When I hear DeMolays talk about this problem that they have in their jurisdictions I tell them very proudly that this is not a problem that exists in the Grand Lodge of Maine. So I thank you for understanding that for there to be true brotherhood in our orders there must be brotherhood among all men.

In closing, I thank you for making it easier for youth to say no to drugs. I am very proud of my Masonic heritage and I look forward to joining you in the greatest fraternity in the world.

R.W. Edwin V. George, Grand Secretary, called the Roll of Grand Representatives and those listed in the Report of the Committee of Credentials stood in place and were greeted by the Grand Master, who directed them to correspond with their respective Grand Lodges, extending the greetings of the Grand Master and this Grand Lodge. He commented on their excellent involvement of communication and told those who did not receive answers from their counterparts to advise him of the fact and he would endeavor to get some answers.

GRAND MASTER'S REPORT

Brethren, as if by the blink of an eye, it seems, my first year ccas your Grand Master has slipped by. It has gone very quickly; nevertheless, there have been some major accomplishments for which we should all be proud.

My major objective this year has been the promotion of two very important programs -- THE SCHOLARSHIP AWARDS and the DRUG AND ALCOHOL ABUSE PREVENTION PROGRAM AMONG CHILDREN.

Last year we were going to present 24 \$500 scholarships. As it turned out we gave 65. This year we will be awarding over 70 \$500 scholarships. The original 48 are given by Grand Lodge and the remainder are scholarships that will be given by individual lodges, Masters and Wardens Associations and various Masonic clubs.

My target for the Drug and Alcohol Prevention Program was \$100,000; but even though we didn't reach my goal, we came close. We raised approximately \$85,000 for which I am very grateful because many school and community projects to fight drug and alcohol abuse were partially funded by your donations.

You should also know that the money is still coming in and I am very grateful for that. I asked and you willingly gave. That, my Brothers, is the true ideal of Masonry.

I must also tell you right now that these programs will be continued. The reason why I say that is that when I wrote my article for the *Maine Mason*, I stated that I would not solicit any funds from you this year. Some brethren interpreted that to mean I was dropping the Drug and Alcohol Abuse Program. That program will NOT be dropped now or in the future. What *will* change is the manner by which the money will be raised.

You should also know that there are still pins to be sold. They are still selling for \$5.00 each and you can buy as many as you want in the Grand Lodge office before you leave.

These programs have given us some very good public exposure, but the public relations have not stopped there. We again participated in the WCBB, Ch. 10 FUND DRIVE as well as the annual SALVATION ARMY CHRISTMAS KETTLE DRIVE. That participation has also put us in the public eye.

Before I go into the membership situation, you should know that there is a very positive attitude evolving in our fraternity. I do not have any statistics, nor can I give you any specifics. But I can tell you that feeling is there and will continue. I can sense it.

You may be asking why I feel that way when we have lodges with severe problems and our membership has declined again this year. Time does

Brethren, don't despair. You know that my concerns are the same as yours. We are slowly but surely turning ourselves around. In my travels to DISTRICT MEETINGS and to INDIVIDUAL LODGES, I have seen a resurgence of interest come about. Again I say to you, if you have problems in your lodges, all you need to do is ask for our help and you shall receive it. My officers and I will travel anywhere we are needed.

I can tell you I was delighted with the attendance at the DISTRICT

MEETINGS. The highest attendance was over 200 and the lowest was about 30. The average was about 45. This coming year I am going to offer an incentive program to increase District meeting attendance even more.

This year we lost two of our beloved PAST GRAND MASTERS. M.W. Leon M. Sanborn and M.W. Harlan F. Small. They will be sorely missed. The grim reaper, however, cannot be deterred; so it is important to remember those brethren who so unselfishly contributed so much to Masonry and to perpetuate their good works.

To me, the future of Masonry looks bright, but before I tell you about that, allow me to tell you how I feel about my first year. Thanks to you, I have traveled more this past year than I have ever traveled in my lifetime -- and never once got lost as hopelessly as when I was an Assistant Grand Lecturer.

My wife, Dolly, and I traveled to many places in Maine as well as to many jurisdictions out of state where we were so warmly greeted and hospitably treated. To our VISITING BRETHREN, thank you for all your kindnesses, and we hope that your accommodations here are just as comfortable as ours were when we visited you. If there is anything you need please let us know, and we'll do our best to see that you get it. I also want you to know that you are in Maine at the most opportune time. That is the season between Mud Time and Black Flies.

Some satisfaction came about when I began to recognize that Maine's Masonic problems are not unique. Masonry's problems are universal. Therefore, I am delighted to be able to discuss mutual problems with other Grand Masters.

My participation in the CONFERENCE OF GRAND MASTERS was most rewarding. One very enlightening report came from the Masonic Renewal Task Force. This report entitled "American Male Attitudes and Behavior Towards Joining and Freemasonry" was an eyeopener. We heard that 85% of the males surveyed were not interested in joining any organization and half of the remaining 15% said they were interested in joining the Masonic Fraternity.

Brethren, our Masonic future looks bright. Let me tell you about some of my plans for this coming year. More emphasis will be put on PUBLIC RELATIONS. That committee will become very busy.

The Education Committee and I will be working on ways to assist Masters and Wardens to organize and run their lodges with proficiency. That same committee will be charged with the task to plot out a plan that will take us into the future with the certainty that Masonry will be alive and well way into the year 2000.

My officers and I will work on incentive programs to help lodges become active and vital in their communities again.

When your friends ask "What do Masons do?" you can tell them with pride about our Scholarship and Drug and Alcohol Abuse Prevention programs, and you can also tell them about your pride in Masonry because we are an organization that is dedicated to helping our fellow man personally and financially. Besides the personal assistance you have given to your friends and neighbors, the Grand Lodge Charitable foundation gave over \$141,000 to needy brethren and their families. That is *nothing* to be ashamed of.

Today, Brethren, we will work to rebuild that PRIDE IN MASONRY so that the world will know us for our good work.

In a short while you will listen to the Finance Committee report and be able to discuss the budget. It is very important for you to know that our invested funds *do not* run your Grand Lodge. Those invested funds are used to give Masonic Relief and Assistance to our needy members and their families. Your Grand Lodge is funded through the assessments that come to us through your lodges. I believe that when you hear the finance Committee Report and the Budget Report you will be pleased.

We are listening to your requests, and my main RECOMMENDATION this year is to make a careful analysis of all spending and to make cuts wherever possible.

As I come to the end of my report it is important to extend a sincere THANK YOU to the appendant bodies that bestowed me with their honors; to the Past Grand Masters who were always ready to answer my questions; to the office staff -- Bruce and Ed; and Lois, Julie, Arline and Blanche -- for their loyalty, dedication, and hours of work without complaint; to my line officers, District Deputies, and District Reps for going that extra mile whenever they were asked; to my family for always being there when I needed them even though I wasn't always there when they needed me; and finally, to you brothers for your support and good wishes. Without all of you, we could not have accomplished what we did.

You elected me to lead you at a time when my life had reached an all time low. Had it not been for my family, my wife Dolly, and you, I dread to think what might have happened to me. I hope I have fulfilled your expectations. We do have a brighter future; so I, with your help, aid, and assistance, look forward to the coming year with renewed hope and vitality.

This year has been full of wonderful experiences for both of us. It has been through the offerings of your friendships, love and support which truly enabled us to enjoy our involvement.

Within this great State of Maine and throughout the country, we have experienced your enthusiasm, and a commitment of body and soul to the values of Masonry.

The reading of the Annual Address was followed by applause, the Communication standing.

At the conclusion of the reading of the address, the Deputy Grand Master entertained a motion that the Address of the Grand Master be referred to the Committee on Doings of Grand Officers and it was so voted. It was also voted that the reports of the Deputy Grand Master, Grand Wardens and the Grand Lecturer be referred to the same committee without reading.

REPORT OF THE GRAND LECTURER

Buckfield, Maine
April 1, 1989

To the Most Worshipful Grand Master, Officers and Brethren of
The Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine:

As my first year as Grand Lecturer draws to a close, I have to wonder where the year has gone, and look back at what we have accomplished.

When I say we, I am referring to my very able Assistant Grand Lecturers. Without them I would not be able to carry out the responsibilities of ritual instruction over the entire state. Each member of the team travels several hundred miles to conduct a total of 96 schools of instruction. This is but a portion of their commitment. In addition to the Grand Lodge Officers meeting held in Waterville, the lecturers met in September and again in December at Bangor to discuss schools of instruction and other instructional topics. Each member of the team was encouraged to express their opinions and new ideas.

The method of notification of schools was our biggest change this year. A form letter was devised for the District Deputies to send to each Master. He in turn circulated the form to each of his Lodge Officers prior to the district school. They were requested to sign the form and indicate if they

planned to attend the school. The form would then be returned to the District Deputy at the school of instruction.

The use of the form saved each of the 24 District Deputies many hours of post card preparation (one for each of the lodge officers) and a savings of an estimated \$1200 in postage.

This notification form was met with mixed feelings. Some thought it a satisfactory and economical change. Others saw it as an attempt to have them commit themselves in writing to attend.

After the first two schools, the form was altered to request signature only, indicating that the officer had received notification of the intended school.

I feel use of the form notification in place of the individual post card had little or no effect one way or another on attendance at schools of instruction. The factors that did affect attendance were adverse weather and travelling conditions, and schools held during school vacation (perhaps conflicting with family plans).

This year I asked the Masters to close the Lodges in the long form if time permitted. My intention was to reacquaint our members with the full form of closing; bring to their attention that the short form is not the only closing. This also was met with mixed feelings. The changes are not intended as added requirements or hardships, but as a means of improving efficiency and spreading Light in Masonry.

Guests at Table No. 1 were introduced by Brother Clyde L. Ferris, Executive Officer for DeMolay in Maine. Guests at Tables No. 2 through 6 were introduced by Past Grand Masters of Maine sitting at each of those tables.

Following a sumptuous banquet, the Grand Master introduced M.W. William R. Pellow, Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of Canada in the Province of Ontario, who spoke as follows:

Orville and Wilbur Wright were at a banquet one night and they asked Orville to get up and asked him to address the group. He said, "No, it's not my turn today, it's Wilbur's." So Wilbur got up and said, "Orville's just made the speech" and sat down. And I might be in the same vein. That's maybe the way I'll handle this today.

If you don't like what I'm going to say, if it hits too close to home, I'll tell you a secret how to get out of here. Take this (takes napkin), put this over your arm, take a half a glass of water, pretend you're a waiter and beat it. It works every time. It works great if you've got a Tux on.

I'm excited about what's happening in Masonry, I really am. I'm extremely grateful to be living in an era that's seeing Masonry become revitalized, reawakened, reborn, and to see the flames of Masonry be rekindled again, because it's gone out for some of us. We thought it had gone out. I supposed it was about 1960 or 1963 when we peaked. That was our zenith. In Ontario we had 134,000 Masons, and it was just like a toboggan slide, on a 45 degree angle. We dropped down to about 93,000 today, and for the first time in 24 years, we've bounced back. We didn't go right back up, but we just bounced off enough to take it off that 45 degree and we've levelled off a bit. It's gratifying to be in an era and see that happen. There's a bubbling out there, there's a real effervescence, and I'm a little bit like you. I don't want to die. I heard a barbershop quartet the other day and the fellow says "Oh, I want to be in Heaven" and the last line was "I don't wanna die". How are you gonna get there?

I don't want to see my Masonry die, and I don't think you do either. I want to live and I want to feel a part of it and I want to feel alive. I want to see some of the action, I like to see the action in Masonry. It gives a great inner satisfaction. I'm enjoying what I'm doing this year, writing a small paragraph in Masonic history in my jurisdiction. Maybe some of you know about the Philalethes Society. We have a fellow in our jurisdiction called Wallace McLeod, Dr. McLeod. Wallace is what we would call an egghead. He's a professor of Classic Greek at the University in Toronto. He's been a very controversial figure in the States because he still figures the British won this war down here. I can remember some of the rebuttals that he put on one of the writings in the Philalethes paper, but he said to me, "I'd like you to speak when the Philalethes have their annual communication in Toronto," and he said "I know you don't read history, so don't talk about it."

So I thought that's a terrible thing to say to anybody, so I wrote back and I said "I know I don't read History any more, Wallace, I'm too busy making it." And that was the end of that. So, if you happen to come to Toronto you might have a chance to listen. I've got eight minutes. There's no time limit on what I'm going to say tonight. But, you know, what I'm going to speak about tonight is not history, it's not philosophy and it's not symbolism, it's Freemasonry.

For many of us, that consumes most of our lives, almost on a daily basis. And that will be my topic, and I'll try and find little areas where I'm going to touch, maybe, some of your lives in Masonry. I might relate to some facts, and any of the facts I might relate to, believe me, are from my own jurisdiction and I haven't talked to your Grand Master to find out if they even work down here.. But they do work, and if they don't work, tough bananas, but at least you'll hear what somebody 's doing on an international basis. This year I stress enthusiasm and motivation and bubbling and effervescence and I talked about participation and cooperation. Without them, we don't have anything . I talked about moral instruction and social intercourse, and the "and" in between is what some of our Masons forget. There's "and" moral instruction "and" social intercourse. They forget that we're here for fun, and if we weren't we would be sitting home with a bag of potato chips, a Budweiser and we'd be watching television. That's if you drink, and I know none of you fellows do that. Participation is the biggest thing and I wanna tell you a little bit about Participation.

I grew up in northern Ontario where animals are all over the place. I was exhausted coming back from Grand Lodge last year, totally exhausted. And so I was at my cottage and it was a windy day and I looked out on the lake and this beaver was trying to swim and he was bucking a head wind, and he was having a terrible time. He had a poplar bough in his mouth and he was trying to pull it in that wind, and you all know that, if you know anything about beavers, they only work when it's nice and calm. I felt sorry for the little guy, so I jumped in my motor boat and I snubbed a little piece of rope around that bough and I drew the tree over to his house. I had supper, and after supper my wife called me to the window. She said "Bill come here." And down at the dock this beaver was standing in my boat trying to start my motor. That's participation and that's cooperation. He's smarter than most Masons, that little guy. He learned something right away.

Let's talk a little about leadership in Masonry. Frank Paul, the Sovereign Grand Commander, said that it's not membership that we're losing that's causing all our problems it is leadership. Dwight L. Smith wrote a whole little book on "Whither Are We Traveling?" A little bit on leadership.

You know, I tend to agree with them that maybe that's one of our biggest blights, that we are lacking a little bit in leadership. I'm frustrated and I'm sick and tired of listening to Masons getting up to make a speech, and they criticize their beloved craft and they never offer one constructive criticism, or any ideas or any recommendation of what we may do to correct them. They'll come up and spout off about a thousand things but never give you an idea on how to reverse the trend. You know we have a few problems, or pseudo problems perhaps, but I didn't promise to get up here and just talk a little bit. I'd like to give you some of the recommendations that I see and maybe they'd be advantageous to you in your own lodges and maybe even in Grand Lodge.

But what level will I talk at? Will I talk at the level of Grand Lodge, or will I talk at the constituent lodge level? I'll talk a little bit about both. I've got about a year and three-quarters under my belt, about eight years of Grand Lodge and I think I can speak a little bit about both, and I don't have my Grand Secretary here or some of my Grand Masters and if you fellows

go back and tell them about this, you know I'm going to be impeached, and I've only got to July to go. So what I'm telling you tonight is just to remain here, and Jack Frazier, don't you talk about what we talked about today. You know what happens in a Lodge when you get one Master that's weak, followed by another Master that's weak, followed by another Master that's weak, that has no abilities, that has no capabilities of leading anything? He couldn't track an elephant with a bleeding trunk through fresh fallen snow, and there he's been sitting up there in King Solomon's chair. What is the scenario if you get one, two, or three weak Masters of a Lodge or one, two or three weak Grand Masters of Grand Lodge? Somebody has to fill in the breach or the thing falls apart, and who is the perennial officer in the Lodge that fills it in? It's the secretary, He's there because the Worshipful Master is incapable, unprepared, and totally inadequate to be the Master of the Lodge or to be Grand Master of Grand Lodge, And that's what happens. The perennial lodge officer takes over to bridge in that gap. And who is he? Of course, he's the secretary, either the Grand Lodge Secretary or the Lodge secretary. Someone has to do it. The secretary becomes stronger and stronger and becomes a despot, almost. He becomes tyrannical, he becomes overpowering, he oversteps his book of Constitution of what he can really do. He oversteps his boundatries and he oversteps his authority, and you have all seen it happen.

When a man of strong leadership then comes into the fore and becomes either the Worshipful Master or a Grand Lodge Officer, or the Grand Master, he then has a secretary who is so overpowering that he confronts him all the time, and it's just like putting your head up against the wall. He has a big problem to surmount before he can even put his programs together, and if it's not a very good scenario, it's almost an insurmountable problem and it happens throughout every jurisdiction in North America and the World. It's a stopgap, but it's one that happens. Many secretaries, and don't get me wrong, because I know there's some here, and I can see them smiling and squirming in their chairs, but you know, they provide yeoman service. They're devoted and loyal and they should receive all the accolades and all the plaudits and all the commendations that they deserve, because they do, and they keep our Masonry alive when we have inept people coming up to be sitting in the chair of leadership.

My brother, let me preface by saying there's no age barrier difference in Masonry. I have friends who are 21 years old who are Masons and I have friends who are 96 years old who are Masons. There is no age barrier as far as I'm concerned, but, sometime, in this world of change, if you want change and you've got a secretary who's been sitting at that desk for ten, fifteen, twenty and sometimes twenty-five and thirty years, he won't change because he can't change. My old dad came through the depression in the dirty thirties. I can't get him to change. It's engraved in him and it's engraved in the secretaries who've been there for thirty years. They won't change and there's no way you are going to make them change, and if you try to do anything, you are bucking a head wind, no matter how you try it. It's time, gentlemen, if you're a strong leader in your Lodge or your Grand Lodge, it's time, perhaps to have a good look at this. We are not a business organization where you walk in and say, "You're fired" on Monday morning, "be-

cause you didn't toe the mark." This is a voluntary organization of Brotherhood

What you may do is elevate that man to a senior advisor or counsellor, but ask him to step down in the office of secretary. Be very diplomatic, very diplomatic and not hurt his feelings. You don't jump up a rung of the executive ladder anywhere by stepping on somebody's hands to get one rung up. So elevate those loyal and devoted brethren, don't demote them. There are eager beavers in the wings who will take over, and you can't tell me there's nobody there who will do the job. If the secretary is worth his salt and loves his Masonry, he'll train somebody and he'll make them into exceptional people as lodge officers and Grand Lodge officers. But diplomacy is the byword and don't ever forget it.

If you think this is a problem only at constituent lodge levels, you're absolutely wrong. It's a problem in many, many Grand Lodges. In our particular jurisdiction we have forty-three District Deputy Grand Masters who represent the Grand Master, and I'm still talking about leadership. He is elected in that particular district by the Brethren of that district and when he comes to Grand Lodge, our Grand Master ratifies his appointment. In other words he is not

the District Deputy, although his brethren elected him, until the Grand Master says "O.K. you are now a District Deputy." Where leadership falls apart at the District level is these forty-three men, and I don't say they all do this, but some of them do. They don't follow the edicts and the principles and the programs laid out by the Grand Master. They start setting up their own little shop in their own little districts and instead of having one central thrust spearheading to get its programs and recommendations through the whole jurisdiction, we have forty-three little groups, all trying to do their own little thing and be kings of their own little castle, and the whole system of leadership loses some of its power and some of its thrust, and so you don't get the drive you should have had. These are little things that may or may not happen in your jurisdiction. In reading back some of the history, and I did read back, believe me I did, and this man is gone now. He was called a tiger in the streets, a lion in the streets, and yet he was supposed to be a Grand Secretary in one of the largest jurisdictions in North America. He was a paid employee of our Grand Lodge, and yet, when I go back, he visited more on paid free holiday than most Grand Masters got in the whole two years they were there. He stepped it up because he got enough weak Grand Masters and he walked in and did whatever he wanted to do without anybody telling him not to. These things happen and how do you ever correct them? When the pattern is set, it is very difficult to change.

Sometimes, what you have to do is take the bull by the horns and hang on.

It's no secret what I did the first day I was in office. They told me I was Grand Master, I went up and met with my Past Grand Masters. And you know what the first thing, the first thing I requested of my Past Grand Masters was? They were all there, wishing me well, and I asked them all, "Would you just sit down, I have a favor to ask you." My favor to ask them was, "Will each one of you gentlemen relinquish your chairmanship of whatever committee you're on?" Man you could have heard a pin drop. But they were 85 years old and one of them was 96. He had no idea of calling

five or six or ten meetings a year, but I had a lot of fellows out there of forty or fifty years old with a lot of fire in them and no way to let it grow. Every one of those Past Grand Masters relinquished his chairmanship and I can remember setting it up, I had it all organized before, hoping they would. I'd have died if they had said "No." But every one of them relinquished and I had fellows all lined up with agendas. One even had 60 points to work on, right off the bat. It takes cooperation sometimes in leadership. It's just not always going out and doing whatever you want to do.

It's something that has to start early. A Doctor is not born a Doctor, a lawyer is not born a lawyer, or a teacher, or an engineer from the day he is born till the day he dies, but somewhere in between birth and death he teaches himself or he is taught or he learns his skills, and it's no different

in a Masonic Lodge. When a man becomes Grand Master, or when a man becomes Master of his Lodge, he learns those skills somewhere, and they aren't all corporate executives when they walk up and sit in the Master's chair or in the Grand Master's chair. We've got truck drivers who have made exceptional masters. They worked harder than anybody to do it because they didn't know anything when they came in, but they knew that they could do it with work, and it takes extra work because they had no industrial or corporate skills coming in, but they served just beautifully. It's too late the day they put you in the chair as Worshipful Master and put the apron and the collar on you to know all the answers. It's impossible, you'll make a lousy Master.

In Ontario, one of the things we have found that let people down, and we'll go right back to basics, is what we call "the sponsor", the man that puts the man's name up to join our fraternity. They are failing us badly, and it's in our Constitution that we have to replace them with somebody, because we are losing everything we ever had, so we developed the "Mentors Program", and the "Mentors Program" is that each lodge, each of the 652 lodges in Ontario and even some of the lodges won't accept it, but they're there, so that they have prepared a set of questions and answers and after the Board of Inquiry has gone out and approved the man, they walk in and meet the family. They have these prepared questions and they read them after the first, second and third degrees, and they stay with the Mason for one year after he's had his Master Mason Degree, before he's parachuted up into the Shrine or up into the Scottish Rite or up into the York Rite and taken away before he's gotten some basics, before he can fly on his own two wings.

We train the man so he's gotten some good basic concepts, and then we let him go. Now, the Shrine doesn't like to hear that. The Scottish Rite doesn't like to hear that and neither does the York Rite, because they want to petition him right through to bolster their membership and what they get is half a Mason, and in four or five years down the line he takes the non-payment of dues and elects suspension and resignation, they wonder why. It's because he didn't have any basics. If you give a Mason basics, I don't care what happens you can't take that Masonry out of the man even if he does resign, if he's trained and he's taught and he's learned enough about the basics, the good tenets and principles that we all love. Some of us out here have taken ten years, maybe, to do what we can do in the "Mentors Program" in a year, because it's geared and sophisticated and organized for them.

So we are developing a base core of what we call "hardwood Masons" and that only gives the basics. We're starting to establish a solid base. It's a slow, slow program.

With officer training, I talked about when you become a Master, you know that you are a good leader. It starts at the Junior Steward's chair, the very first chair in most lodges. You don't just let him sit down on his duff and let him collect dust for a year, and walk around and, put on the coffee pot.

Give him a small lecture to do and organize it so that at every chair, right up to the Worshipful Master, he has got a different lecture in each degree. By the time he's there, it doesn't matter if John Jones, the great historian, great lecturer, doesn't show up, he can fill in because he's done them, and he knows what they are, and there's harmony and there's synchronization and there's continuity of the whole program the whole evening. We're advocating that the Senior Warden plan his year for 1990 and not wait until he's Worshipful Master. Plan your year now in 1989 for 1990 and some people will say you are going to usurp the power of the Worshipful Master. If the Worshipful Master is so weak and so pinheaded, if he can't stand to have a man planning his year for the next year, there's something wrong with the Worshipful Master. But you know, when the agenda is set by the Senior Warden a whole year ahead of time, he is constantly thinking about how to make his year the best when he gets to the Worshipful Master's chair.

Just before I leave the topic of leadership, let me tell you how I can spot an inept, an incapable and totally poor leader sitting in the Worshipful Master's chair. Let me see, if you've probably gone into the lodge some night and this has happened to you. The Worshipful Master will call on the Chairman of the Entertainment Committee, and the Entertainment Chairman says "I have nothing to report." That tells me nobody did their homework. If the Lodge Committee is so inactive, that tells me two things. It tells me that the Worshipful Master hasn't got his agenda ready and he hasn't conferred with that committee chairman prior to the lodge meeting. He has wasted my time sitting there. He has wasted the time of every person sitting there in that whole lodge. He has created a void in the whole situation and it is a boring situation if that happens two or three times in an evening, and it just tells me the Worshipful Master is not prepared in any way, shape or form to come up with that kind of an answer, nor is his Committee Chairman. It means he's sat on his duff and hasn't done anything or he should have gotten a report. Or, you might hear this scenario. A motion is passed on the floor of the Lodge and somebody makes an amendment to the motion and somebody makes an amendment to the amendment and the Worshipful Master has no idea of Parliamentary rules. He doesn't know which way to turn, so he goes to the Secretary and says "What do we do? Do we vote on the amendment, do we vote on the motion, do we vote on the amendment to the amendment?" They have no idea and every Worshipful Master should know parliamentary rules of procedure of a business meeting before he sits in the Worshipful Master's chair, or he is going to create a void, create some boredom in the lodge, because you'll look at that man and say "He doesn't know what he's up there for." But if he has it under control, it takes only two minutes to have that idea in your mind. They will respect

the man, but they will not respect him if he doesn't know what's going on.

Another way you can tell if a man is not a good Worshipful Master, he doesn't even recognize the people who work for him. His biggest pronoun, the biggest word he comes up with is the pronoun "I". He uses it so much that he thinks he is the only person in the lodge. Napoleon went right through Europe by just recognition. A little medal, a gold epaulet, and recognizing people for the work they did and calling them by name. If you have a lodge committee and you work with committee structure in your lodge, think about this. Expand your committee structure and in your monthly summons, place everybody that's on that particular committee and put the telephone number of the chairman there, so he is the direct contact, not your Worshipful Master. Eventually it will come back to the Worshipful Master, but that is one way that everyone will work and be recognized.

So much for leadership. My goodness gracious, you've heard it all before. It might be a little different twist that I put out, or it might be that I call a spade a spade, but how about poor attendance at a meeting. We all suffer. We know that we get only about ten percent of our members out, maybe fifteen on a big night. With free food we might get twenty percent. Why? Why? You and I love our lodge. I'm talking to the wrong group. I'm talking to the fifteen percent out here. But why are our meetings that bad that we love it so much and we will go out three and four night a week! Why is it that people stop coming? Why can't we interest them and why can't we entice our members to attend? Are your meetings boring, uninteresting, or do you just set up meetings for degree mills? Is that what you want, one degree after another, second, first, third? And just day after day that's the only thing you've got on your mind as Worshipful Master is to put a degree mill out? I don't want to go to lodge if I have to sit there every night and listen to a degree. I've seen ten thousand of them and it gets darn boring to see them, unless they're beautifully rehearsed and practiced and absolutely a work of art, but for somebody who gets up there and tries to stumble through degree work for people who go time and time again, that's why you don't have a big attendance. But that's not the only reason, The same old stuff, the same old routine will drive anybody crazy.

Well, Worshipful Masters, maybe try this, also the Senior Wardens out there, try this. Invite to your home, in the warmth and hospitality of your own home every officer of that lodge and his wife for a full course dinner some evening. And then, when you have some recommendations and some plans that have originated out of this little discourse over coffee, then activate those plans. You will not only get something creative coming into your lives, but you're going to cement a think bond between your lodge officers because you invited them to your home and you have shown them the respect, warmth and hospitality of your home, and that will form a catalytic seed, a little growth pattern to make your lodge stronger from the beginning, and at least you'll have eight or ten people every meeting and it won't be like some jurisdictions where they can't even make a quorum. You at least have the catalytic seed of those officers and then you can expand from there. Just little ideas, perhaps.

I have gone to lodges, and I'm thoroughly appalled at what happens. The

Jones' sit on this side and the Smiths and the Poys are on that side. What is it, the feudin mountain boys? There are clicques over here and clicques over there and it's happened over the years, or the old guys sit over there and the young guys sit over here and there's no melding, and you wonder what's going on. This is a Fraternity of Brotherhood. Clearly, it's your problem because what you could do to alleviate that, is, you could use the very same host principle that you use in your own home. When somebody comes visiting you on Saturday night, you hear a knock on the door and you don't bother coming downstairs, you just let them walk in, go into the living room, wherever, sit down and chew the fat with whoever is there. You don't do that. You go to the door and you greet the people who knocked on your door, or who came through your front door, and shake their hands. We could do exactly the same thing in Masonry. Worshipful Master, appoint at least two members, maybe have another couple backups, an older senior member of the lodge who will know all the older members coming in and a younger member who knows all the younger men by name. Give them a little Committee badge. When the Masons come into your meeting, they are greeted with a handshake and a welcome to the lodge. "I'm glad you came tonight". You do the same thing in your own home, but you don't do it in lodge. And the other thing you don't do, some of you may, I'm sorry, but many don't, when the evening is completed and as the Master closes down his lodge and the volume of the sacred law is closed for the evening, just take a minute, Worshipful Master and you ask the brothers to be attentive and relax a few minutes while the Worshipful Master and the Senior and Junior Warden position themselves at the exit doors to your lodge and you bid everybody "Good night", with a little handshake. Might take you five minutes. But you thank them and it's the same host principle you use in your own home and you catch everybody before they go up for doughnuts and coffee. It's not everybody who goes up for doughnuts and coffee.

I want to talk about doughnuts and coffee. Man, that's the instrument with the hole in it. I'll get to that in a minute. I'm going to get it now. Don't ever serve me doughnuts and coffee! I've eaten so many doughnuts and drunk so much coffee that I've got a hole in my head. I used to work on a Railroad at one time. I worked there for twenty years. My wife, God bless her, served me bacon and eggs for supper one time and I threw them in the sink. I said, "Honey, I've eaten too many eggs and too much bacon". It's the only thing you can keep on a steam engine, was eggs and bacon, they never rotted. I've eaten so many dozens and pounds of the stuff I threw them in the sink., I made her cry, but I never got them again. They know enough in Ontario, if they've got me coming over you don't serve doughnuts and coffee. That is the most poorly planned lunch you could give to anybody. It's the dumbest thing you can do, to walk to Kinney Hortons and pick up two or three dozen doughnuts and somebody throws a pot of coffee on. That is no way, because you know how much of that time is wasted? The social hour takes up one third of every Masonic meeting, because, if you're a good leader and a good Worshipful Master, you get in and out of there, your business meeting, your degrees and everything could be done in two hours and I don't think it's any different in the States than it is in Canada. You are usually there for three hours. You'll go upstairs or downstairs

or wherever you go to your social hour for a third of that whole Masonic night, and, Worshipful Master, do you leave that up to the Junior Warden or do you take part of the planning of the third of your Masonic meeting? You are the Worshipful Master and you are the leader. Who does it, the Junior Warden? Whatever he can do, and if he's not financed properly and a lot of you fellows don't pre-finance him, he has to take it out of his own pocket and then get it from somebody else, so all he can afford is doughnuts and coffee. So, Worshipful Master, you're failing the boys, because that social hour is as important to me as any part, because that's where fellowship and fun is, in the third of that meeting, that social hour. And that is maybe some of the reasons why you have poor attendance.

What can you do to alleviate it? Why not a pre-lodge dinner? Charge the boys a couple of bucks, but advertise it. You have to advertise it or you'll fall on your face. Any why not a gourmet meal? Surely you have people who could put something up. You're sitting here. You invited me to a lobster feed. Now you guys might not think anything of that. You told me I was going to get a pound of lobster in my social hour. Man, I'd be at every meeting you invited me to, for a while. Now, if you came North, I'd probably feed you beaver, and I would, and for some of you guys with no hair, I'd cut the little part that slips over the log last and I'd wet it up and I'd run a little salve on it, and man, your hair would all start to grow again. You'd smell like the inside of a diaper, but you'd go to be great. That's what I'd serve you, and if you weren't good guys, I'd serve you the beaver casters and I'd eat the rest. But these are some of the things you can do. Plan that hour. That's the most important part for many people that come out and see degrees, degrees, degrees.

What about a speaker? You think that Masons are the only people you have to get for that service. How about those guys in the Knights of Columbus?

Maybe he's got problems in the Knights of Columbus that parallel yours and help you. Get him and get his views on it. You're not holding open lodge, it's only a little banquet area. How about a woman? Me and you guys, you listen to them all the time, all day long. Why don't you find out what's happening upstairs? They might tell you secrets you didn't even know. You might bring some stuff home and your wife would say "Where did you hear that?" Don't tell them. Talk to your town fathers, talk to some of the teenagers, to some of the kids who might have run through drug problems, and you've got about 23 or 24 lodges in the United States right now who are all behind the drug program. Get it first hand. Well, that's maybe for holding people in the lodge.

How do you hold the old fellows? Oh, you and I, how do you keep us from demitting, resignations, demits, suspension, non-payment of dues? I use, and my recommendations to you are, our lodges have basic, ethical principles that are used in every business in the United States and Canada, Invoicing. And a lot of lodges shy away from it. They say "No, this is a voluntary organization and we won't invoice". What's wrong with invoicing? It works in business, and everyone of you fellows wouldn't pay unless you got an invoice. And so I've advocated that every lodge in Ontario invoice, with colored paper and colored envelopes. Mark it "PERSONAL".

Put a little Chanel Number Five on it. The old lady will open it if you don't.

It'll work, but it's just a basic ethical principle, and you know what happens. Normally, and this is what you fellows do, I'll bet you, you write on your lodge summons, dues, dues, dues, your dues are not paid. Well, you look at your dues card and see if you're paid up. That's a bunch of baloney. The onus isn't on the man, the onus is on the Treasurer, or whoever looks after your finances, to pick the money up. You don't. You don't do this in business. The man who sold you something doesn't say to you "Will you have a look and see if you owe me any money?" It's ridiculous, and yet we do it in Masonry. Now one thing we do in Ontario, we run it through the summons one or two months and then we'll start invoicing and date it and age it and color it. Then we have the Worshipful Master organize one or two people and we don't ask the secretary and we don't ask the treasurer, and let's place experts in that field. To walk up to somebody and ask them for money is a very, very personal item and it's something that requires some expertise and training and diplomacy and not everybody, just because he's a secretary or treasurer has that. And so those particular people should be trained to do that particular job and surely, in every lodge, you've got collection people or somebody who can help you out. And then you go and interview the person, and you don't walk in and say "Pay your dues!". You may find out that that man is between a rock and a hard place, and he can't pay his dues. Then maybe he should have benevolence out of your

lodge and forget his dues for a year. You'll learn more about your membership if you get cracking on it and don't let it run for two, three or four years till he's so embarrassed he doesn't want to pay. And then, finally, after 120 days, you might send him a registered letter and then you'll know that the letter gets to him, and what we do sometimes we even send a letter from the Grand Master and make sure we've applied all avenues so that the man can't relinquish. This is how we've sort of saved some members. One lodge in Toronto had eight members they were going to suspend and by the time the final point came around we lost only two out of the eight. But we lose 1830 some a year and if we can save 90% of them, our statistics will just reverse, and we'll start back up, and that will be good for everybody's spirit in Masonry. I'm just about done. Remember, if it gets too tough on you where to go and I don't want to see you move. He'll do it, just to embarrass me. I know he will, "No Bill, I'm just kidding." All right, let's talk just a minute more. Have I got a minute? I'm on page 83 and I've only got page 84 to go. I'm all set.

Brethren, how do you attract new members? Your rules, I'm sure, are exactly the same as ours. We have the old proper and improper solicitation. We've talked about this since we've been Masons from day one. We circumvented that idea of improper solicitation in our jurisdiction. Scotland has been doing that for some thirty years, and it's simply that if you see somebody who has moral character and ability, who you think would make a good Mason, we can at least tell him that we're alive and alert in the community and, you know we're here, and by so doing, we then present him with a few pamphlets. We have some on what our charitable organizations do and benevolence. What is Freemasonry, a little bit of history, a little bit

of one thing and another, but we have a book called "The Guidelines of Freemasonry" and it's the idea of proper and improper solicitation circumvented, and by so doing we are picking up all kinds of people, and they don't feel, when they're taking their obligation, they don't feel that they're telling a lie when they say that they're coming of their own free will and accord, because they did. We only mention it once and then we never, never, never, never badger them. It makes the choice up to him after he has some information.

Bellamy wrote your Pledge of Allegiance. He was an American, he wasn't a Canadian, so we don't have it. And I know, every time you meet, you pledge allegiance of the Flag. I know that. We're not unpatriotic in Canada, but we don't have allegiance to the flag. Some of you know that. What we have here is the Square and Compass, but over the last hundred years, every Tom, Dick and Harry decided that the square and compass of his design to be the one that he'd have. There's no trademark in Masonry. Did I say "Dentistry?" I have it in the back of my head. There's no trademark on the square and compass anywhere in North America. And through the courts of law, it doesn't hold up. We've been here since time immemorial almost, but there is no square and compass that's universal, not one. Why don't we unite and have one square and compass design? Instead, we have every Tom, Dick and Harry make his own design and put it on his own Lodge Summons. So this year our Grand Lodge consists of 93,000 people. Next year the Masons in Ontario do not have a choice on what square and compass they're going to use. They're going to use the one the Grand Lodge puts out. If they don't like it, tough bananas, but try and get a franchise for McDonald, you don't like the twin yellow arches, you don't like them you don't get the franchise. It's the same thing with us. You don't like the square and compass design, too bad, use it anyway. That's pretty strong leadership, but it's about time somebody said "Let's get organized together and unify ourselves. "Wouldn't it be super if all 50 states and ten provinces on this part of the ocean, used the same square and compass? And the one that we're using. I don't know which came first, the chicken or the egg. Iowa uses it. Vermont uses it. Saskatchewan, Quebec is just advocating it right now, and Manitoba and Alberta. Illinois is using it on some, and the square and compass you are using in Maine is not that far from ours. Wouldn't it be super if we could use the same square and compass throughout the whole World? At least we'd be unified under one common logo. And then, when some beer company in Europe decides to use the square and compass, they wouldn't have the balls to do it, because there would be five million people using that one design.

When you fellows go to lodge, what do you do, grab your little black case and zoom in the front door? Why don't you, someday, park your car across from your lodge and have a look at it. Unless we have a look at our lodge and the landscaping and the grounds, have a look at it and say to yourself, "Would my son develop a thrust or a will of joining this particular building and devoting three or four weeks of net income to pay the initiation dues? Is the building that enticing? Does it have enough enhancement? What kind of Masonic Real Estate do you have, or is it a dump? Is it something that your great grandfather built 150 years ago and none of you has put a

coat of paint on it since"? So we have really pushed Lodge enhancement in Ontario this year. And instead of our working tools in the first degree being the 24" gage, the common gavel and the chisel, not any more they're not, they're the paint brush, and the pipe wrench and the vacuum cleaner. And it's working. We've got enhancement certificates for fellows out there who are doing something about it, and it's working. We are attracting people. Community image, they call it. Public Relations, Public image. We're enhancing it at every lodge. There's a host of travelers coming through our highways and byways. We're putting test sites up now for community entrance signs. We don't put them on the Service Club boards, because we're not a Service Club. Someone told me that a long time ago and I believed them. I don't know why, I don't see anything wrong with Service Clubs, but we don't put them on there. We put them up individually that there's a Masonic Lodge and the same square and compass is on the Lodge sign, our Lodge Communication material and on the entrance sign. It's all uniform, it's all standard throughout Ontario. We'll have them all placed in another month, we subsidize the signs in Grand Lodge. We subsidize the signs because we now have 70 signs subsidized for 380 Lodge buildings in Ontario. And there's a notice or motion going through that by July, by 1994, every lodge in Ontario must have the same standard sign, same lettering, same square and compass, illuminated from dusk till dark, seven days a week, and people living in the Community can't say "We don't know if there's a Masonic Lodge in your village, or your City." Everybody who walks by will see that sign illuminated and we're advocating flagpoles and all other kinds of things and don't think I'm copying that from Americans, because I said every lodge in Ontario should have a Canadian Flag, an Ontario ensign for the Province, and if you're within sixty miles of the United States border, the Stars and Stripes to show that we are all in this together.

It is a genuine pleasure to talk to you people tonight. I was here four years ago when I was Deputy Grand Master. It is a pleasure to come and it is a pleasure to meet your Grand Master and Dolly and develop a friendship, a friendship I picked up mostly with people at the head table.

I don't know you fellows. I hope later on maybe we can talk a little. I hope you are sympathetic to some of these ideas, and I know you are. You've been a kind audience, but remember this, Masonry is a Brotherhood, and never forget that fact. We've talked about displacing treasures. We've talked about displacing secretaries. I don't mean to purge everything like they do in Russia. I'm just saying, diplomatically have a good look at it, and maybe change, not for change sake alone, but for progressive sake, and don't be afraid to try something different, and don't be discouraged if you buck headwinds every time you come up against anybody. Change you must, just to make sure that Masonry perpetuates. You have to instill that enthusiasm. You have to instill that motivation and you have to use participation and cooperation and recognition of your brothers who are working so hard for you. And when you change, don't step on hands and try to make yourself up one more rung on the ladder. I usually wind up one of my little talks by saying, "we may not have it all together, but together we have it all." And I have one other. Two skeletons were in a closet. It was a musty

closet. It was a terrible closet, and one skeleton said to the other, "If I had any guts I'd get the Hell out here." Thank you Brothers.

The Brethren responded with a standing ovation of great magnitude.

The Grand Master thanked Grand Master Pellow for the excellent talk. He then asked the District Deputy Grand Masters and the District Representatives to stand and thanked them for their outstanding work during the year past.

The Reverend Edward Fenderson then gave his usual beautiful benediction to close the evening and wish us a safe journey to our various destinations.

TO THE MOST WORSHIPFUL GRAND LODGE OF MAINE:

Once again I feel honored to submit my report of the Grand Secretary for the fiscal year 1988-1989.

It has been an exciting and productive year; specifically, the several procurements and subsequent accomplishments that could conceivably provide substantive services and cost savings to the individual lodges.

Our Finance Committee has seen their advance planning materialize. A computer system, budgeted for in previous years, has been purchased, installed and operational.

The Grand Lodge Membership list was purged and updated. All additions, deletions, address changes, etc., are now entered daily. We now have the capability to sort and distribute Grand Lodge alphabetized membership by lodge number and zip code, 50, 60, 70 year service, blood donors' records, etc. The program will include the complete Masonic biography for each brother including: N.P.D., suspensions, expulsions, reinstatements, dual membership and extraneous information such as home phone number, social security number, occupation, etc.

The listing by zip code will enable Grand Lodge to alert lodges to the names and addresses of every Mason living in their area a terrific breakthrough for our "Sojourner's Teams". Several jurisdictions have mailed their names to us and we shall contact these sojourning brethren.

As to our data base we now access the computer directly from the reports sent in by lodges after each lodge meeting. Thus we are able to expend significantly less time providing information.

This system will generate all labels needed for Grand Lodge mailings. It will also provide labels to individual lodges. The Grand Lodge is now able to provide dues cards for all its members. We could conceivably reduce the lodges' dues card cost.

Desk Top Publishing and Word Processing equipment has been identified, procurement justified and authorized. Personnel training and equipment "software" has been offered by our Sr. Grand Warden. We now have an opportunity to expand our "in house" publishing capability. Publication of our Annual Proceedings, camera-ready copy for our Maine Mason, miscellaneous booklets and manuals are now within our immediate reach. The cost saving potential is realistic and achievable.

To the Grand Lodge of Maryland, Grand Secretary R.W. Jack Frazier and his staff, R.W. George Pulkkinen, the "prime mover", and our own Leslie Roy, we acknowledge and honor their immeasurable contributions. Truly an outstanding demonstration of cooperation and dedication by all.

In conclusion and by no means less vital to our total office responsibilities, I would be remiss if I didn't acknowledge the time, effort and frustrations of Lois, Julie and Arline in bringing us through their first Annual Communication with its mass of paper, reports, supplies, requests, multiple directives, etc., etc. To Blanche for the tenacity and determination in mastering the "Gremlin" in the Computer. With Bruce as our mainstay - how can we lose. We are extremely fortunate in assembling this great team.

REPORT OF CLYDE L. FERRIS EXECUTIVE OFFICER IN MAINE ORDER OF DEMOLAY

TO: THE MOST WORSHIPFUL GRAND LODGE OF MAINE:

It is a real pleasure to give this report to the Grand Lodge of Maine, as this has been another successful year for Maine DeMolay and the year 1989-1990 has promises of being another banner year, not only in having many successful programs, but also appears that we will have another net gain in membership.

I am happy to report that we now have 13 active chapters and each one of them are bringing in new members. We have just re-activated Capital City Chapter in Augusta after several years of inactivity, due to the lack of Advisors. Our Director of Membership and Assistant Executive Office, Jim Buss has been working very hard the past two years trying to re-activate this chapter and has finally succeeded.

We have re-activated or started at least one chapter each year in the past five years and are working on several other areas throughout the Jurisdiction of Maine to re-activate chapters or start new chapters.

Within the past two weeks, we have just held two of our most popular projects that were both very successful. On Saturday night, April 22nd, we held our DeMolay State Sweetheart Pageant with 9 contestants representing 9 DeMolay Chapters and the new DeMolay State Sweetheart is Miss Elizabeth Hathaway of Augusta, representing Capital City Chapter, which is the chapter we just re-activated. The first runner-up was Miss Genevieve Smith representing Houlton Chapter.

We held our State Basketball Tournament this past week-end at Hampden Academy and it also was very successful. Bangor Chapter won the Class B Championship and Acadia Chapter of Winter Harbor was the Class C winner. Our newly reactivated chapter, Capital City Chapter of Augusta was awarded the Sportsmanship Trophy.

Maine DeMolay had a big week-end on March 3rd & 4th. We held a Grand Masters week-end. Our Grand Master of DeMolay, Robert F. Hannon of Tuscon, Arizona was in Maine for our Grand Masters State Membership Class. On Friday evening, March 3rd, our Most Worshipful Grand Master John E. Anagnostis received the Honorary Legion of Honor Degree, which is the highest honor a Mason, who is not a Senior DeMolay can receive for performing unusual and meritorious service in behalf of the Order of DeMolay, or who has evidenced a spirit of cooperation and appreciation for the Order of DeMolay. On Saturday, March 4th, we held the Grand Masters State Membership Class honoring both Grand Masters of DeMolay and Maine Masons by naming the Class after them. We took in 18 new members on this exciting day.

Our State Master Councilor, Matthew M. Ryder, which you heard from earlier in this Grand Lodge has done an outstanding job this year in leading Maine DeMolay. Anah Temple just had their first DeMolay Brunch last Sunday and it appears that it was successful for the first year. It is hoped this will be an annual Brunch also. As the cost of everything continues to increase, we must look for other avenues to raise funds to support Maine DeMolay.

The State Officers and several local chapters have performed for local Lodges and Eastern Star Chapters and these young men of DeMolay are very impressive in their DeMolay ritual work. They do an outstanding job and many times, I have heard a Mason state that they sometimes put us to shame. If you have never seen any DeMolay ritual work done, you owe it to yourselves to visit a DeMolay Chapter and witness their beautiful work. If your lodge would like to have the DeMolays do some work sometime, let me know and we will be there.

Brethren, Maine DeMolay is doing just great. Our speaker at Monday night's banquet said he is excited at what's happening in Masonry in Ontario. Well, Brethren, I am really excited at what's happening in Maine DeMolay. We now have over 500 DeMolays and over 100 Advisors. By the end of this year, I predict that we will have close to 600 DeMolays and we could use another 100 Advisors. We hope to start at least 3 more new chapters during 1989 and could do even better if we had more manpower from the Masonic Fraternity.

We certainly appreciate the Masonic support your lodges are giving us, but we could do even better if you could give us more manpower. There are young men throughout the State of Maine that need DeMolay. Drugs and other things are pulling them the other way. Help Maine DeMolay pull these young men away from drugs. Give them an "Invitation with A Promise," and help us LEAD THE WAY WITH DEMOLAY.

FRATERNAL RELATIONS

M.W. Charles R. Glassmire, for the Committee on Fraternal Relations, presented the Annual Correspondence Report consisting of a Foreword, Special Report and Recommendations. It was voted that the Reports be accepted and the recommendations adopted. They are printed with the reviews as an Appendix to the Proceedings.

A Brother asked about Prince Hall or Black Masonry and M.W. Glassmire answered at length about the relations of Prince Hall Masonry to Freemasonry. He explained that Prince Hall Masons did not want to join our branch of Masonry, but wished to be recognized as a legitimate Grand Lodge. Since there can be but one Grand Lodge in any State, this was not possible. Many states are on friendly terms with Prince Hall Masonry and their leaders are invited to many social functions.

The Grand Master then invited M.W. Thomas R. Dougherty, Director of Hospital Visitation for the Masonic Service Association, to the East. M.W. Dougherty commented on the excellent job we are doing here in Maine for our Brethren in The Veterans Administration Hospital at Togus. He also told a story of the assistance given by the employees of the Masonic Service Association to a stranded widow of a Mason, who, with her three children, had met with misfortune on the trip south after her husband's death. He then asked R.W. Edwin V. George to approach the East, and presented him with a plaque in appreciation of his service to the Veterans. Brother George was deeply moved and thanked M.W. Brother Dougherty. The Communication responded with a standing ovation.

ANNOUNCEMENTS

The Grand Master announced there would be a luncheon in the Dining Hall in the basement for all those who bought tickets last night and this morning, as well as our guests.

The Annual Meeting of the Maine District Deputies Association will be held in Boody Hall, on the second floor, at 12:45 P.M.

The Grand Lodge was then called from Labor to Refreshment until 1:30 P.M., closing prayer being offered by Grand Chaplain, the Rev. Edward L. Fenderson.

FIRST DAY - AFTERNOON

At 1:30 P.M. the Grand Master introduced Madonna Flanders, a representative of the Maine Department of Education, who has been working with our Program of Drug and Alcohol Abuse Prevention. She spoke to us as follows:

MADONNA FLANDERS

It is a sincere pleasure for me to speak again to this esteemed body. I have been asked to provide you with an update on the fine work being done through the Maine Masonic Foundation for the Prevention of Drug and Alcohol Abuse Among Children. A great deal has been accomplished since last year when I spoke to you.

Beginning with the bottom line...over \$100,000 has been committed to prevention efforts by this fraternal order! Now let me tell you the ways in which that money is contributing to programs.

Since the school year started, there have been four regional workshops to train school personnel so they can teach children refusal skills. Refusal skills is a program that helps children learn how to say no to drug use or other potentially harmful behavior. I think we all know that it is no easy thing to "just say no" as the national campaign suggests. Kids need to have a way to say no that will help them to keep their friends and stay safe...and that requires particular skills.

The workshops on refusal skills have been held in Portland, Ellsworth, Augusta and this week in Caribou. Over 128 individuals from 64 schools have participated in them. Masonic funds have covered the cost for participant rooms and meals at each workshop, a cost that otherwise would have been the responsibility of local schools. Masonic representatives at the workshops have spoken briefly on the commitment of Freemasons to help with alcohol and drug prevention programs.

Last fall, your drug and alcohol committee determined that it would provide financial assistance directly to schools for program materials and expenses and for staff development costs. Over fifty (50) schools applied for and received financial assistance grants ranging from \$300 to \$3,500. The grants are being used for a variety of specific purposes to support alcohol and drug prevention programs. I would like to give you a sampling of the communities throughout the state who have received grants and the ways in which they are being used.

Alcohol and drug curriculum materials for classroom instruction throughout grades kindergarten through 12 are being purchased in 28 school systems, including Houlton, Islesboro, Damariscotta, Rangeley, Hampden, Durham, China, Gray and Old Orchard. Several different types of instructional programs are being purchased for use including one that establishes a strong partnership between schools and local law enforcement agencies.

In 11 schools, your funds are being used to support programs such as teacher inservice workshops, student alcohol/drug awareness, resource materials on alcohol and drugs, and special speakers for awareness programs. Fort Fairfield, Easton, Hermon, Westbrook and Saco are among the schools grateful for this assistance.

Six schools, including Lewiston, Dexter, Readfield, and Augusta, are able to provide some much needed counseling services for students with problems related to alcohol and drug use thanks to these funds.

And 18 individuals from 10 schools will be attending either the New England Summer School on Alcohol Studies or the Rutgers Summer School on Alcohol and Drug Studies with scholarships for their tuition from the Masonic Foundation. These summer programs will enhance the skills and knowledge of people who are playing key roles in school programs.

I have heard many comments from school people about the impact of the assistance from the Masonic Foundation. I would like to share a few of them with you.

Isleboro: There will be far reaching benefits for all the children in our school from the curriculum we'll be able to purchase and use. We couldn't have done this without the financial assistance from the Masonic Foundation.

Mexico: It is through efforts such as the Masonic Foundation's that prevention of alcohol and drug abuse can be established. I applaud you.

Kittery: Your support will significantly contribute to the growth and development of the prevention program we have started, because it will enable all Kittery students and their parents to have access to this information.

Belfast: It is an inspiration to see groups like the Freemasons so visibly supporting those of us who are daily working on the problem of alcohol and drug abuse. It truly helps us to keep on day by day.

And finally, on behalf of the Division of Alcohol and Drug Education Services, let me say that the many individual contributions that Freemasons throughout the state are making to this cause are having a far-reaching effect on school prevention programs state-wide. We are very grateful for your dedication to this cause and for the opportunity to work with you.

Her talk was greeted with a standing ovation from the brethren. M.W. Ernest H. Curtis then presented her with a Certificate of Appreciation from the Grand Lodge of Maine for her efforts in this program.

The Grand Lodge was then called from Refreshment to Labor by the Grand Master, prayer being offered by Rev. Maurice Amnot, Grand Chaplain.

The Grand Master then thanked the Brethren who had come to him during the noon hour to express their thanks for being a Mason and for the work the Grand Lodge is doing in the Drug and Alcohol Abuse Prevention Program. He also thanked the sound men, the maintenance men and the Scottish Rite for the use of the Scottish Rite Auditorium.

The Grand Master then asked M.W. Philip L. Hall, Grand Master of New Hampshire, to respond for the visiting brethren. M.W. Hall then thanked the Grand Master and the Grand Lodge for their hospitality on behalf of the out-of-state guests, and commented on the pleasant relationship which exists between the Grand Lodge of Maine and the Grand Lodge of New Hampshire. He also related the incident when our Grand Master was spread eagled and frisked by the Secret Service men in the White House last year because of an electronic tie he was wearing which played music when touched. M.W. Hall's talk was greeted by much applause from the brethren.

DISTRIBUTION OF THE CHARITY FUND

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine:

Once again your Committee on Distribution for the Trustees of the Grand Lodge Charitable Foundation has attended to its duties and herewith submits the following report.

For the year ending March 31, 1989 the committee received 68 applications for relief, of which all were acted upon. Four more are being held for further information.

The total amount of assistance granted for the past year from the relief fund is \$143,110.74 to 56 lodges. Twelve lodges requested aid more than once and in two of these cases the request was a second request for the same person. The 68 applications approved for the year 1988-1989 averaged \$2104.00 as compared to \$2295.00 for the previous year.

Again this year our contributions to Masonic related bodies include:

\$3000.00	to the DeMolay & Pine Tree Youth Foundation
\$7500.00	plus dues of \$1885.68 to the Masonic Service Assn.
\$400.00	to the Maine Blood Bank Program
\$26,000.00	to the Grand Lodge Scholarship Program
\$5000.00	to the Program for the Prevention of Drug and Alcohol Abuse
\$100.00	for the victims of the Armenian earthquake
\$1000.00	to the Salvation Army
\$5000.00	toward the cost of installing a computer in the Grand Lodge office

In addition \$320.00 was expended for the payment of veteran's dues to eight lodges for worthy brethren who were unable to meet this obligation.

It is of interest to note that of the 168 lodges that reported having a lodge charity fund last year, 75 reported a distribution of \$96,494.00 from lodge funds. Some 15 years ago 150 lodges reported having a charity fund and of these 76 granted assistance in the amount of \$31,000. When adding to the amount of \$96,000.00 given this year by the 75 lodges, aid to widows and brethren in the form of snow removal, lawn care, wood chopping, etc., it becomes apparent that the total package of help to our brethren exceeds a quarter of a million dollars.

Your Grand Lodge and Masonry as a whole can be proud of the many contributions to our brethren in need of help.

Again this year it is a pleasure to report contributions to our relief fund from appendant bodies as follows:

Brethren:

It is with deep sorrow that we are called upon to announce the deaths of three Past Grand Lodge officers of the Grand Lodge of Maine since May 1, 1988.

R.W. CHARLES ANDERSON DUNCAN was born at Lincolnville, Maine on October 10, 1904, son of Henry W. and Elizabeth (Merritt) Duncan. He died December 26, 1988 at Waterville, Maine, at the age of 84.

He graduated from Camden High School in 1922 and in 1927 married Edith M. Brooks. They had no children. He was a textile worker from 1923-1940; a carpenter and cabinet maker from 1940-1962; and a construction foreman from 1962-1966.

He was made a Master Mason in Aurora Lodge No. 50 on April 14,

1943 and was Worshipful Master in 1949. He was exalted in King Solomon's Chapter No. 8, Royal Arch Masons, April 13, 1944, of which he was High Priest.

On November 15, 1948, he was knighted in Claremont Commandery No. 8, and was a past Eminent Commander, serving in 1953. He became a member of Maine Consistory 32d Degree of Portland on May 17, 1945.

He was greeted as a Royal and Select Master in King Hiram Council No. 6, November 3, 1944, and was a past Illustrious Master in 1951.

R.W. Duncan served the Grand Lodge of Maine as District Deputy Grand Master 1960-61, and as Jr. Grand Warden in 1965. He became a member of the Maine Past Officers Association in 1953. He was a member of Chalcedon Conclave, Knights of the Red Cross of Constantine, and of the Maine Council, Order of High Priesthood.

M.W. LEON MELVILLE SANBORN was born in Standish, Maine, February 26, 1905, son of Fred B. and Mary Owen Sanborn. He died on January 27, 1989, at Portland, Maine. He was a graduate of Standish High School and a 1927 graduate of the University of Maine at Orono.

He was principal of high schools until 1932, a salesman for National Casket Company for eleven years, and was vice president of the York Mutual Insurance Company of Maine, retiring in 1975. He was a state legislator representing Gorham for six years, and for four years served on the governor's executive council. He was appointed a *dedimus* justice and he served in this capacity until the time of his death.

In Standish Lodge No. 70 on June 24, 1926, he was made a Master Mason and was Worshipful Master in 1942. His activities in Grand Lodge started with the appointment as Grand Steward 1943, District Deputy Grand Master 1944-45, Deputy Grand Master 1958-59 and Grand Master 1960-61. He was a Grand Representative of the Grand Lodge of Illinois near the Grand Lodge of Maine. He served as a Trustee of Grand Lodge Charity Fund and was a member of the Investment Committee. He received the Josiah Hayden Drummond Distinguished Service Medal May 3, 1962, and was presented his Fifty-year Veteran's Medal January 22, 1977, by M.W. M. Donald Gardner. Exalted in Eagle Chapter No. 11, Westbrook, Maine, May 17, 1943, he became High Priest in 1948. He was a member of Maine Council - Order of High Priesthood.

He was greeted as a Royal and Select Master in Westbrook Council No. 15, March 21, 1945.

On January 24, 1944, he was knighted in Portland Commandery No. 2, Knights Templar. He was a past sovereign of Maine Conclave No. 1, Knights of the Red Cross of Constantine and a past Grand Sovereign of the Imperial Council of Maine, Knights of the Red Cross of Constantine.

In the Scottish Rite, he was a member of the Valley of Portland and Maine Consistory, Past Thrice Potent Master of Yates Lodge of Perfection, Past Commander in Chief of Maine Consistory, and was crowned an honorary member of the Supreme Council, 33d Degree in 1967.

He was a member of Kora Temple Shrine, Lewiston, Maine.

His wife, Lena Burnham Sanborn, died in 1985. He is survived by a sister, Louise S. Gray of Standish.

A funeral service was held at 2:00 p.m., Tuesday, January 31, at the First Congregational Church, Gorham, Maine. A Masonic Memorial Service was held Monday evening, January 30, at Neal York Funeral Home, Gorham.

M.W. HARLAN FORREST SMALL was born in Bar Harbor, Maine September 27, 1922, son of Irving W. and Geneva M. (Turner) Small. He died on January 25, 1989, at Bangor, Maine. He was a graduate of Milbridge High School, attended the University of Maine, graduated from the Bangor Theological Seminary and has served as a student pastor at the Milford Congregational Church (U.C.C.).

He was employed as a buyer at Freese's Department Store and was later employed by the Norman E. Whitney Co., Inc. of which he was a partner, retiring in 1986.

He was a member of the Grace Methodist Church and served on numerous church committees.

In St. Andrew's Lodge No. 83 on May 2, 1947, he was made a Master Mason and was Worshipful Master in 1970. His activities in Grand Lodge started with the appointment as Asst. Grand Lecturer 1972-1974; Deputy Grand Master 1978-1979; Grand Master 1980-1981. He was a member of the Committee for Masonic Education and Lodge Services for many years. He received the Josiah Hayden Drummond Distinguished Service Medal May 4, 1977.

He was exalted in Mount Moriah Chapter No. 6, Royal Arch Masons, May 31, 1951, of which he was Past High Priest.

He was greeted as a Royal and Select Master in Bangor Council No. 5, December 9, 1961, and was a past Illustrious Master.

On October 22, 1951, he was knighted in St. John's Commandery No. 3, Knights Templar, served as Prelate and was a past Eminent Commander. He was a member of Tamerlane Conclave, Knights of the Red Cross of Constantine, member of Grand Commandery Committee on Religious Activities and the Past Commanders Association of Maine.

He was a member of the Scottish Rite Bodies, Valley of Bangor, and a past Most Wise Master of the Bangor Chapter of Rose Croix, a member of Maine Consistory 32d Degree of Portland, past Commander in Chief of the Maine Consistory, honorary member of the Supreme Council 33d Degree, September 24, 1975.

A member of the Anah Temple Shrine, he had served as the active potentate for the Academicians.

He was a member and Past Patron of Tuscan Chapter No. 148, O.E.S., of Bangor, Bangor/Brewer Shrine Club, a past president of the Bangor Triangle Club, a board member of the Masonic Temple Association of Bangor, the Philalethes Society, Royal Order of Scotland.

In Bangor he was a member and past King Lion of the Lion's Club, a member of the Penobscot County Conservation Association and the Salvation Army.

He is survived by his wife, Elaine M. (Whitney) Small of Bangor, four children, Dawn (Small) Lay of Bangor, David W. Small of Old Town, Debra M. Small and Norman W. Small, both of Bangor, five grandchildren,

two brothers, Gerald T. Small of South Portland and Dr. Lawrence Small of Billings, Montana, nieces and nephews.

Funeral and Masonic services were held at 11:00 a.m., Saturday, January 28, at the Grace Methodist Church, Bangor.

This year's numerical loss of 860 is higher than last year, the percentage being 2.48.

At the close of the calendar year, the total membership was 33,782. Twenty-nine lodges reported a gain in membership, 149 a loss and 20 remained the same.

Hiram Lodge No. 180 remains the largest, with a membership of 719. Naskeag No. 171 remains the smallest with 43 members. Arundel No. 76 reported the largest gain (8) while Triangle No. 1 suffered the greatest loss (47). Average membership is 169 and 59 lodges report fewer than 100 members.

MAINE MASONIC FOUNDATION FOR THE PREVENTION OF DRUG AND ALCOHOL ABUSE AMONG CHILDREN REPORT

TO: THE MOST WORSHIPFUL GRAND LODGE OF MAINE:

During the past two years, The Maine Masonic Foundation for the Prevention of Drug and Alcohol Abuse Among Children has come a long ways. It was determined at the start that whatever we did in this project should be a total commitment of the entire membership of the Masons of Maine. There were to be three areas of responsibilities. 1 - Fund Raising, 2 - Selection of programs to financially support and 3 - Public Relations. Public relations being a most important part of the program, because now we have a reason to let our communities know about our good works. During the first year, we concentrated on fund raising, because whatever we did the funds would have to come from donations from the membership. After looking into the many possibilities of financially supporting Drug and Alcohol Prevention projects we decided to work with the Alcohol and Drug Division of the Department of Education. This was a good decision because

we discovered several very dedicated professional people such as Madonna Flanders who are working very closely with our public schools providing special Drug and Alcohol prevention educational programs. The excellent relationship with this department has made our job a lot easier.

During the past two years the Masons of Maine have contributed more than \$135,000.00 to this program.

We have financially supported and sponsored 4 statewide regional workshops for Teachers and Councilors dealing with teaching refusal skills to small children. Over 125 teachers and educators attended these workshops.

We are paying for curriculum materials and programs such as D.A.R.E., BABES, QUEST, HLAY 2000 and others. We are supplementing the cost of specialized instructors of these programs. We are sponsoring 10 teachers to attend a Rutgers University summer school on Alcohol and Drug prevention programs. We are sponsoring 25 teachers to attend the New England Summer School to be held at Colby College this Summer. We are committed to more than \$100,000.00 in mini-grants to more than 50 School Administrative Districts in support of these projects. Brethren, all the monies raised are being returned right into your local school systems.

Most important, we are trying to get as much publicity as we possibly can with each grant and award that we make. Press releases have been prepared along with pictures at each presentation.

Brethren, to my knowledge this is the first time that the Masonic Fraternity in Maine has had the opportunity to be involved with such a humane, timely and most worthwhile project. An opportunity to serve mankind, which is what this great fraternity is all about. The success of this program is dependent on each individual member. We can do only as much as the total financial support we receive from each of you. Out of 34,000 members 12,500 have supported this program so far. Are you one of them? This is our program, supported only by the "MASONS OF MAINE".

We sincerely appreciate the support that we have had in the past from each of you and we look forward to the future in this project with great anticipation. It is a lot of hard work and long hours but the results are most gratifying.

TO: THE MOST WORSHIPFUL GRAND LODGE OF MAINE:

We have just completed the awarding of 65 - \$500.00 scholarships to 37 Colleges, Universities and Vocational Technical Institutes, benefitting 65 deserving Boys and Girls from as many High Schools from across the State of Maine. These scholarships were made available from a \$24,000.00 grant from the Grand Lodge of Maine Charitable Foundation from several Lodges and individuals, a total of \$32,500.00.

Letters and responses from recipients, school personnel and Colleges indicate that this is a most worthwhile program. It is also a good public relations project for the Masonic Fraternity.

There are about 127 Public High Schools in the State of Maine. Last year we awarded scholarships in about one half of these Schools. We are currently in the process of receiving scholarship applications from the other half that we were unable to reach last year. With more Lodges sponsoring more scholarships this year, it looks as if we will be awarding over 70 scholarships. Our lofty goal is to be able to award one scholarship in each public High School each year in the State of Maine.

We appreciate the support from those Lodges who are sponsoring one or more scholarships. We congratulate those Lodges who have their own scholarship programs. Together we can achieve our goal in the next few years.

Once again the "Masons of Maine" can be proud of our good works in this program. It has been said, "That children make up only 25% of today's population but they will be 100% of the future population". Our influence now will pay great dividends in the coming years.

MAINE MASONIC BLOOD PROGRAM REPORT

TO THE MOST WORSHIPFUL GRAND LODGE OF MAINE:

My thanks to all Masonic Brethren, their families and friends who contributed blood, time, and money to the Maine Masonic Blood Program. With the assistance of the American Red Cross, the Masonic Blood Drives netted a total of 2,449 pints of blood.

In order to increase donations of this gift of life, it is extremely important that all District and Lodge Chairmen take advantage of the valuable information to be found in the Masonic Blood Program booklet.

The District Chairmen should also take every opportunity to address the lodges in their Districts--answering questions and providing information to increase knowledge and awareness, and, ultimately, a more active participation in the program. The importance of using the Lodge Donor Code Number when donating blood should be stressed so the lodge will receive credit for all gifts of blood.

Through communication with this State Chairman, blood was provided to seven Maine Masons--four brothers living in Maine, one in Ohio, and two in Florida. In addition, one New Hampshire Mason was given blood as that state does not have a Masonic Blood Program.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON MASONIC JURISPRUDENCE

In Grand Lodge
Portland, Maine
May, 2, 1989

TO THE MOST WORSHIPFUL GRAND LODGE OF MAINE:

The Constitution provides that the Committee on Masonic Jurisprudence should have referred to it all acts of the Grand Master involving questions of Masonic Law and practice, and shall report on such other matters as are referred to it for consideration.

It has been the long standing custom and practice of this Grand Lodge for the Grand Master to report his decisions in his Annual Address and have appended thereto the dispensations granted. The portion of his address containing his decisions, together with the dispensations have by custom been forwarded to this Committee well before the convening of the Annual Communication in order to afford the Committee the opportunity to review the same in light of the Constitution, Standing Regulations and prior decisions and to report thereon in Grand Lodge

On Monday, May 1, 1989 the day before the Annual Communication, the Chairman received from our Grand Master two decisions, together with a chronological list of fifty six dispensations he had granted.

This is a large number of dispensations, but a great majority of them were to permit the holding of table lodges and entirely proper. The remainder of the dispensations were very sketchy and gave no reason or basis for granting the same. We must assume they be within the prerogative and discretionary power of the Grand Master and are approved with one exception.

We do not find justification for granting a dispensation to hold a semi-public installation on Sunday.

We quote from the report of the Committee on Masonic Jurisprudence to be found at page 65 of the Proceedings for 1945.

"The practice which has been consistently followed by all bodies within the jurisdiction of this Grand Lodge of confining their meetings for all purposes, other than funeral and similar observances, to the secular days of the week should continue to be observed-----"

Meetings on Sundays for the conferring of degrees or other ceremonial purposes should not be permitted.

The view has been repeatedly expressed that dispensations should be granted sparingly and only on exceptional circumstances in order that the wise and salutary regulations of the Grand Lodge may not become "more honored in the break than the observance."

The two decisions of the Grand Master, the one relating to requiring the Master of the Lodge to remove his hat in the presence of the District Deputy Grand Master making an official visitation, and the other an interpretation of Section 135 concerning plural membership we neither approve nor disapprove. They each require study and consideration by the entire committee before reporting thereon.

The first appears to conflict with a well reasoned decision previously approved by this Grand Lodge and the second decision, at this point in time, deals with a hypothetical and not a real factual situation.

The Committee, therefore, will take these decisions under advisement and report thereon at the next Annual Communication.

Your Grand Lodge Public Relations Committee reports that, in our opinion, efforts to spread the word about Freemasonry are enjoying continued success.

Much of the focus this year has been on our Scholarship and Drug and Alcohol Abuse Prevention Programs.

Releases were prepared and released to members of the Maine Press -- many with photos -- as our 65 scholarships were announced and presented last spring. Each scholarship piece also included information about our Drug and Alcohol Abuse Prevention efforts, and mention of many other Masonic philanthropies.

Public response has been exceptionally positive.

We also released the word about our Refusal Skills seminars, co-sponsored with the Drug & Alcohol Abuse Division of the State Department of Education.

Photographs and/or releases reportedly appeared in all papers in Maine where assistance was given The Salvation Army by Masons voluntarily manning kettle stands last December.

Releases also were sent out announcing the cooperative effort between Grand Lodge and the Scottish Rite regarding Family Life Week.

Finally we established a working relationship with the TV medium, at least in the Bangor market. This resulted from repeated personal calls to the stations by several brethren.

Portland area TV stations also have been visited but, to our knowledge, we've not yet received air time in southern Maine. We'll keep trying. General acceptance of Freemasonry as a force for good in our communities will be assured as soon as we're recognized and understood for who we are and what we do.

That understanding should have the additional benefit of encouraging the profane to seek application for membership in our beloved fraternity in ever-increasing numbers.

MASONIC EDUCATION AND LODGE SERVICES

TO THE MOST WORSHIPFUL GRAND LODGE OF MAINE:

The Committee on Masonic Education and Lodge Services has completed another busy year in its endeavors to communicate light and knowledge to the members of the Craft.

This Committee is charged with the responsibility of administering the ongoing education and lodge service programs in six specific categories. To these are added the special projects and programs as deemed necessary to support the goals of the Grand Master.

It was with a great sense of humbleness that I accepted the chairmanship of this committee and of so learned and prestigious group of dedicated Masons. I shall be forever grateful for their indulgence in my shortcomings and most appreciative of their guidance and direction in keeping me within due bounds.

To our Jr. Past Chairman, Rt. Wor. Bro. N. James Coolong, we are indebted to him for his superior leadership in directing our previous efforts and are pleased that he has continued to favor us with his services as a member of the committee.

This committee acknowledges with sincere appreciation the valuable support and assistance given by our Grand Lodge officers M. W. John E. Anagnostis, G.M., R.W. Robert V. Damon, D.G.M., R.W. George P. Pulkkinen, S.G.W., R.W. Reginald W. Wing, J.G.W., R.W. Robert H. Perry, G.L. and Wor. Roland G. Hannaford, G. Mar. for their attendance at our meetings, their knowledgeable input during our deliberations and their active participation in our educational seminars. They certainly make us a strong team.

DISTRICT REPRESENTATIVES:

The District Representatives are the vital connecting link between the programs of this committee and their implementation in the lodges. We are most grateful for their dedicated service and extend to them our sincere thanks. This year we will make a special effort to give the new District Representatives an adequate orientation seminar to better prepare them for the important duties of their office. It is worthy to note that each year there seems to be an increasing awareness and attitude of teamwork between the District Deputy and the District Representative, this is as it should be.

NORTHEAST CONFERENCE ON MASONIC EDUCATION AND LIBRARIES

The Grand Lodge of Maine was represented at the thirty third Northeast Conference on Masonic Education and Libraries at Williamsburg, Virginia on May 26-28, 1988 by M.W. John E. Anagnostis, M.W. Peter C. Schmidt, R.W. Edwin V. George and R. W. John E. Gray. The theme of the conference was, "Masonic Education Beyond the Degrees". The keynote address was given by M.W. Richard Fletcher P.G.M. of Vermont and the Executive Secretary of the Masonic Services Association. Bro. Allen Roberts gave an address on "Education Goes Beyond the Third Degree". M.W. Peter C. Schmidt P.G.M. of Maine served on the panel discussing "Developing Leadership in our Grand Lodges".

ONGOING PROGRAMS

CANDIDATE AND NEW MASTER MASON EDUCATION

It is our firm conviction that only by raising Masonically knowledgeable Master Masons can we expect them to become active members of the Craft. This committee, therefore, assigns the highest priority to the Candidate and New Master Mason Education Program.

The expanded Pollard Plan of the Grand Lodge of Maine is one of the finest and most comprehensive education programs in existence. However, we have one almost insurmountable barrier, implementation of the program at the lodge level. Progress has been painfully slow. Only about fifty of the two hundred lodges are currently utilizing this program. We will continue to pursue every conceivable means to convince the Lodge Masters of the value and long term good effects of the program.

LEADERSHIP AND LODGE MANAGEMENT TRAINING

Each year this committee offers a program for lodge officers to improve themselves in Leadership and Lodge Management. This year we conducted six area seminars having a total attendance of two hundred and fourteen officers and brethren.

Although the seminars varied in form and composition they were equally well received. High priority topics were, Lodge Officer Training, Planning Your Year as Master, Candidate Instruction, Lodge Programing and Goals and Objectives. It was the general concensus that this type of seminar was well received. All wardens would derive great benefits by attending this program before assuming the East at their Lodge. We thank all those who assisted in presenting these seminars.

YOUTH SUPPORT

It has been my personal pleasure to have been the representative between this Grand Lodge Committee and the Order of DeMolay for Boys and The International Order of the Rainbow for Girls for nearly ten years. It has been most encouraging in the last few years to have noticed a definite increase in the support from the lodges to these groups. Many of the Chapters and Assemblies are now being invited into our lodges to do some part of their ritualistic work. Some Districts are making organized visitations to DeMolay Chapters and Rainbow Assemblies.

It appears that DeMolay will enjoy another increase in membership this year with Rainbow having a loss of about thirty members. Details on DeMolay will be in the State Executive Officers report.

The highlight for Rainbow is the progress being made on the Merrill Rainbow Camp. This facility is available to the whole Masonic family. Details of the progress is in the last issue of The Maine Mason .

Whatever support that our lodges collectively , and we as Master Masons individually can give our youth groups is time and money well spent.

MASONIC PROGRAMS AND SPEAKERS BUREAU

For several years the administration of this program was in the capable hands of Rt. Wor. John E. Anagnostis. Having graduated to his present position of Most Worshipful Grand Master, this vacancy has been filled by Rt.Wor. John E. Gray. Brother Gray has formulated a list of some twenty-five Masonic speakers covering the whole spectrum of Masonry. Although no statistics are currently available on its frequency of use, it is an active bureau and any Master desiring a speaker should check with his District Representative or Brother Gray. This committee is most appreciative of the time and talent the members of the Speakers Bureau offer to the Craft.

ADVANCED EDUCATION

This program was established to provide Advance Masonic Education to those Brethren who are desirous of obtaining more knowledge in several of the Masonic fields, such as, Philosophy, Symbolism, Jurisprudence, History and Protocol.

Three Districts are currently sponsoring this program, we will continue to promote it and any Lodge may obtain more information by contacting their District Representative or R.W. Reginald W. Wing.

LODGES IN ACTION PROGRAM

Our newest member Wor. Bro. Wayne E. Adams was welcomed into the committee by being assigned as committee leader of The Lodges in Action Program. This program includes the Widows Program, Care and Share, and Team Concept. We have made good progress in the Widows Program but there is a tremendous amount of work to be done in the other programs. We welcome Bro. Adams expertise and enthusiasm.

IN CONCLUSION

Most Worshipful Grand Master, it has been an honor and pleasure for this committee to have served you and this Grand Lodge during the past

year. We hope that our efforts have promoted the cause of education to the Brethren and Service to the Lodges. We now stand ready to accept the challenges of another year.

AMENDMENTS TO THE CONSTITUTION ADOPTED

M.W. Donald S. Smith, for the Committee on Amendments to the Constitution, presented the following reports, which were accepted and the recommendations adopted.

PROPOSED that Sec. 35, Committee on Finance, be amended by deleting the words "recommend appropriations for the proper conduct of the affairs of the Grand Lodge" and inserting in place thereof the words "shall prepare and distribute to the delegates of Grand Lodge within a reasonable time before the first day of the Annual Communication, a proposed operating budget for the ensuing year, together with the per capita tax to support the budget."

The proposal was entertained and, in accordance with Section 137 of the Constitution, was published with the other Proceedings of Grand Lodge at Page 687, and sent to the several subordinate lodges for their consideration, and is now in order to be acted upon.

MOVED that the amendment, as published, be adopted.

PROPOSED that Paragraph 1 of Section 90 be amended by inserting the words "per capita tax", to read: "Each lodge shall pay annually towards the support of the Grand Lodge a per capita tax of five dollars and fifty cents (\$5.50) each for all of its members, including honorary and life members and those absent from the State and two dollars (\$2.00) for every candidate initiated." And add "Provided, however, said per capita tax shall be adjusted annually in accordance with the report of the Finance Committee as presented pursuant to Section 35."

The proposal was entertained and, in accordance with Section 137 of the Constitution, was published with the other Proceedings of Grand Lodge at Page 687, and sent to the several subordinate lodges for their consideration, and is now in order to be acted upon.

MOVED that the amendment, as published be adopted.

The amendment to Section 90 was amended by adding at the end, "Provided further, however, that said per capita tax shall not be increased in any one year by more than an amount equal to 6% of the previous tax, rounded to the nearest five cents." The Amendment to the Amendment to Section 90 was passed. A vote was then taken on the revised Amendment to Section 90 and this too was passed.

AMENDMENTS TO THE CONSTITUTION (LOST)

M.W. Donald S. Smith, for the Committee on Amendments to the Constitution, then presented the following Amendment, which was lost after considerable debate on both sides of the issue.

PROPOSED that Section 36, Paragraph 3, on Grievances and Appeals, be amended by deleting the clause following the first semi-colon and inserting: "shall review the proceedings of the Board of Commissioners of Trials for errors of law and procedure only and present the findings and recommendations of the Commissioners of Trials...for action by the Grand Lodge." The proposal was entertained and, in accordance with Section 137 of the Constitution, was published with the other Proceedings of Grand Lodge at Page 688, and sent to the several subordinate lodges for their consideration, and is now in order to be acted upon.

MOVED that the amendment, as published, be adopted.

The Grand Lodge was then called from Labor to Refreshment until 9:00 A.M. Wednesday morning, Rev. David Wigley, Grand Chaplain, offering a prayer. This occurred at 5:15 P.M. before a final vote was taken on the above Amendment, which was duly concluded on Wednesday morning.

SECOND DAY - MORNING

Grand Lodge was called to Labor at 9:00 A.M. on Wednesday, May 3, 1989 in Corinthian Hall, prayer being offered by Lawrence Hathorne, Grand Chaplain.

The first order of business was to present an amendment to the Amendment to Section 36 which eliminated the three dots after the word "Trials." This was listed as a scrivener's error. The amendment to the Amendment was passed. The final vote on the Amendment showed that the Amendment was lost.

AMENDMENTS TO THE CONSTITUTION (PROPOSED)

M.W. Donald S. Smith, for the Committee on Amendments to the Constitution, presented the following reports, which were accepted and laid on the table to be voted on at our next annual Communication in 1990.

PROPOSED that the first sentence of the Declaration to the Constitution be amended by striking out the words "religious secret society," and inserting in lieu thereof the words "religious society having certain secrets," so that said sentence as amended shall read: "Freemasonry is a charitable, benevolent, educational, and religious society having certain secrets, adhering to its own peculiar ancient landmarks."

R.W. Brother Edwin V. Gedorge moves that the foregoing proposal be entertained and laid over to the next Annual Communication in accordance with the provisions of Section 137 of the Constitution.

This amendment was amended to read "Freemasonry is a charitable, benevolent, and educational society having certain secrets, adhering to its own peculiar ancient landmarks."

PROPOSED that the tenth sentence in Sec. 23 of the Constitution be amended by deleting therefrom the words "four copies to each lodge." and inserting in lieu thereof the words "two copies to each lodge."

MOVED that the foregoing proposal be entertained and laid over to the next Annual Communication in accordance with the provisions of Section 137 of the Constitution.

PROPOSED that Section 23, Page 12, Rev. 77 paragraph 8 of the Constitution be revised to read: "When required, he shall cause a transcript of the journal of the proceedings of the Grand Lodge to be presented as soon after the Annual Communication as the same can be done, and shall forward two copies thereof to each of the Grand Lodges of the United States and such other jurisdictions as are recognized by the Grand Lodge. One copy to each Officer and Permanent Member of this Grand Lodge and two copies to each lodge".

M.W. Donald S. Smith then moved that the entire report of the Committee on Amendments to the Constitution be accepted. Motion was carried.

The Grand Master then invited R.W. George P. Pulkkinen, Senior Grand Warden, to the East and presented him with the Josiah Hayden Drummond Medal for Distinguished Masonic Service.

GEORGE PETER PULKKINEN

George P. Pulkkinen was born in Rumford, Maine, December 10, 1938, the son of the late Peter and Winona Davis Pulkkinen. He was educated in the Auburn public schools and the University of Maine.

George is the father of two children, Peter Powers, and Kristen Ann. He served as an Artillery Fire Direction Computer in the U.S. Army in 1957-58.

Active in the publishing business for 27 years, he started at the *York County Coast Star* in Kennebunk in the early 1960s, assuming responsibilities as editor, general manager and co-publisher. In 1981 Brother Pulkkinen left the *Star* and took over as general manager of James Newspapers in Norway and Skowhegan, Maine, and North Conway and Berlin, New Hampshire. In 1986 he left James Newspapers to assume a newly created position of Advertising Director at *The Maine Sportsman*, charged with the responsibility of directing sales and marketing for the state-wide outdoor publication. In that position he enjoys an occasional opportunity to wet a line in various fly fishing rivers and streams of Maine. George also enjoys catamaran sailing, downhill and cross-country skiing, and photography.

George attends the Second Congregational Church in Norway, Maine. For many years he served as chairman of the Budget and Planning Boards in the Town of Arundel.

Brother George was raised in York Lodge #22 of Kennebunk March 1, 1963, becoming Master in 1981. He served as an officer of Murray Chapter #33 R.A.M. for several years; is a member of Maine Council #7, R&SM, St. Amand Commandery K.T., the various bodies of the Scottish Rite Valley of Portland, Maine Consistory, Josiah Hayden Drummond Chapter Allied Masonic Degrees, The Maine Lodge of Research, and Kora Temple, A.A.O.N.M.S.

In Grand Lodge he served as Grand Steward in 1982-83, Grand Pursuivant in 1986-87, and is presently serving as Senior Grand Warden. He also is a member of the Grand Lodge Scholarship Committee, the Grand Lodge Drug and Alcohol Abuse Prevention Committee, and is Chairman of the Grand Lodge Publicity Committee.

He is a frequent guest lecturer in various lodges throughout southern, western and coastal Maine.

In 1987 he was presented the Simon Greenleaf Medal for Meritorious Service by M.W. Ernest H. Curtis.

Brother Pulkkinen responded as follows:

Most Worshipful Grand Master, distinguished guests, Freemasons my Brothers all. During the series of 24 District Meetings recently concluded, our Most Worshipful Grand Master referred to me on occasion as his "ubiquitous Senior Grand Warden." I can have no quarrel with the Grand Master on that, because, quite frankly Brethren, I don't know just what it means. First, I would say that I'm so proud that I'm able to call all of you brothers my friends, and I'm so very happy that all you friends are my brothers. Thank you, Most Worshipful Grand Master. Thank you, Brethren.

Proud? You bet we are proud of our Grand Lodge Library. We have only scratched the surface. For the first time we are now able to provide information at a moment's notice. Pause for a moment. Every Table of Contents has been photocopied, each chapter recorded and alphabetized for ready reference and retrieval.

Incoming periodicals from all sources are scanned by the Grand Secretary, filed in the office awaiting the next issue. The superseded periodical is forwarded to the library. It is then stripped of "ads" and non-masonic data and then filed in the "alpha" sequence and "Clipping File". Thus a viable procedure, providing continuity, is achieved.

There is no earthly reason why a "ten minute talk" on the subject of his choice, cannot be an agenda item for lodge meetings. A program "team" could plan the entire year.

We are now purging the hundreds of proceedings, with their accumulated dust cover, located in our miscellaneous storage areas. Articles on specific subjects, speeches, jurisprudence, history, surveys, orations, and many pertinent Masonic items are being stripped and catalogued. It is not practical and space wise to store material when it is permanently available with the parent grand jurisdiction, and forwarded by facsimile or fiche.

Incidentally, the purchase of a Microfiche reader-printer could open the flood-gates of available information from all sources.

Finally, it is rather ironic that our prime fund-raising appeal is for a Library and Museum. Again, "let's drop our bucket where we are." The flood gates of opportunity, talent and vision are readily available. The choice is ours.

R.W. Alfred E. Neff, for the Committee on Condition of the Fraternity, presented the following report, which was accepted.

CONDITION OF THE FRATERNITY

In Grand Lodge
Portland, Maine
May 2, 1989

TO THE MOST WORSHIPFUL GRAND LODGE OF MAINE:

Your Committee on the "Condition of the Fraternity" has reviewed 189 of the 200 individual lodge reports and 23 of the 24 reports of the District Deputy Grand Masters. The remaining reports were unavailable.

The District Deputies of the 1st, 4th, 9th, 14th and the 19th Districts are especially commended for their excellent reports.

Your committee examined all reports in great detail, in an attempt to determine the physical condition as well as the general health of the Lodges. Particular attention was focused on (1) The number of Past Masters in line offices. (There were 51 Lodges with 5 or more PMs). (2) Activities in Masters and Wardens Associations and other District functions. (3) Special Events held within and outside the Lodge. (4) Youth Activities - whether or not sponsor, contribution or invitations. (5) Comments of the DDGMs.

PHYSICAL CONDITION

It was found that 126 Lodges own their own halls, 36 rent space and that 27 could not be determined from available data. Comments on the various reports relative to physical condition were very few. It was noted that there are a few Lodges in need of repair but that "funds were not available". It is generally true that a run-down and unattractive Lodge is symptomatic of

deeper problems which should be addressed by Lodge Officers and the District Deputy of the area. Perhaps an old fashioned "Work Bee" would be just the thing to get some of the Brethren involved in a very pleasant and rewarding project to breathe some life into the building and the membership. Remember that most men will seldom "volunteer" but if "asked" will often respond with pleasure and zeal. A few boards, a few nails, some paint and a couple of Saturdays could make a noticeable difference.

GENERAL HEALTH AND WELL BEING

We have rated each of the 189 Lodges as to the probability that the Lodge can continue to operate without significant problems. Factors used to develop the ratings were previously stated. Ratings are as follows:

Excellent	-	52	-	28%

These lodges rated as "Excellent" and "Good" are to be congratulated on their high level of activities. Lodges rated "Fair" and "Poor" obviously need a lot of attention by their own Officers as well as by Grand Lodge. To avoid embarrassment to any Lodge, these have been listed in an Appendix for the Grand Masters' use and will not be read.

IN SUMMATION:

The "Condition of the Fraternity" is neither all good or all bad, but should be clearly unacceptable to the craft as a whole. When 19% of our Lodges are in serious difficulty, there is much work to be done. Certainly there is no one answer or magic panacea that will solve all problems for all Lodges, for each one is unique. There is a solution for each Lodge and inspired leadership can find it. We understand that Officers and Members sometime get discouraged, but we must try and try again until success is ours.

We recommend that the recommendations contained in the District Deputies' reports be sent to the proper committee by The Grand Secretary's office.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON THE HISTORY OF MASONRY IN MAINE as of May 1, 1989

In Grand Lodge, Portland, Maine,
May 3, 1989

During the past year there has been another let-down among the lodges to the end that the improvement shown two years ago has slipped considerably. As of March 31, 1989, all lodges should have had their histories submitted to Grand Lodge through 1988.

In May of 1987, 57 lodges owed 140 years of histories plus a number of years which were found to be missing. In May of 1988, 130 lodges owed 349 years of histories. Your own quick total will show you the trend. It is easy to see that the Masters are not observing the requirement that each Master is responsible for the submission of the history covering his year. These lodges are thereby also failing to show due respect to Grand Lodge and our standing regulations.

The lodges owing the missing years will be made aware that these years are not on file. An ongoing push will be sustained until 100% of the lodges are current.

As you hear the names of the delinquent lodges read, please make a note of any lodge whose histories might be more quickly compiled through your assistance. Make known any discrepancies in our records. Your committee will be seeking assistance through the various District Deputies and District Representatives, but anyone willing to work on histories, for his own or for another lodge, should make himself known.

The delinquent lodges are listed by years of delinquency and by lodge number.

Wallace M. Gage, our Grand Historian, presented the following report, which was accepted.

GRAND HISTORIAN'S REPORT

Grand Lodge
Portland, Maine
May 2, 1989

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine, AF& AM:

The Constitution of the Grand Lodge assigns to the Grand Historian the

duty of keeping and maintaining an up-to-date narrative history of the Grand Lodge of Maine. In compliance with this responsibility, we can now report that Grand Lodge history through the two year period of M.W. Ernest H. Curtis' administration has been completed and is on file in the Grand Secretary's office.

In our Grand Historian's Report last year, we suggested that the Lodge Historian be made an appointive officer, and installed and invested with his jewel along with the rest of the Lodge officers. We're pleased to see that a number of Lodges are recognizing their Historians in this way, and urge others to consider adopting the practice. We would caution against making it a perfunctory "free lunch" sort of thing however. The honor and recognition ought to be extended only to those who earn it by making the necessary effort to produce quality work.

Last year for the first time, there was instituted the Historian's Award for the best Lodge history submitted and Certificates of Merit given to the runners-up. We'd like to think that this recognition is, at least in part responsible for the improved quality of many Lodge histories. Some still have a long way to go, however, and to help those who find writing a Lodge history an unfamiliar job, we plan to distribute a Historian's Manual within the next few months. By providing some guidelines and ideas on what ought to be covered in a Masonic history, we hope to improve on the quality and usefulness of Lodge histories in general.

The Lodge history should be more than a summary of the minutes of its meetings and statistical information duplicating material already available elsewhere. One factor very often missing is the human interest aspect. The Historian of Arundel Lodge No. 76 of Kennebunkport covers this very nicely in the Introduction to the recently completed History of the Lodge. He writes:

"The records of Arundel Lodge have been updated many times since the Lodge's formation in the year 1854. We can find the names of our Past Masters. We can find the names of our Line officers. We know how many Brothers were raised each year, and how many died. Our statistical information has been carefully researched and documented.

But what of the people themselves? Who were the Brothers behind the names? What did they do for a living? How much were they respected by their fellow citizens? What were their families like? What did they look like? What were their lives like when they left the Lodge hall?"

For the most part, our histories have done little to answer these questions. Of those Brothers who founded our Lodge and brought it successfully through its infancy, we know little. Most of the story surrounding our formation will remain forever untold. Many of the questions surrounding our origins will remain forever unanswered. Even today, countless Masonic stories are locked within the memories of our older Brethren, waiting for the proper key to set them free.

In this, the latest update of Arundel Lodge's history, begins the first attempt to look beyond the Lodge hall to the Brothers themselves. Ultimately, Masonry will be judged not by the stateliness of its halls, but by the character

of its people. This brief chronicle of our organization attempts to show who some of those people are. Wherever possible, photographs have been included of our Brethren. Thoughts of our Past Masters have been requested. Newspaper articles showing how our Brethren have been presented to the community have been given important attention.

Statistics have not been ignored in this report. The information so carefully gathered by our historians in the past has been carefully incorporated into this historical update. The written history of our Lodges comes directly from those earlier reports.

However, what this report hopes to accomplish is not entirely tied up in our beginnings. Rather, it looks ahead to what could and should be contained within its pages. Its looseleaf binder format allows for a continuous addition of materials, as well as the addition of newly discovered information from earlier years. This report barely scratches the surface concerning the role Arundel Lodge has played within the town of Kennebunkport. It is hoped that, over the years it will be viewed as a starting point to which will be added many new stories, biographical data and human interest information. It should be looked at as the first stone in the northeast corner of the Lodge, upon which our Masonic history can be built, and it is hoped that the work from this corner will be steady.

For well over a century Arundel Lodge has been a part of the Kennebunkport community. The Masonic values which have been taught within its walls have been spread from Brother to Brother and from family to family. The virtues that Masonry inculcates have become entwined in the fabric of the town, leading to a more honorable and fulfilling life for all.

It is said in the Maine Freemasonry pamphlet that "Freemasonry is kindness in the home, honesty in business, courtesy in society, fairness in work, pity and concern for the unfortunate, resistance toward evil, help for the weak, forgiveness for the penitent, love for one another, and above all, reverence and love of God.

Freemasonry is many things, but above all..."FREEMASONRY IS A WAY OF LIFE!"

Even a brief look at the lives represented in this account of our Lodge shows that the message of Masonry is being faithfully adhered to and deserves to be documented.

DISPENSATIONS AND CHARTERS

M.W. Donald S. Smith, for the Committee on Dispensations and Charters, presented the following verbal report, which was accepted.

The Grand Marshal then escorted R.W. Gordon Harrington and R.W. Meredith Bordeaux to the East, where R.W. Bordeaux presented R.W. Harrington a Placque from the 21st District Officers Association for Outstanding Service during his two years as District Deputy Grand Master in the 21st District

RITUAL

M.W. Ernest H. Curtis, for the Committee on Ritual, presented the following report, which was accepted and held over until the next Annual Communication of Grand Lodge for action.

Several Grand Jurisdictions have removed the physical penalties from the obligations of the three degrees. Others have added the word "symbolic" before each penalty. The obligations are the very heart of our degrees and we feel strongly about making any changes in our ritual. However, I realize that some clarification of the penalties would undoubtedly benefit the Candidate's understanding of his Obligation. Therefore I offer the following instruction to the candidate in the Preparation Room by the Junior Deacon, prior to the three questions that are propounded to the candidate.

"Mr. XX, you are about to be initiated into the mysteries of Freemasonry. The reasons for the manner of your preparation to receive this degree will be explained to you following the conferral of the degree. During the conferral of the degree you will be required to take an Obligation of obedience to the tenets of this Institution of which you have requested to become a member. This Obligation is of Ancient Origin and contains penalties for violations which are founded in antiquity and are wholly symbolic in nature. The only penalties which Freemasonry imposes in modern times for violations of its tenets and regulations are Reprimand, Suspension and Expulsion."

M.W. Charles R. Glassmire, for the Committee on Grievances and Appeals, presented the following reports. Action on each case is indicated at the end of each report.

He was found guilty on all counts on a plea of nolo contendere on June 27, 1988 and was sentenced to seven years in the State penitentiary.

Reginald R. Engstrom was suspended from all the rights and privileges of Freemasonry by M.W. John E. Anagnostis, and a trial was held in Auburn, Maine on February 24, 1989 by the trial commissioners. The defendant did not appear in person, nor was he represented by counsel. The defendant was found guilty of gross unmasonic conduct, and it was recommended that he be expelled from all of the rights and privileges of Freemasonry.

Your Committee on Grievances and Appeals has met and reviewed the proceedings, and find that everything was in order. We agree with the verdict and the recommendation.

Most Worshipful Grand Master, I move that Reginald R. Engstrom be expelled from all of the rights and privileges of Freemasonry.

By vote of Grand Lodge, Reginald R. Engstrom was expelled from all rights and privileges of Masonry.

WAYNE E. The defendant was found guilty as charged on December 28, 1987 and sentenced to twelve years in the State Penitentiary. Wayne E. Donald L. Downs was suspended from all of the rights and privileges of Freemasonry by Grand Master John E. Anagnostis, and a hearing was ordered before the Trial Commission. Attempt at service was made, but was not possible.

Your Committee on Grievances and Appeals agree with the findings and that the suspension be continued for another year.

On February 14, 1989 at a meeting of Arundel Lodge #76, Harold L. Davis petitioned for restoration. His request was received favorably at that meeting.

On April 12, 1989 your Committee on Grievances and Appeals had a hearing in the Masonic Temple in Portland, Maine. Harold L. Davis attended this meeting and spoke in his behalf, expressing his remorse over the incident, and requesting reinstatement.

Ten brethren from Arundel Lodge, most of whom were Past Masters of the Lodge, appeared and spoke eloquently in behalf of the petitioner. Many facts were placed before us which were not available to either the Trial Commission or to us two years ago.

Your Committee on Grievances and Appeals unanimously felt that the petitioner might well have been found innocent at the trial if all of the facts had been known.

ROBERT LEE BERNER was expelled from all of the rights and privileges of Freemasonry on May 6, 1987 on a charge of unlawful sexual contact. On March 1, 1989 at a meeting of Penobscot Lodge #39, a petition was presented for restoration. This was acted on favorably by all of the members present.

On April 12, 1989 your Committee on Grievances and Appeals held a meeting at the Masonic Temple in Portland, Maine. Brethren from Penobscot Lodge appeared and brought many letters with them to support the petition.

Robert L. Berner did not appear as he was given the advice that he could

not appear before us. This bad advice appears to be typical of the advice he received at the time of his original trial. The accusation against him stemmed from an incident when he was seen putting his arm around a young man. He has always denied anything further, but he was told by his attorney that if he would plead guilty he would be quietly given a suspended sentence and therefore avoid any adverse publicity. Instead he was sentenced to one year in prison, but a few days later the sentence was reduced to the few days served.

Your Committee on Grievances and Appeals felt unanimously that he was the victim of bad legal advice, and in all probability was guilty of no crime at all.

INSURANCE

R.W. Edwin V. George, for the Committee on Insurance, presented the following report, which was accepted.

In Grand Lodge
Portland, Maine
May 2, 1989

To The Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine:

In the year of 1988 we applied for a new classification on the Workers Compensation insurance for the Grand Lodge of Maine. The classification was approved, the rating changed and now Grand Lodge is saving nearly \$3,000. a year compared to their cost in previous years.

We also searched into the various markets of Liability and Bond coverage. We presented the past loss history of liability claims, which were minor, along with the facts that more lodges are now included for liability coverage under the building policy. Our presentations were very receptive and consequently resulted in a savings of over \$2,000. a year to Grand Lodge.

In 1987 and 1988 we sent out survey forms to all lodges, giving them the opportunity to have their present insurance reviewed. Out of 200 lodges a total of 132 lodges accepted the service. Over 90 of the 132 lodges made drastic changes in their policies. Many lodges had to have their insurance completely rewritten, more coverage was added, limits of coverage were increased on both the building and contents, products liability was added, and names of other Masonic related organizations using the lodge premises were named on the policy.

The surveys that were returned revealed the fact that their insurance policy had inadequate coverage and inadequate limits of coverage to satisfy the 80% co-insurance requirement in time of loss. Some were not carrying products liability to protect them while serving food and others carried bodily injury coverage but no coverage for property damage. Some policies were not written under a package plan which enables a lodge to receive credits and thereby reduce their cost. Many of the policies had a "Named Peril Policy" instead of "All Risk Coverage".

Over \$48,000. in savings has been realized by the lodges that completed the survey and accepted our recommendations.

There were 26 lodges in addition to the 132 lodges that asked for some advice or information but did not return the survey. The remaining 42 lodges did not respond to any of our letters or the survey.

We still have a lot of work to do for our lodges. It is essential that every lodge have a complete survey made of their insurance needs.

He noted that some Brethren have had problems with drug and alcohol abuse and are willing to admit it, and are thankful for our Drug and Alcohol Abuse Prevention Program. The Grand Master thanked the Brethren for making it possible for us to go out into the Communities and promote this program. He again told us that he would gladly accept donations from all the Brethren, but that there would be no more appeals made for donations at the District Meetings next year. "This has been a very good year," he said. As a final word, the Grand Master thanked Guy McLellan, the Arrangements Committee and their wives for all the help they had given during the Annual Communication. This was received with a standing ovation from the brethren.

In accordance with Section 64, Constitution of the Grand Lodge of Maine, the Annual Meeting of the Trustees of the Masonic Charitable Foundation of the Grand Lodge of Maine was called on Tuesday, April 18, 1989, at Martin's Manor Restaurant in Waterville, Maine, at 3:00 p.m.

(1) Voted - To omit the reading of the various records and that, as recorded, distributed or printed, they be confirmed.

(2) The Grand Treasurer's Report was submitted, discussed and acted upon as follows:

Voted - That the report of the Grand Treasurer be accepted, subject to the report of the Auditor.

Voted - To accept the gifts to the Charity Fund.

Voted - To accept the gift establishing the Charles E. Crossland Fund.

Voted - To authorize the Grand Treasurer to sign proxies of Securities owned by the Foundation, to sign Stock Certificates, Resolutions and other documents pertaining to the sale of securities.

(3) Harold L. Chute, Chairman of the Committee on Investments, submitted the following report.

TO THE TRUSTEES OF THE GRAND LODGE CHARITY FUND
GENERAL

As always your committee had an interesting year and did make a number of significant decisions. The principal investment objectives have remained the same with approximately 65% invested in equities and 35% in bonds. This varies slightly and at present is equities 61.1% and bonds 38.9% (2/28/89).

The committee as well as the Grand Master and Grand Secretary and Treasurer met with our advisors, Standish, Ayer & Wood, three times during the year, May, September and January. During this period we learned of Mr. John Wood's impending retirement at the end of 1989 and met with new advisor, Mr. Lawrence A. Manchester. He is learning our objectives and we think the change will be satisfactory even though Mr. Wood has been very close to us for many years and has done an excellent job.

During the past two years we have made significant changes in the portfolio which bodes well for the future.

The first big change was to invest \$500,000 in the SA&W Fixed Income Trust which is really a large bond mutual fund of almost 250 million. This is certainly easier than individual bond investments and provides a good total rate of return, preservation of principal and is sector oriented with emphasis on corporate bonds, mortgage pass-throughs and convertibles. It is intermediate term of 5 to 13 years. The current return on this fund is 9%.

The second change was to invest \$50,000.00 in the Standish Small Equity Limited Partners mutual fund. Although the income from such a fund is low the total return is great. This fund consists of many small NASDAQ industrials which alone we would not invest in but as a fund of almost 7 million dollars we are protected. On December 30, 1988, this fund had only a 1.89% yield but for the year had a total return (growth plus income) of 25.3%. Long term this will provide a vehicle for us to profit from the large NASDAQ industrial market.

The third change was to invest \$50,000.00 in the Standish International Fund. The basic reason for this is that the valuations of many foreign markets are currently attractive and offer good value to the investor. Many foreign nations are presently stable politically. The important evolution is the societies and economies of China and Russia may have a favorable economic impact on the free world in the years ahead and this may be more pronounced outside the United States. Currently the fund is small with about 10 million dollars. I feel confident we must invest some funds globally.

INVESTMENT POLICY

Your committee is still conservative. The principal investment objectives of the portfolio are preservation of capital, earnings and a reasonable

current income which will cover operating and charitable expenses, growth and income. We must be aware, however, that the operating costs are modestly up plus \$24,000.00 for the Scholarship and \$5,000.00 for the Alcohol and Drug Abuse Program which will make at least an extra \$35,000.00 - \$40,000.00 needs.

Quality is always stressed in the portfolio and balance of 65% equities and 35% bonds long term will assure growth. Our portfolio turnover is low.

THE NAMED POOLED FUNDS

This is a pooling of the assets of many different funds such as Thomas Bodge 29.9%, Charles Farrar 26.3%, Henry Loring 16.2%, Smith & Oliver (Collins) 18.0%, etc. It is a practical manner for the operation of the Treasurer as well as the investment committee. The current value is approximately \$405,382.00 (equities \$225,382.00 and bonds \$180,000.00) with an income of \$22,500.00 or 5.55%. It is the committee's dream that over the years many Masons may add to this fund.

VALUE & INVESTMENT INCOME

The total value of all Charity Funds now is: Relief Fund \$3,259,934, Named Pool Fund \$405,382 making a total of \$3,665,316. The total income is Relief Fund \$185,857 and Pooled Fund \$22,497 equals \$208,354.

Again it has been an honor and pleasure for your committee to serve this Grand Lodge. Also our work would have been fruitless without the diligent efforts of the Grand Treasurer. He not only takes a very personal interest in your funds but he is also pleasant during these duties.



Committee on Fraternal Relations

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine:

We submit, herewith, our annual report on Fraternal Relations, consisting of a Forward, Special Reports, Recommendations and Reviews.

FORWARD

Once again it is necessary to draw attention to the unsettled situation that is rampant in the world today. The Middle East remains one of the most troubled spots in the world. Africa continues to have its upheavals. Latin America is still a hot spot of insurrection. Even Europe and Asia have been the scenes of terrorist attacks, and the United States cannot escape the fact that our crime rate continues to soar.

It has always been a source of pride and satisfaction that we could look to Freemasonry as a site where these conditions did not exist. Unfortunately, this is not still the case.

In one State Freemasonry has been on trial both from within and from without. Suits have been brought in the courts for decisions which should never have been discussed outside of tiled doors.

In one State a Grand Master saw fit to proceed against a high official in the Scottish Rite.

In more than one instance disputes arose between jurisdictions because of alleged violations of their sovereign territory.

The Imperial Shrine of North America became embroiled with many in what appeared to be an inexorable march down the road to divorce themselves from Freemasonry. At their annual session over one third of the delegates present voted to sever the existing Masonic ties which have existed from the days when a Maine physician and a New York showman met and laid down the requirements for admission into their new organization which they called the Shrine.

Amidst all of this unrest and upheaval throughout the world, there is now appearing some rays of sunshine on the horizon. The fighting has certainly died down in Latin America. The Soviet Union now appears to be realizing that harmony must begin to exist between the powers on earth if any of us

are to survive. We are all hoping for the beginning of what our new President calls for in his efforts to heal the political, class and racial tensions which have been allowed to develop over the recent past.

There is also reason to believe that much that has been allowed to divide us in the past is now turned around, and a much brighter glow seems to be coming from the East.

The Spirit of Brotherhood was never more obvious than it was in Arlington, Virginia in February at the Grand Masters Conference. Perhaps it was the divisive influences that had been brought to bear against us in the recent past that made for a very harmonious meeting. The meeting was attended by all but two of the members of the Divan of the Shrine of North America. I had an opportunity to meet with these officers and worked out an arrangement that settled the differences between the Shrine and the George Washington Masonic Memorial Association.

A committee from the Grand Masters met with these same officers, and they pledged themselves collectively to work for the repeal of the legislation passed two years ago that had put us on a collision course.

As I have said for many years, when reasonable men sit down to reason together, anything can be accomplished.

One other observation must also be made. It is wonderful to live in the good old state of Maine, where we are generally immune from these divisive influences which is so rampant abroad.

SPECIAL REPORTS

BRAZIL

There are now 26 State Grand Lodges in Brazil. All of these are considered regular by the Commission on Information for recognition of the Grand Masters Conference of North America. We in Maine recognize most of them, and this year we have had requests for recognition from three more. These are the Grande Loja Do Rio Grande Do Norte, The Grande Loja De Pernambuco and The Grande Loja Maconica Do Estado De Rondonia. Since

these are among the ones considered legitimate, I move that recognition be extended to these Grand Lodges, and the exchange of representatives be established.

ITALY

The Grand Orient of Italy has been in turmoil for a number of years. In 1986 recognition was withdrawn on the recommendation of the Commission. At the Conference of Grand Masters of North America held in Arlington, Virginia this year, the Commission was once again asked for re-evaluation. They concluded that the Grand Orient of Italy is now a monothestic Grand Lodge with the volume of the Sacred Law an essential part of the furniture of the Lodge. They unanimously concluded that the Grand Orient of Italy now meets the requirements of the commission for recognition.

IVORY COAST

On February 19, 1989, the Grande Loge Nationale Francaise constituted a new Grande Lodge in Africa - The Grande Loge De Cote D'Ivoire, which will begin with 8 constituent Lodges chartered originally by the GLNF.

PORTUGAL

The GLNF has chartered two Lodges in Portugal, one in Lisbon and one in Porto. The GLNF is looking forward to setting up a District Grand Lodge and eventually a Grand Lodge in Portugal.

The institution of a Grand Lodge of Hawaii was confirmed and plans made for its Constitution. One new Lodge was instituted. The Grand Lodge became active in the Drug and Alcohol Abuse Prevention Program. Appendant bodies were not restricted from having meetings on Sunday. The fact that California was one of only four Lodges not belonging to the Masonic Service Association was changed by their voting to join. The one year waiting period before a Master Mason could join an appendant body was eliminated. The application of a handicapped person does not now need the approval of the Grand Master, but is left up to the judgement of the Lodge. Memorization to advance to a higher degree now limited to the obligation and modes of recognition (Held over) Nineteen cornerstones were laid and one ground breaking was held. Fees for the degrees average \$105.75, with the lowest at \$50.00 and the highest at \$300.00. Average Dues are \$28.56 with a low of \$12.00 and a high of \$100.00. They are now using "desk top publishing" with their computer and are saving about \$15,716.00. The use of liquor in non-meeting places was not adopted. The Brethren may now pay dues annually instead of quarterly. Lodges are permitted to use lodge funds for scholarships. Use of the cipher ritual during a tiled meeting is prohibited. Past Masters of Lodges are still not entitled to one vote each at Grand Lodge and 50 year members are not exempted from paying dues. Bingo games are still prohibited. A budget of \$1,415,800 was adopted. The Per Capita Tax was set at \$8.71 for Grand Lodge and \$1.10 for the California Freemason. R.W. Stanley L. Channon was elected and installed as Grand Master. In two Masonic trials, the verdict of Suspension was changed to Expulsion by the Trial Review Commission.

4. To add "Educational Officer" to the Lodge Officers.
5. To reduce the number of Custodians of the work from 10 to 6.

A resolution was adopted that no Mason may be installed Master of his Lodge without a certificate of proficiency from the Grand Lecturer.

A resolution deleting the 60 day waiting period requirement before one may apply to either the York or Scottish Rite was enacted, and the only requirement now shall be to qualify in the catechism of the Master Mason Degree. James A. "Bud" McIntire was elected and installed Grand Master.

A proposal to move the Annual Communication of Grand Lodge from June to November was defeated. A raise in the per capita tax for the Masonic Home from 50 cents to \$2.50 was defeated. The Fraternal Relations Committee reports good relations between the Grand Lodge of Wisconsin and Prince Hall Masonry and regrets the untimely death of their Grand Master. A proposal to modernize the language and reduce the length of the work in their ritual was defeated. A proposal to establish Grand Lodge sponsored Bus Tours was defeated. ROBERT VERNLEY DAMON

Robert V. Damon was born in Charlotte, Washington County, State of Maine on April 11, 1928, the son of Paul H. and Clara (Hersey) Damon. He received his first education in the Damon Ridge School in Charlotte, completing the eighth grade in 1940. Due to injuries received in an accident he was delayed a year from entering high school. In 1941, he was enrolled in St. Croix High School, Woodland (Baileyville) and graduated with the Class of 1945 as the valedictorian. Assuming that a call for military service would be received within the year, he did not immediately apply for college entrance to further his education, but sought enlistment in the armed forces. Since he was not accepted, he then applied for enrollment at the University of Maine, College of Technology. During undergraduate days, Brother Damon taught school for a time. He graduated from the University of Maine with a Bachelor of Science Degree in Civil Engineering in the Class of 1952.

Following graduation Brother Damon was employed by Phoenix Bridge Company, of Phoenixville, Pennsylvania, until called to military service in the latter part of the Korean Conflict. He served with the U.S. Army Construction Engineers in France and Germany. Upon completion of his tour of duty, he was honorably discharged with the rank of Specialist, Third Class, Construction Engineers, and returned to his former employment in Pennsylvania. On his return to New England he was employed in various engineering positions that represented either consultant work or that of civil service on the State level. These employment engagements were in Maine and New Hampshire, and he retired in 1990 from the State of Maine, Department of Transportation, where he was employed in Bridge Design.

He is a Member of the American Society of Civil Engineers and served a year as Secretary of the Maine Chapter. He also belongs to the National Society of Professional Engineers, and is registered as a Professional Engineer in the States of Maine, New Hampshire, Vermont and Massachusetts.

In October 1977, Brother Damon was united in marriage with Shirley Rose Ireland. They have two sons, Henry Ireland of Lewiston and Dana of Minot and four grandchildren.

As a member of Calvary United Methodist Church of Lewiston, he has taken an active part in its affairs and served his Church as Chairperson of the Administrative Council, Chairperson of the Pastor-Parish Relations Committee, a Sunday School teacher and President and Secretary of the Methodist Men's Club.

For recreation and hobbies Brother Damon enjoys sports, particularly hunting and fishing. He also enjoys reading, especially science, history and literature. These, along with interests in electronics and music provide other opportunities to keep busy.

Brother Damon was initiated into Masonry while living in New Hampshire, and received the Degrees in Horace Chase Lodge, No. 72, F. & A.M. at Penacook in 1963. On returning to Maine, he affiliated with Rabboni Lodge, No. 150 then of Lewiston, and served as Worshipful Master in 1968 and 1969. In 1970, he was elected Secretary and filled that office for eight years and declined re-election in order that he might fulfill some other Masonic commitments that would interfere with the duties of a secretary. Several years later, he was re-elected to that office and so served a total of 14 years in that capacity. In 1976 and 1977 Brother Damon was appointed an Assistant Grand Lecturer by M.W. Donald S. Smith and in 1980 and 1981 M.W. Harlan F. Small appointed him District Deputy Grand Master for the 23rd Masonic District. Brother Damon was elected to the office of Senior Grand Warden in 1985; Deputy Grand Master in 1988 and 1989; and elected and installed Most Worshipful Grand Master of Maine Masons in 1990, at the

One Hundred Seventy First Annual Communication of Grand Lodge at Portland on the first day of May. He serves also as a Grand Representative for the Grand Lodge of Bolivia near the Grand Lodge of Maine.

Brother Damon received the Degrees of the Royal Arch Chapter in Bradford Chapter, No. 9 of Auburn and served as Excellent High Priest in 1972 and 1973. He was a Grand Steward in 1974 and Grand Royal Arch Captain in 1982. At the present time he serves as a Grand Representative for the Grand Royal Arch Chapter of Alaska, near the Grand Royal Arch Chapter of Maine. He was greeted in Dunlap Council, Royal and Select Masters No. 8 and served as Illustrious Master in 1969 and 1970. Knighted in Lewiston Commandery, No. 6, Knights Templar, he was elected as its Eminent Commander in 1971, 1972 and 1973. He was elected to the office of Grand Junior Warden of the Grand Commandery in 1973 and progressed through the elective line to be elected and installed as Right Eminent Grand Commander in 1978. He presently serves Grand Commandery as a member of the Finance Committee, and for a period of nearly seven years filled the office of Grand Treasurer, following the sudden loss of that Officer. Brother Damon is currently Grand Representative of the Grand Commandery of Virginia near the Grand Commandery of Maine.

Other Masonic Orders of the York Rite in which he has membership are: Maine Council, Order of High Priesthood, Maine Council, Order of Thrice Illustrious Masters; What Cheer York Rite College of Rhode Island; Dirigo York Rite College of Maine; Colonial Council, Knight Masons of New England and Pine Cone Council, Knight Masons of Maine; the Holy Royal Arch Knight Templar Priests which he served as Very Eminent Preceptor; a Past Sovereign of Eusebius Conclave, No. 3, Knights of the Red Cross of Constantine of Auburn and Past Most Illustrious Grand Sovereign of the Imperial Grand Council of Maine. He belongs to the Past Grand Commanders Association and is the present Eminent Prior of Pine Tree Priory, No. 65, Knights of the York Cross of Honour. He has membership as a Knight Grand Cross of Honour with Two Quadrants.

In the Ancient Accepted Scottish Rite, Brother Damon received the Degrees of the order in the Valley of Lewiston-Auburn and in Maine Consistory at Portland. He served as Thrice Potent Master of Lewiston Lodge of Perfection in 1978 and 1979 and as Sovereign Prince of Auburn Council, Princes of Jerusalem in 1980 and 1981. In September 1982 at the session of the Supreme Council held at St. Louis, Missouri, he was created a Sovereign Grand Inspector General 33rd and an Honorary Member of the Supreme Council. He was appointed to the office of Standard Bearer in Maine Council of Deliberation in 1982.

Other Masonic Orders in which he holds membership are Oxford Lodge, No. 1, Ark Mariners; The Royal Order of Scotland; Maine College, Societas Rosicruciana, The Society of Veteran Freemasons of New Hampshire; Past Officers Association of Maine; The Philaethes Society; The Maine Deputies Association; The Maine Lodge of Research; Major General Henry Knox Lodge of Boston and Kora Temple A.A.O.N.M.S. Brother Damon is also a Past President of the Kora Kraftsman Club.

Other fraternal organizations in which he holds membership are as follows: Pine Cone Chapter, No. 26, OES, at Auburn; served as Worthy Patron in 1969; Rugged Cross Shrine, No. 2, Order of the White Shrine of Jerusalem, formerly of Lewiston, but now meeting in Livermore Falls; served as Watchman of Shepherds in 1970; Pineland Court, No. 6, Order of the Amaranth; Abou Ben Adhem Lodge, No. 23, I.O.O.F. of Auburn and a Member of the Grange for forty seven years. GRAND LODGE OF MAINE, A.F. & A.M.

Special Communication

A Special Communication of the Grand Lodge of Maine was held at Augusta, Maine on Monday, 5 June 1989 for the purpose of participating in the State House Celebration and Rededication of the Cornerstone 1829-1989.

The Grand Lodge was opened in Ample Form by M.W. John E. Anagnostis in the Lithgow Library at 10:00 A.M. They then formed in an area across from the library to participate in a parade that marched from the library to the State House. M.W. John E. Anagnostis rode in a horse drawn carriage along with Governor John R. McKernan, and the other dignitaries.

Inasmuch as there was a great deal of movement from one area to another, it was virtually impossible to note all the Grand Lodge officers present and those who participated in the procession.

However the following Grand Lodge Officers were in attendance.

STATE HOUSE CELEBRATION, AUGUSTA, MAINE, 5 JUNE 1989
REDEDICATION OF THE CORNERSTONE 1829-1989
REMARKS MADE BY JOHN E. ANAGNOSTIS, GRAND MASTER OF
MASONS IN MAINE

The Honorable John R. McKernan, Jr., Governor of the State of Maine, Distinguished State, County, and City Officials, M.W. Past Grand Masters, Grand Lodge Officers, Brethren, Friends and Guests.

It is indeed a pleasure and an honor for me and the Masons of Maine to be a part of the re-enactment of the Cornerstone Laying of 1829. Beyond that, it is an important time in the history of our state, not only for us, but also for generations to come.

In today's fast-moving society, we tend to forget the importance of our past. We certainly have all heard platitudes about the importance of history; and if there are young people present, they may give a nod of agreement and go on their merry way.

However, an occasion like this can give real significance to the understanding of how our capitol building came into being. We can witness this important event and realize that all this truly happened 160 years ago.

There were some important concerns that are interesting because they show that the citizens of Maine 160 years ago were just as upset about costs then as we are today. Some of that information taken from the Maine State Archives reveals some interesting points.

For example, former Governor William King was the Commissioner of Public Buildings in 1829. As I'm sure you all know, William King was the first governor of the State of Maine and he was also the first Grand Master of Masons in Maine.

At the time he was Commissioner of Public Buildings, he received a letter from Enoch Lincoln, the governor at the time, suggesting that "solidity, strength and permanency are better than elegance . . . that convenience is worth more than splendor . . . and that utility ought to be the arbiter of taste."

The Honorable William King originally estimated the cost of the state house building to be \$80,000 plus \$5,500 for "an attic story to a dome."

Problems surfaced! Cost overruns were distressing. Mr. William Clark took over as Commissioner of Public Buildings from William King in 1830, and Mr. Clark suggested in the straight forward bluntness of the day that Gov. King was in no small part responsible for the problems of escalating costs and dissension among the workmen. A rash of letters were sent

back and forth making more accusations.

Later, there was another matter of contention between King and Clark. King apparently authorized a reduction in the diameter of the 8 Doric columns forming a front colonnade of the State House from three feet at the base to two feet ten inches.

Mr. Clark wrote the architect, Charles Bulfinch. He was naturally not in favor of the change. And another exchange of letters occurred.

And so it went. Finally, this beautiful structure was completed, and today we see it with its Doric columns and some necessary changes and additions. Were it not for this event today, much of this information would not have come to light.

We as Freemasons took an important part then as we do today. As I stated previously, Governor William King was a Mason and first Grand Master of Masons of Maine. At the time of the cornerstone laying Samuel C. Fessenden was the Grand Master of Masons and performed the Cornerstone laying ceremonies as you will witness them at 2 this afternoon.

Another interesting fact about Samuel Fessenden is that he was an alumnus of Dartmouth College and a student of Daniel Webster. Our present governor, the Honorable John R. McKernan, Jr., is also a Dartmouth alumnus.

At the time of the Cornerstone laying, Andrew Jackson was the President of the United States and also Grand Master of Masons in Tennessee.

As you can see, we have a proud heritage in this state and we, the Masons of Maine, are grateful for the invitation to participate in this historic day.

GRAND MASTER'S REPORT

In Grand Lodge
Portland, Maine
May 1, 1990

Brethren, my sincerest welcome to all of you at this 171st Annual Communication. To our visiting guests, I welcome you to the State of Maine, the state that gives you lobsters, apples, potatoes, black flies and mud season, which by the way, you just barely missed and the state of two seasons, Winter and the 4th of July, but I'm afraid it came early. It was last Saturday that we had Summer.

While you are visiting with us, we want you to be comfortable and happy, and I want you to let me know that if there is anything more that we can do for you your wishes will be fulfilled.

Last February, I was again delighted to attend the Grand Masters' Conference which was held in Utah. The hotel was beautiful but the elevators at a time like that were very overworked and seemed to be running very slowly. One day as we adjourned from one of our meetings, we jammed into an elevator, when it finally arrived. As it ascended about three floors, it stopped and the doors opened. We saw one lady standing there. Without hesitation, she entered and stood among us without saying a word. Just as the elevator stopped at her floor, she turned around, looked at all of us and said "so little time and so many men." The doors opened, and she left.

"So little time and so many men," my brothers. Where has the time gone? It seems like yesterday I was installed as your Grand Master and in so little time it is over with. Well, there is much to do so let's get on with it.

My brothers, we have turned the corner and are looking at a new era in Masonry. Last year we were on the edge and could have gone in either direction. You chose to go forward and make Masonry a positive part of your communities. Because of you and what you have done, your lodges have begun to be revitalized and there are many Masonic activities all over the state. The latest of these are the open houses which were held in your lodges just last month.

I also know that the rekindled interest in Masonry is nationwide and some might say that is the reason for that trend. That may be true, but if you didn't do the extra work in your lodges you certainly would not have been part of that. We have all contributed toward that positive end and should be very proud of our accomplishments.

The following are some of the areas I told you I would work on at the Grand Lodge level. I told you that I would make efforts to cut costs where

ever and whenever possible, and we have done that!! Because of the computer and word processor, there have been several areas where costs have been cut, but the largest of these has been in the proceedings. We saved about \$4,500 by doing all the work on the word processor and having the material camera ready for the printer.

By checking with other printers in the area we have tried in many cases to use the one who could do a job for us for the least amount of money and still have the work done in a professional manner.

We've also cut costs in other ways, and your Finance Committee has worked very diligently on the budget. I am very happy to report to you this morning, **THAT AGAIN THIS YEAR WE ARE NOT RAISING THE PER CAPITA TAX.**

That, of course, is good at least for the time being, but you should not be lulled into complacency thinking that we can now all sit back and not worry. I am certain that there will come a time when the per capita tax will have to be raised again because of rising prices in all areas of our existence.

Nevertheless, you have had a breather for two years which has given you time to make some necessary improvements in your lodges and get your lodges in order.

This year I looked over the **RETURNS** very carefully and was delighted to see the number of lodges that had increases in their membership. Forty lodges raised anywhere between one and fourteen Master Masons. The two that had the greatest increases in membership were **LYGONIA LODGE NO. 40 -- RAISED 11 AND STAR IN THE EAST LODGE NO. 60 -- RAISED 14** Master Masons last year.

There were 18 lodges that stayed even -- no losses and no gains. Of course that indicates that the remainder of the lodges suffered losses not necessarily because they didn't raise as many Master Masons, but because in some cases there were an extraordinary number of deaths. One lodge alone, for example, lost 22 members to the grim reaper.

The area, however, that concerns me still is the **NON PAYMENT OF DUES**. There are lodges that reported as many as 10, 11, and 16 **NPD'S**.

I know that some of those could not be helped, but I also know that in many cases nothing more than 3 letters were sent to the delinquent members with no attempt to contact them in person or by phone. We must start making that personal contact.

My brothers, if I became disenchanted or alienated with my lodge, I know I would want more than a letter that said pay your dues or you will be dropped. **PLEASE, PLEASE** get that personal touch in motion, form a

committee, or get one man that you know can be a good public relations person and have him make contact with the brethren who have not paid their dues.

What I have just said about N.P.D.'S should not be misunderstood in any way to be a reprimand because it is not that. There has been a great deal going on in your Lodges and that is good. For example, I have witnessed a great increase in Lodge activities this year. There have been many Lodges making by-laws changes, holding table lodges, having brotherhood nights, semi-public meetings and awards night.

As I've traveled from one end of this state to the other, I have been a part of some of these awards ceremonies, and as you have seen in your **MAINE MASON**, there have been many **50 YEAR MEDALS AND 5 YEAR STARS** awarded this year. The Brethren receiving these service awards were absolutely delighted because of the pride they have in their Masonry. You should also know that these elder brethren are a great source for the **HISTORIES** of your lodges.

As you know from reading last year's proceedings, we did not do very well with **Lodge histories**. They are important and must be done, I have been told that they are not necessary because we have the Annual Returns that the Secretaries send in. Brethren, those are not histories. They are simply figures. I know that the secretaries certainly don't have the time to write histories. I also know that the Master doesn't have that kind of time either. Appoint a Historian, again another committee, and have him do the necessary research to get those histories completed. Get that person a tape recorder if he doesn't have one and instruct him to sit down with some of the elder brethren of your lodges and get histories that you never knew existed. **Do it now! They won't be around forever.**

As I have gone to the various **District Meetings**, I was amazed at the attendance. I thank the Brethren and the District Deputies for their efforts to make the District Meetings interesting and well attended.

The Grand Lodge suites averaged about 23 at every meeting, and I was so pleased to have many of the Past Grand Masters in attendance.

If you recall, I also told you that I would have a plaque engraved with the District's number that had the highest attendance at a District Meeting and it would be displayed in the Grand Lodge Office where it can be seen by all who come in. In order to make the competition more equitable, the attendance was figured in percentages. **THIS YEAR THE WINNER OF THE FIRST ANNUAL DISTRICT ATTENDANCE AWARD WAS DISTRICT NO. 2.** To R. W. David G. Beckett, DDGM of the Second District, congratulations to you and the brethren of your District (G.M. displayed the Plaque)

Most of the District Meetings this year were semi-public. This allowed

families and friends to attend. It was great because it gave wives of Masons and Non-Masons the opportunity to dispell some of the myths they may have heard about our Fraternity. From these meetings, we have gained some new Master Masons and we also got some very good publicity.

In the area of **publicity**, our Fraternity has made great strides through two programs that I strongly supported the past couple of years. The first is the **Drug and Alcohol Abuse Prevention Among Children Program** and the second is the **Scholarship Program**.

The Drug and Alcohol Abuse Prevention Program has done a great deal of good in many communities in our State. I have gotten calls thanking me and the Grand Lodge for the fine work the Masons are doing in that area. We have also been able to get pictures and write-ups in some of the newspapers through the state, thanks to R.W. Harland Hitchins, R.W. George Pulkkinen and the Photography Committee.

This afternoon we will have Ms. Eve Bither, the Commissioner of Education for the State of Maine to address us. In her remarks I'm certain she will mention the awards we will receive from the state for the work we have done in the line of Drug and Alcohol Abuse Prevention among young people.

It is important to clear up a misconception at this point about the money we have collected from the Brethren and where it goes. You must know that we do not give the money to the State Department. However, the State Department helps us to identify schools that have drug and alcohol abuse prevention programs in place that need funding. Beyond that, the State Department has helped us with the seminars by providing the personnel to run them. We pay for the housing and meals for the many who attend these seminars throughout the state. Once again let me emphasize that we do not give the money to the State Department.

I must also tell you that I was disappointed with the donations to the Drug and Alcohol Abuse Prevention Program this year. We took in approximately \$42,000. I did not push as hard but I did ask that each of you make a pledge to donate the \$3.00 to the fund annually as I had established an **Annual \$100,000.00 Goal**. Please put this charity on the top of your list and send in your donation now if you haven't done so.

The Scholarship Program was started with the idea of giving 48 \$500.00 scholarships to graduating seniors. That was two scholarships in each district. The first year Lodges and Square & Compass Clubs also gave scholarships and that made the total about 60. Last year there were about 75 scholarships given and this year we expect that we will see about 80 \$500.00 scholarships given through the State.

Brethren, there are approximately 127 public high schools in Maine. I can see the day when there will be at least one scholarship in every high

school given by the Masons of Maine. I commend you for this and extend to you my sincerest congratulations for the concern you have shown for our youth. **YOU ARE WONDERFUL!!** I'll tell you, the young people of Maine are beginning to know who the Masons are.

Talking with Masters and District Deputies as I've traveled throughout the State, I've found several Lodges to have severe problems. These ranged from not being able to get new officers to money problems. There was no question that they needed help. We set up informal meetings and over a cup of coffee, a great deal of talk, and good honest questions and answers, we began to identify their problems.

One of the problems we found was that some of these new Masters did not have enough background to know how to run a lodge. On the other end of the spectrum, some Masters had been in office for a long time. They were uncertain what Grand Lodge was trying to do with the changes I had been talking about. In many cases, they could not believe that Grand Lodge was interested in making changes. With the help of the Education Committee, I asked them to work out a Master's Home Study Course immediately so that Masters could have them in their hands before September.

R.W. Wilbur Loveitt, Chairman of the Committee went to work and devised that course. He even set up a test for them to take. To date, there are approximately 40 Masters who took that proficiency test and will receive their certificates soon.

We all know that the planning needs to begin with the Wardens, so at another Masonic Education Committee meeting, we discussed the situation. A short time later, Worshipful Wayne Adams came up with a **WARDENS' LEADERSHIP COURSE**. That course is now being implemented in the 19th District as well as some other areas of the State.

I know that the Masters and Wardens appreciate that assistance. I also thank R.W. Loveitt and Worshipful Brother Adams for their hard work and their efforts to get those programs working. There is no doubt in my mind that education is the key to many of our problems in Masonry, and I thank the Masonic Education Committee for their hard work and cooperation. I've asked for their help and they've given it to me.

Many of those Lodges that had problems are working very hard and have shown improvement. They are enthusiastic and they tell me how happy they are that there is activity in their Lodges again.

Unfortunately, I wasn't successful with all the Lodges that needed help. One Lodge surrendered its charter this year. After traveling to Fort Fairfield to meet with the Brethren and Officers of Eastern Frontier Lodge No. 112, I came home hoping that we gave them the help they seemed to need. It wasn't so. Eastern Frontier Lodge No. 112 surrendered their charter last

Summer. I found that unfortunate.

There have been so many improvements in the Lodges and I am very proud of them. I must brag a little, though, because my Lodge, Saco No. 9, invited the Virginia Craftsmen to come to Saco to exemplify the Master Mason Degree according to Virginia Ritual. What a great evening that was. The Attendance -- 180 plus.

Then, just a short while later, Rising Virtue Lodge No. 10 held a Shrine Unit Night. A representative from each unit from Anah Temple was invited to attend and watch a team of men from their units work the Master Mason Degree on one candidate. Attendance -- 350 plus. That was spectacular!!!

Other functions given by Lodges were receptions. Saco Lodge No. 9 give me my reception last October and that too was a wonderful evening. It was great to see all my friends and their ladies, and again I thank all of you who attended and I also thank you for the many wonderful gifts. Even though, I must admit, the most memorable gift of all will be the speeding ticket my wife Dolly got and presented to me that evening.

Another reception I was honored to take part in was for Illustrious Franklin Hinckley, 33rd, then Deputy for Scottish Rite in Maine. It was my great pleasure to present him the Josiah Hayden Drummond Distinguished Service Medal, and if Ill. Franklin Hinckley would please stand at this time. (To Ill. Hinckley) Ill. Sir, it's a pleasure, to have been the Grand Master to present you that medal. Thank you very much. (Applause)

Then there was that very hot summer's day when we were invited to participate in the re-enactment of the cornerstone laying at our State's Capitol in Augusta. It was an interesting day and a real honor for the Masons of Maine.

This year we had one dedication for a new lodge hall and that was Arion Lodge No. 162 in Goodwins Mills. It was an excellent afternoon and I was pleased to be the Grand Master for that dedication because that Lodge is in District 18, my District.

This was also the year that two jurisdictions took some giant steps toward bringing all Masons in their states into the fold. Connecticut and Nebraska formally recognized Prince Hall Masonry in their own jurisdictions. Of course, this brought about a flurry of discussion from many states, particularly those from the South. Louisiana sent out an edict formally withdrawing recognition from both jurisdictions, and we began to wonder what other southern states would do. To date I have not received any other edicts, but interestingly enough, Virginia did extend the privilege of intervisitation to Prince Hall Masons in their state without formally recognizing them.

In fact the Grand Master of the Prince Hall Masons was the speaker at the Grand Lodge Banquet and the Governor of Virginia, who is also black

and a 33rd Degree Mason, gave the opening remarks at their Grand Lodge Session.

At this time, Brethren, I have three recommendations to make:

1. To eliminate the Per Diem for all delegates, present and past Grand Lodge Officers, and all others who are now entitled to receive it at the Grand Lodge Annual Communication, (will save about \$10,000.)
2. To establish a Lodge Catastrophic Emergency Fund to be used to assist Lodges with severe structural problems. The fund would be established with the money normally used for the Per Diem at the Grand Lodge Annual Communication and the surplus from the Masonic Charity Fund.

The interest from this fund would only be used after the Lodge made proper application, inspection made by qualified designated Brethren, and financial need established. Amount to be loaned would be established by the Grand Lodge and the examiners.

3. That the Advisory Council and Finance Committee investigate ways to raise needed funds for the Grand Lodge General Fund and advise the Grand Master which of his programs can be funded adequately for the improvement of Masonry in Maine.

As it is now, the Grand Master's hands are tied because his programs cannot be promoted because Grand Lodge does not have the money. If necessary, these two committees would recommend that appointment of a professional fund raiser (a Mason) to work with the Grand Master in funding and promoting his programs.

The time has come to extend my thanks to many people. There is always a danger of overlooking someone, so I'll begin by thanking all of you for two wonderful years. To each of you sitting in the audience this morning, to the District Deputies, the District Representatives, to the Past Grand Masters and other dignitaries on the stage, to the ladies in the office without whose hard work and willing assistance, there is no way I could have survived, to the Grand Treasurer, and to my family who felt at times that they had to take a back seat while I fulfilled my Masonic duties, you have my deepest gratitude. I could not have done it without your assistance and patience. Did I miss anyone?

In one of the speeches President George Bush made some time ago, he said he wants people to work harder to make America a kinder and gentler place for people to live in. I know that if there is an example for those people to follow, it has to be R.W. Ed George, our retiring Grand Secretary (ED, PLEASE COME TO THE LECTERN.)

Ed, you have served this Grand Lodge for eight years and have won the

admiration and respect of every Mason in the state. As I've traveled around, the Brethren have expressed to me how they've enjoyed working with you and they will miss you.

You have always been there for them and for me. In appreciation many Lodges have sent a check so you and Gert can take a trip or do some traveling at your leisure to get the rest and relaxation you richly deserve in your retirement. Don't be a stranger. Come to see us at the office whenever you're in town, and don't forget the Open House in Saco this coming Sunday.

On behalf of the many Lodges in the State and the Grand Lodge of Maine, it gives me a great deal of pleasure to present you this check. Enjoy your retirement. You have served us well and we all thank you, from the bottom of our heart. (Standing ovation) Remarks of gratitude were then given by R.W. E. V. George.

And now it's time for me to leave you with just these final thoughts. I have had several goals. Some I've achieved and others I haven't. The days and weeks sometimes just didn't seem long enough for me to do everything I had planned, but I am satisfied that the incoming Grand Master with whom I have worked very closely can pick up where I've left off in some areas. We've tried to create the continuity that is necessary.

The most difficult goal I've tried to reach is that of changing attitudes about our great Fraternity, in some cases, I think I have done that. I also think that I have left the Fraternity in better shape than what it was when I took over. I know that is every Grand Master's wish. You've also heard me say many times that as Grand Master it is important to keep your sights to the time when it is all over because you meet the same people coming down that you met going up. That time has come. I thank you again for all your courtesies and help. You've been great! So now I leave you with these final thoughts:

"Life itself can't give us joy unless we really will it. Life itself can give us time and space -- It's up to us to fill it.

Practice that charity of love. To understand that charity is the radiant spark emanating from God, the inexhaustible source of love. We must extend ourselves to the broader and nobler charity that regards all people as one. The charity that is swift of foot, ready of hand, in the cause of a common humanity. The charity that writes another person's vices in water and his virtues in enduring brass."

Thank you my Brethren and friends, and may God hold you in the palm, of his hand.

REPORT OF THE GRAND LECTURER

Buckfield, Maine

April 1, 1990

To the Most Worshipful Grand Master, Officers and Brethren of
The Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of
Maine:

The 1989-1990 Masonic instruction year was one of change in scheduling and experiment in format for schools. This year all the schools were checkerboarded to allow all three of the degree schools to be held in each of the first three rounds under the direction of each Lecturer. This change made it possible to attend all three degree schools or one that might be needed in each round of instruction. It appears that most lodge officers in every district support the checkerboarding of schools and would like to see it continued.

After listening to some of the concerns expressed by members of the craft concerning how schools are conducted and with the aid of the Assistant Grand Lecturers, I authorized an experimental change of format for the Master Mason schools in the 15th and 17th district.

On January 15 I trekked to Mystic Tie Lodge #154 in Weld with V. W. Charles Barker. He conducted the Master Mason Degree in a question and answer format. The officers and members were encouraged to ask questions that were of concern to them covering anything to do with the Master Mason Degree. The officers and members of the 15th district were not aware of this format change when they arrived for the school. Adjusting quickly, they received answers to questions not previously answered to their satisfaction. On January 16 I traveled to Casco Lodge #36 in Yarmouth with V.W. Kenneth Gardner for the 17th District Master Mason School. The same format was used at this school with one exception. V.W. Brother Gardner had a table brought in and placed in the northeast corner and invited a panel of well informed Masons to participate acting as a panel of experts. This panel answered questions on the Master Mason Degree posed by officers and members of the 17th district. This district was given prior notice of the format to be used and they were well prepared. The members that made up the panel were unaware they would be asked to serve in this capacity but were happy to assist. The change of format was well received here also and many favorable remarks made.

On January 22 the format was tried at the 23rd District Entered Apprentice school, Ashlar Lodge in Auburn. No prior notice was given concerning the change. Many liked the format, but felt that by not giving prior notice of change, left them unprepared. Some were disappointed that the entire ritual was not covered. These were new lodge officers, expecting to have the Grand Lecturer read the ritual. These concerns were well founded and will be considered in any decision of further use of the format.

On January 30 Whitney Lodge #167 in Canton hosted an experimental format for the 20th District Fellowcraft School. Once again no previous knowledge of the new format was given. This seems to be the only drawback to this form of instruction.

During this past year the lodge officer participation at the three ritual schools, E.A., F.C. and M.M., was down about 3% from the previous year. Seventeen lodges had no officers in attendance at these three ritual schools. This is an increase of 11 from the previous year. To say the least, these are very disappointing statistics. In order to reverse this trend, we must improve the communication between the Lecturers, District Deputies, District Representatives and Lodge Masters. Attention in scheduling dates is a must in order to avoid conflict with stated meetings and meetings of other bodies.

The lodge Master is the one who is responsible for notifying his officers and making arrangements for them to attend these schools.

The following list of lodges had no officer participation at the E.A., F.C or M.M. ritual schools of instruction. However, it should be noted that some of the lodges did have other lodge members present at some of the schools.

District Educational Schools (Non-Ritual)

The non-ritual schools were not checkerboarded with the other ritual schools. They were all held in the fourth round.

The subjects for discussion were divided into five categories.

1. Prayers at our meetings, emphasizing that they should be non-sectarian in nature.
2. Reading of applications and balloting.
3. Receiving visitors into the lodge with emphasis on the Grand Master and District Deputy Grand Master.
4. Table lodge, how it should be conducted and its purpose.
5. Choice of subject that the District Deputy felt would be of benefit to his District. These subjects were presented by the Grand Lecturer, Assistant Grand Lecturer, District Deputy, District Representative, or a knowledgeable brother. There was good participation from the members of the craft, and many thought provoking questions presented.

Degree Teams

This year's degree teams have done excellent work from all reports. I have had the pleasure of seeing some of these teams in operation.

This year three new teams were added to the active list, Anah Temple Oriental Band, Central Maine Power, and the Telephone Degree Team. The last two were active in the past and reactivated this year.

In the upcoming year I plan to have a special school of instruction in the M.M. degree for each degree team. I will be in contact with each Degree Team Master to make arrangements for these schools. I am also asking for a complete list of members from each team. The following is a list of the authorized degree teams for the 1989-1990 year.

Guests at Table No. 1 were introduced by Brother Clyde L. Ferris, Exec. Officer for DeMolay of Maine. Guests at Tables No. 2 through 6 were introduced by Past Grand Masters of Maine sitting at each of those tables. M.W. John E. Anagnostis asked the District Deputy Grand Masters, District Representatives along with the Grand Lecturer and Assistant Grand Lecturers to stand and be recognized. The Grand Master then thanked all for their work and their attendance at the banquet.

M.W. Richard E. Fletcher was introduced to present the Grand Master with a gift made for him.

Following a sumptuous banquet, the Grand Master introduced Ill. Brother John R. Graham, 33rd:

"At the first Grand Masters' Conference I attended, I heard a man speak that made a great deal of sense to me, but being a brand new Deputy Grand Master, I didn't say much about him to any of the Masons who were at that meeting because he sounded somewhat radical and talked about changes that needed to take place in our fraternity. I never did forget this man, though, because when I became Grand Master, I knew that changes had to come

about if Masonry were going to survive, and he made even more sense to me as I got more and more involved as Grand Master.

Our speaker this evening, Ill. Brother John R. Graham, 33rd, a member of Columbian Lodge, A.F. & A.M. in Massachusetts, is the brother who, I felt, would be just the person to top off my two years as Grand Master because I am certain his remarks about needed changes will echo some of the ideas I have talked to you about.

Brother Graham is President and CEO of John R. Graham, Inc. of Quincy, Massachusetts, a marketing services and consulting firm which he founded in 1976. It is a full-service marketing agency handling the public relations, advertising and marketing for a variety of service, manufacturing, financial, not-for-profit organizations and associations in New England and across the nation.

Mr. Graham also provides consulting services to a wide range of companies and organizations. Among the firm's clients are the Supreme Council of the Scottish Rite Masons (450,000 members), and the Grand Lodge of Pennsylvania (180,000 members).

Bro. Graham has developed a unique marketing philosophy which emphasizes the need to create customers through the development of a specific buying environment. By practicing his own philosophy, he has built his company to its present status without ever making a cold sales call.

An accomplished writer, his marketing and sales articles appear regularly in many business publications including Fortune, Small Business Report, and Personal Selling Power. He has also just finished a book entitled Magnet Marketing which will be published this fall.

In addition to writing, Mr. Graham speaks at business meetings across the country and conducts seminars on marketing and sales training, fund raising, membership development and public relations. Recent seminar and speaking engagements have been conducted for many business concerns all over the United States.

Brother John's credentials don't stop there. He is also involved in the field of fund raising. In that capacity, Brother Graham has served as fund raising counsel for a number of not-for-profit organizations including the Ancient Accepted Scottish Rite, N.M.J. where he has been responsible for a \$20 million fund raising campaign, as well as the organization's public relations and annual fund campaigns. The annual Scottish Rite Masonic Family Life Week program won the Freedom Foundation's top national award for community programs.

Bro. Graham was born and raised in Los Angeles, California, and was graduated from Occidental College. He and his wife, Mary, the CEO of the printing firm, live in Quincy with their young daughter.

Brethren, it gives me a great deal of pleasure to give you our speaker for the evening, whose topic "Does Masonry Have a Chance" is certainly what we all want to know.....Ill. Brother John R. Graham."

It's wonderful to be here; however, I did not come here to be insulted, which has occurred twice in the last couple minutes. As you noticed, I am a graduate of Occidental College, "Oxy" for short and I don't like to be called an oxymoron. To make matters even worse, if they could be worse, I am a

former Unitarian minister and you had the gall to seat me next to a Methodist minister. Now that just ain't no class.

Nice to see some wonderful people here, the illuminaries of our fraternity, Franklin Hinckley down here; my long time friend Charlie Glassmire. It's good to see you here. Phil Hall and the Grand Master of the one true Grand Lodge in North America -- Massachusetts.

Actually, I am just a garden variety Mason. Somebody said, "How did you get to be a 33rd degree Mason?" Well, everybody makes a mistake. I have never held a Masonic office; I have no desire to. I happen to have a very high regard for Masonry and the philosophy of life because I think it offers the hope of our society. The irony is that when I first started to work for the Supreme Council I was not a Mason, although my father had been a Mason; and it was to some amazement, I guess, that I seemed to know something about Masonry. Actually, I knew nothing, but I happened to like the 18th century and happened to feel that the ideas of the Enlightenment are the ideas that have made this country great. And having been a Unitarian minister, those ideas were very much at home in my life; and I've often said that every Unitarian ought to be a Mason. We have one down here who would at least agree with me.

Unfortunately, in Masonry, we tend to live in a fantasy world. Perhaps you heard the story about the two psychiatrists who were at a convention, and they sat down at the local bar to have a drink and one said to the other, "Would you tell me your most difficult case?"

And the other one thought and thought for a moment and he said, "Certainly. I had this fellow who had the fantasy that he had a rich uncle in South America who was going to leave him a fortune, and this fantasy of the uncle and the fortune so dominated his life that he wouldn't go out of the house, wouldn't go to work. He wouldn't talk to anybody. All he did was, day in and day out, go to the mail box to look for a letter from the attorney saying that his uncle had died and the fortune was his, and nothing else occupied his life. For eight years, I worked with him."

And the other psychiatrist said, "Did you cure him?"

He said, "I saw that man day in and day out every day for eight years and I finally cured him -- and then that stupid letter arrived."

Unfortunately, we live by some fantasies in our own fraternity. There was a time when it meant something to become a Mason. Being a Mason meant that you had special prestige in the community. People highly regarded you. There was a unique sense of trust. You were known as a man of character. Do some of you remember that?

Several years ago the Grand Master of one of the Grand Lodges of this country approached the two United States senators from his state about becoming Masons and they turned him down. Being a Mason today does not add to a man's prestige in the community, so why would any man want to become a Mason? Men at one point, some years ago, wanted to become Masons because it put them in touch with the right people, with the decision makers of the community, the movers and the shakers, the leaders of business, the leaders of civic affairs, the bankers, the physicians, the lawyers, the judges -- Not today. Those people aren't Masons today, so why would any man want to become a Mason?

There was a time it meant that your career got a nice big push. There were what we used to call, you remember some of them, Masonic Companies: Boston Edison was one of them, Penn Central was one. I don't know if Boston and Maine was one. I think it may have been a Masonic Company. (Is that true, Franklin?) Yes, if you wanted to go anywhere in that company, you had to be a Mason -- true or false? (True) There are no Masonic Companies today. Men who wanted to succeed in business and wanted to be known as men of integrity, whether it was insurance or whatever the field, became Masons. It was good for their careers. No man would choose Masonry today in order to advance his career.

Masonry offered men the three most important things in life, three great incentives: It gave men status; it gave men prestige; and it gave a man influence in his community; and that isn't the story today, and certainly our own sons don't believe it. Being a Mason doesn't impress anyone.

A couple of weeks ago I was having a meeting, a business meeting, and I said I've got to leave early because I've got to get a plane because I've got to go to a Masonic meeting, and one of the men looked at me and said, "Why in the world would you want to be a Mason?" Masonic membership today does not convey status, prestige, or influence; and that's a fact. So why be a Mason?

I would like to suggest that there're some good, strong, legitimate, worthwhile reasons. Masonry continues to set forth the values that make life worthwhile. James Fallows, the author of a new book More Like Us, which compares Japanese and American society has this to say, "In the long run, a society's strengths depends on the way ordinary people voluntarily behave." Masonry has maintained that for centuries. And if we are to have a strong society, it won't be because we have more beliefs, more laws; it will be because ordinary people decide to behave in a moral way. And that's the message of Masonry.

More than anything else, Masonry gives a man a positive picture of what it means to be a man. The thing I really like about Masonry -- it's the one organization that doesn't put a man down. Everybody is always telling us how bad we are. Masonry says you're not only good but you can be better, and that's the message America needs today.

Why should a man want to be a Mason? Because being a Mason separates the man from the crowd. One of the fascinating things to me about being a Mason is this, that you can never forget that you are a Mason. True or false? True. You might forget your wife's birthday; you might forget your wedding anniversary; you might forget to bring home a quart of milk, but you can't forget that you're a Mason. No other organization can make that claim.

When you and I say, "I'm a Mason." That means something that we can never forget. So that all that we have to offer, with all that Masonry can do for a man in providing a sense of meaning to his life, then why are we so quickly slipping into the darkness? We are not only fading away; we are falling apart. So what's the problem? I assure you that it's not Viet Nam. It's about time we quit beating that dead horse. I assure you that it is not television -- and that old dog don't hunt either. It's not that people are busier today than they were forty years ago. It's not the breakdown in morality;

it's not drugs. Those are all excuses Masons use to explain away the fact that we are falling apart.

I would suggest that the problem that we have is a problem of leadership. And for the next few minutes I would like to talk about that. We have had for decades a crisis in leadership, and it's aggravated by a number of factors. One of those is time. If you have the time in Masonry, you can get to the top. If you just put in enough time, you get the goodies; or as we say in prison, "You keep your nose clean, you get paroled." Leadership in Masonry is the reward for good behavior. As a matter of fact, we are one of the few organizations I know about that has absolutely no standards for leadership. No job criteria; no job description. If you put in the time, you get the dime.

We have other leadership problems, we completely confuse titles with competence. You do enough bowing and scraping and say, "Yes, sir; No, sir," you get to the top. We have so many chains around our necks they're really more symbolic than the chains around our brains. Jewels don't make a leader and it's about time we recognized that.

Just take a closer look of just how we behave in Masonry. We place the emphasis in all the wrong places. I think there's a song something like that. I call it Masonry's Mussolini syndrome. Now that may seem a little august, but those of you who remember Mussolini remember the fact that Italy was in total absolute chaos. That didn't bother Mussolini. He made the trains run on time. They didn't go anywhere, but they ran on time. Masonry has a Mussolini complex.

Think about our meeting notices, printed by the carload. We get the meeting notices out on time. The fact that nobody comes to the meetings because they're dull and boring doesn't seem to make an impact on us. But everybody has a notice. And we're masters at record keeping. We keep the most accurate records that are conceivable. No one beats us when it comes to record keeping. The fact that the statistics are going downhill at an ever accelerating rate doesn't seem to bother us. The records are accurate.

And are we good at making reports? We're the world's leading experts. They're on time; they're always in the proper form; just the right words are used; no one's name is ever left out, God forbid. The fact that the reports are meaningless gobbledeygook doesn't seem to bother us, and then we repeat the same report year after year.

And are we good at holding perfect ceremonies? We are, pardon the expression, past masters. They're dignified; they're meticulous; our ceremonies are elegant in the extreme, but we cannot seem to get through our heads the obvious fact that there's no one there to see them.

And then take a look at our buildings. We take care of them. You could take a second lieutenant with a white glove and never find any dust. The floors are spit polished, but we don't seem to get the message that there's nobody using the building.

We're also very good at putting men on committees, but it doesn't seem to bother us either that the men that we put on the committees lack talent, skill or experience. They can't do anything. And if you happen to land a talented guy and put him on a committee we toss a Masonic cabletow around his neck, or as we say in the West, where I come from, "We hog-tie

him." We make sure that he gets the message that he's only to do what has been done for the past forty years.

Why don't we have strong leaders? The answer to me is obvious. We don't want them. We don't want new ideas. We don't want interesting programs. We don't want excitement. We don't want the boat rocked. And anyone who tries to bring excitement or new ideas will have his wings clipped by a coterie of men with the word past after their name.

Would you like me to be more explicit? Any competent man; any competent man with any leadership potential may love Masonry, but he's certainly not going to spend his valuable time knocking his head against the wall. He's going to say, "Forget it." The Masonic leadership message in my estimation, is all too clear, "Behave yourself, put in the time, and you'll get to the top. Don't rock the boat, keep your mouth shut; don't come up with new ideas; don't question anything, and then if you're a "good ole boy," you get our Masonic goodies.

We have become a fraternity of pathetic bureaucrats, and it's killing us. If we intend to get to the year 2000, I think that there are some leadership qualities that we need, and the first one is imagination. We need to set leadership standards of what we expect the man to do when he has a job. We need to set goals and objectives just as any business would if it plans to survive the next decade. Where do you want to be when you complete your term of office? Where do you want your fraternity to be when you walk out the door? We need the kind of imagination that men in our communities can provide us, and we ought to be talking to them about becoming Masons.

And we need some excitement in our fraternity. We should get down on our knees and thank even a Methodist God for our beloved members who year after year pay their dues to one of the dullest organizations in existence. God bless them.

I love Pontiac. I don't drive one. I love Pontiac. Pontiac doesn't build cars; it builds excitement. We ought to be building excitement, and one reason men gravitate to the Shrine is simply because there's excitement, and we better learn that lesson. We better take some bold steps. We think we're doing a terrific job if we put a pathetic booth up at a county fair. We need blimps. It's time to make a man's heart go pitter-pat and his chest swell with pride. We are so dull it's dangerous. We're so stiff that if you dropped us we'd shatter. We need excitement -- imagination, excitement, vision.

What do we want this fraternity to be in the year 2000? We should be addressing that question. How are we going to get there? By the year 2000 the Grand Lodge of Maine will have less than 17,000 members - period. That's a fact. But it doesn't need to happen. We need to begin that vision by honoring those who can give us imagination, who can give us excitement. We need to start demanding those qualities from all our leaders and from ourselves. Then and only then will we begin to see once again such qualities as status and prestige and influence return to Masonry.

So what's my advice? Well, how are we going to get the right leadership? You want to be a Masonic leader? Here's my advice. If you have a good idea, go ahead and do it because it's much easier to apologize than to ask for permission. If you have a good idea, good ahead and do it. It's

much easier to apologize than to ask for permission. We need that daring. We need to stop ignoring the past and start adoring the future. We need to be creative in the ways we look at young men.

During the month of March we conducted an extensive radio, television and print campaign across the state of Pennsylvania. Shortly after the ads started appearing, the telephone rang at the Grand Lodge and a woman said, "I'm amazed. My grandfather was a Mason. I thought you people were dead." We need to turn that message around. We need to stop adoring the past and look to the future. What's most important is that we need leaders who are committed to saving our fraternity because then and only then will Freemasonry have a chance. Thank you.

Grand Master: Ill. Bro. John, I tried to say that. It didn't quite come out the same way. Before I dismiss you this evening....

R.W. Stanley Sampson: Most Worshipful Sir, I have a gentleman here who wishes to approach and make a presentation. (My son and brother Sam made a presentation to the Grand Master from his wife Dolly.)

The necessary announcements were made and the banquet was closed with an invocation by Wor. Bro. and Rev. Ed Fenderson, Grand Lodge Chaplain.

These financial statements are the responsibility of the Company's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit.

PRELIMINARY REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON CREDENTIALS

Bro. Mason Shaw, for the Committee on Credentials, presented a verbal report which was accepted. The Grand Master granted permission to amend and add before the final report and urged any Lodges who have not registered to do so.

ANNOUNCEMENTS

The Grand Master announced there would be a luncheon in the Dining Hall in the basement for all those who bought tickets last night and this morning, as well as our guests.

The Annual Meeting of the Maine District Deputies Association will be held in Boody Hall, on the second floor, at 12:45 P.M.

The Grand Lodge was then called from Labor to Refreshment until 1:30 P.M., closing prayer being offered by Grand Chaplain Lawrence W. Harborne.

FIRST DAY -- AFTERNOON SESSION

At 1:30 P.M., the Grand Master introduced Ms. Eve Bither, Commissioner of Education for the State of Maine to speak and give comments on the Grand Lodge Drug and Alcohol Abuse Prevention Program.

I am honored to be here today to report on the ways in which the Masonic Foundation for the Prevention of Drug and Alcohol Abuse Among Children continues to support and benefit schools across our state. In just over two years, your generosity has infused over \$150,000 into prevention efforts from Fort Fairfield to York and from Lubec to Bethel.

During the 1988-89 school year, 49 direct grants were awarded, totaling \$89,000, the largest amount ever raised and given by a social organization to support prevention in Maine. In addition, 108 teachers from 48 schools received scholarships for training in the Refusal Skills Program. Teachers received training so they could subsequently help children in their classrooms develop the skills to say "no" to alcohol and drugs while keeping their friends, staying out of trouble, and having fun.

Your commitment to continue that which you had begun was clear as plans were laid for this school year. In December of 1989, 43 schools received grants totaling \$50,559 to support their alcohol and drug prevention programs. First priority this year was given to applications from schools that did not receive grants last year. In fact, there were 37 different schools and 6 repeat schools received awards. In the two years of making grants, your foundation has assisted 85 different schools. I would say this is a very impressive record.

Awards ranged from \$85 to \$2,700, with an average amount of \$1,137. It is really amazing how much difference such a seemingly small amount can make in a school's ability to provide important innovations for students.

Let me share with you some of the specific ways in which schools are using the grants given this year by your foundation. Their uses can be divided into five different areas. Twelve schools received a total of \$12,973 to support peer programs. Peer programs provide youth with skills for helping other youth. As we all know, especially if we are parents, kids seem to respond better to other kids than they do to adults, especially when they need someone to listen to their concerns and offer encouragement. Peer helpers are students in a school who are identified as being available to listen and when necessary, refer students to appropriate sources of assistance for problems. Your funds are helping to train peer helpers and their adult advisors in Caribou, Woodland, Unity, Kennebunk and other communities.

Ten schools received a total of \$12,103 to purchase curricula and other resource materials. These schools join others in the state that are providing students with full units of instruction about alcohol and drug use and the related issues. In Brunswick, Bethel, and East Holden, students will be involved in the D.A.R.E. Program using trained police officers in the classrooms. This program has gained national recognition for its effectiveness with students in the middle school grades. Bingham, Allagash, Winslow,

and others will implement one of several other excellent curriculum models. Student awareness programs involve junior and senior high youth in an intensive three-to-five day experience during which an entire grade explores the multiple issues of alcohol and drug use. The programs break down cliques and bring students together as a peer group willing to support each other in decisions to remain drug-free and to help those whose lives have been impacted by alcohol and drug abuse in their families. This year, 10 schools, including Mt. Desert, Island Falls, Orrington, and Van Buren received \$9,623 in grants to support student awareness programs.

Schools can only hope to be effective in their prevention efforts by ensuring that their teachers have the necessary training to implement programs. Grants totaling \$6,750 to Cape Elizabeth, Dover Foxcroft, Bridgton, Ellsworth, Arundel and Hodgdon are being used to provide such training for teachers.

Finally, 12 schools systems will benefit from the \$9,110 granted for special presentations as part of prevention programs. There are several creative and effective groups in this state that offer prevention messages for students. They include a puppet presentation, "All American Sam" for younger children, and rock music assemblies with Rick Pinette for older students. As part of an overall awareness program, these presentations will have a powerful impact as they are provided in Jay, Winthrop, Sabattus, Lubec and other communities.

In addition to the grants provided to schools this year, the foundation continued to support schools wishing to have teachers trained to implement the Refusal Skills Program. A total of 135 teachers from 160 schools received scholarships for training in the Refusal Skills Program. This brings to 335 the number of teachers who have been trained and are using this program as a result of your assistance. More importantly, several thousand children are benefiting from the training their teachers have received.

Another scholarship program was added this year, enabling 95 individuals from 22 schools to receive training to initiate Student Assistance Teams. An S.A.T. (as they are called) consists of key people such as nurses, guidance counselors, and special education directors who work together to determine how best to help students who have been identified as "at-risk" because of behavior patterns or known histories of alcohol and drug abuse. The goal is to intervene with these students as early as possible, thereby reducing the possibility that they will drop out of school or be expelled or require extensive remedial education services.

I hope you are feeling, as I am, that the Masonic Fraternity has made a substantial contribution to Maine's ongoing efforts to deal with alcohol and drug abuse. You continue to be a leader as a private organization by the extent of your commitment to prevention. I am very pleased that we in the Maine Department of Education have had the opportunity to assist you in this endeavor. I encourage you to maintain your support and involvement. My congratulations to you! Your efforts are making a difference for schools and our children.

Ms. Bither's remarks were greeted loudly with a standing ovation from the brethren. The Grand Master then thanked her for her remarks and the assist

ance the State Department has given to the Masons of Maine.

The Grand Lodge 171st Annual Communication was then called from refreshment to labor by the Grand Master. Brother and Rev. Clovis Frame, Grand Chaplain was escorted to the altar to offer the prayer for the afternoon session.

FRATERNAL RELATIONS

M.W. Charles R. Glassmire, for the Committee on Fraternal Relations presented the Annual Correspondence Report consisting of a Foreword, Special Report and Recommendations. It was voted that the Reports be accepted and the recommendations adopted. They are printed with the reviews as an Appendix to the Proceedings. The Grand Master asked for questions or comments.

Thurston H. Smith, Jr. came to the microphone and was recognized. He is the Proxie from David A. Hooper Lodge, No. 201 in West Sullivan where he is the Sr. Deacon and has membership in many of the Masonic appendant bodies.

At the last stated meetings of both my home lodge and the 21st District Officer's Association, it was voted that I should be authorized to read the following statement.

Brethren, it is not without some fear and trepidation that I stand before you today - speaking in front of a large group such as this with a possibly unpopular point of view, takes all the courage I can muster. However, after considerable thought and soul searching, conscience dictates that I must speak out on a matter that has long been contentious within our fraternity. That is our long standing lack of fraternal relations with the Prince Hall Masons.

The beginnings of Prince Hall Masonry date to about the time of the founding of The Grand Lodge of Massachusetts; and while this is not a time for historical debate, it is nevertheless clear that the brethren of Prince Hall have substantial documentation as to their beginnings. They have built a substantive organization comprising some six thousand lodges with a combined membership of over a quarter of a million men. This enormous figure is not surprising when one realizes that Prince Hall Masonry predates many Grand Lodges, here and around the world.

Why then have these masons not been recognized as anything but "spurious"? Their ritual is the same as ours. They have Past Masters, Junior Deacons, District Deputies, and Grand Masters. They meet on the level, act on the square, and believe in the brotherhood of man and the fatherhood of God. On the Prince Hall altar lies an open Bible on which are the square and compasses. Are these men spurious - or merely black? We can only imagine what could and would happen if an enterprising journalist decided to make an issue out of this long standing discrepancy. The results of the Morgan affair would pale by comparison.

During the past year or so the Grand Lodges of Connecticut and Nebraska have officially recognized Prince Hall Masonry within their jurisdictions.

Also, it is significant to note, that The Grand Lodge of Massachusetts has begun to have communication with the Prince Hall Lodges within its jurisdiction in the form of dinners and other such gatherings. This movement is likely afoot in other grand jurisdictions as well. It seems clear that the time is here for our Grand Lodge to make similar gestures toward the three Prince Hall Lodges located here in Maine.

I, therefore, Most Worshipful Sir, would like to make a motion that The Committee on Fraternal Relations create a group to study and act upon this question. As the millennia approaches, let us fulfill the promise we have made to ourselves - that of uniting men who would otherwise have remained at a perpetual distance.

Thank you.

The Grand Master asked that Brother Smith read the last part of the comments, and Brother Smith read the last sentence again:

"I would make a motion that the Committee on Fraternal Relations create room to study and act upon this question, and let me say that I've left that somewhat unclear on purpose. The reason why is because I understand the severity of the question.

The Grand Master explained that there was a motion on the floor and that Brother Smith could make his motion into an amendment.

M.W. Charles R. Glassmire: Most Worshipful Grand Master, might I address that question just for a moment, please. I thank you for accepting the challenge that this motion that the brother makes is clearly out of order, and that means that I do not have any qualms with the motion. I do have qualms with the time and the Constitutionality of the Rules and Regulations of Robert's Rules, etc.

I, Sir, would like to have the motion that I made voted upon, and seeing nothing in my motion that the brother can object to, I would then be very happy to accept his proposal and to go further into this situation and see just where we do stand in the State of Maine. (M.W. Glassmire then began to make comments and stopped to request that a vote be taken on his report and recommendations) Motion carried.

M.W. Glassmire then went on: Most Worshipful, if I might just add a few words to Brother Smith's comments.

I first came to Portland, Maine back in 1944. At that time there was a fairly sizeable, substantial Prince Hall population in this state. There was a very active Prince Hall Lodge out here on Congress Street behind what is now the Union Station Plaza. Some of the nicest gentlemen that any of us knew in this city; for instance, the Cummings brothers who were often seen at Union Station and later at the airport, as baggage handlers, porters, whatever you wish to call them, gentlemen that I was happy to call friends. At that time being very, very much of a novice, I was initiated, I believe, in 1945, I didn't know anything about Prince Hall Masonry. Since that time that little white building that stood behind Union Station, which I believe was the A.M.E. Church, that you may remember an African, Methodist, Episcopal Church, and it was in that building that the Prince Hall Lodge met.

Over the years, as I became more and more active in Masonry,

this practically disappeared from my pen primarily because that group, as far as I know, have disbanded. Now you mentioned something today about which I am unaware, but which I would love to hear from you detailing the three Prince Hall Lodges in the state. At that time, as this time, I should also point out that there never has been a word leveled at the Grand Lodge of Masons in Maine of prejudice. We have black men in our lodges in Maine. Not very many, to be sure, but then the black population in the state of Maine is very small percentagewise. Now I would like to see this investigated and would be happy to undertake it, and I, if you would accept this challenge, Most Worshipful Sir, I will put some other people besides the other two on my committee, and we will investigate this situation in the state of Maine, and I would be very happy to have Brother Smith's input.

I am not convinced that action such as was taken in the Grand Lodge of Connecticut nor in the Grand Lodge of Nebraska is very (patent) to be taken in this Grand Lodge because I do not believe, unless you can show me wrong, that Prince Hall Masonry does amount to something in this state.

I am certainly the last person in the world to be accused of prejudice, and I think that those of you who know me know that what I was saying in this report today would certainly back that up.

I don't want to take any more time. I will accept the challenge, and I think it is something we can talk about. But, believe me, the problem is much more complex than you or I or anyone else can believe unless you've really gone into it. The historical background of the original charter, the revocation of that charter, and the subsequent opening of lodges under what was considered to be a still valid charter are probably the legal historical points that have to be settled, and whether or not they ever will be I don't know because every man looks at some of this historical business through his own eyes alone and is not willing to accept much of what he sees or reads.

The actions that were taken in Virginia by the Grand Master there, as a Past Grand Master, I do not happen to believe were legal, but I commend Most Worshipful Brother Cobbs for his reasoning, his ability to carry his point, and to attempt to start to right a situation which has been much more of a problem south of the Mason-Dixon line than is north of it.

So, we will be happy to do what we can, and I hope I'm still able to report to you next year.

GRAND MASTER: Brother Smith, is that satisfactory to you? (The quality of Brother Smith's comments was very bad and rather than transcribe bits and pieces of his response, I felt that it is better to indicate it as such within the parentheses.) GRAND MASTER: (Asked Brother Smith to put his motion in writing so it could be read and understood by all the Brethren.)

The Grand Master asked M.E. Archie J. Gaul to the lectern:

M.E. A. GAUL: Most Worshipful Grand Master, for the Royal Arch Chapters of Maine from our Grand Charity Fund, we have voted to contribute to the Grand Lodge Scholarship Fund the sum of \$4,000.00, and for your program for the Prevention of Alcohol and Drug Abuse, an additional \$4,000.00.

The Grand Master expressed his gratitude to M.E. Gaul and the Grand Chapter for their donations and stated that it would start the incoming Grand Master with a good beginning.

M.W. Richard E. Fletcher, Executive-Secretary for the MSA was invited to the lectern:

M.W. R. FLETCHER: It's always great to have a nervous Grand Master, isn't it? My brothers, if you'll notice the looks of apprehension and fright up here on the stage with the distinguished guests, please bear with us. It's not that we're not delighted to be here in your company, but the ladies' tour today is up at L. L. Bean in Freeport. I don't know what the weather is like in the rest of this state, but in Freeport it's very green. Grand Master in just a moment I am going to ask you to join me over here, and please stop being nervous. This is going to be on the up and up. He doesn't trust me anymore.

My brothers, this morning you heard a report in which the MSA was mentioned three times in which funds from this Grand Jurisdiction have come to us, and those among other things -- First of all, let me congratulate you. My heavens, you're so active here and you're doing so many things, and you're involved in the community. And each time somebody tells you that Freemasonry is dead or dying, say that I just sat in a room full of the liveliest corpses I've ever seen that are doing a lot of good things, and you're to be congratulated. And I'm glad that we at MSA can be just a small part of that. In the gifts this morning you heard one thing mentioned where the dues of our association go, and those dues help us to fund the educational project, "The Short Talk Bulletin" - those kinds of things that we hope are of interest and help to you. "The Worshipful Masters Workbook". We've had great success with that. You heard about giving some money for the Disaster Relief. We had three Disaster Relief Appeals out on behalf of the Grand Jurisdictions of South Carolina, Puerto Rico, and California.

My brothers, Maine being a coastal state, imagine a fifteen foot high wall of water with a hundred mile an hour wind behind it coming ashore, and that's what you had in Charleston, South Carolina. A very lovely area down there called the Isle of Palms had buildings where the only thing you can see today is a slab where the building was, and they don't even know where the building went. They never even found any traces of it. The devastation was total. It looks as though a giant went through there with a big hammer and smashed everything in sight.

In the other aspect of our association that you heard about was a donation to our Hospital Visitation Program and that's specifically what I want to thank the Grand Master for today. That program, as you know, funds our

National Hospital Visitation Program where we have Masonic hospital visitors in the 147 of the 172 VA Hospitals around this nation doing in your name God's work for those brave men who when the country called, answered that call. And we're very proud of the Grand Lodge of Maine and the fact that you're sharing these things with us to help us in the programs and that you're doing all the very many other things that you are.

Grand Master, if you would join me here for just a moment, I would like to recognize you, and also the Masons of Maine. How much we appreciate your Grand Master, and we do it with a Certificate of Appreciation. (The inscription on the Certificate was read by M.W. Richard E. Fletcher.) Grand Master, we're very proud of you at MSA, and even though we tease and have a lot of fun together, it's based on a deep friendship, a lot of respect, and even more love. God Bless and thank you.

The Grand Master then thanked M.W. Richard E. Fletcher for his kind remarks and the certificate.

M.W. Richard Curtiss, Grand Master of Vermont gave the response for the visiting brethren.

MOST WORSHIPFUL RICHARD CURTISS: Most Worshipful Grand Master, Right Worshipful Deputy Grand Master, Grand Lodge Officers, Distinguished Guests, and most important Brothers all. I'm a little bit surprised that your Grand Master would have the bravery to call me up right after Brother Dick Fletcher. My brothers, it gives me great pleasure to bring to you, especially Grand Master and to all of you, the sincere appreciation of all of your visiting brethren for the wonderful hospitality you've displayed to us; the wonderful hospitality we received at the banquet last night and in the hospitality room, here meeting most importantly all the brothers of the Grand Lodge of Maine, the brothers in attendance. Really, here's Masonry right out here. I have a new experience every time I go to a Grand Lodge and I meet a relative. I met a relative. I met one here today. Upon the stage came this young man, and he said gosh, you probably don't remember me, but he said I'm related to you. Well, I found out, lo and behold, that he was and he's sitting right up there in the balcony and it's great to see him again.

I'd like to just take a moment first of all to tell all of you that you heard about dreams this morning from the young lady from Rainbow, and I'm a man, unfortunately, 67 years old who's still dreaming. As a matter of fact I guess I've dreamed all my life. Back in the olden days, at least that's what my grandson says, the olden days were World War II, I was a bomber pilot and on my B29 underneath the left front window of the cockpit was the word "The Dreamer." Every one of my crew had a nickname and mine happened to be the "Dreamer."

Well, I've had a dream, especially the last few years, a dream about Masonry, a dream about what Masonry can do, what it should do, and what it's doing. Last night maybe my dream was shattered a little bit when I heard our speaker say that Masonry was just about dead, and was going to die. My Brothers, frankly, I don't think he knows what he's talking about. I hate to say that, but Masonry isn't dead; Masonry isn't dying; Masonry is making a great comeback. I can see it here in Maine today, I saw it in North

Carolina two weeks ago, I saw it in Richmond, Virginia; I saw it in Connecticut; I see it in my own lodges in Vermont. We're not dead, brothers, we're not dead by any means. We may be quiet; we may not be doing everything we should be doing, but some of the dreams that I've had of some of the things we should be doing, my brothers, we're doing.

One of my biggest dreams is doing something about combating the alcohol and drug problem in Vermont, not only in Vermont, but in this country. You're doing it right here in Maine. You should be proud of the goal your Grand Master has established. You should be so proud of the word your Commissioner of Education brought to you this afternoon, so proud to know that you're doing something to combat this gravest problem that confronts this nation today.

Mr Brothers, I was a state police officer for thirty-two years. I retired as Captain, and I know the evils of alcohol and drugs. I know what is happening out there; I know what it's doing to our communities. I also know that there isn't a community in this country; there isn't a community in the state of Maine, regardless how big or how small it may be, that's escaping the ravages of alcohol and drug abuse.

You know just about, I was going to say every, crime, but a high percentage of the crimes committed in Maine and in this country, can be directly traced to alcohol and drug problems. The crime may be rape, the crime may be child abuse, the crime may be robbery, the crime may be burglary, the crime may be murder but the underlying cause is drugs and alcohol.

In the homes that are broken. Think of the children that are cast out into the street because of alcohol and drugs. I'm sure that every single one of you in this auditorium at this moment in this lodge room can say, "Yes, I know someone personally that's been affected by drugs." I know a business man who's lost his business because of his addiction. I know a man who's lost his wife, and lost his children because maybe of his wife's addiction, or the children's addiction.

My brothers, it's serious, very serious. It's destroying us, and we're doing something about it. We as Masons are doing our utmost, not only financially, but individually with counseling and so on, doing something to try to combat this problem. And you can be very proud of it, and I know we're very proud of it.

As I say, "I'm a dreamer." And I say the Masons are going to grow, to do things, and Brethren, we are growing and are doing things. I see lodges in my own state of Vermont that last year brought in more candidates than they've brought in in a long time. I see lodges with candidates that haven't had a candidate in two or three or four years. I see lodges that have raised one or two each year for the last three or four years, or five years, or six years, maybe eight or ten years, but we're growing. Masonry isn't dead.

Once again, Worshipful Master, Most Worshipful Grand Master, please convey to Dolly our appreciation for the hospitality that has been displayed to us.

You know it's a funny thing that happened here in Maine I met a number of these distinguished guests for the first time here in Maine. Brother Ray; speaking of Brother Ray, you know it was a great thrill for me to be installed in Vermont as Grand Master by three very prominent law enforce-

ment officers from the District of Columbia and the state of Delaware. Men who really took care of me in fine shape.

And, oh one other thing I did want to say just before I left, you know, I'd hate awfully to have you wired for some undercover work because you wouldn't know which way to push the button. (Reference to the personal microphone the Grand Master had a problem with knowing whether it was on or off). Brother John, thanks for inviting us. We're having such a great time. I thank all you brethren.

The Grand Master thanked M.W. Richard Curtiss and added some remarks that were appropriate for the occasion.

M. W. Ernest H. Curtis presented the following two reports, which were accepted:

MAINE MASONIC FOUNDATION FOR THE PREVENTION OF DRUG AND ALCOHOL ABUSE AMONG CHILDREN REPORT

In Grand Lodge
Portland, Maine
May 1, 1990

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine:

The Maine Masonic Foundation for the Prevention of Drug and Alcohol Abuse Among Children is in its third year of fund raising and it's second year of awarding grants to our school systems. Unfortunately our fund raising efforts have fallen short of our anticipated goals. However we will raise in excess of \$50,000.00 this year for which we are quite happy. Two years ago during our initial fund raising project, more than 12,500 Brethren participated. Last year only a few more than 5,000 Brethren donated and up to this point this year only about 3,000 have taken part. We are most appreciative of the special gifts from the Grand Chapter, Square and Compasses Clubs, Master and Warden Associations, Lodges and others. They all help and are very important to our program.

We are committed to more than \$50,000.00 in mini-grants to 51 School Administrative Districts. Examples of some of these grants are as follows:

- MSAD 13 - Bingham - \$1500.00 for project training materials
- CSD 9 - Island Falls - \$1500.00 for Student Awareness Training.
- MSAD 77 - Machias - \$1500.00 for J. H. Video Tape Series
- MSAD 6 - Bar Mills - \$1000.00 for Refusal Skills Video Tapes.
- MSAD 21 - Dixfield - \$1500.00 for Peer Helper Program.
- Dare Program - Over \$4000.00 to four schools conducted by local police.
- All American Sam - Over \$4000.00 to eight schools by Nancy Atkins.

We have grants not over \$1500.00 going to small and large schools in

all areas of the state. There is great work being done by dedicated teachers and counselors. They all deserve our help and because Masons care we will help.

Public relations is an important part of our involvement in this program. Our communities are becoming more aware of the financial support that the Freemasons are giving to our public schools. Teachers and school personnel are expressing their appreciation for the grants that we are making to their schools which enables them to get Drug and Alcohol Abuse prevention programs underway years ahead then if they had to wait for local budgets to allot the funds. Through our efforts we are fulfilling a very important function in a critical situation of saving our children.

We are receiving special recognition from the State Department of Education. For example, upon inquiring for a speaker at this Grand Lodge session, I was told that the Commissioner of Education would be happy to come and so it was that we were honored with the presence of Ms. Eve Bither this afternoon. We will also receive the "Organization of the Year Award" from the Maine State Alcohol and Drug Abuse Prevention Conference at the Samoset Resort on May 14, 1990. This award is presented to the organization which has positively influenced its Community's (local, regional or State) understanding and awareness of the prevention, education and treatment problems of alcohol and drug abuse in Maine. On May 30, 1990 we will receive yet another award from the Division of Alcohol and Drug Education Services of the Department of Education during a Maine Drug Free School Recognition Ceremony at the Civic Center in Augusta.

Relations within the fraternity are equally as important as are Public Relations. In order that our membership might have a better understanding of our Drug and Alcohol Abuse Prevention Program we prepared a brochure and book markers which were sent to the entire membership. We hope that you have all read this material and have a better understanding of this program with a willingness to lend your support in the future. The Freemasons of Maine can make a difference.

SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine:

In my report last year I suggested that we had a lofty goal of providing a \$500.00 scholarship to every public High School in Maine. There are approximately 127 High Schools in the state. We will not meet our goal this year but together we will award scholarships in more than 100 Schools.

In order to involve more Lodges in our scholarship program, we offered to match \$250.00 with a Lodge's \$250.00 to make up a \$500.00 scholarship to be awarded to a graduating student of a High School of the Lodge's choice. Forty Lodges responded to this offer. Eleven other Lodges gave \$500.00 scholarships, the Maine Masonic Scholarship program is giving thirty seven \$500.00 scholarships independent of our program. The total participation is 68 Lodges. There will be more than 110 scholarships in more than 100 high schools amounting to over \$45,000.00.

Scholarship certificates will be presented to the winners during graduation activities by Lodge representatives and District Deputies. Press releases along with pictures for the local papers will be available after each presentation. This is just about the finest publicity that the Freemasons of Maine could possibly hope for. An opportunity to show our communities that we are concerned and that we do support public education preparing the youth of today to be the leaders of tomorrow. We are proud that in the space of three short years we have developed the Maine Masonic Scholarship Program from a few scattered scholarships to more than 100 scholarships. We commend those Lodges who have taken steps to get involved in this program.

What I say to you gentlemen is that I challenge you to go back to your district and in the next twelve months to raise \$1,000.00 and return it to this Grand Lodge of Maine to go into that fund. Twenty-four districts, twenty-four thousand dollars, nearly 25% of the goal that our Grand Master needs to keep this program going for us.

The Sixth District of which I am a Past District Deputy challenges the other twenty-three to do their job, and if we are successful, I would seek your indulgence in presenting this to the Grand Lodge of Maine in memory of M.W. Harlan F. Small.

Thank you Most Worshipful Grand Master.

After making the appropriate remarks to Ill. Royce Wheeler and the Grand Lodge, the Grand Master invited Brother Thurston Smith to the microphone to read his motion concerning Prince Hall Masonry.

TO THE MOST WORSHIPFUL GRAND MASTER, members of Grand Lodge, officers and members of subordinate lodges, and to all Grand Lodges with which we are in Fraternal correspondence:

Brethren:

It is with deep sorrow that we are called upon to announce the deaths of three Past Grand Lodge officers of the Grand Lodge of Maine since May 1, 1989.

W. AND REV. MAURICE AMNOTT was born at Ashland, Maine, June 17, 1911, and died at Baring, Me. June 29, 1989, at the age of 78.

After graduating from Ashland High School, he received his theological training from the New England School of Theology, the Gordon College of Theology, both in Massachusetts, and the University of the Pacific and Berkeley Baptist, both in California.

He served as a Chaplain in the U.S. Army from 1944-1948; in the Army Reserve from 1949-1956, and was installation Chaplain of the Maine Air Guard from 1956-1971. Chaplain Amnott retired in 1971 with the rank of Colonel.

He served several churches during his ministry of 40 years as a dedicated and faithful pastor.

Rev. Amnott was a 33rd degree Mason, having held membership at St. Andrew's Lodge, No. 83 of Bangor, and St. Croix Lodge of Calais. He was also a member of the Tuscan Chapter No. 148, O.E.S. of Bangor.

Brother Amnott had been serving as a Grand Chaplain for ten years at the time of his death.

He is survived by his wife, Etta, of 55 years, two brothers, two sisters, several nieces and nephews.

Masonic services were held July 1 at the Scott-Wilson Funeral Home in Calais, and the funeral service was held at 2 P.M., Sunday, July 2. Pastor Thomas P. Warner Officiated.

R.W. RICHARD CARLYLE COOKSON was born at Randolph, Maine, March 9, 1915, and died July 10, 1989, at Amenity Manor Nursing Home, Topsham, Maine.

He was an offset printer at Camp Keyes, Augusta for nearly 40 years, and was the supervisor of printing at the time of his death.

He was made a Master Mason in Temple Lodge No. 25, at Winthrop in 1942 and served as W.M. in 1946-1947. He served as secretary of Winthrop Royal Arch Chapter No. 37 from 1955-1960.

He was a member of Kora Temple Shrine and served with the Kora Chanters for several years.

His service to the Grand Lodge was as Grand Sword Bearer in 1956; Grand Marshal in 1957; Grand Senior Warden in 1958 and was District Deputy Grand Master of the 11th District from 1959-1960.

Brother Cookson is survived by one son and three grandchildren. A private service was held in Mount View Cemetery, Camden.

R.W. NORMAN WENDELL LINDQUIST was born at West Newton, Massachusetts on October 30, 1913 and died at Portland, Maine, August 14, 1989.

The family moved to Steep Falls when he was a young boy and he graduated from Standish High School in 1932. He graduated from New England Institute of Anatomy, Sanitary Science and Embalming, Boston.

He moved to Houlton, where he worked for the Dunn Funeral Home until he purchased the former Bucknam Funeral Home in Yarmouth in 1939. He renamed it the Lindquist Funeral Home and operated it until his retirement in 1985 due to ill health.

He was a member of the National and Maine Funeral Directors Association; charter member and past president of the Yarmouth Lion's Club; a member and past president of the Central Men's Club and a past president of the Casco Bay League.

Brother Norman was a trustee of Riverside Cemetery Association and served as president for 25 years. He was a former trustee of North Yarmouth Academy and had coached basketball and football there for three years.

He was made a Master Mason at Casco Lodge No. 36 of Yarmouth, Maine, March 5, 1940 and served as W.M. from 1947-1948. Norman was a member of the Scottish Rite Bodies of Portland, Kora Temple Shrine and Put Stevens Royal Order of Jesters. He served as District Deputy Grand Master of the 17th Masonic District 1950-1951; Senior Deacon 1952-1953; Grand Marshal 1954-1955, and Jr. Grand Warden in 1956-1957.

Surviving are his wife of 53 years, Helen Rich Lindquist, one son and one daughter, one brother and five grandchildren.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON RETURNS

TO THE MOST WORSHIPFUL GRAND LODGE OF MAINE:

This year's numerical loss of 747 is lower than last year, the percentage being 2.21%.

At the close of the calendar year, the total membership was 32,986. Forty-two lodges reported a gain in membership, 141 a loss and 16 remained the same.

Hiram Lodge No. 180 remains the largest, with a membership of 692. Naskeag No. 171 remains the smallest with 44 members. Star in the East Lodge No. 60 reported the largest gain (12) while Hiram No. 180 suffered the greatest loss (27). Average membership is 166 and 59 lodges report fewer than 100 members.

JURISPRUDENCE

In Grand Lodge
Portland, Maine
May 1, 1990

TO THE MOST WORSHIPFUL GRAND LODGE OF MAINE:

The Committee on Masonic Jurisprudence has reviewed the dispensations granted by the Grand Master and determine that all are within his discretionary power and recommends their approval.

There have been no decisions made by the Grand Master this past year to be considered by this Committee.

There were two decisions made by the Grand Master the previous year which this Committee agreed to study and report thereon at this Annual Communication. Reference is made to Page 589 of the 1989 Proceedings.

It has always been the rule of this Grand Lodge that the Worshipful Master should wear his hat while the Lodge is engaged in work. It is proper, as a matter of courtesy, to remove the hat at the time of receiving the District Deputy Grand Master, but it should be worn during the exemplification of the degree.

On his official visitation, the District Deputy Grand Master is the personal representative of the Grand Master, but with the limited authority for the purpose of inspection of the lodge, its records and its work and to report thereon. He does not possess the prerogatives nor power inherent in the office of Grand Master.

The decision relating to dual membership is inconsistent with the constitution and present jurisprudence and appears to overrule prior decisions of this Grand Lodge, without reason to support this action.

A member in good standing cannot be deprived of any rights and privileges of an active membership, including the right to hold office. There can be no classes of membership. Membership cannot be conditional nor provisional. See 1879 Proceedings, page 11, approved by the Committee on Masonic Jurisprudence in 1880. And in 1889 Proceedings, Page 384, it has been held that even an honorary member is not deprived of any rights of an active member and can be elected Master.

We agree that each lodge in which a Mason holds dual membership is liable for the per capita tax.

Loss of membership in either Lodge should not constitute a loss of membership in both which would be the effect should the member take a demit from one lodge. Membership in one lodge is not a prerequisite for membership in another. His status in one Lodge should not effect his status in the Lodge in which he remains an active member in good standing. No lodge is permitted to interfere with business or concerns of another lodge. See Section 110 of the Constitution.

The Committee on Masonic Education and Lodge Services has completed another year in its endeavors to disseminate Masonic light and knowledge to

the brethren in the Grand Jurisdiction.

In conjunction with administering the ongoing Masonic Education Programs of Grand Lodge two special programs were also implemented this year.

We gratefully acknowledge the guidance, direction and support received from our M.W. Grand Master John E. Anagnostis and the valuable assistance of our Deputy Grand Master R.W. Robert V. Damon. It has been a pleasure working with you and we look forward to a very smooth transition of policy.

DISTRICT REPRESENTATIVES:

We commend the District Representatives for their dedication to the many duties of their office. The success of implementing our programs lies wholly with the effectiveness with which the District Representative can communicate with the lodge Master.

It is encouraging to see a continuing improvement in the teamwork between the District Representatives and District Deputies.

NORTHEAST CONFERENCE ON MASONIC EDUCATION AND LIBRARIES:

The thirty fourth Northeast Conference on Masonic Education and Libraries was held in Providence, Rhode Island on June 8, 9 and 10, 1989. The Grand Lodge of Maine was represented by M.W. John E. Anagnostis, M.W. Peter C. Schmidt and R. W. Edwin V. George.

The main topics for discussion were Discrimination, Apathy and Leadership. The keynote address was given by M.W.G.M. Roswell T. Swits, G.M. of New York.

CANDIDATE AND NEW MASTER MASON EDUCATION:

It has always been the contention of the committee that new members will become active members only if they are raised as Masonically knowledgeable Master Masons.

The expanded Grand Lodge of Maine Pollard Plan is one of the finest candidate instruction programs available. We must continue to give this our highest priority until every candidate has the benefit of the rewards which it offers.

The last survey by this committee indicated that only 64 lodges were using all or some part of the program. We must find ways to do better.

LEADERSHIP AND LODGE MANAGEMENT TRAINING:

This year's Leadership and Lodge Management Training focused on Lodge Administration. Over a period of years this committee has distributed many informational leaflets pertaining to lodge administration and Masonic protocol. It was the desire of our Grand Master that specific topics be compiled into a handy reference book and designated, The Masters Home Study Course in Lodge Administration. Accordingly, twenty topics such as recommended order of business, examination of visitors, grand honors, avouching and balloting were selected, compiled, printed and distributed to each of the lodge Masters. To stimulate interest in its acceptance and usefulness a

fifty question test was prepared and made available for the District Representatives to administer. Participation in the test was voluntary. Thirty eight brethren have currently passed the test. Proficiency certificates have been prepared and distributed to the District Representatives for presentation.

MASONIC PROGRAMS AND SPEAKERS BUREAU:

Rt. Wor. John E. Gray continues to maintain an updated list of Masonic Programs and Speakers. Any Master desiring a speaker should plan his program at least one month in advance. Consult your District Representative for speakers and topics. Brother Gray would appreciate a confirmation of all speaking engagements.

ADVANCED MASONIC EDUCATION:

The advanced Masonic Education program was established to provide in depth study in five specific Masonic fields. Philosophy, symbolism, jurisprudence, history, and protocol.

Several districts have had varying degrees of success with it. Only two districts currently maintain an active program.

All information is still available by contacting R.W. Reginald W. Wing.

YOUTH SUPPORT:

There seems to be an increasing awareness of DeMolay and Rainbow in our Masonic Lodges. More DeMolay Chapters and Rainbow Assemblies are being invited to do some part of their ritualistic work in the lodges. Master Mason visitations to the Chapters and Assemblies are also increasing. We hope that this trend will continue.

We ask all Master Masons to introduce their sons and grandsons to DeMolay and their daughters and granddaughters to Rainbow. It is the best gift that you could ever give them.

PUBLICATIONS:

In September of 1989 a new District Deputy Grand Masters manual was published. This manual now covers the scope, duties, and responsibilities of that office.

Our special thanks to R. W. Reginald W. Wing for a job well done.

LODGE LEADERSHIP AND DEVELOPMENT PROGRAM:

One of the new programs established this year is the Lodge Leadership and Development Program. This program enables the Master to make a self evaluation of the condition of his lodge, identify weak or problem areas and set goals for their improvement.

Six area seminars were conducted with District Deputies and District Representatives to familiarize them with the program, they in turn have been implementing it in the lodges. The format is structured in a way that allows flexibility for varying lodge conditions. It is our hope that every Master will adopt this program for his lodge. A special thanks to Wor. Bro. Wayne Adams for the tremendous amount of work that he has put into this program.

IN CONCLUSION:

We are taught that Masonry is a never ending search for light. We know that Masonic education is a never ending process of disseminating light. Our challenge is that there may ever be enough of one to satisfy the needs of the other.

Most Worshipful Grand Master it has been our pleasure to have served with you these past two years and we look forward to working with you as Grand Secretary.

LIBRARY AND MUSEUM

Our library program has reached full stride. Requests for material are arriving daily from the brethren, as to subjects for Lodge meetings, special events, research etc. Lodge members from all Bodies are finding a "haven" between sessions, meetings and special events. "We didn't know you had all this!" "You certainly helped our programs" etc. The letters and comments are heartwarming and sincere.

Our surplus books are finding their way into the many small Lodge libraries. Lodge libraries seem to be a coveted title to several.

The "clipping" file is growing by leaps and bounds, as we continue our "stripping" procedure from Proceedings of other jurisdictions and their periodicals. Over four thousand items to date have been alphabetically indexed. Our newly purchased "Word Processor" has provided the capability of inserting the newly added items into proper alpha position, as opposed to "Addendums" to the main listing. A plus for our Finance Committee: Their cooperation and vision has allowed us to purchase every book published by the Macoy Publishing House. Brothers Stewart Pollard, Allen Roberts and many other Book Reviews provide the details for our progressive, current and viable purchasing policy.

An interesting item from our 1948, Proceedings, Page 604. "Through the efforts of P.G.M. Clark D. Chapman and Grand Secretary Convers Leach the Masonic Trustees of the Temple have released all rights to the library and together with each of the local bodies interested have donated said library intact to the Grand Lodge of Maine." Releases were signed by the local bodies.

The treasures are continuing. As to recognition we present the following report from the N.E. Conference of Libraries, held in Rhode Island. Attendees of the key Libraries; specifically, Lexington, Mass., New York, Pennsylvania.

"We agree that successful information retrieval systems, such as the one that has been *developed in Maine*, should be disseminated -- that is the technique that they developed there that can retrieve information quickly for members or officers of the fraternity who need it. This is, in the profession, called Analytics, but is really just a system to get information quickly and pass it on to someone else. That kind of information through an organization like this committee, could help to disseminate the procedures."

R.W. Alfred E. Neff, for the Committee on Condition of the Fraternity, presented the following report, which was accepted.

CONDITION OF THE FRATERNITY

In Grand Lodge
Portland, Maine
May 2, 1990

TO THE MOST WORSHIPFUL GRAND LODGE OF MAINE:

Your Committee on the "Condition of the Fraternity" has examined 194 of the 199 individual lodge reports and 23 or the 24 reports of the District Deputy Grand Masters. The remaining reports were unavailable.

In general, the reports of the District Deputies were much improved over preceding years and specifically those of the 1st, 2nd, 3rd, 4th, 9th, 14th, 17th and 24th districts were excellent.

Your committee examined all reports in detail in an attempt to ascertain the physical condition, as well as, the general health of the Lodges.

Particular attention was focused on:

1. The number of Past Masters in Line Offices. (there were 61 Lodges with 5 or more Past Masters, up 10 from last year.
2. Lodge activities in Masters and Wardens Association and other District functions.
3. Special and social events held within and without the Lodge.
4. Lodge association and/or support of youth activities.
5. Specific comments of the DDGMs.

Physical Condition

Your Committee was pleased to learn that several Lodges have made significant repairs and cosmetic improvements to their buildings. A few lodges still have physical problems but are hampered by a "lack of funds". We suggest that any improvements, short of a major overhaul, could be accomplished by a little local leadership with a fund raiser and a work party.

Remember, Brethren, that an attractive comfortable Lodge can go a long way toward improving attendance and other activities.

General Health and Well Being

We have again rated each of the 194 Lodges as to the probability that the Lodge can continue to operate without serious problems. Factors used in this evaluation were previously stated.

Ratings are as follows:

Excellent	50	26%	(down 2%)
Good	121	62%	up 9%
Fair	17	9%	down 4%
Poor	6	3%	down 3%

These statistics show that there was a 7% shift from "Fair & Poor" to "Good" which is quite a dramatic improvement.

Those Lodges remaining in a "Fair" or "Poor" category have been listed on a confidential Appendix for the Grand Master's use.

In Summation:

In general, the condition of our Fraternity has shown a marked improvement in the past year and this Committee commends those Lodge Officers who were responsible for the turn around. We also wish to commend those Grand Lodge Officers who assisted and offered encouragement.

We are not saying that our problems are over as we still have a long way to go, but we have made a step in the right direction, and with the continuing assistance and encouragement from our dedicated District Deputy Grand Masters, this upward momentum will continue.

We recommend that the recommendations contained in the District Deputies reports be sent to the proper committee (s) by the Grand Secretary.

REPORT OF THE PUBLIC RELATIONS COMMITTEE

TO THE MOST WORSHIPFUL GRAND LODGE OF MAINE:

It's not new news. For many, many years Maine Freemasons have been doing wonderful works. We've done them quietly and efficiently. So quietly and efficiently, in fact, that few among us and virtually no non-Mason has been able to grasp the size and scope of our caring and sharing.

As a result many non-Masons in our towns and cities with a desire to serve their communities have become involved in the "higher profile" service clubs without even considering what Masonry is and what Masonry does.

As our Charitable Foundation efforts have been expanded, your Public Relations Committee has accepted the challenge to get that news out to brethren and to the thousands of other community citizens who should know more about who we are and what we're doing.

Again this year much of the focus has been on our Scholarship and Drug and Alcohol Abuse Prevention Programs. Although many of the larger dailies seem more interested in reporting about lizards in New Mexico, toads in Great Britain and Zsa Zsa's continuing battles with Beverly Hills cops, we did get more than 50 releases about these two important programs for Maine youth published in Maine newspapers during the year. Public response remains positive.

We also established a productive introductory relationship with the television industry. Late last summer we enjoyed the opportunity to share information about our programs with Bangor's Channel 5 viewers on Brother Don Colson's popular show. We had nearly 11 prime time minutes on Sunday evening just between the local news and *60 Minutes* to discuss and promote the craft and its work.

Response to that TV program has been exceptionally favorable. Additionally we received three spots on Channel 6 in Portland regarding our Drug & Alcohol Program efforts.

Much remains to be done, however. Your Public Relations Committee is being augmented in 1990 by several brethren who have established working relations with the Maine press.

These valuable brethren should help spread the news of Masonic involvement and participation throughout the state.

An expanded, effective public information effort can only help in our continued labors to show Freemasonry in its true light as a powerful and progressive force for good in our communities, our state, our nation and around the world.

AMENDMENTS TO THE CONSTITUTION - ADOPTED

R.W. Robert G. W. Loblely, for the Committee on Amendments to the Constitution, presented the following reports, which were accepted and the recommendations adopted.

PROPOSED that the tenth sentence in Section 23 of the Constitution be amended by deleting therefrom the words "four copies to each Lodge" and inserting in lieu thereof the words "two copies to each Lodge."

MOVED that the amendment, as published, be adopted.*

PROPOSED to amend Section 44, Rule 2, by adding the words "However, at the discretion of the Grand Master, Committee reports of a non-debatable nature may be read and received while ballots are being counted."

MOVED that the amendment, as published, be adopted.

AMENDMENTS TO THE CONSTITUTION - LOST

R.W. Robert G. W. Loblely, for the Committee on Amendments to the Constitution, presented the following reports, which were rejected.

PROPOSED that the first sentence of the Declaration to the Constitution be amended by striking out the words "Religious Secret Society," and inserting in lieu thereof the words "Society having certain secrets," so that said sentence as amended shall read: "Freemasonry is a charitable, benevolent, educational society, having certain secrets adhering to its own peculiar ancient landmarks."

MOVED that the amendment, as published, be adopted.

PROPOSED to add to the Grand Lodge Ritual on page 9 of the Cipher where the Junior Deacon speaks to the candidate;

"Mr. XX, you are about to be initiated into the mysteries of Freemasonry. The reasons for the manner of your preparation to receive this degree will be explained to you following the conferral of the degree. During the conferral of the degree, you will be required to take an Obligation of obedience to the tenets of this institution of which you have requested to become a member. This obligation is of ancient origin and contains penalties for violations which are founded in antiquity and are wholly symbolic in nature. The only penalties which Freemasonry imposes in modern times for violations of its tenets and regulations are Reprimand, Suspension and Expulsion."

MOVED that the amendment, as published, be adopted.

GRAND HISTORIAN'S REPORT

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine, AF& AM:

It's come to be a custom in our society, that when we pass a particular milestone in our lives, we usually mark it with some sort of celebration or observance. When we have a birthday or a wedding anniversary, people may give us a party and presents, or send us cards to tell us we're getting old, even though we'd just as soon not be reminded of it.

Some of these milestones seem to have more significance than others, for instance, a 25th wedding anniversary, and if we're lucky enough to be around for our 50th, it's likely that children and grandchildren will come from far and wide, and make a big fuss over us. Everybody will have a good time and has an opportunity to see family that they may not have seen for years.

In Masonry we follow the same practice by presenting 25 and 40 year buttons, and if we've reached 50 years, we get a medal also.

So it is with our lodges. Anyone forgetting or overlooking a wedding anniversary will be reminded of it in no uncertain terms by his wife, and no

lodge worthy of the name will fail to celebrate the 100th or 200th anniversary of its charter.

To wait a century to two seems overly long, however, and there's no reason why the 50th, 75th, 125th or other significant anniversary isn't worthy of celebration. There's nothing better to bring one out of the doldrums and create interest than an anniversary celebration, limited only by the imagination and effort the members are willing to put into it. It can be a year long program or an anniversary dinner, or anything in between.

As you will have guessed by now, this is all leading up to the subject of lodge histories. Besides the annual summary required to be prepared and sent to Grand Lodge, there are other types often used in connection with lodge anniversaries. I have attended a good many lodge anniversary dinners, and never once did there fail to be a speaker whose subject was the history of the lodge. As an added feature of the anniversary program, many lodges have published their histories, covering the period since their chartering.

This matter has been brought up in view of the approach of the 125th anniversaries of many of our lodges. What could be called Maine's "Golden Age of Masonry" included the years 1865-1874, when no less than 54 lodges were chartered.

In addition to the 100th anniversaries of Euclid No. 194 and Bay View No. 196, there are six more reaching their 12th anniversaries including:

Acacia No. 121
Marine No. 122
Franklin No. 123

Olive Branch No. 124
Meridian No. 125
Timothy Chase No. 126

Next year Phoenix No. 24 will be 175 years old, Aroostook No. 197 will be a century old, and six more will hit the 125 year milestone. In 1992, a record nine lodges will be a century and a quarter old.

This group were all chartered in the years immediately following the Civil War when Masonry was growing at a rapid rate. During the first year of the post war period, there were 1741 initiates (compare this with 492 last year). The total membership was only 10,075.

We hope the many lodges in this group are or will be making plans to celebrate these significant anniversaries, and that the program will include compiling and publishing a comprehensive lodge history. We have a heritage to be proud of, so lets bring it out for all to see!

The manual/work book for Lodge Historians is nearly complete, and it is planned to distribute them via District Deputies this Summer. It contains guidelines, suggestions and recommendations for preparing lodge histories, both the annual summary required by Standing Regulation No. 2, and also

for a comprehensive history covering the life of the lodge.

We would again urge that lodges having a capable historian appoint him to the line, and install him along with the rest of the officers. When Grand Lodge return forms are reprinted, they will include the Historian as a lodge officer.

And now it's a pleasure to recognize those historians who have turned out some first class work. This year was the most difficult so far, as there were three that were almost equally good. We had to select one however, and the winner of the 1990 Historian's Medal for the best history submitted for 1989 is - R.W. DAVID G. BECKETT, OF ST. CROIX LODGE NO. 46, CALAIS.

We had several other good histories that deserve recognition, and we're pleased to present Certificates of Merit to:

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON THE HISTORY OF MASONRY IN MAINE as of May 1, 1990

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine:

Brethren, your Lodge histories are not coming in on-time. You are in the position of seeing your Grand Master take serious measures to assure delinquent Lodges of his sincerity in enforcing the current Grand Lodge regulations whereby all Lodges are responsible for submitting a history of the year past before the end of January of the subsequent year. You will see an eye-opening list when you open your proceedings. When you see the names of the many delinquent Lodges, please make a note of any Lodge whose histories might be more quickly completed through your assistance. Make known any discrepancies in our records. Your committee is only three, and will be seeking much assistance through the District Deputies and District Representatives, but anyone willing to work on histories, for his own or for another Lodge should make himself known.

This year has been one of mixed emotions. Leaving this Office, brings forth many potential thoughts, anxieties, some incompleting assignments and lofty goals.

I'm reminded of a retiring Grand Secretary, when asked about retiring stated, "I'm pleased to be sorry. I'm sorry that I must leave what has been a decidedly satisfying function, but it is pleasing that I leave with regrets at doing so, rather than otherwise."

Over the past eight years I have had the distinct privilege and pleasure of working with a great number of our Grand Secretaries. It has been a most rewarding and productive experience to work with such dedicated and professional Craftsmen.

The office of Grand Secretary has been a labor of love for me and to say I will not miss it would surely be untrue. My regret in leaving is only eased by the many, many friends I have made and I'm the better for it. My interest and loyalty in our Grand Lodge and this great Fraternity remains steadfast and strong.

The caliber, strength and tenacity of our elected officers is heartwarming and bodes a productive future.

As to the present: Three of our major goals have been reached. Our Computer Data base has been realized. The results have verified the value of our policy to validate our data first, before entry. The results are beyond description. From our former Maine Mason, Direct Mail's Computer source, we have researched and validated several thousand inaccuracies. Each individual's record is available to each Lodge Secretary.

Lodge Secretaries have been tremendous in their daily 'feedback', concerning our Computer Lists. The resultant response and credibility realized through this project, was accomplished mainly by Mrs. Blanche Wilder. It is remarkable in that she had no previous training and has mastered this IBM "Monster". An outstanding accomplishment. We can now reap the reward of a "non garbage data entry", with its inherent credibility.

It should also be noted that we now produce zip code listings, labels, lodge dues cards etc. Programs available include "over the counter sales, billing and procurement data, Grand Master's schedule and "the beat goes on".

Desk Top Publishing presented a real challenge. We have published the first Annual Proceedings Book and its resultant savings of approximately \$5,000.00. We have produced a "Camera Ready" product "in house".

Directives, Booklets, Financial Reports, we haven't scratched the "surface" on our potential in this capacity. Its outstanding readability and cost savings has no limit.

R.W. George Pulkkinen, our Past Senior Grand Warden has provided over 200 hours "spear heading" this transition from "printer to in house". Mrs. Julie Irving, with very little training, mastered this equipment and made us believe.

Throughout this hectic period, with the end of the year reports, Lois McLellan battled through this mountain of reports and returns and amazed each of us with her persistence to detail (She nearly went to Taiwan!!). Arline Lewis "wore out" our equipment providing lists, Masonigrams, the multitude of bulk mailings, verifying records, obituaries etc. A tremendous support effort.

To our Grand Treasurer, Bruce Tornquist, for his concern, and his value to this fraternity, we forward our respect and thanks.

Sojourners, we have embarked on a serious effort to identify sojourners from other jurisdictions. Several states have forwarded their lists of their members residing in Maine. We are astounded by the number in our jurisdiction. A tremendous assist for our lodge Sojourning Team.

A project held in abeyance, our Secretary's Manual is now ready for assembly and review. We have been blessed with material from many Grand Lodges. It will result in a detailed comprehensive Manual that should conceivably reduce, if not eliminate, the multitude of omissions in our present manual.

To conclude this dialogue, I remind you of the Grand Secretary's column in the recent Maine Mason. Read it, study its message. There are lots of "little bears" out there. It's provocative! My prayers are to the lots of little bears of this Fraternity. May they never stop working.

REPORT OF CLYDE L. FERRIS EXECUTIVE OFFICER IN MAINE ORDER OF DEMOLAY

TO: THE MOST WORSHIPFUL GRAND LODGE OF MAINE:

It is a pleasure to give this report to the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine.

I just returned Sunday night from Philadelphia, Pa. where I attended the 70th Annual Session of the International Supreme Council of The Order of DeMolay. I again have returned to my Jurisdiction with a renewed enthusiasm for the greatest youth organization in the world for young men between the ages of 13 to 21. I am proud to be the Executive Officer in Maine of this great organization and proud to be a Master Mason and belong to the organization that sponsors this great youth organization.

I am happy to report to you that Maine DeMolay is in fine shape and is having another successful year. DeMolay does have some problems, as most organizations are experiencing, however, solutions are being found and the problems are being solved.

As in most youth organizations, such as Boy & Girl Scouts, Big Brothers and Big Sisters and other youth servicing organizations, there are serious social problems that affect teenage young people including child abuse and alcohol and drug abuse. DeMolay International has produced a Youth Protection Program to help our jurisdictions, chapters and members. It is essential that we fully implement this Youth Protection Program so that we can effectively protect our DeMolays and the viability of the Order of DeMolay. The Youth Protection Program will assist us to educate both our DeMolays and Adult Leadership Team Members. This Youth Protection Program will be fully implemented immediately in the Jurisdiction of Maine. We must protect our Adult Volunteer Advisors as well as our DeMolays.

The Order of DeMolay also realized the problem of Alcohol and Drug Abuse. The Pennsylvania Masonic Foundation for the Prevention of Drug and Alcohol Abuse Among Children in cooperation with The International Supreme Council of the Order of DeMolay is sponsoring a Training Seminar for Drug and Alcohol Prevention Coordinators this coming Saturday, May 5th at the Masonic Conference Center, at Patten Campus in Elizabethtown, Pennsylvania. We are sending Mark Cooledge, a Senior DeMolay to Elizabethtown to attend this Seminar. I have asked Brother Mark to be the Director of our Maine DeMolay Drug and Alcohol Awareness Program when he returns and set up the Program for us. He has agreed to do this and I am excited about this Program. We hope that the Masons and Young Men of Maine DeMolay can work together in the prevention of Drug and Alcohol Abuse among Children.

We had a very successful Conclave last June at the University of South

ern Maine in Gorham. This year, our Conclave will be at the State Y.M.C.A. Camp in Winthrop, Maine. By moving to the Y.M.C.A. Camp, we will be able to cut the cost per DeMolay attending by about \$15.00.

We have 2 areas that have shown interest in starting DeMolay Chapters, so we will be actively working on these and will be working hard to increase our membership this year.

I appointed Brother Jim Gaboury, Dad Advisor of Capital City Chapter in Augusta as our Liaison Officer to Togus V.A. Hospital. Brother Jim has been working hard to have volunteers from DeMolay Chapters visit the Hospital one Sunday a month to visit the patients who attend the Worship Service. We are interested in giving more volunteer help to the V.A. Hospital in Togus.

The Kora DeMolay Council sponsored the Fifth Annual DeMolay Brunch on Sunday, October 8th, 1989 and it was very successful. Out of the proceeds of this Brunch, it was voted to purchase some Video equipment for the use in presenting the DeMolay Advisor Development Program, better known as the DAD Program, which is our Advisor Training Program. In addition to purchasing this equipment to help train our Advisors, we will be able to financially assist a number of DeMolays to attend the Leadership Training Conference which will be held, this year at Camp Belknap in Wolfeboro, New Hampshire in August.

We had a very successful Congress Session last December 2nd with an Honors and Awards Night that evening in Rockland.

At the recent International Supreme Council Session in Philadelphia, nominations were approved for the Legion of Honor, Cross of Honor and the Degree of Chevalier and I now have the honor of announcing the following DeMolays & Masons who will receive the Honors at our Honors and Awards Night this November. The following were elected to receive the following honors: The Degree of Chevalier will be received by Michael Tripp, State Master Councilor of Bangor Chapter, John Damon, Deputy State Master Councilor of Knights of the Sun Chapter in Auburn, Jason Grant, State Junior Councilor of Knights of the Sun Chapter in Auburn; Erik Brann of Mid-Coast Chapter, Rockland and Eric Moulton of William Whipple Chapter, Kittery. Elected to receive the Active Legion of Honor Degree is Bruce Chandler of Hampden. Elected to receive the Honorary Legion of Honor Degree are Stephen W. Damon of Minot Maine, Hollis Dixon of Scarborough and Deputy Grand Master Robert V. Damon of Lewiston. Receiving the Cross of Honor will be Roger Granet of Auburn and Arthur M. Morse of Sanford, Maine.

The New England Ritual Competition was hosted by Maine DeMolay and was held at Preble Lodge in Sanford, Maine on March 24th. Maine won the Initiatory Degree and Connecticut won the DeMolay Degree. Several Maine DeMolays won individual ritual awards.

The State DeMolay Basketball Tournament was held on March 30th and 31st at Hampden Academy and was very successful. The Class B, Champion was Downeast Chapter of Machias and Runner-up was Bangor Chapter. The winner of Class C was also Downeast Chapter and Runner-up was Houlton Chapter. The Sportsmanship Trophy was awarded to Capital City

Chapter of Augusta.

We had a most successful State DeMolay Sweetheart Pageant at Kora Temple on Saturday night, April 21st. The new State DeMolay Sweetheart is Wendy Ann Thiboutot, representing Mid-Coast Chapter of Rockland.

This brings us pretty much up to date, however, we certainly could use more help in the capacity of manpower from the Masonic Fraternity. There are young men in the State of Maine that are not receiving the experience and excitement of DeMolay because the Masonic Lodges in their areas are not sponsoring a DeMolay Chapter. Please help us help you with membership. Statistics prove that over 50% of Senior DeMolays become Master Masons. We ask for your increased support of Maine DeMolay by sponsoring a DeMolay Chapter in your town. Please get in touch with me for information. There are young men in your area that need and want DeMolay. Do them a favor and sponsor a DeMolay Chapter. Help them become a DeMolay and help us Lead the Way with DeMolay.

The Grand Master requested that the Grand Marshal present Brother Robert L. Witham to the East. He was presented the Simon Greenleaf Medal by Grand Master Anagnostis.

ROBERT L. WITHAM

Brother Witham was born February 13, 1920 to Willis Wilbur Witham and Adelaide Victoria (Carpenter) Witham in Surry, Maine. When he was 5 years old, the family bought the Leon Chapman Farm in East Blue Hill and remained there. Brother Witham attended school in Surry and Blue Hill. He attended George Stevens Academy until Grade 10 when he was forced to drop out of school to tend the family farm when his father fell ill to kidney stones. His father, a stone cutter by trade, also ran a small dairy business, and smokehouse. Brother Witham not only tended the animals, but supplemented the family income by trapping, cutting pulp, working at a local sawmill, digging ditches, and most any other job a young man could take.

Brother Witham was also active in the East Blue Hill community, and became master of the local Grange at age 15. He is a 50 year member of the Maine State Grange Association.

Brother Witham joined the Youth Conservation Corps at Moosehorn Migratory Bird Refuge in 1938-1939. He participated in several wildlife studies, and was part of the first comprehensive studies of the nesting and breeding habits of the Eastern Woodcock. In 1941, Brother Witham took a job at the South Portland Shipyard as a chipper, and was foreman of a crew of chippers. Although he was an only child, and exempt from service in the war, Brother Witham volunteered for service in the Air Service Command in October of 1942. He served in India, and had charge of the supplies for the China Burma India theater. He served in India from 1942 to 1946. His discharge was delayed by 6 months, when he was told that before he could leave he would need to catalog and price all material in stock, none of which, had been tracked during the war. He received an honorable discharge on March 21, 1946.

Brother Witham joined the Maine Warden service in 1946, and served 10 years on the force. Several members of the lodge have met Brother Witham on a professional basis, but all remember him as being fair in his treatment.

More than one poacher made the mistake of boasting that he would never catch them, but he eventually would. One of the greatest tributes to Brother Witham's tenacity in apprehending lawbreakers was paid to him by a former poacher when he related a story. He said that several of his friends wanted to go night hunting, and he warned them not to do it in Witham's area because "he's too damned smart for you, and he'll catch you". The story teller stayed home, his friends went hunting, and Brother Witham was waiting for them.

Brother Witham left the Warden Service in 1956 after 10 years of service. He joined Great Northern Paper Company as a security guard, and later transferred into the Storeroom as a clerk.

Brother Witham received his Entered Apprentice degree on April 2, 1953. He was passed to Fellowcraft April 23, 1953, and was raised to the Sublime Degree of Master Mason on May 21, 1953. He attended lodge for several years, but could never seem to find the time to work through the chairs. As

with many members, his visits became less frequent, but he still maintained his membership in Nollesemic Lodge. Brother Witham's service to the craft resumed in 1982 when he raised his son. After almost 30 years, Brother Witham, who had never held a regular office, committed to memory the five points lecture given at raising. He inspired his son to become Master of his lodge, and has worked diligently for Nollesemic. He served as Chaplain in 1987-88 and again in 1989-90. He also served as Senior Steward in 1988-89.

Brother Witham also committed to memory the prayers and charges necessary for degree work in all three degrees. He has served as director and coordinator for the Nollesemic Play Cast for "Rose Upon the Altar", "He that Believeth", and most recently "December's Rose". When other members of the cast were unable to fill a part, Brother Witham has stepped in with less than 2 weeks notice, and filled the part himself.

He has worked long and tireless hours in the kitchen also, preparing meals for the brethren, and has acted as head chef for Nollesemic's annual Table Lodge for 6 years. Although suffering from chronic back pain caused by several back operations, Brother Witham has never refused a request for assistance from the master of his lodge. Brother Witham has also put together and presented several entertainment programs for various lodges including a demonstration of stone-cutting by hand, and readings of the works of Holman Day.

DISTRIBUTION OF THE CHARITY FUND

R.W. Stanley F. Sampson, for the Committee on Distribution of the Charity Fund, presented the following report, which was accepted.

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine:

The trustees of your Grand Lodge Charity Fund are delighted that we were able to grant assistance to 55 members and their families for the fiscal year ending March 31, 1990 in the amount of \$108,219.65. This amount is somewhat less than was approved for 68 cases in the preceding year.

In addition to those applications that the committee approved, four were not acted on for various reasons. Two of the four cases the committee deemed unnecessary and two of the applications were not fully completed and returned to the lodge.

When a lodge receives a request for aid from a member we strongly suggest that the Master, Secretary or any other officer assist that member in completing the application whenever possible as this will help the committee in making an immediate determination. Many times we receive applications that are not fully completed which requires correspondence with the secretary and in turn delays the process of making a decision.

The amount for relief as noted above does not include \$488.00 contributed to ten lodges to pay dues for twelve veterans that were unable to meet their obligations.

This past year we also made contributions to the following Masonic related organizations:

\$3000.00	DeMolay & Pine Tree Youth Foundation
\$24000.00	Grand Lodge Scholarship Program
\$5000.00	Program for the Prevention of Drug and Alcohol Abuse
\$7500.00	Masonic Service Assn. for the Hospital Visitation Program
\$1850.00	Dues to the Masonic Service Assn.
\$3000.00	To M.S.A. for disaster relief

As an amendment to Section 62 of the Constitution approved by Grand Lodge in 1987 allows a more liberal interpretation for granting assistance, your committee approved a \$500.00 scholarship award to a student at the University of Maine who is legally blind and who we deemed worthy. This is included in the amount noted above. Not included is a contribution of \$1000.00 to the Salvation Army.

It is also noted here that the subordinate lodges reported a distribution of \$105,266.00 from lodge funds, making a total of \$259,324.00 contributed the past year by the Masons of Maine to their brethren and families. To this should be added the many hours of work relief by the members of the individual lodges. We can be proud of this contribution. It is another in-

stance that justifies our existence as Masons.

Again this year the committee acknowledges the contributions to our relief fund from the following appendant bodies.

Stephen J. Gilman was suspended from all the rights and privileges of Freemasonry, and a trial before the trial commission was ordered.

Hearing was held at the Masonic Temple in Auburn, Maine on November 10, 1989. The defendant did not appear in person, nor was he represented by counsel. He was found guilty of Gross Unmasonic Conduct, and it was recommended that he be expelled from all of the rights and privileges of Freemasonry.

Your Committee on Grievances and Appeals has reviewed the findings and find that all was in order. We agree with the verdict and the recommendations.

(3) Harold L. Chute, Chairman of the Committee on Investments, submitted the following report.

April 17, 1990

TO THE TRUSTEES OF THE GRAND LODGE CHARITY FUND

GENERAL

As has been the policy of the past several years, your committee and the Grand Master, Grand Secretary and Grand Treasurer met in September, January and May with Mr. L. Manchester from Standish, Ayer and Wood (SAW) to discuss economic conditions and make any changes thought prudent with the portfolio.

Although the advisor has permission to make changes in the fund, we are generally appraised in advance of potential changes. The Grand Treasurer is, however, very close to the SAW group. In all our funds there are only 49 stocks and 16 bonds. The activity of the funds are not great as only 16 new stocks were bought and 13 sold.

There is one feature which is emerging from the SAW management. Instead of the normal purchase of many bonds, larger amounts are being invested in the SAW Fixed Income Fund. Presently we have \$550,000.00 invested in this fund it has an income of \$50,838.72 or approximately 9.3% return. We have \$50,000.00 invested in the SAW International Fund and the return was about 11% and the growth for 1989 was 18.7% (see attached sheet). The other interesting feature of this fund is that SAW had no money invested in Japan. Therefore the drop in the NIKKI index was no worry. We also have \$50,000.00 invested in the Small Equity Fund which again produced no income but had a growth of over 20% in the fund.

One year ago the Dow Jones Industrial Average was about 2300 whereas at the present time it is 2700. This has resulted in our spectacular growth.

INVESTMENT POLICY

Our policy remains conservative and for many years we have aimed at a 65% equity and 35% bonds. At present the large charity fund has Bonds 34.8%, stocks 64.4% and cash .8%. Quality is always stressed in the portfolio. Your committee is aware, however, of the ever increasing charitable needs and one way to counteract this is for Masons who are in a position to bequeath as much as possible to the Grand Lodge Charity Fund.

THE NAMED POOLED FUNDS

This is a pooling of the assets of many of our small named funds. We manage this by the committee and not from Standish, Ayer & Wood. We have done quite well with this fund. The basic cost of the fund is \$414,236.91 and it has grown to \$543,977.22 in market value. In 1988 it had an income of \$22,500.00 whereas in 1989 income had increased to \$30,453.03. This consisted of 30.3% bonds, 64.9% stocks and 4.8% cash.

VALUE & INVESTMENT INCOME

The total market value of all Charity Funds now is: Relief Fund \$3,694,612.87, Named Pooled Funds \$543,977.22 making a total of \$4,238,590.09. The total income is Relief Fund \$192,031.02 and Pooled Fund \$30,453.03 or a total of \$222,484.05. The overall return is approximately 5.25%

Again it has been an honor for your committee to serve this Grand Lodge. Although your committee has devoted some time, effort and travel, the real work has been carried out by our kind and meticulous Grand Treasurer. We should all applaud his efforts. The Grand Secretary has faithfully kept the written meeting records.

From the Christian Era take 1118. Thus 1118 from 1990=872.

Order of High Priesthood-

To the Christian Era add 1913, the Year of the Blessing. Thus: 1990 and 1913=3903.

MASONIC CALENDAR

Ancient Craft Masons commence this era with the creation of the world, calling it **Anno Lucis (A.D.)**, "in the year of light."

Scottish Rite, same as Ancient Craft, except the Jewish chronology is used, **Anno Mundi (A.M.)**, "in the year of the world."

Royal Arch Masons date from the year the second temple was commenced by Zerubbabel, **Anno Inventionis (A.I.)**, "in the year of the discovery."

Royal and Select Masters date from the year in which the temple of Solomon was completed, **Anno Depositionis (A. Dep.)**, "in the year of the deposit."

Knights Templar commence their era with the organization of their Order, **Anno Ordinid (A.O.)**, "in the year of the Order."

Order of High Priesthood dates from the year of the blessing of Abraham by the High Priest Melchisedec, **Anno Benefacio (A.B.)**, "in the year of the blessing."

REPORT ON FRATERNAL RELATIONS

In Grand Lodge
Portland, Maine
May 7, 1990

TO THE MOST WORSHIPFUL GRAND LODGE OF MAINE:

We submit herewith our annual report on Fraternal Relations, consisting of a forward and special reports.

FORWARD

It is a distinct pleasure to report that this year has been a significant one in the fraternity in the evolution of the furthering the principle of brotherly love. Many Grand Lodges have espoused these principles as long as they were concerned only with ideals that did not violate their stand with regard to their own set of prejudices. To be specific, it was fine to extend the hand of brotherly love to another as long as the color of the skin was the same.

Not only was this criterion applied to the acceptance of an individual, but the main reason for many to deny the existence of regularly initiated brethren in Prince Hall Grand Lodges.

The subject of acknowledging the regularity of Prince Hall Masons can be argued strictly from a historical position. Almost everyone is familiar with the origin of the Prince Hall Grand Lodge. There can be little doubt that the original charter issued by the Grand Lodge of England was withdrawn for good and substantial reasons. What happened next is clouded in antiquity, and probably will be argued for many years to come. In the great scheme of things, it probably doesn't matter a single bit.

For many years there has been dialog between these two branches of our great fraternity. Having attended a number of our sister Grand Lodges in recent years, it was gratifying to see the Grand Master of Prince Hall Masonry a welcome guest at the annual banquet. He was always made to feel welcome, but was never received in Grand Lodge. Every one of these Grand Masters that I have met have been wonderful men and worthy to be taken by the hand and called "Brother".

This year has found two Grand Lodges willing to forsake the usual prejudices and extend the hand of welcome to these brethren. The first to take this step was the Grand Lodge of Connecticut. A year ago they voted to recognize the Prince Hall Grand Lodge as legitimate, and approved visitation.

Since then the Grand Lodge of Nebraska has taken the same action.

Unfortunately, as soon as Connecticut took its stand, the Grand Master of Louisiana, by edict, withdrew its recognition, and that action was ratified by the Grand Lodge. We have not heard the last of the Prince Hall problem, but we can hope and pray that all future actions will be dictated by brotherly love and friendship.

Along these same lines, a unique situation arose in the Grand Lodge of the Commonwealth of Virginia last year. A black man was rejected in a lodge in Alexandria. The Grand Master, Cabel Cobbs, after extensive investigation, determined that the rejection was based solely on prejudice. He then ordered another ballot spread, and when it too was cloudy, ordered that the ballot was void, and declared the individual elected! As might be expected, this decision was not accepted lightly. At the annual session, after much debate, and following a very close vote, the Grand Master's decision was supported! This is certainly a landmark decision, going way beyond the question of color, and will be debated in many quarters as to whether a Grand Master has such powers.

It is good to see the walls of prejudice, like the walls of Jericho, come tumbling down!

SPECIAL REPORTS

HAWAII

The Lodges in Hawaii, formerly under the jurisdiction of the Grand Lodge of California, have banded together to form The Grand Lodge of Hawaii. They have adopted all of the principles of their parent Grand Lodge, and are considered by the Commission on Recognition of the Grand Masters Conference as meeting all of the requirements for recognition.

VALLE de MEXICO

This new Grand Lodge encompassing the lodges of the area surrounding Mexico City, have also met the requirements for recognition, They like all of the other Grand Lodges in the Country of Mexico, are considered regular and worthy.

IVORY COAST

A year ago we reported that there were 8 lodges in the Ivory Coast working under the sponsorship of the Grande Loge Nationale Francaise. During the past year they have formed their own independent Grand Lodge and are requesting our recognition. We are assured by the Commission on Recognition that they meet all of the usual requirements, and recommend that their request be granted.

URUGUAY

A year ago we had a request for recognition from the Grand Lodge of Uruguay. No action was recommended at that time so additional study of the situation could be undertaken. Study to date is still inconclusive. About 12 Grand Lodges in The United States have extended recognition, but to date none of the Grand Lodges of Canada, nor the three Grand Lodges in the British Commonwealth have extended such recognition.

RECOMMENDATIONS

Most Worshipful Grand Master, I move that the Grand Lodge of Maine extend recognition, enter into fraternal relations, and exchange representatives with the Grand Lodges of Hawaii, Valle de Mexico, and The Ivory Coast. I further move that action on the request of the Grand Lodge of Uruguay be delayed pending further information, and that if further study proves them worthy, recognition may be extended on the unanimous recommendation of this committee and the Grand Master.

The 82nd Annual Communication of the Grand Lodge was opened in the Hotel Saskatchewan, Regina with the reception of Grand Officers, Past Grand Masters, of whom 15 were present, and representatives of 3 Canadian and 4 U.S. Grand Lodges. Welcome was extended by civic representatives, including the Mayor and Governor of the Province.

The flag ceremony was conducted by the Royal Canadian Mounted Police, who presented the flags of Canada and the United States.

The resignation of the Grand Secretary was announced.

Two lodges merged, and the first meeting of Solomon Lodge of Research was held on August 8th.

In his address, the Grand Master emphasized that a successful lodge must involve Masons' families and engage in activities perceived as worthwhile by the community.

He reported a ceremony unknown in the jurisdiction in which a newly initiated Entered Apprentice was presented with a basket containing his "wages", a bottle of wine, an ear of corn and a bottle of oil.

Fraternal relations were extended to the Grand Lodge of Mato Grosso, Brazil. Four other requests for recognition were held over pending further information.

Honorary Past Grand Rank was conferred on five Brethren, one from Canada and four from United States jurisdictions.

Brother Donald A. Orr was elected and installed Grand Master for the ensuing year.

Two new lodges were consecrated during the year, and there are two more under dispensation.

The Grand Master reported taking part in a special event, "Northward Ho" in which 54 recreational vehicles traveled hundreds of miles during the month of August, visiting some 8 lodges, with District meetings being held in conjunction with calls.

A Resolution of Loyalty was adopted, to be sent to Queen Elizabeth II.

Sympathies were extended to the Grand Master whose wife passed away during a visit to England for the investiture of the United Grand Lodge of England.

The title "Right Worshipful" was voted for several District Deputies who have served with distinction during the past year, and "Very Worshipful" to Brethren who have served Grand Lodge well.

The Grand Secretary advised that Grand Lodge records were now on computer, which had enabled him to sort out dual and plural members on the roster.

During the year, relief was extended by lodges to members, widows and transients, and by the Grand Lodge Board of Benevolences, in the amount of \$105,620.

Representatives of concordant bodies were received on the second day of the Communication.

A Community Charities Fund was established to work with non-Masonic needy and with agencies in the community.

Adopted was a change in the Charges to be read to the Master of a lodge at his installation:

"Do you admit that it is not in the power of any man, or body of men, to make alteration or innovation in the body of Masonry, without the consent first obtained of Grand Lodge?" (Change underlined).

Fraternal recognition was extended to the Grand Lodge of Tamaulipas, Mexico, and continued with the Grand Orient of Italy.

Brother David L. Gibson was elected and installed Grand Master.

An Emergent Communication of the Grand Lodge was held on Nov. 12, 1988, to review the status of a controversy between the Grand Lodge and Salaam Temple, AAONMS over the latter's refusal to accept petitions for membership from black members of Alpha Lodge No. 116. It was noted that a law suit had been filed by Salaam Temple against the Grand Lodge to set aside an Edict by the Grand Master requiring Master Masons to demit from Salaam Temple or face suspension.

The 202nd Annual Communication of Grand Lodge was opened on April 12th with presentation of 17 Past Grand Masters in attendance. Representatives of 17 other Grand Lodges and Appendant bodies were then received, followed by the Pledge of Allegiance and singing of the U.S. and Canadian National Anthems. Representatives of DeMolay, Rainbow, Amaranth brought greetings, as did the Mayor of Wildwood.

Progress was noted in the project to locate and mark with Masonic tablets the graves of Past Grand Masters. Sixty-eight have now been installed, 20 more refused by families or cemetery officials. The program is expected to be completed in about three years.

During the year, there were six lodge mergers or consolidations, with one more in progress.

The Grand Master recommended that a legal group be created to take care of the numerous legal matters which seem to be becoming more numerous. He also proposed that consideration be given to revising the Constitution and ritual to substitute the terms "Freemason" and "Freemasonry" for the "Mason" and "Masonry" now used.

Fraternal recognition was extended to the Grand Lodge Benito Juarez, Mexico, Parana, Brazil, Rio Grande del Norte, Brazil, and Maconica Do Estado de Rondonia.

The special Committee of Long Range Planning was elevated to the status of a Standing Committee.

The Committee on Education and Services reported establishment of the New Jersey Masonic University, for promoting Masonic education.

A report was received from the Ad-Hoc Committee to study the organization of the Grand Lodge, indicating a need to adopt a corporate attitude toward the operation and administration of Grand Lodge affairs, keeping in mind that "we are by our nature, a society of friends and brothers."

It was voted to become a charter member of the National Masonic Foundation for the Prevention of Drug and Alcohol Abuse Among Children.

Retiring Grand Secretary Edward Rainey was made Grand Secretary Emeritus.

Brother William Schoene, Jr. was elected and installed Grand Master for the ensuing year.



Following the introductions, the Grand Master introduced M.W. and Ill. M. Donald Gardner, Past Grand Master, and Active for Maine.

Brethren, it is indeed a pleasure to introduce to you our speaker of the

evening. He was born in Brockton, Massachusetts and received his education in Brockton High School, graduating in the class of 1936 and from Colby College in Waterville, Maine with a B.A. Degree in Business Administration in 1940. Following graduation he worked for a time for the Beech-Nut Packing Company in sales promotion and then as Pay Master for the Todd-Bath Shipbuilding Company in Maine, until June 1944, when he received a commission as an Ensign in the United States Navy.

He served on active duty in the South Pacific from 1944-1946 on an LST in the Amphibious Forces as an Executive Officer and Navigator. He retired as a Lt. (J.G.) and remained in the United States Naval Reserve until 1956. Upon his return from active service he attended Boston University School of Law and received a Bachelor of Law Degree in 1949.

Admitted to the Maine State Bar in 1948 he practiced law with Clark Drummond Chapman until 1970 when the family law firm merged with his present law firm and he then became senior partner. He became a counsel to the firm upon his semi-retirement in 1989. He is a member of the Maine State Bar, the American Bar and the Cumberland County Bar Association, and a former member and Secretary of the American College of Mortgage Attorneys, and also a Fellow of the American College of Probate Counsel. He is also a member of the Arbitration Commission of the Maine Board of Overseers of the Bar. For many years he was a Director and General Counsel for the Federal Loan and Building Association of Portland. Since 1962 he has been a Director for York Mutual Insurance Company of Maine and presently serves as its Chairman of the Board as well as Chairman of the Board of York Insurance Company and York Holding Company. He was Secretary and Member of the Civil Service Commission of the City of Portland from 1961 to 1964. He has been a member of the Advisory Board of the Salvation Army of Greater Portland, serving as its Chairman from 1982 to 1984. He is also a member and a Past President of the Woodfords Club, a non-political social club. An active member of Woodfords Congregational Church, United Church of Christ he has served as a member of the Governing Board and is presently a Trustee of the Invested Fund and its former Chairman.

In 1941, he was united in marriage to the former Phyllis Chapman and they have two children, four grand children and two great-grand children.

Raised in Ancient Landmark Lodge, No. 17, in June 1944, he served as its W. M. in 1955. In the Grand Lodge of Maine he served as District Deputy Grand Master, Grand Marshal, Grand Senior Deacon, Grand Lecturer, Deputy Grand Master, and was elected Grand Master of Masons of Maine in 1966 and 1967. He has served on several committees of the Grand Lodge and is presently Chairman of the Finance Committee and the Committee on Masonic Jurisprudence. He has been a Trustee of the Charitable Foundation since 1966.

He received the Capitular Degrees in Greenleaf Chapter, No. 13, R.A.M. in 1960, the Cryptic Degrees in Portland Council, R. & S.M. in 1961, and was Knighted in Portland Commandery, K.T. No. 2 in 1960. He is a Past Officer in the Red Cross of Constantine, of Maine, Lodge of Research, Maine College of Societas Rosicruciana and Kora Temple, A.A.O. N.M.S.

He served as a member of the Commission on Information for Recogni-

tion of the Conference of Grand Masters of North America for six years and its former chairman.

He completed his Scottish Rite Degrees with Maine Consistory in 1951; was Thrice Potent Master of Yates Lodge of Perfection in 1965 and 1966, and Commander-In-Chief of the Maine Consistory in 1964, 1965 and 1966. He has been Second Lt. Commander of Maine Council of Deliberation since 1975. In 1965 he was created a Sovereign Grand Inspector General, 33rd Degree, Honorary Member of the Supreme Council in Cleveland and crowned an Active Member in 1989 at Pittsburgh.

It is a real privilege to introduce to you M.W. Brother M. Donald Gardner, Past Grand Master of Masons in Maine, and an Active Member of the Supreme Council of Sovereign Grand Inspectors General, 33^o Degree, A.A.S.R.N.M.J. In 1969 when I was W.M. of my Lodge in Lewiston, which was observing its 100th Anniversary, he was the featured speaker at one of our Centennial Events.

M.W. Grand Master, honored guests and Brethren:

Although this is the 54th Annual Blue Lodge Banquet, it was initiated by M.W. Bro. Clark Drummond Chapman May 2, 1935. In all of subsequent years, we have been privileged to hear some most eloquent speakers and men from other jurisdictions who have distinguished themselves in Freemasonry. Only once in all those years has a Past Grand Master from Maine been afforded the honor of speaking at the Blue Lodge Banquets. That was M.W. Bro. Aubrey L. Burbank in 1962.

I was somewhat astonished that our Grand Master felt I had anything to say beneficial to the Craft. It is therefore a distinct honor to be accorded this privilege.

A speaker is usually selected because he may have exceptional knowledge in a field or command of some phase of a subject superior to others, the ability to analyze and interpret a subject to the enlightenment of his audience or the extraordinary ability to inspire others to greater achievement. I confess I have none of the above qualifications. As Mark Anthony said "I am no orator, as Brutus is, But as you know me all, a plain, blunt man, for I have neither wit, nor worth, nor words, action, nor utterance, nor the power of speech to stir men's blood; I only speak right on." I intend to provoke some constructive thinking and I hope eventually some action. I am going to talk about the relevancy of Masonry to the community.

I submit that we as an institution are inextricably linked to our communities and we cannot live apart from them.

I frame my theme as Fraternal Citizenship. My inspiration came from the annual report of the American Telephone and Telegraph Company. It recognized the importance of being a part of the community. The introduction to its annual report is entitled "Corporate Citizenship. Investing in the Future." It states in part, "It is both right and smart to invest in arts, education, health and social action programs -- We continue to be guided by what we believe serves the interest of both AT&T and those helped by our contributions -- of time, energy and worthy causes."

In effect, this corporate giant is saying it is striving to be a good corpor-

ate citizen and a part of the community.

I believe Freemasonry, as an institution, should likewise be a good fraternal citizen and a part of the community in which it functions.

Freemasonry in America has been declining each consecutive year since 1959. In the State of Maine, our largest membership stood at 47,964 Blue Lodge Masons in 1959. Today, it is approximately 35,000.

In 1988, the Masonic Renewal Task Force was established by a group of Masonic Leaders who agreed to obtain a professional survey of the prevailing attitudes of both the public and our members toward Freemasonry. The Task Force employed the services of The Barton Gillett Company of Baltimore, Maryland and Opinion Research Corporation of Princeton, New Jersey.

The survey was a comprehensive survey of adult males representing every state in the continental United States. Approximately 84% of those surveyed were not currently members of any organization.

I shall focus briefly on just one phase of the survey, the result of which you will find startling and revealing.

Those interviewed were asked a series of questions designed to get them to identify their attitude toward Freemasonry.

Only about 30% said they were familiar with Freemasonry. 23% said they were not. 36% knew the name only. 11% never heard of the organization.

Asked to name a word or phrase to describe Masonry, the largest single response was they did not know, but 14% listed "secretive."

The study confirmed what most already knew. The fraternity is virtually invisible so far as the public is concerned.

I believe that Masonry is perceived by the community as a secret society of older men concerned with mutual assistance among its members.

We have always been taught that for Masonry to be an effective force in the community, we as individual Masons must translate the teachings of Masonry in our everyday conduct among our friends, our family and our colleagues.

In his address at the Feast of St. John Banquet in the Grand Lodge of Massachusetts in December 1990, Illustrious Brother Robert L. Steadman, 33^o, Chief Justice of the Superior Court for the Commonwealth of Massachusetts said, "While it may be exemplary, the individual approach does not suffice and there should be an institutional demonstration of the teachings of Masonry in order to breathe new life into our relationships with the consuming public." He raised a provocative question when he said, "What do we do as an institution to persuade the society in which we live that we are not self centered or self seeking and that we do share a real concern and affection for our uninitiated neighbors?."

How do we go about it? How do we, or can we, awake the public awareness of Freemasonry, improve the visibility of Masonry in the community and disabuse our neighbors and fellow citizens that as an institution we are a secret society of elderly men unconcerned with the welfare and good will of the community?

I have some suggestions to make which I hope you will not reject out of hand without serious and constructive consideration. I know many of you

will say these ideas go too far too fast and there are those of you who are unwilling to make changes despite the need to do so.

The place to start is with the corporate entity, the corporate citizen if you will, namely, the Grand Lodge of Maine and its constituent lodges whose power and authority are derived wholly from the Grand Lodge.

We must correct things internally to make the Grand Lodge and its constituent lodges a sound, viable and respected institution in the community. It is true that the institution is a voluntary fraternal organization operating on the lodge system. Nevertheless, it must be operated as a sound business entity. The Grand Lodge and its constituent lodges must continually review the finances in order to insure that they are fiscally and financially sound and properly funded to carry on the business. We should take a close look to identify those things which are essential and necessary and those which are merely desirable. Lodges and Grand Lodge should be forehanded, plan for the future and determine the feasibility of establishing reserve funds to meet unexpected contingencies and expenditures without jeopardizing current operating revenues. I believe lodges do not do this. Grand Lodge has been doing it for a number of years and should continue to do so.

The Grand Lodge should consider whether or not in the future it should hire a professional office administrator and financial officer as employees, subject to employment contract. We have been very fortunate up to now to have an elected Grand Secretary and Grand Treasurer who are eminently well qualified. It is conceivable that a brother could "garner" sufficient votes to be elected to either of these officers and not be properly qualified to handle the respective duties, but because each was elected by the Brethren, neither could be discharged for incompetence.

We should take a good hard look at the composition of committees, both in the Lodge and Grand Lodge. Many brethren have served long and well for many years.

We have a great many young men of talent, ability, imagination and perception who would be willing to serve, yes eager to serve their lodge and Grand Lodge, but are not afforded that opportunity. How often have we heard it said that the Lodge and particularly the Grand Lodge are run by the old timers and Past Grand Masters?

Age and experience are valuable and necessary to a degree. But the old timers must let go. Be available to counsel and advise. But we should reorganize some of our Committees to infuse new blood and make use of the younger talent available.

We all appreciate loyalty and longevity of service. And I don't intend to discredit those who have served long and well. But in order to retain the interests of the younger men, we must give them opportunities to serve the Craft.

We who have served many years on various committees do not have all the answers nor do the Past Grand Masters have a corner on all the wisdom.

We need younger men to become the decision makers, those who are not reluctant to change. For these are not ordinary times for Freemasonry. Now we require extraordinary Managers and decision makers to chart the future of the Craft.

I suggest that a thorough review be made of the Standing Regulations

and decision and, yes, some of the provisions of our Constitution because I believe some are obsolete, archaic and inapplicable if we want the institution of Freemasonry to become a citizen of the community and to improve the perception the public has of Masonry. We can accomplish this without doing violence to the Landmarks.

Time does not permit me to enumerate many of the revisions or rescissions which I deem appropriate or to discuss much in detail.

I would suggest two or three changes which might be given consideration.

In my opinion, Section 101 of the Constitution which prohibits public processions by the lodges except with the permission of the Grand Master, as well as the decision which holds that parades in public by Masonic Lodges are not advisable, should be revoked or rescinded. I have read and studied all the decisions and discussions in our jurisprudence and can find no substantive reasoning for such prohibition. It has only been stated that Masons are not accustomed to make public demonstrations except to perform Masonic labors.

Personally, I can see nothing Masonically wrong with participation in a parade although I know other Grand Jurisdictions have the same prohibition. If lodges were permitted to take part in a parade sponsored by the town wherein the lodge is situated in observance of Memorial Day, or the Fourth of July, it would go a long way in making a statement that yes, the lodge is a caring citizen of the community and interested in such observances.

Since long before the founding of the Grand Lodge of Maine, Masonic charity has been limited to assisting the poor and distressed worthy brother, his widow and orphans. In 1970 the use of lodge charity funds was expanded to permit contributions to the DeMolay and Pine Tree Youth Foundation. In 1987 the purposes for which charitable funds of the Grand Lodge may be appropriated were considerably boardened to include charitable, literary, educational, research, scientific or medical purposes deemed appropriate and consistent with Masonic Principals and practices.

In my opinion the constituent lodges should be permitted and encouraged to amend their by laws to broaden the purposes of their charity funds. When I was Grand Master, the Brethren desired to make a contribution in the name of the lodge to a fund raising project for a Community Hospital. They were prohibited from participating because of the restriction of the Grand Lodge laws placed on the use of charity funds. If the charitable purposes were enlarged, the lodges would be able to participate in like community projects thus giving evidence to the public that we do care and are willing to be a part of the community, further raising the visibility of Masonry.

We are doing great things now with our scholarship program. Many lodges participate by matching the scholarship grant made by Grand Lodge and appearing at school assemblies when the award is made. It is expected this year that there will be a scholarship grant awarded every high school in the state. This is great and makes the public aware of Masonry, but we can do more if we enlarge the purposes of our charity funds.

It may come as a surprise to many of you that should you make a gift of books, memorabilia, jewels, or other artifacts to the Grand Lodge Library and Museum or a gift of a sum of money to the Drug and Alcohol Abuse

Prevention Program or to the Charitable Foundation, you will not receive a tax deduction to the value thereof. It makes no difference whether or not the gift is given in your lifetime or as a testamentary gift. The same rule applies.

There is but one corporate entity, The Master Wardens and Members of the Grand Lodge of Maine. The Masonic Charitable Foundation is established under the umbrella of this corporate entity.

It is my suggestion that The Masonic Charitable Foundation be incorporated as a separate legal entity and managed by a Board of Trustees elected by ballot by the Grand Lodge of Maine in the same manner that now exists. This corporate entity should then file with the Internal Revenue Service to qualify under their regulations as a Section 501(c)(3) tax exempt charitable organization. Further, the library and museum should be transferred to the care, custody and management of the Board of Trustees together with the present assets of the unincorporated Masonic Charitable Foundation.

If this were accomplished, all gifts by all donors would receive maximum tax deduction and would encourage Masons and non-Masons to become contributors and we could do a great deal more for our charitable endeavors for the community.

I have often heard it stated that Freemasonry is not buildings, but that it is the members and the workings of symbolic lodges which are the important thing. This statement is only partially correct. Members and the workings of the lodge are important and I will speak on this in a moment, but I think buildings are important too.

The lodge hall in the middle of the community makes a statement to the public whether or not we care or take pride in the image we project. Ask yourselves: what image does your lodge hall project? Is it run down, dilapidated, in need of repair, paint and maintenance? What do you want the public and your neighbors to think about when they view your property?

If you want to cultivate a favorable impression and respect for the Craft, then you must have an attractive, well maintained lodge hall in good repair. You should take pride in your Masonic meeting place. Occasional work parties with volunteer labor and materials can work wonders.

In the last ten years, there have been fourteen new lodge halls erected and one completely renovated in the State of Maine. What an impact these have made in their neighborhoods. And there are more in the making. They go a long way toward raising the visibility of Masonry in their community in a favorable light.

While on the subject of lodge halls, I think we should make our facilities available to local clubs and groups. So long as the lodge rooms remain secure from the public, there is no reason why we cannot invite local clubs and organizations to use our dining halls for meetings, card parties, receptions and other parties. This would not only make the lodge a better neighbor, but would generate additional revenue.

Some will say that it won't work because most private parties wish to serve liquor and this is against present Masonic law. Perhaps that is an issue which should be studied by the Grand Lodge. We now permit business tenants of property owned by the Masonic Lodge or Trustees to sell or serve alcoholic beverages. Customs and practices have changed considerable since

the initial prohibition. So long as it is not a Masonic sponsored party or reception would it be feasible to allow private groups renting the dining halls to serve alcoholic beverages at a private party? Of course, any rental agreement would have to contain an indemnity and save harmless clause for the benefit of the landlord against any claim occurring or arising out of such use.

I make no recommendation other than to say this is a matter that should be seriously considered by a thoughtful and knowledgeable committee.

A moment ago, I mentioned that the members and the workings of a Symbolic lodge are as important as is an attractive lodge hall. I believe how a lodge operates affects the image it projects to the community. Say a lodge meets once a month to transact business and perhaps work a degree and there are two or three cars in the parking lot and the public sees perhaps a dozen or so men entering the lodge hall. To me, this conveys to the public an image of a struggling lodge unable to provide a program that will attract most of its own members. It certainly would not excite a non Mason to express a desire to be a part of it.

Remember, if you will, those occasions when the lodge is well attended, its neighbors see the parking lot full of cars and witness many brethren entering the lodge hall. This projects an entirely different image of Masonry to the public, that of an active lodge that is doing something, attracting its members enjoying good fellowship. A non Mason might well consider that something worthwhile is going on and maybe he ought to be a part of it.

There are two things that make a big difference. Ritual and leadership. Good ritualistic work does not always make good leadership.

The ritual is our basic Masonic educational program. We must have strong proficient ritualistic work in order to teach and instruct the members and candidates in the lessons of Freemasonry. Sloppy unimpressive ritual delivered as an exercise in capacity to memorize neither instructs nor inspires those who witness it. It is no wonder the Brethren lose their interest in the degree work.

But does the degree work have to be done by the elective and appointed lodge officers? Why not establish a director of work and cast a degree team whose sole responsibility is to exemplify the work? A degree team could be organized for each degree. There are those who thrive on degree work, pride themselves on their ability and expression and exemplify impressive and outstanding work. A degree which has been beautifully rehearsed and practiced can become a work of art which will impress and attract the brethren.

But ritual alone while essential, cannot sustain a lodge. It is not sufficient to stimulate a brother's continued interest in Masonry. Our members demand intellectual stimuli. Quality leadership is the key and what the brethren desire. We must have energetic leadership with inspiration and vision to plan and lead.

Today, we have the tendency to reward faithful plodding service which produces faithful plodding officers whose enthusiasm has been drained by the numbing path to the East. It is plain folly to equate long faithful service with leadership qualities due to the misguided notion that if one waits long enough and doesn't rock the boat in the process, he can have his term in the East.

We have in the Craft young men with executive and administrative ability with imagination, enthusiasm and energy to lead and to plan and promote appealing programs, but care nothing for ritual or the desire to memorize. Brethren today are not as willing to commit themselves to ten or eleven years to work through a line. If the Grand Lodge would permit the establishment of degree teams within a lodge and permit the election of governing officers free from ritualistic responsibility, we could say to young men with the qualities of leadership, we need your talent and ability. Give us four years of your time to serve as deacon, warden and master and maybe we can revitalize the lodge and bring the brethren back.

A drastic suggestion it is true. But it is worth consideration and developing until a better idea emerges. There are no over night miracles. Nor are long accepted practices easy nuts to crack.

Throughout this talk, I have been dealing with making Masonry a good citizen of the community and ways of raising the visibility of the Craft in the eyes of the public and how it perceives Freemasonry. In that light, there are two traditions or doctrines of Masonry which appear to place some restraints on how far we may go in informing the public.

One is the tradition prohibiting solicitation and the other is the 23rd landmark which holds that secrecy is a most important landmark and "if divested of its secret character, it would lose its identity and would cease to be Freemasonry."

In my opinion, this Landmark is mostly misunderstood by Masons. Masonry has no secret agenda. It does not seek to conceal its existence nor its objectives.

As Mackey expresses it,

"Its philosophy is open to the world. Its modes of recognition by which it secures identification, and its rites and ceremonies which are its methods of instruction, alone are secret. All men may know the tenets of the Masonic Creed."

In his Revised Encyclopedia of Freemasonry, Mackey goes on to say,

"Such, lastly, is Freemasonry, which is a secret society only as respects its signs, a few of its legends and its traditions, and its method of inculcating its mystical philosophy, which, as to everything else, its design, its objects, its moral and religious tenets and the great doctrine which it teaches is as open a society as if it met on the highways beneath the sun of day, and not within the well-guarded portals of a Lodge."

So Brethren, except for the modes of recognition and method of instruction, there is very little we cannot talk about with non Masons. Contrary to what most Masons believe, it is not a violation of our obligation to discuss Masonry with a non Mason.

Francis G. Paul 33^o, Sovereign Grand Commander of the Supreme Council of the Ancient Accepted Scottish Rite for the NMJ has commented

*"that even those who have some knowledge of
"the Masons" do not have a clear picture of who
we are, what we stand for or what we do"*

Brethren, it is time we went on the offensive and no longer were passive. We should tell the story of Masonry to all who will listen. We want Freemasonry to be seen, known, appreciated and respected.

Some of you will object to this strategy because it smacks of solicitation which is forbidden. Here again, in my opinion, the prohibition against solicitation is misunderstood.

When we wear a Masonic pin, advertise in the newspapers, issue a Grand Lodge publication sent to a member's home or have a semi public meeting in the lodge, we are soliciting prospective candidates.

Solicitation is a poor word choice. Invitation is the more precise word. It is wrong to invite a candidate to present an application. But I see nothing wrong with solicitation so long as we stop short of offering a petition and issuing an invitation to join.

There is nothing in our jurisprudence or customs which prohibits tacit solicitation or selling the product of Masonry. Our Masonic views and values are shared by a great majority of men who believe in honor, truth, charity, justice, industriousness, patriotism and family.

So why not, at any opportunity tell him what we stand for, what we teach, talk about our charities, boast of our antiquity, of the friends to be made and the good fellowship to be had. You may never know who might be ready to become a Mason if he has accurate information about the fraternity. Our purpose should be to inform and give men an opportunity to learn about our Masonic membership.

Brethren, it is time we appreciated our strength and serviceability., We have the opportunity, yes the responsibility of proving that Freemasonry is a caring and supportive citizen and member of the community and very much more that a quiet fraternity. We must be intelligent and resourceful and new horizons will open for all of us.

I shall close by quoting once again Ill, Francis G. Paul, 330,

"If Freemasonry is to grow and remain a positive effective force both in the lives of men and our nation, then we have a job to do."

Grand Master: M.W. Gardner, thank for the inspiring and thought stirring address. I have a few announcements that I wish to make and have a few things we have to do here and then we will depart.

Brethren, "I would like to say how much it means to me that each and every one of you are here tonight. Thanks for being here."

Following the announcements, the Grand Master introduced Wor. Clyde A. Roth, the Grand Lodge representative to the Togus V.A. Hospital for his remarks.

Wor. Clyde A. Roth: "M.W. Grand Master, I would like to present to you Steven Hurd who is the Director of Volunteer Services. He has a special award for the Grand Lodge of Maine which I don't think has ever been given before, and I really appreciate Steve being here. Maybe he'll be a Mason some day. He has a big part in this program in Togus and he has a few words."

Steve Hurd: "Most Worshipful Grand Master, it certainly is a pleasure being here with you tonight, and I take great pleasure in reporting to you that the Grand Lodge of Maine has had a very positive effect on the services

and quality of life for our hospitalized veterans at Togus and I would like to present this Department of Veterans affairs certificate of appreciation on behalf of the Director Jack Sims. *'Department of Veterans affairs certificate of Appreciation Grand Lodge of Maine, A.F. & A.M., for outstanding support of hospitalized veterans through participation in the veterans affairs voluntary service program and enhancement of the mission of the Department of Veterans affairs. May 7, 1991, (signed) John H. Sims, Jr., Center Director, Medical and Regional Office Center, Togus, Maine'* Thank you very much for your help and support."

Grand Master: Thank you. We appreciate it and it will be displayed down at the Grand Lodge Office.

ADDRESS BY MISS PATRICIA FRANK, GRAND WORTHY ADVISOR, INTERNATIONAL ORDER OF RAINBOW FOR GIRLS

Most Worshipful Grand Master of the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine, Distinguished Guests, Masonic Brothers and Guests: It certainly is a pleasure to be here today and to bring you the warm fraternal greetings of the International Order of Rainbow for Girls, and our Supreme Inspector, Mrs. Dorothy Merrill Higgins, our Supreme sub-deputy, Mrs. Cora Ellen Moody and my many Rainbow sisters. Rainbow in Maine, this year, is very busy. Our Charity projects for the year are the Rainbow Merrill Camp and the Alzheimer Disease Research Foundation. The Rainbow Merrill Camp was a dream that was started several years ago, and today we are now pleased to say that our little piece of land now has a bathhouse and roads and I was very pleased to host the very first Rainbow camping week-end this Summer in which we had over 100 guests in attendance. The second charity project is the Alzheimer Disease Research Foundation and this is a charity

project that I chose from personal experience. I had a relative, my Grandmother, who died of this disease. I remember watching her as a child and not understanding what she was doing. Nobody in my family really understood what she was doing at the time either because there was little known about this disease. I have chosen this project because I have seen what it does to normal productive people - it destroys their minds and takes their dignity. I believe if we continue to finance worthwhile foundations like this we will find a cure for this disease, and end the suffering of the victims as well as the people that love them. The main way that we raised money for these charity projects this year was the Grand Charity Ball and I would like to thank everyone out there that supported us in this endeavor. If it wasn't for you and your support of the Rainbow Girls our Charity Ball would not have been a success and I would not be able to make the donations to the charity projects I have chosen for the year.

This year I have encouraged my girls to bring in members, which is something that all organizations strive for, but I gave my girls an incentive this year. As Masons you know about the Forget-Me-Not flower. I told my girls the story behind this wonderful little flower. I told them that it was used by the Masons during Hitler's regime in Germany in which it was a symbol to each individual and to the Brothers that they were Masons. I gave each of my girls a Forget-Me-Not Pin when they bring in a petition. I hope that it reminds them to keep our organization strong and that we can overcome anything that we decide to.

The theme I chose for the year was "Believe". It is a very simple word, but the meaning behind it is what makes it so very special. Believing can move mountains and it can take people to the Moon. As Masonic organizations we need to believe. We have to believe in ourselves as well as our Masonic heritage and what we are capable of doing. There are no boundaries in our organization, only those that we set for ourselves. We just have to believe in ourselves and our organizations and we can attain anything we want.

I would like to thank you for this opportunity to address this Grand Body and for all the courtesies you have extended to myself and my Supreme Inspector. Thank you very much.

Grand Master: Thank you, Patricia, for that wonderful message. Now let us hear from John Damon, State Master Councilor of DeMolay in Maine.

ADDRESS BY JOHN DAMON, STATE MASTER COUNCILOR, INTERNATIONAL ORDER OF DEMOLAY FOR BOYS, STATE OF MAINE:

Most Worshipful Grand Master, Honored Guests, Elected and Permanent Members to the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine: It is a great pleasure to be able to speak before you this morning and I would like to explain briefly what Maine DeMolay has been doing throughout the past year. Our biggest goal as with many other Masonic organizations this year has been membership. Maine DeMolay has been putting its best foot forward to increase membership, bring our Chapters around the state closer together

and to bring DeMolay to the forefront of the masonic community. I recently returned from DeMolay International Conference in St. Louis, Missouri and I would like to share with you a couple of very proud and progressive acts that DeMolay has recently initiated. As of April 26, 1991 DeMolay has opened its doors to the parents and guardians of new DeMolays. Now any parent wishing to witness a DeMolay's initiatory and DeMolay degree may do so. We feel this is a great accomplishment for DeMolay. A new Chapter is about to begin in the history of our great order and we couldn't be happier. Opening our doors to our parents is going to bolt DeMolay toward the future. No longer should a parent have to question any of our principles and ideals. They can come and see for themselves. DeMolay will be a household name once again. Our cities and towns will be seeing our community projects more and more and no longer will any one come up to you and say **DEMOWHAT**.

Another task DeMolay has undertaken is a project called LABO which is an exchange program with young adults from Japan. This August ten Japanese teenagers will come to America and stay with their host families and we hope there will be more and more in the years to come.

DeMolay and Rainbow are the foundations of Masonry and I know that we all want to see it grow and prosper. We have to communicate DeMolay and Rainbow to the public. We have to get out there and generate new membership. Each one of us here holds within our heart a flame for Masonry. If we can nurture this flame, if we can go to another and reach into the inner most depths of their soul and set their flame afire, then therein lies the purpose of our order and therein lies our purpose for living.

Before I return to my seat I would like to share with you a short poem. It is a tribute to the men who have inspired us all -- our Fathers; it was written by Mary Osborne Autumn and it is entitled:

 Undying courage you installed - teaching right, condemning wrong
 Your Fatherly wisdom daily gave new courage to my heart
 Never tiring, just standingby quietly doing your part
 When now we meet at manhoods gate you're the best pal I ever had
 You'll never know what you mean to me as I simply say -- THANKS DAD

Most Worshipful Grand Master can you come over here for a minute please.

Grand Master: I sure can - here I am.

State Master Councilor: Most Worshipful Grand Master, it's been a great pleasure being the State Master Councilor while you've been the Grand Master, and I would like to present to you, on behalf of Maine DeMolay, a

pin, if I can get it out of the bag here, and it has our Masonic emblem, a Rainbow emblem, an Eastern Star emblem and the DeMolay emblem, and it says, "Working together as a Masonic family". I truly believe that's what we have to do and that's what we're trying to achieve. So, Uncle Bob, here, I'd like to pin this on you, if I may.

Grand Master: You certainly may.

State Master Councilor: I hope you will wear it with pride, and now if anybody would like to purchase one of these pins, (laughter and applause) our local chapter, Knights of the Sun Chapter in Auburn have recently run out of their supply but are getting more soon, and they will be on sale and we will distribute them around the State. And thank you again very much for letting me speak to you this morning.

Grand Master: Thank you, John, for a very fine message, and thank you for the presentation here. I'll always treasure this, believe me, because it symbolizes something I truly believe in, our Masonic family.

Well, Brethren, with youth such as are represented here this morning I guess we don't have to worry about leadership here in Maine for a long time to come. Their presentations have really been outstanding, and I certainly appreciate them taking time from their schedules to visit with us for a while this morning and for each of them to bring their message to us. I think it says an awful lot for what our Maine young people are doing. Thanks so much for coming, Patricia and John, Mrs. Higgins and Clyde. It's just great to have you here. So if you wish to retire now with your escorts, you certainly have permission to leave. Again we thank you for your presentations.

Upon leaving our Youth leaders in Maine were given a very hearty applause.

Following the presentation made by the Worthy Grand Advisor and the State Master Councilor, the Grand Master asked R.W. Edward Emery to introduce the representatives from the American Red Cross.

R.W. Edward Emery: "Most Worshipful Grand Master, Brethren of Masons in Maine, I'd like to introduce to you the Red Cross representatives. The Grand Master asked me to have somebody to speak this morning. This is Ann Miller from the Red Cross and Martha Wilder from the Red Cross.

Grand Master: "We'll be very interested to hear your message":

Ann Miller, Rep. of the Red Cross: "Good Morning, everyone. I want to thank you very much for inviting us here, and I also want you to know that I'm a daughter of a Mason. How many of you in this room gave blood in this last year, 1990. (There was a show of hands.) Thank you very much. Those who gave blood last year probably helped the little boy who just got burned in Norway, Maine, little Andy Frenchette who got burned over 70% of his body. I met his uncle. This little boy suffered terribly and will continue to suffer terribly until he's twenty years old because as he grows, he'll have to have surgery. Thanks to the Shriners, his family won't have to worry about the expense of that. But money is not always going to help because this little boy has already used a lot of blood and blood products. He's used plasma, he's used platelets, he's used red cells, and he's going to use an awful lot more. No money in the world can buy those. They have to come from human beings. They have to come from each one of you and I, we who are healthy, are responsible to help those who are not healthy, all the money in the world is not to give a cancer patient another chance, not to give a cancer patient another day at the beach, another anniversary, another Christmas. But by you just taking one hour, sixty minutes out of your busy life style and going to your community blood drive and giving just one pint of blood, and you've all got ten to twelve pints in your bodies, it's not going to hurt to give just one pint of blood. You're going to make it up over night. All you're going to do is lay down for ten minutes and give one pint of blood---the gift of life.

It's the most personal thing you'll ever do in your life. A lot of you here will say, "Oh well, I'm too old to do that." There's no age limit. There used to be, but there isn't anymore. There's lots of seventy year olds out there I see jogging every day. In fact there's lots of gentlemen out there between seventy and eighty that are a lot healthier than some of the twenty year old young men who can't give blood. In other words, you should be giving blood if you're a healthy individual. If you've never had hepatitis, you should give blood. Some of you are saying, "I've got high blood pressure, I can't give blood." If you're controlled by medication, that's no problem.

"In any event when you come to the blood drive, you meet with one of our nurses, and she's going to take your temperature and your pulse and check to make sure that you have enough iron in your blood. She's going to make sure that it's safe for you to give blood. She's not going to let you donate unless it is. . She will take your blood pressure. By the same token, she's going to check to make sure that the blood you're going to donate is going to be safe to give to that patient. Now, Red Cross doesn't need the blood. The patients in the hospitals need the blood. There are 47 hospitals

in Maine. Those 47 hospitals, they all depend on the American Red Cross for a reserve of Blood. But we are just the link to get that blood to the hospital. Red Cross can't do a thing without the people in the community, every community member. We can't do anything unless you do it first. We just provide the link. We do the typing and the testing, and within 24 hours that blood is delivered to the 47 hospitals. But we can't do anything without your input.

"I want you to really think about this, and Martha, my colleague from Bangor Red Cross, is going to fill you in on some of the details, and then after that, we'll have questions because it's your Red Cross. It's your blood program. After questions I'll wrap it up."

Martha Wilder: "Thanks, Ann. What I'd like to do is to take a few minutes and show you what actually happens to the blood after it's donated. I have with me some fake blood products here. They are absolutely fake, but it gives you a good idea what happens to blood.

"Some of you have donated and you know you're helping someone but you're not sure exactly how and hopefully I'll be able to tell you that.

"We collect blood in a three bag unit (holds up three plastic bags). There are three bags right here. Now if some of you are thinking of donating blood but have never done it before don't panic, we only fill up one. Sometimes, the high school kids, we tell them we're going to do more, but not really... We just fill up one bag, but we fill it up and we have this so we can do a number of things with the blood without ever going into the system. It's very important that the system stay sterile and keep the air out to make sure that it does stay sterile so we can keep the blood for a long period of time. We're going to fill up this first bag with blood, you can see there are three little test tubes attached to it, (shows test tubes). The test tubes are going to be filled up, too, out of this first bag of blood. This whole system is going to go back to our lab. Those of you who have donated may have noticed sometimes that they also kind of shake the bag when you start to donate or maybe you've watched somebody else do it. I can't watch myself. Ah, there's an anti-coagulant in the first bag which mixes in with the blood so it doesn't clot. Because like when you cut yourself, your blood would immediately start to clot and it's important to stay fluid until it's ready to be transfused. This whole system is going to go back to our lab and the first thing that's going to happen is these test tubes are going to be pulled off; one of them is going to be used to type your blood -- Ann mentioned typing and testing -- The first one will be for typing R.H. factor and for the A, B & O Groups. The other two tubes are going to be used to test your blood. Every single unit of blood that we collect is tested for syphilis, for two kinds of hepatitis -- hepatitis is a very, very difficult disease to detect. -- so we do two other tests for hepatitis, also. We test for a very rare leukemia virus, and of course the Aids anti-body test. "All of those tests are done on each unit of blood; and if any test comes up positive, the blood is destroyed and the donor is notified. After the testing and typing is done, we're going to take this whole system, put it in a centrifuge, which spins it very, very fast, and what's going to happen is that the red blood cells, they're heavier than the rest of the blood, sink to the bottom. And that's what it's going to look like (shows example). This is fake. Red, blood cells down on the

bottom and it's a very distinct layer when we separate it. After it's separated, we're still attached to the two other bags, we're going to put it between two pieces of plastic called an expressor and just press from the bottom. That top layer is going to go through a tube into the next bag (demonstrates). Now we've got two products. Every single unit of blood that we collect is broken down into these two products, red blood cells and plasma, which means that every time that you donate blood, or encourage someone else to donate blood, you're helping save the lives of two people -- not just one. I'll talk about those in a minute. We can possibly make three or four products out of your blood, but you can be guaranteed that you're going to help two people. The first one is red blood cells. This is what most people think of when they think of blood. It's what you think of hanging, you know when you see it on T.V. or somebody in surgery or something like that, this is what you think of. Red blood cells are going to be used for someone who has lost a lot of blood. The accident victim, car accident, hunting accident. Someone who's lost a lot of blood through an accident may need red blood cells. Surgery patients may need red blood cells. Open heart surgery is becoming very common, by-passes are done every single day all the time. In the last five years they've become very, very successful. Six to ten units of red blood cells, six to ten of these (holding up plastic bags) which means six to ten of us donating need to be available every time there's an open heart surgery. We are able to use the patient's own blood sometimes, but these units need to be available in case that's not possible.

Transplants, too, sometimes use red blood products -- red blood cells. Kidney transplants are becoming very common, they apparently use very little blood. Other transplants, like liver transplants, use large amounts of blood products, red blood cells being one of them.

Sometimes a woman during child birth may need red blood cells, also just anyone who's lost a lot of blood. These last for forty two days, which means we just can't store them someplace indefinitely. We send them out to hospitals. If they're not used, we pick them up and move them to another place. If you've donated blood, you want to be sure that your blood is actually used, and we make sure that happens.

The other product that we took off the top is plasma. This is one of the products that you're very familiar with. Ann mentioned the young boy who was at the Shrine clinic. That boy used a lot of blood products and in the initial phases probably used large amounts of this product, plasma. This is the product that we can do several things with. We may just freeze it, and keep it as a whole, called fresh frozen plasma, FFP for short; the biggest usage for plasma is for burn patients. Somebody who has been badly burned becomes dehydrated. They've lost fluid in their body. They haven't lost any blood at that point so they don't need blood restored. What they do need is fluid restored and physicians will transfuse large amounts of plasma, could be hundreds of units in the first critical phases of someone who's badly, badly burned. That same person is going to need reconstructive surgery, as Ann mentioned earlier, for several years, for many years and may need other blood products along the way.

Out of plasma, also, if we don't just use the fresh frozen plasma, we may extract some plasma protein. Plasma is almost all water. There are a few

plasma proteins in it. One of them is a product called Gamma Globulin, and if anybody's had a shot of it you know it hurts. Gamma Globulin is a broad spectrum immunization against viral diseases -- primarily hepatitis. And when I was about fifteen my brother was in Africa. When he came back he came down with hepatitis. All of us in the family were given shots of Gamma Globulin to keep us from getting hepatitis. It worked; none of us did. And I'm somebody who's used blood -- not a big car accident but I used blood merely through a shot.

"Another extremely important plasma is Factor 8, which is a treatment for hemophiliacs. This is one product that is being made synthetically now, but at this time we're still providing the product from plasma for hemophiliacs, and it enables the hemophiliac, someone who has trouble controlling the bleeding anytime they cut themselves or bruise themselves, to control their own bleeding. It's made a world of difference in their lives. They can inject themselves with Factor 8.

"What we may do also -- we started out with three bags, we've got red blood cells, we've got the plasma and one more bag. We can put it back in the centrifuge, spin it down again -- another separation is going to occur and we'll take the fluid off the top, and this time we're left with a very small amount of fluid called platelets. These are extremely important. This is the product that is skyrocketing in usage because it is closely associated with chemotherapy. I'm sure all of you have known someone who has undergone chemotherapy for cancer. You know it's a very intense treatment. It's designed to kill off cancer cells, and it does that. But in the process it also kills off healthy cells. Someone who has undergone chemotherapy often loses their hair, they'll also temporarily lose their platelets and may not be able to use anymore. You and I after we donate blood will produce platelets very, very fast. They control our bleeding. They're what go immediately to the site of a wound to form a barrier so their blood can clot. Obviously it's very important. Someone who is undergoing chemotherapy doesn't have that ability.

"In the past the patient would be undergoing chemotherapy, the cancer would start getting under control, and they would start having internal bleeding. They might hemorrhage, they would have to stop the chemotherapy, and the cancer would take back over. It's a vicious circle. Today what happens while that patient is undergoing chemotherapy, the platelet count is monitored, and when the platelet count drops, we transfuse or physicians transfuse from healthy donors platelets. What they're doing is stabilizing the patient long enough for the chemotherapy to do what it's designed to do, kill off the cancer. In some cases, that happens completely: they are cured.

Twenty years ago a child diagnosed as having leukemia didn't have a prayer. It was just a matter of time, and the parent knew that the child was going to die. Today, Maine Medical Center talks about an 80 to 85% cure rate of children with Leukemia. Some of those children are going to lead normal lives, but they can't do it without chemotherapy to kill off the cancer and they can't survive the chemotherapy without platelets. It's a very important blood product; it's also very delicate. It only lasts five days, that's it. It's as far as technology has taken us, so it's a very important that

we have blood coming in on a daily basis.

"That's a little bit of the nitty-gritty about what happens to your blood after you've donated. I'm going to turn it back over to Ann who's going to wrap it up, I think."

Ann Miller: "Remember, none of those patients are going to get anything that they need, be it red cells or plasma or platelets unless you give, and I know you give a lot but you're having to give more and we're asking you to give more."

In the lobby, downstairs, we have about 500 fliers, and on the back of the flier is the Maine Masonic Lodge sponsor code list. Every lodge from Abner Wade to Yorkshire is on the back, and each lodge has a number. When you donate blood, when you register to give blood, you must put your Masonic number on that registration form because at the end of the year, Al Butler, as a matter of fact, got the computer list, recently, of everybody that gave in the State of Maine. We only can do that, if you remember, no matter where you're giving blood is to put your number down on that registration form. So, please do take one of these and put it in your pocket on the way out.

"Also we've got a brochure which covers everything in detail that we discussed, plus there's a list of who can donate and who can't, a medical guideline, and on the back it also shows you graphically how that ten minutes that you've laid down, that's all you've done, laid down for ten minutes. Giving one pint of blood can give these people some more time, save their lives is what we're talking about."

"I want to thank you all so very much for allowing us to have this opportunity. Do you have any questions? We're going to spend just a few minutes on questions if you have any that we can answer. Any questions?"
Question: "Is there any age limit."

Answer: "No, there's no age limit. That's wonderful. As I've said before, there are many 70, 75, and up to 80's that are very healthy, we'd like them to run right down to their community blood drive. On the other end of it, you have to be 17 before you can donate. If you have sons or daughters, grandsons and granddaughters, they must be 17 before they can donate, and between 17 and 18 they have to have a special Red Cross permission slip unless their parents accompany them to the blood drive."

Question: "What about medication?"

Answer: "Medication? Most medications are acceptable. Do you know that you can even give blood if you've had a heart attack as long as it was a year ago. We have a complete listing in here, not of medications, but what we do have, on the back of this brochure, there's still something that you really want to know about. It's your blood center; it's your blood community. Please call the Portland chapter, if you're near Portland; it's an 800 number. It doesn't cost you anything. All you have to do is pick up the phone and also you'll see the Bangor number, and if you're in the Bangor area, just please call the 800 number and find out where the nearest blood drive is in your community. I urge you to encourage every one of your members, brothers to go to give the gift of life. Because, truly, there is no gift more precious. It's something that you can really, really share and give somebody another chance."

"Please call us, we'd love to talk with you. Thank you very, very much for giving us this opportunity. Thank you."

R.W. Emery: "Most Worshipful Grand Master, I believe we have been slipping the last few years, and I hope that the lodges, with your wishes, get back into the swing of things. I do have that printout that they spoke about, and I'll be getting a report to you."

Grand Master: "Thank you R.W. Brother Emery, and thank you representatives of the Red Cross for being here this morning and helping us by your presentations. This is an area that we're going to be working real hard in during the next year. I felt that some additional information on how the system works, what the products collected were, and what we're doing with them, the different types of uses, plus how the blood was taken might be very good information for the brethren here to have and perhaps some would feel less reluctant about donating. It's always a lot better to understand what's going on and not just walk into some place not having had any previous explanation. "We do appreciate your being here. Thank you so much. Ed, you may escort them out."

The Grand Lodge was called from refreshment to labor according to the proper form.

The Grand Master then asked the Grand Marshal to present Brother Samuel I. McCullough to the east where he was presented his commission as Grand Representative of the Grand Lodge of Ohio near the Grand Lodge of Maine. The Grand Master extended his congratulations and instructed R. W. McCullough to begin corresponding with the Grand Lodge of Ohio as soon as possible.

R.W. John E. Anagnostis, Grand Secretary, called the roll of Grand Representatives and those listed in the report of the Committee on Credentials stood in place and were greeted by the Grand Master, who directed them to correspond with their respective Grand Lodges. He commented on their involvement of communication and told those who did not receive answers from their counterparts to advise him of the fact and he would endeavor to get some answers.

GRAND MASTER'S REPORT

In Grand Lodge
Lewiston, Maine
May 7, 1991

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Ancient, Free and Accepted Masons of the State of Maine:

Brethren, it is with pleasure I welcome each of you to this, the 172 Annual Communication of the Grand Lodge of Maine in the mosque of Kora Temple, located in the City of Lewiston. Our Grand Lodge is indeed grate-

ful to Kora for the use of this beautiful building, one of the finest in North America. While this arrangement is not a first time event, it does mean very much to me to have the opportunity to hold the Annual Communication of our Grand Lodge in the "Twin City" area where I reside. To our guests from Sister Jurisdictions, we welcome you, especially, and hope that you will enjoy your stay here with us, also that you will want to return many times in the years to come. During the past year, Shirley and I have visited many of you at the Grand Sessions held in your respective jurisdictions and we are very grateful for your hospitality. These many courtesies will remain as cherished memories for us in the years that lie ahead. We appreciate the fast friendships that have been formed. We welcome, too, our in-State guests. It has been a real pleasure to be in attendance at your respective Annual Sessions. The bonds of Masonic cooperation and the friendship that have existed here in Maine, over the years are truly a blessing to all of us. Strength lies in unity and a steadfast purpose. In Maine we have labored together as a Masonic family. I am very grateful to the Grand Commandery, Knights Templar, of Maine for the Color Guard that they have furnished here this morning. It has a particular significance to me as some of you are aware. Twelve years ago we brought the Annual Conclave to the Lewiston-Auburn area and it never occurred to me that there might be a second opportunity for me to do this. Thank you, Sir Knights.

A year ago, you, the Masons of Maine, elected me to the highest office that was in your power to bestow upon a brother. Having already served Grand Lodge as an elected or appointive officer for seven years and also having traveled extensively over our Grand Jurisdiction I was well aware of the responsibilities of this Office. For the first five months of my tenure of office, I was still employed, full-time, with the State of Maine, Department of Transportation, but had plans to retire from my position by October, so as to have more time to devote to the Grand Lodge of Maine. This year has been a challenging one in many respects and not without some concerns. One of these was that our Country became engaged in a war and we were not sure what its duration or side effects would be for our Nation or how it might affect our Fraternity.

There have also been the concerns of how Freemasonry in Maine will fare as we approach the end of this decade and the beginning of the 21st Century. There are many challenges before us and how well we adapt ourselves by use of some ingenuity, imagination, work and patience will determine the condition in which we will arrive at the year 2000. Some of the efforts of this year have been to maintain a continuity of plans to achieve certain goals which are considered to be greatly needed if the Craft is to survive in good condition.

NECROLOGY

We are well aware that many of our Brethern since we last met in Annual Communicatin have journeyed to that Great Beyond, crossing the bar to the Celestial Lodge above. Their departing leaves spaces in the chain of friendship that no one else can ever fill. They have passed the baton to us in this relay race of life, expecting us to carry on. We mourn the passing of so many of our Brethren, especially, M.W. Charles E. Crossland, Past Grand

Master, who left with us many memories of an outstanding career and an excellent exemplification of Freemasonry at its best for us to imitate.

CHARITABLE FOUNDATION

Our Charitable Foundation is being managed under the very capable administration of R. W. Stanley F. Sampson. The review of Applications for relief are made by him each week at the Grand Lodge Office. R. W. Sampson is doing an excellent job. We are indeed fortunate to have his devoted services.

DISTRICT MEETINGS

There were twenty-four District Meetings held this year. Again, the Districts were offered the opportunity to have the types of meetings to which they could invite non-members, such as prospective candidates or to which others such as family members could be present. There are several reasons for promoting more of the "open" meeting. First, we need to be more visible to other members of our communities. If we wish to interest prospective members we must give them some insight into the principles for which we stand and also an inside view of our base of operations, the Masonic Hall. An evening as a guest of the Fraternity at the Masonic Hall can do a lot for promoting our image as well as creating some interest in becoming one of us. The ladies surely will appreciate being our guests at dinner and to be entertained by a suitable program. After all, think of all the meals they have prepared for us, either at home or in the kitchen of the Masonic Hall.

Programs presented at the District Meetings have been varied and some of them showed that a lot of planning had been involved. Several of the meetings had well balanced programs that not only provided Masonic themes but also took the opportunity to give recognition to outstanding Brethren in the District, an effort that is always interesting and does much to promote unity among the Lodges. I have also encouraged the use of material available from the Committee on Masonic Education and Lodge Service. If this material were used by more of the Districts all of the membership would greatly benefit from it. I believe that a lot more effort needs to be expended here.

SCHOOLS OF INSTRUCTION

First of all, I would like to commend the Grand Lecturer and his staff of Assistants for the many miles they travel and the tireless efforts they have made to provide instruction in ritual as well as the general information on other Masonic subjects that are so very important. At times they must feel that their efforts go unrewarded when the attendance at an instructional session is small. On the District Deputies reports I have noticed that generally the Lodges with the poorest attendance at the schools are the same ones who turn in low performances, overall. The saddest part is that while the Grand Lecturer and his Assistants have even offered to help individual Lodges when they are having problems with ritual, there is little or no response to the offer for special assistance. Unfortunately, these difficulties are not confined to matters of ritual. There are many other areas of procedures and protocol where help is needed. I believe that we are going to need to restruc-

ture some of our methods of teaching our members.

MASONIC EDUCATION

In 1989, our Committee on Masonic Education had the task placed before them of focusing their attention on certain problems evident in many of our Lodges. Some of these are lack of attendance by members, decline in interest and officer participation. It was concluded by the Committee that many of the problems evident in Lodges, today, are at least partially due to the need of adequate leadership. Based on the conclusion that most Masters of Lodges really want to turn a good performance and to have a year in the East of their Lodge that they can look back to with a feeling of pride and accomplishment, the Committee set out to advise a plan whereby the newly installed Master through planning and goal setting has his year completely organized, and is ready, after his installation, because he laid the ground work for his them as Master of his Lodge while serving as a Warden. Each Lodge has been asked to complete an evaluation form to establish where they feel that they stand in regard to strengths and weaknesses. They have been asked to indicate in the various categories of operation where they feel they need little or no help and where they wish to work on some improvement. There are goals that may be chosen which are grouped as short, medium and long term. Lodges are encouraged to set those goals which they can completely achieve over the suggested time period, and not overburden themselves by trying to accomplish everything in a period of two to three years.

I believe that this Leadership Program for Masters and Wardens, and particularly Wardens because by the time one has become Master it is too late to make this program work well, has much merit. Complete immediate success is not expected, it will take time. Some Lodges may be reluctant to participate. At the rate that some things are slipping, now, it is safe to predict that a decade or two from now, the ones not interested in participating in this program may not survive the changes that our society is presenting to all of us.

This year I have implemented the Grand Master's Award to be presented to the District that has exhibited the outstanding achievement in putting to work at least part of the useful educational material that has been compiled by the Education Committee of our Grand Lodge over the past few years. In particular, it has been my desire to see the Instructor's Manual used by the Lodges on a District basis for the purpose of instructing their Candidates. All Districts should have a copy of this Manual, but apparently few use it. How much effort is put forth in properly using the "Pollard Plan"? Is this series of booklets merely presented to our Candidates without any follow-up instruction on its contents? How many Members and Officers read our "Maine Masonic Textbook" to get the proper information on procedures and protocol? Some Lodges do have excellent "Fourth Night" programs, but these may be a minority in number.

Lodges where advance planning is done to provide interesting meetings, where Candidates are properly instructed in the prescribed plan of education, and where the younger members are encouraged to take part so as to become the Leaders of their Lodges will enjoy success.

HOSPITAL VISITATION

Last October the Grand Lodge Officers and their ladies observed the Annual Visitation Sunday at the Veterans' Hospital in Togus. They were in attendance at both the Catholic and Protestant worship services at the chapel and at noon joined with our friends from the Knights of Columbus for a joint luncheon with speakers addressing the group who represented each of the organizations. After this observance was over, some of our Masonic group visited the Maine Veterans' Home. Wor. Brother Clyde A. Roth is to be commended for the work that he has put into the Visitation Program at Togus. There are now many more of our Brethren involved in the Sunday visitations because more of our Masonic Districts have been encouraged to participate. If each District will do its share, it will be much easier for everyone. We cannot stress too much what our visits mean to those who are patients at the hospital. Some may have few visitors and perhaps there are also those who have no family left who can call on them. A few minutes visit from some of us can brighten their day. Again, this year, a dispensation was issued to Augusta Lodge to hold a special communication for exemplification of the Master Mason Degree at the theater at Togus for the benefit of our Brothers who are patients at the Hospital. While I was unable to attend, this year, I had the opportunity to witness, last year, and know, first hand, how much it meant to the patients who cannot go to lodge. This was an excellent example of outreach, of caring. Wor. Brother Robert Philbrook is also to be commended for his work at the Maine Veterans' Home in Augusta on behalf of our Brothers who are there. I have been present on several occasions to meet these Brothers and to make membership presentations to them. Last fall at the time of the Meeting of the First District, I had the opportunity to visit the Veterans' Home at Caribou, to meet our Brother who is living there and also our Representative.

YOUTH ORGANIZATIONS

It is truly a pleasure to see so many of our young people of Maine active in the Order of Rainbow and of DeMolay. While we are aware that the membership increases are goals to strive for in both of these fine orders, it is truly impressive to realize that we have many fine young people who are busy in the right kind of activities in a world filled with temptations and wrong influences. It seems, these days, that the bad things that happen to our young folks are most often heard through the news media. There are many good things which they accomplish, that somehow do not get the public attention that they merit. Last May, my wife and I attended the Grand Rainbow Assembly in Orono, on the University of Maine campus. It was a wonderful experience to witness these talented young people as they conducted their meetings with so much enthusiasm, pride and poise. In November I was invited to attend the Annual Honors and Awards Night of the Order of DeMolay held at Auburn. There the Honorary Legion of Honor was conferred upon me. It was a night that I shall always remember. While I have not had the opportunity, this year, to support DeMolay by attending their meetings as often as I would have liked to, it has been a real pleasure to witness some of their work, where they have been invited to be a part of the program at our Masonic District Meetings. At such times, both DeMo-

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lay and Rainbow have demonstrated their capabilities in ritualistic work. We salute our young people. With the dedication for doing what is good and their proven abilities for accomplishing their goals, we are assured of their leadership as they become adults and inherit the management of a complex and troubled world.

NORTHEAST CONFERENCE

The Northeast Conference of Grand Masters, Deputy Grand Masters and Grand Secretaries was hosted by the Grand Lodge of Delaware, and held at New Castle on July 15-16, 1990. Having attended these conferences for the past three years, I feel that they are most worthwhile and they should be of assistance to everyone in the sharing of problems, opinions, problem solving and methods of improvement, as they affect many of our respective Jurisdictions one way or another. Some of the topics for discussion were: Masonic Public Relations Program; Solicitation or Advertising; Prince Hall Masonry; Compromising on Our Standards; Innovations in Candidate Instruction; and the Number of Black Cubes Required for Rejection. These are just a sampling of the topics covered and to which were contributed many comments on the experiences of others for the different Grand Jurisdictions, represented at the meeting.

CONFERENCE OF GRAND MASTERS OF NORTH AMERICA

This year the Conference of Grand Masters of North America was held at San Diego, California, on February 17-20, 1991. These meetings that are scheduled annually for the benefit of the Grand Masters, Deputy Grand Masters and Grand Secretaries, and for some jurisdictions the Grand Wardens have to me for the past three years been a most impressive event. The theme for this conference was "Freemasonry in North America, A Renewal Strategy for the 90's". There are serious concerns in all of the Grand Jurisdictions of North America as to just where the Fraternity will be situated as we enter the 21st Century. At the conference in the preceding years, we heard reports that gave many statistics as to what had happened to our organization, across the country in recent years, in regard to loss of membership. Fortified with the information from the previous sessions as to what had happened, the delegates were prepared to listen to the results of the study made by a consultant engaged for this purpose, who would define areas that needed to be improved to make the Fraternity a more viable institution in regard to the demands and expectation of our modern society.

There are many issues for consideration and a lengthy presentation of them would not be proper at this time, but it seems that a few of them which should be mentioned are community service and public awareness, a better understanding of Freemasonry by the rest of our communities, pride in membership, family involvement with an organization that preserves tradition and heritage, and an organization with appealing activity to which more non-members will be attracted. In Maine, Masonic Education has for a long time been considered an extremely important activity in order that other goals may be achieved. This effort will continue to be ongoing for the future. The Conference presentation indicated that there will be the need for changes in our methods of approach. The other consideration will be a

program that will help the leaders of our Lodges. We are fortunate, here, in that we are already underway in a Leadership Training Program that should provide the help needed to the Masters and Wardens of our constituent Lodges. I believe that the attendance at the Conference was worthwhile as it gave each of us an opportunity to share our plans and ideas.

DEDICATIONS

During the year the Grand Officers have been called upon to dedicate three new Masonic Temples. The first was at Bridgton in June, the second at Warren in September and the third in Norway during December. At Bridgton, the cornerstone laying ceremony was also enacted. One cannot help but be impressed with the careful planning that has gone into these beautiful new buildings. They have been designed to add something very impressive to the communities in which they are located. Much of the actual work has been done by the Members of the Lodges, themselves, and result in new quarters that are paid for. These visible examples of progress within these communities by their Masonic Lodges is bound to stimulate interest and attract candidates. Progress such as this also improves the image of the Fraternity.

NEW ENGLAND BROTHERHOOD NIGHT

The Annual New England Brotherhood Night was held this year on March 23rd at Brattleboro, Vermont. This was the tenth of such observances, and there were delegations from each of the New England Jurisdictions. There were four in attendance to represent the State of Maine, this year and our speaker was R. W. Royce G. Wheeler, Past Senior Grand Warden of the Grand Lodge of Maine and now Deputy for Maine of the Ancient Accepted Scottish Rite. Attendance, overall, was very good, considering that the best of weather for traveling was not prevalent in all areas. This event has always been a very enjoyable one for the informal exchanging of ideas, Masonic fellowship, breaking of bread together and receiving inspiration from a fine speaker. I think that it had promoted strength and unity among our New England Grand Lodges. Next year it will be Maine's turn to host this event.

GRAND LODGE NIGHT

Years ago when our Annual Communication of Grand Lodge was convened for a longer time than it has been in recent years, it was the custom of the Grand Lodge to invite a constituent Lodge whose ritualistic achievement for the year had been exemplary to work the Master Mason Degree before Grand Lodge, then assembled, under the supervision of the Grand Lecturer. In more recent years this custom had been discontinued because there was not enough time for the event. Four years ago it was revived by calling a Special Communication of Grand Lodge and having the selected outstanding Lodge exemplify the Work in the month before the Annual Communication. This year a Special Communication of Grand Lodge was held at Farmington on April 15th, since Maine Lodge No. 20 had been chosen for this honor. There was a fine attendance. The Grand Master presented a plaque to Maine Lodge in recognition of their efforts.

LODGE DIRECTORY AND LOCATION SIGNS

As a special project this year that I had hoped might benefit the Lodges, it was promised that maps be compiled showing the location for all of the Lodges in Maine. It was hoped that this would promote interest in visitations. Most of us have experienced the difficulty of locating the Masonic Hall in many of the communities. I requested that the District Deputies furnish a sketch type of map for the location of each Lodge in their respective Districts and forward them to me. I would like to thank them for their efforts. I would also like to thank the Grand Chapter of Maine, O.E.S. for offering use of the information contained in the directory that they had compiled some years ago. It is hoped that these maps will prove helpful.

At the Annual Communication, last May, a Committee was appointed to investigate the availability of suitable roadway signs that would help locate our Lodges. A sign manufacturer was located that had furnished signs for several other Grand Jurisdictions, and since several Lodges were interested in obtaining them a small supply was ordered. These can do much, when in place to promote public awareness, fraternal unity and pride in membership.

MASONIC HOME

During our travels during the past few years to District Meetings and other events, inquiry has been made of our Grand Officers as to the reason that Maine does not have a Masonic Home. Last May I appointed a committee to study the feasibility of establishing a home for our Brethren, their wives or widows, with the expectation that a medical type of facility would not be feasible, here, since the study made some thirty years ago concluded that such a project was not possible. I highly commend the Committee for the efforts that they have put into this assignment and hope that it will be appreciated by everyone. They have had several productive meetings, and later today will present their findings and conclusions to us.

CONSOLIDATION OF LODGES

During this year, two Lodges, Phoenix, No. 24, and Timothy Chase, No. 126, both of Belfast were consolidated in ceremonies held at the Masonic Temple in Belfast on January 14, 1991, to become Belfast Lodge No. 24. The newly elected Officers were installed by the Grand Master and several of his Grand Officers. The best of success is wished for this Lodge. It was a fine evening with an enjoyable banquet, fellowship and an outstanding attendance.

LODGES REQUESTING ASSISTANCE

There have been two Lodges requesting assistance from Grand Lodge this year in the form of advice and guidance that may somehow give them a plan for building participation and attendance in order that it will not be necessary for them to surrender their charters. At these meetings lengthy discussions were held and the members participated very well by providing valuable input regarding their problems of trying to keep their Lodge in operation. I feel that there is still optimism among those members and that with some help in programming and planning, use of our Speaker's Bureau and materials available from the Committee on Masonic Education and Lodge Service,

that the situations will become better.

GRAND OFFICERS' SEMINARS

After the close of Grand Lodge, last May, a luncheon was held for the new Grand Officers and this was followed by an instructional session for all District Deputies, Line Officers and District Representatives. It seemed important to take this opportunity when all could be present and outline to the Officers what was expected of them before they started out in their new capacities as Officers. In June a seminar was held at Augusta for Deputies and Representatives. The other officers were welcome, but not required to attend. The theme was the Lodge Development Program process. These included the Leadership and Goalsetting aspects for improvement and also the changing roles for the Deputies and the Senior Wardens of the Lodges.

In March of this year another seminar was held at Oakland for the purpose of instructing the District Deputies, present and future, and the Elective Grand Officers. There were several reasons for scheduling this meeting. One of them is that in order for our Lodge Leadership efforts to get started effectively, the team must be briefed on the plans for the program before Grand Lodge meets and the new officers are installed; otherwise it will be too late. Helping our Lodges to improve themselves through goal-setting in areas where they want improvement is the key to success in this changing society of today.

SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM

The Scholarship Program continues to be very successful. It is the goal that this year each of the 127 public high schools in Maine will receive at least one scholarship for a graduating student. The great amount of participation that has been exhibited by individual Lodges and District Master and Wardens Associations is truly an indication of the esteem in which the Masons of Maine regard their young people.

DRUG AND ALCOHOL ABUSE PROGRAM

The participation in the program adopted by the Masons of Maine is outstanding. Like the scholarship funding efforts, it demonstrates the fact that we put a great amount of faith in our young people in that they will be our future leaders. The efforts of Maine Masons in this project have proved an excellent means of creating public awareness concerning the purposes and meanings of Freemasonry. At the recent Grand Masters' Conference in San Diego, one of the Grand Masters inquired of me how Maine had managed to raise such a large sum of money to fund the Program. He wondered if it might have been accomplished through an assessment upon the membership. I was happy to inform him that this had been brought about by the generosity of voluntary contributions by the Masons of Maine.

I would like to report that the sale of the Masonic caps has done extremely well. It was only an idea which I had hoped might appeal to most of our membership. The response has been outstanding and has served as an identifier as well as a fund raiser.

VISITATIONS TO OTHER JURISDICTIONS

During this year, I have attended many of the Annual Communications of our Sister Jurisdictions. Where there was a conflict in my schedule, a representative was sent. I feel that it is very important to visit. It is a wonderful experience to establish many lasting friendships and so much of value can be learned by discovering how other jurisdictions conduct their business and approach the problems of our modern world. We are taught that what we see praiseworthy in others, we should imitate. The experience of other Grand Lodges can help us approach the many challenges of today, here at home.

COORDINATION COMMITTEE

This year we have continued to hold meetings of our Coordination or Liaison Committee. This Committee is formed of representatives from the Grand Lodge, the York and Scottish Bodies, and the two Shrine Temples. We are indebted to the two Shrine Temples for hosting these meetings. The Committee is endeavoring to set up a system of communication among the various groups that will help avoid conflicts of scheduling of events and to also promote Freemasonry in general within Maine. Much work still needs to be done to perfect the system of communication, but I feel that we are making headway. This effort is an excellent example of the harmony that exists in Maine among these various groups and our Grand Lodge.

RECOMMENDATIONS

I recommend that favorable action be taken for the continuation of the publication of three issues of the "Maine Mason" per year. This is an excellent means for communication among our membership across the some 33,000 square miles of our Grand Jurisdiction. Adequate communication has always been a problem, here. It is improving, but there is still much to be done to make it better.

It is my recommendation that the data published in the Annual Proceedings as taken from the District Deputies Inspections be presented so that it will more completely reflect the conditions of the Lodges. Several years ago a supplement to the original inspection form was adopted and put into use. The added information is very useful and it seems that it should be employed in establishing the overall ratings of our Lodges.

My third recommendation concerns the instructional sessions that we have arranged for our Lodges on an annual basis. It seems that the attendance at these Schools or Lodges of Instruction continues to fade. I highly commend our Grand Lecturer and his staff of Assistants for their devoted efforts to bring instruction to the Lodges and to offer to help them, even on the basis of individual Lodge instruction, if requested. This generous offer is seldom, if ever, accepted by a Lodge. Perhaps a qualified Ritual Instructor for every Lodge is the answer. I recommend that this possibility be investigated, and report made on the feasibility of such a system.

I recommend that those Lodges which have difficulties in properly conferring their degrees, establish a team among their own Members to assist the regular Officers so that the work will be portrayed in an accurate and impressive manner. It seems that the services of our several authorized Degree

Teams have accomplished much for the maintenance of quality work. It is noticeable that the Candidates are impressed and also that the Brethren will attend Lodge to witness really excellent Work. However, it seems that the services of these Teams should be reversed, perhaps, for more special occasions, that the Lodges may not be so dependent upon teams.

I recommend that a committee be appointed to study the desirability of eliminating the per diem payment to delegates to the Annual Communication of this Grand Lodge as set forth in Standing Regulation No. 1. While a change could be made at this Annual Communication, I feel that there may be sufficient arguments for and against such a change to merit ample consideration and not giving anyone the feeling that they have been suddenly surprised. Economic conditions within our State are such that elimination of the per diem payment will create, at least an inconvenience for the delegates, but on the other hand it might prove a positive move toward delaying a future per capita tax increase.

Last of all I recommend that a very serious approach be taken to the problem of loss of members through suspensions for non-payment of dues. How much work is actually being done by the Members of some of our Lodges to really contact the Members who have fallen behind in their payment of Annual Dues and are on the verge of being "dropped"? Visiting with these brothers who are falling behind in their payment may reveal that they have a need for our assistance. It is all too easy to vote to suspend a Brother for non-payment, simply because he did not respond to a letter sent to him. This should be the concern of the entire Lodge, not just that of the Secretary and perhaps the Master. I hope that we will put to work a program similar to that used by the Grand Lodge of Manitoba. I think it will be of benefit to us.

CONCLUSION

Brethren, in looking back over the year, just ended, I reflect on the many things that have happened. It has been an interesting year and a challenging one. There have been many good things and honors bestowed upon me that I shall never forget. The reception held for me by my Mother Lodge in Penacook, New Hampshire, Horace Chase, No. 72, was an evening that I shall always remember. The presentation of the Grand Lodge of New Hampshire's Sullivan Medal by M.W. Philip H. White was certainly a well kept surprise. It was also a great privilege to have been honored by my adopted Lodge in Auburn, Rabboni, No. 150, with a Table Lodge last Fall, and also the one held for me by Monument Lodge, No. 96, in Houlton. My ties with the First District go back a long way, even before I became a member of the Craft. Maine's changing of its Regulations a few years ago, allowed me to realize an ambition of a long time, that of becoming a dual member of my late uncle's lodge in Limestone. His influence through his interest and involvement with Masonry probably is more responsible than anyone's on my being a member.

To all of my Officers I extend thanks for their loyal support and the dedication that they have displayed to the duties of their offices. To the District Deputies, in particular, thanks to you for attending to assignments that were not always easy. To those of you who are retiring this year, please don't get too far away. We will still need your valuable assistance. To those who are

beginning another year and also those of you who are new to the job, we have a challenging task before us. To my line officers and District Representatives and to the Grand Lecturer and his Staff you have traveled many miles and have been faithful supporters of all of our District Meetings, Dedications, Programs and any project that was needing to be done.

My thanks go also to our Grand Treasurer, Grand Secretary and the Office Staff for their help on many occasions. Grateful acknowledgement is also given to our Past Grand Masters for their advice and assistance. I thank each of you, my Brethren, for the great support that you have given to me. It has truly been a privilege to work with you.

I have kept no account of the actual miles that I have traveled, but I have attended some 180 meetings with Masonic connections. It has been a busy and challenging year. I expect that the year to follow will be even more so, and I shall look forward to it. Let us remember that old saying which goes something like this: "Give to the world the best you have and the best will come back to you." Thank you Brethren for the opportunity which you have given to me.

REPORT OF THE GRAND LECTURER

Buckfield, Maine

April 1, 1991

To the Most Worshipful Grand Master, Officers and Brethren of The Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine:

Another year of ritual instruction has come and gone. Again this year, we have tried some new ideas in an attempt to improve attendance at ritual instruction. The new program gave each lodge officer a point value based upon the involvement in the ritual degree work. Point values were also assigned to other ritual participants as to their involvement. At the end of the year the totals were averaged together for the best average attendance within the district. The averages of each district were then totaled to determine the best district average. This district will be recognized with a special award. The lodge in each district with the highest attendance average will also be recognized.

This year the individual education supporter certificate program was not used. During the past few years it seemed that many of those who attended ritual instruction indicated that they were not interested in receiving another certificate. This assumption was wrong. Many attending ritual instruction this year were disappointed that the program had been dropped. I am happy to say that in the upcoming ritual instruction year the program will again be in place, along with the attendance program.

Again this year overall attendance at schools for ritual instruction was down from the previous year. The number of lodges with no participation at any of these schools was an improvement over last year. This year six lodges fell into this category: Oriental Star #21, Rockland #79, Temple #86, Marsh River #102, Olive Branch #124, Mount Abram #204.

There were seven lodges that were represented at only one ritual school by one officer: St. George #16, Unity #58, Vernon Valley #99, Seaside #144, Bingham #199, Abner Wade #207, Ralph S. Pollard #217.

One lodge was represented by only one at two schools: Corner Stone #216.

Two lodges were represented at one school by only two officers: York #22, Freedom #42.

V. W. Kenneth R. Gardner put together a survey that will give us much valuable information concerning those who attend the ritual instruction. This questionnaire was circulated during the last round of instruction. We are presently tabulating the results and plan to use the results in scheduling next year's instruction.

During the past year there were nine degree teams authorized to work. As always these teams do excellent work and are a credit to the fraternity. I have asked each of the Team Masters to give me a written report of the ritual work they have conferred this year. At the writing of this report I have not yet received all of these reports. Some of these teams have been quite active and some have not.

Notification of the ritual schools still appears to be a problem. The notification letter that has been used for the past two years still meets with opposition. This subject is presently being discussed with the Grand Master and a resolution reached before the new instruction year starts. I cannot emphasize how much of this responsibility belongs to the District Deputy Grand Masters and to the individual Lodge Masters. If this information is not passed through the chain of command and all officers encouraged to attend then we will continue to fall short. Let us try for the highest possible officer attendance at our ritual instruction during the new year. Each district has an equal chance, (regardless of number of lodges), at having the highest percentage officer participation which is the criteria for the Grand Lecturer Award.

At the close of this Masonic year, two of our Assistant Grand Lecturers will be retiring. R.W. Charles S. Partridge will have completed seven years and V. W. Kenneth R. Gardner steps down after completing three years. Both of these very capable brothers will be missed but I am sure they will continue to serve as active Masons.

In closing, I hope that our newest survey will give us a better idea what the craft needs from us as lecturers to make the ritual instruction more appealing. The officers of the subordinate lodges must have the desire to receive instruction before we are able to impart it to them.

REPORT OF THE GRAND SECRETARY - 1991

In Grand Lodge
Lewiston, Maine
May 7, 1991

To the Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine:

If there were ever a time when being a Mason was necessary, it is now. Last year I spoke to you as your Grand Master and told you that we are on the edge and can go in either direction. We can allow Masonry to become less active, or we can become more involved in our lodges, create activity, and begin to build again. You chose the latter, and this year as your Grand Secretary I have been delighted to see the lodge activities increase to the point where we have mailed to lodge secretaries many M.M. diplomas. I have had calls from the brethren as well as the officers of the lodges to discuss different ideas and special events you want for your lodges. The Grand Master has granted many dispensations for special programs. And it goes on. As you can see, my first year as Grand Secretary has been a very busy and interesting one. With all that activity going on, it has also been an education.

This past year we have updated much of our office equipment. Changes have been made to improve on the efficiency of the office space. Next month, all the Masonic memorabilia which is in the show cases, along with the other Masonic gifts, will be moved into the room adjacent to the elevators. That room has been cleaned up, painted and will be our Masonic Museum. This will allow us to display our numerous gifts in an attractive manner so they can be viewed by you and anyone who comes to the Grand Lodge office.

Worshipful David Ryan, a Past Master from Warren Phillips Lodge in Westbrook, has used his expertise as an IBM programmer to clean up, to rearrange, to add menus that we need, and to delete menus that we don't need. This makes the computer usage more efficient. In addition to this, the office secretaries and I have been trained to run the computer. There is still much that I need to learn, but the important thing is that the office secretaries can now respond to your requests much quicker. I also realize that we are not 100% as yet, and we may never be; however, we will strive to give you the best service we can possibly give you whenever you need anything.

Don Wilder, our volunteer librarian, has done an excellent job of cataloguing books, pamphlets, and articles so they are readily accessible to those of you who need information for speeches, discussions, or brief talks for your lodges. I am delighted that I am able to simply go to Brother Don when any of the brethren ask for library materials. I also urge you to stop into the library when you are in the building. You will find it is very professionally arranged.

Thus far, I've reported on our accomplishments, and now I want to give you some of the goals I have for the Masonic year that faces us. Since this year was my year of indoctrination, I trust that the coming year will be

much easier for me, so I have set some goals which we need to achieve. You notice I said **WE** because I can't do it without your support and cooperation.

My first goal is to eliminate as many of the glitches as I can with the thought of improving the efficiency of the Grand Secretary's office. The first one is to attempt to make it possible to have the lodge secretaries' Annual Returns in on time. I can sit at my desk in the office and say that there is no reason for the kinds of delays that occur, but I do want you to know that I understand that those delays are not intentional. Nevertheless, transcribing the information from the Annual Returns to our office records is a very tedious and time consuming task.

Still, I must commend the lodge secretaries for doing a much better job in getting those reports in on time this year. With your cooperation I hope to get all the Annual Reports in by their due date which is the first day of February. There is no doubt in my mind that, together, we can accomplish this objective.

I also know there are many new secretaries on the job and they need help. This year each lodge secretary will get a copy of the revised Secretary's Manual which will be distributed at the Secretaries' Seminar's. My plan now is to hold three seminars this year in Bangor, Augusta, and Portland respectively. For those secretaries who cannot attend any of those on the dates that will be established, I expect they will be able to meet with me in the morning session of the Grand Master's school for officers. All information concerning time, place and date will be forthcoming; and I expect that when all seminars are done, we can say we had 100% attendance. That is another one of my goals.

Brother secretaries, and for those who are not here, I would appreciate the lodge officers giving them this information, you are the thread of continuity in your lodges. You are the right hand man of the Worshipful. He is the head and you are the heart which keeps your lodge going year after year. Sometimes there are interruptions and the lodge gets bogged down until the new secretary can orient himself to the job. Nobody knows how much you do. You alone know that. Sometime you get discouraged and wonder why you bother. Sometimes you feel you are unappreciated and wonder why you bother, and sometimes you feel you are taken for granted. It's like anything else in life, my Brothers. You've taken on an overwhelming job and you may ask yourself why, but I know that you do that job daily and are determined to do it right and well because that's your nature. How do I know that? -- from the many phone calls I get to ask whether or not you are handling everything correctly. Every day gives us a new learning experience. That's the nature of our fraternity.

Now, I feel it is imperative for me to thank the people who helped me, guided me, and showed me the way to get this job of Grand Secretary done. To R.W. Bruce Tomquist and to the office secretaries, thank you very, very much for your guidance, help, and good humor. What a great team. All you made my job easier.

Let me close with the words from a man who was not a Mason but believed in the high ideals of our beloved fraternity when he said, "With malice toward none, with charity for all; with firmness in the right, as God gives us

to see the right, let us strive on...to care for him who shall have borne the battle, and for his widow, and his orphan..." These words are taken from President Lincoln's Second Inaugural Address. No, he wasn't a Mason, but he believed in the ideals our fraternity was founded on.

Rember those words by President Lincoln; live by them, and they will encourage you to do the job and do it well because there is no doubt that you are and will always be proud to be a Mason

DEMOLAY IN MAINE REPORT

To The Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine:

It is a pleasure to make this report to the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine and I certainly thank you for your continued support of Maine DeMolay.

I am very excited about some of the new programs and activities of DeMolay.

I have just returned last week from St. Louis where I attended and took part in the 71st Annual Session of the International Supreme Council of the Order of DeMolay. I have returned to my Jurisdiction with a renewed enthusiasm for the greatest youth organization in the world for young men between the ages of 13 and 21.

I am happy and excited to tell you that DeMolay International has released a new theme for the next two years. A theme that can be embraced by each of our DeMolay Chapters and Jurisdictions. It is "ACCEPT THE CHALLENGE". After I outline some of the things that DeMolay International has done and are currently working on to help us in our Jurisdictions and Chapters, I am sure you will agree that DeMolay is "Accepting the Challenge".

The Leadership Training Conference program trained over 400 young men this past summer throughout the nation on how to be better chapter leaders, learning such skills as how to work with people, time management, managing finances and on and on and on. And they had fun while doing it. Maine DeMolay sent 19 young men to the Leadership Training Conference in New Hampshire. We are having the Leadership Training Conference right here in Maine this year at the State Y.M.C.A. Camp in Winthrop from Sunday, August 25th through Saturday, August 31st. We are very excited about having it in Maine this year and hope to be able to send 40 - 50 young men. This is a great training program and is the week of a lifetime and, this year, it will be known as DeMolay 2000 Conference.

A new adult recruitment program to assist our DeMolay Chapters in recruiting valuable adult leaders has been developed and we are updating our Membership Retention program to keep our young people active.

As a result of a \$10,000. grant from the Illinois DeMolay Foundation, a video was produced and released to our chapters talking to our young people about "Taking Control" of their time at a time when they must resist the temptations of drugs and alcohol. The film is very generic and is being shared with other youth groups, churches, schools and even police departments. A copy of this video has been sent to each of our Chapters in Maine and we have several extra copies. In the event that your lodge would like to share it with the school or churches in your town, please let me know and I'll be glad to send you a copy.

Our International Alumni Association now has over 5,000 members who

receive regular editions of a special newsletter designed specifically for alumni members. I have just appointed a new Director of Alumni Affairs in John Knox, a past State Master Councilor in 1968 and Past Master of Saco Lodge No. 9. Brother John is in the process of locating Senior DeMolays throughout the state of Maine to organize a Maine DeMolay Alumni Association and wants as many Senior DeMolays as possible. It is hoped to have a reunion of Senior DeMolays soon, so if you are a Senior DeMolay or know of someone who is, please let us know. The DeMolay International Hall of Fame has such Senior DeMolays as: Governor Bill Clinton of Arkansas, Olympian Bob Mathias, College Football Coach Tom Osborne, and Astronauts Frank Borman and Vance Brand. All of these testify that their success is directly attributed to their involvement in DeMolay.

DeMolay International has also just recently developed a new video patterned after the Harvard Business School's famous "Seven Steps to Selling" to teach our members proper recruitment skills and techniques. A dynamite sales tool. A copy of this video will also be sent to each chapter in Maine shortly.

You will be pleased to know that the adult volunteer screening process has been implemented at all levels of the DeMolay organization to insure that our young men are safe and secure in the DeMolay environment. Additionally, this new process better protects our adult volunteers, sponsors, and lodges from potential liabilities. We have not had a problem in this area, as yet, in Maine, but you never know when you might and it is comforting to know that we have the protection.

DeMolay International has also just produced two new video tapes, one on Chapter Management & Administration and the second on Chapter Program Planning. These are two basic, but most important training tools to develop a successful DeMolay Chapter. All of these tapes and several new and up-to-date brochures are being made available to our local DeMolay Chapters.

While attending the recent Supreme Council Session in St. Louis, several very important Statute changes were approved, which also is exciting. Men who are not Masons or Senior DeMolays, who have been recommended by a sponsoring organization and who have been interviewed by the Executive Officer or his representative and who has successfully completed the DeMolay Advisor Development Training Program, may be appointed as members of an Advisory Council by the Executive Officer. Such Advisors may not act in the capacity of chairman or chapter advisors. Such Advisors shall take an oath of secrecy prescribed by the Supreme Council. Such Advisors may visit tiled Chapter meetings and attend functions only within the Jurisdiction of Executive Officers permitting such Advisors.

The father, mother, stepfather, stepmother and legal guardians of a candidate for degrees may, after giving an oath not to reveal the secrets of DeMolay, witness the degrees of that candidate.

Advisors must have successfully completed the DeMolay worker training program to be eligible for reappointment effective with the Advisory Council Certification for calendar year 1993.

These are some important and exciting changes that Supreme Council have made and I am confident that they will help DeMolay throughout this

entire nation to grow. There were 9% more new DeMolays initiated in 1990 than in 1989, so DeMolay has turned the corner. We are GROWING AGAIN.

We have re-activated two chapters in Maine, so far, this year and have several areas interested in starting new chapters. At the rate our membership drive is going, we will bring in more new members in 1991 than in 1990 and we will have a new increase in membership in Maine DeMolay in 1991. Gentlemen, DeMolay has come alive again.

We heard an inspiring speech last night at the banquet about stopping the decline in membership in Masonry, and where we should start. Well, brethren, I suggest we start with DeMolay.

We are growing again and over 50% of all DeMolays become active Masons. And if you have ever witnessed any ritual work done by these young men of DeMolay, you will know that if you will work to help DeMolay grow, Masonry will start growing again. SO GET BEHIND DEMOLAY -- DON'T SIT BACK AND WATCH -- DIG IN AND HELP US AND YOU WILL SEE MASONRY COME ALIVE AND START TO GROW! ACCEPT THE CHALLENGE!!

I want to conclude this report with a poem by Abraham Lincoln and used by our Junior Past Grand Master of DeMolay, Edward C. Bieser several times. It is titled -- YOUTH, TOMORROW'S HOPE...

" He is going to sit where we are sitting and when we are gone, attend to those things he thinks are important. We may adopt all the policies we please; but how they are carried out depends on him. He will assume control of our cities, states and nations. He is going to move in and take over our churches, schools universities and corporations. All our books are going to be judged, praised or condemned by him. The fate of humanity is in his hands."

My Brothers, our lodges and Grand Lodges are also going to be taken over by the youth of today. Then let's train them and make more better leaders of tomorrow by working with DeMolay.

My brothers, leaders of Masonry, as long as there is DeMolay, the fate of humanity as well as the future of Freemasonry, is in capable hands.

ANNOUNCEMENTS

The Grand Master announced the time had come for refreshment. There was a reserved section for the Guests and the Grand Lodge Officers, and there would be a meeting of the Maine District Deputies Association during the lunch break.

The Grand Lodge was then called from Labor to Refreshment until 1:30 P.M., closing prayer was offered by Grand Chaplain Lawrence W. Hathorne.

DAY ONE P.M. SESSION

At 1:30 P.M. M.W. Ernest H. Curtis, chairman of the drug and alcohol Abuse Prevention Program Among Children introduced the newly elected President of D.A.R.E. for the state of Maine, Joel Merry.

"Thank you, Thank you for the invitation to speak on behalf of the Maine D.A.R.E. Officers Association.

It is with great respect that I stand here before this gathering of Masons. I'm deeply honored. The Maine Foundation for the Prevention of Drug and Alcohol Abuse Among Children has played a key role in the work of the D.A.R.E. Program in the State of Maine. As the newly elected President of the Maine D.A.R.E. Officers Association, this is my first opportunity to speak at such an engagement, and I must say that I am overwhelmed, entirely overwhelmed. I'm a bit nervous if you haven't already guessed.

"It brings to mind a story I want to share with you about a Commissioner, a former commissioner of a metropolitan police department when he was addressing an association of chiefs of police. He spoke of an entrance exam that they give to new members, new officers. The question on this entrance exam. 'You are on patrol when an explosion occurs on the next street. Upon investigating you find a large hole and an overturned van laying nearby. Inside the van is the strong smell of alcohol. both occupants, a man and a woman are injured. They know that the man is unlicensed to drive. The passenger in the vehicle you recognize as being the wife of your captain. A motorist stops to offer his assistance. You recognize him as being a felon, wanted for armed robbery. Suddenly, another man runs out of a house nearby shouting that his wife is pregnant and the explosion has brought the birth imminent. At this moment you hear someone crying for help, and you see a man having been blown in the adjacent canal by the explosion and he cannot swim.'

Describe in a few words what you would do.' The former commissioner said that one of his bright young, astute recruits pondered this question for a moment. He picked up his pen and he wrote down on a piece of paper, 'remove uniform and mingle with crowd.'

"I can kind of relate to that. I kind of wish I could remove this uniform and go down and mingle with you, but so be it. Here I am.

"I'm here to tell you a little bit about the D.A.R.E. Program. Traditional drug awareness programs in Maine as well as throughout the United States have lacked in everlasting effectiveness on our children. One student recently told me that those one day programs just don't work. He said it goes in one ear and out the other. They give you a pin or a ribbon, big deal! so what?

"Well, as a law enforcer, the supply of drugs into this country is STAGGERING. We hear about it on the six-thirty news almost continuously. The more we seize, the more they import. It doesn't take a genius to figure out that the most effective way to combat this war on drugs is to decrease or cut the demand for illicit drugs. Thus was the advent of D.A.R.E. in 1983 - the Los Angeles Police Department and the Los Angeles unified school district got together and created a pilot program called 'Drug Abuse Resistant

Education. It was a joint effort, a marriage between educators and law enforcement. It took the best of law enforcement and educational practices that are proven and successful. Since 1983 D.A.R.E. has spread across the United States being taught in all fifty states. It is currently being taught in four foreign countries.

D.A.R.E. is strong and thriving in the State of Maine. The first police officer trained in D.A.R.E. in 1987. In 1988 a group of training mentors from the Los Angeles Police Department came to Maine and instructed a group of 40 D.A.R.E. officers; I was one of them. At this time there are more than 100 D.A.R.E. Officers teaching in schools throughout the State of Maine.

"You might ask, "What is D.A.R.E.? It's a seventeen week course taught to fifth and sixth graders, in classes running approximately one hour each. D.A.R.E. is a pro-active program. Through this course students are taught the development of certain life skills. Skills that are going to be useful to them as they proceed on to Junior High School. Some of these life skills include ways to say 'NO,' being assertive, decision making and risk taking. Forming support groups. Understanding and dealing with stress. Besides these topics, students are given up-to-date information about drugs and their effects. Each D.A.R.E. program ends with a culmination exercise. These are sometime very exciting for the children. It brings everything together. Oftentime, it leaves children with a very emotional high.

"The D.A.R.E. program does cost. Departments have to supply the manpower to run the program. This means oftentime taking a man out of his patrol. It might even mean using one of their detectives. In rural communities it is sometimes difficult. Sometimes services have to be cut back in order to free up manpower. However, this has proved to be more positive than a problem. Materials for the program do cost. Each student is provided with a workbook from which students are taught. There are films which the officer may wish to show, and many officers use handouts throughout the program, such as pens and pencils, erasers, stickers. These little trinkets mean a lot to a young child who may not receive anything else, may not receive any recognition. At the culmination of the program each child receives a T-Shirt, a special D.A.R.E. T-shirt that he can take pride in wearing.

"The D.A.R.E. program has been supported by many funds. D.A.R.E. Officers throughout the state have scratched for funds to run their programs. Officers try to keep their programs away from tax dollars. They are afraid they might be subject to budget cuts that we hear about almost daily. Many of the programs have been lucky to receive funds from various sources; drug free schools money. forfeitures in many drug cases, fund raisers, private donations.

"One of the largest supporters of the D.A.R.E. program has been the Masonic Foundation for the Prevention of Drug and Alcohol Abuse Among Children. To date over the past two years, the foundation has funded over \$16,700.00 to D.A.R.E. Programs throughout the State of Maine. The Maine Masons are true friends of the project D.A.R.E. No other single charity in this state has given to D.A.R.E. what the Masons have. So as I stated when I first began, I stand here honored in front of you people, and I thank you for your support that you have given this worthwhile program.

It is encouraging to us who teach this program to know that we have support from such a prestigious organization that funds this program. The future of D.A.R.E. is well taken care of. I am glad to tell you that this program is here today and here tomorrow. Thank you for your support."

The Grand Master thanked Officer Merry for his presentation and called the Grand Lodge from refreshment to labor. R. W. Clovis Frame offered the prayer for the afternoon session.

REPORT OF THE FEASIBILITY STUDY COMMITTEE FOR A MASONIC HOME

In Grand Lodge
Lewiston, Maine
May 7, 1991

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine:

The first meeting of the Committee for the Feasibility Study for a Masonic Home was held on Sunday, June 24th. There were seven of the nine members present, and as the Ladies were invited there were five in attendance who contributed a great amount of information to our discussions.

The first meeting was concerned primarily with considerations for some type of a Nursing Home. After lengthy discussions, we divided ourselves into groups to investigate such pertinent facts as location, need, demographics, and regulatory requirements, and to report our findings at our next meeting which was scheduled for October 14th.

At the second meeting we greeted a new member to our Committee, Donald Page of Bath, who had much experience and expertise in the type of project on which we were working. At the opening of the meeting we were informed by one group that due to regulatory requirements a Nursing Home was totally out of the question. That required us to about-face and go off on a different tangent.

It was at this point that it was brought out that maybe we should be looking at a "Masonic Independent Living Facility", where Brethren, Spouses/Widows could retire. We followed this concept exploring its possibilities and decided that instead of one, maybe four should be built: North, South, East and West.

We closed scheduling our next meeting on January 13th, at which time we would present a conceptual floor plan, type of facility, facility layout, and presentation and publicity to the Brethren.

The January meeting was a continuation of the October one, with greater elaboration and more detailed discussion. We decided that the Grand Lodge Report should be uncomplicated, concise, with full explanations. It was also decided that the Grand Lodge Report should be divided into three sections to be developed and presented by a different member. We closed, scheduling a meeting for February 24th, at which time we would correlate and finalize our report.

At the opening of the meeting on the 24th Donald Page presented a plan for a new type of facility which was all ready in operation in Bath, and working well. This concept was a series of duplex buildings built in pleasant surroundings. It would not be funded by Grand Lodge or the Brethren, but after its completion any Brother or Widow could buy into it. It was a long and well-planned presentation. After long and involved discussions it was unanimously agreed that this was the avenue we should pursue, and we closed agreeing that this was the concept to present to Grand Lodge.

DISTRIBUTION OF THE CHARITY FUND

R.W. Stanley F. Sampson, for the Committee on Distribution of the Charity Fund, presented the following report, which was accepted.

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine:

Once again the trustees of the Grand Lodge Charity Fund are pleased to report contributions to our brethren and their families in the amount of \$118,399.79. This represents an increase of \$10,000.00 over the amount distributed in the previous year. Of the 53 cases that were approved, 5 were repeat applications and these were granted by the committee after careful scrutiny of the applications and a decision that further assistance was warranted.

The relief fund also paid \$255.50 to seven lodges for dues of members who are veterans needing financial help. This is done only when the lodge feels that they do not have sufficient funds of their own to remit these dues.

In a case where we have been helping a lady confined to a nursing home for several years it is with regret that I sadly report that this lady has passed on. She was a delightful lady who I visited many times and I will miss calling on her. Again this year our Charity Foundation has made the following contributions that are Masonic related.

\$ 3,000.00	to the DeMolay & Pine Tree Youth Foundation
\$24,000.00	to the Grand Lodge Scholarship Program
\$ 5,000.00	to the Program for the Prevention of Drug and Alcohol Abuse
\$ 1,819.44	dues to the Masonic Service Association
\$ 7,500.00	to the M.S.A. for the Hospital Visitation Program.

As Section 62 of the Grand Lodge Constitution now permits the committee to make other contributions as they deem appropriate, we made a grant of \$1,000.00 to the Salvation Army. Also again this year, your committee approved a grant of \$500.00 to a young lady who is considered legally blind so that she may continue her education at the University of Maine. She does have a Masonic affiliation through her grandfather and carries a 3.993 grade point average. This amount is included in the \$118,000.00 noted above.

We had one case this year that involved a daughter of one of our members who lives out of state that we tabled as we did not have sufficient information to make a determination. In addition, two other applications were received and, after careful consideration, no assistance was given based upon the facts of the case.

Let me remind you again that upon receipt of a request for assistance it is important that someone from the lodge help fill out the application making sure that all questions are answered and all statements are verified whenever possible.

My thanks to those secretaries, masters and District Deputy Grand Masters who take the time to send additional information which certainly helps in making a decision in cases that are difficult to assess.

The committee gladly acknowledges contributions to our relief fund from the following appendant Masonic bodies

REPORT ON FRATERNAL RELATIONS

In Grand Lodge
Lewiston, Maine
May 7, 1991

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine:

We submit herewith our annual report on Fraternal Relations, consisting of a forward and special reports:

FORWARD

Throughout the Northern hemisphere of our world there are signs of Spring in the air. The depressions of the cold dark days of Winter have passed and there are signs of new life all around us.

This is as it should be, and it reminds us that there is a cyclical response in all of nature.

In surveying the Masonic activities and happenings in all of the world, we observe this cyclical happening as well. This is really a good thing, as just as much as too much candy would be bad for a child, and too much good weather would be bad for us, too much prosperity in our beloved fraternity would be harmful as well.

During the past few years we have heard from all of the soothsayers and gloom merchants that Freemasonry is not only in a period of decline, but many actually go on record by predicting the date that will see our complete demise. I have always been an optimist, believing always that the cup is half full, and not half empty, and have on many occasions gone on record against such pessimistic predictions.

It is good, therefore, to find that throughout the world there are many signs of renewed activity. Much of this can be attributed to the end of the cold war, and the new spirit of glasnost in the world. Although most of the Grand Lodges in this country have suffered decreases in membership in the past twenty years, we are still fortunate compared to the experiences of many countries on other continents. The company of Adolph Hitler and his Nazi regime meant that Freemasonry went underground. The continued suppression of freedom in many parts of the world was also detrimental to the craft.

Now just as with the coming of the signs of the awakening of nature with the return of Spring, we are beginning to see the dormant sparks of Freemasonry fanned into renewed activity in many areas.

After 39 years of Masonic darkness in Czechoslovakia, we hear that The Grand Lodge of Czechoslovakia resumed activity last November.

The Grand Lodge of Hungary was dissolved in 1950, after a long history going back to 1870. This long standing Grand Lodge resumed activity in December of 1989.

Masonry in Yugoslavia, originally known as The Grand Lodge of Serbs, Croats and Slovenes dating from 1763 dissolved in 1940, as a direct result of

the Nazi occupation. Even here we are pleased to report the reawakening process is once again at work. The invitation by the Founding Committee of the Grand Lodge of Yugoslavia dated May 4, 1990, recites that the regulations of the Grand Lodge of Free and Accepted Masons of Germany have been adopted and that the new Grand Lodge would be composed of three lodges.

To my knowledge there has been no action taken in the other Iron Curtain countries such as Poland and Romania. I have been told, however, that some work has been done for the revival of Masonry in both of these countries.

These are thrilling days, and we can only hope that this trend will finally be seen in this country, and that each year from now on we will be able to report that more and more of our own Grand Lodges are showing an increase in membership.

SPECIAL REPORTS

There have been no requests for recognition this year.

PRINCE HALL

Two years ago at the end of the Report on Fraternal Relations, I was asked to comment on the subject of Prince Hall, which I did. Apparently this satisfied the questioner, but last year the subject came up again. Rather than take a lot of time to discuss the matter further, I agreed to do some research on the subject and report back this year. I have spent a lot of time reading and talking with informed brethren, and hope the following is satisfactory.

When I came to Portland in 1944 there was a Prince Hall Lodge in Portland, and apparently many more throughout the State. Today there are only two such Lodges in the State, and my informants tell me that there is very little activity in these.

Whenever this subject is discussed, there is always more heat than light generated. Perhaps a short history of the subject is in order.

There is a multitude of books on this subject, but in the opinion of this reviewer, the one by Henry Wilson Coil and John MacDuffie Sherman entitled "A Documentary Account of Prince Hall and other Black Fraternal Orders" is the most complete and easiest to understand. In the introduction to his book he states, "This is a difficult subject to analyze because of the many facets that must be considered. The matter is complicated by the large amount of misinformation that has been disseminated over the years by advocates of both sides. The question of legitimacy of the Prince Hall Organization has come up many times, and almost always has been declared as illegitimate. Many Grand Lodges in this country have wrestled with it recently with varying results."

Leaders of the Prince Hall Organization sometime state that the group is not recognized as being legitimate solely because of race prejudice. There is no "Color Line" in Masonry! There has never been a law of Freemasonry stating that white skin is a qualification for membership. The opposite is true as a basic law of the Craft, and many of the Grand Lodges have this written into their By-Laws.

Let us take a look at the historical facts. African Lodge was warranted by the Grand Lodge of England in 1784, and was numbered 459. The fee for the warrant was not paid until 1787. Records show four payments to the Grand Lodge of England Charity Fund, the last in 1797. After 16 years of default, the Lodge was stricken from the rolls in 1813.

In 1827 African Lodge declared its freedom and independence of all other Grand Lodges. This was a surrender of whatever charter it had. In 1847 African Lodge surrendered whatever charter it may have had to the so-called "National" or "National Comfort" Grand Lodge of that year and from it received a new Charter dated November 11, 1847, under the title of "Prince Hall Grand Lodge of Free and Accepted Masons of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts." In 1876 the Grand Lodge of Massachusetts confirmed that the Prince Hall bodies were clandestine.

To date I can find no evidence of when the first Prince Hall Lodge was formed in Maine. One thing is clear, however. Just as the earliest legitimate Lodges in Maine were chartered by The Grand Lodge of Massachusetts, so were all of the Prince Hall Lodges chartered by the Prince Hall Grand Lodge of Massachusetts. There has never been a Prince Hall Grand Lodge in Maine. As a matter of fact, only 36 states do have such a body.

The material which I have presented is for your information only. Anyone having a deep interest in this subject is referred to the book mentioned earlier, and or any of the other books listed in the bibliography. One thing seems clear to me. There is no need for any action by this Grand Lodge.

At the conclusion of the Finance Committee Report M.W. M. Donald Gardner asked for questions from the brethren. There being none, he went on to the item concerning *The Maine Mason*: M. W. Gardner stated that along with the Finance Committee Report all lodges received an addendum that stated "That the \$.50 assessment levied the past year for the publication and distribution of *The Maine Mason* was insufficient to support three issues: Therefore, the number of the issues was reduced to two. It was still necessary to subsidize *The Maine Mason* from the General Fund. The *Maine Mason* assessment produced \$16,000.00 in round figures. The cost of the two issues was \$20,000.00. Now, it's stated right here and you all had it in March. The Brethren must decide at the next annual communication whether or not to increase the Annual Assessment to support *The Maine Mason*. An increase to \$.75 will be adequate to pay for two issues this year. An increase to a dollar will enable the Grand Lodge to publish three issues a year.'

This is an issue the brethren must decide and it's not up to the finance committee to make this judgement. First, M.W. Grand Master, I hear no objections, I move that the proposed budget for receipts and appropriations for the ensuing year be accepted.

The motion was seconded and there being none opposed, the motion was carried.

"Most Worshipful Grand Master, I would like to have the brethren make a decision on whether or not they wish two issues or three issues and if they have three issues, whether or not they're going to go for an assessment. I am ready to make whatever motion seems appropriate on the occasion."

A motion was made and seconded that we provide three issues. There being no discussion, the vote was carried.

After some discussion about the topic of the number of issues and the assessment, M.W. M. Donald Gardner stated, "M.W. Grand Master, if I may intercede. The motion, as I understand it, was that the brethren do support the issuance of three *Maine Masons*."

Gr. Master: "That's correct."

M.W. Gardner: In the accompanying report with the Finance Committee Report it said that in order to achieve that result, it was necessary to increase the assessment to \$1.00. M.W. Grand Master, I move that an assessment of \$.50 a member be assessed upon the several Lodges in this jurisdiction to be due and payable with the annual dues to the Grand Lodge January 1, 1992."

The Motion was seconded and some discussion followed which suggested ways that *The Maine Mason* might be published in different format and distributed through the lodges instead of to the individual members. Following the responses to the suggestions and suggestions, the question was moved.

The motion was carried.

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine:

In it's fourth year of fund raising, the Foundation has been very successful. In our direct appeal to the membership, more than 10,000 Brethren have donated over \$90,000.00. The challenge made by R.W. Royce G. Wheeler to the Past District Deputies last year stirred up a lot of fund raising activity in several Districts. We are indebted to those Brethren and affiliated organizations who have contributed to the Foundation.

Undetermined amounts of money have been received from other organizations. We sincerely appreciate all gifts large and small, however we do acknowledge the special gifts from those Brethren near and afar who have supported this program so enthusiastically.

We are continuing the Grant Program to schools across the State. We are in process of receiving applications for grants to be awarded during the school year of September 1, 1991 to June 30, 1992. We have sponsored several "Refusal Skill Workshops" for Teachers again this year. We have sponsored 2 "Training of Trainers" workshops. At these workshops we hire a Certified Instructor to conduct a 2 or 3 day workshop to train teachers to be able to go back to their school district to train other teachers who in turn can conduct special classes for their children in Drug and Alcohol Prevention Education. These workshops are a good investment because the knowledge acquired from one instructor can be magnified many times throughout the state.

With the financial support of the Scottish Rite Valleys of Portland and Lewiston-Auburn, the Foundation was able to sponsor The "Buffalo and Brandy" kid show at the Cumberland Fair last Fall. This is a special drug and alcohol prevention education musical show conducted by two young people who entertain the kids for an hour. Kids were bussed into 13 shows from all over Cumberland County during the Fair. This was a very successful event and a great public relations activity.

Ten thousand red ribbons with the Masonic emblem on them were distributed to all Lodges in the state. Most active members wore their red ribbons for several days during "National Red Ribbon Week" last October. A great many of these ribbons were distributed to the local school children, who wore them very proudly. Although there were other red ribbons available to the kids, in some areas the kids were insisting on the red ribbon with the Masonic emblem on it. Once again, the Freemasons of Maine were way out in front with this promotion. The Foundation was recognized and received the "Organization of the year Award" from the Maine State Alcohol and Drug Abuse Prevention Conference held in Rockport on May 14, 1990. The Foundation received another award from the Division of Alcohol and Drug Education Services of the Department of Education at the Civic Center in Augusta on May 30, 1990. The presentation was made to Grand Master Robert V. Damon by Governor John R. McKernan. This was the first time that a fraternal organization has been recognized with this award. All the Directors of this Foundation were in attendance at the special presentation.

We have had a very busy year with a lot of good being generated by these activities which I am sure that the Freemasons of Maine will gain much public recognition for our good works.

COMMITTEE ON MASONIC JURISPRUDENCE

In Grand Lodge
Lewiston, Maine
May 7, 1991

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine:

The Committee on Masonic Jurisprudence has reviewed the dispensations granted this past year and find all are within the discretionary powers of the Grand Master and we therefore recommend they be approved.

The decision of the Grand Master ruling that Tremont Lodge, No. 77 at Southwest Harbor and Northeast Harbor Lodge, No. 208 have concurrent jurisdiction over a candidate residing on the Cranberry Isles is not in accord with the Constitution and we recommend that it not be approved.

Section 114(b) of the Constitution governs this situation. "To ascertain which of two lodges is nearer the residence of the candidate, the measurement must be made along the shortest established route ----." The ferry service now established between Cranberry Isles and Northeast Harbor is the shortest established route and therefore Northeast Harbor Lodge, No. 208 has jurisdiction over a candidate from Cranberry Isles.

The decision relating to the requirement that the applicant for membership by affiliation must sign the by-laws is correct. This is required in order to make a written record of his membership. Standing Regulation No. 37 mandates that a "Master Mason who has voluntarily remained for more than one year without being affiliated with some regular lodge shall not of right be entitled to any of the benefits or privileges of Masonry and shall be under the same disabilities as if under suspension for non-payment of dues.

The decision of the Grand Master to permit Blazing Star Lodge, No. 30 to move from its location on Congress Street in the Town of Rumford to Rumford Point, still within the Town of Rumford is in fact a dispensation. The move has been sanctioned by the District Deputy Grand Master and has the approbation of the nearest lodges, but since the new hall is more than one half mile from its former location, the consent of the Grand Lodge is required under Section 86 of the Constitution. We recommend this consent be granted.

DECISION

January 7, 1991

It was, earlier this year, brought to my attention in the Twenty-first District

that the ferry service between the Cranberry Islands and Mount Desert Island at Southwest Harbor has been discontinued. A ferry service is now established between the Cranberry Islands and Northeast Harbor on Mount Desert Island instead. Up until this time, any who resided on the Cranberry Islands who wished to become Candidates were considered to be under the jurisdiction of Tremont Lodge at Southwest Harbor. It was requested that I make a ruling to decide what Lodge should have jurisdiction over Candidates from the Cranberry Islands, since it is now closer by the regular ferry service for them to travel to Northeast Harbor and the Lodge located there.

Section 114 of the Constitution quite clearly defines jurisdictional boundaries as they relate to roads commonly or infrequently traveled for the purpose of establishing the distance to the nearest Lodge. It is my interpretation that distances to be traveled by boat would be considered under the same rules as those established for land based vehicles. The Lodge at Northeast Harbor is now actually closer to the Cranberry Islands by the established ferry service, than to the Lodge at Southwest Harbor. It would seem possible, however, that one might travel by other water transportation, than the ferry service, if it were deemed convenient. Also it seems that in the light of the possibility that close fraternal ties may have been established with Tremont Lodge over the years by the residents of Cranberry Islands, that it might be quite unfair to exclude this Lodge from jurisdiction.

Therefore I ruled, on a temporary basis, subject to the review of the Committee on Jurisprudence, that Tremont Lodge, No. 77, at Southwest Harbor and Northeast Harbor Lodge, No. 208, at Northeast Harbor, be allowed concurrent jurisdiction over all Candidates residing on the Cranberry Islands. It should also be noted that although the change in the ferry service has been in effect for several years, there have been no Petitions for the Degrees from the Cranberry Islands, and that this was raised as a question, since it now appears that there may be some Petitions submitted.

Another question arises in regard to the provisions of our present Constitution, Section 114, Par. c. and d. This is not related to the above ruling, but might at a later date need consideration. The subject is concerned with the determination of the nearest distance to certain Lodges by railroad. Due to the fact that passenger service has apparently become non-existent in the State of Maine on remaining railroad systems, can these provisions as set forth be, in fact, any consideration in determining jurisdictional lines?

DECISION

March 25, 1991

It was recently brought to my attention that a question had arisen regarding the necessity of signing the by-laws of a Lodge in order to become a Member, thereof, upon acceptance by that Lodge to membership by affiliation. This question was brought about by the fact that some who had been members of Eastern Frontier Lodge #112 of Fort Fairfield, which surrendered its Charter, had petitioned other Lodges for membership by affiliation, but had not as yet signed the by-laws of those Lodges, due to the fact that they resided outside the State and had not been able to return for this purpose.

Josiah Hayden Drummond ruled in 1883 that a Member should sign the Lodge by-laws. A decision rendered in 1986 not only reinforced the earlier decision, but ruled that one must sign the by-laws of a Lodge before he could be classified as its Member. My decision on this subject concurs with that of 1986, in that the former members of Eastern Frontier Lodge must sign the by-laws of the lodges with whom they have chosen to affiliate. In order that they may not lose their continuity of membership, I rule that an extension of time, not to exceed one year, be granted for this purpose, and that the signatures of the above referenced brethren be obtained for the by-laws of the Lodges with whom they have chosen to affiliate, so that they may actually become Members of those Lodges.

DECISION

April 2, 1991

This decision relates to a dispensation issued, last June, to Blazing Star Lodge, No. 30, at Rumford to move from its location on the upper floors of a bank building on Congress Street in the business center of town to the more rural location of Rumford Point, but still within the established boundaries of the town of Rumford. The Lodge had the opportunity to acquire a building which had formerly been a school and which they felt would be well suited to their needs. I visited the site with representatives of the Lodge and examined the building which appeared in excellent condition, of relatively new construction, and requiring only minor modifications to make it suitable for Masonic purposes. The land included with the property would provide excellent opportunity for parking and overall, it would be an attractive location for the Lodge. The Lodge had submitted a set of plans for review which met with my approval. This site was not chosen in haste. There had been much consideration to all angles for different alternatives. Considering the size of the Membership, the finances of the Lodge and consideration of the other possible alternatives seemed to make this the most desirable choice. After disposing of the property where they were located and fixing the proposed new quarters before moving in, would leave a comfortable balance in their treasury for maintenance and other purposes, without being in debt.

The only problem that seemed to be involved was in the actual shift in location of the Lodge Hall from one part of the town to another. It was the feeling of all concerned that they would all like to have the same jurisdictional boundaries as had always been observed, and it was believed that all of the Lodges in the District which might be affected would be in complete harmony and agreement on this subject. Representatives of the four Lodges that might be affected, met with the District Deputy and held a review of the jurisdictional lines that had been in effect for many years. It was agreed by all that they wished to keep the same lines for jurisdictional boundaries as had been in use before the moving of Blazing Star Lodge. The other three Lodges under consideration are King Hiram, No. 57 of Dixfield; Bethel, No. 97 of Bethel; and Jefferson, No. 100 of Bryant Pond.

With this understanding in effect, I ruled that the Lodges should be able

to function under this arrangement, subject to the review of the Committee on Jurisprudence. That if an amendment were required to the Constitution, then it could be accomplished, since harmony prevails under the present conditions, as far as the Lodges are concerned.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON RETURNS

In Grand Lodge

TO THE MOST WORSHIPFUL GRAND LODGE OF MAINE:

This year's numerical loss of 532 is lower than last year, the percentage being 1.62%.

At the close of the calendar year, the total membership was 32,412. Forty-five lodges reported a gain in membership, 139 a loss and 15 remained the same.

Hiram Lodge No. 180 remains the largest, with a membership of 674. Naskeag Lodge No. 171 remains the smallest with 40 members. Trinity Lodge No. 130 reported the largest gain (31). --It should be noted that Trinity's gain was because of the many affiliations from Eastern Frontier Lodge -- while Deering No. 183 suffered the greatest loss (20). Average membership is 163 and 60 lodges reported fewer than 100 members.

Since the tellers had not come in with the election results, M.W. Donald Gardner called on the Most Excellent Grand High Priest Douglas Taylor to make his presentation.

M.E.G. High Priest Douglas Taylor, after making the appropriate comments about the York Rite, presented to M.W. Robert V. Damon, Grand Master, \$5,000.00 for the Drug and Alcohol Abuse Prevention Program from the Royal Arch Masons, and \$5,000.00 to the Scholarship Program from the Royal Arch Masons. The Grand Master accepted these two very generous gifts with much gratitude and appreciation.

Following the conclusion of balloting (noted previously in the proceedings) the Grand Master then called M.W. Carroll M. Fogg, Grand Secretary of the Grand Lodge of New Hampshire to approach the East. M. W. Damon, making appropriate remarks, presented M.W. Fogg the Josiah Hayden Drummond Medal for outstanding service to masonry. M. W. Brother Fogg responded with appropriate remarks.

CARROLL MOULTON FOGG

Carroll Moulton Fogg was born in Exeter, New Hampshire on May 16, 1923. He attended the North Hampton grade schools and graduated from Portsmouth High School in 1940. Following high school he attended Salem Commercial School in Salem, Massachusetts, where he took up business administration and accounting.

During World War II he served in the United States Army, and following his discharge, he married the former Shirley E. Prince of Danvers, Massachusetts. They are the parents of a son, Woodbury, and a daughter, Bette Jean. From 1943 until 1947 he was employed by the Portsmouth Naval Shipyard in fiscal accounting. On November 5, 1947, he was hired by the General Electric Company Meter Department in Somersworth, New Hampshire. He worked 25 years for the General Electric Company, holding supervisory positions in finance and employee relations. In May of 1972, Brother Fogg retired from General Electric and in June he accepted employment with the United States Postal Service in Conway, New Hampshire. He worked in that office until he was appointed as Postmaster at Center Ossipee in August 1973, a position which he now holds at the present time, and where he now resides. The Foggs hold dual membership in the First Congregational Church of Ossipee and the United Church of Christ in North Hampton, New Hampshire. While in North Hampton, Brother Fogg served as Deacon in the church and held other civic offices in town.

His Masonic career began at Star in the East Lodge, No. 59, Exeter, where he was raised to the Sublime Degree of Master Mason on February 1, 1945. He progressed through the chairs of the Lodge and was elected Worshipful Master in 1958 and 1959. After moving to Center Ossipee, he became a dual member in Ossipee Valley Lodge, No. 74, through affiliation in 1971. He was exalted in St. Alban Chapter, No. 15, Exeter in 1948, and served as Excellent High Priest in 1959 and 1960. In May 1963 he was appointed as a Grand Steward in the Grand Chapter, progressed through the line and was elected as Most Excellent Grand High Priest of the Grand Royal Arch Chapter of the State of New Hampshire on May 12, 1973. He was greeted in Olivet Council, No. 11, Exeter, in 1951 and served as Thrice Illustrious Master in 1967 and 1968. He received an appointment as the Grand Sentinel in the Grand Council, advanced through the several chairs in the Grand Line and was elected as Most Illustrious Grand Master of the Grand Council of Royal and Select Masters of New Hampshire on May 14, 1977. Brother Fogg was knighted in DeWitt Clinton Commandery, K.T., Portsmouth, in April 1951 and served as Eminent Commander in 1968 and 1969. He received an appointment to the Grand Commandery Line and in October 1978 was elected as Right Eminent Grand Commander of the Grand Commandery of Knights Templar of the State of New Hampshire.

Brother Fogg is also a member of the Scottish Rite Bodies. He became a member of Ineffable Lodge of Perfection, John Christie Council, Princes of Jerusalem, and New Chapter of Rose Croix, Valley of Portsmouth-Dover in 1973, and in the same year became a member of New Hampshire Consistory 32, Valley of Nashua. He is a 33rd Degree Mason of the Supreme Council. A member of Granite State Conclave, Red Cross of Constantine, he served

as Puissant Sovereign in 1974. He is also a member of New Hampshire Priory, No. 58, Knights of the York Cross of Honor and served as Eminent Prior in 1978. Other bodies in which he has membership are Palestine Tabernacle, No. XLI, Holy Royal Arch Knight Templar Priests, Anniversary Lodge of Research; New Hampshire Society of Veteran Freemasons; Order of High Priesthood; Order of the Silver Trowel; Past Commanders Association; General Grand Chapter Royal Arch Masons International; General Grand Council Cryptic Masons International; the Royal Order of Scotland, Order of the Eastern Star; and Bektash Temple, A.A.O.N.M.S.

His activities in the Grand Lodge of New Hampshire began with an appointment as the District Deputy Grand Lecturer of the First Masonic District in 1962 and he was reappointed to that office in 1963. In 1964 and 1965 he served as Grand Sword Bearer and in 1969 as Grand Steward. In May 1970, Grand Master Stanley A. Johnson appointed Brother Fogg as Junior Grand Deacon and he progressed through the several offices to be elected as the ninety-seventh Grand Master of Masons in the State of New Hampshire on May 17, 1980. He has served as Grand Secretary since 1987.

Brother Fogg has received many honors in Masonry and among them are the Major General John Sullivan Medal for Distinguished Service and the Jeremy L. Cross Medal. In assuming the office of Grand Master, Brother Fogg became one of a select group of Masons who served as head of all the York Rite Grand Bodies. He is also a Past Governor of Profile York Rite College; Intendant General, Red Cross of Constantine for New Hampshire. As Grand Master he brought with him to that office a wealth of Masonic experience and he performed the duties of that office with distinction.

M.W. Brother Fogg, as Grand Master of Masons in Maine it is a real pleasure and a privilege for me to present to you, in token of the many achievements which you have made in Freemasonry, Maine's Distinguished Service Award, the Josiah Hayden Drummond Medal.

Grand Master Robert V. Damon then called M.W. Thomas R. Dougherty, PGM of New Jersey and the present director of Hospital Visitation for the M.S.A. to the speakers stand.

After making several interesting comments about the pamphlets "The Hospital Visitor" and "The Short Talk Bulletin," M.W. Dougherty spoke about the M.S.A. and the hospital visitation program. He commended Brother Clyde Roth, The Grand Lodge representative to Togus, and told about the kind of service he provided for our veterans. He went on to mention that Bro. Clyde and lodge volunteers have given over 14,000 voluntary hours in Togus.

He also mentioned the Grand Lodge representatives who work in the three veterans' facilities throughout the state. All this was established with the money contributed to the M.S.A. and has made this necessary work possible. Bro. Dougherty then asked Bro. Roth to give some comments about his work at Togus.

Brother Roth thanked the Grand Master for allowing him to speak at District Meetings and went on to say that our commitment to the program last year was 5,220 hours. That was Sundays only.

He then commended the brethren who did volunteer work at the hospital as well as at the Veterans' homes.

Brother Roth closed his remarks with announcements of future programs at Togus.

At this point M.W. Dougherty had a tribute he wished to make for M.W. Charles R. Glassmire and was visibly concerned that M. W. Charles had left because of the lateness of the meeting. Nevertheless, I will transcribe much of Brother Dougherty's speech as he said it but may edit what might be extraneous:

"Brethren, I would like to read something to you. *'What couldn't a million Masons do if they made a concerted effort to change the world. We could approximate brotherhood in the twinkling of an eye.* Former President Dwight David Eisenhower was the author of these works. Although he was not a Mason, he obviously had a tremendous respect for the Fraternity and its potential power for good.

Isn't it wonderful to have someone of his stature have such a high opinion of us? Wouldn't it be wonderful if WE could share this opinion? Instead, isn't it a shame that we think so little of ourselves that even our meetings are sterile, unattended affairs characterized by minimal routine business with almost no thought of our potential for good?

In this age, most of the institutions which have been the backbone of our great nation have been failing us. The schools are infiltrated with radicals who take great delight in tearing down all our heroes, debunking the work ethic and most of our sacred ideals. The church is filled with starry eyed liberals who preach a new morality which is far from moral. All of our communications media seem to take a great delight in the use of four-letter words for their sheer shock value.

Where shall we turn for light in this rapidly darkening world? Fortunately, we have the working tools right on our altars! Their proper use, by even a fraction of us, could easily change the world.

"But what can I, a lone individual, do?" many will ask.

The answer is quite obvious. We must act in our everyday lives as if the Grand Architect of the Universe was observing our every act, for truly He is! We must begin to think in terms of the greatest good for all rather than for pure selfish gratification.

A return to the basic principles of Masonry will make each of us a better person, and our reflection in the community will inspire each one with whom we come in contact to emulate us. Thus will our sphere of influence spread throughout our milieu and with many others acting in concert will we be able to change the world for good."

"This was written by Charles Glassmire in 1982 and published in your *Maine Mason*. It was duplicated and printed by the Southern California Lodge of Research. That's what they thought of Charlie.

"Charles has given a lot of service to Masonry, not only here in Maine, but at the George Washington National Masonic Memorial in Alexandria, Virginia; and has served for many years as a Commissioner on the Masonic Service Association Executive Commission representing the Northeast of the United States.

"Charles, because of obvious conditions, had to retire this year, and the

Commissioners that he's been working with for so many years have elected him as an emeritus commissioner: and I have a commission here for him." (Brother Dougherty then read what was on the Commission. He asked M.W. Glassmire's very good friend, M.W. Peter C. Schmidt, to join him at the lectern, and asked him to give the Commission which was passed by the Commissioners in San Diego, California during the M.S.A. meeting of the Grand Masters' Conference. Brother Dougherty asked M.W. Peter to see that he present the commission to M.W. Charles. M.W. Brother Peter indicated that Brother Charles would get the Commission at the social that evening.)

Note: The following is more information about some of the tributes given to M.W. Charles R. Glassmire.

On the Tuesday evening mentioned above, M.W. Tom Dougherty took time during the social to call M.W. Charles R. Glassmire to the microphone. M.W. Peter C. Schmidt assisted Brother Charles to the platform where the Commission that was read in the afternoon session of Grand Lodge was presented to M. W. Charles R. Glassmire.

Appropriate remarks were repeated for Brother Charles by M.W. Dougherty and M.W. Peter C. Schmidt. After M.W. Charles responded, he was then greeted with a standing ovation by all present.

M.W. Charles, because of failing health, has retired from most of the Grand Lodge Committees to which he belonged, and he has also retired as editor of *The Maine Mason*. At the end of the 1989 Grand Lodge session, several brethren spoke about the many years of dedicated service brother Charles has unselfishly given to Masonry in Maine. At that time he was given a standing ovation also.

During the summer of 1991 Brother Charles donated most of his masonic library and memorabilia to the Grand Lodge Library and Museum. For this we are very grateful, but it is impossible to express our gratitude for the many years M. W. Charles R. Glassmire has given of himself to Masonry. A simple thank you is all we can say, but I am certain that the Masons of Maine sense a very deep appreciation for every thing Brother Charlie has done for the fraternity.

The Grand Master thanked M.W. Dougherty and asked for the report on Masonic Education and Lodge Service.

MASONIC EDUCATION AND LODGE SERVICE REPORT

In Grand Lodge
Lewiston, Maine
May 7, 1991

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine:

This past year the Committee on Masonic Education and Lodge Service elected to focus its energies on two specific areas which were deemed essential in promoting the mission of Masonry and the well-being and success of the constituent lodges that make up our Grand Jurisdiction. For this reason, this report represents a break in tradition with past reports which contained information on various facets of the Lodge in Action Team Concept Programs

The first area that received priority on the part of the Committee was the continued implementation of the Lodge Leadership and Development Program. The second was the development of a strategic action plan designed to set a course of action for promoting the continued well-being of the constituent lodges into the 21st Century. Both had their beginnings under the direction of our immediate Past Grand Master, Most Worshipful John E. Anagnostis, and have had the endorsement and strong support of our present Grand Master, Most Worshipful Robert V. Damon. It should be pointed out that these areas of focus are not separate entities unto themselves but in essence represent an integrated design for setting both a short-range and long range course of action to strengthen our fraternity as we approach the year 2000 which, needless to say, is not that far away.

It should also be emphasised that they represent a paradigm shift or a change in the past model in terms of the roles of the District Deputy Grand Masters and the District Representatives as it relates to working with lodge masters and wardens. This paradigm shift calls for the District deputy Grand Masters to function as "mentors" to lodge officers and not the more traditional model of "inspectors." It also incorporates the concept that the District Deputies and Representatives should work together as a cohesive team to provide support services to the lodges in their Districts.

This requires a change in thinking and change requires some element of risk-taking. Risk-taking can raise anxiety levels and for this reason it is not unreasonable to expect that there will be those who would be content to maintain the status-quo, to continue to let routine tasks prevent more

important non-routine tasks from every reaching fruition. I don't think we can afford to let this happen if we are to keep our great Fraternity moving in a positive and healthy direction.

The Lodge Leadership and Development Program is based on the assumption that Lodge Masters and the Wardens aspiring to become future Masters want to do a good job. It incorporates an assessment and goal-setting process and recognizes that the Wardens need to be involved in the process long before they assume the chair of Master. The role of the District Deputy as "mentor" is based on the premise that he can play a key supportive role in helping masters analyze lodge needs, set goals and a plan of action for meeting them, and thereby help Masters reach higher levels of leadership and success during their terms as Master. I should add that I am not downplaying the important role that the District Representative can play in the process. Working cooperatively with the District Deputies, Masters, and Wardens, they are a valuable source of support in helping them achieve their goals and have productive years during their terms of office.

The new model also calls for utilizing the human resources often left untapped in the past in the form of the Deputy Grand Master, Senior Grand Warden, and Junior Grand Warden. They will function as "Special Assistants" to the Grand Master and will be assigned the responsibilities for working with groups of District Deputies to support them in their endeavors and to forge a meaningful communication link between the District Deputies and the Grand Master.

Metaphorically speaking, the Committee has completed the second year of its journey and we are well aware that success is the journey and not the destination. Like Dorothy and her companions traveling the "Yellow Brick Road" we have encountered a few obstacles and expect to encounter more. And we have no delusions that there will be a Wizard at the end of the journey.

The strategic action plan as developed contains two-year, five-year, and ten-year goals. We believe that they are achievable yet at the same time they will require a strong belief system and a strong commitment on the part of Masons in Maine. It would not be practical to include the strategic action plan in its entirety in this report but the following does represent a sampling of the goals contained in the plan:

Two-year Goal: The District Deputies assisted by the District Representatives and guided by a designated Special Assistant to the Grand Master should concentrate on seeing that at least one-half of the lodges in each district have fully implemented the Lodge Leadership and Development Program and are pursuing written plans for the year's activities.

Five-year Goal: One third of the lodges in each district should meet the minimum standard, one-third the satisfactory standard, and one-third the exemplary standard for Masonic Education.

Ten Year Goal: By the year 2000 each lodge in the state of Maine should have active and expanding programs of help and assistance directed to (1) Elder Masons, (2) to Masonic Widows, and (3) to the community at large.

As part of the continued implementation of the Lodge Leadership and Development Program two seminars were conducted this past year by members of the Committee. The first was held in Augusta on June 9 and was designed to model for the District Deputies and District Representatives the process for working with lodge Masters and Wardens to assist them in assessing lodge needs, setting goals to meet those needs, and developing action plans for meeting the goals.

The second seminar was held in Oakland on March 31 specifically for the District Deputy Grand Masters presently in office, those who will be installed at this annual communication, and those who were running for the positions of Senior and Junior Grand Wardens. This seminar was designed to give the Grand Master the opportunity to share his vision and goals as it relates to lodge leadership development, the changing roles of the District Deputies, and the new role of the Special Assistants. The importance of developing leadership skills, the roadblocks to change, assessment, and goal-setting were also key components presented at the seminar. It should be noted that the scheduling of this seminar prior to this communication of the Grand Lodge and not immediately following it represents a paradigm shift in itself.

Reports from several District Deputies and Representatives indicate that in those lodges where Masters have implemented the Lodge Leadership and Development Program positive changes are taking place and a new sense of vitality and renewal has been generated.

General Status of Lodge Programs: Exactly half of the 24 District Representatives submitted annual reports to the Committee. Based on these reports it appears that just about all lodges have active Care and Share Programs as well as programs for Widows. The Pollard Plan for candidate instruction is being used in varying degrees. Some lodges use just the basic Pollard Plan booklets, others use some elements of the candidate instruction materials, while a few are using a comprehensive candidate instructional program. More lodges appear to be using the Fourth Night Program successfully and it is hoped that this trend will continue. It also appears that there is support being given to the Rainbow Girls and the DeMolay and that these Masonic Youth Groups are being called upon to present programs in many lodges. This is another trend that the Committee hopes will continue.

Right Worshipful John E. Gray continues to coordinate the Grand Lodge Speakers Bureau which is an excellent resource for lodge educational programs. More lodges are encouraged to make use of this valuable source as they plan programs of education for the general membership.

Manual for Lodge Secretaries: A manual for lodge secretaries has been developed by Right Worshipful Reginald Wing and Right Worshipful Dick Beedy and it is expected that this will be a valuable reference manual for those responsible for carrying out secretarial functions. It is expected that this manual will be printed and distributed to the constituent lodges in

the near future. The Committee gratefully acknowledges that valuable contributions that they have made in developing this manual.

Northeast Conference On Masonic Education and Libraries: The Thirty-fifth Annual Northeast Conference on Masonic Education and Libraries was held in Merrimack, New Hampshire on June 8 and 9 and representing the Committee at the conference were Most Worshipful Peter C. Schmidt and Worshipful Robert E. Johnston. The conference theme was entitled, "Getting the Message Out," and Worshipful Brother Johnston presented a fine overview of the conference to the Committee on his return.

Conclusion: I would be remiss if I did not extend my personal thanks and appreciation to the members of the committee for their cooperation and assistance, as well as their valuable contributions in achieving the goals that have been established. On behalf of the Committee I want to extend our sincere thanks and appreciation to our Grand Master, Most Worshipful Robert V. Damon, for sharing his visions with us, for allowing us to share our visions with him and more especially for walking side by side with us as we have traveled down our own "Yellow Brick Road" which is leading to the 21st Century. We have a long way to go and we look forward to continuing the journey with you during your second term as Grand Master.

And to you, my brethren, I would like to share a quote that I am especially fond of. Margaret Mead, whom I consider one of the world's foremost anthropologist, once said, "Never doubt that a few thoughtful committed people can change the world. Indeed it is the only thing that ever has. We, as Masons, are relatively few in number but if we remain committed to the mission of Masonry then, indeed, we can change the world for the betterment of all mankind.

HAROLD FREDERIC CHENEY

Harold Frederick "Fred" Cheney was born on November 16, 1911, in Bowdoinham, Maine, the third child of Harold E. and Isabel P. Cheney. He grew up in Bowdoinham and graduated from Coombs High School in 1929 with six classmates. Fred is an accomplished violinist and had his own dance band. He also played concerts from WCSH radio.

While attending business college, he worked for the Portland "News", an evening newspaper. One of his big stories was meeting Col. Charles Lindbergh after he had set his plane down on White Oak Pond in Warren, Maine.

On November 21, 1942, Fred married Marion Hayes in Portland. They had one son, A. Frederic, two grandchildren, Tevor and Jennifer, and a dear daughter-in-law, Una. Their home is in Rockland.

Fred worked for Curtis Publishing Company for 25 years, and for McLean-Hunter of Toronto, Canada for 5 years. After returning to Maine, he worked as a professional salesman in Portland. When he retired in 1977, he and Marion returned to the family farm in Bowdoinham to live. His hobbies are fishing, hunting and restoring wrecked cars.

Brother H. Frederic Cheney was raised to the sublime degree of a Master Mason in Village Lodge, No. 26, Bowdoinham on June 6, 1945. A "Life Member" of Village Lodge, he has often commented how little he was able to attend Lodge when he was working and lived away, but since returning to Bowdoinham he has been very active. He served as Tyler in 1987, but reviewing the past decade you see where Brother Cheney's efforts have been. His name appears over and over on the following committees: Welcoming; Social Programs; Work; Widows; Caring and Sharing; and Visitations. Since Village Lodge began recognizing their Masonic Widows in 1980, Brother Cheney has been instrumental in selecting, acquiring and distributing the Christmas Gifts to the Widows. A true "Labor of Love".

Brother Cheney is a member and Ambassador of the Valley of Lewiston-Auburn, Ancient Accepted Scottish Rite which he joined in 1946-47 and also of Maine Consistory. He is also a member and a Senior Ambassador of Kora Temple, A.A.O.N.M.S. of Lewiston.

Brother Cheney, in consideration of the extensive contributions that you have made to Masonry through your willingness to serve long and well in so many of the activities of your Lodge and its surrounding community as prescribed by the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine, it is with pleasure that I present you with this Simon Greenleaf Medal in recognition of service to the Craft beyond the usual line of duty.

It is with deep sorrow that we are called upon to announce the deaths of five Past Grand Lodge officers of the Grand Lodge of Maine since May 1, 1990.

R.W. HOWARD RUSSELL MALLAR, 79, was born January 16, 1911 in Machias, Maine, and died May 22, 1990, in Machias. He was the son of Roy L. and Anna (McCabe) Mallar.

He was a graduate of Machias High School and attended Washington State Normal School. Brother Mallar was a haberdasher in Machias for 61 years and owned Howard's Men Shop.

He was a 50 year member and Past Master of Harwood Lodge No. 91 of Machias; a member of Washington Chapter No. 16, Royal Arch Masons, where he was past high priest; a member of St. Elmo's Commandery, of the Scottish Rite Bodies, Valley of Portland, St. Croix Council No. 11, Royal and Select Masters of Calais, and Ancient and Accepted Scottish Rite Bangor Chapter of Rose Croix.

Brother Mallar was a member of Anah Temple Shrine of Bangor where he was a charter member of the mini-car unit. He served the Grand Lodge of Maine in 1964 as Junior Grand Warden.

Howard served the town of Machias as a selectman. He is survived by his wife of 50 years, Laura (Schoppee) Mallar, one son, Wayne, one daughter, Jean Ingalls, all of Machias; one brother, George of Gulfport, Florida, four grandchildren, two great-grandchildren, and several nieces and nephews.

A Masonic Memorial service was held on May 24 at the Gardner-Hall Funeral Home in Machias, and funeral services were held on May 25, 1990 at the Congregational Church, Machias, with the Reverends Douglas Hedstrom and Norman Duzen officiating.

R.W. WESLEY LEMAN OXTON, 96, was born November 21, 1893 at West Rockport, Maine, and died October 29, 1990 at Rockland.

He graduated from Rockport High School in 1913. Brother Oxtton served in the U.S. Army in France during World War 1. His wife, Leola Barrows Oxtton died in 1984.

He was a farmer and wood dealer for many years and also was a noted area blueberry grower. He served for several years as a selectman in Rockport, and also served on the school board.

Brother Oxtton was a past member of the West Rockport Fire Department and was a life-deacon and past president of the West Rockport Baptist Church. He was also a member of the American Legion Post No. 1 of Rockland, where he belonged to the drum and bugle corps.

He was a 67 year member of St. Paul's Lodge No. 82 of Rockport, and

a member of both the York and Scottish Rite bodies. Brother Oxtan was a 33rd degree Mason and served the Grand Lodge of Maine as Junior Grand Warden in 1947.

A funeral was held November 1, 1990 at West Rockport Baptist Church with the Reverends Richard Lamirande and Valmore Vigue officiating.

R.W. ROBERT EUGENE STROUT, 61, was born December 25, 1928 at Bradford, Maine, and died November 28, 1990 at Bradford, son of F. Leigh and Stella Mae (Williams) Strout.

He graduated from Bradford High School in 1948 and was employed by the State of Maine Highway Department for 34 years, retiring as maintenance supervisor.

Brother Strout was a member and Past Master of Olive Branch Lodge No. 124 of Charleston. He served the Grand Lodge of Maine as Senior Grand Warden in 1975. He was a member of the Scottish Rite bodies, the York Rite, and of Anah Temple Shrine of Bangor.

Survivors are his wife Elaine (Alexander) Strout, nine children and two step-children, one brother and four sisters, and many nieces and nephews. Olive Branch Lodge conducted a Masonic Memorial service Friday, November 30, with funeral services at the Hudson United Baptist church. The Reverends Donald Brooker and Lloyd Roxelle officiated.

R.W. FRANK L. MILAN, 92, was born on Swan's Island June 23, 1898, and died March 23, 1991 in Florida.

He graduated from Maine Central Institute and attended Brown University. Brother Milan taught school for two years in North Haven, and 18 years on Deer Isle, seven of which he served as principal of McKinley High School. He also served as a rural mail carrier for 34 years.

Brother Milan was a member of Marine Lodge No. 122, and served as Worshipful Master in 1936-37. He served the Grand Lodge of Maine as District Deputy Grand Master of the 4th Masonic District in 1943, 1944 and 1945, and as Senior Grand Warden in 1948.

He was a member of Harbor View Chapter O.E.S. and served as Worthy Patron; Past High Priest of the Chapter; member of King Solomons Council of Belfast No. 1.

Brother Milan served on Deer Isle's school board and planning board, and was also a member of the Fire Department and First Congregational Church there.

He is survived by a son, Robert L. Milan of Orlando, Florida, five grandchildren and seven great-grandchildren.

M.W. CHARLES EDWARD CROSSLAND, 96, was born at Watertown, Mass., December 18, 1894, the son of Benjamin and Frances Frye Crossland, and died on July 10, 1990, at Bangor, Maine.

He graduated from Sanford High School in 1913, and from the University of Maine in 1917. He was with the Maine Agricultural Extension Service until 1928, when he became Executive Secretary of the U. of M. General Alumni Association. In 1930 he was appointed Executive Secretary of the Endowment and Donation Committee, and in 1942 acting business

manager of the U. of Maine.

After his retirement in 1961, he received an honorary Doctor of Laws Degree, and in 1981 the university trustees dedicated the Alumni Center as the Crossland Center in his honor.

M.W. Crossland and his wife Idella Goodwin Crossland, who predeceased him, lived in Orono where he was a charter member, choir member, deacon and trustee of the Church of Universal Fellowship of Orono.

Brother Crossland's Masonic career began at Mechanics Lodge No. 66, on April 24, 1918, when he was raised, and in 1924 he served as Worshipful Master.

He was appointed District Deputy Grand Master of the 6th District in 1932 and Junior Grand Deacon in 1936. He was Grand Lecturer from 1937 to 1943; elected Deputy Grand Master in 1943 and elected Grand Master in 1944, 45. He received the Josiah Hayden Drummond Distinguished Service Medal in 1944.

On July 12, 1918, M.W. Crossland was made a Royal Arch Mason in Old Town Chapter No. 68 and a Knight Templar in St. John's Commandery No. 3, in Bangor in 1937. He was also a member of Bangor Council of Royal and Select Masters.

His involvement also included DeMolay where he was a member of the Advisory Council, Orono Chapter, for five years, a member of the DeMolay and Pine Tree Youth Foundation, and he was presented the DeMolay Cross of Honor.

On May 2, 1950 he was elected to the Trustees of the Grand Lodge Charity Fund and eventually was appointed Chairman of the Investment Committee and served in that position until he retired in 1978.

Brother Crossland was a member of the Scottish Rite Bodies in Bangor and was made an honorary member of the Supreme Council 33rd Degree in 1957.

He is survived by his daughter, Mrs. Rev. Frederick (Thelma C.) Robie, Jr. of Orono; two sons, Donald E. of Littleton, Colorado, and the Rev. Elton M. of Baltimore, Maryland; 11 grandchildren and 10 great-grandchildren.

A memorial service was performed by M.W. Robert V. Damon, Grand Master and his officers on July 13, 1990. Funeral services were held at the Church of Universal Fellowship in Orono.

We are grateful to these five brethren for their dedicated work for the Grand Lodge of Maine, and we also remember at this time 849 other brethren from the State of Maine who have died since our last annual communication.

May our ever-loving God mercifully receive them into that celestial lodge above where they may find eternal peace.

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine:

Brethren, your Lodge histories are not coming in on time. A few lodges are in the position of seeing the Grand Master take serious measures to assure delinquent Lodges of his sincerity in enforcing the current Grand Lodge regulations, whereby all Lodges are responsible for submitting a history of the year past (preferably the calendar year) before the end of January of the subsequent year. Of our two hundred Lodges, only 58 are up to date, though that is an improvement. When you see the names of the many delinquent Lodges, please make a note of any Lodge whose history might be more quickly completed through your assistance. Make known any discrepancies in our records. Your committee is only three and will be seeking much assistance through the District Deputies and District Representatives. Anyone willing to work on histories, should make himself known.

Currently, 142 Lodges owe 608 years of histories. It is my avowed promise that with the redoubled efforts of our Committee and my greatly improved health, 1991-1992 will see that number cut by more than half! Look at your own Lodge. Are your records correct? Some Lodges may find that some missing years have already been written and are in their files. Be as correct as you can before calling your Committee or the Grand Secretary.

CONDITION OF THE FRATERNITY

In Grand Lodge
Lewiston, Maine
May 7, 1991

TO THE MOST WORSHIPFUL GRAND LODGE OF MAINE:

Condition:

Your Committee on Condition of the Fraternity has reviewed 194 inspection reports; five were not available; and found ritual ratings on 192 reports as follows: 38-E; 58-VG; 81-G; 14-F; and 1-Poor. This summary indicates a reduction in the number of VGs in previous years to the Good category. This is a concern of your committee, and we recommend a more concerted effort be undertaken to encourage officers of subordinate lodges to attend Schools of Instruction.

Another concern that was noted was the increase in the number of lodges with 5 or more Past Masters filling the chairs. There were 82 lodges in this category, up 21 from last year.

On a more positive note, we were delighted with the number of lodges becoming more publicity minded. Many lodges are planning on participating in the scholarship program for the first time and others are planning events which make them more visible in the community. Awarding of scholarships and promoting the Drug and Alcohol Abuse Among Children program have been two factors which have made Masonry more visible in the communities in the past two years.

Lodge Ratings:

Lodges were rated in the following categories:

It was interesting to note that 74 lodges were rated E in Masters and Wardens and District Activities, which speaks well for the efforts of District Deputy Grand Masters in promoting these events. The lodges rated P should make more of an effort to attend Schools of Instruction, District Meetings, and Masters and Wardens Association meetings.

Social Events and Special Activities were graded high in only 13 lodges. It was interesting to note that most of these lodges were the ones with many new candidates.

Twelve lodges rated high in their support of youth activities. These were the lodges that were either sponsoring or co-sponsoring DeMolay and Rainbow chapters. One hundred fifty-six of the 192 lodges in Maine support our youth groups financially.

DDGM Report

All twenty-four District Deputy Grand Masters submitted reports to Grand Lodge this year and all were well done. Your committee considered the reports of Districts 6, 9, 11, 14, 17 and 22 outstanding.

Summary

For the most part, the Fraternity is in very good condition. New lodge dedications, new buildings under construction or in the planning state, and improvements to many of our existing halls have created enthusiasm among the Brethren of those communities.

Only a few lodges are behind on dues collections, and they have been encouraged to correct this problem. Allowing the problem to exist can only hinder growth in a lodge.

We sincerely hope the ratings on ritual at inspections will improve. After all, the first impression received by the candidate is the most important aspect of his future as a Mason.

It is good to see an improvement in our visibility as Masons in many of our communities.

A grateful thanks is extended to our Grand Lodge officers, past and present, for turning our Fraternity to what we feel is the right direction. Our District Deputy Grand Masters are to be commended for their many hours of dedication to Masonry.

We recommend that the recommendations contained in their reports be referred to the proper committees.

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine:

Weekly newspapers throughout Maine continue to do the best job for us as a means of spreading the story of what Maine Freemasons are doing. The weekly press gets out the message of what the Craft is doing far better and far more consistently than any other medium.

We do continue to make progress with other media options, too. For example, we had an extensive Drug & Alcohol Program story in every Maine daily when Education Commissioner Eve Bither addressed our 171st Annual Communication last year in Portland. The story was picked up by AP and the daily press gave prominence to it.

We've also had coverage of the Refusal Skills Seminars we sponsor with the State Division of Drug & Alcohol Abuse Prevention, as well as coverage for our Drug & Alcohol Abuse Prevention grants.

Newspapers also continue eager to run information about our scholarship program and its many recipients throughout Maine. There were more than 110 Masonic scholarships awarded in Maine during 1990.

Your Public Relations Committee has prepared a sample news release with suggestions for winning publication probability with local editors. R.W. Harland Hitchings has expanded his list of photographers available throughout Maine. We encourage lodges to call on these picture taking brethren to provide photos to accompany releases. (Please give the photographers at least a couple of weeks notice whenever possible.)

A minimum of 67 Masonic press releases were published in Maine papers during 1990. We also took advantage of two radio interview opportunities.

Public relations efforts cannot be made only in the media, however. It's essential that each Maine Freemason actively promote the Craft by telling the Masonic message to family and friends.

Maine Masons are doing wonderful things. We've assumed leadership roles in granting scholarships and with our Drug & Alcohol Abuse Prevention program. Continually share this good news with the men and women you come in contact with. Give them the Masonic message.

That is what effective public relations is all about.

LIBRARY AND MUSEUM

TO THE MOST WORSHIPFUL GRAND LODGE OF MAINE, A.F. & A.M.:

It is indeed gratifying to have received recognition at the 34th Annual N.E. Conference on Masonic Education and Libraries, held in Providence, R.I.

Brother Clement Sylvestro, representing the Library at Lexington and Chairman of the Task Group on Libraries cited our Maine System of information retrieval, developed in Maine (several Grand Jurisdictions have asked for details.)

Encouraged by that disclosure we are continuing our ultimate goal of a State Wide Masonic Library and Museum. An additional storage room has been cleared, one that will house our Museum. In that light we have scanned Grand Lodge Reports from 1916, for data on all items received to date. A near visitable treasure house. Thus, it will enable us to identify and validate our inventory.

We, continue to scan Periodicals, the many conference reports; from Grand Masters, Grand Secretaries, Masonic Education & Libraries, U.S. Sectional Conferences, Proceedings from all Jurisdictions; Grand Masters speeches, Banquet speakers, Grand Orators, as well as specific subjects on the multitude of articles on Masonic information. The potential for Lodge meetings/programs is awesome. In that view we welcome input from York Rites and Scottish Rites Groups.

In the second phase of our "Clipping File Program" we have initiated a "Committee Alert" Program: Specifically: The Librarian or designated individual shall scan all incoming periodicals for items that may be of interest to any of the Grand Lodge Committees. A copy of which shall be forwarded immediately, for review and action, to the chairman of that responsible committee. The subject shall be discussed, as to merit and possible integration, with other committees.

All committees thus would be immediately made aware of actions, taking place in other Grand Jurisdictions, that are pertinent, and of value to, the Grand Lodge of Maine's Programs. Our actions could be conceivably incorporated to suit our need.

We are reminded that the greatest idea in the world is worthless unless it could be communicated to others at a time and in a way that can render it usable to those who have need for it at some later time.

Think of the wealth of material on Scholarships, Drug and Alcohol, Public Relations, Sojourners & Clandestine Masonry, Leadership, N.P.D.'s etc. etc....that do not reach our cognizant committees. It will now!!

Further, let us still be aware of the danger of amassing rooms of book cases, and file cases, whereby replacable microfilm and microfiche, is space

saving, as well as reducing filing and mailing costs. Let us remove those outmoded card files, a justifiable program. Finally I would be remiss if I failed to continue to remind this Grand Lodge of the dedication and services of our Librarian Brother Donald Wilder.

It is inevitable, that eventually, concern, will center on the Library usage. Specifically, the prime requisite for usage? It must be opened to the public and at street level. As we are interested in younger members, the library should be opened on specific evenings, as many of the users are working days.

Further, the Library should have its own stationary and their own telephone line. We now have a detailed alphabetized listing by, subject matter and author. The guess work has been eliminated. Our Lending Program is already in progress.

Our security system for the Library and Museum should be reviewed as to third-floor windows and fire escapes

Last year we purchased 34 new books. We received 69 donations. This policy continues.

In conclusion: It is heartily recommended that the Grand Master consider the preparation of a resolution to establish a "Grand Lodge Library & Museum Commission". Further that a Standard Regulation be proposed. It shall define the: Establishment; Present Records Included; Administration; Powers & Duties; Incorporation; and Accounting.

Details are available in the 1986 Proceedings of the Grand Lodge of Indiana, Chapter 52, Page 120.)

A call was made for amendments to the constitution that were to be made from the floor, M.W. M. Donald Gardner read two amendments to be accepted by the Grand Lodge and to lay over until next year. Both of these amendments were voted on and accepted.

PROPOSED AMENDMENTS

(To be voted on in May 1992)

1. Proposed:

Sec. 90:2A. One dollar (\$1.00) per year shall be levied on each member of the constituted lodges of this Grand Lodge for the purpose of preparing, printing, and mailing *The Maine Mason* to each member of the constituted lodges. These funds for *The Maine Mason* are mentioned primarily for *The Maine Mason* but shall not be considered dedicated funds. These funds shall be subject to Section 35 of the Constitution as any other Grand Lodge Funds.

2. Proposed:

Sec. 60. The Masonic Charitable Foundation of the Grand Lodge of Maine, a Maine charitable corporation, established by the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine, Ancient Free and Accepted Masons, shall consist of the Charity Fund of the Grand Lodge, and such other funds or other property as are established or accepted for charitable, education or other specific purposes which are in accord with masonic principles and practices.

Sec. 61. The Charity Fund of the Grand Lodge shall from time to time be increased by adding thereto such moneys as may be voted into it.

[See Sec. 75.] [1984, p. 642]

Sec. 61 (a) The Corporation shall have the care, custody management and administration of the Museum and Library owned by the Grand Lodge of Maine.

Sec. 62. The interest arising from the charitable funds of the Masonic Charitable Foundation, and such other funds as may be available, may be appropriated in whole or in part, for the relief

First, to poor and worthy members of lodges, their widows and orphans, under this jurisdiction, in cases where the funds of their own lodges are not adequate to the exigency of the case.

Second, to all other worthy causes within and without the Masonic Fraternity, as the Grand Lodge or the Trustees of the Masonic Charitable Foundation through a Committee on Distribution appointed by the Trustees from their own members may consider worthy of assistance, to the DeMolay and Pine Tree Youth Foundation, and to other charitable, literary, educational research, scientific or medical purposes as the Trustees of the Grand Lodge, may deem appropriate and consistent with Masonic Principles and practices; and if the whole be not distributed the residue may be used for the payment of ordinary expenses necessary for the proper administration of the funds, and any amount over the appropriation for relief and expenses may be added to the Charity Fund.

[1987, pp. 443-444]

Sec 63. The several funds and other property constituting the Masonic Charitable Foundation shall be held in the name of the corporation, but under the management of a Board of Trustees, consisting of the Grand Master, Deputy Grand Master, Grand Wardens, Grand Secretary and six brethren, who are not acting officers of the Grand Lodge, to be elected by ballot for the term of three years; and to constitute a permanent part of the Board. If a vacancy occur in said Board it shall be reported to the Grand Lodge and filled at its next annual communication.

The Board of Trustees thus constituted shall be styled "THE TRUSTEES OF THE MASONIC CHARITABLE FOUNDATION OF THE GRAND LODGE OF MAINE", who shall have authority to.....

GRAND HISTORIAN'S REPORT

In Grand Lodge
Lewiston, Maine

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine, AF& AM:

According to the Grand Lodge Constitution, the Grand Historian is responsible for maintaining an up-to-date history of the Grand Lodge of Maine. This has been done and it is on file in the Grand Secretary's office. It is being updated every two years, with a chapter covering each Grand Master's term in office.

We can also advise that the publication "The Lodge Historian" has now been issued, and copies provided to each lodge via the District Deputy last Summer. It contains some helpful hints, examples and suggestions to those preparing a lodge history, and outlines the duties of a lodge historian.

There have been some interesting developments taking place in the field on Masonic history lately. Until fairly recently, almost all of the studies and theories advanced as to the origin and background of Freemasonry have been made by Masons from a strictly Masonic viewpoint.

In the last few years however, there have been several books published, written by non-Masons, some of whom are professional historians. This is all to the good as in the words of the famous Scottish Freemason poet Robert Burns, it gives us a chance to "See ourselves as others see us". It's especially pleasing to find that while Masons may not always agree with some of their conclusions, these books have been well researched and written, and are

fair and favorable to the Craft. The authors deserve credit for tying in general history with Masonic history, something Masonic historians often neglect.

When you dig into Masonic history, every once in a while you come across something that throws light on the origins of some of our present day practices. I did while reading one of these recent books by non-Masonic writers, *Scotland's Century, 1590-1710*. It is written by David Stevenson, a member of the staff of the Department of Scottish History, at the University of Aberdeen.

There are a number of theories as to the origins of Freemasonry, but the one most generally accepted today is that it evolved from the operative stone masons of medieval times. Because the first speculative Grand Lodge was formed in London in 1717, England is usually considered the birthplace of our present day Freemasonry.

Stevenson's book however, makes an excellent case that actually Scotland deserves a large share of the credit, as minutes of operative lodges in Scotland going back to the 16th Century document the gradual transition from operative to speculative, while English records of the pre-Grand Lodge period are few and inconclusive, and cast doubt on the operative to speculative transition as an English development.

I've never liked memorizing ritual or catachisms. For me, it's a long and tedious job, and I could never get a satisfactory answer as to why it had to be memorized in the first place. It wasn't until reading Stevenson's book that I found an answer that made sense.

In Scotland in the late 16th century, supervision of the operative mason's craft was exercised by an officer called the King's Master of the Works, or General Warden. In 1599 the individual holding this office was William Schaw, who drafted and issued a series of regulations having to do with the operation and conduct of operative mason's lodges. One of these Schaw Statutes, as they were called, had this to say:-

"It is ordained that the Warden of Kilwinning Lodge...take trial of the art of memory...of every fellowcraft and every apprentice."

Stevenson then devotes a whole sub-chapter entitled "The Art of Memory" to describe a technique nearly forgotten today, which was used by orators in ancient times to help them remember long passages, and improve their memories. This art of memory was then considered to be an aspect of the art of rhetoric, which you'll recall as one of the seven liberal arts and sciences described in the Fellowcraft lecture (Grammar, Rhetoric, Logic, etc.)

A likely further connection between the Schaw Statutes and our present day Freemasonry may lie in the requirement Apprentices and Fellowcrafts were to be tested (there were only two grades in those days) and the fact that many of our Grand Lodges today only require examination in the EA and FC

degrees, and not in the Master Mason.

Stevenson concludes his sub-chapter with this comment, "William Schaw's injunction that Masons must be tested in the art of memory has been read by generations on Masonic historians, but the significance of it has not been noticed".

And so it took a non-Mason to discover the probable origin of a custom we've been following for almost 400 years. I still don't like memorizing ritual, but at least I know where the custom originated.

Preparing the annual Lodge history is usually a thankless job, but one that requires some time and effort if it's to be done right. To recognize those lodge historians who have labored and produced top quality work, there was established some years ago, the Historian's Award, given annually to the author of the best lodge history for the preceding year. Certificates of Merit are also presented to the runners-up. This year it was particularly hard to choose the winner, as there were four well qualified candidates. We could only pick one, however, and we're happy to announce the winner:-

The Grand Master asked that R.W. Charles S. Partridge be escorted to the East and presented him with the Josiah Hayden Drummond Medal for distinguished service in Masonry.

CHARLES STURTEVANT PARTRIDGE

Charles Sturtevant Partridge was born in Portland, Maine, on January 16, 1923, the second son of Donald B. and Geneva S. Partridge of Norway, Maine. He attended Norway schools and graduated from Norway High School in 1941. He received his B.A. Degree from the University of Maine, Orono, in 1949 and an M.A. Degree in 1959. Charles taught school at Ashland Community High School, Fryeburg Academy and Paris High School.

In 1959, he entered Bangor Theological Seminary, graduating in 1962. He was ordained in Ashland at the U.C.C. Church on June 26, 1962. In addition to the Ashland/Portage Churches, he served as a co-pastor for ten years in the Mount Desert Larger parish and he was the pastor of the Congregational Church in East Machias for five years.

He was united in marriage to the former Phyllis Scribner of Norway, Maine on June 24, 1950. They have three children - Beth (Mrs. Gary Wells) of Depoe Bay, Oregon; Judy (Mrs. Wayne Mitchell) of Salisbury Cove and David of Bar Harbor (both of Mount Desert Island). A fourth child, Jean, died in 1968.

During World War II, he served in the Army and was attached to the Army Medical Corp Band, where he spent the entire three years with various bands such as U.S.O. Bands and at War Bond Rallies. The instruments that he played were the trumpet and the French Horn. Charles has always enjoyed music. Until he became a full time minister he played trumpet in local dance bands either as a leader or as a fellow player. He especially enjoys the music of the "Big Band Era". As a retired Congregational Minister, his favorite pastimes are recording and listening to the old time big bands, and as an active Freemason to help young Brothers in Masonry in any Lodge any way that is possible.

Brother Partridge was raised a Master Mason in Mount Desert Lodge 140 on January 30, 1967, and served as Worshipful Master in 1973 and 1974. He became a member of the Hancock County Past Masters Association in 1973 and served as its President in 1980. In Grand Lodge, Brother Partridge was appointed District Deputy Grand Master in 1976 and 1977 for the Twenty-first District. He was appointed District Representative for the year 1980. He was appointed in 1987 as Grand Representative for the Grand Lodge of Ceara, Brazil, near the Grand Lodge of Maine. R.W. Brother Partridge was appointed as an Assistant Grand Lecturer in 1985 and has been reappointed to serve in that office, continuously, since that date.

Brother Partridge became a member of the Ancient Accepted Scottish Rite in 1973. He served as Excellent High Priest of Washington Chapter, No. 16 R.A.M. in 1981-82, and Eminent Commander of St. Elmo Commandery, K.T., No. 18 in 1981. He affiliated with Acadia Chapter, R.A.M., No. 31 in 1990 and also with Blanquefort Commandery, No. 13, K.T. which he presently serves as Prelate. Other affiliations include Maine Council, Order of High Priesthood; Oxford Lodge, No. 1, Ark Mariners; Anah Temple,

A.A.O.N.M.S.; Anah Temple Past Masters Unit; Maine District Deputies Association, Warren Chapter, No. 131, O.E.S.; Hancock County Shrine Club and an Honorary Member of Warren Lodge No. 2 of East Machias.

In recognition of your many years of service to mankind through your professions and as a Freemason, I am pleased to award to you, R.W. Brother Charles S. Partridge, the Distinguished Service Award of the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine, the Josiah Hayden Drummond Medal.

The ship is not sinking. The course has been staid. I am proud and you should be proud, and together, we can keep on going. Thank you very much.

(2) The Grand Treasurer's Report was submitted, discussed and acted upon as follows:

Voted - After some discussion about the concentration in certain funds that the report of the Grand Treasurer be accepted, subject to the report of the Auditor.

Voted - To accept the gifts to the Charity Fund.

Voted - To accept the gift establishing the Charles E. Crossland Fund.

Voted - To accept the gift that was made in the name of M.W. Charles Crossland, PGM and that it be added to the already established Charles E. Crossland Fund..

(3) Harold L. Chute, Chairman of the Committee on Investments, submitted the following written report in his absence.

April 16, 1991]

TO THE TRUSTEES OF THE GRAND LODGE CHARITY FUND:

GENERAL

As has been the policy of the past several years, your Investment committee has been comprised of the Grand Master, Grand Secretary, Grand Treasurer and the below mentioned three trustees. We meet during the year in May, September and January with Mr. Manchester from Standish, Ayer & Wood (SAW) of Boston to discuss economic conditions and make any changes thought prudent with the portfolio.

Although SAW have complete freedom to make changes in the fund, they invariably notify the Grand Treasurer and he in turn calls me before the change. Changes in the total fund are made very slowly and there has never been a rapid turnover of equities.

THE SAW FIXED INCOME FUND

The SAW Fixed Income Fund was a fund established several years ago by SAW and at the time we invested \$500,000.00 in this fund. The income has been excellent from this and as our bond portfolio matured more was invested in this fund. Presently we have \$1,386,284 invested in this and the estimated income for 1991 is \$111,488 or a 7.82% return. It accounts for 34.62 per cent of our Relief Fund. Besides our 35 U.S. equities we have two other funds, i.e., SAW International Fund and SAW Small Equity Fund. The original cost of these latter two was \$102,149 and current value is \$127,232 and comprises only 3.18% of the total fund. In fact the International Fund has had a 14.8% growth since its inception (12/88)

One year ago the Dow Jones Industrial Average was about 2700 and today it is close to 3000. These increases in the value of the Stock Market has resulted in our tremendous total growth over the years.

INVESTMENT POLICY

Our policy has remained the same for many years and that is as close to 65% equities and 35% bonds and cash in the portfolio. Quality and conservatism have remained our top priorities. Your committee is aware of the increasing needs of members of the Fraternity as well as Society and so we constantly keep in mind the income needed.

THE NAMED POOLED FUNDS

This is the pooling of the assets of many named funds. The money is pooled and yet the name of the donor is kept intact and they are credited with a percentage of the pool. The Grand Treasurer lists the names of these donors.

There are three trusts due to various legal implications that have to be kept separate. These are the Philip Alton Quimby Trust, the Dana B. Cutter and George R. Rich Memorial funds. The current value of these funds are \$759,302 and a total income of \$39,806. This portion of charity is not managed by SAW.

VALUE AND INVESTMENT INCOME

The total value of all the above Charity Funds now is \$4,817,866 and an increase over 1989 of almost 14%. The total income of all these funds is \$237,690 or 4.9%. Keep in mind that the above total growth is the result of some new added funds as well as many stock splits and distribution.

It has been an honor for your committee to serve this Grand Lodge. The dispensing of these funds is managed by the Disbursement Committee and the Charity Trustees as well as Budget and Finance of Grand Lodge. Our committee is specifically charged with investment management. The committee minutes of the meetings are recorded by the Grand Secretary. Again we are extremely fortunate to have the services of the Grand Treasurer, Brother Tornquist, without whose meticulous efforts we would all be lost. We cannot thank him enough.

(9) Voted - Appropriation - Grand Lodge Blood Bank Program, \$1,000.00.

(10) Voted - That the Investment Committee be authorized to transfer up to \$40,000.00 from the Relief Account to the Grand Lodge Charity Fund (if and when available).

(11) Voted - to Appropriate the following:

- a. Grand Lodge Scholarship Fund - \$30,000.00
- b. Alcohol and Drug Abuse Program - \$5,000.00
- c. For fund of Reserve Fund payments to former employees \$1,000.00
- d. Library rental and expenses May 1987 - April 1991 inclusive \$20,187.95.
- e. One half cost of renovating room for museum - \$525.00.
- f. 35% of office rental effective July 1, 1991.
- g. Expenses for museum and library - \$1,500.00.

A motion was made, seconded, and passed that we hire legal counsel to investigate our obtaining a 501(C)(3) approval.

(15) The date for our next Annual Meeting was set for April 21, 1992.

(16) No other business appearing, the meeting was adjourned at 4:35 p.m.

The following is remarks given by M.W. Harold L. Chute at the Memorial Service for M.W. Charles E. Crossland on July 13, 1990 in Orono.

M. W. Charles Edward Crossland
1894 - 1990

Brother Crossland was born in Watertown, MA, December 18th, 1894. He was educated in public schools and graduated from the Sanford, Maine High School in 1913. He soon entered the University of Maine at Orono and graduated with a B.S. degree in 1917. He served his entire professional career at the University and retired in 1961 after 44 years of devoted service to the Institution.

In 1919 he was united in marriage to the late Idella Goodwin and from that union there were four children. One son, Carlton, predeceased him. He was blessed with 11 grandchildren and 10 great-grandchildren. He was a charter member of the Church of Universal Fellowship and was a choir member, deacon, trustee and member of many committees.

At the University he held many executive positions. Due to his ability with people, he was instrumental in raising funds for the institution such as the Union Building and many others. He served as Acting President, Executive Vice President, and from 1928 to 1942 was Executive Secretary of the General Alumni Association. As I served in Development for 9 years at the University I was able to see the results of his efforts and work. As an example, I remember reading in 1975 a report and letter he had written to Mr. Russell Hudson in 1946. He had visited Mr. Hudson in the hayfield at that time. It was the start of a friendly relationship which resulted in Mr. Hudson giving approximately \$600,000.00 from his estate and we now have the Hudson Museum as part of the Performing Arts Center at the University. Brother Crossland influenced and knew thousands of students and alumni. It is safe to say that probably 30,000 knew him.

He was made a Master Mason in Mechanics Lodge #66 at Orono on June 5th, 1918 and was its Worshipful Master in 1924. He has been our Senior Past Grand Master for many years. In York Rite he was made a Royal Arch Mason in Old Town Chapter #68 on July 12th, 1918 - 62 years ago yesterday, and he was Knighted in St. Johns Commandry #3 in Bangor October 25th, 1937. In Scottish Rite he joined the Valley of Bangor receiving the 18th degree on April 25th, 1945 and the 32nd degree from the Consistory in Portland on May 18th, 1945. He was crowned an Honorary 33rd degree Mason of the Ancient Accepted Scottish Rite of the N.M.J. of the USA in Boston, MA, September 25th, 1957, 35 years ago, and is one of the Senior 33rds in Maine. For many years he held the office "Minister of State" in the Council of Deliberation of the Scottish Rite.

In Grand Lodge he held many offices, chaired many committees and was our Senior Past Grand Master. He was appointed the District Deputy Grand Master for the 6th Masonic District in 1932-33. He was appointed Grand Junior Deacon in 1936 and in October 1936, was appointed Grand Lecturer which office he filled most acceptably until 1943 when he was elected Deputy Grand Master. In 1944-45 he was elected, and served ably as the Most Worshipful Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of Maine. From this

time forward he served the Craft in many valuable capacities on such important Committees as (1) Amendments to the Constitution, (2) Grand Honors, (3) Condition of the Fraternity, (4) Long Range Planning Committee, (5) Foreign Correspondence, (6) Trustee of the Charity Fund, (7) Chairman of the Investment Committee and Chairman of Distribution, and was for many years Grand Representative to the Grand Lodge of Vermont.

As Grand Master he established a \$75,000 fund to help World War II veterans and in 1944 sent 2,000 Christmas letters to those serving in the Armed Forces. He also sent a condolence letter of sympathy and encouragement to the family of every Maine Mason who died in World War H. A highlight of his Masonic career was when he raised his two sons, Carlton and Donald to the Sublime Degree of a Master Mason.

His greatest pride was to serve as Chairman of the Committee on Distribution and Chairman of the Investment Committee for many, many, years. He saw the fund grow from approximately \$240,000.00 in 1944 to about three million dollars in 1980. As a cardinal virtue he held CHARITY in the highest esteem. In our own Lodge at the end of the year he would listen patiently to all reports on charity and he would say, "Is there not someone out there who needs help?" Yet he was thrifty - as Chairman of Distribution I know personally that for many years it was not unheard of for him to negotiate with a hospital or a medical bill - to have all bills paid - so that a family would feel they did not owe anyone.

He studied, researched and prepared such elaborate reports as the one he presented to Grand Lodge in the 1960's on the pros and cons of the Grand Lodge operating a Masonic Home.

He received the highest award possible from our Grand Lodge by receiving the Josiah Hayden Drummond Medal for Distinguished Service in 1944.

On November 14th, 1968, I had the great pleasure as Grand Master to present to Brother Crossland the 50 year Veterans Medal in Mechanics Lodge #66. A total of six Past Grand Masters were present and paid tribute to him for his many years of Service to the Craft.

In DeMolay, a young man's organization of boys ages 13-20 years and sponsored by Masonic Lodges, he had great interest and served on the Advisory Council of the Orono Chapter for many years. He was an original trustee of the DeMolay and Pine Tree Youth Foundation from 1970 to 1986. There he served as chairman of the investment, scholarship, publicity committees. He was made an Honorary member of that Foundation in 1989. In 1974 he received the highest award presented by the International Supreme Council of DeMolay - The Honorary Legion of Honor.

For a number of years he and I would install the officers of our own Lodge and some others. He would serve as Installing Master. He was always popular because in his dignified manner it meant so much more to being installed. He knew Masonry from all the ritual to the deepest philosophical meanings. For as long as I can remember he would give the charge or special lecture at the end of a degree, not only in our Lodge but as such special occasions as Grand Officers night in Belfast each year.

For many years he served as the installing officer at Grand Lodge and even Grand Master not only looked forward to his words of wisdom but

listened intently to the advice. I remember distinctly when he installed me in 1968 as Grand Master he said, "And I hope and pray that your dreams for the Craft will come true" and many things did.

In knowing Brother Crossland for almost 40 years, we never exchanged an angry word. He had great patience with impatient people like me.

As we traveled together for many years and later as our wives traveled with us to receptions and other Lodge events, people apparently thought our families were related. One day a Past Grand Master was talking to my wife Marion, and he said, "Of course your father, Mr. Crossland, will take care of Harold." Marion replied, "I am not Mr. Crossland's daughter - but I am greatly honored to have you think so!"

On another occasion Brother Charles and I were going to a Lodge meeting in Westbrook, Maine. I was driving and as usual was late. It was January, cold and snowing. At Gray on the Turnpike we were passing some cars and our car went into a spin, turned completely around several times and came to rest at one of the bridge abutments. No harm, no injuries and I drove out of the ditch on our way. After about 5 miles Charles said, "Slippery, isn't it, Harold?" Brother Crossland was very stable emotionally.

This very brief sketch reveals a Mason devoted to our Craft but also society in general. One of his great prides was the distribution of financial support to poor and distressed Masons, their widows and orphans. He always sent a Christmas message to our charitable recipients, about 150 each year and would enclose a \$20.00 cheque.

He was an inspiration to me and he taught me many things as we traveled throughout Maine, thousands of miles and hundreds of meetings. He is a great loss to our Fraternity and Society, it is the end of an era.

MASONIC CALENDAR

Ancient Craft Masons commence this era with the creation of the world, calling it **Anno Lucis (A.D.)**, "in the year of light."

Scottish Rite, same as Ancient Craft, except the Jewish chronology is used, **Anno Mundi (A.M.)**, "in the year of the world."

Royal Arch Masons date from the year the second temple was commenced by Zerubbabel, **Anno Inventionis (A.I.)**, "in the year of the discovery."

Royal and Select Masters date from the year in which the temple of Solomon was completed, **Anno Depositionis (A. Dep.)**, "in the year of the deposit."

Knights Templar commence their era with the organization of their Order, **Anno Ordinid (A.O.)**, "in the year of the Order."

Order of High Priesthood dates from the year of the blessing of Abraham by the High Priest Melchisedec, **Anno Benefacio (A.B.)**, "in the year of the blessing."

Brother Pulkkinen is a frequent guest lecturer in lodges throughout Maine



Following the introductions, the Grand Master introduced R.W., W. Scott Stoner, Past Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of Pennsylvania.

Brother W. Scott Stoner of Lancaster, Pennsylvania, was installed as the one hundredth Right Worshipful Grand Master of Masons in Pennsylvania on December 27, 1989, in Harrisburg.

Brother Stoner received his Blue Lodge Degrees in 1966 after serving two years in the military. He served as Master of Casiphia Lodge No. 551 in Mount Joy in 1973-1974; as Treasurer in 1976-1977 and as Representative in the Grand Lodge from 1978 through 1983. He was appointed District Deputy Grand Master for the 1st Masonic District in 1977 and was created a Past District Deputy Grand Master in 1983 when he left that office to assume the station of Junior Grand Warden. Since 1984, Brother Stoner has served on the Committee on Masonic Homes and the Consolidated Fund Committee. He is a member of the Board of Directors of the Pennsylvania Masonic Foundation for the Prevention of Drug and Alcohol Abuse Among Children and is the Chairman of the Board of Directors of the Pennsylvania Youth Foundation.

Born and raised in Lancaster, Brother Stoner was educated in the Hempfield School District and was graduated from Pennsylvania State University in 1961 with a Bachelor of Science Degree.

In 1966, Brother Stoner joined the accounting firm of Dorwart, Andrew and Co. He was admitted to the partnership of that firm in 1973. At present he is an audit partner and is in charge of the firm's continuing professional education. He is a member of the American and Pennsylvania Institutes of CPA's and served as president of the South Central Chapter PICPA in 1980-1981. He has served as chairman of several PICPA committees.

Brother Stoner is a member of Zion Lutheran Church in Landisville. He is currently an usher there, as well as being a Financial Teller and Chairman of the Endowment Fund Committee. Formerly, he has been a member of both the church's choir and Church Council.

In the community, Brother Stoner has served as a member of the Board of Directors of the Kiwanis Club of Lancaster. He is a former board member of Lutheran Social Services, East Region, and has served on the organization's Finance Committee.

Brother Stoner is a member of Lancaster Royal Arch Chapter No. 43; Goodwin Council No. 19, Royal and Select Masters as well as Lancaster Commandery No. 13, Knights Templar. Further, Brother Stoner has brought his professional expertise in finance to York Rite Masonry by currently serving a five year position on the Knights Templar Education Foundation Scholarship Committee.

In the Scottish Rite, he is a Past Thrice Potent Master of the Lancaster Lodge of Perfection where he serves presently as Trustee, and he is also a member of the Valley of Harrisburg.

He was coroneted an honorary member of the Supreme Council, Thirty-third Degree, in Boston, in 1984.

Brother Stoner's other Masonic affiliations include membership in Zembo Temple, A.A.O.N.M.S. and the Lancaster County Shrine Club. He is also a member of the High Twelve Club, York Conclave, Red Cross of Constantine; Sovereign Council No. 103, Allied Masonic Degrees and the International Supreme Council, Order of DeMolay for Boys, in which he also holds both the Legion and the Cross of Honor. In DeMolay, Brother Stoner served as Lancaster Chapter Advisor and Council Chairman.

Brother Stoner married Phyllis L. Lamson in 1965. They are the parents of two daughters, Karen Elizabeth and Cheryl Lynn.

Most Worshipful Grand Master Robert V. Damon, Officers and Brethren of the Grand Lodge of Maine, Distinguished Guests and Brethren All:

It is an honor and a pleasure to be here for the 173rd Annual Communication of the Grand Lodge of Maine. I want to thank Most Worshipful Grand Master Damon for inviting me to address this Grand Master's banquet and to also thank Brother Sampson and his wife, Jane, and Brother Jefferson and his wife, Nancy, for the hospitality extended to Phyllis and myself.

In Pennsylvania, just as here in Maine, we are concerned for the future of Freemasonry. We recognize the need for people to know about us...to appreciate who we are, what we do and recognize our dedication to our fellow man. I am talking about Awareness.

Thinking about Awareness as the topic we want to focus on tonight, I'm reminded of the story of the days when Yogi Berra was in his prime. It was World Series time and he was in right field. It was the days when "streaking" was the craze for those who felt the need to express themselves in their own ways.

At an exciting time in the televised games, three women "streaked" across the field in front of Yogi. The television director was alert enough to switch cameras and keep the scene from going out on video and the announcer only said that three individuals had "streaked" across right field in front of Yogi Berra.

When he got home that night, Yogi's wife asked him, "Were they boys or girls?" To which he gave his typical Yogi reply: "How should I know, they had bags over their heads."

Well, a lot more has happened in our lives -- in our world -- since the days of Yogi and streaking. We certainly are not streakers; but we do want people to know who we are. Competition for time and attention is even more fierce.

I need not come here from Pennsylvania to tell you that these are challenging, changing times.

Conversations I have had with your Grand Master and Grand Lodge Officers and reports in the Proceedings of your annual Grand Communications of the past several years tell me clearly that you are aware of the challenges we face in Freemasonry and that you have set a course of action. I applaud you for your Leadership Program, for your two-year, five-year and ten-year goals, your emphasis on community involvement and public relations. I see the kind of progressive thinking and actions that we need in Freemasonry today if we are to be the vibrant Fraternity ready for the Twenty-First Century.

Grand Masters across North America have been asking themselves -- and they have been asking their Brethren: "What can we do? How can we rejuvenate interest in this Great Fraternity?"

For at least the last three years at your Annual Communication, you have heard the call -- you have gotten the message: "We need Masonic Renewal." Freemasonry needs a renewed pride among its members and new excitement in the Lodges. We need community involvement. And, we need public awareness -- for people to know who we are, what we stand for, and what we do.

You know that four years ago through the Conference of Grand Masters and with generous contributions from the Northern and Southern Masonic Jurisdictions of the Scottish Rite, Grand Lodges and the Imperial Shrine, a "Masonic Renewal" Task Force conducted surveys across the country -- among members and non-members. Last year at this banquet, your Most Worshipful Past Grand Master, Brother M. Donald Gardner, told you the highlights - - or should I say, the disheartening facts -- that came out of those national surveys concerning public awareness of Freemasonry and the levels of interest in becoming part of the Fraternity. In short, what came out of those surveys was the evident need to consider certain changes and to institute certain programs.

First -- and fortunately -- the Masonic Renewal Task Force has become a standing committee of the Conference of Grand Masters and has been moving forward with programs to rejuvenate our beloved Fraternity throughout North America.

And, like those of us in Pennsylvania -- and you in Maine -- Grand Lodges believe in Masonic Renewal and support it wholeheartedly. Indeed, Masonic Renewal certainly was a motivator for the Awareness Program we instituted in Pennsylvania when I was installed as Grand Master on December 27, 1989.

WE SET FORTH ON A DYNAMIC EFFORT WITH SEVERAL GOALS:

- To Revitalize the values of Freemasonry among Masons;
- To rejuvenate pride in the Lodges among its members;

- . To serve our fellowman in the Lodge and in the community, and
- . To introduce this great Fraternity to those who have not yet seen the Light of Freemasonry.

We recognized that for too many years this great Fraternity has been hidden. For hundreds of years, we have been a sleeping giant.

We are a Fraternity of good men with high standards. But we have practiced our teachings quietly.

We have taken care of those in need. We have contributed to charities -- quietly and generously. The benevolences of the charities of the Family of Masonry in this country are astounding: From Masonic Homes to Crippled Childrens Hospitals ... from Research to education ... from major grants to local contributions ... the Family of Freemasonry nationally gives more than two million dollars a day -- every day!

MASONS ARE -- and always have been -- leaders in their communities. Find the movers and the shakers ... the supporters of worthy causes ... the leaders in your churches ... and you'll find that prominent among them are Freemasons.

Yet, for decades, in the eyes of the public, Masonry has been a dormant organization. We have suffered because we never told anybody what we are all about, what we stand for and what we do.

Brethren, all of us -- you, in the Jurisdiction of the Grand Lodge of Maine, those of us in Pennsylvania and Freemasons across the United States, Canada and around the world -- are builders today. We are the builders of a great Fraternity.

We need to be proud of our heritage and true to our values, yet we must be modern with the times. We need to communicate. Communications! That has been a keynote of our Awareness Program in Pennsylvania as it obviously is important in your goals and actions here in Maine.

Certainly, we will continue to demonstrate our values by precept and example; but, the world -- our friends and neighbors...our communities -- must know who we are and what we stand for...

Brethren, I would like to share with you excerpts from an inspiring and challenging charge used many times by a dynamic Freemason. He was Grand Master in Pennsylvania in 1984 and '85 when I served as Junior Grand Warden -- the late Brother William A. Carpenter. While he was Grand Master, he attempted to visit every one of the 546 Lodges that were in our Jurisdiction at that time. As he did, he would tell the Brethren this:

"...Freemasonry is a splendid Fraternity...steeped in tradition; (with) many great men, past and present, as its members; it has a beautiful ritual, and it is indeed an honor to be a Freemason. However, my Brethren,...the future of Freemasonry depends not on these things, but on the influences that it exerts in the life of each of us.

"...the individual members must live the spirit of Brotherhood. We must be a doer of the work; not just a hearer only...

"In this sense, as present day Freemasons, we could very well classify ourselves as **Operative Masons**. Our Lodge is not just a room; it is not merely a place to enjoy fraternal fellowship;...What our Lodges are is really a group of men, a group of brothers who dedicated themselves to a common task. And, that task is to build.

A Freemason is a builder -- a builder of character, a builder of a better community, a better nation, a better world in which to live -- a builder of an eternal temple for the indwelling of God."

His charge was a prophetic challenge -- a challenge that I believe Freemasons have accepted -- at least as far as I can speak for Pennsylvania Masons.

Almost a year ago, I was privileged to address that Grand Master's Banquet of the Grand Lodge of Canada in the Province of Ontario. The concerns were the same and equally serious. I took the liberty of recalling to Most Worshipful Grand Master David Bradley of Ontario his own words from his Grand Lodge Proceedings of a year earlier. They state the case so well that I will take the liberty of quoting them for you:

"Let us all, therefore, be **Operative Masons** again and be apprentices not merely to Masonry, but to all of life.

"The fact that Masonry has existed for several hundred years is something of which to be proud; but that fact does not, of itself, guarantee our continued existence. New thoughts and new ideas are needed. Masonry is exciting and venturesome!

"Though each of us wants Masonry to survive, we tend to leave it to somebody else to undertake the work and do the thinking. We must be masters of our own destiny. If we are to move into the future, we will do so only because we want it."

Yes, we want Masonry to move forward. We want to do more than stop the decline in membership, we want to reverse it. We want good men in our Fraternity; but good men won't seek out a dormant Fraternity.

Whether it is in Maine ... or Ontario ... or Pennsylvania, the people would not -- in fact, they could not -- continue to believe that Masonry is dormant if everybody knew who we are ... what we stand for ... what we do for mankind and in our communities. As Masons, we are men of great promise. We remain true to our beliefs in the fundamental importance of character and honor, of responsibility, and the essential worth of a man's life. We are not just members of an old and great Fraternity; we are Masons. We are keepers of that promise.

That has been the message of the Awareness Program of the Grand Lodge of Pennsylvania and to Maine also: "Keeping the Promise of America!" We work to "Keep the Promise" in our Lodges. We work to "Keep the Promise" to our Youth. And, we work to "Keep the Promise" to the Public.

In Keeping the Promise to our Lodges, our focus has been on leadership -- in keeping the Lodges dynamic and making programs more interesting. We have made great strides in educating the Brethren, because having knowledgeable members is the only way that the Brethren are able to talk confidently about Masonry and help to make an Awareness Program successful.

The Grand Lodge of Pennsylvania continues to set high standards when it comes to a deep commitment to Youth. Through the years, our Grand Lodge leadership has recognized a keen responsibility to young people.

The Pennsylvania Youth Foundation established and supported by the Grand Lodge is a focal point for the youth activities of DeMolay, Rainbow for Girls and Job's Daughters -- as well as including the Knights of Pythagoras -- in the use of the well-equipped Patton Campus facilities. The Youth Foundation also coordinates the numerous scholarship programs statewide of the Grand Lodge and Masonically-related organizations.

Both of our Grand Lodges are committed to attacking the scourge of drug and alcohol abuse that threatens our youth. Your activities in this field, I note, are simply called "Drug and Alcohol Abuse Programs." We operate under the name of -- and wait till I take a deep breath so I can say it all -- "The Pennsylvania Masonic Foundation for the Prevention of Drug and Alcohol Abuse Among Children."

I like to say it's a long name for a big cause! To break the generation chain of addiction.

The Foundation works through grants to established hospitals and agencies to provide intervention facilities, particularly prenatal and post-natal treatment and counseling for addicted pregnant women.

Of great importance has been the support of the Pennsylvania Department of Education's Student Assistance Program. Through the Foundation's grants and cooperation of the Youth Foundation, the facilities of the Masonic Conference Center at the Patton Campus have been provided to train educators for serving on Student Assistance Teams in schools. In three years, more than 6,000 educators -- teachers, school nurses, administrators -- have been trained in recognition, intervention, referral and counseling. At the start of this school term, there were Student Assistance Teams in every secondary building in Pennsylvania and by some time in 1995, there will be teams in every school -- from kindergarten through high school.

Just last January, the head of the Student Assistance Programs in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania said, "If it weren't for the Masons, we wouldn't have the program in Pennsylvania." The work of the National Foundation is patterned after the Pennsylvania program.

Keeping the Promise to the Public means taking our message to the community by example, service and communications. Our Fraternity has suffered because we don't tell anybody what we are all about. The Masonic Awareness Program in the Jurisdiction of the Grand Lodge of Pennsylvania during the past two years attempted to reach out to every citizen in the Commonwealth -- and to anyone else who watched television, listened to the radio, read newspapers or paid attention to highway billboards.

I know we made a difference. In each newspaper ad, television spot or radio commercial, the public was invited to call a toll-free number. During our campaign periods -- in the Spring and the Fall each year -- calls to the 800 number ranged from 65 to 80 a day.

Immediately after someone called the 800 number we sent an informative brochure about Freemasonry. Further, every inquirer also received a personal contact at the grassroots. To make that happen, Grand Lodge forwarded the information to the appropriate District Deputy Grand Master who then turned it over to the Worshipful Master of the Lodge nearest the area of the caller. The Worshipful Master was obliged to make a personal contact to provide more information and answer questions -- and, report back to Grand Lodge with the results of the visit.

There was no solicitation. It was not a recruiting campaign. However, there were times when the personal contact resulted in the request for a petition. There is a case in my home District, where a young man said he called the 800 number because his father was a Mason and he always wanted to know more about it. Today he is a Freemason and has enjoyed his first months in the Lodge so much that he started "through the chairs" this year.

People really do want to know about the Fraternity and are pleased about the personal attention given in helping them to understand Freemasonry.

Here's what happened in our campaign last Fall when the messages were

predominantly by cable television and newspaper advertising:

Ninety percent of those who called for information were NOT Masons. About a quarter of those who called learned about Masonry by watching cable television; more than two-thirds responded to the newspaper advertisements, about seven percent resulted either from personal referrals or they couldn't verify where they received the message.

There was response from just about all of the Zip Code areas of the state and some calls from other states -- bordering the states or persons traveling through Pennsylvania.

As I said this was not a recruiting program. There was no intent to measure success based on petitions.

The measure of success is the number of people who for the first time in hundreds of years, have been learning about Freemasonry ... have been reading about it ... hearing about it ... seeing it on TV ... recognizing the Fraternity, the Square and Compasses, the values and the character of Masons in their communities.

I assure you, the number who received the message is thousands of times more than just those who called our 800 number.

Ours is a straightforward message -- one that reflects the character and concerns of Freemasonry. Listen to it:

"Maine Masons are committed to the values that built America. Values such as family, character, integrity and the promise for tomorrow.

"Masons in Maine have an outstanding record of leadership. With 32,000 members strong, we contribute \$20,000 a day -- every day -- to help the elderly, care for children, and help fight drug and alcohol abuse.

"More than ever before, Masons want you to know how important our organization is in making life better for all of us -- working for the individual ... the community ... and mankind.

"If you'd like to know more about the Maine Masons ... call now and ask for our brochure, "We Stand With You."

Yes, we want people to ask about Masonry. Who we are, what we do, and the values we espouse. The more people ask, the stronger we will become. You see, when we tell others who we are ... when we tell people to look us

over and ask about us ... we are renewing **OUR pride in a great Fraternity** --- and pride in ourselves.

An Awareness Program is not meant to be a recruiting program --- this one certainly wasn't. But, when the kind of good men who would make good Masons see who we are and appreciate the values they see in Masons, it is likely they, too, will want to be part of this Fraternity.

That was the message of the headline of our advertising:

"THE MASONS. MEN WHO MAKE A DIFFERENCE!"

Public Awareness is making a difference. We are making the kind of difference that is necessary to revitalize our Fraternity.

It is important to our cause -- probably to our salvation -- that our friends and our neighbors know us and respect us for what we are: A Fraternity built on the cardinal virtues of Brotherly Love, Charity and Truth.

President John F. Kennedy said - "Ask not what your country can do for you, but what can you do for your country" and my question to you is what can Maine do -- How can we rejuvenate interest in this great Fraternity?

Speaking out has become a new experience for many of us. We have been quiet far too long. We must seize the opportunity to revitalize our Fraternity -- to communicate our values while always remembering to support the name we have always borne of being a respectable, regular and uniform Fraternity.

Thank you Most Worshipful Damon and Brethren all.

M.W. Grand Master Damon thanked R.W. Stoner for his appropriate remarks at a time when change was very definitely needed.

**ADDRESS BY RICHARD W. THACKERAY, STATE MASTER
COUNCILOR, INTERNATIONAL ORDER OF DEMOLAY FOR BOYS,
STATE OF MAINE:**

"Thank you, Most Worshipful Grand Master. Members of Grand Lodge, I'd like to start off by telling you what has happened in Maine DeMolay over the last year. Since our last installation in June, over the summer the members of my suite were very busy. Last summer we traveled to Conclaves in other states such as West Virginia, Massachusetts and New Hampshire. Also last summer we saw the first success, of the LABO STUDENT EXCHANGE, from which students from Maine have exchanged with students from Japan. Where host families have taken people in for a month, and this is a program that we will be continuing for the next year and we're sure this will be very successful once again.

In September we had our Second Annual Fellowship weekend in which we had a softball tournament and a statewide initiation class where we took in thirty new members.

In October we had our Annual Kora - DeMolay Brunch. A portion of the proceeds from that brunch go to DeMolay. That was very successful, and we thank the members of KORA Temple for helping us.

In November we hosted the Region One Regional Conference in Portland. The members of Region One are the members of the New England States who came together and discussed matters which pertain to International DeMolay. Later in November we had our Annual Congress Session when we discussed legislation which will help better Maine DeMolay.

The next major event that we had on a statewide basis was our DeMolay College which is very similar, from what I hear, to the Lodge of Instruction. We brought future DeMolay leaders together in Auburn to discuss what they may do as future leaders to help DeMolay grow and to make sure it goes into the Twenty-first Century.

Recently, in April we had our Annual Basketball Tournament in which the chapter in Bangor took first place. That was very successful as well. We had over six teams compete, and the brotherhood came together and participated well.

Dad Ferris, myself, and the Deputy State Master Councilor, Brother Jeremy Rytkey just returned a few weeks ago from Detroit, Michigan. The three of us went to represent Maine at the International Supreme Council and International DeMolay Congress Sessions where more issues were discussed. We looked at the long range plans of DeMolay to see where we are going to be in twenty or thirty years and to see what kind of things we should do to plan accordingly to make sure that the perpetuation of DeMolay, and also in turn Masonry will result.

Well, this is what has happened thus far in DeMolay. I'd like to discuss with you briefly what's going to be happening in the next two months before our conclave session in which I will retire as State Master Councilor. Over the period of the next few weeks in May we're having our Annual Sweetheart Pageant in which we elect a sweetheart. For those of you not familiar with the program it's a female who we elect to represent us at all official functions and be sort of a good will ambassador for Maine DeMolay.

Also coming up we have a big weekend for Maine DeMolay in which we have our First Annual Alumni Banquet honoring alumni in Maine of DeMolay. Then on the following day we have a state wide initiation class honoring the newly elected and installed Grand Master of Masons and the newly installed Grand Master of DeMolay who will be coming from Washington, D.C. It should be a very strong weekend for the Brotherhood of Maine DeMolay.

Also in June we have a few events piling up. Our Special Olympics Summer Games will be coming up in Orono. This is a new program that we have taken upon as a philanthropy in the State of Maine. We hope this will go well. What we've planned along side the games themselves, Maine DeMolay is going to be sponsoring a DeMolay Funtown at which we'll provide for events for the Olympians to partake in when they're not actually competing. Each chapter is sponsoring a booth to have something to do for these people. From what I hear right now, all the chapters are working very hard, and it's going to be a great week-end.

Finally, the 26th, 27th and 28th of June, we're holding our Annual

Conclave Session once again at the University of New England in Biddeford at which we'll have the elections and installations of the next State Suite of Maine DeMolay.

Those are some of the events we've done over the last year and hope to see come to their fruition over the next couple of months. But I'd like to talk about DeMolay in general for a second right now.

In Detroit, Maine DeMolay was awarded with an award for membership for growth over the last year, but membership isn't the problem we are facing right now. The problem we are facing is retention of members. You may ask yourself, "What are the reasons for this"? Is it the lack of state activities? I don't think so. Is it the loss of the relevance of the teachings of Maine DeMolay?" Definitely not. The teachings will remain constant. The problem we are facing in Maine DeMolay right now is the lack of advisors who are willing to dedicate themselves. We have a crew that we have had for a long time who are dedicated and will remain dedicated, but we always need more.

As I mentioned at the Grand Council and Grand Chapter Banquets a few nights ago, a chapter never folded because of a lack of members. It's always been because of the lack of advisors. It's not any easy job to be an advisor in DeMolay. It takes a lot of someone who is willing to give of their time freely. Someone who has a pair of ears and is willing to listen to the problems of a young man at any time. Also a wise tongue that can give them aid and assistance whenever it is needed. A willingness to sit back but also to step in whenever needed, and above all a young heart.

The rewards in being an advisor in DeMolay are immeasurable. Mostly the fact that you have a share in shaping the next generation of the leaders of America who, I'm sure you have realized at one time or another, not just the future of America but the future leaders of Masonry. In DeMolay lies the future of Masonry.

To preserve the future of DeMolay and also to insure the future of Masonry, invest now and accept the challenge. You cannot afford not to.

Thank you, Most Worshipful Grand Master, and Thank you, members of the Grand Lodge.

ADDRESS BY MISS AMANDA HALL BICE, GRAND WORTHY ADVISOR, INTERNATIONAL ORDER OF RAINBOW FOR GIRLS:

Most Worshipful Grand Master, Distinguished Guests, and all Master Masons: Good Morning. It is indeed a great honor and pleasure to be with you this morning and to bring to you the greeting of our Acting Supreme

Deputy, Mrs. Cora Ellen Moody, the greeting of all Rainbow girls in Maine, as well as my own very warm personal greetings.

*"If we only have love with our arms open wide, then the
young the old will stand at our side
If we only have love, love that's falling like rain
Then the parched desert earth can grow green again
If we only have love, we can reach those in pain
We can heal our own wounds, we can use our own names.
If we only have love, we can melt all the guns
And pass on the world to our daughters and sons..."*

These words were written by a Frenchman named Jacques Brel quite a few years ago, yet they seem to fit the times we are living in so very well. In a world that is full of hatred, discrimination, illiteracy and miscommunication, it is such a comfort to know that there is a place to go where the goal is kindness to one another; where a person is encouraged to strive for higher ideals, where no one is set apart because of a mere outward quality. I would like to thank you for making it possible for the youth in Maine to have a place like this. It is because of your order that ours ever even came into being and I hope you are each aware of the good you have done just by keeping Masonry alive in Maine.

This year, the Rainbow girls have had the theme "Reflections of Love". Our mascot is Raggedy Ann, a universal symbol of the love and friendship between girls. Our motto is "Love One Another" and the girls have lived this motto to the fullest. Our charity projects have been the Special Olympics of Maine and the Merrill Rainbow Camp Lodge Fund. Someday, we would like to build a lodge on our beautiful land in Somerville, Maine for all Masonic bodies to use for their various degrees and ceremonies. I would like to extend a thank you to all of the Masonic lodges who donated to our Grand Masquerade Enchantment Ball in October. Your support is greatly appreciated.

I invite you to attend our "Reflections of Love" Grand Assembly Session, May 29-31 at Husson College in Bangor. We would like to see as many Masons there as possible to support us and to find out what Rainbow is all about. I can assure you, if you weren't already aware, you will be glad you came!

Mr. Damon, I'd like to thank you for the invitation to be here this morning, for the courtesies extended to myself and to Mum Moody; and for this opportunity to address your Grand Lodge.

The Grand Master thanked Amanda and Rick for two outstanding addresses. He knows that the leadership of tomorrow can be found in young people of today who exemplify the qualities of these two.

Grand Master: At this time I would like to call upon our Governor to address the Grand Lodge. Governor McKernan, it has been quite some time since a Governor has addressed the Grand Lodge of Maine and we appreciate your being here. Governor McKernan, the floor is yours:

ADDRESS OF GOVERNOR JOHN R. MCKERNAN
GOVERNOR OF THE STATE OF MAINE

Let me say what a pleasure it is for me to be here and bring you the greetings of all the citizens of our State. Also it is nice to be able to share the dias with both Amanda and Rick, two young people who ought to give us great confidence in the future of the State. Allow me, as I begin, to salute both your Grand Master, Robert Damon, as well as your Past Grand Master, Ernest Curtis. How pleased I am to be here with them. I especially appreciate those warm words of introduction. That is not always the kind of response the Governor gets as he goes around the State in these times. Let me tell you how I was introduced once a couple of years ago. This fellow had clearly given a lot of thought to how he ought to go about introducing the Governor and he got started and was clearly on a roll. After about five or six minutes it was clear that he had figured out how to start it but not how to end. It just sort of dragged on and on and on and finally he just blurted out, at the end, "you probably want to hear the latest dope from the capital so here's the Governor," and that was before we had any budget problems.

As many of you know I have been a strong advocate for improving our educational system and doing what this State needs to prepare our young people for the future. That is really one of the reasons I wanted to be here to thank you for all you have done. I learned just Sunday about the involvement of DeMolay in the Special Olympics at a reception we had at the Blaine House for volunteers for the Special Olympics. I want to congratulate all of you that are involved in Special Olympics. I think anyone will find that it is a rewarding experience not only for those involved, but perhaps just as importantly it will make a huge difference in the lives of so many young people in this State and I think the smiles will make it all worthwhile.

One of the reasons that I think it is so important that we look to our young people is to realize that with the right kind of investment in the youth in this State we can give this State the edge it is going to need in the future as we enter what is becoming a very, very competitive global marketplace.

This morning what I wanted to do was to really thank you for your support of our education initiatives, and particular support for our Alcohol and Drug Abuse Prevention Programs which are so vital to what is happening with young people in this State. The Masons have been the true stalwarts in our war on drugs and I'm happy to tell you, this morning, that your support of our efforts are paying off. We have seen the use of Cocaine and Marijuana and other illegal drugs decline sharply over the last decade. We are making progress with drug prevention before drug use starts. Although we obviously have a lot more work to do in preventing alcohol and tobacco abuse I am confident that we are well on our way to the drug free schools that are our goals. Your generous financial support both at the State and local level means just an incredible amount to all of us involved in this effort. The citizens of this State obviously but perhaps most importantly the young people of the State benefit so much from these programs. My division of

Alcohol and Drug Education is led by the director, Carl Mowatt, and he works with the Masons at the grass roots level all across this State. In fact sometimes he even holds training sessions at some of your Masonic Lodges and that is how involved you have been and we truly appreciate it. Preventing Drug and Alcohol abuse in our schools allows us to continue to focus on what is going to be crucial to the future well being and standard of living of people in this State an improving overall education for Maine's young people.

I want to talk a little bit about that this morning. About why the change in our educational system is so important and what a difference it is going to make in our State. For five years my Commissioner of Education, Eve Bither, and I have been encouraging schools to look system wide at everything that they do in their school systems because I am convinced that if we are going to have the kind of education system that people in this State need in order to compete in the future we can't just tinker around the edges; we have to make some fundamental changes in the way we educate our young people. We have seen some considerable success in the last few years particularly at the school level. However, I'm hoping that in the next two years we can see entire school districts just pick up the banner for change and look at everything from what kids are taught, to the way teachers teach, and to the way schools are funded. We have to have that kind of *fundamental change*. We are beginning not only to accomplish that kind of change but we are beginning to see the results in the kind of respect we are receiving all across this country. Last Friday, the National Science Foundation reaffirmed our approach to educational reform when they announced that we will be receiving, one of only ten States I might point out to receive this type of grant, a five year, ten million dollar grant from the National Science Foundation to upgrade our Math and Science curriculum.

We are also proposing a Maine youth apprenticeship initiative. It is going to be based on the successful European apprenticeship models but it will be Americanized to fit American culture and our American system. It is a program that we will be announcing next week. You're sort of getting an advance copy today. I hope this is going to open up opportunities for educational excellence for kids who, in my view, have too long been ignored in our educational system. Those are kids who have historically been the non-college bound in our educational system. Let me tell you how this program is going to work because it is truly going to make national waves. We are planning a three year program and it is an option that will be offered to eleventh grade students. It is going to be work-based training in the schools, and it will not limit a student's other options. This is the way it will work. In the 9th and 10th grade students will study career opportunities as one of their electives. Hopefully, they will learn how education has an impact and an application to the jobs that they might be interested in doing when they get older. In the tenth grade, students who are interested in an apprenticeship for their last two years in high school will take a test that will be based on a common core of learning. This is the common core of learning that every graduating student should understand. The reason for this test is to make sure that anyone entering this program is up to our high standards and is going to be able to be a contributing and productive citizen in society.

Those who pass the test are going to be admitted to the program. Others who fail the test and are not quite up to the rigorous standards will be offered an opportunity to spend the next year getting their skills up so they can take the test again. This is not "either you make it or you don't" on the first try. In fact my view is that too long in education we have ignored those kids who could not keep up with the average. Many kids do have the ability. They just learn in a different way and it takes them longer and we have just discarded them. We haven't given them the extra help they needed to make sure they have had the opportunities they deserve. Once students start the apprenticeship, generally in the 11th grade, for those who pass the test on the first try, it will work as follows: There will be twenty weeks in the 11th grade year in the classroom. There will be specifically tailored curriculum designed to lead to the work place. Then they will spend thirty weeks of the year working for an employer who is participating in the program. In the 12th grade they will spend about fourteen weeks in school and about 36 weeks in the work place. Assuming that they are making good progress in this apprenticeship both in the classroom as well as in the work place as certified by his or her employer, the student will graduate with his or her class at the end of the 12th grade. On the job during this two year period employers would serve as mentors in addition to teaching the skills that the young person would need for the selected occupation. Students would also earn as they learn through a year round stipend that would be paid as part of this program. What really changes our apprenticeship program from many others in this country and the ones in Europe is that this is going to be a three year program. At the end of high school they will have only finished two of the three years. The third year that student will also spend another thirty-six weeks with the employer they have been working with, but the fourteen weeks in the classroom in the thirteenth year will be in one of our technical colleges. At the end of that thirteenth year, assuming that the student can pass both a written exam as well as a practicum, a test of what they have actually been trained to do in the work place, they would receive both a certificate from the industry or the occupation involved that they were qualified to do these skills and a one year technical college degree which would be half way to an Associate's Degree in that college or perhaps enough credits to begin at the university if they wanted to take that route as a second semester Freshman. I think that this program is going to help Maine students to get the kind of skills youth all across this country are going to need if America is going to be competitive. What I believe is that it will also make Maine young people among the best skilled anywhere in the world, and that should help us to attract high paying jobs to the State. I give you this background because I think that the absolute necessary first step is to make sure that people in this State have the skills they need for the jobs of tomorrow, not the jobs of yesterday. Education, however, is only half of the equation because no matter how much we improve education and we upgrade the skills of our workers in the workforce in the State we are still going to have a struggle unless we improve our business climate so that people can make money working in this State and hiring other people to work with them. I sort of equate this to a comment that Wayne Gretsky, the great hockey player, made when someone asked him the secret

to his great success in hockey he said, "I skate to where the puck is going to be, not to where it is."

Too often we forget that. We focus on today and we don't prepare for tomorrow. I think that is what Wayne Gretsky was saying and that is especially true in some of the policies that we have in this State. That is why we are trying to change them so Maine and Maine's people will be prepared for the future. Remember the story of the store owner who had his store in the middle of a building with two other stores. This fellow's store was in the center and he went to work one morning and saw that the store on the left had a big sign that said MEMORIAL DAY SALE and he looked and the store on the right had this big sign that said ANNIVERSARY SALE. He thought, "now how am I going to sell anything today-- this kind of competition is going to kill me." He went into his store, and sat in his office, and he thought and thought, " what am I going to do - what am I going to do". All of a sudden he got an idea and he got a big sign and painted it and hung it up over his store. The sign said MAIN ENTRANCE. We need some of that Yankee ingenuity in State government right now. We need to realize that to meet the competition. Making sure that our workers have the skills they need, as I said, is half the equation. The other equation is making Maine a decent place to do business. A place where a business can compete, that can prosper and that can continue to put people to work. Frankly, we fall short on that half of the equation. That is why we tried to take some action during the last session of the legislature. Some were successful, others need to be revisited. We have a jobs bond issue that is going to be voted on in June. I think that is critical in continuing the momentum which I have seen over the last three or four months of our economy beginning to improve. These will be inferstructure projects, both roads and other transportation networks as well as inferstructure repair projects within our communities. All of which need to be done and all of which can be done in this building season which is what is so important about this particular bond issue. We can, in fact, start the work that needs to be done this Summer so that we can continue the momentum of this economy beginning to come back. In the last session of the legislature we began to make some progress in removing some regulatory red tape which is also important. If people want to create jobs, State government, in my view, should be hospitable to their doing so, and we ought to be getting rid of that bureaucratic red tape and should be getting people through that regulatory process sooner rather than later. Some other things that we need to do - we need to make changes, frankly, in our welfare system. We need to encourage personal responsibility. We need to have people understand that welfare is there for a short term benefit to get people through, but they have a personal responsibility to improve themselves to go out and get the kind of education and training that will get them the skills that will get them back out into the workforce and break this cycle of dependency. We need to give businesses in this State financial incentives to invest, to modernize and to hire people to work for them. If you look at the States against whom we compete you will find that Maine does woefully little in trying to be hospitable to businesses and give them financial incentives to do business in the State. That is why we have proposed an invest tax credit. We have proposed a new jobs tax credit

for businesses to hire Maine people. We have proposed an education and training tax credit for businesses that get their workers the extra skills they're going to need to be able to compete in the future. We have also tried to do what we could to lower the tax burden on the people in this State. Because in my view we are going to take away incentives for people not only to create jobs but to work if we are not careful about the level of the tax burden in the State.

Finally, you have heard so much about the business climate and Worker's Compensation Insurance I won't bore you to death with another rendition of why this is so important, suffice it to say that Maine businesses cannot compete when they pay three times the national average for the cost of worker's compensation insurance. We have a blue ribbon commission who is studying this issue and they are going to report back the first of September and I intend to call a special session of the legislature to have those recommendations passed into law. The time has come to take this issue seriously. We are not going to be able to create the kind of jobs we want to have in the State of Maine if the cost of putting people back to work is significantly higher than all of our surrounding states and all the other states around this nation in regards to worker's compensation insurance. It is a five point plan. Something that I believe is action if we are to fix our business climate in this State. I don't believe that this State, frankly, can afford not to grapple with these issues. We owe it to the people who we in government are suppose to be representing. I hope that you people can understand the urgency for the need for these changes. Our economy is recovering, jobs are going to be created, they are going to be created in New England. The question is, will they be created in Maine. Only by our taking appropriate action to make it easier to do business in this State will we be successful. I hope that I can count on you to support our efforts because you are leaders in the community. You represent people in communities all across this State, and therefore you can have a significant impact on how people view the need to put people back to work. I am reminded of the words of philosopher Edmund Burke, who once wrote, "That no man has made a bigger mistake than he who did nothing because he could do only a little." You individually may only be able to do a little, but you as a group have an opportunity when all of your individual efforts are put together and spread out all across this State to do much. We need your help. This State needs your help. You can make a difference, and I hope that we can count on you. Thank you very much.

Grand Master: Thank you very much for that wonderful message, Governor McKernan. I know that you have a very busy schedule and we appreciate your taking time to come here and to give us this message this morning. Special Honor Escort, I will ask that you now come to the East and escort our distinguished Governor from this Grand Lodge Session.

Our youth leaders were escorted out of the Grand Lodge, to a standing ovation, at this time.

The Grand Lodge was called from refreshment to labor according to the proper form.

The Grand Representatives were then asked to stand in place and were greeted by the Grand Master, who directed them to correspond with their respective Grand Lodge counterparts. He commented on their involvement of communication and told them to keep up their good works and to continue to correspond even though at times it was frustrating not to get a response. He also thanked them for being present this morning.

GRAND MASTER'S REPORT

In Grand Lodge
Portland, Maine
May 5, 1992

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Ancient, Free and Accepted Masons of the State of Maine

My Brethren, it is indeed a pleasure and an honor to greet you at this One Hundred Seventy Third Annual Communication, here in the City of Portland. To our distinguished guests from other Grand Jurisdictions it is my hope that your stay is pleasant, as it has been a really wonderful experience to have visited with so many of you at your respective Annual Communications this past year. Shirley and I have enjoyed your hospitality and friendship, and we look forward to continuing this association with those of our Sister Jurisdictions in the years that lie ahead. We truly appreciate your taking time from your busy schedules to be with us for this occasion. To our in-State guests, it is also a pleasure to have you in attendance, today. We have enjoyed your friendship and hospitality and the warm spirit of cooperation that exists between the Grand Lodge of Maine and all of our Masonic Family, here. We are truly fortunate that such a fine relationship exists. There is no doubt that whatever part of Masonry in which we are actively engaged, we realize that there is strength in unity, and in these times unity is essential if we are to succeed in attaining our goals.

Another year has slipped by and the sands in the hourglass for 1991-92 are nearly spent. As Grand Master, the time has come for me to render an account of what has been done these past twelve months, and to present to you, my Brothers here assembled, some appraisal of the state of the Craft in this Grand Jurisdiction. We need to review what has been accomplished and note some conclusions regarding what can be foreseen for the future. We need to enumerate the goals which should be set in order to effectively deal with the challenges that await us. It is all very apparent that the world of change in which we dwell has caught up with the Craft, and like life itself, our Fraternity of tomorrow cannot remain the exact same in all of its aspects as it was in earlier days.

Necrology

During the past year, we have lost many Brethren from our ranks to the

scythe of time. We shall miss their friendship and the many contributions that they were making of their time and talents for the benefit of the Craft. We may find it somewhat disconcerting to realize with each passing year as the "oldtimers" depart from our midst, that we are fast becoming the Elder Brothers, and that those who are new to our ranks are looking to us for leadership, as we did to those who have gone on before us. We have a charge to keep, my Brethren, not only to those who look to us for direction and training, but also to those who have passed to us that torch of light which is Freemasonry. Let's keep it burning brightly.

Charitable Foundation

During the past year our Grand Lodge Charitable Foundation distributions have been managed by the very capable administration of R.W. Stanley F. Sampson. As during last year, the review of applications for relief have been made on a weekly basis at the Grand Lodge Office. R. W. Brother Sampson has done an excellent job, and I can only echo my statement of last year in regard to how much we do appreciate his devoted services. After six years of serving in this capacity, he has requested that he be replaced as Chairman of Distributions. I have appointed as of April 1st, Wor. Brother Wayne T. Adams, a member of the Trustees of the Charity Fund, to this position. Thank you, R.W. Brother Stan, for so capably handling this assignment.

District Meetings

There have been 24 District Meetings held this past year, and we were truly favored by not having any severe storms which forced postponement and rescheduling of meetings. Again, this year, the Districts were given three choices or options of the type of meetings which could be held. They were: (1) The traditional "Masons Only" meeting (2) A fellowship or brotherhood night to which men who were not Masons might be invited to enjoy a dinner and a program in which they could be given some insight into what our Fraternity is all about, and that this might spark a desire in them to petition for membership. (3) A semi-public type of meeting to which our families and other non-member friends could be invited. It is interesting to note that in regard to attendance in comparing the statistics of the past two years that 12 Districts had a decrease; 2 Districts showed no change and 2 Districts had to be evaluated on an estimate basis because of lack of complete data on the attendance breakdown. However, in comparing the overall attendance of the two years, the figures showed 16 Districts with an increase in attendance, and 8 Districts with a decrease. In either case, the numbers for increased attendance considerably outweighed the others. All Meetings for this year were Type 3, except one which was a Type 2. A year ago, six Meetings were Type 1, and the remaining sixteen were Type 3.

We realize that public awareness is a subject of prime importance for the well-being of the Craft in this modern age. Freemasonry cannot continue to remain quiet as to its good works and some of the principles which it stands for, only hoping that the rest of the world will assume a general trend to

read about it from the many informative sources that are readily available to anyone; references such as books and magazines which are published by many excellent authors, that can give a good insight into the many good works of the Order. It is fully realized, now, in all of the Grand Jurisdictions that we as a Fraternity must organize our own public awareness efforts. Public awareness isn't just going to happen by itself. Well planned District Meetings can be a special step in the project of public awareness. If we can begin with our families and friends on the local community level who touch our lives in our daily associations, we shall have begun our quest of creating a better understanding by those of our own communities. It is only a beginning, but it is a step in the right direction. Changes in our efforts must take place, for our society is quite different today than a few generations ago and we need a fresh approach which is in keeping with the times.

The programs for all of the District Meetings have been interesting and have shown some considerable improvement in several of the Districts. There were outstanding programs in fifteen of the Districts. In the remaining ones they were very good to good. Most of these had had a theme of potential for an excellent program, but needed more planning and work put into them. District Meetings are important. They provide an opportunity for the Lodges to work together for the benefit of all of them, and each will benefit if they will take part.

Schools of Instruction

Our meetings scheduled by the Grand Lecturer and his Staff of Assistants to provide ritualistic instruction and help with other types of Masonic training are experiencing difficulty in obtaining satisfactory attendance. It seems to have arrived at the point in many of these meetings that the members who attend these faithfully are the ones who need the least help, and those who would greatly benefit from some instruction do not attend much, or at all. I cannot give our Grand Lecturer and his assistants anything but praise for the outstanding services which they perform in taking the Ritual into the Districts, and who have offered their help to individual Lodges, if they will but request it. Very unfortunate it is that little or no help is asked by these Lodges which are most noticeably experiencing problems with the Ritual. My question is simply this: If one does not want to learn our Ritual correctly, why bother to learn it at all. Striving for proficiency is admirable in whatever our laudable undertaking may be. Poorly presented Ritual is only poor information that is passed on from one officer to another or to candidates. I wonder how many realize when they teach candidates incorrectly, how the meanings of our instructions are changed? It appears, from my observation, that many who are teaching our candidates are not qualified for this assignment. It certainly indicates a lack of interest by part of our membership.

So what is the answer to this problem that seems to be growing in regard to ritualistic proficiency or accuracy? There have been different schemes tried by the lecturers for the Schools. They have tried recognition for improved attendance by an award for the Lodges having the most Officers and

Members present at Schools, with the hope that pride in the spirit of competition might be the answer. To date, nothing has really been devised that works effectively. If a system could be adopted in which there was a "built-in" certified ritualistic instruction for each Lodge so that each rehearsal for Work could be an instructional session in itself, perhaps adequate instruction would reach everyone. Improvement in proficiency might be attained. As our present system cannot afford individual Lodge instruction and has to work on a District basis, this might be one new plan to try. The participation experienced is discouragingly small, at the present time.

Masonic Education

Masonic Education has for many years been a program of prime importance for the success and prosperity of Freemasonry. How can we adequately communicate with others on the values of Freemasonry if we do not fully understand it along with our relation to it as a living, working part? Can we expect that leadership will evolve from membership that has been inadequately prepared? We are very fortunate in Maine that we have a Grand Lodge Committee on Masonic Education and Lodge Service that is made up of so many well qualified Brothers. We are equally fortunate that over a period of many years, they have by their combined efforts and those of others who are interested in this subject, developed excellent sources of material for use in all sorts of Masonic Educational Programs. The point is that the material is all developed and ready for use. All that is needed, now, are some interested Brethren from each Lodge, that have not already done so, to put this source of help and improvement to work. For those who have done so, already, the difference in Lodge achievements is beginning to be realized. Maybe there needs to be a change made in the method of instruction, wherever it can be properly done. An audio-visual type of instruction has proved to be of great merit in some teaching applications. Learning is an on-going process for our entire lives. It is difficult to imagine that there are Brethren out there who do not care to become more proficient in Masonry, not just Ritual, but in all its wide spectrum.

Our Lodge Leadership and Development Program is at least in part dependent on a good background of Masonic Education for our Members. In any walk of life, in order to be successful, each of us needs some measure of training and preparation. Freemasonry is no different in regards to the need for training. It is already being noted by those Lodges which are taking part in the Leadership Training Program that education and training can make the difference for operating a successful Lodge, or not. We can assist the Lodges in realizing their goals, but first of all, they must have the pride and the desire to help themselves.

V.A. Hospital Visitation

Last June, with the assistance of our Masonic Service Association Representative at Togus Veterans' Facility, Wor. Bro. Clyde Roth, the arrangements were again made to exemplify the Master Mason Degree at the theater at Togus for the benefit of our Brothers who are patients there, and

unable to attend Lodge. It was also an opportunity to bring other shut-in Brethren to a daytime meeting where they could enjoy the work of the Third Degree as exemplified by the Kora Kraftsman Club of Kora Shrine Temple, accompanied by the music furnished by the Chanters of Anah Shrine Temple. Augusta Lodge was the host lodge sponsoring this event. As in the previous year, this event was accompanied by enthusiasm, and I'm sure a feeling of all who contributed to make that day a success, was that this was Masonry at its finest. While I was unable to attend as I did the previous year, I was represented by our Deputy Grand Master. It is hoped that this will be continued as an annual event.

In October, the Grand Lodge Officers made their official Sunday Visitation to the Togus Veterans' Facility and also visited the Maine Veterans' Home in Augusta, afterward. As usual, we attended both of the religious services conducted in the Togus Chapel and visited with the patients as much as possible. A joint luncheon was held with the local Council of The Knights of Columbus at the gymnasium with an excellent attendance, and following this there were introductions of the representatives of both Orders and some brief presentations. We were fortunate to have in attendance M.W. Thomas Dougherty, Past Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of New Jersey and Director of the Masonic Service Association Visitation Program to address those at the luncheon. A plaque was presented to Wor. Bro. Clyde Roth in token of the great appreciation that our Grand Lodge has for all of his efforts in making the Visitation Program successful. By developing a schedule of Sunday visitations involving many more Lodges than were originally included in this effort, it has not only created a better opportunity of providing more Masonic involvement, but also to share the purpose of dividing the time expended and the travel required among more Districts and hopefully to make the program easier and more meaningful to many more of our Members. We can help more people, some of whom are our Masonic Brothers, and it is also an excellent part of our Public Awareness efforts. Last Fall I was also fortunate, while on the northerly swing of the District Meeting circuit to visit the Maine Veterans' Home at Caribou. Our Representative there, Wor. Bro. Harry Kearney, is doing an excellent job. Wor. and Rev. Bro. David Wigley, one of our Grand Chaplains, is also our Representative at the Veterans' Home in Scarborough. I know that he is doing good work there, and I had hoped to pay a visit to the Home, but time has not permitted. My thanks go to each of you Brethren for the work that you are doing. We all appreciate your contribution to this program.

Youth Organizations

Our youth organizations, consisting of the Order of Rainbow for Girls and the Order of DeMolay for Boys remain active. According to the information I have received, the DeMolay have organized a new Chapter and are in the process of reactivating others. Their desire is to establish at least one DeMolay Chapter for each of our Masonic Districts. There seems to be growing enthusiasm and this is encouraging. I do not have recent information that indicates how the Order of Rainbow is faring. It has not been brought to my attention that any new assemblies have been formed or that

activity has been started in any formerly active Assemblies, but the visits that I have been able to make at their meetings and notices received of their activities indicate that there is still much activity and enthusiasm with the Order of Rainbow. I am sorry that my schedule, last Spring, did not permit me to attend their Annual Grand Assembly. I have been unable to attend many of the DeMolay activities this year as I wished, due to other demands upon this office. Perhaps the years ahead will afford more opportunity.

Northeast Conference

The Northeast Conference of Grand Masters, Deputy Grand Masters and Grand Secretaries was held at Hunt Valley Inn, Cockeysville, Maryland, last July. This annual gathering of the representatives of the Grand Jurisdictions of the northeast part of the country has always provided an excellent opportunity for the exchanging of ideas and reporting on the programs and methods that these Grand Lodges are using to strengthen the Fraternity in their respective areas. We share many of the same concerns and it seems that each of us welcomes news and the opinions of others as to how our Masonic neighbors are faring in their efforts to cope with changing times. The topics discussed were: The National Masonic Foundation for the Prevention of Drug and Alcohol Abuse Among Children; Relations with Appendant Masonic Organizations; Youth Organizations; Membership Losses; Public Awareness Programs; Family Involvement in Masonic Activities; Charitable Fund Raising; The Conference of Grand Masters of North America - Its Programs and Benefits; Dual or Plural Membership; and the Update on Meeting of the Grand Secretary of England and Grand Lodges which recognize Prince Hall Masonry.

There were numerous presentations made by the several Grand Jurisdictions who had been requested by the planners of this session to have information available for sharing with others in attendance. It is unfortunate that the system for recording the proceedings did not function properly, and accordingly, the complete transcript of the presentations and discussions is not available. Even with this problem, if one took a few notes, he should have gained much from this meeting. It seemed to be the feeling of most of those who were present at the meeting that some progress is being made in improving our situation of competing with the times. We are all aware of the problems and are working on various plans to help correct them.

Conference of Grand Masters of Masons of North America

This year the Conference of Grand Masters of North America was held at Arlington, Virginia, at the Crystal Regency Hotel in conjunction with the Annual Meeting of the George Washington National Memorial Association conducted at the Memorial in Alexandria. It is always an inspirational experience to either visit the Memorial or to attend meetings held there. Somehow, the influence of the "Father of Our Country" and also of the great heritage which the other founders of the New National left for the benefit of the Craft are deeply felt while one is visiting there. It seemed that the Conference was especially good this year. Most of the delegates attended

the religious services held on Sunday at Washington Cathedral. Crystal City in Arlington furnished an excellent location for the Conference as everything is conveniently located. The theme this year was "Operation Turn-Around". The delegates were divided into three groups and listened to a presentation on "The Challenges of Leadership". They were then given the opportunity to participate in the "Breakout Sessions" for group discussions which included; (1) Membership Development (2) Hypothetical Lodge Problems (3) Creative Thinking for Lodge Programs and (4) Using Audio-Visuals.

Of course, while this Conference or any other similar meeting cannot in a single session solve all of the problems that each Grand Jurisdiction may be encountering, it does provide the opportunity to try new ideas which may help each of us. All Grand Lodges do not experience the exact same situations, either good or bad, and on the other hand many of them are similar, especially when considered by regions. For example, New England may experience problems that are somewhat different from those prevalent in the Southwest.

A project with which the Memorial Association is faced with, today, is the repair and maintenance of the Memorial itself. The cost of such operations, being what they are today, production of income for this purpose is a real challenge.

Dedication

On June 22, 1991, a Special Communication of Grand Lodge was held at Rumford Corner to dedicate the new Hall for Blazing Star Lodge No. 30. This Lodge was fortunate in being able to purchase a former schoolhouse and convert it to a Masonic meeting place. While it is located somewhat out of the center of population of the present town, historically the new quarters are situated near where the town had its beginnings, long years ago. The Dedication was well attended with a capacity gathering of Members and Visitors and their guests; the weather was fine, and the fellowship at its best. It is sincerely hoped that location in these comfortable new quarters will give to Blazing Star Lodge new enthusiasm and will establish a level of new activity and participation by its membership that will lead to future prosperity.

New England Brotherhood Night

The Eleventh Annual New England Brotherhood Night was hosted by the Grand Lodge of Maine and the meeting preceded by the traditional dinner was held at Kora Shrine Temple in Lewiston on Saturday evening, March 21, 1992. The keynote speaker for the evening was R.W. and Rev. Howard C. Olson, Grand Chaplain for the Grand Lodge of Rhode Island and Providence Plantations. He brought an inspiring message to the 101 Brethren in attendance who represented all of the Grand Jurisdictions of New England. The six presiding Grand Masters were present, and each was accompanied by some of his Present Grand Officers and Permanent Members. An additional feature was added to the plans this year, whereby the Ladies were invited to

travel with their husbands and meet with the wife of the Grand Master of Maine for a social visit and to enjoy a dinner at a local restaurant, while the Brethren were attending their own dinner and meeting. This preserved the traditional custom of the Brethren, while also providing for the Ladies. From the comments received it is my belief that everyone had an enjoyable visit. Since its start in 1982, this has remained a popular event for the Brethren of New England. Next year the Grand Lodge of Rhode Island will host this event.

Grand Lodge Night

This year, as last, an outstanding Lodge was chosen to exemplify the Master Mason Degree at a Special Communication of the Grand Lodge, called for that purpose, in order that an old custom might be continued. This is because at the present time our Grand Lodge convenes for only a day and a half, which leaves no time to include what was once an apparent on-going custom. The Lodge that was chosen this year, not only for its outstanding accomplishment in ritualistic work, but overall excellence in other endeavors was Trinity Lodge, No. 130 of Presque Isle. The date chosen for this meeting was April 25, 1992, a Saturday near the Annual Communication of Grand Lodge and which was hoped to be a date when there would be as few conflicts as possible with other scheduled activities. A plaque was presented to Trinity Lodge in recognition for the fine evening and its accomplishments for the year.

Lodge Directory and Highway Signing Projects

A year ago, in interest of furthering the efforts of assisting our Public Awareness Program, as well as to give assistance to any sojourning Brethren who might be traveling through Maine, the Roadway Sign Project was begun. Although it started somewhat slowly, the number of Lodges taking part in this project has increased in recent months. Not only does this project lend itself to assist the "Awareness" effort, but it also serves to indicate the pride felt by the Masonic Brethren of a community to advertise that there is a Masonic Lodge in town, and that they point it out with pride.

Few comments have been made concerning the usefulness of our Lodge Directory; however, I have found it most useful in locating several Lodges that I wished to visit for the first time. It is hoped that this volume of maps can be improved by reducing the size of the book, after establishing a more consistent proportion in the scaling of the maps that were furnished. It is a good reference, but it does need a few refinements.

Masonic Home

Our Committee chosen to study the Feasibility of Establishing a Masonic Home in Maine, first appointed two years ago, has continued to explore with diligence and enthusiasm the potential for bringing such a hope into a reality. Their attitude has continued to be very positive and they have chosen several options for study which might be adaptable for our particular

situation. I highly commend these Brethren for the immense amount of effort that they have put into this assignment, and for their contribution of their time, expenses, thoughts and the sharing of ideas. We shall be interested to hear, later today, what their final conclusions are from this study and what recommendations they shall present.

Lodges Requiring Assistance

During this year, three Lodges have requested that the Grand Master meet with them to discuss what they can do to improve their conditions and thereby continue to function properly. Two of these Lodges outlined their outlook for the future, considering their lack of attendance, activity and participation. It was also pointed out that one of the greatest obstacles in keeping going was that of securing Officers. One Lodge sought advice of ways in which they might raise money to improve their financial condition. Answers that will solve all problems are not usually easy to find, and we can only hope that the suggestions and recommendations provided by those who met with these Lodges will be of assistance to them. Many times the approach has to be one of trial and error. If one scheme doesn't work be prepared to try another plan.

Sometimes it seems that the merger of two Lodges that are located near each other may be the answer to some of the problems. In the past, some such consolidations have worked well and others have produced a combination that is no stronger than its components were, while in other instances this action seems to have worked well. One factor that should be taken into consideration is that travel is not the problem that it was in our grandfathers' time. If anyone is really interested in attending a social or recreational event, a few extra miles of travel do not make that much difference. It appears that the chartering of more than 200 Lodges in Maine, years ago, may have been for advantage in travel. Perhaps fewer Lodges are the answer, if they are active, operating properly and really furnishing something for their communities that reflects credit upon the Craft.

I would like to commend the Lodges that during the past two years or more have done so much to improve the appearance of their buildings. Repairs, painting, and other improvements have been accomplished that impart the impression that we as a Fraternity are a prospering group that wants to be a credit to the community in which we are located and that we have something of importance to offer to the world.

Grand Officers' Seminar

After the Grand Lodge closed its Annual Communication last May, a luncheon and an organizational session were held for the newly installed Officers. The purpose was to provide instruction for them so they would be ready to commence with their duties. This meeting was held instead of the one that has often been scheduled in early Summer, in other years. Many people then are scattering for their own seasonal activities and May seemed an appropriate time to meet. The Program of Lodge Leadership and Development upon which we were then embarking, necessitated the establishment

of a different schedule for the training sessions that had been previously used. These seminars, held in September and April, were especially designed for District Deputies and Representatives. It is by their efforts, along with those of the Grand Master, with the Deputy Grand Master and Grand Wardens acting as his special assistants, that this concept of leadership development can best work. The Program involves appraisal by each Lodge of itself in regard to its own strengths and weaknesses in five different categories of operation, as each Lodge feels that it should score itself. It encourages the establishment of goals to be attained over varying periods of time.

This program operates on the basis of furnishing help to the Lodge Officers, especially to the Masters and Wardens, that they may realize their goals over a period of time; the time limits they have set for themselves. The Leadership Program was developed by the Committee on Masonic Education and Lodge Service because it was realized that assistance was needed in many Lodges to cope with the environment offered by our present-day society. Successful results will not be attained immediately. Things just do not work that way, anywhere. Everyone involved with this Program realizes that it takes time to accept and more time to place any new plan into operation. We are pleased with the progress of this Program in some Districts, and we are confident that more Lodges will decide to become involved in the future.

Two seminars have been held this year one was in Augusta in September, and the other at Fairfield in April. There are beginning to be some positive effects visible from the results of these training sessions.

Scholarship Program

Our Masonic Scholarship Program has continued to be successful. There have been 151 scholarships awarded to a total of 126 public high schools across the State. During this year, now ending, the Maine Masonic Scholarship Program has thus achieved the goal that it set for itself a year ago, which was that at least one \$500 Masonic scholarship be awarded in every public high school in Maine. Several schools, however, received more than one scholarship because there was more than one co-sponsoring Lodge. The \$250/\$250 matching fund system of grant enabled several additional Lodges to participate in this Program. A total of 94 Lodges and 3 Past Officer Associations participated. The total of the \$500 scholarships was \$75,500. It is hoped that more Lodges will become involved. This is one of the finest ways in which the Masons of Maine can support our public awareness efforts, assist our young people, and involve their members in fund raising projects. What better way is there to illustrate our tradition of being the "Builders" than by helping our Youth to build their own lives and to prepare themselves for a happy and productive future.

Foundation for the Prevention of Drug and Alcohol Abuse

This ongoing program receives donations on a daily basis from Lodges, Masters and Wardens Associations, individual Brethren and the Past District Deputies Associations. There has been received, during the past year, more

than \$96,000 through the direct appeal program. There was a special gift from the Grand Royal Arch Chapter of Maine. The Past Deputies Association of the 6th District has made outstanding contributions as has the 22nd District, and the Grand Master's hat and jacket sales have generated additional income.

There were forty-one school systems which received grant money from this Program to help finance their own program selections to provide training for staff, peer helpers and student awareness. Grants have been made to local police and sheriff's departments in support of the D.A.R.E. projects as well as special grants to Camp Kiev and the "All American Sam SAFETY Program". Several of the Lodges had additional activity and involvement in the Program this year by furnishing the use of their halls for training workshops conducted for area teachers. The Masonic Halls in both Auburn and Presque Isle were used for 4-day training sessions and the Hall in Bowdoinham was provided for use in conducting a 2-day session. The Eastern Star Chapters in these areas provided refreshments and noon luncheons. As our Committee Chairman notes in his report there will without a doubt be many opportunities this year to involve other Lodges in hosting this Program in a similar manner.

To the Director and Staff of the Division of Alcohol and Drug Prevention Education at Augusta, we are indebted for their support and guidance. As a team we work well together. The Division supplies the training program and the personnel to conduct it. The Masons of Maine assist in making the training financially feasible for the schools. My thanks and recognition go to all who are involved in this great project.

Visitations of Sister Jurisdictions

This year as last, I attended most of the Annual Communications of the Grand Jurisdictions with whom we customarily exchange visits. Exceptions were Massachusetts, to whom I sent our Junior Grand Warden to represent us, and Virginia for whom I was unable to arrange a substitute to attend in my place. These visits are very rewarding. Not only does one form strong friendships with his counterparts in the other States, but each Jurisdiction has programs and customs which are interesting and from which we can sometime borrow ideas. One Jurisdiction included in our travels, but not ordinarily receiving a delegation from Maine was the Grand Lodge of Hawaii, which met last January in Honolulu. This is a very young Grand Lodge, comprised of 12 constituent Lodges, and this was their third Annual Session. We were interested to learn that their retiring Grand Master, M.W. William McKee, Jr., has roots in the State of Maine. He informed us that his grandfather was from Houlton. This meeting, held in mid-Winter, gave Shirley and me an opportunity for a few days of vacation. There were five visiting Grand Masters and representation from several other Grand Jurisdictions in attendance. This was an interesting experience that we shall long remember.

Liaison Committee

This Committee has continued to meet the past year on a quarterly basis, and has been working to promote Public Awareness. This is intended to benefit all branches of Masonry and most particularly our Blue Lodges. One of our main objectives also, has been to try and establish a system to avoid so many conflicting meeting dates. There is still a long way to go in order to set up a system that works well. Two considerations must be fulfilled in order to attain success. First, there must be sufficient advance planning by Lodges and other Masonic Orders so that adequate "Lead time" is available, and second, the varying of meeting dates which customarily convene on the same respective date, each year, must be avoided. This will help. It is impossible to plan around the meeting dates of 198 Lodges, alone, but our State is so large that some meetings on the same date would not incur a conflict, anyway. The main concern for the most part is conflicting meetings in adjacent Districts. This project promises to be a challenging task, but with our computer capabilities now available we should be able to make improvements.

Reception for the Grand Master

Last November, my Lodge, Rabboni, No. 150, of Auburn held a reception to honor the Grand Master and his Lady at the Ramada Inn in Lewiston. Some two hundred which included Brethren, ladies and others assembled for an evening of excellent fellowship, dinner and an entertainment. Needless to say, it was an evening that my wife, Shirley, and I will always remember. The Brethren and their Ladies who had assembled to wish us well, demonstrated to us the many friendships that we had formed and was illustrative of one of the greatest benefits that this Fraternity affords. Among the gifts from my Lodge was a large framed portrait of the Grand Master for placement in the Auburn Masonic Temple. We truly appreciate all of the work in planning and making arrangements that were accomplished by the members of the Committee from my Lodge, and particularly the Chairman, Wor. Bro. Robert Johnston, and also everyone from far and wide who traveled so far to be with us for the evening. All of these contributed to make this an outstanding event.

Condition of Masonry in Maine

It is my belief that Masonry in Maine is reawakening. Not that I would infer that there is a potential for an upward surge in membership, or that full scale activity will soon occur in all of our Lodges. I do not believe that we will again experience a membership number that will equal that attained a few generations ago. I do believe that there is an awakening of interest and activity in many areas, that include most of our Districts, and that there are Lodges that again have work after a long period of inactivity. The interest in the Projects to assist our Youth have involved the interest and efforts of many Brethren, who seemed to have discovered in these, something they enjoy doing. I think that there is a renewed awareness of the importance of Masonry in our communities. This is illustrated by the fact numerous Lodges have improved the appearance of their buildings as well as their

accommodations. This is great. It shows that there are Brethren who are aware if we are to attract new members, keep the present ones interested and be a credit to the communities in which we are located, we must provide for everyone a positive image. I enjoy seeing the caps and jackets with the symbol of our ancient Craft worn with such great pride. I am enthused at seeing road signs going into place, here and there, which quietly announce the presence of Freemasons. I believe that some aspects of Masonry in Maine are definitely improving, but that there are others which need a lot of attention to better them. We have the talents and the training skills represented among our membership that can accomplish nearly anything that needs to be done. All that is needed is the commitment of more Brethren to help.

We are sorry of the recent loss of the Hall of Morning Star Lodge in Litchfield, by fire, and hope that they will soon be able to locate in permanent quarters. It is also hoped that Hermon Lodge of Gardiner will be able to establish a more favorable arrangement for a meeting place, soon.

Recommendations

There are several recommendations that I would like to make for consideration and they are as follows: To establish in each Lodge a Certified Ritual Instructor. Our reports for Schools of Instruction indicate that attendance at these sessions is small. Those who need the most help are not receiving it. These Instructors would receive their certification by the Grand Lecturer's Staff. This could serve to make the rehearsals of each Lodge become as individual Schools. It could also help our Candidate instruction, which is needed to be improved.

To establish a provision in our Constitution and Standing Regulations that will better encourage the prompt submittal of Annual Returns by all Lodges. The present system of fines for late Returns seems to have little effect upon too many Lodges who every year necessitate the sending of unnecessary letters and placing of an excess of phone calls to plead with these Lodges for submittal of Returns. Perhaps an added provision that would incur the arresting of their Charter might make the system work better.

To better coordinate the present requirements of Sec. 126 of the Constitution, and Standing Regulation 25, both of which are concerning proficiency for advancement through the Degrees, the signing of the Lodge by-laws and presentation of a Diploma. The present arrangement is not an easy one that will control the process and impart the proper education to our Candidates and to abide by what the Regulations require of all of us. This plan would be a progression of steps and would consist of the satisfactory proficiency examination after each Degree, followed by signing of the Lodge by-laws and receiving a diploma. This would seem to be a more meaningful beginning for the Candidate's Masonic career.

To establish Degree Teams within each Lodge that needs to improve the quality of its Work. Some Lodges are struggling to find Officers to do the work properly. The use of outside Degree Teams of which we have several excellent ones, is a fine diversion to boost attendance for an evening and is recommended for an occasional Special Event. I do oppose the idea of uti-

lizing such Teams frequently just because a Lodge cannot do its own work.

To recommend that the holding of "Table Lodges" should be reserved for reasons that are really special in which to honor a Brother who has truly earned special recognition. If there were a restriction placed on the number of such meetings that a Lodge might have each year, perhaps this fine old custom will retain its proper purpose. They should not be scheduled merely because there seems to be nothing else available for a program.

To recommend that some of the information included on supplementary Inspection Form 1-A, concerning the Program Activities of the Lodges be also included with other data already included in our Annual Proceedings. If this were done a much better perspective of what each Lodge is accomplishing beyond ritualistic efforts would be known. There are many special recommended programs and activities for use that have been on the menu for some time. Some Lodges are doing well with these while others are doing little or nothing. These facts help to complete the picture.

That a Standing Regulation, similar to Standing Regulation 45, be adopted by Grand Lodge to permit lodges to become a sponsoring body for an Assembly of the Order of Rainbow for Girls. I recommend the adoption of a new Standing Regulation and that the Committee on Amendments to the Constitution prepare and present to the Grand Lodge such Standing Regulation that would authorize such sponsoring lodges to use general funds for such purpose.

To recommend that a study be made to determine if there could be long range benefits derived through the consolidation of some Lodges. The fact that travel distances are not necessarily a handicap in these days, merits consideration. Generations ago, the distance to travel to meetings was an important consideration, as is evidenced by the fact that there were 219 Lodges originally chartered in Maine. That was mainly to accommodate the "horse and buggy" era which we have left far behind.

Conclusion

My Brethren, these two years as Grand Master have slipped away rapidly. Two years ago I entered this commitment with all of the dedication that was possible to carry out the trust reposed in me by you. I only hoped that I might with your assistance accomplish a few of our objectives and would contribute to the advancement of the Craft, here in the Pine Tree State. This year I have attended more than 150 meetings of various sorts and have kept no complete mileage count. Now, this term is drawing to a close and in a few hours I will be succeeded in this position. The term is ending, but my commitment of the Craft is not, for I firmly enjoy and believe in Freemasonry as a way of life. A friend of mine, years ago, said that the way Masonry "caught on" with men was somewhat like the parable of the seeds of grain in that some fell on barren ground and either did not sprout or maybe flourish significantly. There were others that found an environment that was suitable for them and they did grow and flourish abundantly. Each of us know this to be true for every Mason.

To my Officers I wish to express my thanks for the support that they have given me. The Grand Officers both Present and Past have been a great group

with whom to work. I have found the Officers and Members of our Lodges helpful and cooperative in most of the tasks they were requested to complete. To the Past Grand Masters I convey my thanks for their counsel and advice. I would like to give special recognition to my District Deputy Grand Masters. You have taken care of your duties and special assignments and some of them were not easy ones. Many of our District Representatives have done exceptionally well in carrying out the duties of their office. To my Grand Marshal I give special thanks. You have fulfilled the duties of your office in an outstanding manner. You have made my work easier on many occasions. My thanks also goes to my Grand Standard Bearer who has helped on several occasions and sometimes without much advance notice on my part. To the Office Staff for our Grand Lodge goes a special thank you, for all your help.

Last, but certainly not least, my gratitude goes to my wife, Shirley, without whose full support this experience of serving as Grand Master would have been very difficult, if not impossible. Her patience and understanding have endured at my being absent from home so much since 1977, and her only requirement has been that I keep her informed of the suppers at home from which I would be absent. My plan now, is that whatever she wants to plan will receive top priority.

Finally, my Brethren, thank you for conferring upon me the high honor within your power. I wish to thank you for your loyalty, support and patience. We have made gains and though there is still much more to be done, I am confident that our Programs which are in force are going to contribute largely to our future success. With a positive attitude, enthusiasm and determination there is nothing worthwhile that we cannot accomplish for the good of Masonry in Maine. Thank you, my Brothers, may the years that lie ahead be kind to you, and may the Supreme Grand Architect who has the power to read men's hearts, and understands us all, watch over and protect you.

REPORT OF THE GRAND LECTURER

In Grand Lodge
Portland, Maine
May 5, 1992

To the Most Worshipful Grand Master, Officers and Brethren of the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine:

This past year of ritual instruction has been one of mixed gains and losses. Some lodges have improved in officer attendance at schools of instruction, while others had less attendance than in the previous year. The same holds true for the districts as a whole.

The overall attendance at schools this past year is down 1% from the previous year. The number of lodges with no officer attendance at any school of instruction was eight (8). This is two (2) more than the previous year. Twenty-eight (28) lodges had officers at only one (1) school of instruction, and two (2) of these lodges had only one (1) officer in attendance. Twenty-seven (27) lodges had officer attendance at only two (2) schools of instruction.

Non-ritual schools had the best attendance average and participation among the brethren. It appears that the brethren who attended these non-ritual schools have an interest in more of this type of informational schools.

During the 1990-91 instruction year, a questionnaire was circulated at the non-ritual schools. One question was what can we do to improve attendance at schools of instruction. One of the most frequent responses was to send post cards to the individual lodge officers. This practice had been dropped due to the cost of postage. In its place, was a letter to the Master of each lodge and he was asked to circulate this notification to all of his line officers. This year, as a result of the questionnaire, we returned to the individual card notification. Once again the District Deputies were furnished with cards to be sent to each line officer in his district. Many of the District Deputies complied with enthusiasm, while others objected, and did not send out or circulate these notification cards. It was hoped, that as the craft had indicated they wished a personal notice of schools, that attendance would improve. This was not the case, and will not be repeated next year. It should be noted, that in some areas there was improvement, but overall, attendance was down.

Checkerboarding of schools (staggering) between the districts of the Lecturers still seems to be of benefit, allowing officers to cross over to a neighboring district to attend a school missed in his own district.

This year a special Saturday Breakfast meeting for School of Instruction was held in District 4 at Ira Berry Lodge #128 in Blue Hill. V. W. Harland Hitchings conducted this school and reports the attendance was good and feels this format has merit and should be used on occasion. It creates interest and encourages attendance.

A similar format was used in the 9th District at Moses Webster Lodge #145 at Vinalhaven and also at Island Lodge #89 at Islesboro. These schools were arranged on Saturdays around the noon meal in an attempt to accommodate ferryboat schedules to the islands. V.W. Arthur Frieder conducted these schools in the Master Mason Degree at Vinalhaven and the Fellowcraft Degree at Islesboro. In these two cases, scheduling of schools on the islands for the district results in poor attendance. However, scheduling schools on the islands for individual Lodge instruction in this format results in an excellent turnout. A special school was arranged at Vinalhaven in this format which resulted in 26 officers and members of Moses Webster Lodge attending. It is my opinion that under special circumstances this form of school would improve attendance and benefit the craft. Other members of the Lecturers staff have expressed interest in using the Saturday meeting in some of their districts.

This year there were nine (9) Degree Teams authorized to work. Some were quite active and others not so busy. As of this date, I have received written reports from only two Degree Team Masters, Central Maine Power Degree Team and The Maine State Police Degree Team. I have had some verbal reports throughout the year and am happy to report that the work done by these Teams is most satisfactory and a credit to the Fraternity.

Their knowledge and expertise in Masonic instruction have added much to the schools which they conducted. Both of these gentlemen will be moving on in their Masonic careers in the upcoming year. We wish them the best and thank them for a job well done.

The entire staff of Assistant Lecturers have done an excellent job and I sincerely thank them all.

The Assistant Grand Lecturers and myself met with the Grand Master and Deputy Grand Master on February 29th of this year. We discussed the problems of attendance at our schools and what we might do to create new interest. Plans are being formulated for the new year of instruction.

At this meeting, Trinity Lodge #130 was selected to confer the Master Mason Degree for Grand Lodge, known as Grand Lodge night. The selection was a difficult one as there were four (4) Lodges recommended for this honor by District Deputies on official nomination forms. Several other Lodges were also noted for their fine degree work.

My sincere congratulations to all of these Lodges for their outstanding work.

As I mentioned, plans for the new year are already underway. New approaches to instruction are being considered. If all of us work together, we can turn around this trend of non-attendance at schools of instruction. We must be clear as to the dates and locations of these instructions. Be sure that these dates do not conflict with other bodies at the same lodge hall on that scheduled date. District Deputies must get notification to all lodges in ample time before each school. The Master of each Lodge should make a point of contacting each of his line officers to attend such schools. Only by each Officer in each Lodge making an effort to attend these schools, can we pass on the correct information in our degrees. We can do it!

REPORT OF THE GRAND SECRETARY - 1992

In Grand Lodge
Portland, Maine
May 5, 1992

To the Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine:

Behold how swiftly the sands run, my Brothers. Despite the fact that each day whizzes by ever so quickly, I am happy to report that we are still making progress in many areas. That is not to say, however, that we haven't had our share of failures also.

Several improvements have been made in the office itself. The office has been painted and curtains are up. The Building Trustees were very cooperative in allowing the secretaries to select the colors they wanted the walls painted. When that was done they bought material and sewed the curtains for the windows.

All of the secretaries have given so much of their time and effort to make each day run smoother than the last. These ladies are the most compatible and cooperative group of people I have ever worked with, and I certainly appreciate everything they accomplish daily.

There is no way I can explain the amount of work they do. The computers have added considerably to everyone's work load. In addition to their typing, writing letters, and answering the phones, these ladies handle all the computer printouts, computer dues cards and desk top publishing. All this helps to make your job easier and saves all of us a great deal of money.

This year we had 131 Lodges order dues cards. This indicates that our lodge secretaries realize how much time and money these computer run cards save them. I also know that the system is not perfect and that there are secretaries who prefer not to use them. That is perfectly all right. We will continue to provide this service for any lodge secretary who wishes to take advantage of it.

Because we now have the basic format for the *Proceedings* in the computer, we are able to have the entire copy camera ready before it goes to the printers. This saves us up to \$6,000 annually.

You've perhaps noticed that I had the address area and postal permit put on the back cover of last year's *Proceedings*. It will be done the same way again this year. This also saves a great deal of time and money. We no longer have to have a secretary package these books before mailing them. Now one of the secretaries attaches the address labels to the back cover, the books are then sorted and bagged, and they are ready for bulk mailing. Each day we learn more and more the value of these computers and how they help us to stay within our budget.

Again this year like last, our major problem has been trying to get the Annual Returns in on time. That problem was compounded because we also had to get the four year membership check done this year.

To you delegates who are going to be Masters of your lodges in the future. Please be aware that the deadline for the Annual Returns is February 1st of each year. The Annual Return form is sent out in December with a

worksheet and specific instructions enclosed. Yet, year after year, some lodge secretaries have the same problem with deadlines.

I find it difficult to understand why these forms cannot be returned by the date and deadline which is established by our Constitution. When your lodge secretaries get these reports in late, that means it will cost us, you and Grand Lodge, time and money. I must again write letter after letter to some secretaries to try to get this information. If I get no answer, then I use the telephone. Time and space does not allow me to list the money spent on postage and phone calls to get the information which all lodge secretaries should be responsible for sending us. I must emphasize that the problem is with some and not all of the secretaries.

Every four years, by Constitutional regulation, we must reconcile our membership files to be certain that our numbers are similar to yours. This year, and henceforth, we will send printouts to your secretary and ask him to make the corrections on the printout itself and return it to us.

Those who have ordered copies of the *Maine Masonic Text Book* will be receiving them very shortly. That project turned into an ordeal that dragged on much too long. The entire book has been read and reread completely several times, and the "Digest of Decisions" in the back of the book is now all up to date.

In the future, the only portion of the *Maine Masonic Text Book* that will be redone and published will be the "Digest of Decisions." Very little, if anything, changes in the front part of the book, so why publish the book in its entirety? You will be getting more information about this in my newsletters and the *Maine Mason*.

Last fall the Grand Master appointed a committee to review and make suggestions for revisions of the Grand Lodge *Constitution and Digest of Decisions*. The members of that committee are Ill, Franklin G. Hinckley, Chmn.; M.W. John E. Anagnostis, Gr. Sec.; R.W. Waino T. Ray, PDDGM; R. W. Hollis G. Dixon, PDDGM, & Sec. of Gov. William King Lodge in Scarborough; and Wor. Wayne T. Adams, P.M. of Arundel Lodge in Kennebunkport.

We want your suggestions. You are welcome to come into any of our meetings and give us your ideas, or you are welcome to give them to any of the above mentioned members personally or in writing. We are making progress, but you need to know that it is a long and tedious undertaking.

Finally, Brethren, I am planning four Secretaries' Workshops this year. They are tentatively scheduled for Saturdays in September, but that could change. I know that many of the Secretaries have jobs and work on Saturdays; therefore, I will be very willing to take suggestions about accommodating everyone that I can. If you can't be present, you can write to me and I will be happy to incorporate your ideas in the workshops.

The really good news is that we worked hard to stay within our budget and have accomplished that again this year. As always my office is here to provide a service for each of you. Call or stop in to see us about anything we can do to help you run your Lodge more efficiently.

DEMOLAY IN MAINE REPORT

To The Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine:

It is a pleasure to make this report to the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine.

I started the year 1992 with a renewed feeling of enthusiasm and excitement for Maine DeMolay and I honestly feel that 1992 will be our best year yet. We have had a lot happen already in 1992 and there are a lot of additional good things planned for this year. Our membership goal for 1991 was met and we exceeded the goal the Grand Master of DeMolay, Russell C. Wells set for us by 33 1/3%. Our goal for 1992 that I have set is to have a new increase in membership, which means to have more new members initiated than those reaching majority.

We held a most successful "DAD" Program on January 18th at the Auburn Masonic Hall where 16 Advisors were certified. Our two new Certified Instructors, "Dads" Richard W. Thackeray, Sr. and James C. On Friday night, we will be holding an Alumni Banquet at the Auburn Masonic Hall, in which we will start our Maine DeMolay Alumni Association. The following day, Saturday, May 23rd, we will be holding the Grand Masters State Membership Class, in honor of our new Grand Master of Maine Masons, Most Worshipful George P. Pulkkinen. Brother Pulkkinen has been a great supporter of Maine DeMolay and we know he will continue to be a big help to us. In addition to Most Worshipful Pulkkinen, we will also honor Most Worshipful Jerry Samet, who wears the hats of two Grand Masters, the Grand Master of Masons in the District of Columbia and Grand Master of DeMolay. Our goal for the Grand Masters Membership Class is 100 candidates, which will certainly be a great tribute to these two great DeMolay supporters and distinguished Masonic leaders.

We will again, sponsor the DeMolay/Labo Japanese Student Exchange Program, which was so successful last year, however, this year, we have committed Maine DeMolay for 17 exchange students to be in Maine during the month of August. Our annual Maine DeMolay Conclave '92 will again, be held at the University of New England in Biddeford, on Friday, Saturday and Sunday, June 26th, 27th and 28th. This was an excellent facility for our Conclave last year and we are looking forward to an excellent and even better Conclave '92.

One good thing that is happening in Maine DeMolay that makes me extremely happy and encouraged, is that a great many young Senior DeMolays that were active DeMolays while I have been Executive Officer, have come back from college or the service, joined the Masonic Fraternity and have become active DeMolay Advisors of their chapters. DISTRIBUTION OF THE CHARITY FUND

In Grand Lodge

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine:

Amid the uncertainties of the slumping economy one might expect the requests for assistance to soar this past year. However, the applications for relief dropped from 57 in 1990 to 43 in 1991. Hopefully, this is an indication that our brethren and their families are doing well and I am persuaded that this is the case. If not, we must be constantly alert to alleviate the need of our brethren and how a personal interest in their lives. This must be done in a confidential manner and without embarrassment to the brethren or their widows.

The trustees are pleased to report contributions of \$105,439.57 to our brethren and their families this past year. This compares with \$118,399.79 in the prior year, a drop of some \$13,000.00. Brethren, the theme of this report is that we have the resources to extend relief well beyond the amount granted this past year.

Not reflected in the above amount granted last year is \$351.00 to lodges for dues of members who need financial help. This is only done when lodges feel that they do not have sufficient funds of their own to remit these dues.

The committee also approved a contribution of \$250.00 to Joshua Boulanger to enable him to participate in a trip to Archangel, Russia, in a student exchange program. Joshua is a member of the Frank S. Land Chapter of DeMolay in South Portland.

This past year your Charity Foundation has made the following contributions that are Masonic related.

\$ 3,000.00	to the DeMolay & Pine Tree Youth Foundation
\$30,000.00	to the Grand Lodge Scholarship Program
\$ 5,000.00	to the Program for the Prevention of Drug and Alcohol Abuse
\$ 1,796.44	dues to the Masonic Service Association
\$10,000.00	to the M.S.A. for the Hospital Visitation Program.

Here I must note that the sum of \$50,000.00 was granted by the subordinate lodges from their own charity funds to the brethren making a combined total of \$155,000.00 for Masonic Relief to the Masons of Maine. This is commendable but we should strive to do better.

REPORT ON FOREIGN RELATIONS

In Grand Lodge
Portland, Maine
May 5, 1992

To the Grand Master, Officers and Members of the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine:

The duties of the Committee on Foreign Relations have changed quite a lot in the past couple of years. Where once we reviewed the Proceedings of Sister Grand Lodges and reported on them in the Annex, we now review nothing but the trends of Masonry in general and report on those new Grand Lodges who ask for recognition and exchange of Representatives by this Grand Lodge.

In last year's report, M.W. Dr. Glassmire wrote extensively about Prince Hall Masonry and its effect on the Grand Lodges of North America. The first Grand Lodge to recognize Prince Hall Masonry as legitimate was the Grand Lodge of Connecticut, then came the Grand Lodge of Nebraska, the Grand Lodge of Washington State and the Grand Lodge of Wisconsin. The Grand Lodge of Georgia immediately took action to sever connections with these Grand Lodges and stated that they would also sever relations with any other Grand Lodge recognizing Prince Hall Masonry as legitimate. This is most unfortunate, since other Grand Lodges may follow the suit of the Grand Lodge of Georgia. The Grand Lodge of Maine has no bar for race, creed or color in its Constitution, and this is as it should be, for I feel that all men are created equal. Since we know of no Prince Hall Masons in the State of Maine, we feel there is no need for us to take any action on this problem at the present time.

The only foreign Grand Lodge asking for recognition this year is the Grand Lodge of Cuba in Havana. Since their letter merely gives a list of their new officers and makes no statement of principles, and since the Committee on Recognition of the Grand Master's Conference makes no mention of Cuba, we do not feel that Cuba should be recognized by the Grand Lodge of Maine at this time.

In the EMESSY NOTES for March, 1992, the Masonic Service Association mentions that new Grand Lodges in Yugoslavia, Czechoslovakia, Hungary and Poland have been formed and will undoubtedly be asking for recognition in the near future. At the Spring meeting of the Maine Lodge of Research it was voted to send \$50.00 to each of these struggling Grand Lodges, and we heartily approve of this action.

Most Worshipful Grand Master, I move the acceptance of this report and that the recommendations therein be adopted.

He served as Master of Casiphia Lodge No. 551 in Mount Joy in 1973-1974; as Treasurer in 1976-1977 and as Representative in the Grand Lodge from 1978 through 1983. He was appointed District Deputy Grand Master for the 1st Masonic District in 1977 and was created a Past District Deputy Grand Master in 1983 when he left that office to assume the station of Junior Grand Warden. Since 1984, Brother Stoner has served on the Committee on Masonic Homes and the Consolidated Fund Committee. He is a member of the Board of Directors of the Pennsylvania Masonic Foundation for the Prevention of Drug and Alcohol Abuse Among Children and is the Chairman of the Board of Directors of the Pennsylvania Youth Foundation.

Born and raised in Lancaster, Brother Stoner was educated in the Hempfield School District and was graduated from Pennsylvania State University in 1961 with a Bachelor of Science Degree.

In 1966, Brother Stoner joined the accounting firm of Dorwart, Andrew and Co. He was admitted to the partnership of that firm in 1973. At present he is an audit partner and is in charge of the firm's continuing professional education. He is a member of the American and Pennsylvania Institutes of CPA's and served as president of the South Central Chapter PICPA in 1980-1981. He has served as chairman of several PICPA committees.

Brother Stoner is a member of Zion Lutheran Church in Landisville. He is currently an usher there, as well as being a Financial Teller and Chairman of the Endowment Fund Committee. Formerly, he has been a member of both the church's choir and Church Council.

In the community, Brother Stoner has served as a member of the Board of Directors of the Kiwanis Club of Lancaster. He is a former board member of Lutheran Social Services, East Region, and has served on the organization's Finance Committee.

Brother Stoner is a member of Lancaster Royal Arch Chapter No. 43; Goodwin Council No. 19, Royal and Select Masters as well as Lancaster Commandery No. 13, Knights Templar. Further, Brother Stoner has brought his professional expertise in finance to York Rite Masonry by currently serving a five year position on the Knights Templar Education Foundation Scholarship Committee.

In the Scottish Rite, he is a Past Thrice Potent Master of the Lancaster Lodge of Perfection where he serves presently as Trustee, and he is also a member of the Valley of Harrisburg.

He was coroneted an honorary member of the Supreme Council, Thirty-third Degree, in Boston, in 1984.

Brother Stoner's other Masonic affiliations include membership in Zembo Temple, A.A.O.N.M.S. and the Lancaster County Shrine Club. He is also a member of the High Twelve Club, York Conclave, Red Cross of Constantine; Sovereign Council No. 103, Allied Masonic Degrees and the International Supreme Council, Order of DeMolay for Boys, in which he also holds both the Legion and the Cross of Honor. In DeMolay, Brother Stoner served as Lancaster Chapter Advisor and Council Chairman.

Brother Stoner married Phyllis L. Lamson in 1965. They are the parents of two daughters, Karen Elizabeth and Cheryl Lynn.

R.W. Brother Scott, for your many contributions to Freemasonry I am happy to award you with Maine's highest award for Distinguished Service to Masonry, the Josiah Hayden Drummond Medal.

REPORT OF THE FEASIBILITY STUDY COMMITTEE FOR A MASONIC HOME

In Grand Lodge
Portland, Maine
May 5, 1992

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine:

The Committee established to study the feasibility of a Masonic Home has diligently attended to its duties, has completed the study, and is now ready to make its recommendations. We have pursued many avenues, assessed, reassessed, questioned, and discussed at length all the options and now, unanimously make the following recommendations:

#1. We agree that the Independent Living Facility Cluster is the most desirable, is feasible, and is the option which should be pursued. However, this does not exclude other types of facilities which might be more appropriate in certain instances.

#2. We recommend that each project should be done locally, with local control, supported locally and financed locally.

#3. We recommend that the Grand Lodge supply a facilitator to provide expertise in arranging, processing, and financing to any locality, upon request, which is considering the construction of such a facility.

An Independent Living Facility Cluster already in successful operation in Bath, Maine has, at the present time, nineteen couples on the waiting list which is indicative of the great need. This facility may be seen by interested persons at any time.

We are confident that Maine Masons can accomplish anything they desire. In fact, we are so confident and have so much faith in our Brethren, that we, the ten members of this Committee, have pledged \$5,000.00 to the locality that first initiates and pursues the construction of such a facility.

I want to thank every member of the Committee for their contribution of time, effort, and unselfish dedication these last two years. Participation of the members has been outstanding.

Now that this Committee has performed its duties, made its determinations, and presented its recommendations, I move the acceptance of this report, the recommendations adopted, and the Committee be dismissed.

The fund raising activities of this Foundation is an ongoing program. Donations are received daily from individual Brethren, Lodges, Masters and Wardens Associations, Past District Deputies Associations and other Masonic affiliated groups. This last year we received over \$96,000.00 from individual donations through our direct appeal program, a goodly amount to be sure.

We also received numerous gifts including the very special \$5,000.00 donation from the Grand Royal Arch Chapter of Maine. The 6th Masonic District's Past District Deputies Association continues to be the greatest fund raisers and having a good time doing it. Considerable funds were received from the Grand Master's sale of Masonic hats and jackets.

The distribution of these funds is greater and more varied every year. Forty-one school systems received grant monies from this program this year for a variety of programs such as Peer Helpers training, Staff training, Student awareness, Parenting programs and many others. Special grants have been made to local Police Departments, Sheriff Departments in support of the most popular D.A.R.E. projects. Other special grants have been made to Camp Kieve in Nobleboro and to the All American Sam S.A.F.E.T.Y. program. New involvement this year was providing the facilities of the Auburn Masonic Temple and Trinity Lodge in Presque Isle for 4 day training workshops for area teachers and Village Lodge in Bowdoinham for a 2 day workshop. At these meetings we provided the facilities and the Eastern Star Ladies provided refreshments and noon lunches. We anticipate that there will be numerous opportunities for other Lodges hosting Teacher Training workshops this year.

We continue to support the National Red Ribbon Program in October with more and more Lodges getting involved. We distributed 15, 000 red ribbons to our schools last year.

Hiram Lodge No. 180 suffered the greatest loss (21). Average membership is 160 and 60 lodges reported fewer than 100 members.

MASONIC EDUCATION AND LODGE SERVICE REPORT

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine:

Lodge Leadership and Development Program: The Committee on Masonic Education and Lodge Service has continued to focus its energies and human resources on the Lodge Leadership and Development Program. The basic premise or assumption underlying this focus is the belief that the success of a constituent lodge is directly related to the quality of the leadership, goal-setting, and planning skills that a lodge Master possesses. This has certainly proved to be true in those lodges that have experienced an outstanding year.

This past year marked the third year in the implementation process and progress is being noted. Lodge Masters, with the support and cooperation of District Deputies and District Representatives, have completed the self-assessment phase of the program and many of them have used the results to plan short and long-range goals designed to bring about improvements in areas of need.

The Special Assistants to the Grand Master, R.W. George P. Pulkkinen and R. W. Donald B. Wiswell, have done an outstanding job providing support services to the District Deputies assigned to them and the Committee commends them for their efforts.

Two seminars were conducted this past year to assist the District Deputies, District Representatives, and the Grand Wardens to gain a better understanding of the program and to develop strategies for serving as mentors to lodge Masters and Wardens. The first was held on September 7th in Augusta and the Second on April 11th in Fairfield.

District Representatives: The District Representatives, working in conjunction with the District Deputies, have a very important role to play in the implementation and coordination of educational programs in their districts. In those districts where the Deputies and Representatives have worked together as a team some very positive results have been achieved. The Committee hopes that this trend will continue and that all Deputies and Representatives will work collaboratively in their districts.

Masonic Retreat: In an effort to provide stimulating programs of Masonic education to interested Masons at-large, the Committee has planned a Masonic retreat to be held in Oakland on May 9th. This retreat will focus

on five major questions relating to the ritual, philosophy, and the status of Masonry in today's society. There will be presenters for each question to help those in attendance focus on the theme followed by small group discussions and analysis. The groups will then reassemble for group reports on issues that arose and possible solutions. If this retreat proves successful additional ones will be scheduled in the future. R.W. Walter M. Maccougall has chaired the planning committee for this event and the Committee commends him for the fine job he has done during the planning process.

Masonic Programs and Speakers Bureau: R.W. John E. Gray continues to coordinate the Masonic Speakers Bureau which is a valuable resource for Deputies, Representatives, and lodge Masters. Although it is being utilized to some extent, the Committee believes that it is not being utilized to its fullest and strongly urges lodges to take advantage of this very valuable program.

General Status of Lodge Programs: A majority of the lodges have Active Care and Share Programs as well as programs for their widows which usually include an annual banquet and a program of entertainment in their honor. The Pollard Plan for Candidate Instruction is being utilized but the extent of its use varies greatly between lodges. Some utilize just the basic Pollard Plan booklets while others use some or all the elements contained in the comprehensive program for candidate instruction including the Four-night Program.

Many individual lodges as well as Districts are giving their support to the Rainbow and DeMolay Masonic youth organizations and are calling upon them to present programs at lodge meetings. The Committee hopes that this support will not only continue, but expand as well.

Conclusion: The Committee has been very active this past year as it continues its quest to support the lodges to broaden the scope and quality of their programs. We have come to the full realization that success is the journey and not the destination. The quest is a never ending one. I commend the members of the Committee for their dedication and hard work and want to recognize them at this time for their commitment to the Grand Lodge of Maine: Wor. Wayne T. Adams, R.W. Wilbur F. Loveitt, R.W. Walter M. Maccougall, R.W. Reginald W. Wing, R.W. John E. Gray, and R. W. J. Michael LaChance. To each of you I extend my sincere thanks and appreciation for your dedication and hard work and the support you have given me the past two years as Committee chairman.

The Grand Master asked to have Worshipful Brother Harry Norwood Kearney presented in the East.

HARRY NORWOOD KEARNEY

Brother Harry N. Kearney was born on October 29, 1918. Much of his education took place in Bangor and Ellsworth. He graduated from Fryeburg Academy in Fryeburg.

Even at the early age of twelve, Harry was interested in organizations which provided a service. That was the time when he joined the Boy Scouts. On April 11, 1935, Harry received his Eagle Scout Award, an award as we all know is the highest that any Boy Scout can receive.

Later on, Brother Harry joined the National Guard in Bangor and served in the Pacific Theater during World War II. Before going overseas, Harry married Louise Ward of Naples. This union brought forth two daughters, Patricia Louise and Colleen Elaine. Both daughters are now married and still live in Maine. Harry and his wife now live in Caribou.

Much of Brother Harry's employment evolved from his interest for the outdoors. Shortly after his graduation from high school he worked for York's Twin Pine Camps of Katahdin. He was a Fish and Game Warden, serving in Greenville, Turner, and Baxter State Park. He left the Game Warden Service in 1969. Bro. Harry's personality and character is not of the kind that allows him to sit home for any length of time, so he worked for the I. R. S. from 1972 to 1985 and retired for a second time at the age of 67.

Retirement doesn't mean sitting home for Bro. Kearney. He is still very actively pursuing his love for the outdoors. His wife, Louise, tells me that he is a "die-hard conservationist." He is currently involved in efforts to restore salmon to the Aroostook River. His hobbies include photography, fly tying, cooking, and reading.

Brother Harry was raised in Nezinscot Lodge No. 101 on December 5, 1967. This opened up another opportunity which allowed Brother Harry to be of service to his fellow man once again. Eventually, he affiliated with Caribou Lodge No. 170, was appointed to the line and elected as Master for the first time in 1976 and again in 1984. He also held the office of secretary for a while.

On the suggestion of R. W. Don McAllister, M. W. John Anagnostis appointed Brother Kearney the M.S.A. Field Agent to the Cary Veteran's Home in Caribou when it opened. How fortunate we were to have him accept that nomination. Since his appointment, he has given many hours of dedicated service not only to the Masons but to all the residents of that facility.

Brother Harry, you have served the Craft and your fellow man long and well. It is with a great deal of pride and joy that I present to you the Simon Greenleaf Medal in recognition of dedicated service in the name of Masonry.

M. W. Brian L. Carley, Grand Master of Vermont was invited to the lecturn to speak for the visiting dignitaries:

M.W. Brian L. Carley: "Thank you, Most Worshipful Grand Master, Robert V. Damon for the honor of allowing me to respond for the distinguished guests of your sister jurisdictions and the collateral bodies of this Grand Jurisdiction of Maine, and let me assure you that they are enjoying this Annual Communication. They have expressed to me their appreciation for the hospitality extended to them here in the Pine Tree State. The little goody bags of Maine products were extra nice but personally I was somewhat concerned about MAINE maple syrup." RICHARD E. FLETCHER
OF
THE MASONIC SERVICE ASSOCIATION

Grand Master, Good Afternoon my brothers, I have to bring you a couple of sad notes this afternoon, but it is information that I think you need to know about. As many of you know Brother Tom Dougherty, the Director of Hospital Visitation had some heart problems in February and fortunately he was in the hospital being treated for acute bronchitis when he suffered a heart attack. They were right there on him in no time and I am pleased to report that he is progressing well and he is in therapy. He is at home and we send his work, his letters and things, home and if you don't think he is busy, call the Secretarys; they will tell you just how busy he has been. His progress is looking pretty good.

The other one that I don't think you have heard about, and again I am awfully sorry to tell you this one but before I tell you, I have to say things are looking good here too. Stu Pollard was in Hawaii on vacation and unfortunately he too suffered a heart attack. He is now home and is recovering very nicely. I talked with him on the phone last Friday. Now I don't want to tell you that prying information out of Stu is difficult, but it reminds me of the two Vermonters who met and one said "How's your wife" and the other one said "None of your darn business and if you weren't my Brother I wouldn't have told you that much. Stu is doing well, and I am sorry to have to bring you this sad news. The happy news is that both of them are doing very very well.

I did want to call your attention to the fact that when I was telling you about Stu Pollard that he did write the April 1992 Short Talk Bulletin. I hope all of you have seen it - it is called "Why I became a Mason". It is a collection of stories that Stu put together from around the country on different men. He asked them the question why they became a Mason? It started because a Master in Virginia had his program fall through at the very last moment so he looked at the Brethren and said, "Brothers, the program tonight is, Why did you become a Mason?" from that beginning Stu has collected all these stories, and he has put out a super Short Talk Bulletin. If you don't have it and would like a copy, see me after the meeting and I'll be more than glad to work with you on obtaining a copy.

There is one more thing that I would like to talk with you about that I think is very very important. (Brother Fletcher was interrupted with a ballot report - this happened several times during his talk and he was very gracious about the whole thing) To continue, the other item I wanted to talk with you about you heard alluded to this morning. I could talk with you about our hospital visitation program which has been mentioned many times today and we appreciate all of the superb work that is done here in Maine. We are very proud of all that you do here to support us. You heard talk, just a little bit, about an appeal for Eastern Europe. The Conference of Grand

Masters authorized the MSA to put out an appeal on behalf of the emerging Grand Lodges of Eastern Europe. My Brothers, what I have tried to say is please try to imagine that we are sitting here and it is forty years ago and we are in Hungary, Romania, Czechoslovakia or Poland having a masonic meeting and the doors get kicked in and a representative of the Government comes in and says :You are illegal, your assets have been seized, this building now belongs to the Government, everything in the building belongs to the Government. You are no more, your leaders are going to jail - that happened. Today these Grand Lodges are re-emerging and they don't even know what they are getting back or of what they get back, what kind of shape it will be in. I was talking with Jess Mitton the Grand Secretary of the American-Canadian Grand Lodge who is working with us in this effort because they are over there and they are on the scene. In one of the countries in Eastern Europe the Grand Lodge doesn't even know when it's going to get it's building back and there is so much wiring and things in there they just don't know when they are going to get to use the building. The appeal is real, my brothers. These brethren, some of them are in there 70's and 80's, are trying to get younger men to become Masons and they need help. They are starting from scratch. But they have, for the first time in forty or fifty years, freedom - what we take for granted. So I would urge you to help us in this appeal so that we can help these emerging Grand Lodges.

Grand Master can you join me here for a moment. I don't see anyone coming through the door. At this time it gives me a great deal of pleasure on behalf of the Masonic Service Association to present to you M.W. Robert V. Damon this Certificate of Appreciation with words of praise for your many many contributions to the craft.

Grand Master: Thank you, Brother Fletcher, I am truly overwhelmed by this recognition.

The final ballot report was given (the results of which were noted earlier in the Proceedings) and M. W. M. Donald Gardner returned the gavel to the Grand Master to continue with the business at hand.

CONDITION OF THE FRATERNITY

In Grand Lodge
Portland, Maine
May 5, 1992

TO THE MOST WORSHIPFUL GRAND LODGE OF MAINE:

CONDITION

Inspection reports were received by the Committee on Condition of the Fraternity from 195 of the 198 lodges in this jurisdiction. Your Committee was impressed with the results of 44 Excellent, 83 Very Good, 50 Good, 8 Fair, 3 Poor, and 7 No Rating of ritual at inspections. These results show a ratio of 127 Excellent and Very Good to 61 Good or below this year compared to a ratio of 96 Excellent or Very Good to 96 Good or below last year. Hopefully this trend will continue as we endeavor to improve ritualistic expertise in our constituent lodges.

Many of the District Deputy Grand Masters reports indicated more new officers in the line of succession to Master. This is a positive note in the opinion of your Committee.

Visibility in the community continues to improve with a number of lodges holding public breakfasts, lunches, or dinners followed by an open house. Many lodges are also undertaking renovations both inside and outside of their buildings. What a wonderful way for a lodge to promote a positive awareness in the community! Continued support of the Drug and Alcohol Abuse Prevention Program and the Scholarship Program also promote lodge publicity in the area.

A brief explanation of the numbers in the above summary is required. Although 195 inspection reports were received, not all reports were accompanied by the 1A supplement and not all 1A supplements were completely filled out. As a result, complete information was available on only 182 lodges.

When one makes a summary table as listed above, many conclusions can be drawn from the information. However, when a majority of the numbers are in the Good or Excellent category, we can conclude that those programs are doing well statewide.

Most lodges which have a Widows and a Care and Share Program do well in keeping track of and recognizing widows and visiting or calling on ill and

and elderly members.

Nearly all lodges have a Past Masters Night with a supper, but many more activities could be planned such as Ladies Nights, Brotherhood Nights, Programs with Speakers, etc.

Support of Youth Activities (Rainbow and DeMolay) remained much the same as last year with 151 lodges participating.

District activities also remained much the same with the more active lodges participating in Masters and Wardens Associations, Schools of Instruction, and District meetings. We had a few more lodges drop to the Poor rating in this category and urge those lodges to make more of an effort to participate in District functions. A carload of Brethren to visit another lodge can be a fun thing to do.

We listed a new category of Publicity this year and found that the majority of lodges do a poor job of publicizing their meetings and activities. The 22 lodges that rated Good or better on Publicity are the most outstanding lodges in the State. Think about it! An item in the local newspaper to publicize a meeting costs nothing. A monthly or seasonal trestleboard is *money well spent*.

DDGM REPORTS

Twenty-three of the twenty-four District Deputy Grand Masters submitted reports to the Grand Lodge this year. The reports were concise, uniform, and well done. Many included recommendations which will be considered by the appropriate Grand Lodge committee. The reports of Districts 5, 6, 9, 14, 17, 19, and 22 were considered outstanding by your Committee.

SUMMARY

The Fraternity is in a more promising position for future growth than any time in the recent past. Only a few lodges are experiencing difficulty in maintaining a positive outlook for their future. Hopefully we can all offer assistance to those lodges in need of support.

Many lodges are undertaking renovations of their buildings. A few new buildings are under construction, and many others are planning changes to and renovations of their existing facilities. Plans of this sort seem to generate enthusiasm among the Brethren of a Lodge and in many instances among the people of the community.

We were pleased to note the big improvement in Very Good and Excellent ratings of ritual on inspections. The Grand Lecturer and his Assistants are to be commended for their good work. We still need better attendance at Schools of Instruction from the Stewards and Deacons.

The District Deputy Grand Masters are to be praised for their dedication to Freemasonry. They spend many hours traveling, visiting, planning and submitting reports. We were pleased with the quality of their reports this year.

We continue to see an improvement in visibility of Masons in our communities. The new Lodge Leadership Development Program should be a great asset for Wardens in planning for their year as Master of their Lodge. As we continue our journey through the 1990s to the 21st century, we feel that inspirational leadership with a great deal of enthusiasm for the future of

our great Fraternity will bring success.

Our grateful thanks are expressed to all the Constituent Lodges, Grand Lodge Officers, District Deputy Grand Masters, and Grand Representatives for their efforts on improving the Condition of our Fraternity. We recommend that all recommendations contained in the District Deputy Grand Masters reports be referred to the proper committee.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON AMENDMENTS

In Grand Lodge
Portland, Maine
May 5, 1992

To the Grand Master, Officers and Members of the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine:

1. Proposed:

Sec. 90:2A. One Dollar (\$1.00) per year shall be levied on each member of the constituted lodges of this Grand Lodge for the purpose of preparing, printing, and mailing the Maine Mason to each member of the constituted lodges. These funds for the Maine Mason are mentioned primarily for the Maine Mason but shall not be considered "dedicated" funds. These funds shall be subject to Section 35 of the Constitution as any other Grand Lodge Funds.

This proposal was entertained and, in accordance with Section 137 of the

Constitution, was published with the other Proceedings of the Grand Lodge on Page 347 and sent to the subordinate lodges for their consideration and is now in order to be acted upon.

I move that this Amendment, as published, be adopted.

2. Proposed:

Sec. 60. The Masonic Charitable Foundation, a Maine charitable corporation, established by the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine, Ancient Free and Accepted Masons, shall consist of the Charity Fund of the Grand Lodge, and such other funds or other property as are established or accepted for charitable, education or other specific purposes which are in accord with Masonic principles and practices.

Sec. 61. The Charity Fund of the Grand Lodge shall from time to time be increased by adding thereto such moneys as may be voted into it (See Sec. 75) (1984, p. 642).

Sec. 61(a) The Corporation shall have the care, custody, management and administration of the Museum and Library owned by the Grand Lodge of Maine.

Sec. 62. The interest arising from the charitable funds of the Masonic Charitable Foundation, and such other funds as may be available, may be appropriated in whole or in part, for the relief-

First, to poor and worthy members of lodges, their widows and orphans, under this jurisdiction, in cases where the funds of their own lodges are not adequate to the exigency of the case.

Second, to all other worthy causes within and without the Masonic Fraternity, as the Grand Lodge or the Trustees of the Masonic Charitable Foundation through a Committee of Distribution appointed by the Trustees from their own members may consider worthy of assistance, to the DeMolay and Pine Tree Youth Foundation, and to other charitable, literary, educational research, scientific or medical purposes as the Trustees or the Grand Lodge, may deem appropriate and consistent with Masonic Principles and Practices, and if the whole be not distributed the residue may be used for the payment of ordinary expenses necessary for the proper administration of the funds, and any amount over the appropriation for relief and expenses may be added to the Charity Fund. (1987, pp.443-444)

Sec. 63. The several funds and other property constituting the Masonic Charitable Foundation shall be held in the name of the corporation, but under the management of a Board of Trustees, consisting of the Grand Master, Deputy Grand Master, Grand Wardens, Grand Secretary and six brethren, who are not acting officers of the Grand Lodge, to be elected by ballot for the term of three years; and to constitute a permanent part of the Board. If a vacancy occur in said Board it shall be reported to the Grand Lodge and filled at its next annual communication.

The Board of Trustees thus constituted shall be styled "THE TRUSTEES OF THE MASONIC CHARITABLE FOUNDATION OF THE GRAND LODGE OF MAINE" who shall have authority to.....etc.

This proposal was entertained and, in accordance with Section 137 of the Constitution, was published with the other Proceedings of the Grand Lodge

on pages 347 and 348 and sent to the subordinate lodges for their consideration and is now in order to be acted upon.

I move that this Amendment, as published, be adopted.

Proposal #1 brought several minutes of discussion concerning these funds should *The Maine Mason* cease publication. It was also pointed out that if this proposed amendment did not pass we would have to go back to publishing only two copies of *The Maine Mason* per year. An amendment to the amendment was presented but never accepted and the original amendment was passed.

All of the other amendments were passed as presented.

Standing Regulation No. 63

Resolved, That the general funds of a constituent Lodge may be used to contribute to the support of the International Order of Rainbow for Girls, provided the By-laws of a Lodge so permit, after a majority vote by the members attending a Lodge meeting. Notice of such action to be included in the notice calling a meeting of a constituent Lodge, at which said action is to be taken.

The committee recommends adoption of this regulation.

In calling for the vote the Grand Master explained that he had recommended this action so that the Lodges could assist the Order of Rainbow as they now assist the DeMolay.

The recommendation passed.

The Grand Master had R.W. Charles Plummer presented in the East at this time.

CHARLES WILLIAM PLUMMER

Brother Plummer was born in Lisbon Falls, Maine on April 30, 1934. Following graduation from Lisbon High he served in the U.S. Navy for four years. Upon his discharge in 1956 he entered Farmington State Teachers College graduating in 1961 with a B.S. Degree in Education. In 1967 he was awarded a Master's Degree in Administration and Supervision from the University of Maine at Orono. After 30+ years as a teacher and principal, mostly in the Auburn School District, he retired in 1989 and is presently self-employed as an education consultant and living history performer. He also teaches courses for the Auburn School System and the Thomas College Elderhostel Program.

Brother Plummer was united in marriage on February 17, 1962 to the former Sally Bell and they have one daughter who is a Senior at St. Anselm College in Manchester, N.H..

He was raised in Ashlar Lodge No. 105 in 1974, appointed to the line in 1975, and served as Master in 1981. He served two years as secretary, five years as a member of the Scholarship Committee and is presently a member of the Finance Committee, the Education Committee, and is the Lodge Historian.

He served as District Representative for the 23rd Masonic District in 1982 and 1983 and District Deputy Grand Master in 1984 and 1985. He has been a member of the Committee on Masonic Education for the past six years and is presently Committee Chairman. In 1990 he was presented the Outstanding Mason of the Year Award by the 23rd District Masters and Wardens Association and at the Annual Communication of the Grand Lodge on May 1, 1990, he was elected Senior Grand Warden.

A Charter Member of the Maine Lodge of Research, he has written and presented numerous papers and was elected Master in 1988. He is a very active member of the Grand Lodge Speakers Bureau and has presented numerous programs in Lodges from Maine to Virginia including Leadership Seminars, Advanced Masonic Education Seminars, and living history presentations as some of the more notable Civil War Generals.

He is a member of the Valley of Lewiston-Auburn Ancient Accepted Scottish Rite and is presently Deputy Master of the Lodge of Perfection. He is also a member of the Maine Consistory, the York Rite Bodies, the Kora Shrine of Lewiston and has served as Degree Master of the Kora Kraftsmen for the past two years.

In recognition of your many years of service to mankind as a Freemason, I am pleased to award to you, R.W. Brother Charles W. Plummer, the Distinguished Service Award of the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine, the Josiah Hayden Drummond Medal.

R.W. Charles Plummer thanked the Grand Master and the Brethren for this honor and expressed his love for the Fraternity and his willingness to serve where needed.

GRAND HISTORIAN'S REPORT

In Grand Lodge
Portland, Maine
May 5, 1992

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine, AF& AM:

In reading over many of our older lodge histories, we often find the Historian beginning with a statement to the effect that "it is too bad this story wasn't written years ago when the founding fathers of the lodge were still alive and could tell us what things were like in those early days", or "the records covering the beginnings of the lodge were rather sketchy, as most of them were lost when our temple burned some years ago", or maybe "some members of this lodge were believed to have been active in local, State or national affairs in their time, but nothing appears in the lodge records".

As the bitter attacks on Freemasonry brought about by the Morgan affair began to wind down in the 1840's, the Grand Lodge came to realize that something had to be done before the story of the beginnings of Masonry in Maine was lost and forgotten. The result was legislation passed in 1858 which now appears as Standing Regulation No. 2, which requires each lodge to keep its history current and provide copies to the Grand Lodge periodically. More recently a Grand Historian was appointed to keep the Grand Lodge history up to date.

A good many people find history boring, and have as little to do with it as possible, probably due to the way it was taught to them in school, being little more than memorizing countless names, places and dates. History can be interesting, and I'm going to give a couple of examples taken from the Lodge History of Village Lodge No. 26, of Bowdoinham going back to the days of the War of 1812. They demonstrate that the history of a lodge is more than those things that take place within the four walls of the lodge room.

This particular history brings in the human element by including biographies of the charter members. Here's what it says about one of these, Bro. Solomon Eaton:

"He often related an incident which occurred to him in the time of the War of 1812. At this time he commanded a coasting vessel which ran between the Kennebec River and Boston. Sometime in the former year (?) he sailed laden with a valuable cargo consisting of hemlock bark and a large amount of produce and dairy products. About four hours after leaving the River, he was chased and overtaken by the famous "Liverpool Packet" which before her capture, did an immense amount of mischief on our coast by capturing and destroying merchant vessels. On coming up, the Captain hailed Bro.

Eaton with the order "heave to". Bro. Eaton answering, gave the GHS which to his surprise, he saw immediately recognized. Before the order could be executed, the enemy was alongside and the Captain thus addressed Bro. Eaton, "Hold your course toward Boston. I wish to run to the eastward and visit several vessels which have just left the Kennebec, and I will overtake you."

As soon as Captain Eaton saw him fairly gone, he bore away for Portsmouth, and in two hours, was safely anchored in Pepperells Cove, from thence he reached his place of destination, and returned home in due time with his craft in safety."

Brother Eaton also mentioned the case of other vessels which the same Captain had suffered to escape, whose Masters had made the same mystic appeal. (Bro. Eaton often related this incident and it can be relied on as authentic, as he was a man of the strictest veracity.)

And from the same Lodge history, another incident, this one involving Captain John Rogers, also a Charter member of Village Lodge. He too was a shipmaster and:

"While bound on a voyage to the West Indies with a cargo of lumber and provisions, near his destination, he was brought to and boarded by the crew of a pirate schooner. Some 10 or 12 ruffians of a fierce and savage appearance came rushing on the deck of his brig, and with pistols and cutlasses. On gaining the deck, the leader in broken English inquired for the Captain. Captain Rogers forthwith presented himself and invited the piratical chief below where he furnished a bottle of spirits which both partook, during which time they exchanged "salutations" (sic). The pirate, after a short pause, grasped Captain Rogers' hand, saying "I will leave you", hurried on deck and, after a short harrangue to his fellows concerning the poverty and destitution of their prize, hastened on board his own craft followed by his crew, and shortly was out of sight.

It is a humiliating reflection that Masonry should number among her sons, a pirate or a felon, but we gain some consolation by the consideration that she exerts a power over her initiates which even the most abandoned among them are rarely known to resist."

So much for just one lodge history. There are a good many more like this. While we haven't had many other wars to write about, in recent times, there are a great many things taking place involving our members, that the Brethren of a couple of centuries in the future might like to read about.

Bringing us up to the present, we find lodges are far behind in writing up their histories, and that others leave much to be desired as to their content. On the positive side, others coming in seem to be of better quality and more interesting.

In picking the winner of the Historian's Award for the best one there were three this year in close contention. We have to pick one, however, and we're glad to present the 1992 Historian's Award to:

INSURANCE COMMITTEE REPORT

In Grand Lodge
Portland, Maine
May 5, 1992

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine:

It is with pride and joy that I have this opportunity to give a report on behalf of the Insurance Committee.

Several years ago we agreed that every Lodge shall have the opportunity of having their insurance reviewed by us. Lodges were informed of our services and over 156 Lodges have responded. There are 127 Lodges that have followed our recommendations. Most of these Lodges have been able to buy more coverage for less money thereby collectively they are saving thousands of dollars annually. Over 80% of the Lodges carry broader coverage and higher liability coverage with protection for "Products Liability" claims.

We have found that most Lodges had an insurance policy either covering the building owners or made out in the name of the Lodge only, thereby leaving one of them not insured for their property losses or for liability claims. Another area of great concern is the fact that most Lodges that have an active organization, such as the Order of the Eastern Star, DeMolay, or Rainbow did not have that organization named on their policy to protect them from liability claims.

Every Lodge that has had a survey completed for them has increased their coverage, or increased their liability limits, or included the names of the various organizations using their Lodge, thereby ending up with much better coverage.

This past year there have been several small liability claims and one substantial claim that exceeds \$25,000. There have been several substantial smoke losses and a total fire loss claim to Morning Star Lodge #41 in Litchfield. Even though the Lodge had more than doubled their coverage during the last several years, the amount of coverage they carried was still not adequate.

The total amount of their policy was paid to them 13 days after the loss occurred, plus an additional amount of money for debris removal.

Our knowledge, information, and service to the Lodges has been accepted and appreciated. We have enjoyed serving the Lodges and the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine.

ADDRESS OF THE NEWLY INSTALLED GRAND MASTER

BRETHREN, We've made it to the beginning again. I'm excited...and I hope you are too. New beginnings always mean new opportunities.

Yesterday during the introductions of distinguished guests to this session, R. W. Brother C. Wilfred Brann was among those presented to the East. As I watched him approach I thought about how Brother Wil would soon want to be sailing, which is another of Wilfred's passions, along with Freemasonry and his family.

Seated just behind and to the side of him was R.W. Brother "Pete" Forrest, a deep water yachtsman. There were also fishermen, Navy men, shipbuilders and marine engineers among the assembled brethren.

I suddenly realized how integral a part the sea plays in Freemasonry, not only in the active lives of many of us, but also in the allegory of our lessons.

We learn the lessons of the anchor and ark, how geometry specifies the extent of oceans, and in our EA obligation that the tide ebbs and flows twice in 24 hours.

I was reminded of an article I read long ago about the extra concerns Masters of vessels had when wind on canvas provided the only locomotion for much of the world's commerce.

In those days when a ship neared a harbor approach, the arrival schedule was very much dependent on the natural forces...on the winds, to be sure, but even more so on the tides.

Of course the days of sail were also days before modern dredges shaped and scoured harbor beds to allow round-the-clock navigational access. Often a ship needed near full-tide to reach their wharves and customers for its precious cargo. If the tide were low or ebbing as a ship neared land, it had to lay at anchor or sail parallel to the coast awaiting the flow of the tide.

While waiting for that tide to rise and carry it to the successful conclusion of its journey, the ship was said to be "ob portas" or waiting to go "to the port." From that Latin phrase "ob portas", of course comes our English word "opportunity." The ship was waiting for the tides to provide "opportunity" to achieve its goal...to achieve its success.

Has Freemasonry perhaps been doing the same thing? I ask you has Freemasonry perhaps been making progress but waiting for opportune tides to reach ultimate goals?

If so, the wait is nearly over, brethren, I'm totally convinced the tide of interest is rising and we Freemasons must be ready to rise with that tide.

We have no tricks, no gimmicks. What we do have is a wonderful story of Masonic commitment and caring and sharing to tell to every attentive ear.

You've heard the story over the past two days. At our Grand Lodge Banquet

many of you heard R.W. Scott Stoner, immediate Past Grand Master of Masons in Pennsylvania, tell about the \$2 million dollars American Freemasons donate daily --that's every day--to help those in need.

Then yesterday you heard Gov. McKernan thank Maine Freemasons for our many accomplishments, our many successes, on our part of the fight against drug and alcohol abuse among children. You heard M.W. Brother Ernie Curtis report on our Scholarship and D&A abuse prevention programs here in Maine. You heard him say that another 150 \$500 scholarships will be awarded to members of this year's graduating class of Maine high schools. That makes a total of 550 scholarships since the program began in 1988, \$275,000 worth of Maine Masonic investment in the youth...in the future...in our state.

These facts, these numbers, and the people they affect, are part of our favorable tide. The more we tell the story...the more we share the news...the higher our tide will flood.

We're going to tell them in a special newspaper supplement which will be included in all Maine daily newspapers during Memorial Day Week. 300,000 of the newspapers will be printed and distributed...to tell the story of what we Masons are doing.

Among the information in the Special Supplement will be a list telling the public the name of every town in Maine which has a Masonic lodge.

We'll tell our story at District Meetings, too. These meetings are a critical opportunity to share our message with carefully selected potential members, good men who we feel would have an interest in Freemasonry.

We cannot fail to seize that opportunity. To that end I challenge you District Deputies, District Representatives and other Grand Lodge officers to hold your district meetings in the largest hall in each district...and I challenge the brethren to fill those halls with prospective members and their wives that District Meeting night.

Filling the halls should not be difficult. If every officer of every lodge brings one good non-Mason to his District meeting -- and each of us has at least one non-Mason among our friends, family and acquaintances -- we'll be sharing our marvelous Masonic message with nearly 2000 prospective candidates at our District meetings alone during the year.

Don't ask them to join. Tell them our story and they'll want to join. Then just be handy by with an application or two.

These are exciting times....there are exciting challenges. As R.W. Brother Royce G. Wheeler said earlier this morning together we'll meet them...we'll meet them head on...and together we'll meet them successfully!

The Grand Master's first official act was to thank those who had served on the Installing Suite and to thank them each and everyone for a very special installation service.

The Grand Master then had M.W. Robert V. Damon presented in the East.

ROBERT VERNLEY DAMON

Robert V. Damon was born in Charlotte, Washington County, State of Maine on April 11, 1928, the son of Paul H. and Clara (Hersey) Damon. He received his first education in the Damon Ridge School in Charlotte, completing the eighth grade in 1940. Due to injuries received in an accident he was delayed a year from entering high school. In 1941, he was enrolled in St. Croix High School, Woodland (Baileyville) and graduated with the Class of 1945 as the valedictorian. Assuming that a call for military service would be received within the year, he did not immediately apply for college entrance to further his education, but sought enlistment in the armed forces. Since he was not accepted, he then applied for enrollment at the University of Maine, College of Technology. During under-graduate days, Brother Damon taught school for a time. He graduated from the University of Maine with a Bachelor of Science Degree in Civil Engineering in the Class of 1952.

Following graduation Brother Damon was employed by Phoenix Bridge Company of Phoenixville, Pennsylvania, until called to military service in the latter part of the Korean Conflict. He served with the U.S. Army Construction Engineers in France and Germany. Upon completion of his tour of duty, he was honorably discharged with the rank of Specialist, Third Class, Construction Engineers, and returned to his former employment in Pennsylvania. On his return to New England he was employed in various engineering positions that represented either consultant work or that of civil service on the State level. These employment engagements were in Maine and New Hampshire, and he retired in 1990 from the State of Maine, Department of Transportation, where he was employed in Bridge Design.

He is a Member of the American Society of Civil Engineers and served a year as Secretary of the Maine Chapter. He also belongs to the National Society of Professional Engineers, and is registered as a Professional Engineer in the States of Maine, New Hampshire, Vermont and Massachusetts.

In October 1977, Brother Damon was united in marriage with Shirley Rose Ireland. They have two sons, Henry Ireland of Lewiston and Dana of Minot and four grandchildren.

As a member of Calvary United Methodist Church of Lewiston, he has taken an active part in its affairs and served his Church as Chairperson of the Administrative Council, Chairperson of the Pastor-Parish Relations Committee, a Sunday School teacher and President and Secretary of the Methodist Men's Club.

Brother Damon was initiated into Masonry while living in New Hampshire, and received the Degrees in Horace Chase Lodge, No. 72 F.&A.M. at Penacook in 1963. On returning to Maine, he affiliated with Rabboni Lodge, No. 150 then of Lewiston, served as Worshipful Master in 1968/69. In 1970, he was elected Secretary and filled that office for eight years and declined re-election in order that he might fulfill some other Masonic commitments that would interfere with the duties of a Secretary. Several years later, he was re-elected to that office and so served a total of 14 years in that capacity. In 1976 and 1977 Brother Damon was appointed an Assistant Grand Lecturer by M.W. Donald S. Smith and in 1980 and 1981 M.W. Harlan F. Small appointed him District Deputy Grand Master for the 23rd Masonic District. Brother Damon was elected to the office of Senior Grand Warden in 1985; Deputy Grand Master in 1988 and 1989; and elected and installed

Most Worshipful Grand Master of Maine Masons in 1990, at the One Hundred Seventy First Annual Communication of Grand Lodge at Portland on the first day of May. He serves also as a Grand Representative for the Grand Lodge of Bolivia near the Grand Lodge of Maine.

Other Masonic organizations that Brother Damon belongs to include the Royal Arch Chapter, Dunlap Council, Royal and Select Masters. He was Knighted in Lewiston Commandery, No. 6, Knights Templar, he was elected as its Eminent Commander in 1971, 1972 and 1973. He also served as Right Eminent Grand Commander for the State of Maine in 1978. Other Orders of the York Rite in which he holds membership include the Maine Council, Order of High Priesthood, Maine Council Order of Thrice Illustrious Masters; What Cheer York Rite College of Rhode Island; Dirigo York Rite College of Maine; Colonial Council, Knights Masons of New England and Pine Cone Council, Knights Masons of Maine; the Holy Royal Arch Knight Templar Priests; a Past Sovereign of Eusebius Conclave, No. 3, Knights of the Red Cross of Constantine of Auburn and Past Most Illustrious Grand Sovereign of the Imperial Grand Council of Maine.

In the Ancient Accepted Scottish Rite, Brother Damon received the Degrees of the order in the Valley of Lewiston-Auburn and in Maine Consistory at Portland. In September 1982 at the session of the Supreme Council held at St. Louis, Missouri, he was created a Sovereign Grand Inspector General 33rd and an Honorary Member of the Supreme Council. He was appointed to the office of Standard Bearer in Maine Council of Deliberation in 1982.

Other Masonic Orders in which he holds membership are Oxford Lodge No. 1, Ark Mariners; The Royal Order of Scotland; Maine College, Societas Rosicruciana, The Society of Veteran Freemasons of New Hampshire; Past Officers Association of Maine; The Philaethes Society; The Maine Deputies Association; The Maine Lodge of Research; Major General Henry Knox Lodge of Boston and Kora Temple A.A.O.N.M.S., and is Past President of the Kora Craftsman Club.

Other fraternal organizations in which he holds membership are as follows: Pine Cone Chapter No. 26 OES; Rugged Cross Shrine No. 2, Order of the White Shrine of Jerusalem; Pineland Court, No. 6, Order of the Amaranth; Abou Ben Adhem Lodge No. 23, I.O.O.F., and a member of the Grange for over fifty years. He is also a member of Liberty Rebekah Lodge.

He and Shirley reside at 151 Stetson Road, Auburn, Maine.

M.W. Robert V. Damon, it is my pleasure to present to you for your many outstanding contributions to Masonry in Maine the Josiah H. Drummond Medal.

M.W. Robert V. Damon thanked the Grand Master and the Brethren for this very high and distinguished honor. At this time the Past Grand Master presented the Grand Master's Traveling Jewel to M. W. George P. Pulkkinen knowing full well that it would be worn with pride, dignity, and would receive many, many added miles.

JEWEL AND APRON

M.W. Ernest H. Curtis presented M.W. Robert V. Damon with his Past Grand Master's jewel and M.W. John E. Anagnostis presented him with his Past Grand Master's apron.

M.W. Robert V. Damon thanked these brethren for presenting him with this regalia that now makes him an official Past Grand Master and expressed his personal thanks for all the special help they gave to him during these past two years.

(3) Harold L. Chute, Chairman of the Committee on Investments, submitted the following written report.

April 21, 1992

To the Trustees of the Grand Lodge Charity Fund

Your investment committee of the Trustees of the Charity Fund have met with our financial advisors - Standish, Ayer & Wood Inc. (SAW) of Boston three times during the past year.

At these meetings the advisor, Mr. Larry Manchester, has reviewed for us the current and projected future economic conditions. These meetings include a detailed report on the portfolio. It is interesting to note that we devote one page of the report to our Investment Objectives which are reviewed annually. These objectives include the following statements. "The principal investment objectives of the Grand Lodge portfolio fund are preservation of capital, earning a reasonable current income which will cover operating and charitable expenses, and growth in income. Quality is to be stressed at all times in the portfolio. The fund will pursue a balanced program utilizing both fixed income and equity investments although it is anticipated that a majority of the assets is to be committed to equity investments. The equity component of the endowment fund will range between 60% and 75% of the total fund." This is essentially the same objective we had 26 years ago when I first became associated with the endowment. It has proven to be a very stable and reliable objective.

We had a spectacular year in 1991. This was due mainly to the large equity portion of the portfolio. We have told you this for several years but do not expect this performance of growth to continue indefinitely. One can expect some set-backs over the years. Your treasurer with support of the committee manages independently from SAW a number of smaller amounts of money which we identify as the "Pooled Fund." The current value of our holdings (Some data from 12-31-91 and some 3-31-92) is as follows.

This portfolio will generate approximately 4.5% or \$225,000.00 and give us security plus the growth potential to counteract inflation.

The SAW portion is invested as follows: 33% in U.S. Treasury Bills, U.S. Bonds and Federal Agency bonds and approximately 67% in domestic, international, small cap, and securitized funds. The Securitized Fund is a new addition to our portfolio and these are a class of assets where obligations (bonds) are secured by assets and the cash flows to service those obli-

gations are provided by the cash flows of the underlying assets. Home mortgage loans, car loans and home equity loans are all examples of securitized assets. These have superior risk and return characteristics.

The Grand Lodge Charity Funds performance at the end of 1990 and 1991 was as follows:

A quick mental calculation shows that our stocks had a 30.61% total return and remember about 67% of our total portfolio was in equities. This may never occur again.

There are three persons in the Grand Lodge who have given their unfailing support. They are M.W. Robert V. Damon, John E. Anagnostis, PGM and Grand Secretary and R.W. Bruce S. Tornquist, Grand Treasurer. R. W. Brother Tornquist takes care of the multitude of details required for handling the many important details of these investments.

It has been an honor for your committee to serve the Charity Committee and this Grand Lodge for the past year.

Royal and Select Masters-

Add 1000 to the Common Era. Thus 1992 and 1000=2992.

Knights Templar-

From the Christian Era take 1118. Thus 1118 from 1992=874.

Order of High Priesthood-

To the Christian Era add 1913, the Year of the Blessing. Thus: 1992 and 1913=3905.

MASONIC CALENDAR

Ancient Craft Masons commence this era with the creation of the world, calling it *Anno Lucis* (A.D.), "in the year of light."

Scottish Rite, same as Ancient Craft, except the Jewish chronology is used, *Anno Mundi* (A.M.), "in the year of the world."

Royal Arch Masons date from the year the second temple was commenced by Zerubbabel, *Anno Inventionis* (A.I.), "in the year of the discovery."

Royal and Select Masters date from the year in which the temple of Solomon was completed, *Anno Depositionis* (A. Dep.), "in the year of the deposit."

Knights Templar commence their era with the organization of their Order, *Anno Ordinid* (A.O.), "in the year of the Order."

Order of High Priesthood dates from the year of the blessing of Abraham by the High Priest Melchisedec, *Anno Benefacio* (A.B.), "in the year of the blessing."
