teaching in 1986, following the death of his first wife.

In 1987 Dolly Howe and John were married in Biddeford. This marriage enlarged the family even more as Chris and Lara Howe, Dolly's children from her marriage, became a part of the Anagnostis family unit.

John has always said that his three great loves are family, teaching and Masonry. Even though he is not actively teaching in the classroom, he believes that he can now devote his energies to teach Masonry's great tenets of Brotherly love and friendship.

He said, "Well, I guess I haven't been a very good father, have I?" My response to him is, "It's not too late."

So that's why I'm encouraging all of you to tell your daughters, grand-daughters and friends that you may know, about our youth group and encourage them to join. They are a very worthwhile organization and they offer many things that are neglected in society today.

I went into Rainbow when I was 12 years old, I was young, awkward, gawky — I don't know of enough words to explain how horrible I was, Our Supreme Inspector

told me that if I ever found the marching lane, I might be a good Drill Leader. I carried the flag staff into the door frame, I had many numerous occasions — my nickname was "Dribble." But hopefully you can see I have progressed a long way since that time and if you know of any girls that are in the same situation that I was approximately seven years ago, I hope that you will introduce them to the International Order of Rainbow for Girls. It is a very worthwhile organization.

Our project this year is the Merrill Rainbow Camp. I'm sure many of you are well aware of what we are doing. For those of you who aren't as well informed, the Rainbow Girls have purchased, with money earned by the Rainbow Girls, a piece of 10-acre land in Somerville, Maine. Here we are establishing campsites and facilities for the Masonic bodies and the Rainbow Girls to attend and have their outings on this piece of property. Somerville is right outside Augusta, near Windsor, and right now we are hoping to have septic facilities in, electricity, running water — because one of the things Rainbow Girls ask when they go camping is, "Where can I plug in my curling iron?" So they will be very excited with the addition of electricity on their property. I hope that many of you will have the opportunity to visit the Rainbow Camp or support it in any way that you feel proper, possible, by your means.

I would like to invite you to our Grand Assembly Session, which will be held May 27th, 28th and 29th at the University of Maine at Orono. The 27th session begins at 6:30, it is held in the gym and it is the informal opening. This is when your Grand Master — well, your representative, will be introduced.

I would like to thank you for all courtesies extended to me, as well as my Supreme Inspector, this morning and I would like to remind you that you, the light of your candle, can make all the difference.

Thank you very much.

Her address was greeted with a standing ovation.

Grand Master Curtis: Dannette, in the past two years Rainbow Girls in Maine have impressed me very much. The great work they do, the great support that they give to Masonic associations — last year, maybe it was this year, the Rainbow for Girls gave over \$4,000 to the Commandery Eye Foundation. I'd venture to say that that's almost as much as the Commanderies did themselves.

In appreciation of the great work that you girls have done and are doing, last Fall I promised "Mum" Higgins that there would be a donation coming and in behalf of the Grand Lodge of Maine I proudly present you with this check for \$3,439.

Miss Drysdale: I would like to thank you for this most generous donation. It's more than I ever had dreamed of. "Mum" Higgins' fondest dream, vision I like to call it, is to one day have a lodge on the campground and hopefully this donation will make that dream possible. Thank all of you once again.

Matthew Ryder, Deputy State Master Councilor, Order of DeMolay then addressed the Brethren:

Thank you very much. Unlike Dannette, she's used to making these speeches unlike myself, so I'll get out these notes in case I need them.

I'd like to say "Hello," my name is Matthew Ryder and I'm the Deputy State Master Councilor of the Jurisdiction of Maine. I would like to bring greetings from our State Master Councilor, Kevin Stoebr, who has academic obligations to fulfill today and is very sorry that he could not be here. To the Masons here from New Hampshire, Vermont, Connecticut, Delaware, District of Columbia and Australia, I would like to say that the delegates from your DeMolay Jurisdictions are a great example of how your support to DeMolay helps make great DeMolay leaders across our Country.

To the Masons here from Canada, I would like to say what a pleasure and honor it was to meet the Grand Master of DeMolay from Canada.

Speaking as a new Regional Master Councilor, I would like to bring greetings from the new International Master Councilor, John Hink, from the Jurisdiction of Northern California and from the Grand Master of DeMolay, Dan Robert Hannon, from Arizona.

On behalf of the State Officers who attended the banquet last night, I would like to thank you very much for the invitation. We enjoyed ourselves very much and were very interested in what your guest speaker had to say. We, as future Masons, realize the importance of what was said.

We hope your visit with us will be such an enjoyable experience that you will long remember it and that you will want to visit with us time and again.

A warm welcome to our in-state guests, too. Having visited at all the annual meetings of our Masonic-affiliated orders, enjoying their hospitality is an experience that I will always remember. Again this year, I must comment on the excellent relations that we enjoy

among all Masonic orders. May these good relations long continue and may we continually seek to strengthen and improve these relations at every opportunity. We hope each of you will enjoy your visit with us.

To all you delegates and Brethren assembled this morning, a hearty and warm welcome. To those of you who are attending Grand Lodge for the first time, it will be an impressive experience for you to sit in your Grand Lodge and participate in the deliberations. I pray that we can conduct the proceedings here during the next two days, in such a way that a favorable and lasting impression will remain with each of you. We appreciate those of you who support your Grand Lodge by your attendance year after year. We are pleased and honored to have you here again this year.

This past year has been a busy year, not only representing the Masons of Maine at the many meetings usually attended by the Grand Master, but more especially in the developing and planning of new programs. This job was made a lot easier through the support and input of a dedicated staff of Grand Lodge Officers. The progress of these programs will be highlighted in this report.

Necrology

Once again the grim reaper has taken his toll. The scythe of time has cut the brittle thread of life of 1,007 of our Brethren and gathered them into the Celestial Lodge above, where the Grand Architect of the Universe presides. Among these brethren was one permanent member of the Grand Lodge of Maine, R.W. and Dr. Laurence G. Higgins, past Junior Grand Warden. We mourn the passing of these late departed Brethren.

Charitable Foundation

The processing of applications for Masonic Relief continues to be handled in the Grand Lodge Office. R.W. Stanley F. Sampson, Distribution Chairman, reviews all new applications every Wednesday, consulting with the Grand Master and Grand Secretary. This work is most important and is being handled very capably by Brother Sampson.

District Meetings

Twenty-four district meetings were held this past year. We enjoyed the largest attendance that we have had in recent years. The Eighteenth District meeting had 194 Brethren and Ladies in attendance. Five other districts had over 100 present. This increased attendance was due, in part, to good advanced planning by the District Deputies and those who assisted. By request of the Grand

Master, each meeting featured, as part of the program, a skit commemorating the signing of the U. S. Constitution, in observance of the 200th anniversary of this historical event. The skit was prepared by our own Committee on Masonic Education. Each one was presented a little differently and demonstrated great ingenuity on the part of those who planned the meeting. Again this year, several districts invited the Ladies, which helped to swell the attendance. All meetings were well organized and the District Deputies are to be commended for a job well done.

Ritualistic Instruction

Our Grand Lecturer reports that the usual number of schools of instruction have been held this past year, offering our Lodge Officers the best ritualistic instruction available. After four years as an Assistant Grand Lecturer and eight years as Grand Lecturer, R.W. N. James Coolong has decided to retire from this position. Brother Coolong has been an outstanding Grand Lecturer and has fulfilled the duties of his office with distinction. We shall miss the great work that he has contributed to the Grand Lodge in this office.

Masonic Education

This committee is the most important committee in Grand Lodge. Herein lies the greatest challenges of Freemasonry. It is only through Masonic education of our members that we can hold their continued interest in this great fraternity. The Committee on Masonic Education meets regularly. They are mindful that we now have sufficient educational materials and personnel to assist the Lodge officers and members. Our greatest challenge today in Masonic Education is "how to disseminate Masonic information to our members." The Committee is addressing this challenge and we are looking forward to seeing some results.

Hospital Visitation

Once again this year, the Grand Lodge Officers and their Ladies made the annual visitation to the Togus Veterans' Hospital. We attended chapel service and spent some time with our Masonic Veterans at the Hospital. A joint luncheon with the Knights of Columbus was held at their Hall. After lunch we attended a Chapel Service at the Augusta Veterans' Home. This is a relatively new facility, which the Hospital Visitation Committee is now servicing. We welcome aboard a new representative for the Augusta Veterans' Home, Wor. Brother Robert W. Philbrook of Monmouth. We wish him well in this new undertaking. Wor. Brother Clyde Roth continues as the representative at Togus V. A. Hospital. The Sunday Hospital Visitation Volunteer Program has been expanded tre-

mentously. We now have volunteers from the Eastern Star, Rainbow Girls and Masons coming from all over the State. Our representatives are doing commendable work.

Youth Groups

DeMolay Chapters and Rainbow Assemblies are busy and showing progress. New Chapters and Assemblies have been organized or are in progress. The State Rainbow has acquired a Rainbow Campsite in Somerville, Maine. It was my privilege to attend the dedication of this new campground on July 12, 1987. This is a dream come true and I encourage all Masons to lend their support.

Northeast Conference of Grand Masters, Deputy Grand Masters and Grand Secretaries

Your Grand Master and Grand Secretary attended the Northeast Conference of Grand Masters, Deputy Grand Masters and Grand Secretaries, held in Rhode Island on July 19 and 20, 1987. This conference, attended by our counterparts from the Northeast States, is held annually and hosted by a different State each year. It will be the privilege of the Grand Lodge of Maine to host it this year. It is a very serious session that gets down to business Sunday afternoon and evening, with only a short break for dinner. It continues Monday morning and adjourns at noon. Each delegation comes to the conference with a list of subjects to discuss and there seems to be time to cover them all. It is a very interesting and beneficial meeting.

Conference of Grand Masters and Grand Secretaries of No. America

This conference met in Cedar Rapids, Iowa on February 22, 23 and 24 this year. The conference includes all the jurisdictions of North America. With over 60 Grand Masters, 60 Deputy Grand Masters and 60 Grand Secretaries, along with many Past Grand Masters, this conference has to be the largest annual get-together of Masonic Leaders. Subjects of mutual Masonic interest are discussed by the Grand Masters, while the Grand Secretaries discuss subjects of mutual interest to their office. There is time to meet and greet Masonic Brethren from all over the world and to enjoy Masonic Fellowship.

Imperial Shrine Visitation

Once again the Grand Masters of the United States were invited to attend the Imperial Shrine session in Las Vegas on June 22, 23 and 24. This is an effort on the part of the Imperial Shrine, to maintain

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good relations with the several Grand Lodges. We are hosted as guests and are invited to sit in on their meetings. We enjoyed the session and the hospitality and I am appreciative of Kora Temple and Anah Temple for sponsoring the trip.

Dedications

The Grand Lodge of Maine was called upon to dedicate two new Masonic Temples last Fall. On August 22, 1987, we dedicated the new Temple of Eastern Lodge #7, Eastport and on September 26, 1987 we dedicated King Hiram Lodge #57, Dixfield. These were both semi-public meetings, with the Halls packed to over capacity. It was necessary for the Grand Lodge procession to move about the rooms in single file. A cornerstone laying ceremony was conducted at King Hiram Lodge, prior to the dedication. Sumptuous dinners were served at both meetings. Both these Lodges are to be congratulated on their new buildings and commended for their foresight for Freemasonry in their areas. I am sure that the enthusiasm and interest that has been generated during the construction of these new Temples will gain momentum in the years to come. Several other new Temples are under construction, as well as some being in the thinking stage. There is good reason to believe that there will be a new Masonic Temple here in Portland in the not-too-distant future. These are all good signs for the future of Freemasonry.

New England Brotherhood Night

Nineteen present and past Grand Lodge Officers attended the 7th Annual New England Brotherhood Night, held at Masonic Temple, Manchester, N.H. on March 26, 1988. This is an opportunity for Grand Lodge Officers to meet Grand Lodge Officers from the other New England States. It features a banquet, followed by the introduction of Grand Masters and a speaker. It is a short program, but is most enjoyable.

Grand Lodge Night

The second annual Grand Lodge Night was held at the Masonic Temple in North Windham on April 22, 1988. Presumpscot Lodge #127 was selected as the outstanding Lodge of the year and honored to work before a Special Meeting of the Grand Lodge of Maine, called for this purpose. In preparation for this evening, the Lodge held several rehearsals, under the direction of an Assistant Grand Lecturer. Presumpscot Lodge consistently performs exemplary degree work. It is good to recognize a Lodge for outstanding work and set an example for other Lodges to follow. A plaque, appropriately engraved, was presented to the Lodge by your Grand Master.

The Maine Masonic Foundation for the Prevention of Drug and Alcohol Abuse Among Children

By the positive action of this Grand Lodge at the annual communication last year, we joined the National Masonic Foundation for the Prevention of Drug and Alcohol Abuse Among Children. Since then, we have organized a state program, have raised over \$51,000 through personal contributions and have reviewed several programs in which we might participate. Our conclusions are that we will cooperate with and support State programs already in existence. We learned that the State of Maine Department of Education Substance Abuse Division is the best in the Country. We also learned that the Masons of Maine are the first fraternal organization to offer to support State programs. There are many areas and programs within the overall State Programs, that we can be involved with, and I think we can do no better than to cooperate with the State Programs. I wish to take this opportunity to thank all of you who contributed to our Christmas Card appeal. It was a great success. Fund-raising will be a continuing effort. Donations may be sent to the Grand Treasurer. The more funds we can raise, the more support we can give toward educating our children against Drug and Alcohol Abuse.

Scholarship Program

The Grand Lodge Charitable Foundation has released \$24,000 to fund a Scholarship Program. The Grand Lodge of Maine is granting forty-eight \$500 scholarships, 2 in each of the 24 Districts — only one scholarship to a school. Several Lodges have joined with the Grand Lodge and it is anticipated that there will be more than 60 scholarships altogether. These scholarships will be presented with appropriate ceremonies, to gather the most public awareness.

Public Awareness

Our highest aims during the past two years have been to initiate new programs and activities that would allow for the greatest possible public awareness that the Masonic Fraternity is alive and doing good things. This past year newspaper releases, with pictures of the Grand Master and District Grand Lodge officers, appeared in advance of the District Meetings and other special programs, in local papers. In several instances these releases appeared in 3 or 4 local papers.

Numerous special programs and activities have been sponsored by our Lodges during the past year. In conjunction with the 200th Anniversary of the signing of the Constitution of the United States.

In addition to the District observances, several Lodges held their own special meeting to observe this milestone in American History. Phoenix Lodge #24 sponsored a public meeting to observe this great occasion. A play, "The Signing of the Constitution", directed by Basil E. Kinney, Lodge Secretary, was presented. The play was well rehearsed, costumes borrowed from the Scottish Rite made it appear very professional. It was well done and many hundreds of local people had the opportunity to witness the re-enactment of a very special event in American History. Congratulations to Brother Kinney and those who assisted him.

Masons were busy in many semi-public activities this past year. There was excellent participation in the "Scottish Rite Masonic Family Life Week" Sunday service and breakfast. Masons rang the bells for a day in cooperation with the Salvation Army's Christmas Kettle Fund-raising Project in each location across the State. Masons assisted Educational TV for a day by answering telephones in one of their fund-raising projects. These and other semi-public activities are making the public more aware of the presence of the Masonic Fraternity in their communities.

Reception

On Saturday evening, October 3, 1987, a reception was held to honor your Grand Master at Kora Temple, Lewiston. Two hundred fifty Brethren and their Ladies enjoyed a lovely evening of Fellowship, feasting and entertainment. Ashlar Lodge #105, the host, presented several gifts to your Grand Master, including a large portrait, which is on display at the Masonic Temple in Auburn. Your Grand Master and his wife, Barbara, are most appreciative of this outpouring of affection and Brotherly Love demonstrated by those in attendance at this reception. It was a wonderful evening that we will long remember.

Recommendations

Several Grand Jurisdictions have removed the physical penalties from the obligations of the three degrees. Others have added the word "symbolic" before each penalty. The obligations are the very heart of our degrees and we feel very strongly about making any changes in our ritual. However, I realize that some clarification of the penalties would undoubtedly benefit the candidate's understanding of his Obligation. Therefore I offer the following instruction to the candidate in the preparation room by the Junior Deacon, prior to the 3 questions that are propounded to the candidate:

"Mr. _____

You are about to be initiated into the Mysteries of Freemasonry.

The reasons for the manner of your preparation to receive this degree will be explained to you following the conferral of the degree.

During the conferral of the degree, you will be required to take an Obligation of obedience to the tenets of this institution of which you have requested to become a member.

This Obligation is of Ancient Origin and contains penalties for violations which are founded in Antiquity and are wholly symbolic in nature. The only penalties which Freemasonry imposes in modern times for violations of its tenets and regulations are Reprimand, Suspension and Expulsion."

This recommendation should be referred to the Ritual Committee for their consideration.

The most important recommendation I can make to this Grand Lodge and the delegates here assembled, is that every member of every Lodge be concerned about the declining membership. I sincerely believe that we can do something about it, if we would only seriously consider what is really happening. The death toll each year is high and we suspend entirely too many for N.P.D. A small Lodge, with only 94 members, suspended 10 for non-payment of dues. This is 10% of their membership. How much longer can this Lodge exist? I maintain that most of their suspensions could have been saved with a little care and teamwork by the members of the Lodge. The solution to this problem lies within the responsibility of every Lodge. Each Lodge must take steps to preserve the present level of its membership or it will not exist in a few short years. I suggest that we investigate very carefully, all proposed suspensions for non-payment of dues before we take action; that we discourage demits, encourage affiliations and reinstatements. Plan Lodge meetings ahead, to include special programs, educational meetings, Table Lodges, and at least one Brotherhood Night each year, to attract the interest of your members. The challenge is yours, the Grand Lodge can help, there is a job to be done, but it has to be addressed NOW.

I have two more recommendations for your consideration. One has to do with the Finance Committee preparing the proposed budget for the year. This Grand Lodge has a method they have used for a number of years, whereby we reach a point that we have a deficit budget, then we go ahead and try to raise the per capita. It takes two years to get that job done and it just is very inconvenient to properly finance the Grand Lodge. My recommendation is that we amend and add a new rule, whereby the Finance Committee shall prepare and distribute to the delegates to Grand Lodge on the

morning of the first day of Grand Lodge, a proposed budget for the ensuing year, together with the established per capita tax to support the budget, the per capita tax to be rounded off at the next highest 25¢.

This procedure is being used very successfully in many Grand Lodges. We merely determine our budget and then finance that budget through our per capita tax.

The other recommendation is to amend Sec. 44, rule 2, having to do with preparing to go into executive session for balloting, which we will do this afternoon. Many times we have several candidates running for office and the tellers have to count those ballots and we sit here and wait for them, when we could be doing some other business, receiving some other reports.

My recommendation is that we add a line to rule 2, Sec. 44, that reads, "however, at the discretion of the Grand Master, committee reports of a non-debatable nature, may be read and received while ballots are being counted."

Conclusion

In addition to all the special programs and activities, the usual table Lodges, Special Ladies Nights, Masonic Plays, Awards Nights, Brotherhood Nights, St. John's Sundays and others have kept our Lodges busy. Your Grand Master has attended many of these activities or was represented by a Grand Lodge Officer. It has been a busy year.

As this Grand Lodge year draws to a close and my term as Grand Master nears its end, I can only rejoice with a happy reflection of the most rewarding experience that one could ever have. We accomplished many things and had fun doing it.

I am most appreciative of the assistance and support I have had from all the elective and appointive Grand Lodge Officers. They have been a superb staff to work with.

To my District Deputies, District Representatives and Grand Lecturers, you have been the field men. You were the liasons between the Grand Master and the Lodges. Without your complete cooperation and support, Grand Masters' programs do not work. You have all done a commendable job and I am most thankful to each of you.

To our Grand Secretary Ed and Grand Treasurer Bruce, it has been a privilege and honor to have worked with you these past two years. You both are most efficient in your important positions and you made my job a lot easier. Your counsel and advice have been most appreciated.

To Elizabeth Tupper and Lois McLellan, I can never thank you both enough. Your pleasant attitudes and willingness to help me whenever I asked, have not gone unnoticed and I am grateful for your assistance.

After twenty years of loyal and faithful service to the Grand Lodge Office and ten Grand Masters, Elizabeth Tupper is looking forward to retirement later this year. She will be missed, not only for the fulfillment of her office responsibilities but also for her friendliness and kindness. We wish her and Charlie many years of good health and happiness in retirement.

A list of dispensations granted or denied and bylaw changes approved during the year follow this report.

I have one decision that I should read. A Brother, guilty of sexual misconduct, is considered not to be in good standing as a Master Mason and is therefore not entitled to the rights and privileges of a Master Mason.

Details: A Brother pleaded guilty (through plea bargaining) to two lesser counts of sexual misconduct with a minor. While awaiting sentencing, he was shot to death. His family requested a Masonic Memorial Service, which was denied by me on the grounds that being guilty of two or more counts of sexual misconduct with a minor, he should not be considered in good standing as a Master Mason and not entitled to any of the rights and privileges of a Master Mason.

Finally, my Brethren, it has been a great honor and privilege to serve the Grand Lodge of Maine as your Grand Master during the past two years. I hope and pray that through my efforts and your assistance, Freemasonry is in better condition from my stewardship as Grand Master. It has been an experience that comes only to a few and the memory of which I will always cherish.

I sincerely appreciate the opportunity that was mine, to have been the Most Worshipful Grand Master of Masons of Maine.

The reading of the Annual Address was followed by applause, the Communication standing.

At the conclusion of the reading of the Address, the Deputy Grand Master entertained a motion that the Address of the Grand Master be referred to the Committee on Doings of Grand Officers and it was so voted. It was also voted that the reports of the Deputy Grand Master, Grand Wardens and Grand Lecturer be referred to the same committee without reading.

To the Most Worshipful Grand Master, Officers, and Brethren of The Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine:

With spring having finally arrived with its promise of flowers and growing things — our Grand Lodge session fast approaching; the time has come for us to give account of our Masonic labors with the Ritualistic Instruction we are charged to provide the constituent lodge within this Grand Jurisdiction.

It is with mixed emotion that I submit my eighth and final report as Grand Lecturer. Having served two years as District Deputy Grand Master, four years as Assistant Grand Lecturer, and having the high privilege of being elected Senior Grand Warden of the Grand Lodge has provided an opportunity to work closely with my brethren. During these fifteen (15) years I have had the pleasure and honor to work for and with the most hard working and dedicated Masons one could hope to find anywhere. Men whom I am proud to call friend and brother, brethren who have given so much to our beloved Craft. The office of Grand Lecturer is not one which should be assumed for a short period as continuity of effort is essential. The time, however, has arrived for me to step aside and let others come forth.

I have endeavored to do my best, and trust that my stewardship will not be found wanting. This has truly been a great experience and opportunity for which I am sincerely thankful. The past years in Freemasonry for me have really been a "Way of Life".

"We are entrusted to preserve the accuracy of the Ritual, to communicate its meaning, and to deliver it effectively. It is the foundation upon which we teach the principles, philosophy, and symbolism of Ancient Craft Masonry. If we teach our new Master Masons that being a Mason in the fullest and complete sense is to exemplify in one's dealings with all mankind those virtues of Charity, of kindness, of tolerance which the ritual so forcefully inculcates by precept and by symbol, then we are in the proud position of being Master Masons."

Under the direction of the M.W. Grand Master, three ritualistic Schools of Instruction, one in each of the three degrees, has been conducted in each of the twenty-four (24) Districts in this Grand Jurisdiction by the Grand Lecturer and the six (6) Assistant Grand Lecturers.

Total attendance this past year is down slightly from previous years, however, we had 170 fewer officers in attendance at the Schools. In reviewing the Summary Sheets of Attendance at Schools it is not uncommon to observe districts with seven or eight Lodges represented by only a few Master and Wardens. A year ago, in this Grand Lodge, our Grand Secretary in his Annual Report indicated a "Danger Signal" in reporting that over 500 Past Masters were presently Lodge officers. Although we are thankful for the continued support these brethren bring to their lodges, we cannot expect for the health of the Craft, to continually recycle these brethren. Past Masters do not always feel they need to attend the Schools as they "know" the work. However, most of us do forget, and when these officers particularly if Masters and Wardens, are consistently absent from Lodges of Instruction the expectation from among Junior Officers is lost. This is not the best situation with which to encourage Junior Officers and conscientious brethren to become effective and dedicated officers of the Lodge. This continues to be a concern we must address for the health of our Craft.

Last year it was reported that nine (9) lodges were not represented at a single Ritualistic Lodge of Instruction. I am sorry to report that two of those appear again this year: Quantabacook #129 - Searsmont, and Vassalboro #54 - North Vassalboro.

I recommend to the District Deputies of the above mentioned Districts that they contact those lodges to determine how we may help.

Officer attendance ranges from 16% in District 7 to 44% in Districts 1 and 6. We commend the officers of Districts 1, 6, 14, and 2 for their excellent attendance record this year. Their dedication to their lodges this year and Freemasonry is evident. The success of the Schools depends on the work, interest, and effort of many brethren. Our thanks especially to the District Deputies for sending the cards notifying the officers, and for promoting the Schools.

District Educational Meetings

The District Educational Meetings provide an opportunity to deal with non-ritualistic Masonic topics which are of interest to all the brethren and this has remained our objective.

One topic in particular on this year's agenda, "A Response to Antimasonic Criticism", generated lively discussions, and from the reports was of general interest and seems to have been well-received by the brethren. Each Assistant Grand Lecturer and District Representative had latitude to select topics to present and were assisted by other brethren from the Districts. The agenda included items from the following topics:

- A. A Response to Antimasonic Criticism
- B. Duties and Responsibilities of the Lodge Officer
- C. Masonic Protocol
- D. A Masonic "Short Talk"

With a few of the Attendance Summary Sheets yet to be received, an estimate of the total attendance at these Educational Meetings will, in all probability, be more than 900 brethren. Special thanks are due the District Representatives, the Deputies, and the many brethren who participated in the program. It appears the program was enthusiastically received.

Degree Teams

Activity with Degree Teams continues as many Lodges invite various Teams to their Lodges to exemplify the Master Mason Degree at special occasions. I have authorized the Teams to exemplify the Master Mason Degree in accordance with the policy established by Grand Lodge in 1960, and the Teams' permissions are valid until May, 1988. The Teams do much to promote visitation, and bring out the brethren for these special occasions. My term as Grand Lecturer is nearly completed; it has been a wonderful experience which I have thoroughly enjoyed. It has been a lot of work and many miles; I have zealously attempted to fulfill the duties of my office. Whether or not I have been successful, only you can judge. I do, however, want to most sincerely thank you for the opportunity. I have always tried to be a good ambassador for Freemasonry.

Finally, Most Worshipful Grand Master, my friend and Brother, it has been a pleasure to have served as one of your officers, and a privilege to serve this Grand Lodge. To you, and M.W. Harlan Small, P.G.M., who originally appointed me as Grand Lecturer, my most sincere "Thank you" for the faith and trust you placed with me.

M.W. Curtis: Brethren, last night, if you attended the Grand Lodge Banquet, you were treated to an excellent presentation by M.W. Richard E. Fletcher, the Executive Secretary of the Masonic Service Association. At this time I call upon M.W. Brother Fletcher for a few words.

SPEECH BY M.W. RICHARD E. FLETCHER

Thank you very much, Grand Master. Actually as I pull out some notes here, it means nothing, the Past Grand Glasses are back in my room, so . . . Why do I always get the most applause on that statement?

You know, my Brothers, coming from Vermont, forty miles from the Canadian border and moving down to the Washington, D.C. area is, as you might perhaps guess, a change in lifestyle.

Perhaps one of the most interesting things that happened - and my friends from Virginia and the District, I hope, will forgive me for telling a joke on Washington, but you know where I come from in Vermont, snow is considered white gold. Down in Washington snow is also thought of as a four-letter word, but a little different.

It was a great honor last night to have the opportunity to address the assembled Masons. I spoke to you as one Mason to another. Today I'd like to take a moment and talk to you about the Masonic Service Association, which I now serve as Executive Secretary-Treasurer.

We have three parts to our organization — three main parts — and the first one I'd like to talk to you a moment about is the Publications and Education section. I'm most appreciative of your Grand Master's support of Masonic education because I happen to agree it's one of the most important things as Masons that we do — train Masons to know what Masonry is all about.

We publish monthly perhaps our best-known publication, the Short Talk Bulletin and I hope all of you have had an opportunity this month to see the one written by Judge Sentelle, who had such an ordeal being confirmed as a circuit court judge. The Short Talk is called "On Senate Confirmation of Men and Masons" and it talks about what he had to go through for no other reason than that he was a Mason.

We also encourage Masonic writers to submit to us articles for consideration in our Short Talks. We had one recently by a Past Master of a lodge in Virginia. We have another one coming up by a Past Master of a lodge in Missouri, so we're always looking for new material and we would encourage you to send to us material either for Short Talk or Digest, something of lasting Masonic interest. We're not looking for news articles, particularly, we're looking for something that is of interest to Masons from an educational, informational point of view.

Another section of our Masonic Service Association is our disaster relief and right now we have an appeal out on behalf of the Grand Lodge of Chile. Now some interesting things are happening in Chile. We worked our way through this appeal and we had an opportunity to talk with members of the Grand Lodge and especially a man who was in the D.C. area.

It is interesting to know that before the present regime came in, there was a president of the country named Salvatore Allende, who was overthrown and killed in that overthrow. Interestingly, Allende was a Mason, a very active Mason. Many active men in the government in Chile are Masons and because of the oppression of the new regime, Freemasonry, Masonic Lodge Halls, are one of the few places where government officials and their opponents have an opportunity to come together on the level and attend a Lodge meeting — not to discuss politics but a place where they can be together.

The dollars we are sending down there are helping for disaster relief for the terrible flood they had. They are also doing some other good things there, too.

The third aspect of our programs at M.S.A. that I'd like to talk about this morning — Hospital Visitation Program. My Brothers, I don't know how many of you have ever visited a Veteran's Administration Hospital. Last night in my remarks, I talked about the Kohima Battle area in Burma in World War II and the bitter fighting that occurred there. Many men died there. There's nothing we can do for those brave men who died except honor their memory.

But there are a lot of other veterans too and if you think back in time with me to World War II and today, and the intervening number of years, you will understand that we're coming to one of the largest influxes of patient care within the next few years that we have ever had. World War II veterans, Korean veterans are reaching an age where they are going to need more and more treatment.

The V.A. announced the other day that they were no longer considering alcoholism as a sickness, but rather, something that was self-induced. I don't want to get into the ramifications what that means in patient care, but I do want to stress to you the fact that it's not recognized as a sickness isn't going to make it go away.

We have a hospital visitor in Vermont — Scotty Maclay. Scotty's son is representing Vermont here today, he's our Grand Junior Warden. Scotty has taken me through the V.A. Hospital in White River on several occasions. He doesn't show much mercy when he does that. We don't go to happy places — we go to the hospital. One of the places he took me was the drunk tank. Yeah, that's what it is, and we talked with one

of the patients in there and afterward Scotty said to me, "You know this man lives in the middle of seven acres of land in a beautiful house. His wife died a few years ago. He's lonely. All he does now is watch T.V. and drink. Most days he doesn't watch much T.V."

Well, if you ever go in the hospitals, to any part of them, the hospital visitors are here; and if any of you are here, my Brothers, I wish you'd stand up because you're doing God's work in those hospitals. Because you know when it comes right down to it, whether they're in the cancer ward, the drunk tank, in the nursing home section, you know the one thing that every one of those patients has in common — they only want one thing — they want someone to care. Care enough to come in, say 'hi', do whatever you can to make their life a little more pleasant. We don't give medical care, we give care from the heart.

I can sum it up in no better words, my Brothers, than in our Scottish Rite degree, when we use Tennyson's words to talk about the test of Knighthood:

"To ride abroad, redressing human wrong;
To speak no slander, no, nor listen to it;
But teach high thoughts and amiable words,
And courtliness and the desire of fame.
And love and truth and all that makes a man."

Thank you, my Brothers.

Grand Master Curtis then presented M.W. Brother Fletcher with the Josiah Hayden Drummond Distinguished Service Award.

Richard Elliot Fletcher was born in Malden, Massachusetts, on October 12, 1934.

He is a graduate of Cambridge High School in Jeffersonville, Vermont and also studied with the American Institute of Banking.

Serving in the U.S. Navy from 1953-55, he attained the rank of Petty Officer, Third Class.

On July 2, 1960 he married Judith Elsa Irish and they have five children, who have been active in DeMolay and Rainbow.

He was employed 31 years by the Chittenden Bank, starting as messenger and ending as Senior Vice President in Treasury/Property Management.

GRAND SECRETARY

The Grand Secretary presented his report which was accepted and referred to the Committee on Doings of Grand Officers.

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine:

It is again my pleasure to submit the report of the Grand Secretary for the fiscal year 1987-1988.

Our Grand Lodge Finance Committee, pending today's approval of the Budget, has authorized the Grand Secretary to explore, justify and recommend a course of action to purchase a computer and its ancillary equipment, including a word processor. One that will encompass the administrative and financial functions of this Grand Lodge.

It is agreed that it is not to be based on need nor mere automation of existing operations. However, it will permit the Grand Lodge to expand its operations as well as to relieve the subordinate lodges of some of their responsibilities.

While this assignment seems minimal, it requires a detailed study, in order to establish a comprehensive Data Base, one that will manage and maintain a program of membership information of 35,000 Masons.

Additional actions will include the *entry* of the above-noted information, production and distribution of Annual Report drafts for each lodge. A reduction of the work load on Lodge Secretaries is conceivable.

Other positive functions include direct mailing lists, maintained for individual Lodges, and other activities of the Grand Lodge.

As to "hardware", we are currently reviewing an IBM Personal System /2 Model 60 with 44MB capacity. Our appreciation goes to the Grand Secretaries of Penn., D.C., Md. Arizona, Oregon and Iowa for their beneficial wordage, instructions and cooperation.

Lodge Computers: R.W. Carroll B. Knox, Sec. of Caribou Lodge #170, has prepared for this office a detailed "Users' Guide and Manual" that we earnestly encourage every non-computerized Lodge to review.

It is an outstanding document and one that brings the acquisition of a computer within each Lodge's budgetary means.

Monthly Reporting: Never have we been made aware of the inaccuracies in our card files as we were upon receipt of our 4-year membership sheets from the Lodges. Approximately 6500 changes were made to our mailing list. (All Grand Lodges

require monthly reports.) Two years ago, 12 lodges volunteered to try this method and it met with favorable comments. Each Lodge secretary is asked to fill out a Grand Lodge prepared form that requires that no later than 10 days after each stated meeting, all information on any **personnel** actions such as degrees, obituaries, address changes, etc., must be forwarded to the Grand Lodge office. If no action, the form must be sent anyway. Followup will be monitored by the D.D.G.M.s. This procedure enables the Grand Lodge to provide a record copy for the Lodges Annual Report. This could reduce the end of the year delinquencies and fines.

Secretary's Seminar & Manual: Seminars were held in all 24 Districts. Although the attendance was minimal, those who participated were able to scan the "proposed manual" and in most cases, took them home for further review and comments.

All manuals were returned with significant recommendations for revisions, deletions, additions, etc. The manual includes "Data Pages" that list items that require dispensations, by-law changes, etc. Every form used by the Secretary has been filled in and is accompanied by an instruction page of "how, who, what and when" to prepare it. Notes from the S.E. Corner Newsletter will be integrated into this 30-page document.

We owe the veteran secretaries a sincere and respectful vote of thanks. Constructive "feedback" is vital for any document and more so when it is geared to the "needs of the users."

Code Books, Monitors, Constitution and Standing Regulations: During our library activity, we purposely accumulated all available copies of the subject regulations. That in itself is a sad commentary. We are now acting on a program to acquire current code books from all Grand Lodges.

In this high-tech world of Information Retrieval, Freemasonry is sure delinquent. Specifically our standardization and interchange of data. It should be in our interest, as well as others, to "Standardize" our Code Book numbering system. Numbers are cheap, but they should be meaningful. The benefits and timely results of the system could be extensive. Think of it. A problem concerning jurisprudence, insurance, waivers, etc., could be researched in a few moments by merely using a standard number, #300 Series, etc. As to our Constitution and Standing Regulations, this system could conceivably reduce, if not eliminate, much of our confusion among the brethren users. It leaves much to be desired.

Masonic Inserts: This program has reached the "bulk" mailing state, thus a minimal cost. Lodges are sending their names of shut-ins and those in nursing homes (240) to this date. Sure hope someone is visiting them? Here again, the Team Concept is the answer.

In conclusion and by no means less important, I would be remiss if I did not acknowledge the self-sacrifice of time, effort and frustration of Lib Tupper. Her performance in carrying out the myriad of tasks required by our Annual Communication was far beyond the line of duty. She is one in a million. With Lois and Bruce, the Grand Lodge has a trio beyond reproach.

Most Worshipful Sir, I move the acceptance of this report and that the paragraph concerning Care and Share be omitted from the proceedings.

FIRST DAY - AFTERNOON

1:30 p.m. M.W. Curtis: Brethren, I have a little extra treat for us here this afternoon. In organizing our program of the Prevention of Drug and Alcohol Abuse Among Children, we have been working with a State Organization, the Department of Education Substance Abuse Division, and a young lady who has met with us several times and told the committee about this program that we are considering. This afternoon I'd like to ask this lady to speak to you brethren so that you will have a better idea of what we'll be doing in the next few months.

It is with a great deal of pleasure that I introduce to you Madonna Flanders.

MADONNA FLANDERS' SPEECH

I can tell you that standing here, looking around this room, I really feel the fact that I'm a minority! When I got in here and sat down, I suddenly started trembling. I looked around and realized the power of the group in which I find myself.

I am very pleased for the opportunity to speak with you this afternoon and hope that when I'm finished, you will be inspired to continue in your efforts as they've been begun — to add your strength as an organization, to the drug abuse prevention in the State of Maine.

Very briefly, I represent the Division of Alcohol and Drug Education Services, which is part of the State Department of Education. As an organization, we provide leadership, direction, guidance and training support resources to the schools throughout the State, in the area of drug abuse prevention. It's an organization which has been in existence since 1970, has been operating its current program focus since 1979. Our goal in the work that we do, is to help schools and communities help themselves to deal with this problem of alcohol and other drug abuse — not to go in and try to solve the problems for them but to give the people in our schools and communities the skills, the tools and support that they need to deal with this issue at the local level, recognizing that every community in this state is very unique and has its own particular needs and strategies that will work best for the people who live there.

I'd like to give you a little bit of an overview of what's going on in the State of Maine as far as prevention is concerned. We have already, in the State of Maine, over 60% of our school systems that are actively involved in comprehensive effort to deal with the very complex issue of drug abuse, through their work and involvement with our Division. It includes development of school community teams, and some of you may be familiar with these from your own particular local area. It includes training for those teams and then an action plan for a long-term process to implement a comprehensive program. This is not a problem affair with any quick fix to solve. It is a very complex issue that requires an on-going effort.

Maine has four schools that were recently recognized at a Blaine House reception, for excellence in their programs. They are school systems that have really made distinctive progress in attempting to address drug abuse. The schools that were honored were Cony High School in Augusta, Oxford Hills in South Paris, Skowhegan Junior High and Montello Elementary School in Lewiston. The Governor was present to give each of those schools an award recognizing their long-term efforts.

We have 389 schools in the State of Maine who are currently enrolled in the National Challenge campaign, which is a national effort going on right now through the U.S. Dept. of Education, to encourage schools and communities throughout the country to recognize and deal with drug abuse.

Maine leads the nation in the Challenge Campaign, a fact which is gaining us national recognition, which will occur within the next two weeks at a White House ceremony.

Project Graduation, which you may be familiar with, started in Maine in 1980, in South Paris. It's a program that aims to offer chemical-free opportunities to Seniors to celebrate their graduation from high school. It's a program that now involves 95% of our Maine High Schools and has involvement in every other state in the Country and at least two Canadian Provinces to some degree at this point in time. We have over 80% of our seniors participating in the activities that are sponsored through Project Graduation.

Last year our Legislature, as part of its activities, recognized the efforts that are going on in the State of Maine and the work of our Division, in a way that made us feel very proud, and affirmed for our work through a joint Resolution of Commendation, something which said that the Legislature also recognizes that Maine is taking on the issue of chemical dependency and drug abuse head-on. We do not have our heads in the sand, we're working on it.

Last Fall our division received a Federal grant, one of 36 awards in the country, awarded out of 281 applications, and the only one to come to Maine, which is allowing us, at this point in time, to be involved in some research that will give us some very good solid data that has heretofore not been available to us, for lack of funds. It will give us data on three different funds.

First, it's allowing us, with a team of researchers from Boston University, to study the efforts that are going on in our local schools and communities, through the team model. Four team sites have been identified as research sites that are under study by Boston University. The communities involved in that effort are Biddeford, Belfast, Camden and Millinocket.

Secondly, it's enabling us to do a statewide survey of school students in grades 5 through 12, to find out what really are the statistics in Maine for alcohol and drug abuse among our young people. I think sometimes, for some of us, there is a tendency to think that because we live in Maine, a rural state — and we feel very special about our state, that we can escape the problems that New York City or Los Angeles and Chicago face. What we know in our heart of hearts is that drug abuse is in Maine, too. This will give us some data that will substantiate the need to continue to have drug abuse prevention as a priority.

Third, it's enabled us to do a comprehensive survey of our school administrators, which will give us data about the status of prevention programs in our schools and the perceptions among administrators of the quality and effectiveness of those programs. That data will enable us, then, to make course corrections, fill in gaps as we need to, so that we can further enhance and strengthen the efforts that are currently underway in the State.

Finally, within the last two years, our division has established regional offices — one in Presque Isle and one in Machias, recognizing that geographically, the northern part of our state and the downeastern part of our state face special problems as they seek to have services to help them implement prevention efforts. They are just simply so many miles away from Augusta and Central Services that it makes it difficult for them to get the assistance they need. By placing consultants in those regions in permanent offices, it has opened those areas of the state to receive services and to feel like maybe it's okay to begin looking at the issue, to begin doing something about it because we've got somebody close by who can help when we need it.

Those are but a few of the things that are going on, perhaps highlights of what exists in the State of Maine. We are a leader in the Nation, in terms of drug abuse prevention. Every time anybody from our office goes out of state to a convention or some type of meeting, and talk about what's happening in Maine, we are told consistently by others in other states, that we are far ahead of what other states are currently doing to deal with drug abuse prevention. And that's a source of pride. It's also a source of affirmation, to know that as a state, we have identified, perhaps earlier than some of our larger counterparts in the United States, the need to really take on drug abuse and deal with it with continuity, with consistency, with quality.

And now we're really excited to talk a little bit about this new endeavor between the Masonic Fraternity and the State and our office, as part of the State Department of Education. Probably two months ago, at this point, as I sat in my office one day

involved in paper work on the research project I described, George Pulkkinen walked in and he said, "I'm looking for somebody who can help me. I represent the Masons and we have some money we want to give away."

"Oh wait, don't go away!" Actually I did think "Gee, you've got to go away but when can I meet with you besides today?" Because that simply just wasn't a good day for me. So we set up a meeting and I came to Portland and met with the Grand Master and the Grand Secretary and George and we began to talk about the fact that the fraternity, the Masons in Maine, had raised \$50,000 that they wanted to contribute — that you wanted to contribute — to drug abuse prevention and that you wanted some guidance in doing that.

Let me tell you some things that are first in the fact that that has occurred. First is that as a fraternal organization, this represents the first time we have seen statewide effort by such an organization to raise a significant amount of money that you wish to use toward local prevention efforts in this area.

Secondly, as a first, you are the first organization of your type to approach us, as a state agency, and say, "Will you help us to distribute the money that we've raised, so that it can be distributed in the best way possible?" And that was very gratifying for us to hear because there are so few resources available and so much that needs to be done, that we cannot afford to waste any of the precious dollars that exist. And so often what happens, as groups have a sum of money that they've identified that they want to use for a particular cause, in this case drug abuse prevention, they distribute it without necessarily seeking some guidance about what's the best way to distribute this money, and it can essentially be like tossing dollars to the wind on a brisk March day in Maine, and we can't afford that. So I, for one, on behalf of our organization want to very sincerely thank you for seeking guidance in how best to distribute the funds that you've raised.

Our first meeting began a process of discussing what kinds of protocol, strategies and criteria might best serve in terms of distributing the funds and we've come up with ideas that I'd like to share with you.

We've talked and decided, I think at this point, that there are two different ways that the funds you've raised might be distributed. One, in the way of direct scholarships, to help individuals who work in school systems to gain some additional training, to enhance their role as part of a drug abuse prevention program. We're very specifically talking about offering a series of scholarships, and according to my corrected math, it could potentially be as many as 15 scholarships, for school people around the state to attend summer school on alcohol studies, that would give them the skills that they can take back to their school systems and share with others in the area.

Secondly, we've talked about using some of the funds that you've raised for direct grants to school systems, toward their prevention efforts, and those grants to local schools might be used in two ways. They might be used to directly purchase or provide services for students — it might be curriculum materials, it might be speakers for students; or they might be used by the school systems at the local level for some type of staff education activity.

The process that we've talked about using to accomplish this is to jointly set the priorities, then to have whatever applications that need to be submitted by local school systems come to our office. We will use our expertise and our knowledge of the schools of the state to assess the quality and the merit of the applications for funds and make some decisions, set some priority order to the applications that have come in, and then provide those to your Grand Lodge. Then the distribution of funds will occur directly from your Grand Lodge to the individual school systems or the individuals from school systems in the State.

The choice of outcomes — what can happen from the \$50,000 that will go to the schools in the State. Locally, a mini-grant of a couple of hundred to a couple of thousand dollars can accomplish more than you could ever imagine, in terms of local prevention efforts.

We have, in the past when we had small pockets of money available to provide money grants to schools, found that it can be the boost that helps the program get out of the slump, that helps the program get off the ground, that gives them the affirmation that what they're doing is important and valued and noticed and recognized.

It has gone to things like the purchase of drug curriculum materials, it has gone to provide training activities for teachers, it has gone to offer alternative activities in different communities, it has gone to seed funds that have enabled schools to hire a drug abuse counselor, to hire an individual to coordinate a local prevention program. An amazing amount has been and can be accomplished with what seems like a fairly small amount of money to an individual school.

At the state level, the implications of this money to the outcomes are that it shows us, as a State Agency, a major commitment on the behalf of a control organization to the issue of drug abuse prevention. It tells us that not only do we believe at the state level that this is a priority and something that we need to struggle with, something to continue to work toward but that it is also a priority for a major fraternal organization in our state and that they are willing to put behind their voices some resources to contribute to the effort.

It also gives us the ability to help to insure that those funds are distributed to the areas of greatest need, to insure that they are distributed in ways that will contribute, in the greatest way, to what's happening at the local level, and not go towards something that might become productive or of no enhancement to local programs.

I'm excited. I've said I'm excited about the potential. It's coming out of what you have done — the fact that you have taken on the priority for your fraternal organization, drug abuse prevention. You can help, not only through the money you have raised and hopefully will continue to raise, but you can help also with the services you can offer in your local areas.

Giving the local school people, the community people who are in your areas who are working on these issues, your voice of support, your support in involvement with things like Project Graduation, community awareness activities, says at the local level where perhaps it's the most important, "We hear about our kids, we're concerned about drug abuse, we want to help."

I thank you for your willingness.

The Grand Master thanked Madonna for her presentation. He then called the Grand Lodge from refreshment to labor. Prayer was offered by Bro. Maurice Amnott, Grand Chaplain.

Brethren:

It is with deep sorrow that we are called upon to announce the death of one Past Grand Lodge officer of the Grand Lodge of the State of Maine since May 1, 1987.

Rt. W. and Dr. Laurence G. Higgins was born in Ellsworth, Maine in 1898, and died in Santa Cruz, California on May 8, 1987 at the age of 89.

Doctor Higgins was a dentist in Ellsworth from 1921 to 1961. He was past president of the Maine Dental Society and a member of the State Board of Dental Examiners.

Brother Higgins was raised to the sublime degree of a Master Mason in Lygonia Lodge No. 40 of Ellsworth in 1919 and was W.M. of his lodge three times.

He was a member of the Scottish Rite bodies and York Rite bodies of Maine, and past Patron of the O.E.S. Chapter of Ellsworth. He served the M.W. Grand Lodge of Maine as District Deputy Grand Master of the 21st District in 1958, 59, and as Jr. Grand Warden in 1962.

Graveside services were conducted at the Oakwood Memorial Park in Santa Cruz, May 11, 1987, with the Santa Cruz Lodge No. 38 officiating. We are grateful to the Santa Cruz Lodge for this brotherly act of remembrance.

A short memorial service was conducted by Rev. Fenderson, with Rev. Frame as soloist, accompanied by R.W. Sidney Lerman as organist.

BLOOD PROGRAM

R.W. Oscar M. Hartford presented the following report, which was accepted.

MAINE MASONIC BLOOD PROGRAM
1987

To the Most Worshipful Grand Master of the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine:

We extend our congratulations and thanks to all Masons and their friends who contributed BLOOD, TIME and MONEY to the Maine Masonic Blood Program. We had an excellent increase in the number of pints donated because more Lodges participated and all Districts became more active in the program.

Every Lodge has a Masonic Blood Program Chairman with a District Chairman in every District. This is a vital part of making this program work and keeping districts active in the program.

A new Masonic Blood Program Booklet has been printed and distributed to all Lodge and District Chairmen. Booklets have been given to the American Red Cross in Portland and Bangor to make it easier for both the Chairmen and the ARC to work together. The Booklet contains a wealth of information to assist Chairmen in answering questions and providing more BLOOD to the ARC and those hospitals that are still drawing blood. All district chairmen and the ARC have a Master booklet containing all Lodge and District Chairmen in the State of Maine; whereas each Lodge chairman only has the District and Lodge Chairmen in his District.

We recommend and hope that "Blood Drives" will be held on a district level with all Lodges in the District participating in the blood drive. If each District will hold two drives a year we can accomplish the goal of donating 3500 pints a year. The ARC will help you organize your "Blood Drive".

We further recommend that every Lodge have the Lodge Donor Code Number printed on your next dues card. Your Lodge number is listed in the rear of the booklet. We further charge each Lodge Chairman to advise their Lodge secretary to have this done.

We further recommend that each Lodge send at least one mailing a year to all their members explaining the need for this program and appeal for their help to donate blood and help with a "Blood Drive".

Under this program all Masons can have their friends donate blood and use the Lodge Donor Code Number. The ARC will credit your Lodge for every pint of blood that is given under your number by a Mason or a friend. This makes it a lot easier for all Lodges to become active and support a worthwhile program.

We **MUST** support this program to be assured that an ample supply of BLOOD will be available for all Brethren, their families and friends. Blood is the most charitable gift one can give, because without it, life does not exist.

We know for a fact many Masons have contributed blood through their place of employment without using the Lodge Donor Code number. Consequently, the Lodge did not receive a credit for his gift. Let your Brethren know that this number can be used so that your Lodge will be credited with the blood donated.

Even though we can be proud of this past year's accomplishments we must endeavor to improve our program. We must find ways and means to provide more blood to the medical profession.

INSURANCE

R.W. Oscar M. Hartford, for the Committee on Insurance, presented the following report, which was accepted.

COMMITTEE ON INSURANCE

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine:

The Grand Lodge Insurance Committee, this year, was able to reduce the cost of the Grand Lodge Insurance over \$3,300. on the Liability and Bond Coverage. It is also possible we may benefit in a further savings of \$2,000. on the Workers Compensation coverage. As of this date, we are waiting for the outcome of an inspection that we have requested to change our classification.

We are again in 1988 extending our services to all Lodges who would like to have us review their insurance coverage as to need, cost, and coverage. After we make the insurance survey we will advise you what coverage to carry and what it should cost on the present market to purchase the coverage.

Over 90% of the Lodges we have assisted have either reduced their cost, or been able to purchase more coverage without increasing their present cost. Some of the Lodges have increased their coverage and also reduced their present cost. Each Lodge is notified in writing of our recommendations and cost of insurance. This gives them the opportunity to confer with their agent and negotiate for a better insurance policy.

Again this year we believe it is most important to remind all Lodges that the Grand Lodge of Maine carries a Comprehensive General Liability Policy with limits of One Million Dollars (\$1,000,000.). The policy covers the Grand Lodge and all constituted Lodges chartered by the Grand Lodge, while holding rehearsals, Masonic meetings, Masonic suppers, and includes activities pertaining to Masonic education. It does not cover DeMolay, Rainbow, Eastern Star, etc. More important, it does not cover the owners of Masonic buildings that are owned by a Charity Group or Trustees even though they are Masons and belong to the Lodge. Therefore, it is necessary and essential that the owners of the property be adequately covered — and this, too — is part of our service to the Lodges.

All Lodges should have the survey completed. We have completed 129 surveys for Lodges. We have been able to reduce the cost on the coverage they were carrying by \$42,178. Most of these Lodges elected to use the savings to buy more protection and better coverage. All Lodges are morally obligated to protect and preserve their Lodge property for the future of all Masons.

THE SURVEY IS FREE!

We have helped 129 Lodges and Grand Lodge to save money. We believe the other 71 Lodges should seriously consider looking into a cost savings on their coverage.

This year's numerical loss of 752 is higher than last year, the percentage being 2.12. At the close of the calendar year, the total membership was 34,642. Twenty-seven lodges reported a gain in membership, 154 a loss and 17 remained the same. Hiram Lodge No. 180 remains the largest, with a membership of 747. Naskoag No. 171 remains the smallest with 43 members. United No. 8 reported the largest gain (9) while Triangle No. 1 suffered the greatest loss (37). Average membership is 173 and 53 lodges report fewer than 100 members.

JURISPRUDENCE

M.W. M. Donald Gardner, for the Committee on Jurisprudence, presented the following report, which was accepted.

In Grand Lodge
Portland, Maine
May 3, 1988

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine:

The Committee on Masonic Jurisprudence has reviewed the several dispensations granted by the Grand Master and determines that all except one are within his discretionary power and recommends their approval.

The one dispensation granted with which we disagree concerns the granting of a waiver of Jurisdiction over an Entered Apprentice Mason in favor of a particular lodge in a Grand Jurisdiction with which this Grand Lodge is in fraternal relations and in which the candidate now resides.

Such a waiver neither confers authority nor transfers jurisdiction. See 1927 Proceedings 435.

A candidate once having been elected and entered as an Entered apprentice remains the property of the lodge. The lodge should have properly requested that the subsequent degrees be conferred by the lodge in the other Grand Jurisdiction. See Constitution, Section 133, Subsections 2 and 3.

Therefore, we recommend that this dispensation not be approved.

We recommend approval of the one decision referred to this Committee. Charges of unmasonic conduct had been prepared, but no hearing had been held. Since the Mason was under charges of unmasonic conduct, he was not then a member in good standing and denial of a Masonic burial was appropriate.

MASONIC EDUCATION AND LODGE SERVICE

R.W. N. James Coolong, for the Committee on Masonic Education and Lodge Service, presented the following report which was accepted.

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine:

The past year the activity and continued effort of the Committee on Masonic Education and Lodge Service has been toward realizing a more effective implementation of the program of candidate and new Master Mason instruction. Just how best

to achieve this is a challenging problem. While progress and strength is made in one area, we seem to fail or digress in another. The instruction we provide to our candidates and new Master Masons is vitally important if we are to make active and knowledgeable Masons in our lodges. Patience and perseverance will prevail over our efforts as we push forward toward realizing our goal and our mission.

District Representatives

The office of District Representative is an integral and important component to the Grand Lodge team on Masonic Education and Lodge Service. The District Representatives perform a great service to the lodges and have been a valuable assistance to the District Deputies and this Committee. To each of them we offer our most sincere thanks for their dedication to the Craft and service to their Districts.

Last year at the Grand Officers School it was not possible for ten (10) of the District Representatives to be present. This is not the most optimal situation. Although I am aware of the value of having the District Representatives present at this particular School, there is usually not sufficient time to provide instruction and training for this important assignment. I am, therefore, recommending that a separate school for the District Representatives be held: one for the central to the northern portion of the state, and one for the coastal and southern portions of the state, in order to minimize traveling distances, which I am sure is a factor.

These two schools should insure the presence of all District Representatives; only then may we provide the necessary training to this important office so that these brethren may go forth prepared to serve the Craft.

The office of District Representative is not to be regarded as a preliminary step to an appointment to the office of District Deputy, as this is not necessarily the case. Rather, it is a unique opportunity to work in the field of Masonic Education and provide service to the Craft, and to the Lodges.

The success of our program depends so much on the continuity of effort, which all the District Representatives bring to the constituent Lodges.

Northeast Conference on Masonic Education and Libraries

The Thirty-Second Annual Northeast Conference on Masonic Education and Libraries was held at Rutland, Vermont, July 16, 17, and 18, 1987. There were twelve (12) Grand Jurisdictions in attendance. Maine was represented by Brothers John E. Gray, Walter M. Macdougall, Reginald W. Wing, M.W. Peter C. Schmidt, and myself.

Brother Stewart W. Miner, Past Grand Master of Virginia and Grand Secretary of the District of Columbia, gave an inspiring keynote address on the topic of Masonic Education — its progress and reasons for its lack of effectiveness. This excellent paper gave much for us to think seriously about. Other topics presented during the Conference were: "Publicity and Public Relations", "National Masonic Foundation for the elimination of Drug and Alcohol Abuse Among our Youth", "Masonic Charity", "Revitalizing Freemasonry", and "International Talks With Rome", a report on talks between Roman Catholicism and Freemasonry. This presented by Bro. Kenneth W. Aldridge, Past Grand Master and present Grand Secretary of the Grand Lodge of Quebec. Brother Aldridge is an exceptional speaker and his presentation was both most informative and interesting.

Advanced Masonic Education

Our program of Advanced Masonic Education which is directed to District or area seminars can do much to stimulate interest in a number of Masonic subjects such as Masonic History, Philosophy, Symbolism, to name a few. We encourage them and hope to expand this activity to more Districts. Participation has not been as good as last year, and there may be several reasons why: travel distances in geographically separate Districts, and the lack of a continuing, ongoing curriculum, to name a couple.

We are exploring the possibility of a reading correspondence course which could do much toward alleviating existing problems. We need, however, to determine the level of interest for such a program. This program would enhance use of the Grand Lodge Library and its many resources which we should encourage.

Lodges in Action and Care and Share Programs

Lodges would be well-advised to fully utilize these excellent programs. Reports from the District Representatives indicate an increase in the number of Lodges with active Widow's Programs, with visitations to brethren in hospitals, rest homes and those that are confined to their homes. This is Freemasonry in Action, brethren, and it is heartwarming to note increased activity in this area.

District Educational Meetings

The District Educational Meetings, or The Fourth School as they were originally called, are non-ritualistic schools — essentially a Masonic Education School. These meetings treat topics of general Masonic interest directed to all the brethren, provide an opportunity for the District Representatives to take an active part, and most of them did. This year the agenda of topics at the District Education Meetings was as follows: Topic 1 - A response to Antimasonic Criticism; Topic 2 - Duties and Responsibilities of Lodge Officers; Topic 3 - Masonic Protocol; Topic 4 - A Masonic "Short Talk." Topic 1, in particular, generated lively discussion, and the program seems to have been enthusiastically received.

DeMolay and Rainbow

DeMolay is growing steadily in Maine, with the forming of new Chapters. We encourage the support lodges make by visitations to DeMolay Chapters and Rainbow Assemblies. Your presence is appreciated by these young people. Reports from the District Representatives indicate that a number of Lodges have invited DeMolay Chapters to their Lodges to present programs and that these have been well-received. DeMolay and Rainbow are always in need of advisors and we encourage you to make your interest known to them. We as Masons do make a difference in the lives of these men and women.

A detailed report of the activities and growth of Maine DeMolay will be given in the report of Bro. Clyde L. Ferris, Executive Officer of DeMolay in Maine.

Raymond M. Rideout Award

The Raymond M. Rideout Award is presented annually at Grand Lodge to the Lodge that in the opinion of the Committee on Masonic Education and Lodge Service has developed the best program of Masonic Education during the year.

This year seven (7) lodges have been recommended by District Representatives and/or the District Deputy for outstanding programs in Masonic Education and Service to the Craft. The following Lodges deserve this special recognition:

I thank you for the trust, confidence, and support you always supply, and for the opportunity to work within this great Craft of Masonry.

Happenstance brought a Brother to the Grand Lodge Office. As usual, our conversation ultimately turned to "Information", its management, storage, accountability and dissemination. That meeting initiated a proposed course of action that was to end several years of frustration. For the first time ever we will have identified and located information on every subject existing in our library.

The usage and potential for assistance is unlimited. The knowledge contained within volumes, periodicals and Proceedings of every Grand Lodge is a treasure house of information for researchers, scholars and the uninformed.

It seems almost criminal that the information hidden in our paperwork has inadvertently lain dormant for much too long.

Brethren, we are now soliciting any and all books, periodicals, etc. All contributions will be acknowledged, recorded and suitably inscribed. Let all of us provide our best effort to obtain acceptance and recognition as the official State of Maine Masonic Library; one that is opened to the public and a credit to the Fraternity.

They said it couldn't be done. Initiative, tenacity and vision belies that statement. Let us now complete the cycle.

The title in our report is *Library and Museum*. We are now searching for a knowledgeable individual that will assist us to identify, catalog and properly display our numerous medals, artifacts, aprons, etc., in their proper sequence/setting.

Our goal to establish a professional Masonic Museum will then be attained. This office will provide the leadership and initiative and together we *can* provide a meaningful Museum.

GREENLEAF MEDAL

Grand Master Curtis called Brother Donald A. Wilder to the East where he decorated him with a Simon Greenleaf Medal for outstanding service to the Grand Lodge Library. Brother Wilder responded with appropriate remarks.

DONALD A. WILDER

Brother Donald A. Wilder was raised to the sublime degree of a Master Mason on November 23, 1973 in Corner Stone Lodge #216, Portland. From 1977 to 1980, he served the Lodge in several offices and is presently their Historian.

An enthusiastic Postal Stamp Collector, he has attracted considerable attention in his unique Masonic-related treasury.

For the past 2½ years, interspersed with 4 or 5 back operations, inherent pain, braces and a cane, he has left Peaks Island on the ferry two days a week, given 2-3 hours and longer laboring for Grand Lodge, and returned by ferry.

Brother Wilder was given a standard Masonic Library numbering system and proceeded to remove all existing books, accumulate additional book cases, assign numbers as well as shelf numbers, to each unit. He has purged all duplicate volumes, replaced books in accordance with our new numbering system, attached labels on each and prepared a master alphabetized index. In addition, an active "clipping service" has been established and implemented, whereby over a thousand items have been indexed. He has commenced photocopying the table of contents of every book, whereby a resultant comprehensive alphabetized index will be readily available.

In short, he has made the Library a vital and viable part of our Grand Lodge Program, one that will increase our dissemination of information to our brethren as well as to the public.

For his untiring and enthusiastic efforts in the above-noted accomplishments, we are pleased, without reserve, to award him the Simon Greenleaf Medal.

ARTHUR MORGAN GRIFFITHS

Arthur M. Griffiths was born December 21, 1928 in Waterville, Maine. A graduate of Bates College in 1950, he has been Principal of Limington Academy; Radio announcer at WTUL-WLAM; Director of News Bureau, Bates College 1955-1973; and has been associated with Twin City Printery from 1973 to the present.

He has been President of Arnold Expedition Historical Society, Monmouth Historical Society, Monmouth Museum and Cochnewagen Agricultural Assoc.

He and his wife, Lois, were married July 18, 1948 and have four children, two boys and two girls, and two grandchildren. All four children are graduates of Bates College. Arthur and his wife reside in Monmouth.

Brother Griffiths was raised in Adoniram Lodge No. 27 on May 13, 1952. In 1961 he affiliated with Rabboni Lodge No. 150, Lewiston, serving as Wor. Master in 1964 and 1966. He is a member of the Androscoggin County Square and Compass Club, the Maine Lodge of Research and the Maine College Societas Rosicruciana.

Brother Arthur has contributed much to Freemasonry in Maine and to the Grand Lodge for many years. He served for several years, beginning in 1964, on the Public Relations Committee and again in 1986-1987. He has served faithfully as the Associate Editor of the Maine Mason since 1977, having worked on it since its inception in 1973. Being associated with Twin City Printery, which prints the Maine Mason, he has been responsible for the actual arranging and final assembly of each publication. The success of this most popular and finest of publications must, in a great measure, be attributed to the input and great care of Wor. Brother Arthur M. Griffiths.

On behalf of all the Masons of Maine, it is my honor and privilege to present to Wor. Brother Arthur M. Griffiths, this Simon Greenleaf Medal in recognition of your outstanding service to the Craft.

DISTRIBUTION OF THE CHARITY FUND

R.W. Stanley F. Sampson, for the Committee on Distribution of the Charity Fund, presented the following report, which was accepted.

In Grand Lodge
Portland, Maine
May 4, 1988

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine:

For the fiscal year ended March 31, 1988, your committee received 61 applications for relief from a total of 49 lodges compared to 65 applications for the preceding year. Eleven lodges applied for assistance more than once during the year.

I detect a common thread developing in these requests as the same lodges, for the most part, appear again this year. This perhaps is not all bad, but it reveals the fact that 151 lodges have not requested relief this past year. It might indicate that some lodges are located in more affluent areas and/or have sufficient funds to grant relief without our aid, or that in some cases the brethren are missing opportunities to help, aid and assist their brethren and their families.

The total amount of relief granted in the year 1987-88 was \$140,010.00 not including the sum of \$486.00 paid to 9 lodges for veteran's dues. This compares with the sum of \$150,250.00 granted in 1986-87. One request was denied and two were tabled due to a lack of an application or insufficient information.

The 61 requests approved for 1987-88 averaged \$2,295.00 compared to \$2,422.00 the previous year.

The committee acknowledges the contribution of \$14,650.00 from the Grand Chapter to the Grand Lodge Charitable Foundation for Chapter members whom we assisted. We also note the following amounts contributed by the various Scottish Rite Valleys.

Again this year our gifts to Masonic-related organizations include \$3,000.00 to the Pine Tree DeMolay and Youth Foundation, \$3,000.00 to Merrill Rainbow Girls Camp, \$6,000.00 to Masonic Service Association, \$1,200.00 to Togus Hospital Visitation Program and \$1,500.00 to Maine Blood Bank Program.

Your Committee on Distribution will, if the opportunity arises, gladly take advantage of the amendment to Section 62 which makes it possible now to consider granting assistance for other charitable, educational or medical purposes as the Trustees may deem appropriate.

I would again acknowledge the assistance of M.W. Ernest H. Curtis and R.W. Edwin V. George in helping to make the best use of our resources in contributing to the relief of our distressed brethren and their families. Many thanks also to M.W. Charles E. Crossland who has always been ready to guide us in our decisions.

CONDITION OF THE FRATERNITY

R.W. Lewis E. Newell, for the Committee on Condition of the Fraternity, presented the following report, which was accepted and the recommendations adopted.

In Grand Lodge
Portland, Maine
May 4, 1988

Your standing committee on the "Condition of the Fraternity" has reviewed the reports of the District Deputy Grand Masters, as provided in Sec. 36, Par. 9 of the Grand Lodge Constitution.

One hundred ninety-nine of the individual Lodge reports and all of the annual reports, except the fourth district, were reviewed.

The District Deputies of the 1st, 5th, 6th, 8th, 11th, 14th, 17th and 18th presented outstanding reports. All of the others were very informative, with one exception. This report did not contain the information needed to determine the overall conditions in that district.

The District Deputies have been very active this year and have made many visitations to their respective lodges, in addition to the official visits for inspections. They should be commended for their dedication to the fraternity.

Recommendations that were included in their reports are as follows:

That Grand Lodge set up a low-interest revolving loan fund so that lodges could make necessary repairs without paying high interest rates for loans;

That special dues cards be issued to Past Masters so that they would be identified when making visitations outside of their areas;

That Grand Lodge consider the hardship imposed by the \$2.00/capita increase on small struggling lodges.

That a comprehensive training program for all lodge officers be made available to improve their skills in lodge administration;

That changes be made in the schools of instruction to enable lodge officers to perform in a more impressive and creditable manner.

Masonic Education

Seven district reports indicated very active Masonic Education programs. Twenty-four lodge reports made note of "Advanced Study of Freemasonry." The topic of "Masonic Jurisprudence" was presented by M.W. Charles Glassmire in the 11th District. (This is an example of one of these programs.)

Schools of Instruction

Increased promotion of the schools by the District Deputies appeared to result in better attendance.

Financial Conditions

Eight lodges reported no outstanding dues at the time of their annual inspection. Twelve were under \$75, sixteen were under \$150, and twenty-six were under \$250. The secretaries of these lodges should be commended.

There are other lodges that have a considerable amount of outstanding dues. For example:

One lodge with 255 members with \$3,330 outstanding.

Others - 106 members - \$1,248

95 members - \$1,155

114 members - \$1,374

202 members - \$2,563

84 members - \$1,520

302 members - \$3,498

Ritual

Twenty-six lodges were given "Excellent" ratings, eighty-seven - very good, sixty-one - good, eighteen - fair and seven - poor.

It was noted that eighty-seven lodges use the Wayfarer in their degree work.

Master and Warden's Association

Fifteen districts reported some activity and with ten of these being very active.

Some comments about the Associations were as follows:

(a) The backbone of the district is the Masters and Warden's Association.

(b) Our Master's and Warden's Association is playing a very important part in the overall success of our district.

(c) Our Association is a great forum for discussion of problems and making plans for district-wide activities.

(d) The third district Officers Association has raised \$5,500 towards their goal of \$10,000 for a heart monitor for the Machias Hospital.

It is very evident that an active M & W Association in a district has a great influence on the promotion of masonry.

Fraternal Condition

Thirteen districts report good conditions. Five report good conditions except for one weak lodge in each district. One district reports fair conditions and one reports poor overall conditions.

Lodge Physical Condition

Seven districts reported that their lodges were in generally good condition.

One reported poor conditions overall with several problems.

Another reported that broken windows had been boarded up and a lack of routine maintenance was evident.

Oxford Lodge in the sixteenth district is building a new lodge hall.

Standish Lodge in the seventeenth district has plans to build in the future.

Asylum Lodge in Wayne also has building plans.

Charity Funds

Thirty-seven lodge reports indicated that no charity fund existed; however, some of these lodges handle charity situations by other means, such as special events to raise money when needed.

Two lodges in the fifth district have adopted scholarship programs to assist a graduating senior's college costs.

Messalonskee Lodge in Oakland has raised over \$800 to assist a brother with large hospital and doctor's bills.

Masonic Widows

Thirty-five lodges do not have active widows programs.

Several fine programs were reported throughout the districts.

Care and Share

Sixty-seven lodge reports indicated active programs. This is a considerable increase over last year.

DeMolay and Rainbow

Ten districts reported DeMolay Chapters.

Thirteen districts reported Rainbow Assemblies.

It appears that gains are being made in both organizations.

Outstanding Meetings

Dedication of Eastern #7 in Eastport by M.W. Ernest Curtis and his Grand Officers.

International Night with brethren from New Brunswick and our Grand Master present at Pembroke.

"We the People" program at Belfast was a public costumed celebration of the 200th Anniversary of the signing of the Constitution.

Special outdoor degree and chicken barbecue by Marsh River Lodge in Brooks.

Several "Pink Degrees" presented O.E.S. ladies depicting what they think Masons do during their lodge meetings.

Eleven Table Lodges were reported with excellent attendance.

Presentation of a Master Mason Degree for hospitalized brethren at the V.A. Hospital by the 11th District M. & W. Association.

The M. & W. of the 14th District honored Rodney Pearl who is retiring as the V.A. Representative at their annual banquet. The lodges of this district also exemplified the Master Mason Degree in an outdoor ceremony at the new Rainbow Campground in Somerville.

Rabboni Lodge honored M.W. Ernest Curtis by hosting a Brotherhood Night program consisting of a portrayal of school days in the 1850's.

Several lodges participated in "Family Life Week" programs.

Programs relating to the 200th anniversary of the signing of the Constitution were a part of the District Meetings during the past year.

The above special events are examples of the numerous programs that have been presented during the last year.

Traveling Gavel

It was noted that nineteen districts have a Traveling Gavel with considerable visitation as a result of it.

Recommendations

1. It should be the goal of each district to form and maintain M. & W. or Officers Associations as they have proven to be very beneficial in the promotion of masonry and lodge officer education.

2. Help should be provided to assist lodges that have excessive amounts of outstanding dues.

3. Provisions should be made in the District Deputies guidelines for reporting on the physical condition and appearances of lodge buildings.

4. It is recommended that the recommendations contained in any of the District Deputy reports be sent to the proper committees by the Grand Secretary's Office.

LODGE HISTORY

Wor. Edwin E. Cummings, for the Committee on Lodge History, presented the following report, which was accepted.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON THE HISTORY OF MASONRY IN MAINE AS OF MAY 1, 1988

In Grand Lodge
 Portland, Maine
 May 4, 1988

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine:

During the past year there has been a general let-down among the Lodges to the end that the improvement shown last year has slipped considerably. During 1986-'87 the rules changed regarding the due dates for Lodge histories. As of the end of March, all Lodges should have had their histories submitted to Grand Lodge through 1987.

Last year 57 Lodges owed 140 years of histories plus a number of years which were found to be missing from the file kept for each Lodge. Those missing histories added up to 102 for a total of 242 years due from 73 Lodges. This year the list shows the most recent history, but includes the years missing from the files. We now have 349 years of history now overdue from 130 lodges. It is easy to see that the Masters are not observing the requirement that each Master be responsible for the submission of the history covering his year. Allowance should be made, however, since several of the Lodges owing the missing years may not yet be aware that these years are not on file. An ongoing push will be sustained until 100% of the Lodges are current.

As you hear the names of the delinquent Lodges read, please make a note of any Lodge whose histories might be more quickly completed through your assistance. Your committee will be seeking further assistance through the various District Deputies and District Representatives, but anyone willing to work on histories, for his own or another Lodge, should make himself known.

GRAND HISTORIAN

Wor. Bro. Wallace M. Gage, Grand Historian, presented the following report, which was accepted.

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine, A.F. & A.M.:

When the officer of Grand Historian was created by the Grand Lodge last year, it came equipped with a very brief job description "to keep and maintain an up-to-date narrative history of the Grand Lodge in Maine". As is the case with most Grand Lodge offices, the duties assigned them by the Constitution are but a small part of the activities and responsibilities that go with the position.

Ever since 1858, each Maine lodge has been required to compile its history periodically, and provide copies to the Grand Lodge. Establishment of the Grand Historian's position in no way affects this requirement. These lodge histories are a major source of input for the preparation of the Grand Lodge history. We recently had occasion to review the 1987 lodge histories in the Grand Secretary's office. Some were excellent and others passable, all too many were nearly useless. Statistics on the number Raised, died and demitted; the names of the officers elected and the date of the District Deputy's official visit are a part of lodge history, but a very minor part of it, and are mostly duplications of the numbers found in the Grand Lodge Proceedings and elsewhere.

One lodge history contained the statement that "A Masonic lodge is a social organization and as such, reflects the character and background of the community in which its members live and work." In addition to telling the story of the lodge itself, a history should tell something of the people who are its members. Why shouldn't a brief biography of its Master and other noted members, newspaper clippings about them, photographs and programs of special events be included in the lodge history?

The word "history" for many, brings to mind school days when they were required to commit to memory countless names, dates and places about which they knew little and cared less. But there is a vast difference between a history text book which usually gathers dust on the shelf, and a historical novel which may sell millions of copies. The difference is mainly the human interest element. While we don't expect every lodge historian to write a "Gone With the Wind", their work could be made a great deal more interesting by adding more about the people who make up the membership, and their activities and effect on the community. The minute books should not be the sole reference used in preparing the lodge history.

During the course of a conversation not long ago, with the Master of one of our lodges, he related a story told to him of an incident which supposedly took place during the late 1800s. As the story went, a sailing vessel was caught in bad weather off South Bristol at the mouth of the Damariscotta River. She finally was driven ashore on "Thread of Life" ledge and began to break up in the heavy surf. There was no Coast Guard in those days, and rescue of the crew seemed impossible. Many people were on the shore watching and salvaging wreckage from the ship. As it began to get dark, a Mason among the spectators saw one of the crew of the wreck give a certain sign which he recognized. He passed the word to a number of Brethren. After weighing their chances, they launched dories, and at the risk of their lives, rowed out and were able to rescue the crew from certain death.

This is the sort of thing that lifts Masonic history from the dull and uninteresting. But is it really history or legend or just someone's fantasy? We don't know because apparently no one took the trouble to make a record of it. We wonder if our present day lodge historians would have included it in their histories. Because it didn't happen in the lodge room or appear in the lodge minutes, it's doubtful that some would. As a part of the Grand Historian's job, we hope in time, to show that lodge histories can be interesting and that their preparation doesn't have to be just something that has to be done to avoid a fine.

Standing Regulation 2 states that "each year, the Master of each lodge shall appoint a Lodge Historian whose duty it shall be to prepare the history of the lodge." To do justice to this assignment requires a fair amount of time and effort. Yet the historian usually receives recognition or appreciation, and rarely even thanks. We suggest that the Historian be included with the other appointed lodge officers, and be installed with them and invested with the jewel of the office. This recognition should only be extended to those whose work justifies it however.

To give further recognition for exceptional work, there has been instituted a Historian's Award to be given for the best lodge history submitted each year, and Certificates of Merit for the runners-up. These will be presented for the first time at this Annual Communication.

I regret that I have to give this report to the Grand Lodge by proxy, however, unfortunately, I have to be in Tucson, Arizona to attend the International Supreme Council Session of the Order of DeMolay. I am happy to report, however, that another honor has come to me and Maine DeMolay as I have received an appointment by the Grand Master of DeMolay, Robert F. Hannon, to be the Grand Senior Steward of the International Supreme Council of the Order of DeMolay for the DeMolay year of 1988/89. I will be installed along with the other members of the Grand Line on Wednesday night, May 4th.

Maine DeMolay had an outstanding year in 1987 and was one of only five Jurisdictions in the entire International Supreme Council that had a net increase in membership and Maine DeMolay was the first Jurisdiction to show a net increase in 1987. The rate we are going, so far in 1988, we will show another net increase by Conclave '88 which will be the last weekend of June.

We have started a new chapter in Machias which is Downeast Chapter. Since my report of last year at Grand Lodge, we have organized the Maine Chapter Dream Factory, Inc. which is the official international philanthropy and gives DeMolay a chance to show we have a heart by fulfilling dreams for seriously or critically ill children between the ages of 3 and 13. This project has already granted several dreams.

We are in the process of starting several local Alumni Associations. We hope to have charters presented to 3 local Alumni Associations at Conclave '88 the end of June. The three we have hopes of chartering at Conclave are Greater Portland, York County and the Greater Bangor Alumni Associations.

The Kora DeMolay Council sponsored the Third Annual DeMolay Brunch on Sunday, November 1st and it was a tremendous success. The profit realized from this project will be used to help support our Conclave and to provide scholarships for DeMolays who wish to attend the Leadership Training Conference, which will be held, this year, at Camp O-AT-KA in East Sebago, Maine in August. The Leadership Training Conference is an outstanding program that trains DeMolays to become better leaders and this is one reason we have such outstanding State Officers in Maine DeMolay.

Jim Buss has been my Director of Membership and Bruce Chandler, my Director of Chapter Development and their hard work is starting to show with our increase in membership and new chapters starting. In addition to Downeast Chapter in Machias, there is interest in starting chapters in Ellsworth, Calais and several other areas throughout the state and if we could get more Masons to assist us, we would be able to grow even faster. My whole staff is working very hard for Maine DeMolay. The one big problem is that there are thousands of young men throughout the state of Maine wanting to be DeMolays, but we do not have the manpower to get chapters started fast enough and to organize Advisory Councils. If we could get the manpower we need, this would eventually help the Masonic Fraternity also, as over 50% of all DeMolays eventually become Master Masons and they are usually the active ones as they know what fraternal life is, having been DeMolays.

We had the honor of having Grand Master of DeMolay, Robert M. Walker visit us the weekend of October 16th & 17th when we held a state Membership Class in his honor and we initiated 17 new DeMolays. Grand Master Walker was very impressed with Maine DeMolay.

We held our annual DeMolay Congress Session at Anah Shrine Temple on November 14th & 15th. In conjunction with the Congress Session, we held our 16th annual Honors and Awards Night. Six outstanding Masons and Senior DeMolays, and four outstanding DeMolays received the Active Legion of Honor, Honorary Legion of Honor, the Cross of Honor and the Degree of Chevalier. Receiving the Active Legion of Honor was Keith R. Sherrard of South Portland, a former member of Maine Chapter of Dover-Foxcroft. Receiving the Honorary Legion of Honor were Richard Agathos of Lisbon Falls and James A. Millar, II of Houlton. The Cross of Honor was conferred on Lawrence Wade of Portland and Dana C. Ryder of Gorham. John D. Basinger of Springvale was unable to attend and will receive the award at a later date. The DeMolays who received the Degree of Chevalier were Scott D. Matthews of Frank S. Land Chapter in South Portland; Shawn J. Davis, Bangor Chapter, Shawn N. Webb of Auburn Chapter and Anthony T. Averill of William Whipple Chapter, Kittery. The Executive Officer presented special awards as follows: The "Hat's Off Award" to Marion Buss of Winterport; the "Maine DeMolay Dream Factory Award" to John Stacy of Cape Neddick; the Executive Officers Special Award" to James Buss of Winterport; the "Special Advisor Award" to Merritt Lenentine of Houlton; the award for being the "First Maine DeMolay Chapter To Grant A Dream" to Houlton Chapter; the "Best Friend of DeMolay" award to Norman Morehouse of Augusta; The "Special Masonic Recognition Award" to Harlan F. Small of Bangor; and the "Special DeMolay Recognition Award" to DeMolay Robert J. Davis of Bangor Chapter.

We held our 8th Annual State DeMolay Sweetheart Pageant on Saturday night, April 23rd and it was a huge success. Jennifer Janus representing Springvale Chapter was crowned the DeMolay State Sweetheart for 1988/89.

We will hold our Conclave '88 again at Bates College in Lewiston on June 24th, 25th & 26th and it is shaping up to be the best Conclave yet. It would certainly be nice to see more Masons drop by Bates College and look in on the activities during this weekend of fun. Friday night is the formal opening of Conclave and athletic events will be held all day Saturday. The State Master Councilors Banquet will be held on Saturday night with the Installation of State Officers following. The financial support of our Conclave from the Masonic Lodges and other Masonic Bodies throughout the State of Maine is sincerely appreciated and it keeps the cost to the DeMolays to a minimum.

Brethren, Maine DeMolay is prospering and growing, but we could be so much better and grow much faster if we had the manpower from your local Masonic Lodges. Please attend the local DeMolay Chapter meetings in your area, you will be impressed with their work. Give a little bit of your time to a DeMolay Chapter and if your area does not have a DeMolay Chapter, get in touch with the Executive Officer to find out how a chapter can be started in your town. You won't be sorry. There are young men out there that need and want DeMolay — help them become a DeMolay. Give them an "Invitation With A Promise".

AMENDMENTS TO THE CONSTITUTION - PROPOSED

M.W. M. Donald Gardner proposed from the floor the following amendments, which were accepted:

PROPOSED that Sec. 35, Committee on Finance, be amended by deleting the words "recommend appropriations for the proper conduct of the affairs of the Grand Lodge" and inserting in place thereof the words "shall prepare and distribute to the delegates to Grand Lodge within a reasonable time before the first day of the Annual Communication, a proposed operating budget for the ensuing year, together with the per capita tax to support the budget."

PROPOSED that Paragraph I of Section 90 be amended by inserting the words "per capita tax", to read:

"Each lodge shall pay annually towards the support of the Grand Lodge a per capita tax of five dollars and fifty cents (\$5.50) each for all of its members, including honorary and life members and those

absent from the State and two dollars (\$2.00) for every candidate initiated." and add "Provided, however, said per capita tax shall be adjusted annually in accordance with the report of the Finance Committee as presented pursuant to Section 35."

PROPOSED that Section 36, Paragraph 3, on Grievances and Appeals, be amended by deleting the clause following the first semicolon and inserting:

"shall review the proceedings of the Board of Commissioners of Trials for errors of law and procedure only and present the findings and recommendations of the Commissioners of Trials . . . for action by the Grand Lodge."

MOVED that the proposals be entertained and laid over to the next Annual Communication, in accordance with the provisions of Section 137 of the Constitution.

GRIEVANCES AND APPEALS

M.W. Charles R. Glassmire, for the Committee on Grievances and Appeals, presented the following report, which was accepted.

In Grand Lodge
Portland, Maine
May 4, 1988

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine:

STEPHEN J. GILMAN, on or about February 16, 1988 was found guilty in Penobscot County Court of the crime of Gross Sexual Misconduct and Unlawful Sexual Contact with two females under the age of 14 years, and was sentenced to six years and three years to be served concurrently in the Maine State prison, after a plea of guilty.

Stephen J. Gilman was suspended from all the rights and privileges of Freemasonry by Grand Master, Ernest H. Curtis.

On March 18, 1988, a hearing was held in the Masonic Temple in Auburn, Maine, by the Trial Commissioners. The defendant did not appear, nor was he represented by counsel.

The commission determined that the defendant did not have service of process in that the certified mailing was returned unclaimed, and therefore no hearing was held. It was recommended by the commission that the suspension be extended for a year, and that trial be held after due process.

Your committee on grievances and appeals agrees with this recommendation.

Most Worshipful Grand Master, I move that the suspension of Stephen J. Gilman be extended until the First Tuesday in May, 1989, and that during this year proper service be made on the aforementioned Stephen J. Gilman, and a trial be held.

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine:

ANDREWS BRUCE CAMPBELL, on or about November 3, 1987, was found guilty of the crime of possession with intent to distribute marijuana, after a plea of not guilty. He was sentenced to a fine of \$5,000 and one year in prison.

Andrews Bruce Campbell was suspended from all the rights and privileges of Freemasonry on January 13, 1988, and a hearing was ordered.

A hearing was held at the Masonic Temple in Auburn, Maine on March 18, 1988. It was found that the defendant had taken an appeal from the verdict, but that the appeal had not been heard. For this reason, no official hearing was held, but it was recommended that the suspension in effect against Andrews Bruce Campbell be continued until after the appeal has been decided.

Most Worshipful Grand Master, I move that the suspension presently in effect against Andrews Bruce Campbell be continued until the First Tuesday in May, 1989, and that a trial be held by the Commissioners as soon as the appeal has been heard.

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine:

JOHN JORGEN BERG on or about August 21, 1987, was found guilty of 17 counts of offensive physical contact with approximately eight different females, all under the age of 14 years. On a plea of guilty to 10 counts and was sentenced to 364 days as to all but one count, and five years on one count with all but three years suspended.

John Jorgen Berg was suspended from all the rights and privileges of Freemasonry by Grand Master Ernest H. Curtis on January 30, 1988.

On March 18, 1988, trial was held by the trial commissioners in the Masonic Temple, Auburn, Maine. The defendant did not appear in person, nor was he represented by counsel.

The defendant, John Jorgen Berg was found guilty on the charge of Gross Unmasonic Conduct, and it was recommended that he be expelled from all of the rights and privileges of Freemasonry.

Your Committee on Grievances and Appeals has met and reviewed the proceedings, and find that everything is in order, and we agree with the verdict and the recommendation.

Most Worshipful Grand Master, I move that John Jorgen Berg be expelled from all the rights and privileges of Freemasonry.

In Grand Lodge

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine:

JOHN A. MESSEDER on or about October 31, 1986 was found guilty on a plea of guilty on a charge of unlawful sexual contact and sentenced to a term of one year with all but fifteen days suspended and the term was served in the Franklin County Jail. He was placed on two years probation.

John A. Messeder was suspended from all the rights and privileges of Freemasonry by Grand Master Ernest H. Curtis on February 25, 1987, on the charge of Gross Unmasonic Conduct in that he did engage in incestuous sexual relations with his daughter who was under the age of 14 years.

On March 18, 1988 a trial was held in the Masonic Temple in Auburn, Maine. The defendant did appear in person but was not represented by counsel. After due deliberation, the Trial Commission found the defendant guilty of Gross Unmasonic Behavior and recommended that the suspension in effect against him be continued for a year or until the next meeting of Grand Lodge on the First Tuesday in May, 1989.

Your Committee on Grievances and appeals has met and reviewed the proceedings, and find that everything was in order. We agree with the verdict, but cannot in all conscience agree with the recommendation. We are aware that the defendant is contrite and ashamed of his behavior, but cannot recommend that he be restored in one year without evidence that his rehabilitation is complete, and that he is once again worthy to be called "Brother".

Most Worshipful Grand Master, I move that John A. Messeder be indefinitely suspended from all the rights and privileges of Freemasonry.

In Grand Lodge
Portland, Maine
May 4, 1988

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine:

EUGENE LAWRENCE COFFEN on or about January 31, 1986 was found guilty in Cumberland County Superior Court on two counts of Unlawful Sexual Conduct with a female who had not reached the age of 14 years, after a plea of not guilty. He was sentenced to two years in the State Penitentiary, with all but six months suspended, and was placed on probation for a period of two years.

On complaint by his lodge he was suspended from all the rights and privileges of Freemasonry, and a masonic trial ordered.

A hearing was held at the Masonic Temple, Auburn, Maine, on March 18, 1988. The defendant did appear, but was not represented by counsel. He was found guilty of Gross Unmasonic Conduct, and it was recommended that the suspension against him at that time be extended one year until the next meeting of Grand Lodge on the first Tuesday of May, 1989.

Your committee on Grievances and Appeals has met and find that everything was in order. We agree with the verdict, but find that we cannot agree with the recommendation. We understand that the defendant still professes his innocence, and that the trial commission felt that there were some mitigating circumstances. They did, however, find him guilty as charged. We do have many reservations in recommending that he be returned to membership in our fraternity in one year without any evidence that he has once again earned the right of that membership. It is because of the feelings of the trial commission that we do not recommend expulsion, but that an indefinite suspension will serve the cause of justice, and give him a chance to return to the fold at some time in the future.

Most Worshipful Grand Master, I move that Eugene Lawrence Coffen be indefinitely suspended from all the rights and privileges of Freemasonry.

Most Worshipful Grand Master, I move the acceptance of this report as a whole.

THE MASONS ROLE IN SOCIETY

In a war filled with bitter fighting the Kohima Battle area in Burma during World War II was described as having "fighting as desperate as any in recorded history."

After the war a stone was raised in memory of the dead at Kohima saying, with brief poignancy,

"When you go home
 Tell them of us, and say
 For your tomorrow
 We gave our today"

War highlights and gives deeper meaning to sacrifice, because all too often the sacrifice must be measured in human life. War unfortunately means that some must die in the hope that those who remain will be able to have a better life because of that sacrifice. In no way should we forget or ever lessen the value of the gift given to our nation by those who lost their lives for what they felt were worthy causes.

We must, however, begin to find ways of accomplishing a better life short of war. And we, hopefully, will find ways to measure sacrifice in terms short of death.

Since so many Masons have served in the military, we have a good understanding of what sacrifice is all about. As Masons, we also need to develop ways of transferring sacrifice into productive accomplishments that will help people develop understanding toward each other and thereby lessen the tensions that lead to war.

What on earth does all this mean? In my opinion, Masons have an enviable record of responding to our nation's needs when we are threatened or in danger. It is also my opinion that Masons fall far short of responding to our nation's needs when there is no imminent threat or danger. The basic flaw in our Order today and the reason we have lost touch with our communities is simply this: As Masons, we no longer provide leadership in our communities or our nation to the extent that we once did. Leadership, my Brothers, is the very hallmark by which Freemasons were once known.

We do have a great Masonic record in military service. It is my hope that we can use that same spirit of sacrifice to become re-involved in our communities, our states, and our nation. As Masons we certainly need to provide strong military support, but my Brothers, just as important we also need to provide strong community support.

Re-establishing our Masonic leadership role and serving human need are two of the extremely critical challenges we face as a Fraternity.

Today's words that I am sharing with you really started in August of 1984. On a hot and rainy Sunday, the Grand Lodge of New York dedicated a Plaque at the Statue of Liberty. It was my pleasure to represent Vermont on that occasion. Returning home, I couldn't wait until Monday to pick up a New York paper and read about what had been accomplished. To my surprise there was no coverage. None! Tuesday I bought another paper and there it was—a picture of the Statue of Liberty on Page 1 of the Second Section. That had to be story. But it wasn't. No mention of the dedication. Instead, a protestor had strung a banner, flaunting his cause, around the Statue. A positive story about a fraternity that has served mankind for several centuries, deeply involved in the history of our nation, did not deserve to be mentioned. A negative story involving one protestor was found worthy of a picture and a short story.

It occurred to me then, and the feeling has grown stronger since, that our nation has developed a very twisted sense of values. And these values will not change unless organizations such as ours become involved.

Let me touch on the negative positions so popular in the media today. Positions that I feel are part of the problem and not part of the solution. The major problem with the so-called protest groups is that they are never able to distinguish between the problem and their solution to it. Peace groups, for example, cannot distinguish between a desire for peace (everyone's goal) and their answer to achieve peace. If a demonstrator's position is challenged the response is not that you disagree with their position but rather you must be against peace because you disagree with them!

Unfortunately, protest groups are not helpful because they take extremist positions. For example:

1. There is no room for compromise—only their solution is correct—no other possible solution need apply!

2. Intolerance toward the opinions of others.

3. Freedom of speech carried to the extreme of listening to those who say what the group wants to hear and then shouting down, harassing or trying to intimidate anyone with an opposing point of view!

You can read about these extremist positions in any daily paper. My point is not to create confrontation with these groups, but rather to start the process in our communities that says the voices of reason, toleration and compromise will do more to insure American freedom than any extremist position ever taken.

Let me illustrate this point with an example:

The time: early 1860's.

Slavery is evil and should be abolished. A point with which any reasonable person can certainly agree. How do you abolish slavery? Again we must separate the goal—abolishment of slavery—from the solution—how is the abolishment of slavery to be accomplished.

Fiery abolitionists were never able to make this distinction and so whatever they chose to do became the only way to abolish slavery. Anyone who disagreed was ridiculed, shouted down and in some cases threatened with violence. The abolitionist position became so extremist, so fiery, so righteous and inflexible that they ended up being a group of people who preached hatred and violence.

Reasonable people learn to compromise, respect each other and work toward solutions.

Unreasonable people become intolerant, develop hardened, unyielding positions, and finally take to the streets because no one respects their position.

A free nation must provide for **all** points of view, but I believe we can accomplish more as reasonable people.

What then, can we do?

To begin my next illustration, let me quote some words from a person interviewed on T.V. during the racial confrontations of the 1960's. The person was asked why black people were so looked down upon and the reply was "we have to have someone to be better than."

Athol Fugard has written a very powerful play about life in South Africa. In the order of people in South Africa, the lowest order are the blacks, next up the ladder are the coloreds, then the whites; each hating the other. Fugard's play "Boesman and Lena" has just three characters. While it speaks of white indifference and black subjugation in South Africa, the play spoke to me about very human emotions that are part of all of us!

Basically, the play deals with a husband and wife—Boesman and Lena—who have just fled an area being destroyed by whites. As the play develops, it is apparent that

Boesman who is "colored" takes out his frustrations not only on his wife but on "black" people as well. Subservient to whites, he beats up his wife as an outlet for his frustrations. Wife-beating out of frustration, is not confined to any race, creed or color. Later in the play an old "Kaffir" who is black, wanders into their camp. It is obvious that Boesman hates and despises the man because he is "black."

Unhappy countries like South Africa promote ways for someone to be better than someone else.

Another example of intolerance which we all too often take for granted!

In our own nation, with a poor but improving record of race relations, Masons should be active leaders in contacts with the black community.

Masons most certainly should be in the forefront of cordial relations and social contacts with Black Lodges. In fact, we have no excuse not to be.

We must also be vigilant against anti-semitism, an evil that constantly lurks beneath the surface of many outward smiles.

While you may politically agree or disagree with Mario Cuomo's ethnic sensitivity, nonetheless ethnic considerations are apparent and he senses them.

And I still hear that we cannot be active in trying to establish good relations with the Catholic community because of old wounds suffered centuries ago.

In a day and age where we have established excellent relationships with England, a nation against whom we fought two wars, I find this line of reasoning difficult to accept. The only way we can ever convince the Catholic community that they have nothing to fear from Freemasonry is to work with them! Being apart may be trendy, but it never solved anything!

In summing up our relations with others, no more powerful words come to mind than those of Elie Weisel. He tells the story of a brother and sister who were sent to a World War II death camp. The sister (the younger of the two) is to die the following morning.

This is what they say to each other.

But you will speak even when you do not see me?

I shall try.

You will say that I liked to sing? That I liked to listen to you sing?

I shall say that too.

And that I loved the Holy Days?

You radiated joy.

And Shabbat? You won't forget to say how much I loved Shabbat?

It made you glow.

And the Shabbat songs?

You sang them at the table.

And you will speak of my love of God?

Yes, little sister.

And my grief at losing you, losing all of you, will you speak of that too?

I shall carry it inside me.

And one more thing.

Yes?

When you speak of your little sister leaving you like that, without a hug, without a goodbye, without wishing you a good journey, will you say that it was not her fault?

It was not your fault.

And the little sister asks: "Then whose fault was it?"

A bewildered child was killed by a regime that just as systematically, though not as viciously, destroyed Freemasonry. Extremism that went too far!

Can Freemasons really afford to be so complacent? If we continue to refuse any kind of outreach to the black community; think relations with the Catholic community cannot improve because of ancient hostilities; ignore anti-Semitism when it occurs; and feel ethnic slurs are kind of good fun, then who do we look to for support during periods of anti-Masonic hysteria that continue to this day?

If we continue along this path, are we not risking that day of extremism, of having gone too far, when we shall have to look at one another and say:

"Then whose fault was it?"

It is not my purpose to suggest that our nation's woes are solely the fault of Freemasonry, nor that Freemasonry alone can cure these woes. But, if we continue doing nothing, we will contribute to the credibility of the groups who go too far and by default help them carry our nation into a slide to extremism.

Freemasonry is the largest untapped source of good-will, tolerance, compromise, acceptance of others and standard of values available to our nation today. Freemasonry must, through its members, speak as a voice of moderation and toleration! It remains to be seen how we will respond to our potential.

Let me close with these beautiful words from the SANSKRIT:

As the sun is rising on this new day, let us look to it well.

For today alone is life.

In its brief course lie all the truths and realities of existence . . .

the glory of action . . .

the awareness of beauty . . .

the serenity of meditation . . .

the warmth of gratitude . . .

thought . . .

achievement . . .

laughter . . .

the comfort of loving and of being loved.

Yesterday is only a memory . . . and tomorrow has yet to be.

But today, lived to its fullest, can make each yesterday

a memory of happiness and each tomorrow

a vision of hope.

(3) Harold L. Chute, Chairman of the Committee on Investments, submitted an excellent report (copies distributed and analyzed). The following items were noted:

General

1987 was a difficult year in the financial markets. Your investment committee met three times with the Grand Master, Grand Treasurer, Grand Secretary and the investment adviser John M. Wood, Jr., from Standish, Ayer and Wood, during which time the total portfolio was discussed in detail. The bond markets over the recent years had been volatile and at the May, 1987, meeting our adviser discussed the Standish Fixed Income Fund which really was a mutual bond fund managed by Standish, Ayer and Wood. The objectives of the fund is to generate a high total rate of return to market indices consistent with achieving preservation of principal and earning a market level of income. The fund will generate about 8% income. The fund consists of governments, pass-thru securities, foreign bonds, Eurodollar Bonds plus industrial, finance, bank and other bonds.

At the September 16th meeting our adviser expressed a nervous attitude relative to the equities market particularly. The committee agreed on all points and we proceeded to sell some common stocks. We had also accumulated some cash from maturing bonds. The end result is you can see from the Treasurer's Report we bought 28,243 units of the S & W Fixed Income Trust with a book value of \$550,000.00.

The Relief Fund now has a book value of \$2,203,844 and a current market value of \$3,521,890.

If you will study the attached sheet you will see the Dow Jones industrial averages in September, 1987, and then the result of the October 19th drop and feel happy that we are still \$1,318,046 ahead of book value. The income from the fund is \$186,805.

Investment Policy

The committee remains conservative and over the years we have looked at about 65% equities and the remaining 35% bonds and cash. As of February 29, 1987, it was bonds 43% and common stocks 57%. Although financial markets are constantly changing, the above ratios have guaranteed our income over the years and given us substantial growth in the face of some bad markets. Our biggest group of holdings is in the interest sensitive group, i.e., banks, insurance, electric, natural gas and telephone (30%) closely followed by consumer stable, i.e., drugs, hospital supplies, entertainment, food, beverages, imaging technology (Kodak) and personal care (23%). About 11% of this Relief Fund portfolio is in the energy group. Capital goods/technology 19.8% and consumer cyclical 6.3%.

The Named Pooled Funds

The group is not managed by Standish, Ayer and Wood but rather by your committee and Grand Lodge officers. It comprises funds such as Bodge, Farrar, Loring, etc. The total number of stocks is 15 and 9 bonds. This pooled fund is the only way the Treasurer can work or the committee can understand what is happening because the numbers of stocks and bonds would become too great. The total value of this fund is now \$464,596 with an income of \$23,353 or 5.02%.

Value & Investment Income

The total value of all Charity Funds now is: Relief Fund \$3,521,890; Named Pool \$464,596 making a total of \$3,986,486. The total income is Relief Fund \$186,805 and Pooled Income \$23,353 making a total of \$210,158.

Your committee wishes to express our pleasure for serving this Grand Lodge another year. The committee and all members of Grand Lodge are fortunate to have someone of the stature of our Grand Treasurer to manage our financial affairs and take a personal interest in the finances.

MASONIC CALENDAR

Ancient Craft Masons commence this era with the creation of the world, calling it **Anno Lucis (A.D.)**, "in the year of light."

Scottish Rite, same as Ancient Craft, except the Jewish chronology is used, **Anno Mundi (A.M.)**, "in the year of the world,"

Royal Arch Masons date from the year the second temple was commenced by Zerubbabel, **Anno Inventionis (A.I.)**, "in the year of the discovery."

Royal and Select Masters date from the year in which the temple of Solomon was completed, **Anno Depositionis (A. Dep.)**, "in the year of the deposit."

Knights Templar commence their era with the organization of their Order, **Anno Ordinid (A.O.)**, "in the year of the Order."

Order of High Priesthood dates from the year of the blessing of Abraham by the High Priest Melchisedec, **Anno Benefacio (A.B.)**, "in the year of the blessing."

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine:

We submit, herewith, our Annual Report on Fraternal Relations, consisting of a Foreword, Special Reports, Recommendations, and Reviews.

FOREWORD

One of the most depressing things that most of us do every day is to read the daily newspapers. I recently counted the number of columns devoted to the accounts of war and other forms of violence throughout the world. It is apparent that our world is wallowing in a sea of hatred and distrust.

The late General Omar Bradley said it well, "In a world of nuclear giants, we are ethical infants. We know more about war than we do about living." Our trouble, he says, is that we are becoming so absorbed in the mystery of the atom that we are neglecting the mystery of the Sermon on the Mount.

Some years ago, the famous scientist, Charles P. Steinmetz, urged us to wake up and explore this second mystery more thoroughly.

"Spiritual Power," he wrote, "is a force which history clearly teaches has been the greatest force in the development of men. Yet we are merely playing with it, never have really studied it as we have the physical forces. Some day people will learn that material things do not bring happiness and are of little use in making people creative and powerful. Then scientists of the world will turn their laboratories over to the study of spiritual forces which have hardly been scratched."

In thinking these thoughts, it is refreshing and reassuring to know that we belong to the greatest fraternity on earth. One that recognizes the spiritual side of life, and wherein men of good will, even though professing different faiths, can live and work together in peace and harmony.

One of the most troubled areas in the world today is the Middle East. Even here we know that Jewish, Christian and Arab brethren live together, work together, and meet together under the all seeing eye and the fraternal and all encompassing banner of Freemasonry.

This is a wonderful tale, and one which we should be sharing with the entire world. As the world begins to know and understand us, we should reap the benefits due a group such as ours.

SPECIAL REPORTS**ITALY**

The Grande Orient D'Italia has once again come to these shores and appeared for hours before the commission on Information for Recognition of the Conference of Grand Masters of Masons in North America.

They submit that they are following the standards for regularity adopted by the conference. Evidence gleaned from other sources, however, indicate that they have not adhered to them in practice.

The commission reaffirms its opinions reached in 1986 and 1987, namely that this Grand Lodge is not now entitled to any recognition.

MEXICO

We have received requests for recognition from two Grand Lodges in Mexico. The Grand Lodges of Tamaulipas and Benito Juarez are both considered regular, and we therefore recommend that the Grand Lodge of Maine recognize them and exchange representatives.

HONDURAS

A request for recognition has been received from the Grand Lodge of Honduras. The following direct quote from the Commission Report is interesting and informative. "The state of Masonry in the Central American Countries of Guatemala, Honduras, El Salvador, Costa Rica, and Panama is, at best, precarious."

We recommend that no action be taken at this time, but that we await further information on this situation before we can make any positive recommendations.

GLOMORON (ESTADO DE RONDONIA)

The most recent request that we have received has been from another of the Grand Lodges in Brazil. The report of the commission last year informed us that all of the Grand Lodges in that country at that time were regular. This year's report simply states that "The newest Grand Lodge in Brazil is Grande Loja Masonica Do Estado De Rondonia." They append no recommendation.

In the application from this Grand Lodge they state that they are in Fraternal Relationship with many Grand Lodges, but a perusal of this list shows that they are all in Brazil.

We believe that more information should be obtained before we grant their request. We therefore make no recommendation at this time, and plan to investigate this situation in greater detail and will make a further report at the annual meeting next year.

VENEZUELA

It was brought to the attention of your chairman that the Grand Lodge of Venezuela is in Fraternal Relationship with almost all of the Grand Jurisdictions in the United States. We naturally wondered why. A search was begun through our proceedings as well as the reports of the Commission on Recognition.

In 1964 Ralph J. Pollard reported that Masonry in Venezuela was split into two Grand Lodges. One operated under the Constitution of 1924 and the other the

Constitution of 1956. No recommendation was made to this Grand Lodge. The rift reported then has long since been healed.

We are aware that at least one Venezuelan Mason, now living in this country has been harmed by this lack of recognition.

It is not normally our policy to initiate exchanges of recognition between the Grand Lodge of Maine and other grand jurisdictions. It is our feeling, however, that in this instance, an exception should be made, and we do recommend such action.

RECOMMENDATIONS

Most Worshipful Grand Master, I move that recognition and the exchange of representatives be extended to the Grand Lodge of Venezuela, The Grand Lodge of Tamaulipas, The Grand Lodge of Benito Juarez. I further recommend that no action be taken at this time toward the Grand Lodge of Honduras and the Grand Lodge of Estado De Rondonia. I further recommend that we continue in our present relationship with the Grand Oriente D'Italia.

Most Worshipful Grand Master, I move the acceptance of this report as a whole.
