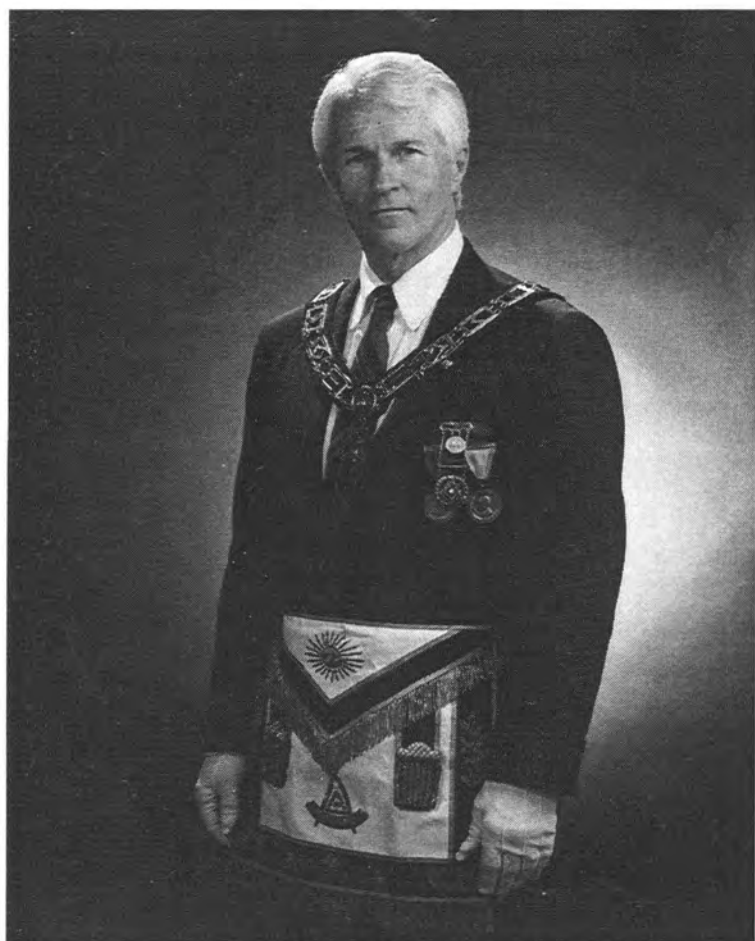

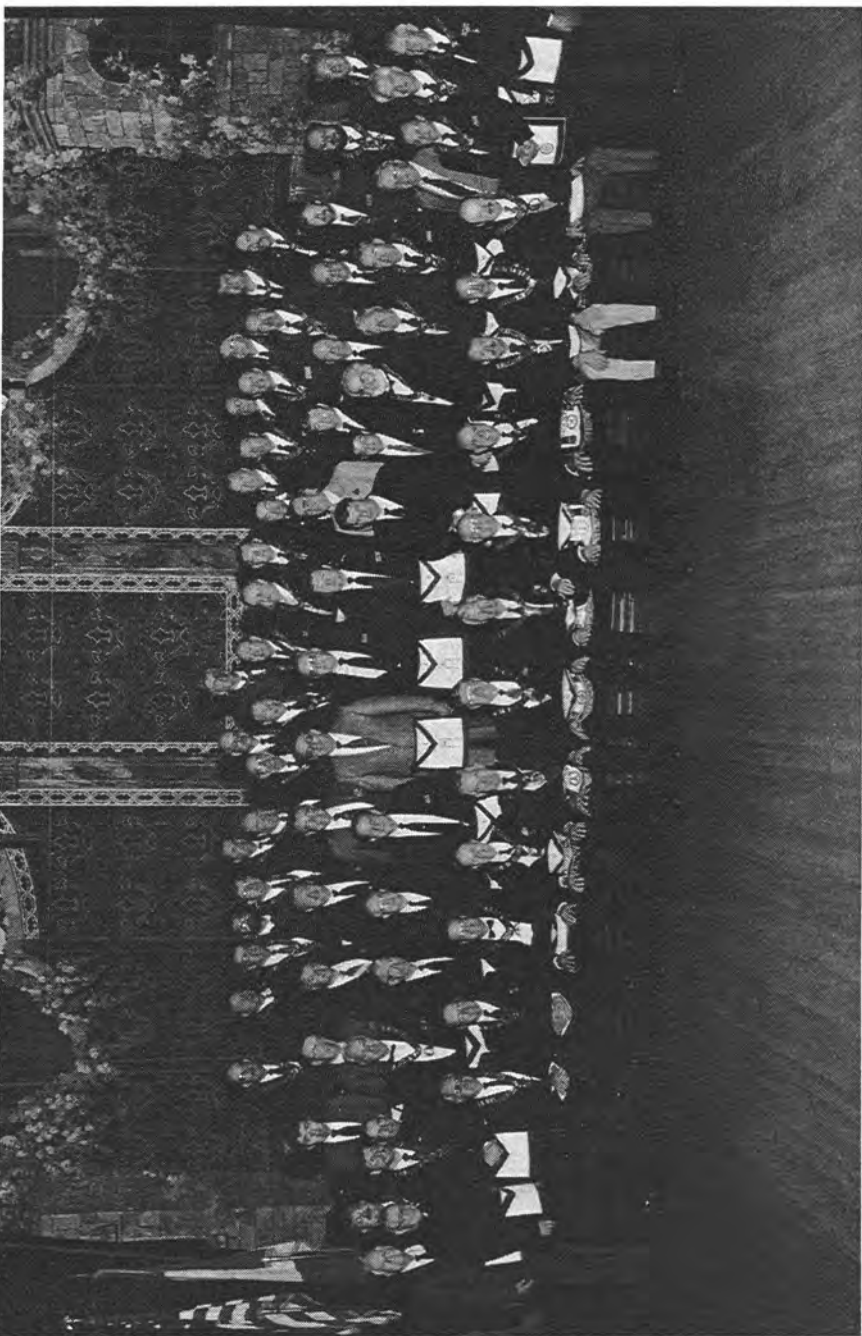

### DAVID CLEVES FAIRBAIRN

R.W. Brother David Cleves Fairbairn was born August 21, 1926 at Boston, Massachusetts. He attended public school in the Boston area, graduating from Braintree High School.

Active in the Boy Scouts during his youth, Brother Fairbairn received his Eagle Scout Badge before entering the U.S. Navy where he served as Signal Master aboard a Destroyer escort. Following his Navy years, he entered Boston University where he earned a degree in Business Marketing. A man of broad interests even at an early age, Brother Dave was a member of the wrestling, tennis and fencing teams at BU where he also crewed and played the flute and piccolo in the university band.

He also has earned a private pilot's license.

While at BU, Dave started dating the woman that was to become his wife. Married in 1950, Brother Dave and Pat moved to Augusta to start their own business. They also raised three children. A son, Kenneth, who also was a member of Augusta Lodge, worked in the business until a fatal accident took his life. Dave and Pat also have two daughters, Brenda Larrabee, who is in business with her husband in Gardiner, and Janet Fairbairn, who holds a Masters Degree from Yale and is now a professor at Fedonia University.

Brother Fairbairn petitioned Augusta Lodge #141 early in 1958, and was raised to the Sublime Degree on May 27 of that year. He served as Worshipful Master in 1967 and District Deputy Grand Master in 1981-82. He has also been active in both York and Scottish Rites, and is a past presiding officer of all the York Rite Bodies in Augusta.

Vitaly interested in youth, Brother Fairbairn served as Dad Advisor to Capital City Chapter of DeMolay for several years.

As extensive as has been his organized commitment to the Craft for nearly 35 years, Brother David Fairbairn's contributions to Freemasonry extend far beyond what can be chronicled merely in membership cards or years of service. He has been a driving force for Freemasonry in the Capital City area, a Brother always at or near the center of Masonic ideas, ideals and activities such as the 11th District Trestle Board and special programs to provide for the needy. R.W. Brother Fairbairn repeatedly demonstrates, in the most appropriate manner, an outlook that focuses properly and positively; one that makes good men respond to need in the right ways.

For all these reasons, and more it is with great pride, great pleasure, that I present to R.W. David C. Fairbairn, on behalf of the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine, the Simon Greenleaf Medal for Meritorious Service

to Masonry.

Before presenting Brother Fairbairn with the Greenleaf Medal, the Grand Master gave some interesting off-the-cuff remarks about the multi-faceted contributions Brother Fairbairn has made in the past and is still making.

*Brother David Fairbairn:* "Thank you very, very much. I'm just speechless. This is the biggest surprise of my life. All I can say is thank you, George, Most Worshipful and the Grand Lodge of Maine. I really appreciate it."

The Grand Marshal escorted R.W. Fairbairn to his seat and presented the speaker of the evening, R.W. Robert L. Steadman, who was introduced by the Grand Master with a few interesting and enjoyable comments.

### ADDRESS

by

R.W. ROBERT L. STEADMAN

"There is no such thing as judicial humor. All of us know that; and yet speakers like myself, nonetheless, constantly try because we know that opening remarks should begin with a humorous story. Let me make a modest attempt." [R.W. Steadman continued and told two very humorous stories which did indeed relax the gathering.]

"There are many similarities between being a jurist and being a Mason.

Justice is that standard of boundary of right that enables us to render to every person his just due without distinction. This virtue is not only consistent with divine and human law it is the very cement and support of civil society.

As the Chief Justice of the Superior Court, the great and historic trial court of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, I bare a responsibility to dispense Justice to all members of our society without regard to race, creed, religion or national origin.

As a Mason, I bare a responsibility to dispense Justice to all members of our society without regard to race, creed, religion or national origin. Isn't it strange that my responsibilities as a Chief Justice and yours as a Master Mason are the same.

I have a constant awareness of the changes going on in our society and I must adjust to these changes because complacency in law or in Masonry has a tendency to stagnate initiative, imagination, and growth. We should continually ask ourselves whether we as Masons are discharging our responsibility to the fraternity and as a natural extension of that inquiry, whether we as an Institution are discharging our avowed responsibility to the society in which we live.

I claim no right to speak on this or any other Masonic subject and therefore I do not, and dare not speak for our cherished institution. I will, how-

ever, with purity of motive, with more courage than wisdom, attempt to stimulate your concern, to generate your interest, and activate your curiosity regarding our sworn to obligations.

I am driven to discuss this sensitive and controversial issue with you because I have reached the unavoidable conclusion that men are less motivated to join our fraternity now than they were earlier in our history. While the loss is theirs in not availing themselves of our rich philosophy of life, Masonry suffers because the decline in our numbers affects our ability to be an effective instrument for good to the communities in which we live.

I suggest for your consideration that the decline in membership is not the real problem but in reality the decline is a symptom of the real problem that confronts our cherished fraternity - and it is solvable.

Brother Dudley Wright, recognized this fact in 1924 when he wrote,

**"The Strength of Freemasonry, like that of any other built up on fraternal lines, lies not in its numerical power, but to the extent to which its tenets are put into practice."**

Perhaps we should have less concern about membership numbers per se than about the cause of the decline which strikes at our roots. Let there be no mistake, Masonry is still the greatest fraternal order the world has ever known or will ever know. Masonry is as strong as you are or as weak as you will permit it to be. Masonry has nothing to fear except complacency.

The greatest, the wisest and the best of men in every country have been brothers and still are and will continue to be so long as we are able to learn and exemplify the great lessons taught in our ritual and portrayed by our symbolism.

Our motives ought not be for the sole purpose of generating membership numbers, although that will happen. Our reasons must be to strengthen the root. We are mindful, however, that the world loves a winner and that while winning isn't everything losing is nothing. Or to put it in perspective, Masonic vitality is a natural by-product of success.

Brother Roscoe Pound, Dean of Harvard said back in 1924, "Our strength and success lie in the depth and strength of the root, for the deeper and stronger the root, the more sturdy and flourishing will be the plant."

Without fear of serious disagreement, I submit that men join Masonry for pure and beneficent purposes - with few exceptions. They believe as you do and as I do, that Masonry stimulates our humanitarian interests in the world we inhabit, the nation in which we reside and the communities in which we dwell.

Masonry endows us with the craving to be serviceable to our fellow man, to sooth the unhappy, sympathize with their misfortune, compassionate with their misery and restore peace to their troubled minds. Isn't that the grand aim we have in view. **What a magnificent philosophy - What an extraordinary ideology.**

However, what do we do as an institution in our jurisdictions or better still across jurisdictional lines, to persuade the society in which we live that we are not self centered or self-seeking and that we do share a real concern and affection for our uninitiated neighbors?

Do our neighbors have cause to believe that we have removed them from our consideration? Have we ceased to be universal in our words, acts and deeds? Do we welcome men of every race, creed and religion into our lodge rooms? Or do we shut them out.

**Brother Edwin Markham** (1852-1940) a member of Arcadia Lodge No. 92, Coloma, California, wrote;

"He drew a circle that shut me out  
Heretic, rebel, a thing to flout  
But love and I had the wit to win  
We drew a circle that took him in."

Mention should be made of our individual brothers who without credit, exemplify on a daily basis the teachings of Masonry and are the pillars of their communities.

The charitable efforts of individual Masons remains unparalleled in the lives of our neighbors and friends. We give unsparingly of ourselves for the better good of mankind - but is that enough to satisfy the demanding attributes of our Fraternity.

I suggest for your consideration that while exemplary, the individual approach does not suffice and there should be an institutional demonstration of the teachings of Masonry in order to breathe new life into our relationships with the consuming public.

Recent studies suggest that the general public does not know who we are or what we are or what we do in our lodge rooms. Perception is reality and we are perceived to be a secret society and therefore distrusted. It does not suffice to respond to that allegation in the traditional way, that is, "We are not a secret organization, we are an organization with secrets." A distinction without a difference.

Why should there be an interest in joining our fraternity if we are perceived as secret and silent. There must be some outward demonstration by the craft to persuade the uninitiated that we are productive members of society, that we are committed to the public good, and that we care about people. Masonry's most important message of Brotherly love, relief and truth is not being heard.

Remember the old law, if a large oak is felled in the forest and there is no one to hear, does it make a sound. It really doesn't make much difference. I submit sound is irrelevant unless there are ears to hear and brotherly love is irrelevant unless communicated.

Baltasar Gracian, a 17 century Jesuit scholar summed it up neatly when he wrote, "Things do not pass for what they are, but for what they seem. What is invisible might as well not exist. A fine exterior is the best recommendation of inner perfection." Let us clean up our exterior, open the doors of our temples, raise the blinds, part the drapes, let the sun in and become a pro-active part of our communities.

When I reach this point in my analysis, there is an appalling temptation to select a comfortable solution to the problem that will avoid a confrontation with reality.

You may be tempted to say, as I have so often said, it's not us it's the culture in which we live; be patient, what goes around comes around; persevere, the pendulum is on its way back and relax, the times will change.

You may be right, but what is the cost of being wrong:

Logic dictates and intelligence demands that we examine the way we are administering our fraternity and fairly assess our successes and failures. We should certainly evaluate decline in membership, its significance and causes, to see if there is a common thread that will help us unravel the mystery of the apparent reduced interest in our fraternity.

Have we become irreverent because of our silence on issues that concern the public? We have been silent you know. The morals of our society have changed in the last thirty years and these changes, in great measure, are inconsistent with our Masonic philosophy as well as the avowed beliefs of every major religion. We know we have a drug infested and aids inflicted society that has grown from our permissive culture.

We know the terrible extent of white collar crime, fraud and corruption that feeds on the less fortunate. We are aware that our courts are overwhelmed with drug related crime and our only answer has been to build more prisons - not to rehabilitate but to punish. We know that unwed mothers give birth to babies with cocaine in their system before they leave the womb.

While we can hear Nero fiddling, we have done precious little as an institution to involve ourselves in the solutions to the devastating problems that confront us. Would you agree, that if we are not part of the solution - we are part of the problem.

In the April 1993 issue of The Atlantic Monthly, Barbara DaFoe Whitehead, authored an article captioned Dan Quayle was Right. It is a 35 page learned treatise on our society and interesting enough, she addressed the social problems that developed during the same period of time that we have been in membership decline. I suggest that this interesting comparison may not be coincidence.

Whitehead writes: "Survey after survey shows that Americans are less inclined than they were a generation ago to value sexual fidelity, lifelong marriage, and parenthood as worthwhile personal goals."

Where have the Masons been in the last thirty years as an institution to address these problems. What have we done in the last thirty years to carry out our beautiful Masonic precepts of *brotherly love, relief and truth*, towards all mankind. Has our voice been heard; have we made known our positions on these social ills; are we prepared to enter the battle; have we lost the moral high ground that our Masonic forefathers in the country captured for us.

Have you ever thought about what our early Masonic forebears would do if they were with us today. I suggest that they would take back the moral high-ground and make it clear to society that Masons intend, both individually and as an institution, to reclaim their leadership position in solving the problems of the day.

Would the scholarly lawyer Brother James Otis, a member of St. Johns Lodge, and one of the exciting Sons of Liberty have spoken out on today's social issues. He had the courage and fortitude to stand up against the crown and condemn the obnoxious Writs of Assistance that permitted the unreasonable search of the homes of the colonists and the seizure of their goods.



In 1761, this renowned academic appeared before the Massachusetts Superior Court and argued against this outrageous procedure. The Boston Pamphlet, a forbidden publication in 1772, described the Writs of Assistance in these words:

**"Officers break through the sacred rights of the Domicile, ransack men's houses, destroy their goods, carry off their property and commit the most horrid [crimes]."**

Brother Otis spoke out, at risk of his life and the courts listened.

Now then about **Paul Revere**, history's favorite revolutionary, would he have responded to the needs of our time. He was a member of Saint Andrew's Lodge, a Past Grand Master of Masons in Massachusetts and a leader of the "Sons of Liberty". History remembers that Brother Revere was dispatched by our esteemed Brother Joseph Warren as a courier "to ride and spread the alarm." Longfellow wrote of that magnificent historical ride:

**"...and yet through the gloom and the light  
The fate of a nation was riding that night  
and the spark struck out by the steed in his flight  
kindled the land into flame with its heat."**

Are we prepared to spread the alarm, kindle the fire, and have our voices heard by the community.

Then there is our Brother and first governor of Massachusetts, **John Hancock**, a native of Quincy and a member of Saint Andrew's Lodge, a Past Grand Master and a member of the fearless "Sons of Liberty". He was the first signer of the Declaration of Independence - his signature is legend. When asked why he wrote his name so bold he sarcastically replied:

**"So that George the Third may read it without putting his glasses on."**

He led the way with his historic signature and sent the king a message that was loud and clear. Are we prepared to send a message that we are an institution that will take positions and foster causes.

What about Brother Parker. In the gray dawn of that April morning in 1775, seventy courageous militia men faced 6 trained British regiments, including the famous British 10th Regiment afoot. Masonic history records that when the British Royal Troops reached the Lexington Common our friend and Brother Captain Parker gave his famous command to the minutemen: "Stand your ground. Don't fire unless fired upon; but, if they mean to have a war, let it begin here."

Are we prepared, here and now, to fire a shot that will be heard around the Masonic world. We all know that as Maine goes so goes the nation. You have extraordinary and insightful leadership in Most Worshipful George P. Pulkkinen who has developed many aggressive imaginative programs. With him at the helm, we can fire that shot.

A threshold inquiry must be made, and that is do we, as an institution,

want to do something dynamic and creative to translate our Masonic philosophy into Masonic reality.

Albert Pike of Boston, a learned, albeit controversial Masonic philosopher and past Sovereign Grand Commander of the Scottish Rite, Southern Jurisdiction in 1859 wrote, "It is a mason's part to protect the feeble against the strong, and the defenseless against rapacity and craft; to succor and comfort the poor, and be the guardian, under God, of his innocent and helpless wards."

So let us this day accept the challenge and begin the exciting process of generating a new vitality to Masonry. This is best done by deciding first where we want to go and then charting a course that will take us there. Seneca said many years ago that, "if a man does not know what port he is steering for, no wind is favorable." Let's get this ship out of the doldrums.

Might I suggest a Masonic course that will require a skilled helmsman, a courageous crew and a worthy ship but before we embark on this venture, let us enter into a pact. We will do nothing that will offend against the principles of our institution and we will maintain and preserve the universal, unalterable and unrepealable fundamentals of Masonry that have existed from time immemorial.

With that in mind, let me test the waters with an example of the type of outreach project that might find acceptance in your mind. I am sure that the collective wisdom of the Brethren and this Grand Lodge is far superior to mine in identifying an appropriate social adventure for consideration. With more courage than prudence, let me examine with you the following.

There are many social problems that blight all of our communities and have a devastating impact on our youth. Some that come to mind are drugs, alcohol, child abuse, Aids, illiteracy, racial and ethnic prejudice and many others that society has not been able to resolve. Should we, as an institution become involved in one or many of these destructive social problems.

I don't mean the easy way by donating funds to others and letting them do the work, I mean putting the working tools of the craft back to work in our communities. We should be the leaders with the square and compasses open to view and admiration.

We are told the battle against drugs, alcohol, child abuse, illiteracy, racial and ethnic prejudice will be won in the class room and not in the court room. The scholars tell us that education is the answer to most of our social ills. If anyone can develop a nation wide educational road show to bring the healing message to every class room in America, it's the Masonic Fraternity. We have the organization, we have the expertise, we have the resources and we will have the support of every Mason and non-Mason in this courageous soul saving outreach. There is an alternative - **WE CAN DO NOTHING.**

Dare we on this date in the Great State of Maine, charge the cannon that will fire a shot that is heard round the Masonic world. Do we have the courage, leadership and commitment of our Brothers at the Lexington Green or the Concord River to snatch victory from the jaws of defeat. Dare we immortalize our modern day Masonic pride and perpetuate it for our children and those who follow.



Brother Theodore Roosevelt, (1899) 25th President of the United States, and a member of Matinecock Lodge No. 806, New York said, "Far better it is to dare mighty things, to win glorious triumphs, even though checkered by failure, than to take rank with those poor spirits who neither enjoy much nor suffer much, because they live in the gray twilight that knows not victor or defeat".

If I have offended the sensitivities of any of my Brothers by anything I have said then regrettably I have failed and I apologize - that was not my intent. But if by chance I have said something, any thing at all, worthy of your consideration, that might kindle your interest in Masonic activism - then I have not tasted failure this day.

In closing, I am reminded that there are three parts to a Masonic address called Faith, Hope, and Charity. If the brethren applaud when you get up to speak, that is an act of Faith. If the brethren applaud during your talk, that is an act of Hope. If by chance they applaud when you're finished, that's an act of Charity.

The Grand Master graciously thanked our Ill. Brother for his remarks. He then asked for the introductions of the special guests to be made by Past Grand Masters and others sitting at the tables in front of the dais. M. W. Pulkkinen continued with the introductions of the District Deputy Grand Masters who were present.

All the introductions being completed, the Grand Master asked Ill. Robert L. Steadman to approach the speaker's stand again.

Grand Master: Mr. Speaker, I didn't get through all of the introduction, so I'll finish it now.

### ROBERT LLOYD STEADMAN

The Honorable Robert L. Steadman was born March 8, 1926 in Cambridge, Massachusetts, the son of James C. and Mae (Carew) Steadman.

He attended the public schools of Cambridge, and in 1944 graduated from Rindge High School (now known as Cambridge Rindge and Latin). He continued his education at Suffolk University earning an Associate in Arts Degree in 1948 and a Bachelor of Law -- Juris Doctor -- Degree from Suffolk Law School in 1951.

His military career began in the U.S. Army Air Force during World War II, followed by service in the Naval Reserve, where he rose to the rank of Lt. Senior Grade.

In 1953 he was married to Elaine Rosa Nickerson at Cambridge, Massachusetts. They are the parents of two children, Robert L. Steadman, Jr., an electronic engineer, and Angela Mae Steadman, a trial attorney in Boston.

His professional career in the practice of law was primarily in the area of criminal defense from 1952 to 1962, and civil defense from 1962 to 1979, the year he was appointed to the Superior Court by Gov. Edward J. King. In 1988 he was inducted as Chief Justice of the Superior Court, the great and historic trial court of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts.

Active in his church and community, Brother Steadman served for many years as Moderator and Sunday School teacher at Old South Union Church, and as a trustee of Weymouth Savings Bank and South Shore Hospital.

In 1957 he was raised to the Sublime Degree of a Master Mason in Orphan's Hope Lodge of Weymouth. Soon after, he was appointed to the line in his lodge and served as Worshipful Master in 1966-67, and as District Deputy Grand Master of the Quincy 26th Masonic District in 1976-77. He has been recognized by his own Grand Lodge as the recipient of the Joseph Warren Medal for distinguished service.

Brother Steadman is a member of the Scottish and York Rite Bodies as well as Aleppo Shrine Temple and the Grotto. For his contributions to community, church, profession and the Masonic Fraternity, Brother Steadman was coroneted a Sovereign Grand Inspector General, 33d Degree in 1989 at Pittsburgh. In 1991 he was appointed an Active Member of the Supreme Council, Ancient Accepted Scottish Rite, for Massachusetts.

III. and R.W. Brother Robert L. Steadman has served mankind with distinction in many ways -- as a husband and father; as a contributing member of his community; as a practicing and teaching professional in the field of law; and as a Freemason.

It is my distinct honor to present to you the highest award for service that this Grand Lodge can bestow. Brother Robert L. Steadman, for your many contributions to Mankind and to Freemasonry, I am privileged to award you the Josiah Hayden Drummond Medal for Distinguished Service.

R.W. Steadman thanked the Grand Master and the Grand Lodge of Maine for the honor bestowed on him.

The Grand Master then made the announcements pertinent to breakfast and activities for Tuesday. The evening concluded on a note of enthusiasm and a positive attitude about Masonry and its future.

Most Worshipful Grand Master, Distinguished Guests, and members of the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine. It is with great pride that I bring you greetings on behalf of the Rainbow Girls of Maine.

My girls have been working very hard this year to support our three charity projects: The Multiple Sclerosis Society, The Merrill Rainbow Camp, and The Mabel J. DeShon Scholarship Fund. We're working together to support these projects. We have been able to strengthen our Rainbow because the girls are more active and more excited than they have been before. This year, I asked each Assembly to keep a scrapbook throughout the year. They'll bring them to Grand Assembly where they will be judged by



our out-of-state guests.

I asked them to do this for two reasons. First, I thought it'd be nice for them to have a record of their year's work. Second, I hope it will encourage them to do some publicity and let the people in their community know who they are, and what they do. This project has been most successful. At various meetings through the year I have had girls and adults come up to me to show me the articles and pictures of their Assembly printed in their newspaper. These girls have been enthusiastic about their organization and this is how we've been able to initiate over one hundred girls this year. We need your leadership and your guidance.

At this time I would like to share this short poem with you.

When the Rev. William Mark Sexton wrote our ritual we're told that he received much inspiration from his extensive Masonic background and research. DEMOLAY REPORT  
ROK MORIN  
ACTING STATE MASTER COUNCILOR

I'd like to thank the Most Worshipful Grand Master for allowing me to speak here today. In my travels I often get to see many Masons but never so many at one time. I must say this is probably, I notice, the first time in the history of Clyde Ferris as Executive Officer that he can say he has more hair than the State Master Councilor. I know he's pretty proud of that.

I want to tell you why I actually shaved my head. It looks kind of funny, but the first time I did it was last summer as the Leadership Training Camp for DeMolays, and it had been a long week. A whole bunch of guys in the camp together...you know, we kind of get on each other's nerves and after a while we all stink a little bit, but everybody is just kind of down. There's no sense of brotherhood there, and then we played a volley ball game and everybody knows what happened at the Olympics volley ball tournament last year when all the Americans shaved their heads. Well, our team lost, and the guys said, "Aw, we oughta shave our heads."

"All right I'll do it!!!"

So I shaved my head and all of a sudden the whole camp was laughing and having a good time, and there was a sense of brotherhood there.

Well, I belong to a fraternity at college, and once again...it's getting into the finals. Everybody's down and cranky and like, well, if it worked one time, it ought to work again. By golly, it did. It's amazing what a reaction you'll get out of a group of young men just by shaving their heads.

Well, the reason I'm telling you this is that I would do anything for DeMolay. It has given me so much. There's nothing I wouldn't do, but there's only so much that I can do, and I'm here today to ask you for your help.

DeMolay is the greatest youth fraternity in the world, but it's going down hill, and it will continue to unless we take action now. I hate to say it, but unless things change, I can almost guarantee within five years there'll no longer be a DeMolay in Maine.

Maybe some of you are thinking, "Why should we help DeMolay?" I know Masons have their own problems with their membership and other projects. I'll tell you why. First, I remember one day I overheard a couple of my advisors speaking, and I'll never forget what they were talking about. One advisor was saying, "I hear people today, they talk about the youth. You know they're this, they're that. They're no good..." And he said, "But they have no right unless they're willing to do something about it." I'll never forget that. The man who said that was "Dad" Weinberg. I thank you for -- he's right over there -- I thank you for that. That was very inspiring for me.

However, I know Masons are not like that. You're not the type to just sit by and not do anything about the problems of our world. Yesterday, the Most Worshipful [Right Worshipful] Steadman said, we give unsparingly of ourselves for the better good of mankind. And from what I know of Masons, I couldn't agree with that more.

There are thousands of young men out there crying for help, looking for



guidance, looking for someone to show them that they care. When your brother, Franklin Sherman Land, first started DeMolay, he saw a need. He started DeMolay shortly after the war and he became friends with this young gentleman who had lost his father in the war. And he saw that he had many friends that were in the same situation. They had no male role model to teach them what they needed to be a man. Today, we're faced with the same situation. Although the causes are different, the effects are the same. It's unfortunate that today there are thousands of broken homes and unwed pregnancies in today's society. And once again there are thousands of young men that are left without the love and guidance of a strong male role model to teach them right from wrong. DeMolay is just the place for such men. A boy can join DeMolay and he will learn self confidence, and self respect. He will learn the precepts that we inculcate in all our teachings. He will learn to stand up for himself and be a man. He'll become a part of a family.

I know DeMolays that -- it's unfortunate, but in their home they have nothing. DeMolay is their family. Our advisors, we call them "Dad," "Dad" Ferris because they really and truly are like fathers to many of us. However, DeMolay can't help these young men unless there's a DeMolay, and DeMolay can't exist without the support, leadership and guidance from men like yourselves.

In the past, we have often received monetary support from you, and we thank you so much for that. We could not do the things we have done without it. But we need more than that. We need your time and your effort. There's another reason for Masons to support DeMolay. By helping DeMolay, you'll help to secure the future of Masonry. DeMolays are the future young Masons.

I see in other jurisdictions of DeMolay where the DeMolays aren't even allowed to hold meetings in the Masonic lodges. They don't recognize the DeMolays at all, and in those areas less than five percent of DeMolays go on to become Masons. Here, the Masons not only openly recognize us, they support us. A good percentage of the DeMolays go on to become Masons. I wish I could give you an exact number. I can name dozens of DeMolays who have gone on to become Masons. I know tonight I've met some Past Grand Masters that were DeMolays. Perhaps there are more of you out there that I have not yet met. And just think, that little support can increase the numbers of DeMolays that become Masons with more support. With more advisors we can have more DeMolays to go on to become more Masons.

By now I hope you're all asking yourselves, "How can I help?" I'll be honest with you, it's not always easy, but it's worth it. If you can change the life of a young man, if you can better the future of DeMolay and of Masonry, get involved; find out if there's a local DeMolay Chapter in your area. Go to a meeting. Offer your help. If there's not a DeMolay Chapter in your area, go talk to the Masons back at your lodge. See if you can get them started.

I know myself I so much want DeMolay to work that next year I'm taking a year off from college and dedicating myself to DeMolay. If I can do that, please, could you sacrifice a little of your time and a little of your ef-

fort and help these young men that so desperately need you.

Most Worshipful [Right Worshipful] Steadman talked about the social problems of our society, and he said if any one can set a course for change in these problems, the Masons can do it, and I believe he's right. The opportunity is there for you gentlemen. So, I set forth a challenge to you to prove him right. Prove to these thousands of young men that someone cares. Prove to them that they are important and valuable to our society and that they are not just pieces of social trash that have been thrown away and forgotten.

I hope that next year at this time I can come back and not give this type of speech. But come back and thank you for all your support, and hopefully there'll be ten new Masonic [DeMolay] Chapters. That will thrill me to death.

Yesterday I had the Deputy Grand Master of Nova Scotia asking if I could help him set up a chapter in Halifax, Nova Scotia. I tell you that just made my day and thrilled me to death. If I could get more Masons to show that type of enthusiasm about DeMolay and come to me like that, it would make my job so much easier.

Thank you, Gentlemen, for your time. Most Worshipful Grand Master, thank you once again for letting me speak here today.

The Grand Master thanked the youth leaders for two fine reports and complimented them on jobs well done. At this time he asked that our guests be escorted outside the hall.

Grand Lodge was called from refreshment to labor.

The Grand Master asked that the Grand Representatives present stand. "As I look over this assembly I see that you are veterans at this work. You know your job, you know the importance of communicating, of corresponding with your counterparts in your several jurisdictions. Explain to them what we are trying to do, what we are doing in this Grand Jurisdiction, and get from them information about what they're doing. I thank you all for your continued work. Please, I would appreciate your reports in sixty days from this Annual Meeting. Thank you very much."

## REPORT OF THE GRAND MASTER

In Grand Lodge  
Lewiston, Maine  
May 4, 1993

M.W. Past Grand Masters, Distinguished Guests, my Brothers:

I'm extremely proud to be a Freemason; extremely grateful to be your Grand Master; extremely enthusiastic about the future of Freemasonry.

If you wonder why my enthusiasm, I ask you to look about you; at the Brethren to your left and to your right, before you and behind you, and I ask you to think of other lodge leaders back in your communities.

Your leadership -- individually and collectively, your dedication, your love of Freemasonry...your commitment to live it and teach it to newly initiated brethren -- your willingness -- even eagerness to carry it into your towns and cities, and share the essential goodness and rightness of the Craft with the men, women, and yes certainly the youth of your communities -- is the reason for my enthusiasm.

You inspire me with your understanding, appreciation and practice of brotherly love, relief and truth...you inspire me with your faith and hope for continued improvement... you inspire me with your resolve to practice charity to the betterment of those in need, to the betterment of society, and ultimately to the betterment of our beloved fraternity.

My Brethren, in preparing for this annual communication I attended the Annual sessions of the Grand Chapter, Grand Council and Grand Commandery. I can tell you I saw no down-at-the mouth defeatists among those Brethren. The air was charged with a refreshing, positive spirit...you could hear it; you could feel it; you could see it. The rallying cry ... the challenge for renewal, was very much in the air.

It's the same fresh breeze blowing in a positive change that I've sensed in our Scottish Rite Valleys, and more importantly in our blue lodges as I've traveled this Pine Tree State during the past twelve months.

The inspiration...the inspired...are everywhere.

From the bustle of York County ... to the special qualities of THE County; from the beautiful mountains and lake country of western Maine to the down east blueberry barrens and coastal communities where those monster tides ebb and flow twice in 24 hours, I've repeatedly been rejuvenated by the eagerness of Maine Freemasons to live and share their Freemasonry.

If we had established a beachhead before, we now have developed positions of significant strength.

WE are the Freemasons of Maine !

If we had been a presence in our communities, we now are recognized as a force for good in our cities and towns.

WE are the Freemasons of Maine!

If we were known as a harmless collection of nice old guys who fortnightly cloistered ourselves in windowless, dank, dark buildings never penetrated by the warming rays of the noonday sun, we now are recognized as inspired leaders in the community who are stepping forward and making a difference in the lives of many of our neighbors ... Sometimes the difference is between life and death. If you doubt that, talk to the DARE officers whose programs have been saved from the budgetary scrapheap by a Masonic Foundation grant. M.W. Brother Ernest Curtis and I heard that testimony last Friday in Bangor when your Foundation was recognized by the State DARE Association as the outstanding public service supporter of that critically needed program.

Let me tell you I was some proud of all of you as I accepted this award and heard DARE officer Joel Merry identify Maine Freemasons as a one-of-a-kind group committed to making a major difference...and to see the many Masons among the 124 DARE officers, themselves beaming their pride to be part of this wonderful fraternity.

### **The Wages of Brotherly Love**

I'll tell you Brethren, I'm not complaining a bit when I tell you the hours on this job are long, indeed. But I'd not trade the experiences for the salary and benefits package of any CEO in the country. The wages of this work are great indeed.

I mean it.

What can compare with the feeling of visiting an ailing brother, a brother perhaps not visited for a year... or two...or more.. of seeing the tears of gratitude well up in eyes long dimmed by the passage of time...and hope...and love.

I've received those wages. And you can too!

Worshipful Masters, when you get home from this session, I would ask that your very first Masonic action be to appoint visitation teams and set them to work with proper instruction.

Some of you, I know, already have done this. All of you must do it if you're to experience the real satisfaction of filling your responsibility to the Oriental chair.

Form teams of two Brethren each -- one senior brother and one new to the

Craft. Ideally the senior Brother will know the elder brother being visited, and so will afford the comfort of immediate familiarity; the younger brother will get a real lesson -- a first person experience of Freemasonry in action -- of the mystic tie that binds us one to another.

Worshipful Masters! Do yourselves a favor. Assign yourself to one of your teams. You'll find the toughest part of the job is ending the visit. The Brother you're visiting won't want you to leave. And you know, neither will you.

Sometimes you'll find Brethren needing help but too proud...or too detached...to ask.

Sometimes you'll find brethren a bit crochety at first, brethren who feel forgotten, unwanted, unneeded, little more than a destination name and address at dues card mailing time.

Anticipate this! Be prepared to apologize! Be ready to visit again!

I recommend this approach be initiated with every brother living within reasonable driving distance who has not visited lodge within the past year.

And Worshipful Masters -- I also recommend this approach to every brother facing suspension n.p.d. We fall down so badly...we fail so miserably...when our sole final effort to reach this brother in trouble is an impersonal registered letter from your lodge secretary. To be sure it's more work to visit, but as R.W. Brother John Baggett said last Saturday, the successful answer to our problem -- to any problem -- is work.

Are you Masonic leaders prepared to work? Well are you? Then be prepared when you leave here to work harder...and smarter...at your Masonry than ever before. And, my Brothers, at the same time be prepared to enjoy the sweet fruits of your successful labors as you have never tasted them before.

On this note, last September the Grand Secretary, at my request, sent a series of four sample letters to all 197 of our lodges. The letters were drafts which I intended to mail to all brethren who were:

1. Facing Suspension n.p.d.
2. Had recently demitted.
3. Had taken the EA or FC Degrees and not advanced;
4. Had been newly raised to the sublime degree.

The first three letters were informational and an invitation to reactivate. The fourth letter was congratulatory. The Grand Secretary's message included a

request for the names of all Brethren who'd fit into any of these categories. Every letter was accompanied by a card which a Brother could return if he wanted me to visit him in person.

I'd like to report on that effort. First off, nearly 30% of the lodges responded to the request. One of the lodges that didn't respond two months later suspended 19 Brethren for n.p.d.

They sent out their registered letters. It was an effective way to tidy up their bookkeeping, to purge their arrearages...but I submit it was a shockingly poor example of stretching forth a helping hand to assist a falling brother. I would urge you Master and Wardens to never let this happen in your lodge.

You can not grow and prosper --either in numbers of members, or in the exercise of Brotherly love -- by allowing this membership management approach.

I want you to implement this program because it works. Lodges that participated last fall benefitted. Delinquent dues were forthcoming. Important personal contacts were made; the bonds of brotherhood strengthened. I'm continuing to meet with brethren who responded.

Let me share with you my most recent experience resulting from the effort. Last Monday evening I visited Oxford Lodge in Norway. On the way in to the meeting a brother I had written to stopped me... clutched my hand. With tears in his eyes he thanked me for caring enough to take time to write him a personal letter...for caring when times were tough.

Brethren, I could spend all of today and much of tomorrow reporting stories of this past year, and I could do it without significantly lowering the overflow reservoir of wonderful experiences. It has truly been heartwarming and gratifying.

### **The Activity Level and District Meetings**

You will hear specific numbers in the report of the Committee of Returns. But I cannot pass without relating the current activity level throughout much of our state. Lodges are now working who haven't worked in years. Brethren are being initiated, passed and raised where no new members have received light for some time. I expect -- if the same level of activity holds through the fall and winter -- that we will enjoy a larger number of new members in this Masonic year than we have seen in a decade or more.

To that end I would urge you once again, to invite non-Masons -- prospective Masons and their wives -- to your District Meetings. Last year I suggested that if every officer in every lodge were to invite one potential candidate to his District meeting we'd be able to introduce 1980 men to the fraternity in this one effort.



Not surprisingly, that didn't happen. What did materialize in most Districts was an encouraging number of prospects who came, saw and enjoyed outstanding programs. There were eight meetings with attendances in excess of 100. The 17th District turned out a whopping 251, and chairs had to be carried into Portland's Corinthian Hall to accommodate the gathering. There were several overflow crowds. Attendance isn't the only gauge for success, however, and I applaud you several deputies who really came through with thoughtful, enjoyable programs.

As an aside I'd note that many of the non-Masons who attended District Meetings throughout the State have since petitioned for membership.

This is one of your membership tools. Use it!

### **Service Awards.**

Recognizing Masonic Veterans is always a great thrill for me. Your Grand Master enjoyed the opportunity several times this year, and three times recognized Masons for 75 years of service.

The first was last summer when your GM joined the Kora Temple Chanters in Hallowell to recognize Wor. Brother and Dr. Ed. Peaslee on his 100th Birthday and as well as his 75 years of Service to the Craft. A second was in St. John's Lodge, South Berwick when a Brother was honored. And the third was a week later in Springvale when Wor. Brother Clifford Holdsworth regaled the packed apartments of Springvale Lodge with experiences that stretched back to his boyhood days in England more than 80 years ago.

### **The Grand Lodge at Work**

Your Grand Lodge travelled three times during the past year. Once was to consolidate Davis Lodge into Blue Mountain Lodge from which it sprang in 1885.

The other two occasions were to work the Master Mason Degree. In September, 1992, Brother Steven Henshaw, grandson of M.W. Brother Paul Powers was raised to the Sublime Degree before the full and appreciative hall of Freeport Lodge #23. All places and stations were filled by the Grand Lodge officers laboring in the positions to which they were installed. M.W. Brother Powers participated by raising his grandson, and giving the second part of the Master Mason lecture in impressive "Paul Powers" fashion.

On Monday, April 29, 1993, the Grand Lodge officers, again with all officers in their installed positions, worked the Master Mason degree on Stuart Goodwin before a full house at Oxford Lodge #18 in Norway. Brother Goodwin is the fourth consecutive generation to be a member of Oxford Lodge.

### **The Lodge Leadership Development Program**

This program is expanded in acceptance this past year, and the benefits are becoming apparent. For too long we expected a Brother to assume the Oriental Chair and perform in a highly proficient manner without providing him any training to enhance his performance. We expected that through his life experiences, and careful observation while in lodge, he would be ready. Sometimes this was adequate; sometimes it was disastrous; always the results could have been improved.

This is no longer accepted procedure. There is no question the Lodge Leadership Development Program helps prepare a brother to enjoy fully his year as Master. With the incorporation of the work plan, the probability of continuity from year to year has also been enhanced. The Wardens now are important parts of the process and sign on to the work plan, thus creating expectations that projects not completed one year will enjoy continued attention if and when the Senior Warden becomes Master.

Your District Deputy and District Representative are major resources to help lodges achieve maximum success. They'll be contacting you but you don't have to wait for that contact to talk with them. If you have a question...ask it! If you have a comment...give it! If you have an idea...explore it! If you want to be a winner...do it!

### **Certified Lodge Ritual Instructors**

The Certified Lodge Ritual Instructor Program completed a successful pilot program in the 16th, 17th, 18th and 19th Districts during the year just completed. In an attempt to improve ritual proficiency, Brethren were schooled, tested and certified in one or more of the three degrees.

Duties of the Certified Lodge Ritual Instructor are: to attend ritual schools; to assist the Worshipful Master conduct rehearsals for lodge degree work; to instruct officers and Brethren in ritual; to prompt officers during degree work; to provide substitute Certified Ritual Instructors in the event of his absence; and to regularly communicate lodge progress and problems related to ritual to the Assistant Grand Lecturer assigned to his district.

This program will be expanded throughout the entire state during the Masonic year starting 5 May, 1993.

### **Out-of-State Visitations**

Brethren, I have kept my out-of-state travel to a minimum this year, venturing only to the Northeast Conference of Grand Masters in Pennsylvania, the Grand Lodge of Massachusetts in December, the 275th anniversary of the founding of the United Grand Lodge of England, and the National Conference of Grand Masters in Arkansas.



I have made recommendation to the Grand Masters Conferences that they should be restructured to present solutions to problems -- to showing plans that are working to solve common areas of concern -- rather than a continued gnashing of teeth and a rehashing of problems that won't go away by jaw-boning among a new group of Grand Masters each year.

If the changes are made, this will provide a worthwhile forum for problem solving. If they aren't made, I fear the Conferences are doomed to extinction. And, in my opinion, should be.

Let me give you an example of what I mean. At the most recent Conference, the Grand Masters were buzzing in the halls about the effects of the Southern Baptist onslaught. It was not on the agenda. I asked the Conference chairman -- and the executive secretary -- when we'd get the chance to talk about the issue in session.

I was told it was not on the agenda, and there wouldn't be time. What there was time for though, was a series of reports that nobody but the presenters gave a whit about.

Concerned that the Grand Masters would be heading for home without considering this critically important issue, I lined up four Grand Masters to speak about their experiences, then grabbed the floor mike and invited them to speak. They did. After all had finished the host Grand Master asked to speak. He explained that 43 years ago he was raised to the sublime degree. And 41 years ago he became a Minister in the Southern Baptist Church. He went on to say that if it hadn't been for Freemasonry getting his priorities straight, for showing him the way, he doubts he ever would have become a minister. There is no question in his mind that Freemasonry and religion are compatible. He sees them as a holy alliance, as vital forces fighting on the same side for good in a world increasingly run amok.

His testimony...his witness...gave the Grand Masters a valuable piece of information with which to fight the nonsense hysterics of Dr. Holly and his anti-Mason cohorts.

I have not visited our sister jurisdictions this year, not because I don't cherish the fraternal ties, but because there is simply far too much to be done here in Maine that can't be done without the constant care and attention that comes from being on the job.

### **Trial Entered Apprentice Program**

It's always disappointing when a man petitions a lodge is accepted, takes his Entered Apprentice Degree, and never returns. It's fair to ask why this happens. For certain, some men are not right for Freemasonry, and Freemasonry not right for all men, although I personally cannot understand that probability.

When that is the case, however, I believe, in fairness to the man and to the lodge, we should find that out as early in the process as is possible. That being said, I still believe we lose some men we never should.

What can we do to change this? It is in answer to this question that I propose to initiate this year, on a trial basis and by dispensation only, the entire Entered Apprentice package, but in a slightly altered form.

The entire program is predicated on the belief that very few men respond negatively to a genuine kindness. In other words, make your candidate feel really important...and you'll make a happy candidate ready to seek further friendship and further light. When your candidate goes home after taking his first degree, the most important thing he must take with him is the belief that he has made many new friends that evening as well as new brethren, and that his new friends really are interested in him -- who he is, what he does, what his interests are, etc.

The guidelines for accomplishing those objectives through this program are simple, and are as follows:

1. The Entered Apprentice Degree must be worked on a special meeting, opened on the EA Degree. This will minimize the time the candidate feels abandoned before and after the degree as he sits and ponders how he might be spending his time.
2. The Pollard Plan must be used in its entirety, from The Accepted Candidate to Fourth Night. This will assure he is a well-informed candidate, prepared, his first night, for at least some of the forms and ceremonies of initiation. This will also help his family understand something about Freemasonry, and so maximize support at home. It will also teach the candidate -- and the lodge -- early in the procedure, if the candidate is not ready for Freemasonry. It will also assure that he is a well-informed Mason by the time he completes the Fourth Night.
3. To help get to know the candidate, the lectures may be waived the night of the degree. It is at this time, around the refreshment table, helping him with his lesson, and talking about the effects of various Masonic programs in the community, that you will get to know the new Brother, and he will get to know you. This is when the bonds of friendship will be forged.
4. The lectures will have to be given before he takes his Fellowcraft Degree. They should be given at the lodge hall as part of an additional education night opportunity. (*Your District Deputy or District Representative will help you.*)
5. This is a pilot program, and as such will be closely monitored. Therefore a dispensation from the Grand Master will be needed to try this, and a brief report submitted on the success of the program within 60 days after the candidate takes his Master Mason Degree.

### Recommendations

I recommend that each lodge or Building Association in this jurisdiction consider making a contribution to its Municipal Government in lieu of taxes for services provided. This action will further demonstrate the commitment of our lodges to be good neighbors and will stand the fraternity in good stead -- I believe -- when sometime in the future fraternal non-profit organizations face the certain attempts to have our property tax exemptions taken from us. Some of our cities and towns now have situations where up to 50% of their real property is tax exempt. As the search for new revenue continues organizations enjoying our status will likely become targets for the tax man. Far better it is to make a good faith effort to pay what we believe is appropriate now than to risk our fate to government officials trying to balance the ever broadening gap between available funds and revenues needed to balance strained budgets.

There are several additional recommendations and they will be offered as proposed amendments to the Constitution. They are as follows:

1. Past Grand Treasurers will be accorded Permanent Member Status. Can you imagine R.W. Brother, Tornquist retiring from this position that he has held with such distinguished service and the next year not being allowed to vote in our Grand Lodge. We have to correct that.
2. Past Grand Secretaries will be accorded Permanent Member Status.
3. District Representatives will be accorded Grand Lodge Member Status.
4. Trials and Appeals Provisions will be changed to provide improved process.

### An Act of Charity

Within the last couple of months, Brethren, I received a call from R.W. Brother Wilbur Loveitt, distinguished Past Junior Grand Warden, who told me he had just gotten a telephone call with an amazing message and ask if I would get together with him -- which I did. The telephone call that R.W. Brother Loveitt was still trembling about was from a man who belongs to his lodge, Polar Star Lodge in Bath. On seeing Brethren walking the streets of his community without proper places to live, without proper shelter in the inclemency of the seasons, proposed to donate his home, his dwelling, to our Grand Lodge as a Masonic facility.

I visited with R.W. Brother Loveitt of course and with Brother Arthur Berry who is the intended donor. He took us through his place and with great enthusiasm showed it to us. Our Committee on the Feasibility for a Masonic Home gathered on the site. Brother Arthur Berry showed it again. It is a tremendously exciting project. We are not, at this time, in a position to accept it because - because it is not this body's jurisdiction to present it.

Brother Berry appeared before the Charitable Foundation and again shared his information. We are, at this time, having our attorney and his attorney talk -- find out exactly what is being proposed -- find out exactly what would be expected and if at such time they can come together with an agreement agreeable to all that presentation will be made to the Charitable Foundation.

It will be a very orderly process -- it may never come to be -- it may come to be.

I would ask at this time if M.W. Brother Harold Chute would come to the podium and address this body with any thoughts you might have on the subject.

"M.W. Grand Master, Brethren, I've had the opportunity to hear some of this discussion about this potential gift to the Grand Lodge; and having been on the Charitable Foundation for a number of years, I'm very familiar with our financial position and what we have been doing for charity. We have, over three years, made great contributions to Maine Masons and their families.

"In recent years, several of the Past Grand Masters such as M.W. Brother Ernest Curtis and others, have established programs such as the Drug and Alcohol Abuse Program, the Scholarship Programs and a number of others, and we have made great contributions.

"I also have observed we used to, for many many years, contribute to people in need in various situations. Often it related to their health status or their family's health status, the widows, the orphans, the children, the fathers of Masons; and this has constantly decreased over the years. I think at one time, and I know the Grand Treasurer will correct me within a penny, but I think it has been up to \$125,000, maybe \$140,000 sometimes. This year it's down to \$100,000.00. The reason for this is that, due to health programs of the country, a lot of this is changing. In other words, we just are not rich enough to take care of all Masons health problems because they are massive. To go to the hospital, a \$1,000.00 a day is modest and it could be much more, in which we could in no way ever take care of this. So there are certain things we are not going to be able to do. I say this with great humor and respect relative to Hillary Clinton who's going to solve all the health problems -- didn't mean to get into politics. The problem will be, perhaps, corrected some but not all solved; and we can't solve them because we aren't rich enough.

"I also read an interesting statistic the other day, and this will absolutely amaze you, but in this country there are 35,500 people over a hundred years old -- but don't look at me, I just happen to be one of them -- and this is increasing daily. There're going to be more and more. Many of these older people -- I'm not talking about the ones over a hundred though some of them might qualify -- are badly in need of a place to live, not hospital and not necessarily a nursing home. So I think we have to think in modern terms about what will be needed in the next twenty or twenty-five years. I

will not be here and maybe a lot of the Past Grand Masters will not be here, but some of these young fellows will. I'm the third senior, so I'm sure I may not be here. Many will be here and we have a real job ahead of us.

"Now this is very philosophical. I can't tell you how many need help. I have no way of knowing. I have no survey, no statistical data on the masons. I know our age is catching up with a lot of us and catching up with more and more. Fortunately, we have some young people coming on that will certainly be a great asset, but there are many who are getting older and older. In thinking of this, as I say, the committee last year gave a report they did not talk about getting involved in nursing homes. That is a place where we cannot take part because it is so interwoven with government that it would absolutely drive us crazy if we got involved in it. And some of these visiting dignitaries here today know what happens when you get into a hospital when you get interwoven with the government. The bureaucracy is unbelievable and we are not in a position to get in that type of thing.

"We have to think what we're going to have to do for some of our older Masons. I can think of many, many people who have large homes, a husband and wife, probably both in perfectly good health, relatively good health, and they are going to have to make some changes. There are some places to go. I think we as a fraternity have to think about the future, whether we can take part and in what way we can take part and whether we can be a real guiding force to help them. We really do need to do something for charity. I've just had the occasion to read 'The Condition of the Fraternity Report' which I'm sure you listened to, the lodges, all your lodges in this state have over a million eight hundred thousand dollars in their Charity Funds. That has transpired, a large part of it, during the last twenty-five years.

"Heaven forbid, I was Grand Master twenty-five years ago, and I hammered you to death to get those charity funds going. Well, you did something about it. You got a million eight hundred thousand. It should be ten million but you did quite well. You got a good start.

"Now, my whole message, if there is one, today, and I've talked to the Grand Master extensively about this, we've got to do something for the future. How we do it, I don't know. You have got to start thinking that way. You've got to organize your thinking; you've got to bring it up to date, and we are going to take care of our people, some way or other. You're going to put in the money, I'm going to put in the money, and everybody is going to put in the money. It's going to cost a lot of money. But you're really a very wealthy group.

"You keep telling me individually how poor you are. I know how poor you are. Some of you are more poor than others. None of you is really that poor. You can help your brother Masons, and I hope, long after I'm gone, that this will be a driving force and a great project for Maine Masons. I'm going to leave it to the future Grand Masters and I will take my seat. Thank you for listening."

Thank you M.W. Brother Harold. We will keep you Brethren apprised. If there is any news, if anything happens you will know about it. Because this happened so recently this was the perfect occasion to make you all aware that this offer had been given and that we are very grateful.

### **Alcoholic Beverages in Masonic Buildings**

The issue of the use of alcoholic beverages in Masonic Buildings is a continuing one.

I am fully aware that many of our active Brethren particularly at special social events, have forsaken their Masonic Buildings to go to another establishment where alcoholic beverages are available. This action has deprived Masonic Building Associations from revenue which they might otherwise have received.

I am also well aware of the increasing costs of operation confronting Building Associations, especially for heat, utilities and maintenance; and of the problems attendant with revenue losses resulting from reductions in membership.

In view of these problems, of the changing times, and after careful consideration, your Grand Master hereby rules that alcoholic beverages may be dispensed in any Masonic Building, on a trial basis, subject to the following restrictions and limitations:

1. During exclusively social functions, fellowship and banquet rooms or dining halls, and always under the control of responsible persons, the temperate use and dispensing of alcoholic beverages is not prohibited.
2. At no time shall alcoholic beverages be introduced into a Lodge room, except for authorized ceremonial purposes, or into those rooms used directly in connection therewith, such as the preparation room, Tyler's room, or corridors adjacent thereto.
3. All applicable laws and regulations, both of the State of Maine and of local authorities, shall be observed and complied with at all times.
4. The foregoing is not to be construed as a mandate that the use and dispensing of alcoholic beverages must be allowed; whether such use is allowed or prohibited is for the local Masonic body and the Building Association, as the case may be, to determine.
5. This policy is not intended, at this time, to provide the opportunity for Building and Temple Corporations and Associations to make available their social rooms, banquet rooms, kitchens and dining halls to outside, non-masonic-sponsored functions when the use of alcoholic beverages would be permitted.



6. In an attempt to closely study the effects of this pronouncement, each instance where the use and dispensing of alcoholic beverages is to be allowed will require a dispensation from the Grand Master, and within seven days after the event, a written report will be required by the Grand Master.

We must recognize that times change. It is to devise a policy that recognizes that there are various legitimate points of view on this question and at the same time to preserve our time-honored sacred places and ideals, that the above stated pronouncement is directed.

### Conclusion

Tremendous strides are being made in improving lodge administration, candidate instruction, and public assistance programs, as well as tending to the traditional needs of our Brethren, their widows and orphans. Freemasons are again - as our distinguished banquet speaker last evening, the Honorable Right Worshipful and Illustrious Brother Robert L. Steadman challenged - we are moving to take our rightful places of leadership in all areas of our communities. I applaud you all for that.

Once again I thank you for the great honor you have bestowed upon me with this opportunity to serve as your Grand Master. Additionally, I express my sincerest gratitude to the Past Grand Masters for their wisdom and counsel, and to my Grand Lodge officers for the outstanding effort and support you have demonstrated.

You are all the greatest.

## REPORT OF THE GRAND LECTURER

In Grand Lodge  
Lewiston, Maine  
May 4, 1993

To the Most Worshipful Grand Master, Officers and Brethren of the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine:

The 1992-93 Masonic instruction year has been one of mixed feelings where school attendance is concerned. From lodges with no officer attendance to one that averaged 71% of officer attendance for one year.

During the 1992-93 year, there were 14 lodges with no lodge officer participation at any of the four schools of instruction. In addition to these, there were 20 more lodges that were not represented by the Master of the lodge, 17 not represented by Sr. Warden, and 28 not represented by the Jr. Warden.

The overall average for officer attendance in 20 of the 24 districts was only 21%. The 16th, 17th, 18th and 19th districts were not included in these statistics because of the pilot program which they participated in.

When we take our first three degrees in Masonry, we promise to answer all summonses. When we are installed as elected or appointed officers, we promise to support Grand Lodge Regulations and a regular attendance on the committees and communications having received proper notice. Brethren, I believe Ritual Schools of Instruction fall into both these categories.

This steady decline in attendance at ritual schools, particularly by the three principal officers is very alarming. In an effort to combat the lack of proficiency in our degree ritual, which is becoming more evident as a result of the nonparticipation, the Lodge Ritual Instructor Pilot Program was initiated this year. The 16th, 17th, 18th and 19th districts were selected for this Pilot Program. V.W. Kenneth Gardner was selected by the Grand Master to head up this program and deserves a well earned pat on the back for his

efforts.

The Lodge Ritual Instructor Program is one that I feel should be continued. This year's pilot program I believe has been a success. It may not be the answer to our ritual problems, but I believe it is a step in the right direction. It will enable lodges to have access to more brothers who are certified proficient in the ritual, and who have taken the initiative and time to achieve this goal. It is only another tool to be used. Let's give it a chance to work.

V.W. Gardner put in many hours developing this program and organizing the Certification Boards. His dedication to this project deserves our most hardy thanks and support. I am including his report to me on this project as part of my annual report.

### Degree Teams

This year there were 7 teams authorized to work at the beginning of the year. During the year, two new teams sought authorization and were added to the list. They are the 20th District Officers Association Degree and the "Demolay" Master Mason Degree Team.

All reports reaching me indicate that these Degree Teams demonstrate excellence in their work and are a credit to the fraternity.

Again this year, the Grand Lecturer's staff met 4 times through the year to discuss matters and lay out plans for the year's schools of instruction. At the February 27th meeting, we had the honor of M.W. George Pulkkinen as our guest. At this meeting, we selected the one lodge from eight (8) lodges recommended to confer the Master Mason Degree for Grand Lodge, known as the Grand Lodge Night. The selection for this honor was the most extensive since I have been involved. As the field was narrowed, the applicants were so closely matched, it was necessary to obtain statistics and other information that had not previously been necessary to make a selection. It is very gratifying to see lodges with this kind of commitment to excellence. After a very lengthy selection process, Rising Virtue Lodge #10 was chosen for this honor. The entire Lecture's Staff wishes to congratulate all of the lodges considered for their outstanding work.

Summary Report of V.W. Kenneth R. Gardner, Assistant Grand Lecturer:

The program started early in the Masonic year with a meeting of the District Deputy Grand Masters, the District Representatives, Lodge Masters and other interested Brothers of the four Districts which piloted the program. At this very well attended meeting, hosted by Ocean Lodge, the program philosophy, objectives, and purposes were presented. Those present gave direction and help establishing goals for the seminars to be conducted in the fall. During the summer the Masters of the various lodges forwarded names of Brothers, whom they believed would be interested in becoming a ritual instructor. This list was used to generate a mailing list of about 180 names.

A mailing was made to all lodges and to the Brothers on the mailing lists giving dates, time and locations of the six seminars.

The seminars were well attended, as with any scheduling there are conflicts, weather problems, and unexpected events that cause difficulties for people to attend. In order to be able to utilize the dining room for the seminars, and to keep down the cost of the host lodges, dinners were not held. The seminars were not held in open lodge, this proved to be a real time saver, making it possible to use nearly the full two hours for discussion and study of the ritual. One unexpected benefit of not holding the seminars in open lodge was the Brothers felt freer to attend in more casual attire.

It was decided early on that the goal of the program would be that Certified Lodge Ritual Instructors will be able to read the cipher including the italics correctly in each degree he is certified in. Of the 137 individual Brothers who attended one or more seminars, 89 were tested and 83 were certified in one or more degrees. Brother Don Collins of Warren Philips Lodge traveled to all six seminars.

Temple Lodge, Westbrook, Brotherhood Lodge, Portland, and

Drummond Lodge, North Parsonfield were not represented at any of the seminars. The reasons for their non-participation are unknown.

Accompanying this report are statistical data on attendance and certification.

Some recommendations I would like to make include: A. That the program be continued and expanded into other districts. B. That the lodges be requested to utilize the Brothers that are certified by the Grand Lodge Officers. C. That the program be allowed to develop in the lodge level not by a committee, it should be open and flexible to meet the needs of the lodges and Degree Teams.

The experience of getting this program started has led to the following conclusions: A Although espoused by nearly all Grand Lodge Officers very few view change with anything but distrust and fear. B. We all need to become cognizant of the rapidity that the officers move into the Master's chair and change our expectations what they should be able to do in the way of ritual. C. There are a large number of members and Grand Lodge Officers, who will not only fight change but hold on to their position until the last lodge hall is sold.

I have one regret and that is that literally I don't have the heart to continue the program.

In closing, I wish to express my most heartfelt appreciation for the support I have received during the past five years as Grand Lecturer. I will not seek reappointment to this position as circumstances in my life do not permit my full attention to these responsibilities. I can only echo a statement made to me by R.W. Robert Walker, Past A.G. L. "To be chosen as a teacher of this great fraternity, is perhaps the greatest honor one can have bestowed." To all of my Assistant Lecturers, I wish to thank them for all their support and dedication. They are the greatest group of guys one could have to work with. These past five years have been the best of my Masonic years.

## REPORT OF INDEPENDENT CERTIFIED PUBLIC ACCOUNTANTS

**REPORT OF THE GRAND SECRETARY - 1993**

In Grand Lodge  
Lewiston, Maine  
May 4, 1993

To the Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine:

We have come through another successful year. In the Grand Lodge office, I am happy to report that we are well organized. This has happened because of the efficient and cooperative staff working there. There is little I can tell you about the efficiency and dedication of our Grand Treasurer, and we are very grateful and fortunate to have three secretaries who are a pleasure to work with.

The Masonic year has slipped by so rapidly that it hardly seems possible we are at another Grand Lodge Session. Last summer I held four Lodge Secretaries' Workshops. The secretaries who could attend were most helpful in giving me a great deal of information as well as support, and I trust I did the same for them. However, attendance was again less than 50%, and this makes me wonder why we can't accomplish the same objectives through a questionnaire. Early this summer I will send the secretaries more information about these plans in my newsletter.

Again this year, we have had several lodge secretaries retire. I commend them for their fine work and dedication to the Craft. Many of the Brethren don't realize the countless hours the lodge secretary puts in year round. We have been very fortunate to have them in our lodges, and I am happy to greet and help the young men who have taken their place.

As Masonic activities increase, there is more and more paperwork for your secretaries to do. The young men who have taken on the neverending job need your help and consideration. I strongly recommend that all elected lodge secretaries find a good and loyal brother to assist them in their work. This will train a future secretary for your lodge and he will be ready to take over the job when the time comes for the present secretary to retire. This is a way for the elected secretary to have some help and to provide a smooth transition for the lodge when he is ready to retire.

Unfortunately, there are still a few problems that we have not resolved. The one that continually dogs us is the completion of the Annual Returns and getting them into my office by the deadline of February 1. Again this year, we have five secretaries who had not turned in their Annual Returns by the second week of April. The lateness of these reports creates financial problems for those lodges. The problems created for the Grand Lodge office are too numerous to recount here.

This year we have had a large number of Masonic Trials. You'll get the details on these from the committee chairman.

Another concern we all have is our declining membership, and it should be a concern. The number of deaths creates a loss in our membership. It is interesting, though, that the gap is narrowing. I have told you in the past that we will be leveling off very soon, and that will happen.

What is important now is to always keep in mind that we must be very careful to get the best applicants we can possibly get. Then the real job begins when these candidates become Master Masons. Education is of the utmost importance. I would rather have 31,000 Masonically educated Master Masons than 50,000 Master Masons with 25 or 30% of them not knowing very much about Masonry. In our organization ignorance is not bliss. It is very dangerous.

One of the dangers we have witnessed this past year is the Anti-Masonic movement put forth by some of the churches. A few years ago it was John Ankerberg with his T.V. broadcasts denouncing Masonry. This year we have been barraged by several of the fundamentalists churches and the Southern Baptist Conference. If you are not Masonically educated, there is no way you can know what is happening. The Masonic material is available for all of us to read. It is up to us to get it and read it. Seventy-five percent of the information a Mason needs is contained in three books that most of you have. The first is the *Maine Masonic Text Book*. the second is the cipher, and the third is the *Constitution, Standing Regulations and Digest of Decisions of the Grand Lodge of Maine*. The remaining twenty-five percent is available to all of us in Masonic magazines and books in the Grand Lodge Library.

I also know that those of you who have copies of the Grand Lodge Constitution often have a hard time finding what you're looking for. Don't despair. I do, too, and I refer to it almost daily. The Committee on the Review and Revision of the Constitution under the leadership of Ill. Franklin G. Hinckley has been working diligently all year long, and I am happy to report that we have gotten through the entire section of the Digest of Decisions. When we begin meeting again this month, we will put all the material together and have it printed in a more accessible format. I sincerely thank all the members of the committee for the hours they spent researching the needed materials for our meetings. The members of the committee are Ill. Franklin G. Hinckley, M.W. M. Donald Gardner, R.W. Waino Ray, R.W. Hollis Dixon and R. W. Wayne Adams.

The Grand Master has requested that this committee review the Constitution and Standing Regulations in order to make this format also easier to read and to understand.

Before I close, I do want to mention a project that I will begin working on this summer. I am going to investigate the possibility of getting our office forms in computer format. If you have any information or programs you believe are workable, please let me know. The problem, of course, is that we don't all have computers; and those of us who do, know that they may



not be compatible to the one at Grand Lodge. Nevertheless, we will do what we can to make the job easier for as many as possible as soon as possible.

Before closing I have a good news message for you. The Grand Lodge Office has worked within the budget again this year; and for the seventh year in a row, there will be no rise in the per capita tax.

My office is always open even when I'm home. My job is to provide you with the information you need, so don't hesitate to write or call for that information. In closing, I want to leave you with this suggestion. Take some time this summer to read and study the *MAINE MASONIC TEXT BOOK* and the *GRAND LODGE CONSTITUTION*. There is a wealth of important information contained there.

## GRAND LODGE OF MAINE CHARITABLE FOUNDATION COMMITTEE ON DISTRIBUTION REPORT

In Grand Lodge  
Lewiston, Maine  
May 4, 1993

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine:

The Committee on Distribution is pleased to report distributions relief totaling \$92,445.84 to 50 recipients this past year. This compares with \$105,439.57 last year to 44 recipients. This represents a drop of \$13,393.73 but assistance to 6 more recipients. The recipients by Lodge are indicated on Exhibit A.

In addition this past year, the Foundation has made contributions as follows:

During this past year, we have distributed relief using the same criteria which has been applied in the past:

First, we give priority to elderly Masons and their widows who are in distress because of age or infirmity and are without means to meet their needs or obligations. We always contact the secretary of the Lodge submitting the application, because we find that more often than not the applications do not tell the whole story. It is helpful, but not necessarily determinative, to know whether the Brother or deceased Brother has been an active member of his Lodge. We believe that the commitment and service of a Brother to the fraternity merits consideration.

Second, we try to make sure that our grant enables the recipient to maintain a quality of life. We want what we do to assure that there is food on the table, oil in the tank and medical care that is not otherwise provided for. Accordingly, we sometimes, but not always, give instruction to the Lodges as to which obligations we want to have priority.

Third, we try to enable the recipient to get over an obstacle and back on a self-sustaining budget, because, as a practical matter, we do not have the resources to provide continuing support. (In the past we have sometimes made exceptions for two or three years to enable elderly recipients to remain at home and still have the care they needed.) We often suggest steps which can be taken by Lodge members to help the recipient get back in control of his or her affairs.

Fourth, we try to see what other means are available from the applicant's own resources, from the applicant's family and from the constituent Lodges. In addition, we have pointed out that some requirements are covered by insurance, Medicare and Medicaid. Recently, we suggested that a widow should obtain legal advice concerning creditors who were pressing for payment of some thirty thousand dollars. Our contribution toward the modest legal fee resulted in a determination that those were not obligations for which she was legally responsible at all. In addition, we look to see what resources are available from other Masonic bodies.

Fifth, we transmit funds to the constituent Lodges for payment directly to creditors. No cash is ever given to an applicant.

We are grateful to those other Masonic bodies which have transferred funds to us this past year in order to participate in the grants of relief we have made. Those contributions are as follows:

I, personally, am grateful to the other two members of the Committee for their assistance. The Grand Secretary is often the first point of contact and is very helpful in advising lodge secretaries how to prepare complete applications. The Grand Master has taken an interest in several of the applications and, on one occasion, personally visited a widow and arranged for a Brother to assist her in better organizing her financial affairs so that she would be able to meet her obligations as they fall due.

Finally, we do have the resources to be of greater assistance to Masons or members of their families in need. Each Trustee should make it a point to suggest, where appropriate, that lodge secretaries apply for assistance.

### THE REV. EDWARD LEROY FENDERSON

Edward L. Fenderson was born on Chebeague Island, September 11, 1921, the son of Leslie and Helen Thompson Fenderson. He moved with his family to Portland at an early age and attended the public schools of Portland. He was graduated from Deering High School in 1939, and went on to attend Portland Junior College, University of Southern Maine, Boston University School of Theology, and received his Masters Degree from New York Theological Seminary.

Brother Ed, as he is affectionately known among the Craft, began a part-time ministry at Fryeburg Harbor in 1964. A year later he entered the ministry full time as Minister of Portland's Congress Street Methodist Church and Associate Minister at the Chestnut Street Methodist Church.

Four years later he received a call from Calvary Methodist Church in Lewiston where he served six years. Brother Ed also served Methodist Churches in Cape Elizabeth (six years) Waldoboro (one year) and Southport (8 years). He officially retired in 1990, but has now returned to a part-time ministry as Associate Minister back at Portland's Chestnut Street United Methodist Church.

Ed Fenderson married Gwen Farnham in 1946. They have two daughters, Nancy Harris of Auburn and Jane Leonard of Raymond, and two grandsons, Ned and Benji.

Brother Edward Fenderson was raised a Master Mason February 27, 1949, in Hiram Lodge, South Portland. It was while serving as Worshipful Master of Hiram Lodge in 1962, that he began studying for the ministry. Among Ed's other Masonic affiliations are the York and Scottish Rite bodies of Portland. He is also a member of Kora Temple AAONMS, and Longfellow Chapter, OES. In addition to his responsibilities as Grand Chaplain of the Grand Lodge of Maine, Rev. and Brother Ed Fenderson also serves as Chaplain of Kora Temple.

The Rev. and Wor. Brother Edward L. Fenderson has served his Brethren and all his fellow men with a special love and caring. He is a man who embodies what was good, who exhibits what is good, and who demonstrates a profound faith in the good that awaits us all.



Rev. Edward L. Fenderson -- Brother Ed -- for your distinctive and valued career of service to us all I am truly honored to award you the Josiah Hayden Drummond Medal for Distinguished Service.

Gr. Master: "I would like to just put in an extemporaneous explanation of the kind of service this man has always been able to provide for us. The Grand Secretary a short time ago received an application from a lodge Down East. The application was from a man who, as he filled in his application, where it said 'Do you believe in God as the author and creator of the universe?' -- this applicant said, 'I don't know.' On the back he went on to explain his feelings, his beliefs -- and it seemed to me he was a man who was trying to sort out some very important forces in his life. The secretary of that lodge sent it down to the Grand Lodge office, not sure what to do with the application without receiving direction.

"So I took the application one morning over to Brother Ed, showed it to him, told him my concerns, said I think if we can help this man whether or not he ever becomes a Mason, it's something we should do. 'Ed, what do you suggest? Is there anyone whom you could recommend, a Brother who is also a minister way Down East who might talk with this man,' and Ed said, 'Yes,' he knew just the man who would do it. So I left it there knowing it was in good hands.

"So a short time later I talked with Ed and said, 'Well, did you have any luck with that fellow and how did it go?' And Ed said, 'You know, I took care of that myself. And he did. He talked with this man down there on at least three occasions. Finally he came back to me and said, 'This man believes in a Supreme Being. This man while, perhaps, has a little trouble with the language, he knows that there is a Supreme Being and I recommend that he is properly and spiritually prepared to become a Mason.

"That is certainly going beyond the usual call of business, the usual practice of doing business; but this is just one example of what Brother Ed Fenderson does routinely in his work, in his Freemasonry, and I'm just delighted to be able to present this to you. Is there anything you'd like to say?"

Brother Edward Fenderson: "I'm not a very emotional man. I guess all of you know that. People in my church often joke with me about this. I get emotional at the drop of a hat. I never expected anything like this. I'm indeed grateful, but I shall just continue on as all of us should in brotherly love, relief and truth. What else is there, my dear Brethren? Brotherly love, relief, and truth to one another and to the world that they may know what we're all about. Thank you, thank you so much."

Grand Master: "This certainly is a high note to call this Annual Communication from Labor to Refreshment for lunch. Brother Clovis Frame will give the prayer."

"The Annual Communication will resume at 1:30 P.M."



## FIRST DAY P.M. SESSION

The afternoon session of the Annual Communication was called from refreshment to labor with prayer by Grand Chaplain, David Wigley.

Gr. Master: "One of our many outstanding District Meetings this year was held in the Twenty-second Masonic district. When I walked into that lodge room that night I saw this beautiful highly polished cabinet, if you will, there in front of the lodge room, in front of the podium. I wondered about it for a while, but I didn't wonder too long because this brother who is the Senior Warden of Meridian Splendor Lodge soon got up and explained it. I was so inspired by it I asked him to come here today and share the same message with you. Gerry, if you would please. (Gerald Leighton, Senior Warden of Meridian Splendor Lodge spoke.)

Gerald Leighton: "Most Worshipful Grand Master, Distinguished East. It is really a pleasure and honor to be addressing the Grand Lodge of Maine and to share with you this project that we've recently completed in Newport and we're really kind of proud of it. One of the most interesting aspects of Masonry that's becoming obvious to me is that some of our history reaches back into antiquity. We all know that our first Grand Lodge goes back to 1717. There is an author that I've read thus far that says our history's records stretch much farther back than that. Some of them believe that some of the symbols laid out in this room here today have been brought to us from that shrouded time in antiquity -- the square and compasses resting upon the Holy Scriptures.

One of my favorite symbols is the symbol of the Master's hat. It's the symbol of his authority over the Craft and his responsibility to it. That symbol goes a little further when even our Grand Master doffs his hat when in the presence of someone with higher authority, such as when prayer is being offered at the altar. These are some of the symbols our fraternity is famous for, and which thousands and thousands of books have been written about [inaudible]

In trying to do some of my Masonic reading, which, I think, all of us should do. There are thousands of excellent books. I came across the same story twice, and the second time I came across it -- it became of importance to me like the light was switched on. It was a story about a Brother, who on the occasion of raising his son, [inaudible]. He commissioned a loving cup to be made, a loving cup such as this.

He had it inscribed with all those Masonic symbols that we are always searching for all the time. He commissioned this cup to be sent in an easterly direction, and in an easterly direction only. To be carried by the hand of a brother from one lodge to the next as a symbol of brotherly love. It traveled to many lodges in the State of New York until it went aboard the S.S. Caledonia and went to Europe where it visited lodges in Scotland and Eng-

land and France, and finally made its way to King Solomon's Lodge No. 1 in Jerusalem about the same time the maelstrom of World War II broke out, and how it survived those times nobody knows. Perhaps it's by the all seeing eye.

But for sure, it was carried by the hand of a brother from one lodge to the next. But for whatever reason it next appeared in Australia and New Zealand and finally made its way to the western shores of the United States and finally made its way back home to Indiana some twenty-nine years later. What a great story.

Here we are some thirty five years later. The world has certainly changed considerably since the time this cup [inaudible] for CNN can bring into our living rooms and our hearts and [inaudible]. Nightly news night after night brings us the very worst of human behavior. Once again, as mentioned this morning, Masonry is again under attack by some fundamentalists right here in our own country.

Thus the brethren in Newport decided, 'Couldn't we send a reminder to our brothers in the State of Maine something they could live up to - a living symbol that we are still inclined to live to a higher plain of honor. Couldn't we send something to them that each and every one of them could touch? The symbol that Masonry is still founded on friendship, morality and brotherly love. Couldn't we send something to them that says that Masonry's influence for good is [never ending]. That's when we came up with the idea of this loving cup.

Putting this project together I personally discovered one of the greatest attributes of Masonry, one of the founding principles of Masonry. Masonry unites men of every country, of every sect, political opinion, age and persuasion. The cup itself was handcrafted by a recent Past Master of Meridian Splendor Lodge who by education is an engineer. The making of the box was undertaken by none other than Worshipful Brother Tom Boatman, whose beautiful voice you heard here this morning. He's also a Past Master of Meridian Splendor Lodge. The book of travels was done on the computer by another member of our lodge, a brother [name is inaudible] about twenty five years old.

So you see, this single project united men of every background, of every educational background, retired people, people in their twenties, men of every age, of different religious background. We were all united for the same purpose, the Brotherhood of Man. (Brother Leighton then went on to read from the "Book of Travel." As the cup comes to your lodge, it will be read again there.) What we did then, we presented the cup and asked that it be taken from our Lodge by the hand of a Brother, and as it turns out the Brother who was there that night was our Most Worshipful Grand Master.

The Brothers from Newport are very happy that its first stop was right here at this Grand Lodge meeting.

Note: My apologies to Bro. Leighton for the editing that was done by me to his report. The acoustics and noises in the hall made some of the speech inaudible.

Gr. Master: "And you wonder why I am enthusiastic about this Fraternity. This is the kind of thing that is happening. It's happening everywhere. Men getting together being properly fired by the surge of Freemasonry and moving forward with a tremendous project. I am going to take this because of the historic significance, the first time to Triangle Lodge #1 the premier lodge chartered in this Grand Jurisdiction. The brethren of Triangle Lodge will then take it in whatever direction seems appropriate. Every one of you brethren will one day see it in your Lodge, you will recognize it, you will make appropriate comments, I am sure, in your records. Think what a joy it will be for all of us, but particularly for the brethren from Newport when this completes its journey the first time around, and returns back home. Brother Jerry thank you so much, I really appreciate it. Loved it the first time, and love it the second time too."

## FRATERNAL RELATIONS REPORT

In Grand Lodge  
Lewiston, Maine  
May 4, 1993

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine:

During the past year, Freemasonry has had its good news and its bad news.

Under "good news", the liberation of Eastern Europe from the Communist yoke has brought about a resurgence of Masonry there. Former Grand Lodges in Czechoslovakia, Hungary, Yugoslavia and Poland have been or are in the process of reorganization. New lodges and Grand Lodges are springing up in other locations. The Grand Lodge National of France has recently consecrated a lodge in Paris, made up largely of Russians. A former lodge was recently reconsecrated in East Germany. Several new Grand Lodges are in the process of being formed in West Africa.

On the other side of the coin, the ugly head of anti-Masonry has again reared itself. The Southern Baptist Church, long torn in a power struggle between fundamentalist and moderate factions, at its June 9-11, 1992 annual meeting, voted to begin a year-long study of Freemasonry at the instigation of a group of fundamentalists under the leadership of a Dr. James Holly, author of an inflammatory book, insisting that Freemasonry is a religion, and describing Freemasonry as a "*spiritually devastating and ungodly brotherhood of Satanic darkness.*"

The Board studying the matter is to present its report to be voted at the Southern Baptist Convention in June 1993. We understand the Board will recommend that membership in Masonry should be left up to the individual.

Departing from its traditional practice of ignoring attacks on the Craft, a good deal of attention has been given to answering this vicious assault filled with lies, half truths and misunderstandings applied to something no Mason would ever recognize as the Freemasonry he knows.

## SPECIAL REPORTS

### PRINCE HALL

The background of the controversy surrounding the recognition of Prince Hall Masonry by some Grand Lodges was covered in detail in this Committee's report in 1990, in an article by MW Charles Glassmire, then chairman.

At the present time, recognition of Prince Hall Grand Lodges by those generally referred to as "regular", is proceeding slowly and there are now eight U.S. and two Canadian Grand Lodges in Fraternal relations with the Prince Hall Grand Lodges in their jurisdictions.

This hasn't come without problems however. Some Grand Lodges have severed relations with others who have granted recognition, and have threatened to do the same to any others who may chose to join in recognition. The climate does appear to be easing in some instances, however, and hopefully the matter will be settled in due time.

While not restricted to the Prince Hall controversy alone, it has brought attention to the matter of visitation by Brethren. Some American Grand Lodges and the Grand Lodge of England have forbidden their members to visit lodges in jurisdictions which have recognized Prince Hall Grand Lodges. We do not favor this, and suggest that Maine follow a practice established by California in 1990, which has drawn a good deal of favorable reaction.

Each Grand Lodge may recognize and establish fraternal relations with other Grand Lodges who may not be recognized by Maine. This is within its exclusive control, and not subject to outside interference.

Your committee recommends that so long as Maine continues to recognize a particular Grand Lodge, members of Maine lodges may visit or affiliate with lodges under the jurisdiction of that Grand Lodge even though members of lodges of jurisdictions not recognized by Maine may be present.

### URUGUAY

A request for recognition from the Grand Lodge of Uruguay was received in 1989, but as there were a few unanswered questions, the matter was deferred. It now appears that whatever problems may have existed, have now been solved. Nearly all American Grand Lodges as well as those of the British Commonwealth have now extended recognition, and your Committee recommends that Maine do likewise.

### HUNGARY

The Grand Lodge (Symbolic) of Hungary was re-established in 1989 after decades of darkness behind the iron curtain. A request for recognition has

been received, and the Commission has assured us that it meets the customary requirements for recognition, and we recommend their request be granted.

### PORTUGAL

The new Grand Lodge (Regular) of Portugal was consecrated on June 29, 1991 in Lisbon, before a large international delegation that included representatives from numerous Grand Lodges. The Secretary of the Commission on Recognition was present and the Commission reports favorably on the qualifications of the new Grand Lodge for recognition. Your Committee concurs, and recommends establishment of fraternal relations and the usual exchange of Representatives as requested by the Grand Lodge of Portugal.

### YUGOSLAVIA

The Grand Lodge of Yugoslavia was recently reconstituted, and appeared to the Commission on Recognition to be regular and entitled to recognition. Since that time, however, a number of incidents have brought up questions as to its stability. The political situation has deteriorated to a point where the Grand Lodge of Yugoslavia cannot have influence over a country divided by turmoil, civil war, ethnic cleansing and widespread atrocities reported in the media.

Your Committee considers it prudent to put recognition on "hold" until developments are more promising.

### SUMMARY

Your Committee on Fraternal Relations recommends that the Grand Lodge of Maine enter into Fraternal Relations and exchange of representatives with the Grand Lodges of Uruguay, Hungary and Portugal.

It further recommends that no action be taken at this time regarding recognition of the Grand Lodge of Yugoslavia.

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine:

Our fund raising efforts produced about the same monies as they did last year, approximately \$90,000.00. We receive donations from individual Brethren daily as well as an occasional substantial donation from Lodges, Masters and Wardens Associations, Past Officers Associations and other subordinate bodies. Once again we are indebted to the Grand Chapter of Maine for their very generous donation of \$5,000.00, the Past District Deputies of the 6th District for their donation of \$2,800.00 and the 22nd District for their gift of \$1,000.00. There may be other special donations that I am not aware of.

These funds have been very carefully distributed to those schools who apply for our grants after the Boards' approval. Several special grants were made for the sponsorship of seminars and workshops for training of teachers. The most important and interesting of these was held at the Ramada Inn, South Portland during the week of March 28th through April 2nd. Ninety teachers, students and community people from 6 different school districts attended a week long Alcohol and other Drug School and Community Team Institute which was totally sponsored by the Masons of Maine. We will be meeting with some of these people in our local Lodges in the next few months in order that we might obtain a better understanding of the great work that is being done in these programs in our school and in our communities.

An Award presented by the Governor for our support of the "Maine 2000" program, a statewide program to successfully advance the State of Maine into the next century was gratefully received in ceremonies at the Blaine House last February. Once again this year The Maine Masonic Scholarship Program has been able to place at least one \$500.00 scholarship in every public High School in the State. We granted 132 scholarships, with the assistance of 100 Lodges, Grand Chapter and 4 Officers Associations totaling more than \$70,000.00. This does not include several thousands of dollars in scholarships that have been granted by other Lodges independently from this program.

Many more Lodges have signed up to participate in this program this year. Applications have been sent to the schools for this years scholarships and have just started to come in. During the next 3 weeks we anticipate receiving near 150 applications. This is a busy time. These applications have to be approved, the schools have to be notified of the winners and a letter sent to the students. We also provide a certificate to the Lodges for presentation to the winners by the Lodges. This all has to be done before June 15th. We need the help of all co-sponsoring Lodges, District Deputies and Representatives to accomplish this undertaking.

The Maine Masonic Scholarship Program as well as the Foundation for the Prevention of Drug and Alcohol Abuse Among Children afford Masonary in Maine the greatest opportunity of community involvement and public relations that we have ever had. Let us make the best of it.

## COMMITTEE TO PREPARE FOR THE 175TH ANNIVERSARY OF THE MOST WORSHIPFUL GRAND LODGE OF MAINE

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine, AF&AM

Your Committee has done a considerable amount of preliminary work on programs and activities which might be adopted to mark the Grand Lodge's 175th Anniversary, appropriate to the objectives we'd like to reach.

Ordinarily a 175th anniversary would not be a major milestone, as the centennial or bicentennial is generally considered to be. It would likely be celebrated with a banquet, publication of a history of the organization and maybe some press coverage and a few programs designed to stimulate interest and make members aware of past accomplishments.

But times are not exactly normal today. We've seen numerous attacks on Freemasonry in recent years, mostly by religious fundamentalists who insist that Freemasonry is a religion, which some claim is anti-Christian and that Masons are secretly taught to worship satan. These attacks are as bad as any since the Morgan affair of the last century.

In the past, such slander has been allowed to go unanswered, but these latest have been so vicious and so widespread through television, radio and other media that we must counter the falsehoods and misunderstandings lest they be accepted as true.

The 175th anniversary of the Grand Lodge of Maine gives us an opportunity we can't afford to pass up - to face up to the Masonbashers with some programs and activities which show Freemasonry as it really is, and not as its enemies would like to have people believe it is.

Among these under consideration are information booths at some of the fairs and festivals held in Maine, such as the Union County Fair, the Rockland Lobster Festival, the Maine Highland Festival, and possibly others, participation in local parades, special events and other community affairs. By these, we can bring attention to Freemasonry's charities such as the Scholarship Program, Drug and Alcohol Abuse program, the Shrine Children's Hospitals, the Knight Templar Eye Foundation and many others which benefit everyone and not just Masons.

District meetings and individual lodges might sponsor programs open to the public or made semi-public, on matters of general interest to the community.

Another favorable circumstance is that the State of Maine will also be marking its 175th birthday, and will likely be celebrating it during the year. It may be possible to emphasize that Bro. William King was the first Governor of the State and also the first Grand Master of Masons in Maine, and that many Masons were members of the Convention that drafted Maine's



# Constitution.

There will undoubtedly be proposed a number of programs for Masons and their families on the Grand Lodge, District and Lodge levels.

The present Committee is involved in planning and coordination principally, and welcomes ideas and suggestions. Above all, once plans have been drawn up, we're going to need a lot of help if we're going to make the best use of this rare opportunity to promote Freemasonry in Maine and show it off for what it really is.

Details of the various suggested programs will be made available as soon as they have been drawn up.

# REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON RETURNS

## TO THE MOST WORSHIPFUL GRAND LODGE OF MAINE:

This year's numerical loss is 690 the percentage being 2.02%.

At the close of the calendar year, the total membership was 31,055. Forty-six lodges reported a gain in membership, 131 a loss and 21 remained the same.

Hiram Lodge No. 180 remains the largest, with a membership of 625. Naskeag Lodge No. 171 remains the smallest with 43 members. Two Lodges, Lygonia #40 and Mechanics #66 reported the largest gains (7) for each. Waterville Lodge No. 33 suffered the greatest loss (40). Average membership is 158 and 63 lodges reported fewer than 100 members.

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine:

The dispensations granted by the Grand Master are proper within his prerogative, and are approved.

A number of decisions by the Most Worshipful Grand Master have been referred to the Committee for consideration.

The Grand Master's decisions involving questions of Masonic law and practice have been reviewed by us and are found to be correct.

Much discussion was emanated with respect to the matter of the Grand Master's removal of an incumbent Master of his lodge. The Grand Master conducted his own investigation, spoke at length with the Master in question and having reviewed all the facts concluded that the Master's continuing in office would be detrimental to the fraternity because of unmasonic conduct finally adjudicated during his term of office. In the normal course this matter would have been referred to The Commissioners of Trials and then to the Committee on Grievances and Appeals for report to the Grand Lodge. If the Grand Master had, in fact, suspended the Master from Masonry, the matter would have been accorded the foregoing due process.

However, The Grand Master, exercising the inherent powers of his office, determined upon a less stringent course of action. Since the term of office as Master has now expired the matter is, in fact, moot and seemingly not the subject of further appeal.

Gr. Master: "Brethren, at this time I would like to introduce to you Most Worshipful, Francis R. Mitchell, Grand Master of Masons in New Jersey; Brother Francis."

"Most Worshipful Grand Master, R.W. Deputy Grand Master & Heir to the Throne of Grace, College of Cardinals the Most Worshipful Sirs the Past Grand Masters of this Grand Lodge, my colleagues from the visiting Grand Lodges and finally my Brethren one and all:

Earlier on I heard the Grand Secretary talking about how he was going to try and computerize your Lodges, and before I get too far along and forget what I really want to say, John, all you have to do is get in touch with Ray Bellini. We already have accomplished the computerization with programs and so forth for 70 Lodges, which we will make available to you, and with 20 more or so. By the time I get back to New Jersey more than half of our Lodges will be computerized and you are welcome to everything we have. We have a very active Computer Committee and what we have is yours.

Good afternoon to the Grand Lodge of Maine. It is a singular pleasure for me to be here and I would like to thank your Grand Master for the many courtesies that he has extended to each of us here, today his visiting colleagues. It has been a most enjoyable day and a half, most of us arriving yesterday. Last evening the Grand Master's Banquet was very enjoyable and it was very nice visiting with many of you at that time. Today has been no less interesting to me and the other visitors. This has been a very well run Grand Lodge you are very fortunate to have a very competent Grand Master.

As I said, I am very pleased to be here and last night we had a very revered jurist talk to us, a Judge, and a Right Worshipful Officer of the Grand Lodge and being a Judge reminded me of a joke that went through the Grand Lodge of New Jersey some time ago. It seems that there had been a young person



convicted of a capital crime in some state, and as he was being led through the prison yard to the place of his execution, the gibbet, he struggled mightily naturally because no one goes willingly to meet his maker and they finally got him up the thirteen steps, and up on the platform and the Warden asked if he had anything to offer and he launched into a tirade against Masons. He said, it is all a Masonic plot my execution. The guy I killed was a Mason, and it is his fault. The Prosecutor was a Mason, the Judge was a Mason and half the jury were Masons. He went on and on and finally the hangman put the noose around his neck and said; advance one step with your left foot.

I am pleased to be here, I have a very good friend who lives downeast. He is probably very well to do like the Brother told about this morning. He professes to be poor but he has a home downeast and another one in Florida. I see him periodically on his way back and forth through New Jersey either on his way to Maine or Florida. He bought this place on a lake downeast sometime ago. He is a very loquacious sort of individual, talks very quick and very fast and he tried to identify very quickly with his downeast neighbors. He tells the story about one he walked up to and said as a point of conversation, 'have you lived here all your life?' and the old gent said 'Not Yet', and a couple of weeks later he ran into the same old guy, after it had rained for four days and three nights and he said to the old gent', do you think this rain will ever stop? and his reply, 'It always has'.

Finally there is the one about his neighbor, Mr. Peabody. I know that's not the way you pronounce it but you will have to forgive the New Jersey pronouncement. Mr. Peabody had some problem with the local telephone company. He had one of those crank phones and he would crank it up and nothing would happen. He got very exasperated and finally the operator came on and he told her in no indescribable terms what she could do with the telephone and in what part of the anatomy she could insert it. As profanity on the telephone means removal of the phone she reported him to the Public Utilities Commission and they in turn got hold of Mr. Peabody and told him if you don't apologize to the lady they will come to take your phone out. No way you're not going to do that. Finally a contingent, went out to see him, from the PUC and the telephone company and explained to him what was going to happen, you'll have to apologize to her. He thought long and hard about it, and finally went over to the phone, cranked it up and said 'Are you the lady I insulted recently? She replied, 'Yes'. He said, 'Get ready they are bringing it back'.

On a more serious note you know the difficulty about being a speaker at a Masonic Convention. Everything that could be said has already been said more times than any of us would care to admit it or recall it, and certainly this Grand Lodge has had two eloquent speakers, last night and today. Everything that could be done and every recommendation regarding conduct of Master Masons has been offered to each of you by Brother Steadman last night and certainly the most inspiring address this morning by your Grand Master. If each of you could take only one little part and interact any part of

what your Grand Master or R.W. Steadman mentioned last night or this morning - little things to consider and to try and act upon - this Grand Lodge would be very well served. However, I will try - I will try to give you my perspective on how I view Freemasonry. I am convinced, and I've been a Mason since 1958, and like so many others here I was a District Deputy Grand Master for ten years and I've been in the trenches. But I am convinced that being a Master Mason is not the easiest job in the world. I am reminded, and I am not a biblical student, but I do recall reading some time back about the simple fact that Masons really put great store in Solomon's Temple and that is how it should be.

But back in *Numbers* there is another little occurrence which I think depicts how we should approach Masonry. When Moses finally got out of the wilderness and had to build a Tabernacle he assigned various members of the tribes responsibility for building that Tabernacle and contrary to what you see in Cecil DeMille's "The Ten Commandments" where the Tabernacle is on wheels and they wheel it around. If you read *Numbers* you will find out that the Tabernacle and all the Holy Vessels were carried on the shoulders of the Kohathites. Everybody else in all the other tribes were able to use wheels and any other method conveyed for the elements and parts of the Tabernacle, but not the sons of Kohath. They had to bare the Tabernacle on their shoulders and that's pretty much what Masons have to do. We have to bare Masonry on our shoulders. It has to be carried by each of us. There is know easy way.

I know you heard your Grand Master, this morning, talking about change and the things he is trying to do. There is another little part in the *Book of Kings* which I think typifies again where each of you are sitting and then where each of us sits. Somewhere in the *Book of Kings* there is a story about two lepers who get thrown out of a city that is under seige. They are in front of the gate and they can't get back inside because the people inside are killing and they can't go forward because the enemies of the siege will kill them, too. They wait and wait wondering about their fate when eventually they decide to get up and move. They move off to where the enemy has gone and find that the enemy is no longer there. It is not that the enemy is no longer there, it is the fact they got up and decided to move that is critical to each of us as Master Masons. We can no longer sit and bemoan our fate. We have done that too long, far too long, in every Grand Lodge in the United States of America. It is time to get up and go forward and I heard the Grand Master earlier on today and last night say there is only one way this Grand Lodge is going to go and that is forward and upward. You have got to be like those two lepers; you've got to get up and walk behind your Grand Master and help him in all the programs he has designed.

I think the simple question each of us has to remember, and I know what it is in the Grand Lodge of New Jersey, and I think it is probably similar in this Grand Lodge because while we do have perhaps new answers and basic small differences in our ritual each of us started the same way. Somewhere in our distant past, our history, someone asked us 'Are you duly and truly

prepared? Are you worthy and well qualified? Each of you has to answer that question yourself. Are you indeed duly and truly prepared to assist your Grand Master as he takes your Grand Lodge and prepares it for the balance of this Century and prepares to leave it to the 21st Century for those Masons not yet members of the Grand Lodge.

Your Grand Master, and I, our commitment is much the same. Although we have not ever discussed this commitment, and I am sure it is pretty much the same with each Grand Lodge Officer sitting behind me here, we are dedicated to the simple premise that each of us as Grand Lodge Officers are going to leave our particular Grand Lodge better for each of us having been Grand Master. I think each of us Master Masons have to have that same dedication and that same enthusiasm. You have to leave your Masonry, your particular sphere of Masonry better for the simple fact that you were indeed a Master Mason in a Lodge in the Grand Lodge of Maine. As a Mason by the name of Gates once said if we are to inherit that which has been bequeathed to us we must indeed earn it anew. Each of you have heard that particular brand of Masonry from someone you don't even know, someone who disappeared off the face of this earth a hundred years or more ago; so you must again earn that which has been bequeathed to you by that legion of Master Masons who are long gone to the Grand Lodge above.

Now, Grand Master, each of us your visiting guests commend you, congratulate you and wish the richest of God's blessings upon you."

To the Grand Master, Officers and Members of the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine:

1. Proposed:

Sec. 90:2A These funds for the Maine Mason are (delete-mentioned primarily for The Maine Mason but shall not) (add - ~~to~~) be considered (add - as though they are) dedicated funds. (delete - These funds shall be subject to Section 35 of the Constitution as any other Grand Lodge Funds,) (add - If The Maine Mason shall cease to be published this levy shall likewise cease.)

Sec. 90:2A will read with the deletions and additions:

These funds for The Maine Mason are to be considered as though they are dedicated funds. If The Maine Mason shall cease to be published this levy shall likewise cease.

2. Proposed:

Sec. 114 "All Lodges in the 19th Masonic District, to wit: York Lodge No. 22, St. John's Lodge No. 51, Fraternal Lodge No. 55, Arundel Lodge No. 76, Ocean Lodge No. 142, Preble Lodge No. 143, Yorkshire Lodge No. 179, Naval Lodge No. 184, Springvale Lodge No. 190 and St. Aspinquid Lodge No. 198, shall have concurrent jurisdiction with each other."

The committee recommends the acceptance of these proposed amendments and that they be sent to the subordinate lodges for their consideration and to be voted on at the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine, May 1994.

Following the presentation of this report, the following Proposed Amendments to the Constitution were proposed from the floor:

In accordance with Section 137 of the Constitution and Standing Regulations of the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine, the Masters and Wardens Association of the 14th Masonic District propose two amendments to the existing Constitution, and if these proposed changes are accepted by the Grand Lodge, they be referred to a committee entered upon the records, pub-

lished with the other Proceedings of the Grand Lodge, and sent to the several subordinate lodges for their consideration; and it shall be deemed in order to take up the subjects and act upon them definitely at the next annual communication:

Amendment #1 - That the Constitution and Standing Regulations of the Grand Lodge of Ancient Free and Accepted Masons of the State of Maine, Part First Section 2, "OFFICERS AND MEMBERS -- RANK AND TITLE" which list the permanent members of the Grand Lodge be amended to include; Worshipful Past Masters of all currently and previously chartered lodges under this jurisdiction. (1)

Amendment #2 - That the Constitution and Standing Regulations of the Grand Lodge of Ancient Free and Accepted Masons of the State of Maine, Part Fourth "Standing Regulations" Standing Regulation #1, which covers entitlement to payment of mileage be amended to include subparagraph (e) stating; Worshipful Past Masters of all currently and previously chartered lodges under this jurisdiction shall not be entitled to payment of mileage and per diem unless entitled to the same under paragraph (a) or (b).(2)

In an attempt to improve the trials procedure, and the appeals procedure, should an accused seek to appeal the recommendation of the Trials Commission to the Grand Lodge, the following amendments are proposed to the Constitution of the Grand Lodge of Free and Accepted Masons of the State of Maine.

# 1. To Section 36. 3 On Grievances and Appeals.

The Committee on Grievances and Appeals shall have referred to it all matters of controversy and grievances and petitions or applications for reinstatement or restoration to Masonry *shall review the proceedings of the Board of Commissioners of Trials and recommend to the Grand Lodge any penalties to be imposed in cases where a brother is found guilty of a Mason's offense*

**strike out section in Italics and replace with the following:**

and shall hear appeals from recommendations of the Commissioners of Trials, and on receiving and hearing such appeals, shall review the proceedings and findings of the Board of Commissioners of Trials and make appropriate recommendation to the Grand Lodge.(3)

**to Section 49 (bold italics is proposed addition)**

g. The examination upon the charge and accusation shall be had at some convenient place and time to be designated by the Commissioners *not later than 90 days prior to the next annual communication of the Grand Lodge*, of which said place and time due notice shall be given, and no visitors shall be admitted except as counsel or witnesses. Unless otherwise ordered by the Commissioners, the testimony may be taken by

the Chairman, or any member designated by him, who shall reduce the substance of the same to writing, to be submitted to the Board. Witnesses, if Masons, shall testify on their honor as such. Other witnesses shall be duly sworn before their testimony is taken. (4)

j. A report of the proceedings and summary of the facts in each case, including the finding and recommendation of the Commissioners thereon, shall be signed by the Commissioners acting in such case and shall be *submitted to the Committee on Grievances and Appeals at least seven days before the annual communication of Grand Lodge at which it is to be presented. The finding of Commissioners and recommendation of the committee shall be subject to correction or review by the Grand Lodge.*

**section in italics to be replaced by the following:**

sent by registered mail to the accused, at his last known address, within 30 days of hearing such case, together with a notice that he may appeal the recommendations of the Commissioners of Trials, said appeal to be filed with the Grand Secretary within 15 days of receiving said notice. Upon receipt of notice of appeal, the Grand Secretary shall forthwith file with the Chairman of the Committee on Grievances and Appeals, the report, findings and recommendations made by said Commission pursuant to Section 36, subparagraph 3. Failure to file an appeal within the time provided for herein shall terminate any right of appeal and the findings and recommendations of the Commissioner of Trials shall be reported directly to the Grand Lodge for review and final determination. (5)

4.1. (new provision) Any Brother may appeal a finding of the Commissioners of Trials, in his case, to the Committee on Grievances and Appeals which will hear said appeal and make appropriate recommendation to the next annual communication of the Grand Lodge. Said appeal must be made within 15 days of receiving notification from the Commissioners of Trials. (6)

#### **5. Proposed:**

Sec. 2: That all Past Grand Treasurers will be accorded Permanent Member status. That all Past Grand Secretaries will be accorded Permanent Member status, and that District Representatives, while in office, be accorded Grand Lodge Member status.(7)

These proposed changes resulted in several long discussions on various aspects of the proposals both pro and con. The final vote was that those recommendations by the Committee passed as well as the following: Items 3 through 7 in parenthesis. Item #1 was defeated and this eliminated Item #2.

This session of the Annual Communication was called from Labor to Refreshment, with a prayer by Grand Chaplain Lawrence Hathorne, to reconvene at 9:00 A.M., Wednesday, May 5, 1993.

## DAY TWO WEDNESDAY MAY 5, 1993

The second day of the 174th Annual Communication was called from labor to refreshment by M.W. George P. Pulkkinen at 9:00 A.M.

Grand Chaplain, Philip J. Libby opened the session with prayer.

The first order of business was to complete the reports in a timely fashion and hold the Installation of Officers for 1993-94.

The first report given was the Condition of the Fraternity report by R.W. Gerald Pickard.

### CONDITION OF THE FRATERNITY

In Grand Lodge  
Lewiston, Maine  
May 4, 1993

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine:

First let me say that in giving this report I must deviate from the written report because there are several items of business that are not contained in the report that I would like to bring to your attention. The first of these is to thank M. W. Brother Harold L. Chute for writing this report. Brother Harold served as Chairman of this committee for many years and as time would not often permit I would review the reports and write the report. This year I became Chairman and lo and behold Brother Harold had to write the report. Thank you Brother Harold for taking care of this for me -- it is greatly appreciated.

### CONDITION

Of the 198 lodges of this Grand Jurisdiction only 173 reports were received. (Approximately twenty five reports were not received and this information is lost in this Grand Jurisdiction. It is imperative that these reports reach the Grand Lodge Office by April 1st.) In a study of the "rendition of the ritual" there were 30 Excellent, 72 Very Good, 54 Good, 17 Fair and 0 Poor compared to 1992 results as follows:

Basically it appears that "the rendition of ritual" is very satisfactory in the Jurisdiction. Another feature of note is that very frequently the "rendition of ritual" is one or even two grades above the "floor work". This could mean more attention in Schools of Instruction should be given to floor work. Your committee, however, feels the ritual work is in good shape.

Again this year many lodges are having more semi-public events such as breakfasts, lunches, dinners and open houses. This is an excellent way to impress the public of some of our good works.

The Drug and Alcohol Abuse and Scholarship Programs seem to be well known by all lodges but the Scholarship Program seems to have the popularity edge. This is no doubt due to the fact this program often receives local publicity in the schools and newspapers.

As Masons we are dedicated to Charity and of the 173 reports received the total Charity Funds were \$1,866,927. This is to be commended. However, there are some Lodges that do not have any Charity Fund and usually they are the lodges that request support from the Grand Lodge Charity Fund. If one studies the records over the past 25 years, a large portion of these funds were accumulated over this time, except possibly, some of the few lodges that now have Charity Funds of over \$100,000.00.

Generally the lodges without Charity Funds are smaller, isolated lodges except the Bangor lodges which have their own special fund combined with other Masonic Bodies. The obvious reason for this discussion is to prove that we as Masons believe in Charity and secondly this fund alone should generate interest annually about \$80,000 to Charity.

### LODGE RATINGS:

The 1A report of the District Deputy Grand Masters lists in some detail questions relating to the excellent programs of Grand Lodge--1. Widows, 2. Care and Share, 3. Charity, 4. Lodge Operations, 5. Youth Activities, 6. District Activities, 7. Special Events, 8. Publicity, 9. Lodge Leadership Development Program.

It is almost impossible to make an accurate statistical analysis of this data but it appears that lodges tend to specialize. In other words, some lodges are productive in one area and not another. It was observed that some of the older and larger lodges are excellent in everything relating to ritual but do very little on many of the other programs. The fact remains that apart from lodge operations and ritual we should be conscious that in this society if we are to survive as a good organization we need to do more on these so-called "outside activities" of Masonry. Perhaps the way to pursue these programs is for an individual lodge to pursue vigorously one or two programs and not try to do them all and fail miserably.

Again as last year the greatest weakness is in the area of Publicity. We as

Masons must notify the world of the good things we do and what we stand for and one of the greatest of these is Charity.

#### **DDGM REPORTS:**

Of the 24 Districts, a summary by the District Deputy Grand Master was not received from 4 Districts. The reports received were really very well done. They highlight the great amount of work, meetings attended, support and miles travelled by these District Deputy Grand Masters and without them this Jurisdiction would have a great loss. They do represent the Most Worshipful Grand Master and are a very fine group of Masons. District Deputy Grand Masters from Districts 2,4,7, and 18 submitted outstanding reports.

#### **SUMMARY:**

Fundamentally, Masonry is in good hands and is making progress. As the rest of society changes toward the 21st Century so must Masonry change. Even though we as individuals are getting older, Masonry must maintain our traditions yet change with Society. This is going to be very difficult. Masons have a great challenge ahead. Your committee has found in these hundreds of pages of reports that our lodge halls are being improved, our Charity Funds are growing, our programs are being expanded and supported and the future is bright.

The committee is appreciative of the Constituent Lodges, Grand Lodge Officers, District Deputy Grand Masters and Grand Representatives for their efforts to improve the Condition of the Fraternity. Our committee suggests that all recommendations contained in these reports of the District Deputy Grand Masters be referred to the proper committees of Grand Lodge.

## GRIEVANCES AND APPEALS

In Grand Lodge  
Lewiston, Maine  
May 5, 1993

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine:

On January 22, 1993 this Committee received an appeal from Jefferson Lodge #100 to rescind the fine of \$111.00 which they paid as a penalty for not sending in their report for 1991 on time. After reviewing all the correspondence from the Lodge Secretary to the Grand Lodge Office and from The Grand Secretary and Grand Master to the Lodge, we can find no reason for clemency toward the repeal of the fine.

Section 84 of the Grand Lodge Constitution clearly states that the Per Capita Tax and Lodge Returns must be made on or before the first day of February. In the case of Jefferson Lodge #100 the returns were made 106 days after they were due, and the Lodge did not vote to pay the dues until Feb. 17th, 17 days after they were due in Grand Lodge. Since we can find no extenuating circumstances in this particular case, we recommend that the appeal be denied.

Most Worshipful Grand Master, I move that the appeal for the rescinding of the \$111.00 fine against Jefferson Lodge #100 be denied.

By vote of the Grand Lodge of Maine this appeal request was denied.

ANDREWS BRUCE CAMPBELL was charged in the United States District Court on two charges of intentionally passing marijuana with the intent of distributing the same. He was found guilty on both counts and sentenced to a fine and one year in prison. His appeal was turned down, and he was also disbarred from the practice of law.

At a Masonic Trial held at the Masonic Temple in Auburn, Maine on November 10, 1989, Andrews B. Campbell was found guilty of Gross Unmasonic Conduct and it was recommended that he be expelled from all the rights and privileges of Masonry.

This information was presented to this Committee and on May 2, 1990, after reviewing the findings of the Commissioners on Trials, we recommended that Andrews B. Campbell be expelled from all the rights and privileges of Masonry. By vote of the Grand Lodge, Andrews B. Campbell was expelled

from all the rights and privileges of Masonry.

On April 29, 1992, Andrews B. Campbell appealed to Village Lodge #26 in Bowdoinham, Maine to be reinstated to Masonry. On October 10, 1992, the Grand Secretary received a letter from R.W. Bradford D. Blake, Secretary of the Lodge, stating that at their meeting of September 2, 1992, the letter of Andrews B. Campbell, requesting restoration of membership, was read and a Committee of Inquiry was appointed by the Master.

Notices were sent to all the members of the Lodge and on October 7th, at their stated meeting, the Investigating Committee, having met with Andrews B. Campbell, and having made other contacts into his standing, recommended that he be restored. After much discussion by the members present, the ballot box was then used and a unanimous vote resulted in recommendation to the Grand Lodge that Andrews B. Campbell be restored to membership in Masonry.

This information was presented to this Committee on December 17, 1992 and on January 27, 1993, Andrews B. Campbell appeared before the Committee in the Trustees Room of The Grand Lodge in Portland, Maine.

After due consideration, the majority of this Committee feels that Andrews B. Campbell has paid his penalty to society, both civil and criminal. Also, because of a favorable unanimous ballot from his home Lodge, we recommend that Andrews B. Campbell be restored to Membership in Masonry.

Most Worshipful Grand Master, I move that Andrews B. Campbell be restored to all the Rights and Privileges of Masonry.

By action of Grand Lodge, Andrews B. Campbell was restored to all the rights and privileges of Freemasonry.

CLYDE A. ROTH, a member of Augusta Lodge #141 had been charged with shoplifting a package of cigarettes, to which he pleaded guilty and paid a fine of \$50.00. Clyde A. Roth was suspended from all the rights and privileges of Freemasonry by Grand Master George P. Pulkkinen and a hearing before the Commissioners on Trials was ordered. A hearing was held at the Masonic Temple in Auburn on March 26, 1993.

Clyde A. Roth appeared at the Trial with 14 witnesses. After due consideration of his pleas and the testimony of the witnesses as well as a series of letters from the Grand Master, and several others, the Board voted to life the suspension and restore Clyde A. Roth to all the rights and privileges of Freemasonry.

Your Committee on Grievances and Appeals reviewed the findings and find that all was in order. We agree with the verdict and the recommendations.

Most Worshipful Grand Master, I move that the suspension of Clyde A. Roth be lifted and that he be restored to all the rights and privileges of Freemasonry.

LARRY LEE CAMPBELL was charged by members of the Investment Club consisting of members of Tranquil Lodge #29, of unmasonic conduct, wherein he was obliged to contribute equal amounts monthly with the other members and administer the fund, but it was discovered that he failed to put his money into the investment.

Larry Lee Campbell was suspended from all the rights and privileges of Freemasonry by the Grand Master, M. W. George P. Pulkkinen and a hearing before the Commissioners of Trials was ordered.

Larry Lee Campbell appeared before the Commissioners at a hearing held in Auburn, Maine, on March 26, 1993 and pleaded guilty to the charges. On consideration of the evidence and the fact that this was an intentional fraud on other Masonic members, the Board voted unanimously to recommend expulsion of Mr. Campbell from all the rights and privileges of Freemasonry.

Your Committee on Grievances and Appeals reviewed the findings and find that all was in order. We agree with the verdict and the recommendation.

Most Worshipful Grand Master, I move that Larry Lee Campbell be expelled from all the rights and privileges of Freemasonry.

By action of the Grand Lodge Larry Lee Campbell was expelled from all the rights and privileges of Freemasonry.

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine:

STEPHEN DEANE was charged with theft, a Class C crime. He was found guilty of Theft and a sentence of four years in prison was pronounced by the Judge, with all four years suspended, but to serve four years proba-

tion and make restitution of \$11,000, the value of the inventory he was charged with stealing.

Stephen Deane was suspended by the Grand Master, M.W. George P. Pulkkinen, and a hearing before the Trial Commissioners was ordered.

Hearing was held at the Masonic Temple in Auburn, Maine, on March 26, 1993. Mr. Deane appeared before the Commissioners and explained that although he was in charge of the inventory which disappeared, he did not steal it. The policeman in charge of the investigation was alleged to have taken the inventory and disposed of it and was suspended from the force as a result of his action. A letter was presented by Michael LaChance attesting to the high integrity of Mr. Deane and that he was a victim of circumstances. In addition five Brothers spoke in behalf of Mr. Deane.

Upon consideration of all the evidence, it was voted to recommend a continuance of the suspension of Mr. Deane until his restitution is complete or the time of his probation expires, whichever occurs first.

Your Committee has reviewed the findings and find that all was in order. We agree with the verdict and the recommendation.

Most Worshipful Grand Master, I move that the suspension of Stephen Deane be continued until his restitution is complete or the time of his probation expires, whichever comes first.

By action taken by the Grand Lodge the recommendation of the Committee was accepted as presented.

He would not be returning to Maine until the middle of April because of his job commitment.

The Board considered the request and voted to deter the consideration of the charge until the next meeting of the Board.

## GRAND HISTORIAN'S REPORT

In Grand Lodge  
Lewiston, Maine  
May 4, 1993

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine, AF& AM:

Without doubt, the name of Josiah Hayden Drummond is the best known Mason in Maine Freemasonry. Not only was he a famous Mason, but was also noted for his accomplishments as a lawyer, business leader, political figure and public servant among other things. Few will recognize him as a historian however. He was - and an excellent one too! Probably the best lodge history I've ever read was his "History of Portland Lodge No. 1" (Now Triangle Lodge No. 1) which was published back in 1881.

Most people have been exposed to history in their early school days when it was taught mostly as a bunch of names, dates and places in which they had little interest and considered it had not much relevance to present day happenings. But it doesn't have to be so!

Not long ago I was skimming through this History of Portland Lodge and had quite a surprise. I'd just finished looking up some of the background of Prince Hall Masonry in connection with a report for the Committee on Fraternal Relations, and on one of the early pages on Drummond's History, the name "Prince Hall" jumped out.

Prince Hall Masonry which has been in the limelight so much recently, is an organization similar in nearly all respects to our own, but its membership is almost exclusively made up of Blacks. It had its beginning in the days following the Revolutionary War. Because of some unresolved legalities, it has never been recognized as regular by the Freemasonry we're a part of. It has Grand Lodges in many States but for over two centuries, it has been considered irregular or clandestine by what we consider regular Freemasonry, and the two organizations have streered parallel courses with little or no contact with each other.

The impass was broken several years ago when the Grand Lodge of Connecticut recognized the Prince Hall Grand Lodge of that State as regular, and since that time several other Grand Lodges have done the same. There is still a lot of controversy on the matter but the reference to Prince Hall in Drummond's history shows that history can be relevant to current events. The reference is quoted as Drummond gives it:-

"In the Cumberland Gazette...(May 1787)...the following:

*In Captain Scott, lately arrived from London, the African Lodge in Boston, receives a charter which his Royal Highness the Duke of Cumberland and*

*the Grand Lodge of Great Britain (sic) have been pleased to grant."*

This refers to the famous charter granted to Prince Hall and others under the authority of which other lodges of colored men were formed.

In the Gazette of April 24, 1788 is the following :-

*"A copy of a petition presented to the General Court of this State. at their late session, taken from the original, in the handwriting of the signer, who is a free negro in the town of Boston.*

"The Petition of a great number of Blacks, freemen of this Commonwealth, humbly sheweth:

*That your petitioners are justly alarmed at the inhuman and cruel treatment that three of our brethren, free citizens of the town of Boston lately received.*

*The Captain (or a vessel) under pretense that his vessel was in distress on an island below in this harbor, having got them on board, put them in irons, and carried them off from their wives and children, to be sold for slaves...What then are our lives and liberties worth, if they may be taken away in such a cruel and unjust manner as this? ...We can assure your Honors that many of your free Blacks that have entered on board of vessels as seaman have been sold as slaves... One thing more we would beg leave to hint, that is, that your petitioners have for some time past, beheld with grief, ships cleared out from this harbor for Africa, and they either steal our brothers and sisters, fill their ship holds full of unhappy men and women crowded together, then set out for the best market to sell them there, like sheep for the slaughter, and then return here like honest men, after having sported with the lives and liberty of their fellow men, and at the same time call themselves christians...Do us that justice that our present condition requires, as God and the good laws of this commonwealth shall dictate to you.*

**Prince Hall**

This petition was granted and a law enacted which is published in the Gazette. The petition is given to introduce the following from the Gazette of September 18, 1788:

(Extract of a letter from Boston)

*"I have one piece of good news to tell you. The negroes who kidnapped from here last Winter are returned. They were carried to St. Bartholomew's and offered for sale. One of them was a sensible fellow and a Freemason. The merchants to whom they were offered was of this fraternity. They soon became acquainted. The negro told his story. They were carried before the Governor with the shipmaster and the supercargo. The story of the negroes was, that they were decoyed on board under pretense of working."*

As the story finishes, they were held until proof of their story could be checked, then they were freed and returned to Boston.

The African Lodge referred to as having received its charter, was the root from which Prince Hall Masonry grew. While some Masonic lawyers today are busy arguing about the regularity of origin of Prince Hall Masonry, the story of the kidnapping of the free Blacks and the attempt to sell them as slaves, gives a vivid picture of some of the conditions they faced right here in our own part of the Country.

I think it shows that lodge histories can and should be much more than a summary of the Secretary's minutes of what goes on inside the walls of the lodge room. The lodge is a part of the community in which it is located, and its history ought to reflect it.

One of the Grand Historian's jobs is to review the lodge histories sent in covering the past year, and try to grade them so we can give recognition to the best of them. All too many of them can be glanced at and put aside as having not much of interest in them. The middle group show more interest, effort and understanding as to the purpose being served, and the third -- and smallest group has definite value and show promise.

This year's batch covering 1992 shows more of the middle group - histories that will make interesting reading by our Brethren of 50 and 100 years down the road.

As was the case last year, there were three outstanding histories submitted, one of which was by the Grand Historian's Award winner for 1992. Of the two remaining, we had to select one, and we're glad to present the 1993 Grand Historian's Award to:-

**R.W. John H. Miller, of Eastern Lodge No. 7**

We're also happy to recognize the "runner-up" and three others who deserve special mention, and to present them with Certificates of Merit.

## REPORT OF THE PUBLIC RELATIONS COMMITTEE

In Grand Lodge  
Lewiston, Maine  
May 4, 1993

To the Grand Lodge of Maine, A.F. & A.M.:

As recently appointed chairman of the Committee on Public Relations for the Grand Lodge, I must defer credit for the single most important act of publicity since the 1992 Grand Lodge session to the former chairman, M.W. George P. Pulkkinen. The tabloid publication prepared by M.W. Bro. Pulkkinen, was indeed a work of 'art' and, with its distribution in all the major newspapers in Maine, must have made a great impact in educating non-Masons of what Masonry is truly all about.

In a time when Masonry is coming under attack from some self-serving, uninformed and poorly informed religious quarters, that tabloid (which is still available) should have answered any doubts non-Masons may have had about our Fraternity. All they needed to do was read the various articles with an open mind and they would see that Masonry is not the 'villain' as portrayed by a vocal minority of some ultra-fundamentalist religious bigots.

Another source of publicity that I cannot claim credit for is contained in recent Scottish Rite publications. A long-time friend of Masonry, John J. Robinson, has two articles published in "The Northern Light"... one on the "Southern Baptist Controversy" and a companion item on "Who is Dr. Holly?"

Bro. Robinson first came into contact with Freemasonry while preparing a book "Born in Blood." Since then he has been a strong advocate for the Masonic Fraternity. Last fall he received his Masonic degree in Ohio.

John Robinson, as a non-Mason, has been defending the fraternity against vicious attacks for several years. Bro. Robinson's first association with Masonry came when researching his book "Born In Blood." He soon found himself defending the Craft on radio and TV talk shows as well as speaking engagements.

The articles in the February "Northern Light" were excerpts from "A Pilgrim's Path" which explains the experiences that led to a decision to join the Fraternity.

Brother Robinson explains that, while Dr. Holly claims to represent the anti-Masonic views of Southern Baptists, thousands of Southern Baptist ministers are Masons and approximately half a million Masons are Southern Baptists. To fully understand this controversy, one needs to read the aforementioned articles in The Northern Light as well as a publication presented by the Southern Masonic jurisdiction.

On my own behalf, I have been successful in publishing a number of pictures and articles that show, at least in part, what Maine Masons are doing... Pictures showing M. W. Bro. Pulkkinen receiving awards from Gov. McKernan (along with M.W. Bro. Ernest Curtis) and the Dept. of Education; presenting awards; and presiding at Lodge combining ceremonies and installations. Also pictures of newly installed officers of individual Lodges.

Tips on publishing the many activities of individual Lodges have been distributed in numerous areas of our Grand Jurisdiction and will continue to be distributed.

And we should not forget the work of Public Relations Committee member, Wor. Bro. Arthur Griffiths in publishing the Maine Mason.

Nor should we forget the untiring efforts of R.W. Harland S. Hitchings for the many pictures he has taken and had published. Although 'officially' chairman of the Photography committee, Bro. Hitchings' work is certainly a substantial part of Grand Lodge publicity efforts.

Our Scholarship and Drug and Alcohol Abuse programs have received much favorable publicity for the Craft, thanks to the efforts especially of M. W. Bro. Ernest Curtis.

All in all, I would say that, with the aforementioned dedication of many good Masons, Masonry in Maine and the United States has received a goodly amount of publicity during 1992-1993.

## INSURANCE COMMITTEE REPORT

In Grand Lodge  
Lewiston, Maine  
May 3, 1993

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine:

During the past several years every Lodge has been given information and the opportunity to have a survey completed for their insurance needs. The survey includes reviewing their present coverage, determining what exposures exist, appraising the Lodge building and advising the Lodge what changes should be made to have adequate protection, not only for the Lodge but also to protect all other organizations or associations that have use of the premises or have a financial interest in the property.

Over 150 Lodges have responded to having a survey completed. After we have all the information necessary to complete the survey, we search the insurance market to find the lowest cost for coverage needed. There are now 126 Lodges that have much better coverage, with higher limits for better protection in time of loss and paying less money per \$1,000. of coverage than they were in the past.

Most insurance companies and insurance agents have not responded to the need of what Lodges should carry for coverage. Neither have they taken into consideration that a Lodge is a low risk in regard to liability and the physical structure has less exposure to loss than most all other clubs, organizations and fraternities.

Most Lodges operate only 9 months of the year and hold only two monthly meetings. Therefore, most Lodges are only active eighteen to thirty-six times a year, with a very low percentage of the members of the Lodge attending meetings.

The surveys reveal many interesting omissions of coverage that Lodges should carry to protect themselves from a serious financial loss. We hereby mention some of the ways to upgrade coverage and eliminate some of the pitfalls that exist and can be included without increasing the overall cost. The OES, Demolay, and Rainbow can have their names added to the Lodge policy covering the building and all contents therein, including all the names of the various organizations on their policy that use or have a financial interest, in the property, at no extra charge. Therefore, if a loss should occur to the building and contents each Masonic Body or organization would collect their share of the loss. One must remember that Grand Lodge covers all Lodges for liability up to a limit of \$1,000,000., but the Grand Lodge liability coverage does not extend any coverage to other Masonic organizations. Therefore, it is necessary for the building association and all other Masonic bodies that own or use the Lodge to carry liability to protect their own interest in time of loss. However, this protection can be provided by having all names added to the Lodge insurance policy.

We have found many Lodges carrying very limited coverage when "All Risk" coverage should be carried. During the survey we have found many Lodges carrying too little property coverage to comply with the 80% co-

insurance clause. In today's insurance market a Lodge or building association can carry Replacement Cost coverage and, if a loss occurs, the insurance company would have to pay the cost of repair and reconstruction without taking any depreciation.

We strongly urge all Lodges to have an insurance survey completed and find out if they have proper coverage at a reasonable cost. **"DO IT NOW BEFORE A LOSS OCCURS."**

In addition to all this, Wor. Brother H. Donald James serves as Grand Organist for the Grand Lodge of Maine, and regularly provides music to his Lodge, Star Chapter, and Commandery. It is not at all uncommon to meet Don at the keyboard of some Masonic lodge anywhere throughout this state...at any time. He has even been known to carry a portable keyboard into the woods or quarries to provide special music at outdoor events.

Wor. Brother H. Donald James, I am delighted to recognize you for

your extraordinary contributions to Freemasonry by presenting you the Simon Greenleaf Medal for Meritorious Service.

### To the Trustees of the Grand Lodge Charity Fund

As has been the practice in the past year, your Investment Committee together with the Grand Master, Deputy Grand Master, Grand Treasurer and Secretary met with our advisors, Standish, Ayer & Wood three times: May, September and January. Besides written communications at this meeting we are apprised of the financial markets and economic conditions.

#### Investment Policy

As always quality of security is to be stressed in the portfolio. The principal objectives being the preservation of capital, earning a reasonable current income which will cover our charitable expenses as well as growth in income.

Our asset allocation remained stable with 34% in fixed income, 63% in equities and 2% small capitalization stocks and 1% international.

Some changes were made in the portfolio. We sold 2000 shares of Lubrizol and lowered our total shares in Emerson, General Electric, Coca-Cola, J. P. Morgan, Chubb, and Textron. We bought 1000 shares of Kimberly Clark and increased our holdings in the International Equity Fund, Small Cap. Fund, and the Fixed Income Fund.

#### The Named Pooled Funds

This is a pooling of the assets of many of our small named funds. The example is that if someone wished to contribute money to the Grand Lodge Charitable Foundation in an amount to justify a "named fund" the money would be placed in the "pooled fund." This fund is not supervised by our financial advisors.

#### Value and Investment Income

**Order of High Priesthood-**

To the Christian Era add 1913, the Year of the Blessing. Thus: 1993 and 1913=3906.

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## MASONIC CALENDAR

**Ancient Craft Masons** commence this era with the creation of the world, calling it **Anno Lucis (A.D.)**, "in the year of light."

The event was recorded by several videotapers and is to be part of a Maine Masonic video now being developed. Also on hand to carry the message of the vitality of Freemasonry to the Masons of Maine was Wor. Arthur M. Griffiths, Editor of *The Maine Mason*, and at least one newspaper reporter was present as well.

Within moments of the planned starting hour of 10 o'clock, the skirling of the Kora Highlander's bagpipes and the beating of their drums to the tune of "Scotland The Brave" announced the procession. Two by two, all Masons present processed in their customary order, from the southwest corner at the front of the building around to the northeast corner, where tradition dictates that Masons shall lay cornerstones.

Most Worshipful Brother George P. Pulkkinen's brief opening remarks of welcome and announcement were followed by the Chaplain's prayer and a Highlanders' rendition of "Amazing Grace."

Wor. Richard E. Lerette, Acting Grand Secretary, then deposited in the cornerstone a copy of the morning's Kennebec Journal, a local newspaper, and a Memorial List in recognition of contributions to the new lodge building.

"The many brethren, craftsmen and workers and friends who have donated many hours to erection of the temple. Their contributions will be individually recognized on a memorial plaque permanently displayed in the new temple."

The Grand Master then spread cement upon the foundation surface and the cornerstone was deposited in its place by Bro. Stephen E. Lerette and Bro. Douglas Nee. When the cornerstone was in position, the Grand Master called upon Deputy Grand Master Harland S. Hitchings to test the stone with the square, Acting Senior Grand Warden Charles Plummer to test with the level, and Junior Grand Warden Richard B. Farrington to test it with the plumb.

Upon their report that the stone was square, level and plumb, Grand Master Pulkkinen cemented the stone into its permanent position.

He then ordered that the elements of consecration be distributed to the proper Grand Officers. Grand Marshal Brian Paradis presented the silver chalice containing corn to Deputy Grand Master Harland S. Hitchings, that containing wine to Acting Senior Grand Warden Charles Plummer, and that containing oil to Junior Grand Warden Richard B. Farrington each of whom in turn poured the contents of his vessel upon the ceremonial carpet with the appropriate time honored invocation.

After invoking the blessing of God, the Most Worshipful Grand Master called R.W. Charles W. Barker, Architect, to the "East" for presentation of the working tools.

Pursuant to the order of the Most Worshipful George P. Pulkkinen, the Grand Marshal made proclamation "...the Corner Stone of Asylum Lodge

No. 133, has this day been found square, level and plumb, true and trusty, and laid according to the old customs by the Grand Master of Masons."

Wor. Franklin R. Barclay, II, Master of Asylum Lodge was invited to speak. He paid tribute to those members of Asylum Lodge who had helped to bring to realization the dream of a new lodge hall. After thanking the Brethren and visitors present, the Highlanders of Kora Temple and the Grand Master and other Grand officers for making this ground-laying ceremony an outstanding event, Wor. Barclay presented to Most Worshipful Pulkkinen, for the archives of the Grand Lodge, commemorative coin No. 25 of those silver coins which had been especially struck in honor of the occasion.

Following Worshipful Barclay's remarks the Highlanders played "Auld Lang Syne."

Grand Master Pulkkinen took the occasion to say that the ceremony today is of great importance to Freemasonry. It serves to emphasize that Freemasonry is real, exciting and vital, that the fraternity is on the move in Maine. He made note that Asylum Lodge dates to 1865, the time of the Civil War, and that he had just last week been privileged to attend a heart-moving ceremony at Gettysburg dedicating the new Friend-to-Friend Masonic Memorial at the battlefield there. That memorial pays homage to an actual death-bed incident between two general officers who had been Masonic friends together in the Union Army prior to the war but were on opposite sides during the conflict between the North and South.

In conclusion, Most Worshipful Pulkkinen referred to the cornerstone ceremony of Asylum Lodge as a new beginning.

Led by the pipes and drums, the officers of the Grand Lodge of Maine marched off in proper form. Grand Lodge was closed in peace and harmony.

## GRAND LODGE BANQUET

Monday, May 2, 1994

With the sound of the gong, M.W. George P. Pulkkinen, Grand Master of Masons in Maine, opened the 175th Annual Communication of the Grand Lodge of Maine on Monday evening with the banquet. It was held at Verrillo's off Exit 8. Rev. and Bro. Edward Fenderson gave the invocation, and the festivities began. The traditional roast beef banquet was served in the usual elegant style and greatly enjoyed by the brethren and guests.

Following the banquet, M.W. Pulkkinen introduced the guests at the Head Table and asked selected brethren to introduce the guests at the sub-head tables.

The Grand Master then introduced the speaker of the evening, one of our members, R.W. Walter M. Macdougall.

"I first met a man who inspired me very much with his message, with his carriage, with his (?). I invited him to be our Grand Lodge speaker this year. Unfortunately, I found out in February his health was not going to be good enough to allow him to be here. That man was a man who was dear to virtually all of us, I'm sure. It's Ill. Robert Francis G. Paul 33<sup>o</sup>, Past Sovereign Grand Commander of the Ancient and Accepted Scottish Rite of the Northern Jurisdiction. Bro. Paul has shown the way in many respects. He was instrumental in the development of Masonic Renewal. He has always been there as a beacon to really light the way to the brethren, regardless whether they be active in Scottish Rite, or just active in the Fraternity at any level. I was greatly disappointed when his health disallowed him from being with us, and I heard from him late in February to that effect.

"I thought, 'What to do?' We're getting late in our planning session, and I started to [think about] who can we get who will inspire the brethren appropriately with a message, with the language of Freemasonry. At that time, I thought, 'Well, it's now March; we have one declared candidate for Deputy Grand Master; he's a man who has inspired me also for many years, and I decided that I would invite him to be our Grand Lodge Speaker this year. R.W. Walter Marshal Macdougall.'

Bro. Macdougall was raised to the Sublime Degree of a Master Mason in Piscataquis Lodge in 1959. In 1965 he was elected Worshipful Master, and since then he has served the lodge in many capacities. He's a Past High Priest of Rabboni Chapter; Principle Sojourner of the Grand Chapter of Maine; member of St. John's Commandery; Tamerlane Conclave, Red Cross of Constantine; the Maine College of Societas Rosicrucianas; included in the Who's Who of Freemasonry for his writings on the meaning of Freemasonry. Bro. Macdougall has been most active in the areas of Masonic Education and Lodge Service Programs. In 1970 he followed M.W. Ralph J. Pollard as chairman of the Committee on Masonic Education and Lodge



Service. He served again as chairman of that committee from 1983 to 1986, during which time the committee published a number of manuals including the "Revised Pollard Plan for Candidate Education," and took him [tape inaudible] the structure of the position of District Educational Representative.

For his work in these areas Bro. Macdougall has been awarded the Simon Greenleaf and the Josiah Hayden Drummond Medals by the Grand Lodge of Maine.

Bro. Macdougall and his wife Judith have three sons. In 1987 he retired after thirty years in public education. He has a Doctorate in Leadership and Administration and presently is an Assistant Professor at the University of Maine at Orono where he is teaching educational philosophy.

At this important Grand Lodge Session where we are celebrating 175 years of history, and looking forward to the next 175, I know that Brother Macdougall will set the proper course, proper tone, the proper note to set us in that direction. Brethren, I introduce to you R.W. Brother Walter Macdougall.

#### *FREEMASONRY: PASSAGE INTO THE TWENTY-FIRST CENTURY*

Most Worshipful Grand Masters, Most Worshipful Past Grand Masters, Distinguished guests and Brethren of the Mystic Tie.

I am deeply grateful for the opportunity to address this fifty-seventh annual banquet of our Grand Lodge. This privilege is made even more special by two considerations: first, we are looking forward to our Grand Lodge's one hundredth and seventy-fifth anniversary, and the second is a conviction which I know I share with many here this evening, namely: that no period in the history of Freemasonry has been more exciting or more challenging than our own. As we are all very much aware, we are living in an era when the sanity of civilization often seems to hang in the balance and when, in desperation, prejudice and fear, individuals and nations seem to be swept willy-nilly toward a new century. But in all this confusion and at the moment when it is most needed, Freemasonry offers us a passage of inspiration and strength!

*Freemasonry: a passage into the twenty-first century!* We sense this opportunity, and at the same time, we find ourselves asking a Masonic question: "Are we prepared?" Other equally Masonic questions thrust themselves upon us: What, after all, did we come here to do, and when new architectures may be necessary to maintain the old strength and at the same time let in new light? And as we search for answers, we find ourselves needing to look two ways at once-- one back to those principles which make us Free-

masons; one forward into the demands of the future.

But that, my brethren, is exactly how Free Masons have always progressed-- drawing wisdom from the past and with daring making a passage into the future. There is an expressive symbol for this sighting back and forward-- a symbol which might well have been included in our ritual. It is the representation of the Roman god Janus who is pictured with two faces, one looking ahead and the other behind. Janus was the god of beginnings and thus his name has been enshrined in the first month of the year, January.

But if Janus was the god of beginnings, why had he one face which looks to the past? The reason is one which a mason can readily appreciate. Janus was not only the god of beginnings but of doorways and of passages. Every one of us has passed through the Masonic doorway and been put upon a journey-- a passage from west to east, from darkness to light. At every step of that ongoing passage, our past and that of the Fraternity and of the human race has pointed direction.

We masons like to express our ideas in practical, work-a-day analogies, and this Janus-like process of taking bearings from our past while looking forward reminds one of how a surveyor runs a line or a series of levels by alternating backsights and foresights. And with this analogy in mind, let me take a few minutes to tell you about a prodigious survey through the wilderness taken by Brother Park Holland.

Brother Holland was the patriarch of Maine surveyors, and his life was a story of skillful work under conditions which would have made lesser men pack up their compass and go home. His most arduous survey was conducted in 1794, when the interior of Maine was for white men an unknown land. (I should add that it was to remain that way for another twenty years or so until Right Worshipful Brother Moses Greenleaf began to publish his maps of Maine.) Brother Holland was hired by the Commonwealth of Massachusetts to lay out a rectangular strip of land sixty and a half miles wide and running from what is approximately the present northern boarder of Washington County to the height of land which separates the waters of the Saint John from those of the Saint Lawrence. Holland was quite sure that the land agent in Boston knew little about the proportions of this project, and Holland was right. He was told that the distance to the dividing height of land would be only some fifty or sixty miles. Brother Holland and his crew ran their line north for one hundred and fifty two miles-- and "running a line" meant "chaining" that is laying off sixty-six foot measures one after the other and progressing like an inch worm as summer turned into fall. Imagine the bogs, the cedar swamps, the blow downs, the hills on hills and the water in those miles!

They never did quite reach their destination. Ragged and with supplies about gone, Brother Holland turned westward, ran the sixty and a half miles, then started southward still chaining-- still trying to close the survey. Snow was falling. They would have starved had it not been for Holland's small dog

which saved their lives, and his own, by treeing porcupines.

Brother Park Holland's perseverance and his ability to put his own self interests aside in order to keep his word tells us much about those men who brought Free Masonry into Maine. But to get back to the importance of a Janus-like perspective, consider how Park Holland and his crew ran their lines across wide expanses of water. Building a raft, they steered forward by compass while behind them a column of smoke rose from a signal fire on the departed shore. Thus Janus-like, the line of passage was assured by back sights on the smoke and signal fire and compass sightings ahead. Let us, for a moment, talk about some Masonic backsights..

Twice before us our Masonic brethren here in Maine have passed from one century into another. The passage of the twentieth century took place in what I call the "fat years"-- a period of soaring membership, packed meetings and the building of impressive three storied lodge halls. Interesting times, but I suggest that our most useful back sights will be those focused on what we can call the frontier years--those years at the close of the 1700s and the beginning of the nineteenth century--years not of plenty but of struggle. In human terms we have so much in common with those frontier years when the leaders of Free Masonry realized that their Masonic Society was more than another Fraternity. That, indeed, it represented (to borrow from a recent Scottish Rite video) a "Conscience for America."

Take those first two lodges founded in the District of Maine-- the first in Falmouth and the second in Machias. Separated by some two hundred miles, they were like two burning tapers situated in the east and the west. Between them lay wilderness and too often a moral darkness. Early historians tell us that there was within the District from its first settlement an element which knew little of the law and who were not much worried about their ignorance. Such darkness even penetrated the Craft. Warren Lodge, colonial Masonry's eastern most outpost, expelled (as lodges did in those days) one of its members when, as tradition has it, he sold his wife for a barrel of rum. Free Masonry and all other social institutions had their work cut out for them. Much more was needed to build a just and safe civilization in those frontier years than simply taking an ax and letting light into the swamp.

The Revolution was a school of many of the Freemasons who had come and were to arrive in to the District of Maine. In those years of testing, many had learned a truth which Joseph Fort Newton was much later to put into these words: "The brotherhood of man begins with the manhood of the brother." In Machias Free Masons were leaders among those who refused to cut down their liberty pole and who fought our first naval battle. In Falmouth brothers bitterly divided by the war demonstrated that glorious Masonic principle which holds that respect for the dignity of the individual brother must prevail despite political and religious strife. After the war men remembered the Masonry they had seen in action. Park Holland remembered how following Burgoyne defeat a young and dying British officer had been

carried into lodge meetings that he might hold Masonic communion with those against whom, a short time before, he had fought. Moses Greenleaf's father remembered how when he was master of the lodge attached to the Massachusetts Line, Brother George Washington came and sat among the brethren.

The sons of these Masonic veterans found the same meaning of Masonic fellowship in the isolation of the Maine wilderness. When my own lodge, Piscataquis, Number 44, was chartered, the Brethren of Somerset Lodge sent a set of truncheons as a gift. That gift came over the bridle paths to that new Masonic light shining in the woods of Sebec. Eben Greenleaf who was the secretary of the new lodge wrote this note in thanks:

*...I give to you the salutations of every Mason in this remote part of the country. We are stimulated to exertion to diffuse Masonic Light and Knowledge when we consider that Brethren at a distance and personally unknown take so much interest in our welfare. Wishing you all the happiness that can result from a strict adherence to the principles of our order-I am your friend and brother...*

These were masons who loved the festive board and knew the strength of and often longed for the joy of fellowship. These were men who knew that beyond the camaraderie, Masonry had a mission. They were as Eben Greenleaf wrote "stimulated to exertion to diffuse Masonic Light..." In increasing numbers lodges were chartered to provide fellowship, to more effectively set the Brethren to labor and to muster meager resources for the work of relief. These lodges appeared first along the coast as a string of radiating centers as if to illuminate that admonition "but to us He gives the keeping of the lights along the shore." Most of these lodges were small-- some with less than a dozen members. Janus-like we look back and we see Masonry radiating from those lodges and finding fruition in Education, Justice, Equality and in faithfulness exhibited not in great multitudes but in a growing number of men who singularly and together made a difference.

In Wiscasset the brethren of Lincoln Lodge agreed that Freemasonry is primarily about education, and they saw that mission extending beyond the lodge room to the offering of public lectures on the moral issues of the day and to the support of the local academy. Up north in the Foxcroft area, Worshipful Brother James Stuart Holmes, a lawyer and graduate of Brown, rode horseback ten miles to Lodge in Garland. Freemasonry for him meant "A Conscience for America." And when a group of Millerites were arrested and prejudicially charged with vagrancy, Holmes defended them without pay and won the case--winning a victory for freedom of expression. And it was not an easy case as the defendants insisted on praying and hymn singing in loud voices throughout the whole proceedings. In Bangor, in 1818 and on Saint John's Day, the brethren of Rising Virtue Lodge gave a banquet for 27 leaders of the Penobscot Nation and a number of Government Commissioners. The event was a celebration of the signing of a treaty. And when Brother Daniel Davis rose to give the blessing he spoke these words:

*We acknowledge the goodness of Almighty God, the Great Good Spirit, who made both you and us and from whom all our blessings are received that we are permitted to meet here in peace and friendship...*

So with the beliefs of Freemasonry, with the tenets of Brotherly Relief and Truth, with the conviction that "a fund of science and ingenuity was implanted in man for the best and most salutary purposes," these masons of the frontier years made passage into the 1800s. How proud these brethren would be of our Grand Lodge's programs in support of education both within and without the Fraternity--how proud of our concern for the well-being of youth! How at home they would feel among the Craft today when a lodge gets in the wood of a disabled brother, or gathers to paint the house of a widow, or meets to organize a family picnic!

Finally, as we look back, let us not forget that the passage which these Masons of the frontier years accomplished was not into sunshine but into a terrible storm. The strongest among the Craft would be put to test for, even as success seemed apparent, the Brethren stood in a dark doorway. Those old agents to darkness which still gnaw at the Fraternity; envy, suspicion, ignorance, misplaced religious dogmatism, and political avarice were about to close in upon the Fraternity with a vengeance. There followed those years when in the words of our thirteenth Grand Master, Alexander Pumey, "All was dark, save the faint glimmer from the altars of three only of [the] fifty-eight lodges.

In 1994, we know how precious the tenets and beliefs of our Freemasonry are because through those years of persecution they did survive. They kindled into flame again and now become beacons in our time of passage. Again we see the old wisdom giving strength and meaning to the new designs on the trestle board. Again Free Masonry is seen to be both speculative and operative-- always about *understanding* and about *building* and forever about belonging to what is greater than ourselves. These are exciting times!

It has been an experience of renewal to watch and talk with those young, non-Masons who have come to our recent district fellowship meetings. Through their eyes and their needs, we can see just how precious this passage of Free Masonry is. Their interest confirms the perennial need for belonging to what has been proven to be significant and which we can only find through that Janus-like perspective- which gets it bearing from the past while it dares to look ahead. **Our strength lies in taking with us our foundational and unchanging truths, our moral geometry if you will, as we labor into the future.** This is a truth which has been missed by several generations of moral relativists and deconstructionists. It is a truth we as Free Masons intend to preserve and practice.



In a last few minutes, let me conclude and reinforce what I have described concerning the Janus-like perspective and the making of Masonic passages into the future. Let us use that central Masonic symbol-- the compasses. In this change of image we switch from the analogy of making progress in laying out a line to expanding a circle, but both analogies have to do with living into the future. In order to swing ever widening circles, one leg of the compasses must hold to a center. We instantly see the analogy of our own human situation. As the compasses of human exploration and growth swings ever wider circles of understanding, of discovery and progress, one point of that instrument must remain fixed. In the symbol of the compasses, **the center of belief and conviction must hold** if any perfect circles are to be drawn. If that center cannot hold in a civilization, a society, a family circle, or in an individual life then dissolution follows as surely as if there were no chance for growth.

William Butler Yeats used the example of a falcon circling a falconer to describe the situation when centers fail. Picture how a falcon circles the falconer obeying his signals as it widens the circles of its hunt. Yeats image is of a falcon which gets so far away from the whistle of the falconer that the guiding signals are lost. Thus Yeats characterized what he sees as a growing alienation, a loss of belonging, and a breaking down of the human conversation--the end of what we as Free Masons have striven to inculcate. Listen, my Brethren, to his chilling description of our times:

TURNING AND TURNING IN WIDENING GYRE  
THE FALCON CANNOT HEAR THE FALCONER;  
THINGS FALL APART THE CENTER CANNOT HOLD;  
MERE ANARCHY IS LOOSED UPON THE WORLD  
THE BLOOD-DIMMED TIDE IS LOOSED, AND EVERYWHERE  
THE CEREMONY OF INNOCENCE IS DROWNED;  
THE BEST LACK ALL CONVICTION WHILE THE WORST  
ARE FULL OF A PASSIONATE INTENSITY.

Free Masonry is about order and sanity. It is about the ceremony of innocence as your white apron will remind you. It is about stemming the blood-dimmed tide with Brotherly Love and a deeper understanding of the shared, human situation. It is about making sure that the best are filled with constructive convictions. **Free Mnsonry is about centers that hold!** And it is because of its holding center-- because of its Moral and Spiritual Beliefs- that Free Masonry offers a passage into the twenty-first century.

It is good Masonic practice to put into drama what we wish to communicate; so in ending this talk imagine with me:

We stand shoulder to shoulder, we the Brethren with the Janus-like perspective. We with the center which holds. We sense close behind us those who taught us the tenets of our profession and the landmarks of the Craft. We stand with the working tools of the builder in our hands, and, hopefully there are one or two with cribbage boards sticking out of their hip pockets for we intend to enjoy each other's company as well as labor. And a voice

from before us -- the voice of the twenty-first century-- challenges:

"WHAT CAME YOU HERE TO DO?"

AND WE ANSWER, "TO WORK UPON THE TEMPLE."

"NAME THAT TEMPLE," DEMANDS THE VOICE.

"THE TEMPLE OF UNDERSTANDING AND JUSTICE WHERE EVERY MAN, WOMAN AND CHILD SHALL HAVE THE PRIVILEGE OF JOINING IN THE GRAND DESIGN OF BEING HAPPY AND IN TRANSMITTING HAPPINESS."

AGAIN THE CHALLENGE: "CAN YOU DRAW ON THE TRESTLE BOARDS OF THE FUTURE AND DO YOU DARE TO BUILD THE ARCHES OF TOMORROW"

AND AGAIN OUR ANSWER: "YES, FOR THERE HAS BEEN 'IM-PLANTED IN US A FUND OF SCIENCE AND INGENUITY,' OUR MORAL CENTER HOLDS, AND THE FUTURE, HOWEVER DIFFERENT, MUST BE BUILT BY THE SQUARE, THE LEVEL AND THE PLUMB."

And then, my Brethren, I fancy that voice will say: "Pass, work well for the sun rises in the east and a new day comes!"

GRAND MASTER: Our guidance systems and beliefs are sound. Because of that our future looks rosy, indeed, and within a few short hours we'll be moving into the next phase of Freemasonry in Maine. Nine o'clock tomorrow morning, our Grand Lodge Session actually begins.

The evening was then concluded with announcements and the Benediction by Brother Edward Fenderson, Grand Chaplain.

Most Worshipful Grand Master, Distinguished Guests, Visitors and Masons of the Grand Lodge of Maine:

It is my honor and privilege to bring to you greetings from the Maine DeMolay Association. I am pleased to report that my term as State Master Councilor has been outstanding. We have had many exciting and successful events this year. Some of our greatest events took place during March 12-19, 1994 which was DeMolay week. We tried to make DeMolay week extra special this year because this year is the 75th Anniversary of DeMolay.

The week started with a charity basketball game between some of the members of Grand Lodge and DeMolay with some help from some Rainbow Girls. We raised over \$250. which we donated to the Commandery of Knights Templar to be used for their adopted charity the Eye Foundation. ## REPORT OF THE GRAND MASTER

In Grand Lodge  
Portland, Maine  
May 3, 1994

M.W. Past Grand Masters, Distinguished Guests, my Brothers:

Last year at our Annual Session I began my address by sharing with you my enthusiasm for the future of Freemasonry. I asked the assembled Brethren to look about...beside them, before them, and behind them at the men who were Maine's Masonic leaders.

I was inspired by what I had seen of the quality and commitment of my Brethren who would lead the Craft during the ensuing year.

I must tell you I've been not in the least disappointed, not the slightest bit displeased. Rather I continue to be charged and charged again by your individual and collective love for -- and dedication to -- Freemasonry, and to your unflagging efforts to live and teach the spirit of Freemasonry which we know is the joyous celebration of the Brotherhood of Man under the Fatherhood of God.

I also feel compelled to report, officially, that the Rabbit is running still. That wonderful Volkswagen that I was urged to replace at my first installation as your Grand Master two years ago is still doing the job.

It now has nearly 411,000 miles -- 410,763 as I entered the parking garage this morning, to be exact.

Why do I bother to tell you that? Very simply because I believed, because I had confidence in its ability ... to do the job. I had faith.

I tell you I have the same strong feeling of confidence, the same sort of faith, in the tenacity -- and ability -- of Freemasonry to get the job done.

As your Grand Master, I am delighted to be able to tell you there is good news to report at this Annual Session. Much good news to report.

THE SPIRIT AND vitality of hope built on accomplishment is forging strong bonds among brethren, strong commitment to the cause of brotherly love, a healthy happiness as men open their hearts, minds and hands to help, aid and assist.

There is some question, though, about where Masonry is today when measured on the celestial scale as determined by the 24 hours of the day.

Some would suggest we are as Entered Apprentices, in the morning hours of our life, still industriously occupying our minds in the attainment of useful



knowledge.

And they would be right.

Some would suggest we are as Fellowcrafts, at the midday period, applying that knowledge to the discharge of our respective duties to God, our neighbor and ourself.

They, too, would be right.

And some, I suppose, even would make the argument that we are in age, as Master Masons, happily enjoying the reflections consequent on a well spent life, waiting to die in the hopes of a glorious immortality.

I certainly hope any who subscribe to this positioning are wrong. I believe they are. And I'll tell you why.

As I travel through this jurisdiction -- and I've been in every district at least twice this year, the majority of districts four or more times -- I see an increasing number of young men taking up the working tools to successfully build a stronger fraternity, making the Masonic message meaningful to more men and women well into the next century.

The scholarship program, the Drug and Alcohol Prevention Program, the generous acts of brotherhood toward all are encouraging beacons of knowledge and enlightenment.

But with all the good, all the positive, all the inspiring acts of caring and sharing and brotherly love -- we can not forget... we must not forget that:

because we are good, there are those who attack us;

because we are just, there are those who defame us;

because we are tolerant, there are those who abuse us.

The dark forces of ignorance and bigotry did not die with last year's Southern Baptist Conference vote. In some quarters Freemasonry remains the primary target for venom and bile, for hate and distrust.

Although it hurts me grievously to say it, you have a right to know and I an obligation to tell you, that in our towns and cities ... in our very churches ... today, right now, circuit-riding, hate mongering hired guns are targeting their heavy artillery at Freemasons and Freemasonry.

In their wake they leave a landscape strewn with the pockmarks and craters of human anguish, fear, heartache and confusion.

Just this year I know of three Maine brothers denied Masonic Memorial services by hostile clergymen. The pastors told the families to decide whether they wanted a funeral service ... or a Masonic memorial. They couldn't have both, the compassionate pastors told bereaved family members.

And nine days ago, in the Columbia Street Baptist Church in Bangor, I witnessed, with much shock and disgust, a brutal, frontal assault on Freemasonry, and on the pastor who is a brother.

A professional anti-Mason had been called to the church by a tiny cell of zealots within the church. His mission was to "cleanse" Columbia Street Baptist of the evil Masonic influence.

Keenly honed to his bigoted calling, this man who was highly conversant with the words of our ritual - if not the essence of Freemasonry - wove a fabrication of lies, deceptions and innuendo into a five hour presentation on the evils of the Craft and the need to purge the Masonic influences from the old church.

Never mind that the founding pastor of Columbia Street was a Mason.

Never mind that Masons have been among the most dedicated members and workers of the church all these many years.

Never mind that our U.S. Constitution guarantees religious freedom, intellectual freedom, the pursuit of happiness, or that free will is an important tenet to the Baptist Church.

This man arrived at Columbia Street, prepared, he said, to do God's will, to "cleanse" the Masonic stain from the church.

Cleanse. Doesn't that sound distressingly familiar? Isn't cleansing what the Serbians are attempting in Bosnia? Isn't cleansing what is occurring in Rwanda and Byrundi?

For bigots, to cleanse is to eliminate any and all who think, talk, look and pray differently ... different from the bigot.

To cleanse. What a sanitized word for destruction.

I dwell no longer on this subject. But, in my opinion, we as a Craft and as individuals must prepare ourselves to respond to this very real threat. We must assemble a corps of knowledgeable, articulate brethren ready to confront and neutralize the vicious attacks on our Fraternity with fact, with truth, and with the continued exercise of brotherly love.

We cannot ... we must not be timid in our efforts. Truth is on our side, my brethren, and Truth is a mighty weapon.

We must be prepared to wield it...to wage it...and to win with it.

### Maine Masonic Membership Program

Speaking of wielding, waging and winning, I shift to a happier subject and share with you the successes of our new Maine Masonic Membership Program.

Designed to explain the facts of Masonry in a fun-filled evening of fellowship, the first of eight meetings held thus far was enjoyed at the Auburn Masonic Temple on February 2.

153 men attended, more than 50 of them non-Masonic guests. Subsequent Fellowship Nights have been held in Wilton, Phillips, Orrington, Union, Augusta, Fairfield, and just last Thursday night in Saco. I thank each of you brethren who has participated, who has helped spread the Masonic message.

At each of the meetings the guests get answers to the following five questions:

1. Who are the Masons?
2. What do they do?
3. Why do Masons do what they do?
4. How does a man become a Mason?
5. How much of a time commitment is involved.

Response has been positive, exciting. Scores of applications have been received as a result of these guests learning that they *must ask* to become a Mason.

Cooperation has been outstanding with both Kora and Anah Shrine Temples providing knowledgeable brethren to tell the important Shrine portion of the Masonic story.

Preliminary meetings have already been held that will lead to Fellowship Nights during 1994 in Districts 2,3,4,10,20,21 and 22.

Our R.W. Deputy Grand Master, Brother Harland Hitchings, has endorsed this Membership Program and has asked me to continue working on it so I'll be in touch with you Deputies in the remaining 10 Districts within the next few weeks to explain how the program works and go about scheduling a Fellowship Night.

I believe that properly applied, this working tool will, within the next two

years, lead to a doubling of the number of qualified men currently raised to the sublime degree, and ultimately to a growth in our members.

### **Activity of your Grand Lodge**

Since our last Annual Communication, your Grand Lodge Officers have labored in extremes of climate to perform their official duties.

Last summer the cornerstone of Asylum Lodge was layed in searing heat approaching 95 degrees, and it was only through the Grace of God and the uncanny ability of the Grand Marshal to keep the sun behind a cloudy canopy during the ceremonies that heat prostration was not the order of the day for the huge gathering.

To the other extreme, on Jan. 8, the Grand Lodge dedicated Euclid Lodge's beautiful new home in Madison. In spite of frost-bitten temperatures and driving snow, more that 125 brethren and guests assembled. And enjoyed.

On April 2, with winds whipping wildly on an otherwise fine day, Vassalboro's two lodges were consolidated to henceforth be known as Neguemetkeag-Vassalboro Lodge #54.

And on April 16, in torrential Spring rains, your Grand Lodge officers dedicated Hermon Lodge's fine new facility in Gardiner. Again, the rigors of seasons failed to discourage the crowd and a large and enthusiastic crowd it was.

Our 24 District Meetings were successful, generally well attended, and enjoyable. A special notice must be made of the 23rd District Meeting, and of Brother Les Buzzell the RWDDGM, and Brother Ken Richardson, the District Representative, for their tremendous effort and accomplishment. There were 240 smiling faces at the Auburn Masonic Temple that evening. It was good to behold.

### **Siloam Lodge selected The Outstanding Lodge**

Your Grand Lodge convened on Thursday, April 21 at the Hall of Siloam Lodge in Fairfield to witness the Master Mason Degree performed by the Siloam brethren, the lodge selected "Outstanding Lodge in Maine for 1993-94" by the Grand Lecturer and his staff after considering recommendations by the District Deputies.

The work was superb, brethren, as one would expect from the outstanding lodge. But Siloam demonstrates its excellence not only through degree work but also by practicing outside of the lodge those lessons which they are taught in it.

The Brethren of Siloam Lodge are to be congratulated for their excellence, their proper application of Masonic teachings and their enthusiasm.

It was a happy, a joyous evening. Unfortunately, just six nights later -- last Wednesday -- a terrible accident occurred which I must tell you about.

Wor. Brother Kevin Madore, the junior past master of Siloam, the man who ran his lodge so successfully last year, a good friend, a good man and a good Mason, was riding his mountain bike home when he was hit head-on, by an automobile.

Wor. Brother Kevin was catapulted over the handlebars, face first into the windshield. He then flew 20 feet past the car onto the pavement. He was wearing a helmet. That, plus his faith and his superb physical condition was what saved him.

He suffered a shattered jaw, crushed nose, and severe lacerations. His condition required hours of surgery at the Maine Medical Center. I'm happy to report that when I went to visit him yesterday, he had just been released to Mid Maine Medical Center in Waterville where his convalescence will continue. I would add, at this time, that R.W. Brother Don Bowden, severely injured in a single car accident last month, is also on the mend at the Waldo County Hospital in Belfast.

I know you all join me in wishing both of these distinguished Freemasons complete and rapid recoveries.

### **Public Awareness**

We are beginning to make the public aware, but there's much more to be done. Press coverage was much improved this year with many newspapers reporting our events with pictures and stories.

Our television spots last summer also increased our exposure. These efforts should continue. I would also encourage the Grand Lodge to provide continuing leadership in efforts to see a 10 foot statue of Joshua Chamberlain erected at Gettysburg's Little Round Top as a fitting monument to this gifted leader and the 20th Maine Regiment for their gallantry in action.

For many years I've been convinced that the leadership skills and accomplishments of this United Lodge brother were crucial in the successful efforts to preserve the union during those bleakest and bloodiest days, weeks and years of the Civil War.

The project would continue under the guidance and direction of the Grand Lodge, but would be a project open to public participation and involvement.

Our leadership efforts in the statue project will help recognize Chamberlain, appropriately, in my opinion. I see this effort as a high visibility/high public profile project for him, for Maine...and for us.

The plan is to involve the schoolchildren of Maine in the project. We will

encourage American History students to study Chamberlain and learn about his leadership in war, in Augusta as Governor, and as President of Bowdoin College. A study of Chamberlain will make our young people realize that individual excellence and commitment can and do make a difference.

As part of the project, a special Chamberlain unit is scheduled to be prepared and presented by the State Department of Education to American History students at various levels in Maine schools.

I see students encouraged to write essays about Chamberlain, the 20th Maine, and perhaps the accomplishments of other Maine units during the Civil War. I see the Grand Lodge putting up \$500 savings bonds or scholarship vouchers for the outstanding efforts at various class levels.

I see erection of this statue as a fitting part of the 175th anniversary celebration of Maine and our Grand Lodge in 1995. Participation of school children and the success of Ted Turner's *Gettysburg* will mesh very nicely with our already substantial presence we enjoy in the educational community thanks to our tremendous scholarship and drug abuse prevention efforts.

Involving the school children throughout the project will provide the additional benefit of maximum public exposure and will provide opportunity to tell again the story of our two great, existing youth support programs.

All this will have to impact positively on our membership efforts. Think how this project will reinforce the message we share at our Fellowship nights. Maine's Commissioner of Education, Brother Leo Martin (a Past Master of Arundel Lodge), is supportive of the effort.

The statue will cost approximately \$100,000. Fund raising efforts were kicked off on the back page of our last Maine Mason. Already monies have been donated.

Grand Lodge financial commitment would be non-existent. All donations would continue purely voluntary.

### Out of State Visitations

Once again this year I have travelled minimally, out of state. I attended the Grand Masters Conference in Washington, D.C., the best and most useful conference of the four I've attended, I might add. I also attended at least part of the Annual Sessions of Massachusetts, Connecticut and New Jersey.

My reasons for not attending more are the same as last year. While I cherish greatly the personal friendships and fraternal ties forged among our sister jurisdictions, the work to be done here in Maine must take precedence if we're to move the Craft forward.

For example, the Membership Program initial presentations and the result-



ing Fellowship Nights created time demands equal to two or more additional district meetings around the state.

### **Recommendations**

Last year I recommended, among other things, that each lodge or Building Association in this jurisdiction consider making a contribution to its municipal government. We are fortunate, in Maine, that our buildings are tax exempt. This action will further demonstrate the commitment of our lodges to be good citizens, and will stand the fraternity in good stead, I believe, when, sometime in the future, fraternal non-profit organizations face certain attempts to have our property tax exemptions taken from us.

Some lodges have accepted the recommendation. I believe you lodges have acted wisely. As was suggested last year, it is far better to make a good faith effort to pay what we believe is appropriate now than to risk our fate to government officials trying to balance the ever broadening gap between available funds and revenues needed to balance strained budgets.

Your Grand Master is making seven additional recommendations that will be offered for consideration and action at the appropriate time at this session. They are as follows:

1. I would recommend adoption of the option outlined by the Grand Master last year in Annual Session that allows a lodge fully employing the Pollard Plan, complete with the Accepted Candidate portion to present the Entered Apprentice lectures at another time, after the degree but prior to the candidate receiving the Fellow Craft Degree. Purpose of this option is to allow the candidate to establish a bond of friendship with the older brethren the night he becomes a Mason. Far too often, I fear, a newly made Mason is sent off alone into the night without the proper feeling of brotherhood.
2. I would recommend formal establishment of a Special Committee on Membership. Purpose of this committee would be to continue the successful program begun during 1993, and to make adjustments, as needed, to keep the program on course.
3. I would recommend adoption of the Certified Lodge Ritual Instructor Program as an integral part of the education program of our Grand Lodge. More than 200 brethren throughout Maine have made the commitment to the program, demonstrated proficiency in the ritual, and offered themselves as a valuable teaching resource within their respective lodges.
4. I would recommend lowering to 18, the legal age for petitioning our Masonic Lodges. I would hope this change would also encourage an annual Father-Son evening at the lodge so our sons can experience the positive feelings of fraternal brotherly love at an impressionable age, and we can share with them the reasons for our love of the Craft. I do this with full understanding that there might be concern among some in DeMolay that this

could somehow have negative repercussions on that fine organization. Nonetheless, I remain fully committed to the fundamental principle that a healthy and vigorous symbolic lodge is essential to the health of all organizations and associations within the Masonic family. Within the ensuing year I would expect all potential impact will be carefully examined and analyzed.

5. I would recommend adoption of a new award to be given by the Grand Lodge of Maine. It would be awarded, not on an annual basis, but whenever the appropriate recipient is identified, and never more frequently than one per year. This award would be entitled the Joshua Lawrence Chamberlain Award, and would be presented to a citizen of Maine, Mason or non-Mason, who best exemplified the characteristics of leadership, citizenship, honor and integrity demonstrated repeatedly by this great Maine man and Mason. A suitable medal would be presented to each recipient, and possibly a statue of Chamberlain which the recipient would keep until the next recipient is selected.

6. I would recommend that the rule disallowing the dispensing of alcoholic beverages in our lodge buildings be relaxed so that such use as was outlined in the Grand Master's address on May 4, 1993, would be allowed. Three such dispensations were granted during 1993. The events were closely monitored, and each event was attended by proper decorum. It was your Grand Master's intention last year to determine whether such use of our dining rooms could be accomplished responsibly. Your Grand Master has been convinced that it *can be* because it was in each instance. It is now the responsibility of this Grand Lodge to decide whether it *should be*.

My final recommendation is to strike out that portion of Standing Resolution No. 27 that prevents two deserving Maine Masons from receiving the Josiah Hayden Drummond Medal in one year. This change would not increase the number of recipients of this prestigious medal, but it would allow, at the Grand Master's direction, for one or both recipients in a given year to be Maine Masons.

Finally, as I leave this office of Grand Master, I must say I am forever indebted to you brethren, and to all the others who have supported and worked with me to move the Craft forward during times of some difficulty, to hold hard to the necessary landmarks and regulations while at the same time daring and encouraging innovation in the process and practice, if not in the body, of Freemasonry.

The 21st Century is upon us. The challenge of a new millenia is enormous for all mankind.

Much is changing, and in many respects, the change is coming too fast, too radically, too desperately.

Masonry's tenets are timeless; its cardinal virtues contemporary guideposts



steering all who will heed along the path to a saner, safer, more joyous life's experience.

I am confident that the leaders who follow will chart a true course, and I know you will continue to support and maintain them as you have supported and maintained me.

I leave this office of awesome responsibility and exciting opportunity disappointed that more real progress has not been made, but assured and confident that I've held nothing back, that I've offered all I have, that I've done the best I could.

Someone else, I suppose, will decide whether any successes have been realized. To me that's not nearly so important as knowing I always did what I believed right for the Craft, and being able to genuinely consider each of you my friend as well as my brother.

I am a very rich man indeed.

## GRAND LECTURER'S REPORT

Caribou, Maine  
April 30, 1994

TO: The Most Worshipful Grand Master, Officers and Brethren of the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine.

This has been a year of many changes. Most of us would agree, change usually meets with much resistance, as did the introduction of the Certified Ritual Instructor program this year. Your Grand Lecturer and the six assistants

met twice during last summer before the fall schedule of schools began. After much discussion at these meetings, it was decided by those present to combine the traditional "School of Instruction" and the "Certified Ritual Instructor" program and to use as much flexibility as the District Deputy Grand Masters and the Masters hosting the schools wanted. A suggested format for the combined SOI and CRI programs was sent to all DDGMs and District Representatives to be used as a tool for them to implement the program.

Because of widespread misunderstanding about the program initially, there was considerable resistance; and progress putting the program in place was slow to begin. Through the hard work and dedication of the lecturers, the program was explained and clarified in the Districts, and then we began to see acceptance. At the present time, we do feel that the program has basically been implemented and should be continued. Seventy-two schools in the three degrees were conducted by lecturers in the twenty-four Masonic districts.

It is with regret that I must report that officers in twenty-four lodges failed to be present at any of the ritualistic schools this year. This is disappointing, because RITUAL IS THE FOUNDATION OF MASONRY and the strength of our lodges. Without the correct rendition, time will allow eroding changes to occur; and the authentic rendition of our rituals will unknowingly be lost forever. We are reminded that "Even the Temple of Solomon, so spacious and magnificent, and constructed by so many celebrated artists, escaped not the unsparing ravages of barbarous force. Freemasonry, notwithstanding, still survives. The attentive ear receives the sound from the instructive tongue, and the mysteries of Masonry are safely lodged in the repository of faithful breasts." The foregoing excerpt enforces the importance of our continued commitment to preserve the authenticity in our rituals now and through the ages.

The Grand Master, Deputy Grand Master, Assistant Grand Lecturers, and I

met on March 19, 1994, to select the lodge to confer the Master Mason Degree for Grand Lodge night. The following five lodges were nominated for consideration:

Siloam #92 - District 12  
Ancient York #155 - District 14  
Kemankeag #213 - District 15  
Harmony #38 - District 17  
Tyrian #73 - District 23

After much discussion, Siloam #92 in Fairfield was selected by those present. I had the opportunity to see this lodge confer the Master Mason Degree for Grand Lodge on April 21, 1994. The degree work that these young officers performed that night was exceptional. Hearty congratulations for a job very well done!

The retiring Grand Lecturer R.W. Robert H. Perry extended authorization to eleven (11) Degree Teams effective to June 30, 1993, so that the transition from the retiring Grand Lecturer to the new Grand Lecturer would not cause any interruption to the Degree teams. This year, EIGHT (8) Degree Teams were authorized (effective to May 3, 1994):

3. York County Shrine Club DT
4. Second District Past Masters DT
5. Anah Temple Past Masters DT
6. Kora Kraftsmen DT

The degree work these brothers exemplify is a credit to Masonry and to themselves.

## **REPORT OF INDEPENDENT CERTIFIED PUBLIC ACCOUNTANTS**

April 27, 1994

To the Most Worshipful Grand Master,  
George P. Pulkkinen, Grand Master, of the Grand Lodge of Maine.

We have audited the statements of assets, liabilities and fund balances arising from each transactions of the Grand Lodge of Maine, A.F. & A.M. as of March 31, 1994, and the related statements of operating cash receipts, cash disbursements, and changes in fund balances for the year then ended. These financial statements are the responsibility of the Organization's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit.

We conducted our audit in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.

As described in Note 1, these financial statements were prepared on the basis of cash receipts and disbursements, which is a comprehensive basis of accounting other than generally accepted accounting principles.

In our opinion, the accompanying statements referred to above present fairly in all material respects, the assets and liabilities of the Grand Lodge of Maine, A.F. & A.M. at March 31, 1994, and its revenue collected, expenditures paid, and the changes in fund balances during the year then ended, on the basis of accounting described in Note 1.

The accompanying supplemental data presented in Schedule 1 is not necessary for a fair presentation of the financial statements but is presented for additional analysis purposes. This information has been subjected to the same tests and other auditing procedures applied in the audit of the financial statements referred to above and, in our opinion is fairly presented in all material respects in relation to the financial statements taken as a whole.

## REPORT OF THE FINANCE COMMITTEE

Before reading his report, M.W. Curtis made some preliminary remarks which were as follows: M. W. Grand Master, before I read this report I want to tell you that we have made a couple of changes since we made up the proposed budget.

The Grand Lodge of Maine operated under two entities: 1. The General Fund, and 2. The Charitable Foundation of the Grand Lodge of Maine. Last year we had transferred the per capita tax on the MAINE MASON into the Charitable Foundation and supplemented the total cost from the Charitable Foundation. We decided that inasmuch as the MAINE MASON is funded with a per capita tax of \$1.00 per member that the MAINE MASON needs to be funded from the General Fund. That's one change.

The other change was, at the time --- and mind you we met and made up this proposed budget on March 10th --- at the time we did not have a Membership Development Committee appointed, and our Grand Master had requested \$2,000.00 to be set apart for membership development. Inasmuch as there wasn't a committee appointed, we added that item to the Grand Master's contingent, but since then the committee will be appointed and we felt it proper to make a separate line item of that \$2,000.00 for the membership development.

And the third item, there was some question in the appropriations that the Grand Secretary's salary was \$14,040.00 and the Grand Treasurer's salary was \$2,600.00. It's a little below the poverty line for such responsible offices of Grand Lodge. The truth is that \$14,000.00 is supplemented from the Charitable Foundation by \$4,500.00, making the Secretary's salary \$18,540.00.

And the same with the treasurer -- because so much of his work is in the Charitable Foundation, looking after the various accounts -- that part of his salary is \$7,500.00, making a total for him of \$10,100.00. So that's just dividing the expense up in approximately where they spend most of their efforts.

So with those changes, I will read the report.

Your Committee on Finance submits the following report.

## REPORT OF THE GRAND SECRETARY

In Grand Lodge  
Portland, Maine  
May 3, 1994

To the Grand Lodge of Maine:

Behold how swiftly the sands run and how good and how pleasant it is for brethren to labor in unity for the purpose of conducting our 175th Annual Communication. Each of us has contributed something to this Masonic year. My contribution has had some very high spots while there have also been some lows.

I am happy to report once again that we have made progress in the Grand Lodge office. Working together, the staff and I have fine tuned several of the weak spots in order to serve you more efficiently. As hard as we try, though, we still have some trouble spots. Will we reach 100%? Probably not, since human nature just doesn't allow for that goal, but we'll always keep aiming for excellence.

Through my monthly newsletter we send out more information from this office than we have ever sent before. I know these are busy times, but I urge you to read the newsletters because that is the method of communicating with the lodge secretaries and the members. Communications and education are vital in every organization, but more especially ours.

Knowledge makes man comfortable because he understands and knows what

needs to be done. Last February I attended the Grand Masters and Grand Secretaries' Conference in Washington, D.C. The seminars were invaluable because they gave us information to work with. The most important piece of information came from Gary Leazer, the person who was banished from the Southern Baptist Conference. He was assigned to research information about Masonry. He did just that and reported that Masonry was not an infringement on religion, nor did it replace religion. Dr. Leazer has given Masonry invaluable information which can serve us well.

Again this year I will remind you to read your *Maine Masonic Text Book* and your *Grand Lodge By-laws and Decisions*. You need to know the workings of your lodge and Grand Lodge. Your secretary can give you much of this information, but it's every member's responsibility to know and the only way is to study those two books.

Last year I reported that the Committee on the Review and Revision of the Constitution was making progress in reviewing the "*Digest of Decisions*," the second part of the Constitution. This year I am happy to report, that except for the final proofing, the committee has finished its work on this section.

Brethren, I know this may seem to have taken an inordinate length of time. You must realize, however, that this work is tedious and time consuming because of the amount of meticulous research that had to be done. The committee composed of Ill. Franklin G. Hinckley, Chmn; R.W. M. Donald Gardner, R.W. Waino T. Ray, R.W. Hollis G. Dixon, and R.W. Wayne T. Adams met often and worked diligently on assignments at home in order to conclude this work. This summer we will work on the final proof and begin on the Constitution and Amendments. Time does not allow me to explain what will be done here, but I am confident that we will have some changes, additions, deletions, and amendments ready to present to you at next year's Annual Session. I know you join me in thanking this committee for all their hard work.

There comes a time when by-laws need to be updated in every lodge. We find in the Grand Lodge office as some of the secretaries retire, the new secretaries have problems with the revision. Please don't hesitate to be in touch with me should you need assistance on the procedure of updating your lodge's by-laws. To the new as well as the veteran secretaries, each of you should have a *Secretary's Handbook*, a copy of the *Constitution, By-laws and Digest of Decisions*, and a *Maine Masonic Textbook*. Knowing what's in these books will give you a wealth of knowledge about your job as secretary. Does this sound familiar? Well, it's important enough to repeat again and again.

Several secretaries have retired this year. We wish them well and thank them for their many years of dedicated service.

The Secretaries' Workshops worked well last year even though the attend-

ance was poor. Because there was less than 25% total attendance, I am going to change the procedure again this coming year. That information will be sent out to you through my newsletter during the summer. I urge every secretary to make an effort to attend the workshop in his area.

It appears that we will never arrive at the point where we will have 100% response for the Annual Returns. As of the first of April we still have two Returns missing. There is no sense to belabor the fact that these missing Returns costs all of us time and money, and I'll leave it at that.

I had hoped to be able to report that many of the forms in the Grand Lodge office have been computerized. It did not happen. It's difficult to explain here the complexities and problems which exist in my trying to do this job. However, computerizing these forms will be on my priority list for the coming year.

Masonically, this has been a very busy year. There were five Grand Lodge Special Communications: one Cornerstone laying, three Dedications, and one Consolidation. There have been numerous Table Lodges and many Fellowship nights. This kind of activity has given Masonry a more positive image.

There is still a concern about membership, and I wouldn't want anyone to believe that I would diminish its importance. However, both you and I know quality must always be a major concern for all of us. A short time ago I heard a speaker talk about "downsizing" his company. He commented that his firm was becoming smaller in order to provide better service. Big is good if it doesn't lose touch with its objectives. Freemasonry is a people oriented fraternity and we do little good if we build in numbers and forget that it's the individual who counts.

Finally, I would be most remiss if I didn't tell you again how proud I am of our office staff. I know you will agree that the quick response you get when you call or write is due to Lois, Julie, Mary and Bruce. Working with them makes my job an absolute pleasure.

Beyond that, we have again worked within our budget and I am happy to report that for the seventh year in a row there will be no rise in the per capita tax.

Brethren, thank you for a very good year and I'm looking forward to working with you again this coming year.

## DOINGS OF GRAND LODGE OFFICERS REPORT

In Grand Lodge  
Portland, Maine  
May 3, 1994

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine:

Your committee on Doings of Grand Lodge Officers have given careful consideration to the address of the Grand Master and to the reports of the other officers which have been submitted to them.

We commend the Grand Master for the intense level of energy and enthusiasm which he has maintained throughout his two year term of office, and which has been evident in his every undertaking. Besides his many out of state visitations he has traversed the length and breadth of this Grand Jurisdiction untiringly.

The continued promotion of The Foundation for the Prevention of Drug and Alcohol Abuse has received wide acclaim in the news media.

The news releases on scholarship presentation have provided public awareness of Masonic support of our Youth in nearly every High School community in Maine.

The introduction of District Fellowship Meetings have provided an opportunity to introduce non Masons into a Masonic atmosphere. Several of the meetings have exceeded two hundred in attendance. These meetings have promoted the image of Masonry and have established a basis for increasing membership.

The Grand Master has proposed the adoption of the following five recommendations.

Lowering membership age from 21 to 18. Deferring the Entered Apprentice lecture until the Entered Apprentice Pollard Plan Session. Establish a new Grand Lodge Award. Adopting the Certified Lodge Ritual Instructors Program and relaxing the regulations on alcoholic beverage use in the banquet hall. All of these have much merit but careful consideration should be given them to determine their long range impact on the fraternity.

The Deputy Grand Master's report indicates that he has strongly supported the programs of the Grand Master and has had many opportunities to represent the Grand Master both in and out of state. He has attended 112 Blue Lodge Meetings and was the guest speaker at many of them.



The Senior Grand Warden represented the Grand Master at the Grand Lodge of Halifax, attended most of the District Meetings and promoted the goals and programs of the Grand Master.

The Junior Grand Warden has been very visible this past year by indicating his attendance at 113 Masonic meetings.

The Grand Secretary has submitted a very detailed and informative report. The highlights include the near completion of reviewing and updating the "Digest of Decisions", that the Grand Lodge has operated within its budget and that for the seventh year in a row there will be no request for an increase in the per capita tax.

The Grand Treasurer has again submitted an excellent detailed report of the financial status of Grand Lodge.

We commend the Grand Lodge Office Staff for the proficiency with which they continue to administer the business of Grand Lodge.

We recommend that portion of the Grand Master's Address covering dispensations be referred to the Committee on Jurisprudence and that portion pertaining to adoption of recommendations be referred to the Committee on Amendments.

tion for membership at age 18, the recommendation relating to the proposed Joshua Lawrence Chamberlain Award, the recommendation relating to the Simon Greenleaf Medal, the recommendation relating to the use of alcoholic beverages, and I also move that the recommendation relating to Special Committee on Membership be referred to the incoming Grand Master for consideration under Section 39 of the Constitution.

## DEMOLAY IN MAINE REPORT

In Grand Lodge  
Portland, Maine

Most Worshipful Grand Master:

It is an extreme pleasure for me to present this report on the status and activities of Maine DeMolay in this 75th Anniversary Year of the founding of our order. The Grand Lodge of Maine and **Maine DeMolay** have enjoyed a lasting association and we greatly appreciate your continued support. In looking through a proceedings book of this Grand Lodge, I found an indication of that fraternal tie. In 1956, DAD Frank S. Land, the founder of DeMolay, was presented the Josiah Hayden Drummond Distinguished Service Medal by M.W. Paul L. Powers. This is the kind of support that we have received for these many years.

As you could probably summarize from our State Master Councilor's presentation, **Maine DeMolay** has experienced a very exciting and successful year under his direction. As our year begins at Conclave in July, we are not yet at a close of activities for this year and the best is yet to come.

Beginning last July, we established a new direction for **Maine DeMolay**. Our International Supreme Council chose our jurisdiction as one of only two in the country to participate in the Executive Officer's Service and Training Program. Through this program, the staff at our national headquarters provided resources to assist us in developing a management plan for **Maine DeMolay**. With their assistance, the State Staff and State Officers met several times with Dan Houlihan, Director of Development for DeMolay International, and wrote a **Five Year Strategic Plan** for the management and growth of DeMolay in Maine. Our State Officers have adhered to this plan, and are meeting the goals which they helped to set.

In September, we conducted our Annual Fellowship Weekend at the YMCA Camp in Winthrop, with conferring of degrees on ten candidates. October brought the Annual Rainbow Charity Ball at Kora Temple, which was attended in strength by DeMolay members from across the state. In

November, members of the State Staff and the State Officers attended our Region 1 Conference in Woburn, MA. This regional session helps our state officers meet their counterparts in New England, and creates an expanded bond beyond our own state. January brought a sad time, with the untimely death of our State Treasurer, Dad Tom England, and our Annual Medieval Night was dedicated to his memory.

The month of March was a special time for us, as we celebrated our 75th Anniversary during DeMolay Week, March 12 to 19. We began the week with a charity basketball game between our state officers, and a semi-pro team, organized by your M.W. Grand Master. The boys won, but only with some very creative officiating by our own Kora Klowns as referees. On March 19th we celebrated a world-wide observance of the first initiatory class, held on that date in Kansas City, Mo. in 1919. Our Grand Royal Arch Chapter was the sponsoring organization for 25 new members of DeMolay. The degrees were conferred in the first-class fashion by members of Phil Drader/Coronation Chapter of Moncton, New Brunswick, and by a team of Senior DeMolays. We greatly appreciate the support of the Royal Arch Masons in Maine for this event.

In April we conducted our Annual Sweetheart Pageant, and have a very charming Court of Sweethearts, representing each of our active Chapters. May brings the annual communication of our Grand Masonic Bodies. This year, Maine DeMolay has established a recognition of a Mason whom we feel has exhibited support of DeMolay, and has served as a positive role model for our members in his support and involvement of his own Masonic organizations. We are proud to announce that Brother Irving Anzmann has been selected as Maine DeMolay's Mason of the Year for 1993-1994, and he was presented with a plaque at the Grand Chapter Banquet last Friday evening by our State Master Councilor.

June 18th will be the State Master Councilor's Dance and Cruise on the Songo River Queen on Long Lake, and will be our last major event before conclave. On June 20th, 42 members of Maine and New Brunswick DeMolay and advisors will make a pilgrimage to Kansas City, via bus, to attend the 75th Anniversary Session of our International Supreme Council. July 8-9-10 will mark our Annual Conclave, and the election and installation of new state officers. You are invited to attend any or all of our conclave events, especially the banquet and installation, which should be an impressive event.

This is only a summary of the events of Maine DeMolay through this past year. It does not begin to detail events of our individual chapters, which include chapter meetings, conferring of degrees, civic service projects, fund raisers, and fun events. Our chapters have been active, and all are experiencing positive growth. To date, we have initiated 45 new members into Maine DeMolay. At this rate, we will achieve a net growth position before conclave. We have interest in starting or reinstituting chapters in several communities - Ellsworth and Windham - we have conducted several

DAD Training Programs to certify new advisors and adult workers, but we can always use more.

If you have not worked with young people give it a try. It's guaranteed to provide an experience unlike anything else in this world.

I again thank you for this opportunity to address this Grand Lodge, and thank you for your continued support of Maine DeMolay.

Several times during the past year the committee has encountered situations which need clarification. First, it is not true that we routinely pay for the funeral expenses of a deceased brother or his widow. It is true that we occasionally assist a family with the payment of those expenses when the deceased left no assets and when the next of kin are, themselves, without means. The Committee was surprised this past year to receive an application to pay the funeral expenses of a deceased brother who did leave a small estate to two sons, both non-Masons. In another instance the Committee

received a request to pay a funeral bill where there were assets but there was some delay in settling the estate. The Committee looks carefully at these applications to be sure that they are appropriate disbursements for our limited charity funds.

The second problem which frequently arises is based on the erroneous assumption that the Committee has a better ability to decide on the merits of an application than the officers of the Lodge which submitted it. In fact, we have no independent means to verify whether or not an application is worthy beyond the information the officers of the Lodge give us. Upon receipt of an application we always check with either the Master or the Secretary. Sometimes we are surprised to find that either one or both of them don't really support the application. They simply sent the application forward to let someone else make the decision. That puts the Committee in a very difficult situation. The Masters and Secretaries who sign the applications should treat their signatures as a personal endorsement that the application has merit, that the amount requested is reasonable in the circumstances. The Committee has to be able to rely on the signatures of a Master and Secretary as their personal recommendation.

We are grateful to those other Masonic bodies which have transferred funds to us this past year in order to participate in the grants of relief we have made. Those contributions are as follows:

The Grand Master has taken a personal interest in many of the applications and on several occasions suggested an application when he heard of a brother in need. The Grand Treasurer is particularly helpful in coordinating with other bodies their participation in grants of relief to Brothers who are also members of those bodies.

Finally, we do have the resources to be of greater assistance to Masons or members of their families in need. Each Trustee should make it a point to suggest, where appropriate, that lodge secretaries apply for assistance.

Wayne Adams tells the story of the gift given to Grand Lodge by the Foster Family --

The Grand Master also as part of this report asked me to report to you on a magnificent gift which the Masonic Charitable Foundation received this past year, which, I believe, is the single largest gift the Maine Masonic Charitable Foundation has ever received. It is an important story because it conveys to each of us four important lessons.

It is the story of Frances Foster, the widow of a Mason, age 94, who lived in Massachusetts. Her late husband, Stanley Foster, was raised in the small town of Sumner, Maine. When he reached the appropriate age, he was raised to the Sublime Degree of Master Mason in Evening Star Lodge in Buckfield. Soon thereafter he moved to Massachusetts, and lived all of his adult life in Massachusetts. He died, survived by his widow, and his widow, as he did, retained a fond affection for that little town in Maine and for the lodge of which her husband was a member. The members of Evening Star Lodge included Mrs. Foster as one of their "Special Ladies." That, of course, is the first lesson.

We tend after our elder brothers and their widows because it is the right thing to do, but often times it pays unexpected dividends. Mrs. Foster decided she would like to establish a scholarship to benefit young people in those towns of Sumner, Hartland, Hebron and Buckfield with special consideration to be given to children of members of Evening Star Lodge.

She cast about for a way to do it, and decided she would do it by selling her home subject to a life estate, and establishing a scholarship fund. In trying to figure out how to do it, she decided the best way to do it would be to establish a scholarship fund at the University of Maine at Orono for the benefit of those young people. The brethren of Evening Star Lodge got wind of this and brought it to the attention of the Grand Master. That's the second lesson. When any of us hears of a Mason, or someone who is related to a Mason who desires to make a gift and doesn't quite know how to do it, it is important to bring that to the attention of the Grand Master or Grand Secretary immediately.

They brought this information to the Grand Master who called me one morning and gave me the background to the story and said "I think that money should be going not to the University of Maine but into our Masonic Charitable Foundation because of the ties of both Mr. and Mrs. Foster..." I agreed that that was a good idea. And then he said, "I'd like you to look



into it and see if you can't arrange that." There was a long pause. Well, I thought, "This guy wants me to snatch a scholarship fund away from the University of Maine," so I said something noncommittal like, "I'll see what I can do."

Well, I met with members of Evening Star Lodge, opened up discussions with Mrs. Foster's attorney in Washington -- who really wasn't too interested in talking to me -- but I persisted and one day made the argument that, I think was persuasive. It was that if Mrs. Foster establishes this fund at the University of Maine at Orono it would help students from those small towns at the University of Maine at Orono and no other school. But if she established that scholarship fund with the Masonic Charitable Foundation, we can help students from those four towns no matter where they went to school. At that point, Mrs. Foster's attorney shared with me how frustrated he was at dealing with the University of Maine being referred to one vice-president to another and not getting an answer, so at last he said, "What kind of bureaucracy do you have?"

I took a deep swallow and said, "You're talking to him."

And he said, "Do you have the authority to establish a name scholarship fund in honor of Mr. and Mrs. Foster?"

I said, "Yes."

He said, "Can you move quickly?"

I said, "Yes."

He said, "Are you authorized to pay Mrs. Foster's transfer taxes in relation to the conveyance of this property to the Foundation?"

I said, "Yes."

He said, "Are you prepared to pay Mrs. Foster's attorney's fees in preparing the documentation necessary to make this gift?"

I said "Yes."

At this point I was getting worried because I had no authority to say yes to anybody about anything. I called the Grand Master immediately, confessed my premeditated guilt that I had no authority...

He said "Go for it."

At that point papers began to fly back and forth rapidly by FAX and by Federal Express between us and Mrs. Foster's attorney and our attorney in Massachusetts and the buyer of the property; and it all came together on December 17th when our attorney went to Mrs. Foster's house at ten o'clock in

the morning. And she conveyed her property to the Masonic Charitable Foundation subject to a life estate in herself. At eleven o'clock that morning our attorney went to the office of the buyer's attorney where we sold that property, again subject to a life estate in favor of Mrs. Foster and realized over \$344,000.00. At noon of that day our attorney was at the Plymouth County Registry of Deeds recording all the appropriate documents. At one o'clock that afternoon Mrs. Foster died. The lesson for us all here is that when someone says they want to move fast, they want to move fast.

I never met Mrs. Foster, but all the events surrounding this gift leave me to believe the completion of this gift was very important to her, and that she had hung on until she was sure that she had accomplished her goal because it was important to her. It was certainly important to the Masonic Charitable Foundation; important to Evening Star Lodge in Buckfield; and will be important to successive generations of young people from those small towns as they seek their education. And it was certainly an honor for me to be allowed to play a small roll in bringing that about. Thank you, Most Worshipful.

\$201,440.00

We determine that the per capita tax of \$5.50 as fixed in Paragraph 1 of Section 90 of the Constitution is sufficient to support the foregoing budget and no adjustment thereto is required.

## PRELIMINARY REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON CREDENTIALS

ARTHUR O. NELSON: Most Worshipful Grand Master, I bring to you and the brethren here a preliminary report from the Credentials Committee. At the present time there are 179 Lodges represented, which gives you a vote of 537 members of those lodges. We have 51 Grand Lodge officers present. We have 43 permanent members present, which gives us a total of 631 votes. I have 5 duplicates taken from that figure which gives us a net total at the present time of 626 votes.

For your information, Most Worshipful, at the present time there are 17 lodges not represented.

GM: Thank you, Bro. Arthur. I suspect that you will request to amend that at a later time should it require.

Is Brother Colwyn Haskell in the house?

### COLWYN F. HASKELL

Colwyn F. Haskell was born in 1932 in Norway, Maine. He graduated from Norway High School in 1950, at the top of his class. In 1954 he earned a BS Degree in Chemical Engineering from the University of Maine and the next year earned his Masters Degree in the same discipline and from the same institution.

During his 37 year career at the Oxford Paper Company (now Boise Cascade) in Rumford, he served as Research Engineer and Superintendent of the Groundwood Mill.

He was united in marriage with the former Judith Klain, a classmate at Norway High School. They have two children, James and Kathryn; and three grandchildren, Alexander, Nora, and Owen Davis.

The Haskells have resided at 120 Paradise Street in Bethel for 38 years, a place handy by the snow covered peaks where Brother Win has spent many an hour, first teaching his son to ski, then following increasingly far behind as the younger legs prevailed.

Win Haskell spent many years as a member of the Ski Patrol at Sunday River. When not skiing, he has shown a similar flair accomplishing household renovations.

A man who demonstrates, in every endeavor, that perfection is truly an attainable goal, Brother Win's excellence to the tasks at hand has been demonstrated in his Masonry since he was raised April 9, 1959. He served as Mas-

ter of Bethel Lodge #97 in 1965 and District Deputy Grand Master of the 16th Masonic District in 1966.

He is a Past Presiding Officer of all the York Rite Bodies, a Past Sovereign of Eusebius Conclave, Knights of the Red Cross of Constantine; and the Knights of the York Cross of Honor.

He joined the Lewiston-Auburn Valley, Scottish Rite, and Maine Consistory, in 1967, has participated in the 4th and 16th degrees for many years, and is a line officer in the Valley.

An excellent ritualist as well as an inspiring leader, Brother Win Haskell is also the purifier, if not the originator, of the famed Sunday River Ritual, a Masonic dialect unique to the hills of Western Maine, and one which every brother should hear and enjoy in its purest sense.

Brother Colwyn F. Haskell -- Win -- for your many years of outstanding service to the Fraternity, I am honored and privileged to present you the Simon Greenleaf Medal for Meritorious Service to Masonry.

The Grand Master asks Brother Haskell, "Is there anything you'd like to say in this prepared occasion?"

**BROTHER COLWYN F. HASKELL:** Most Worshipful, I don't know that there's anything I can say. I never in my life expected to be granted that distinguished award. I'm a little shocked, not able to mouth off as much as I usually do in some of these places when I shouldn't. But, seriously, my Brethren, I can't think of a greater honor that could come to me in my lifetime as to be presented this medal in this lodge by this Grand Master. Thank you very much.

## **FRATERNAL RELATIONS REPORT**

In Grand Lodge

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine:

The past year has been fairly quiet with a couple of exceptions which are noted below.

### **SPECIAL REPORT**

#### **RUSSIA**

In a development that would have been unthinkable until fairly recently,

progress is being made toward the establishment of a Russian Grand Lodge. In fact, the optimism is such that the name "National Grand Lodge of Russia" has been registered with the Ministry of Justice in Moscow.

The Grande Lodge Nationale Francaise has taken the lead in helping to re-establish Russian Freemasonry. It has consecrated three new lodges in the past year in addition to one previously formed. There are now two lodges in Moscow, one in St. Petersburg and one in Varonej.

The GLNF is looking for assistance from American Grand Lodges in visiting the newly established Lodges whose members have little experience in Masonic practices, and can use some guidance in learning the Masonic ropes.

Alaska has expressed interest in helping to establish Freemasonry in Eastern Russia, in Irkutsk, Vladivostok, Magadan and Khabarovak. According to an article in *The American Masonic Review*, the Grand Lodge is actively seeking individual Lodges or Masons who would be willing to act as representatives while travelling in Siberia.

### GREECE

This has been a trouble spot for some time. The Grand Lodge of Greece has been in existence since 1811. Historically it has been faced with problems common to much of European Freemasonry, because of domination by the AASR's Supreme Council which also controlled the Craft degrees.

This continued in Greece until the Supreme Council and Grand Lodge separated in 1988. When this happened, some 400 of the brethren did not agree to this breaking of what had become tradition, and broke away to form the irregular National Grand Lodge of Greece.

In 1992, for reasons that are not entirely clear, the United Grand Lodge of England chose to raise the questions of the sovereignty of the Grand Lodge of Greece, the matter of discussion of politics in lodge, and whether or not Greek brethren took an oath, obligation or a formal assertion.

These questions were answered in a manner which seemed satisfactory to us, to an investigation committee established by the Australian Grand Lodge of New South Wales and the Commission on Information of the Conference of Grand Masters. Yet the Secretary of the UGLE refused to meet with a delegation from the Grand Lodge of Greece to discuss and clarify the situation.

On June 9, 1993, the UGLE withdrew recognition of the Grand Lodge of Greece on grounds that it encouraged discussion of politics in the subordinate lodges, and on September 8, 1993, extended recognition to the National Grand Lodge of Greece, which we understand had a problem develop in the meantime, which caused many of its members to break off and form three more Grand Lodges.

The Commission on Information for Recognition of the Conference of Grand Masters has had this matter under close observation, and reports that in its opinion, "the Grand Lodge of Greece is regular and entitled to continued recognition." It further gives its opinion that the National Grand Lodge of Greece does not at this time, meet all the standards of the Commission for recognition.

Your Committee on Fraternal Relations therefore recommends that the Grand Lodge of Maine continue to extend Fraternal Recognition to the Grand Lodge of Greece.

### ITALY

The 1994 report of the Commission of Information for Recognition of the Conference of Grand Masters opens its section on Italy by stating "Freemasonry in Italy has, through the years, been in turmoil," which has to be in the running for the understatement of the year. It goes on to say "This past year has been particularly turbulent with the establishment of a new Grand Lodge called the Regular Grand Lodge of Italy."

These two bodies have been releasing volumes of correspondence, filled with charges, counter charges, accusations, denials and personality clashes. They involve politics, corruption, alleged mafia connections, legal problems with the Italian government, illegal Masonic bodies, interference by other Masonic organizations, and even the P-2 scandal is still being investigated..

In reading through it all, it's not possible for an outsider to know where the truth lies.

The Grand Lodge of England has withdrawn recognition from the Grand Orient of Italy, and extended it to the new Regular Grand Lodge of Italy.

The American Commission on Information for Recognition on the other hand, takes the opposite stand, seeing no proven reason why recognition should be withdrawn from The Grand Orient at this time. It is concerned that recognition of the new Regular Grand Lodge has been given a bit hastily, and that it does not satisfy the conditions of regularity.

The Grand Lodge of Maine extended fraternal recognition to the Grand Orient of Italy some years ago. Breaking such relations is a serious matter to be taken only with definite knowledge of irregularities, which we do not have at this time.

Your Committee therefore recommends that the Grand Lodge of Maine continue its recognition of the Grand Orient of Italy for the time being, keeping a close watch on the situation.

## YUGOSLAVIA

We reported last year that while the newly reconstituted Grand Lodge of Yugoslavia had received recognition from a few Grand Lodges, and was considered as meeting the standards for recognition by the Commission on Information for Recognition, and while the political situation in that fractured country is somewhat improved, your Committee recommends that recognition be deferred pending further stability.

## SENEGAL

The Grande Loge National Francais constituted a new Grand Lodge in Senegal, West Africa on January 16, 1993. It was formerly a District Lodge of the GLNF, and is made up of 13 lodges located in or near Dakar. This new Grande Loge de Senegal has made excellent progress since that time, having increased its membership by 20%.

The Commission on Information for Recognition considers it meets all its standards and is entitled to recognition. The Grande Loge de Senegal applied to the Grand Lodge of Maine for recognition on April 22, 1993, and your Committee recommends their request be granted and representatives be exchanged.

## SUMMARY

Your Committee on Fraternal Relations recommends that the Grand Lodge of Maine continue to extend fraternal recognition to the Grand Lodge of Greece and the Grand Orient of Italy; that it take no action at this time with regard to the Grand Lodge of Yugoslavia, and that it enter into fraternal relations with the Grande Loge de Senegal, and exchange representatives with it.

GM: I would call this 175th Annual Communication of the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine from refreshment to labor. Brother Grand Marshal will you escort Rev. Brother David Wigley to the altar please.

## **COMMITTEE ON AMENDMENTS**

In Grand Lodge  
Portland, Maine  
May 3, 1994

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine:

The Committee on Amendments was saddened this past year with the death of R.W. Millard A. Whitney, Past Junior Grand Warden of Machias, a member who has served faithfully on this committee for several years.

This committee recommends the following Legislation to be voted on at this 175th Annual Communication:

### **1. Proposed:**

Sec. 90:2A will read with the deletions and additions:

These funds for The Maine Mason are to be considered as though they are dedicated funds. If The Maine Mason shall cease to be published this levy shall likewise cease.

### **2. Proposed:**

Sec. 114. "All Lodges in the 19th Masonic District, to wit: York Lodge No. 22, St. John's Lodge No. 51, Fraternal Lodge No. 55, Arundel Lodge No. 76, Ocean Lodge No. 142, Preble Lodge No. 143, Yorkshire Lodge No. 179, Naval Lodge No. 184, Springvale Lodge No. 190, and St. Aspinquid Lodge No. 198, shall have concurrent jurisdiction with each other."

### **3. Proposed:**

Sec. 36.3 The Committee on Grievances and Appeals shall have referred to it all matters of controversy and grievances and petitions or applications for reinstatement or restoration to Masonry; and shall hear appeals from recom-



mendations of the Commissioners of Trials, and on receiving and hearing such appeals, shall review the proceedings and the findings of the Board of Commissioners of Trials and make appropriate recommendation to the Grand Lodge.

#### 4. Proposed

Sec. 49.g: The examination upon the charge and accusation shall be had at some convenient place and time to be designated by the Commissioners not later than 90 days prior to the next annual communication of the Grand Lodge, of which said place and time due notice shall be given, and no visitors shall be admitted except as counsel or witnesses. Unless otherwise ordered by the Commissioners, the testimony may be taken by the Chairman, or any member designated by him, who shall reduce the substance of the same to writing, to be submitted to the Board. Witnesses, if Masons, shall testify on their honor as such. Other witnesses shall be duly sworn before their testimony is taken.

Sec. 49.j: A report of the proceedings and summary of the facts in each case, including the finding and recommendation of the Commissioners acting in such case shall be sent by registered mail to the accused, at his last known address, within 30 days of hearing such case, together with a notice that he may appeal the recommendations of the Commissioners of Trials, said appeal to be filed with the Grand Secretary within 15 days of receiving said notice. Upon receipt of notice of appeal, the Grand Secretary shall forthwith file with the Chairman of the Committee of Grievances and Appeals, the report, findings and recommendations made by said Commission pursuant to Section 36, sub-paragraph 3. Failure to file an appeal within the time provided for herein shall terminate any right of appeal and findings and recommendations of the Commissioner of Trials shall be reported directly to the Grand Lodge for review and final determination.

Sec. 49.4.1: (new provision) Any Brother may appeal a finding of the Commissioners of Trials, in his case, to the Committee on Grievances and Appeals, which will hear said appeal and make appropriate recommendation to the next annual communication of the Grand Lodge. Said appeal must be made within 15 days of receiving notification from the Commissioners of Trials.

#### 5. Proposed:

Sec. 2: That all Past Grand Treasurers will be accorded Permanent Member status. That all Past Grand Secretaries will be accorded Permanent Member status, and that District Representatives, while in office, be accorded Grand Lodge Member status.

Brother Lobley requested that the proposed amendments be read and voted upon individually. The Grand Master granted that request.

G.M. interrupted to request that a Constitutional procedure be followed, which was to insure that all the amendments be properly voted upon for removal from the table. It was so done for each amendment.

The amendment for concurrent jurisdiction in the 19th District raised a question. The Grand Master asked if there were any discussion. A member in the hall asked for the background on the proposed amendment.

G.M. I think that's a fair question. I would call on Wayne Adams, the District Deputy Grand Master of the 19th Masonic district to explain that.

WAYNE ADAMS: When I became District Deputy two years ago, the first item I was asked to address as District Deputy by the Masters and Wardens Association was the possibility of having concurrent jurisdiction within our district. Our district is small, it's compact, the people tend to know each other from one lodge to another, and to a man they found it was causing excess delay in getting waivers from each other's lodges. I told them as a new District Deputy certainly I wasn't going to get out in front of this issue unless all the lodges in the district approved it. They all approved it in the Annual Meetings in 1992. It was part of the published agenda on the Annual Meetings, and all of the lodges approved it. And so it was presented with the identical language which appears before us here today. It was presented by each of the lodges to Grand Lodge. It was received last year, and we certainly hope it will be approved by Grand Lodge this year. We're not saying it's something that this solution will work in every district, but we believe very strongly it would work in our district, and it would be to the benefit of getting new members and speed up the process.

G.M. Thank you Bro. Adams. Would you stay there for just a minute in case there are further questions.

A Brother raises the point that if this amendment is passed it establishes the precedent that it could become an amendment in other districts. [The language could not be given because the sound couldn't be picked up sufficiently to be recorded.]

G.M. The point is well made and taken. Are there any other questions on this issue? Thank you Brother Adams. You've heard the proposed amendment, you've heard the discussion. Is there any further comment on the question? I will call for a vote.

#### PROPOSAL ON CONCURRENT JURISDICTION WAS PASSED.

There was some discussion asking for clarification about the proposal to give the Grand Treasurer and Grand Secretary permanent member status. Once the information was clarified, the amendment passed.

THE REPORT IN ITS ENTIRETY WAS VOTED ON AND IT WAS ACCEPTED.

GM: Brethren, before we leave that last item, are there any amendments to be proposed this day from the floor? M.W. Peter C. Schmidt, PGM is recognized by the Grand Master.

M.W. Peter C. Schmidt: I hereby propose the following amendments to the Constitution of the Grand Lodge of Maine:

Strike out Section 114 in its entirety and insert in place thereof the following:

Sec. 114: The jurisdiction of each Lodge in the State shall extend over all territory of Maine and all Lodges shall have concurrent jurisdiction therein.

Also, amend Section 112 by striking out the word "nor" in the third line, place a period after the parenthesis in line four and strike out the rest of the words after the period in lines four, five and six of this sentence. Place a period after the word "year" on the next to the last line of the second sentence and strike out the rest of the words after the period in that line and the last line of that sentence, so that Section 112 shall read;

Sec. 112. No Lodge without the permission of the Grand Master, shall receive a petition of a candidate for the degrees until he has resided in the State one year. (exception seafaring men absent only on a voyage to sea) Lodges shall have the right to receive petitions from candidates in the military or naval service who are stationed and have their domicile in this State one year.

Also, Section 115 to be amended by striking out the first paragraph. Also, Section 123, paragraph two to be amended by removing the comma after the word "year" in the third line and striking out the words "and in the jurisdiction of the lodge six months" so that paragraph two shall read as follows:

"Each application must be made in writing under the signature of the applicant, stating his age, residence, and that he has resided in the State one year next preceding the date of the application (except in cases above mentioned) and whether he has made application to and been rejected by any other lodge."

M.W. Sir, I move that these amendments be received, referred to the Committee on Amendments, laid on the table until the next Annual Communication of the Grand Lodge in 1995.

G.M. Brethren, you have heard that motion duly seconded that these proposed amendments must be accepted, referred to the proper committees, laid on the table for consideration next year. Is there any discussion? I'm sure you gathered all the gist of those proposed amendments at the reading.

You will be provided additional information for those of you who might have missed a word or two along the way. Is there any discussion on that proposal? If not, all those in favor of accepting this motion as proposed signify in the usual manner. Opposed? It is a vote.

Are there any other amendments from the floor that a brother would wish to propose. Thank you Brethren. (The Grand Master recognized a brother who wishes to speak.)

Most Worshipful, my name is A. James Ross and I am the president of the Masters and Wardens Association of the 17th Masonic District, and on a regular of the 17th of March it was voted and resolved by the Masters and Wardens of the 17th District that each of the constituent lodges which compose the 17th Masonic District shall have concurrent jurisdiction over applicants for membership who reside within the 17th Masonic District subject, however, to all conditions of eligibility for membership. I think that goes along with the Most Worshipful Brother's statement. I would like to submit this to be tabled and considered for the next Annual Communication, Sir.

G.M. You've heard the motion made and seconded that we accept this proposed amendment which will provide for concurrent jurisdiction within the lodges of the 17th Masonic District. Is there any discussion? All those in favor of receiving this proposal. Opposed? It is a vote.

Are there any further amendments to be offered from the floor? Thank you Brethren. R.W. Brother Tornquist, the report on Delinquent Lodges.

Fund raising efforts earned us nearly \$100,000.00 this year and we are thankful to those 8,000 Masons who financially supported this program. We are also appreciative of the \$5,000.00 gift from the Grand Royal Arch Chapter of Maine and other special gifts from Lodges, District Deputy and Officers Associations. Seventy-two grants totaling \$64,000.00 have been made to schools statewide. Individual grants do not exceed more than \$1,000.00 each. All requests for grants were fulfilled except for two or three. You've seen that his kind of commitment always makes our Past Grand Master smile and look very happy. Just look at him. [M.W. Curtis makes a few comments] Ernie, I'm going to pass these over to you because you've just proven to be such a good steward of this program since its beginning. I'm not going to endorse them, however.

M.W. Ernest Curtis: This just shows what we can do, and I hope that, perhaps, this will be an inspiration for some of the other districts. Grand Master, we have accepted this report, but I have another, The Scholarship Report.

## THE MAINE MASONIC SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM REPORT

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine:

The Maine Masonic Scholarship Program has had another excellent year. Matching Fund Scholarships have been co-sponsored by 104 Lodges. 32 Lodges have granted their own scholarships. The Maine Masonic Scholarship Program has granted 23 - \$500.00 scholarships to schools where no Lodge has participated. Masters and Wardens Associations and Officer Associations have granted 7 - \$500.00 scholarships. This makes a total of 136 - \$500.00 scholarships that have been granted with at least one in every High School in the State this past year amounting to \$68,000.00. Once again we acknowledge with sincere appreciation the \$5,000.00 gift from the Grand Royal Arch Chapter of Maine and all other special gifts. A wonderful thing has happened this past year. The Charitable Foundation of the Grand Lodge of Maine received a bequest of \$344,000.00 to set up the Francis L. and George B. Foster Scholarship Fund. The income from this fund is to be used for scholarships for Sons, Daughters, Grandsons, and Granddaughters of members of Evening Star Lodge #147 of Buckfield and the surrounding



Towns. It is anticipated that this is the first of many such gifts that will be available to the Charitable Foundation in the future as we now have the proper tax exempt status to receive such gifts.

The paper work and all correspondence of the scholarship program is now being handled in the Grand Lodge Office by Julieanne Irving. There is much detail and correspondence to oversee and Julie is doing a super job with the program.

The Freemasons of Maine can be justly proud of the great good that is coming from the Maine Masonic Scholarship Program.

**COMMITTEE TO PREPARE FOR THE 175TH ANNIVERSARY OF THE GRAND LODGE OF MAINE

TO THE MOST WORSHIPFUL GRAND LODGE OF MAINE:

Your Committee has devoted a good deal of time drafting a program of activities to mark the 175th Anniversary of our Grand Lodge. Some of the many proposals considered have been adopted and others discarded. We have come up with plans for a celebration that will involve the Grand Lodge, Districts and individual lodges, and is designed to make our members aware of a past we can be proud of, and to help them learn something more about Freemasonry than appears in the ritual.

In recent days when Freemasonry has come under bitter attack from its enemies using lies, half truths and misunderstandings, we, as Masons ought to be able to spot them for what they are. For this reason, we plan to include a bit more than history alone in the program.

The Grand Lodge of Maine was organized and went into business on June 1, 1820. The year 1995 will be designated as the 175th Anniversary year, although preliminary work to organize began as early as October 14, 1819.

Activities sponsored by the Grand Lodge will begin with a banquet to be held on October 1, 1994 at Kora Temple, Lewiston, to commemorate the first Maine Masonic convention at which the Grand Lodge of Maine had its origin. Further details will be forthcoming shortly.

At this affair, a 175th Anniversary medal will be presented by the Grand Lodge to the Master of each of the 30 founder lodges for his use while in office. In slightly different form, it will be available to members of those lodges, and with a different color ribbon, to members of all Maine lodges.

A 175th Anniversary banquet will also be held in June 1995 at Anah Temple, Bangor to mark the consecration of the Grand Lodge of Maine. Particulars of this and other 175th Anniversary events will be published in a special newsletter to be issued as necessary.

In addition to Grand Lodge activities, Districts and individual lodges are requested to hold at least one event during 1995, marking the 175th Anniversary of the Grand Lodge. These might be held in conjunction with:

Family Nights  
District Meetings*

Or such other programs as might be suitable. There will also be at least two special programs made available to lodges who might like to use them by Dispensation.

The Grand Lodge will provide a 10-15 minute script of the History of the Grand Lodge which is to be used as a part of each of these Anniversary programs. The brochure "Maine Freemasonry" should also be read.

There will be a number of other features marking the Anniversary celebration, including articles in "The Maine Mason", philatelic covers, a commemorative coin among others.

Other activities may be programmed during the Anniversary Year, in which case information will be passed along through the 175th Anniversary newsletter.

To the Most Worshipful Grand Master, Members of Grand Lodge, Officers and Members of Subordinate Lodges, and to all Grand Lodges with which we are in Fraternal Correspondence:

It is with deep regret that we recognize the death of three Grand Lodge Officers since our last Annual Communication.

Rt. Wor. Malcolm R. Holts was born at Perham, Maine, on March 15, 1910, the son of John and Martha (Peary) Holts. He died February 27, 1994, at his residence at Washburn, Maine.

He graduated from Washburn High School, Class of 1928, and Beals Business College, Bangor, in 1930. Brother Holts operated Holts IGA Store in Perham from 1934 to 1970.

He also served as postmaster for Perham from 1934 to 1969. He was later employed by Spinney's Color Center.

Brother Holts was a member of Washburn Lodge #193 and served as Worshipful Master in 1949 and 1950. He served as District Deputy Grand Master in 1954 and 1955. In 1960 he served as Senior Grand Warden for the Grand Lodge of Maine.

He was a member and past president and secretary of the Washburn Rotary Club and was recipient of the Rotary Paul Harris Fellow Award. Malcolm was also a member and former Sunday School teacher of the First Baptist Church of Perham. He served as an honorary deacon until the time of his death.

His wife, Harriett (Baker) Lewis Holts, died in 1973. He is survived by a son, Bryant Lewin of Pittsburg, California; two daughters, Marilyn Prince of Houlton and Myrna Lewin of Presque Isle; a brother, Philip of Weaver-ville, California, a sister Wilda McIntire, of Presque Isle; 10 grandchildren and 7 great grandchildren. Funeral services were held Wednesday, March 2, at the First Baptist Church, Perham, with the Reverend Robert McCarthy officiating.

Rt. W. Elmer P. Smart, son of Mike and Addie (Lambert) Smart, was born at Glenburn, Maine, on December 13, 1902. He died at a hospital in Bangor, on February 26, 1994.

He owned and operated Smart's Feed Store of Bangor for many years.

Brother Smart was very active in Masonry for more than 65 years.

He was raised in Kenduskeag Lodge No. 137 and served as Worshipful Master as well as Treasurer. He served the Grand Lodge of Maine as District Deputy of the 6th District in 1940; Grand Junior Deacon in 1942; Grand Steward in 1946, and as Senior Grand Warden in 1947.

Brother Smart was a member of all York Rite Bodies, Valley of Bangor, all Scottish Rite Bodies, and was Past Most Wise Master of Bangor Chapter of Rose Croix.

He was a member of the Maine Consistory, 32nd Degree of Portland, and of Anah Temple Shrine of Bangor. In 1965, Brother Smart was elected an honorary member of the Supreme Council 33rd Degree in Cleveland, Ohio.

Surviving are three daughters, Leona Ryan of Bangor, Nathalie Stone of Falmouth, Lorraine Hill of Bangor and several grandchildren.

Rt. W. Millard A. Whitney, son of Charles C. and Julia May (Foss) Whitney, was born at Jonesboro, Maine, February 26, 1903. He died at his home in Machias, Maine, October 22, 1993.

He was a graduate of Jonesboro High School and Washington State Normal School, Machias. He taught school at Cherryfield and Madrid before becoming Headmaster of St. Andrews, an Episcopal School for Boys in Barrington, Rhode Island.

Brother Whitney was a lifelong sports enthusiast, having played baseball and basketball in school. While at St. Andrews he was one of the founders of the sports program. He was inducted into the St. Andrews Hall of Fame in 1984.

He was past president of Eastern Maine Board of Basketball Referees Association. Sports were a very important part of his life, as a coach, player, official and spectator.

After returning to Machias, Millard established an automobile dealership and also became very active in the blueberry industry in Washington County. He was a past chairman of the Board of Directors of Pleasant River Blueberry Co-op.

Brother Whitney was active in Machias town government, having held the office of Selectman. He was a member of Centre Street Congregational Church where he served as a deacon.

He was raised in Harwood Lodge No. 91 of Machias and served as Worshipful Master. Masonry was one of his greatest passions in life. He was a 32nd Degree Mason and was actively involved in 9 different Masonic Bodies. He received the Josiah H. Drummond Medal in 1980.

Brother Millard is survived by his wife of 65 years, Dorothy (Fisher) Whitney; one son, Dale F. Whitney; one daughter, Evelyn Foster of Princeton, New Jersey; one sister, Edrie Davis of Machias; six grandchildren and 6 great-grandchildren.

It is with deep regret that we acknowledge the deaths of 868 Brethren from the State of Maine who have died since our last Annual Communication. May our Most Merciful God receive all these Brethren into that celestial Lodge above, where they may find eternal peace.

This year's numerical loss is 605 the percentage being 1.84%.

At the close of the calendar year, the total membership was 30,415. Thirty-six lodges reported a gain in membership, 145 a loss and 16 remained the same.

Hiram Lodge No. 180 remains the largest, with a membership of 597. Naskeag Lodge No. 171 remains the smallest with 45 members. Lygonia #40 reported the largest gain with seven. Hiram Lodge No. 180 suffered the greatest loss (35). Average membership is 154 and 64 lodges reported fewer than 100 members.

## COMMITTEE ON MASONIC JURISPRUDENCE

In Grand Lodge  
 Portland, Maine  
 May 3, 1994

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine:

The Committee on Jurisprudence has before it a decision of the Grand Master construing Section 135 of the Constitution. The Grand Master was asked to decide whether the provision which reads: "A Brother may be an active member of more than one lodge within the jurisdiction of this Grand Lodge, but he may not hold more than one office in any lodge at the same time," means that multiple membership is limited to two lodges or more and whether a holder of multiple membership(s) may serve as an officer in more than one lodge at a given time.

The decision was divided into two questions. The first is whether a Brother may belong to two lodges, or to an undetermined number more than one? The Grand Master ruled and, we concur, that the language "more than one" reflects the meaning and there is nothing in Section 135 which would limit a brother to membership in but two lodges -- a brother is free to join as many lodges as he wishes and as will have him following petition, election and signing the by-laws.



The second question is whether the language of Section 135 prevents a brother from holding more than one office in any lodge in which he holds membership? Unfortunately, the language of Section 135 may not be as artfully crafted as we might wish. You will recall that prior to 1988 when Section 135 was adopted, a brother could be a member of but one lodge within our jurisdiction. That membership as the Grand Master points out is without restriction, limitation or condition.

However, the legislative history of Section 135 acknowledges that while dual or multiple membership was a point of departure within our jurisdiction -- indeed a constitutional amendment was necessary for multiple memberships to be allowed -- such multiple membership(s) would be limited in that any brother electing multiple membership(s) would be under the disability of being able to be an officer in but one lodge at any given time.

It may well be that this section of the Constitution now with a perspective of six years should be revisited, but your Committee has determined that Section 135 allows multiple membership(s), but a member who has multiple membership(s) may be an officer at any given time in only one of the lodges to which he belongs.

The Grand Master has granted a number of dispensations this last year all of which save one fall well within his prerogatives. However, it is incumbent upon any Grand Master to follow the substantive law of the Grand Lodge of Maine. The purpose of dispensations in the first instance is to allow a Grand Master to waive in an individual instance a procedural rule or guideline which if strictly followed results in a conclusion which the Grand Master has determined is not in the best interests of the Fraternity. He has and should have wide discretion in issuing dispensations.

On January 30, 1994, the Grand Master granted a dispensation to Western Mountain Shrine Club allowing them under very strict conditions to dispense alcoholic beverages at their February, March and April meetings. The dispensation essentially set aside the well established Masonic law (see 1935 Proceedings at Page 391) in this jurisdiction. Masonic law in this jurisdiction is established by one of two methods. Either it is enacted at Grand Lodge as a piece of legislation at an annual communication, or it results in the form of a decision of the Grand Master, approved by the Committee on Jurisprudence whose report is subsequently approved by Grand Lodge. Previously, dispensations have been granted for the use of alcoholic beverages only when their use is attendant upon ritualistic exemplification. In this instance, we feel that the Grand Master exceeded his prerogative even though his intent was to test an alternative regulation governing the dispensing of alcoholic beverages. Such a practice deviates from the historic use of dispensations. We believe that the serving of alcohol on Masonic premises constitutes a substantive change from our existing regulations and that deviations from those regulations even for experimentation or trial purposes should be specifically authorized by Grand Lodge and that the Grand Master's authority to issue such dispensations should be the subject of specific

Grand Lodge legislation which would reflect the same consensus concerning the use of that authority as has long existed for other questions most commonly concerning degree work.

## CONDITION OF THE FRATERNITY

In Grand Lodge  
Portland, Maine  
May 3, 1994

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine:

As we write this report to Grand Lodge on its One Hundred Seventy-fifth Annual Communication, we commend the District Deputy Grand Masters for submitting inspection reports and supplements (1A) for all of the lodges in this Grand Jurisdiction. Since serving on this committee this is a first for us and gives us a complete view of Freemasonry in Maine.

### CONDITION

Almost all of the lodges in Maine have a Charity Committee and Charity Fund, promote the Widows Fund, participate in District Activities, support the Scholarship Program, and hold Past Masters Nights as part of their annual program. Because of the popularity of the above programs we selected the following six categories from the inspection supplement (1A) for review this year: Care and Share Committee, Youth, Special Events, Publicity, Lodge Leadership Development Program, and Non-payment of Dues Committee. We felt that these categories might best exemplify what needs to be done to improve Masonry in Maine as we look to the future. Briefly this is what we found: Care and Share Committee: Less than one-half of the lodges have a formal committee and what better way to improve our image as a lodge than to visit elderly or ill brethren and bring a small gift, a word of encouragement, and news of the lodge. Youth: Only about one-fifth of the lodges actively engage in support of our youth, although 90% of the lodges contribute financially to either Demolay or Rainbow or both. These young people can enhance our Fraternity greatly in the future. We must make more of an effort to become actively involved in their support. Special Events: 56% of our lodges actively engage in these events which include Brotherhood Nights, Degree Teams, Fellowship Nights, Blood Drives, etc., and many times these activities greatly improve our image in the Community. The other 44% of the lodges should consider this kind of event. Publicity: Only a very small percentage of our lodges do anything with publicity other than awarding scholarships, and although this certainly catches the attention of the families of graduating seniors, we need to go further in publicizing our activities. Lodge Leadership Development Program: This wonderful program instituted three years ago by Grand Lodge has been adopted by about one-half of the lodges. It greatly enhances activities in the lodges that have undertaken the program. It gives the Junior Warden and Senior Warden a plan of work for their year as Master. Non-payment of Dues Committee: Only about one-third of the lodges have a formal committee for assisting the Secretary in contacting members who are delinquent in dues. Some Secretaries are very proficient in collecting dues and may not

need assistance, but others could well benefit from the help this committee would provide.

Inspection reports indicated many lodges are involving new members and young officers in their officer line; however, too many still say only Past Masters are taking office and keeping the lodge running. Hopefully the new plan of holding District wide Informational Meetings with non-members will help our endeavors to slow the decline in membership.

The above table shows the ratings of the lodges on ritual on the night of inspection. As we review these numbers we find that the excellent and very good ratings have declined and the number of good ratings have escalated in the last two years. The only conclusion we can draw from this is that the officers are allowing the quality of ritual work in the degrees to decline. We would hope that attendance at Schools of Instruction and adoption of a ritual instructor would become a goal for concentrated effort on the part of all lodges this coming year.

#### DDGM REPORTS

The reports submitted to Grand Lodge by 22 of the 24 District Deputy Grand Masters were outstanding this year. The information contained in these reports from the various districts gives us an up-to-date view of Freemasonry in each part of the State and also points out to us the lodges that need help and support. District Representatives are very helpful in most Districts in the support and assistance they offer to the District Deputies. Because the reports were so well done this year, it was difficult to select the most outstanding ones, but we decided on reports from Districts 2,7,10,14 and 16 as the ones that deserved special recognition.

#### CONCLUSION

We realize that as our society changes, so must our outlook on Freemasonry. As we must of necessity look to younger men for our future success, we must find ways in our Fraternity to compete for their time. We must make our meetings more fun and more exciting while still maintaining our pride and our dignity as a group of men who meet in fraternal fellowship. It pleases us to see new Masonic buildings in many of our communities. Masonic signs as we approach towns where lodges exist, and the improve-

ments in existing facilities of many lodges.

Our sincere thanks to all Constituent Lodges, District Deputy Grand Masters, and District Representatives for their hard work in providing us with the needed information for this report. We recommend that all recommendations contained in the District Deputy Grand Master Reports be submitted to the proper Grand Lodge Committee by the Grand Secretary's Office.

## **REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON THE HISTORY OF MASONRY IN MAINE AS OF APRIL 21, 1994**

M.W. Grand Master, Distinguished Grand East and my Brethren:

Brethren, the history of a Lodge is the responsibility of the Master for that year, and should be a testimony of his stewardship. To many it is a joy to

write for they have had years of which they can be proud. Perhaps some histories are hard to write for lack of interesting "news" or activities, or because the Master may have few writing skills. But brethren, the histories must be written and help is as near as your phone. Penalties are available, but should not be necessary among good Masons. I remind newly-appointed District Deputies and District Representatives that this Committee relies on them to be aware of the situation of the Lodges in their respective Districts, and to use their influence to promote prompt submission of Lodge histories. I urge the Grand Master to make available this report to the District Deputies and Grand Lodge District Representatives soon after Grand Lodge closes along with a strong admonition to assist Grand Lodge and this committee in reducing the backlog of histories due.

There follows a list of lodges and years of history due to Grand Lodge. Your Committee strongly recommends that those Lodges which have failed to make any noteworthy attempt to comply with this standing regulation of Grand Lodge be called before Grand Lodge to give cause why this Standing Regulation has not been honored.

This year 732 years of histories are due from one hundred thirty-one lodges. Sixty-seven of the one hundred ninety-eight working lodges are current through 1993. Fifteen Lodges owe ten or more years, including one Lodge which owes twenty-seven years!!! This shows an improvement over last year, but should be much, much better.

Brethren, check the status of your Lodge at the office of the Grand Secretary or a committee member while you are here. If you disagree with the report, you can assist your Committee by calling us or the Grand Lodge Office. Brethren, facts disappear or are soon forgotten. Do not let the passage of time make this duty a burden. Just do it! Call Grand Lodge; call your District Deputy or District Representative; call one of your Committee members listed below - please.

I am given to understand that the Maine Lodge of Research is very interested in assisting in the area of lodge histories. Their plans have not yet been announced, but will be welcomed in whatever form they take.

I know you brethren find this a little hard to believe that in one day you brethren can elect me Sr. Grand Warden and the next day present me with the Simon Greenleaf Medal. Over the past few years we have issued several articles regarding the need for our Lodges to obtain proper insurance protection in order to safeguard their existence for future generations. As part of our effort to ensure adequate coverage for our Lodges, we have reviewed the coverage in place and advised as to changes that should be made to various policies, in order to provide proper coverage.

I am pleased to report that great strides have been made in this area. Through our efforts, more than 100 Lodges have purchased improved coverage, while saving premium dollars. Our progress has been very encouraging, however, there is more to be done if our goal of providing all of our Lodges with the most comprehensive coverages available at the best possible premium is to be met.

A large part of meeting this goal involves periodic searches of the market-

place to find the best programs currently available. In our most recent search, we have found a program that has proven very successful with many of the Lodges, in that the program provides the comprehensive coverages we require at even greater savings! Not only have we been successful in meeting these insurance goals, but we have also been successful in obtaining policies written on a three year basis, thereby guaranteeing their cost will not increase for three years!

To provide all of our Lodges with an opportunity to take advantage of the new program, if it is the right program for them, we are asking them to do only three things:

1. Complete the insurance survey form
2. Provide a copy of their existing policy
3. Send a recent photo of their Lodge

In turn we analyze their current coverages and make suggestions for improvement on their insurance coverage and cost.

We are pleased that so many Lodges have accepted our services and suggestions because they have collected money for losses that were not covered under their previous programs.

Remember, our goal is to ensure that the proper coverages are in place before a loss occurs. Let us assist you now, before an inadequately covered loss results in a financial devastation.

## GRAND HISTORIAN'S REPORT

In Grand Lodge  
Portland, Maine  
May 4, 1994

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine:

Someone once asked a minister how he went about preparing his sermons. He thought a minute, and then said "Well first I tell them what I'm going to tell them; then I tell them, and then I tell them what I told them.

This isn't going to be a sermon, but it does touch a bit on the past, present and future.

First of all, as I'm sure you know, we're looking ahead to the celebration of the 175th Anniversary of the formation of the Grand Lodge of Maine, which officially went into business on June 1, 1820. Freemasonry had been active in Maine ever since 1762 however, and you'll be hearing about those early days which saw the American Revolution and the War of 1812, both of which involved the Masons of Maine, as well as what took place during the century and three quarters which have elapsed since our Grand Lodge came into being.

The forthcoming celebration will begin with a commemoration of the Convention called by Portland Lodge on October 14, 1819, to see if the Masons of Maine wanted to form a separate Grand Lodge if and when the District of Maine separated from Massachusetts to become a State, as was expected to take place the following March. The vote was overwhelmingly favorable, and led to the formation of the Grand Lodge of Maine.

A celebration of this event will be held in June, 1995, and a number of District and Lodge activities will be held during the anniversary year.

And to tell you what we will have told you, there will be two historical booklets published, one covering the period 1762-1820, and the other covering the 1820-1995 life of the Grand Lodge.

There will also be coverage in *The Maine Mason* and a special 175th Anni-

versary newsletter issued from time to time.

While most of us think of history as things that happened a long time ago, it isn't so. What took place yesterday afternoon or this morning has already passed into history.

In the past few years, we've been watching an attack on Freemasonry as vicious as the Morgan Affair of 1826 which lasted into the 1840's. It almost wiped out Masonry in some parts of the Country, and the hatreds and rancor it caused split families, churches, neighborhoods and sowed divisiveness wherever it spread. It had both religious and political backgrounds.

The recent anti-Masonic campaign may not have been as obvious to us here in Maine as it has been contained within a single religious denomination which operates mostly in another part of the Country.

This denomination is the Southern Baptist Convention which is the largest protestant church in the United States, with some 38,000 congregations and 16 million members. An estimated half million of them are Masons, approximately 20% of all American Masons.

One might think that with that many Masons and their families, any movement to condemn the Craft would be quickly shot down, but we should never underestimate the power of a strong-willed militant minority group.

A few years ago after a lengthy power struggle, a hard core fundamentalist faction gained control of the Southern Baptist Convention. They immediately fired the staff, replacing them with those of their own group adhering to the rigid doctrines of the new leadership.

A group of these fundamentalists led by a Dr. James Holly, a physician from Beaumont, Texas, introduced a resolution at the 1992 annual meeting, requesting that a study be made to see if Freemasonry was compatible with Southern Baptist doctrines. Their objectives was obvious as they published and distributed a 60 page booklet claiming Masonry was an anti-Christian religion, a cult of Satan worshippers, and filled with distortions, half truths and outright lies.

The Convention assigned the task of making the study to the Home Missions Board of the SBC. Its leader, a non-Mason attempted to make a thorough, impartial study, consulting with those on both sides of the controversy. Because the study failed to condemn Freemasonry, he was accused of being partial to the Masons and demoted. He later was fired for addressing a Masonic Conference on the matter.

The matter was settled temporarily at the 1993 annual convention when the Messengers (delegates) voted overwhelmingly to leave the matter of Masonic membership up to the individual's conscience. There are indications that it will be brought up again, however.

This controversy brought about a change in Masonic custom and practice in one respect. The Craft has always been inhibited in replying to attacks on it, probably due to the section of the EA charge which says "you are not to suffer your zeal for the institution to lead you into argument with those who through ignorance may ridicule it."

Over the years, this has resulted in many charges against Masonry going unanswered, leading opponents and others to assume the Craft is guilty as charged. In by-gone days when communications were primitive, this could be tolerated without serious damage. Now however, with television, videos and other means of mass media being used by some of its enemies, silence can no longer be kept. It was not ignorance and ridicule being used against us, but antagonism and hatred spread by deliberate lies and misinformation.

The Masonic press finally rose to the occasion, and devoted widespread attention to the attacks against it. The Scottish Rite publications of the Northern and Southern Jurisdictions put out special issues devoted to the subject and newspaper advertisements were taken to get the truth to those who had been exposed to the attacks.

A non-Mason who had become interested in Freemasonry while doing some historical research, will long be remembered for his invaluable work in defending Freemasonry by appearing on television and radio talk shows, and filling innumerable speaking engagements. He wrote one book which was particularly effective in demolishing the false claims of the SBC anti-Masonic group. John Robinson, the author of "A Pilgrim's Path, One Man's Road to the Masonic Temple" donated profits from its widespread sale, to helping to finance the newly formed Center for Masonic Information, designed to insure Masonry wouldn't again be caught with no defenses against such vicious and undeserved attacks.

After being its unofficial spokesman, Robinson became a Mason in 1992. His health was deteriorating however, and his FC and MM degrees had to be conferred in the hospital. He was able to take the Scottish Rite degrees, then was coronated 33rd degree just three days before his death on September 6, 1993. The Maine Lodge of Research is proud to have elected John Jamieson Robinson its 1993 Fellow in Masonic Research in June 1993.

And now for our report on the Lodge histories for 1993, which were reviewed in late March. The quality is gradually improving. As has happened for the last four years, there were three excellent papers. This year however, two were done by winners of the Historians Award in the last two years. As we can't give a second one to the same individual, the remaining one is the winner. It is very well done and certainly an original concept. It's my pleasure to announce the winner is:

## COMMITTEE ON GRIEVANCES AND APPEALS

In Grand Lodge  
Portland, Maine

TO THE MOST WORSHIPFUL GRAND LODGE OF MAINE:

John J. Berg was charged in the Cumberland County Superior Court on 11 Counts of Class D Assault and on 6 Counts of Class C Unlawful Sexual Contact. He was found guilty on 9 of the Assault Counts and on 1 Count of Unlawful Sexual Contact and was sentenced to serve 3 years in prison.

At a Masonic Trial held at the Masonic Temple, Auburn, Maine on March 18, 1988 at which trial Mr. Berg was not present as he was then serving his sentence, John J. Berg was found guilty of gross un-Masonic conduct and it was recommended that he be expelled from all of the rights and privileges of Masonry. This information was presented to this Committee in the Spring of 1988 and this Committee recommended that John J. Berg be expelled from all of the rights and privileges of Masonry. By vote of the Grand Lodge, John J. Berg was expelled from all of the rights and privileges of Masonry.

On May 20, 1993, John J. Berg appealed to Crooked River Lodge #152 in Bolsters Mills to be reinstated in the Lodge and to Masonry. On June 23, 1993 the Grand Secretary received a letter from Kevin J. Vaughn, Secretary of Crooked River Lodge stating that Mr. Berg's letter requesting reinstatement had been read in open Lodge, that several Masonic Brethren who used to work with Mr. Berg came to the meeting and spoke on his behalf. The Lodge then voted by ballot to have the Secretary write to the Grand Lodge to request that John J. Berg be reinstated.

This information was presented to this Committee on March 8, 1994. John J. Berg appeared before the Committee in the Grand Secretary's Office in Portland. After due consideration, a careful review of the prior proceedings and a careful examination of John J. Berg, a majority of the Committee feel that John J. Berg has paid his penalty to society, both civil and criminal. Because of the testimony of his Masonic Brethren who worked with him at the time of the alleged offenses and because of the favorable ballot taken in his own Lodge, we recommend that John J. Berg be restored to Membership in Masonry.

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine:

The Maine Masonic Blood Program has had its share of problems again this year. This, however, is through no fault of the chairman, Wor. David Bates. Because of his work schedule, Bro. David has been in and out of the state, and eventually was transferred to a new job site in Virginia. He apologizes for not having been able to do more with the program.

Our Grand Master asked if I would be willing to try to coordinate the program and get information out to the lodges. This I did. The volunteers to serve as lodge and district coordinators didn't come in as rapidly as I had hoped. In fact I have less than 50% returns for lodge and district coordinators. Nevertheless, this will be taken care of shortly by the appointment of a new state chairman. I would ask that you respond to him so he can get the blood program moving again. It is very important.

The most important fact I can get to you today is that there is always a need for blood. The critical times are during the winter holidays and summer as the vacationers come into our state. We now work through the American Red Cross. Every group and organization that works with the American Red Cross helps to insure that we and everyone who needs blood will get it.

Do you pay for blood should you get a transfusion? The answer is definitely NO. You do pay for the processing and the hospital costs, however.

Brethren, I urge you to get involved in this program if you haven't already done so; and when the state chairman calls for your assistance, please respond as quickly as you can. You may never need to receive blood, but if you do, it will be there only if we all cooperate in this truly vital program. The blood donor is giving the most sincere gift he can give because he gives the gift of life.

## WALTER LOUIS GREENIER, II

WALTER LOUIS GREENIER, II was born January 30, 1942 to the late Walter Louis Greenier and Hazel Trecartin Greenier. He grew up in Caribou, Maine, graduating from Caribou High School in 1960 where his classmates elected him their class marshal. Louis' special abilities were apparent much earlier than that, however. He had tossed several "no hitters" as a little league pitcher, and was the 1949 community ice sculpting competition winner. His sculpture was a life-size rendition of a mother bear and cub, and reports are that his work impressed even officials from the Fish and Wildlife who marvelled at the detail and life-like qualities of his work.

Such attention to detail and such quality of work has been the hallmark of Brother Louis' efforts ever since. Following high school, he served in the U.S. Army, his field of specialization was satellite communications. He is a Viet Nam veteran.

An active skier, Brother Louis is a certified ski instructor, and he and his family have enjoyed many hours together on the slopes of Sugarloaf. Brother Louis is owner and manager of Greenier Auto Parts in Caribou where he also serves as a member of the Board of Trustees of the Utilities District. He serves as Director of Fish River Lakes Water Quality Control Association in Aroostook County.

Brother Louis is a life-long member of Gray Memorial Methodist Church of Caribou. As a youth he was a member of the church's Cherub Choir.

Brother Louis was married May 25, 1968 to the former Judi Sutherland. They have two sons, Adam, a senior at the University of Maine, Farmington; and Aaron, a senior at Caribou High School.

Brother Louis petitioned for the degrees of Masonry at Caribou Lodge and was raised November 2, 1967. ### To the Trustees of the Grand Lodge Charity Fund

As in previous years the Investment Committee as well as the Grand Master, Deputy Grand Master, Grand Treasurer and Secretary have met with our major advisor Standish, Ayer and Wood in May, September and January during the past year. At this meeting the economic conditions and financial markets are reviewed and any major changes in the portfolio are studied. We are all now pleased that it is a Charitable or IRS 501 (1) c3 Tax Exempt Foundation. In other words any contributions to the Foundation is a tax deduction for the donor and in turn the Foundation is not subject to IRS taxes. This should be a great boon to our members and friends especially for larger contributions.

#### Investment Policy

As always security is stressed in the portfolio. The principal objectives being the preservation of capital, good earnings and a reasonable growth pattern. Our asset allocation remains in all our investments about 60-65% equities and 30-35% in fixed income.

Although some changes were made in the portfolio, the major change was the addition of about \$345,000 for the Foster Scholarship Fund to support Educational Scholarships in the Buckfield, Sumner, Hebron and Hartford lodge areas. This should provide money and generate a small growth in the Fund. It was decided we would keep this with another Brokerage, Legg-Mason, because basically we had great faith in the person managing the account. We now have our money in banks, Standish Ayer & Wood, Advest and Legg-Mason, so we as a committee are subject to a variety of opinions.

#### Value and Investment Income

The total income for the portfolio should be \$264,844 or 4.62%. The Foster money is not yet all invested.

The two attached charts show quite well what has happened to the financial markets this past year. The Federal Funds Rate is the lowest (around 3%) in years and that is why CD's and other such investment rates are so low. The New England employment also reveals that economic conditions are still poor in Maine. One chart shows the Standard & Poors, Russell 2000 Index, and Dow Jones Averages have had terrific growth increases during 1993. This is why our basic objectives of 65% in equities has been very wise over the past 25 years.

Your Investment Committee is appreciative of the support of the Grand Master, Deputy Grand Master, Treasurer and Secretary. It has been an honor for us to serve this past year.

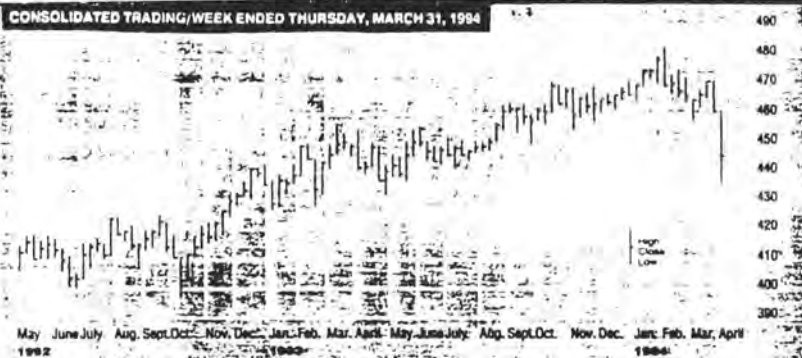

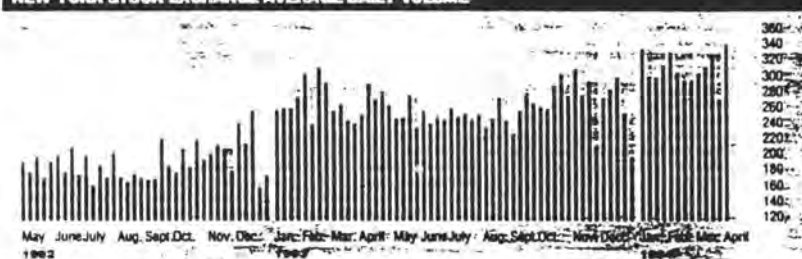
## CONSOLIDATED TRADING/WEEK ENDED THURSDAY, MARCH 31, 1994



## RUSSELL 2000 INDEX OF SMALLER COMPANY STOCKS

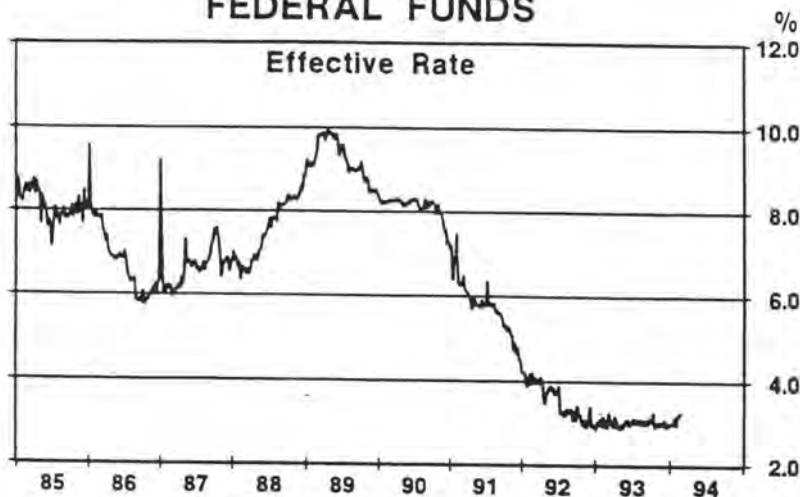
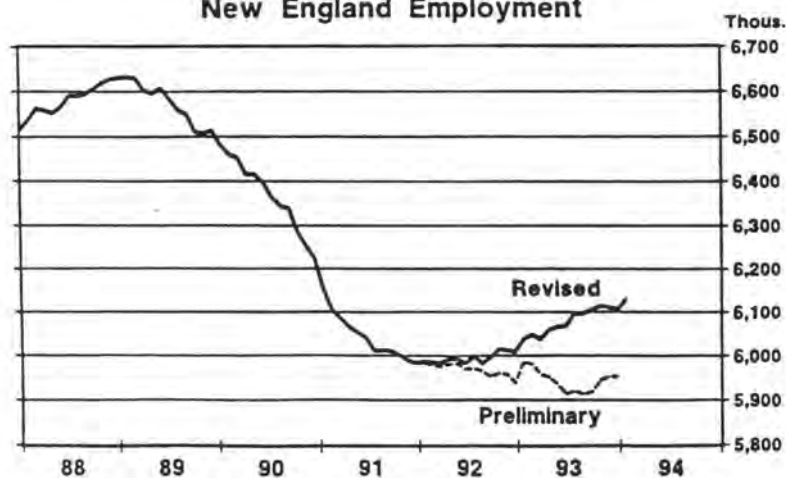


## NEW YORK STOCK EXCHANGE AVERAGE DAILY VOLUME



## GRAND LODGE BANQUET

Monday, May 1, 1995

M.W. Harland S. Hitchings, Grand Master of Masons in Maine, opened the 176th Annual Communication of the Grand Lodge of Maine with the Banquet held at ANAH SHRINE TEMPLE in Bangor. The festivities began with the sound of the gong, and the Grand Master asked Rev. and Bro. Edward Fenderson, Grand Chaplain, to lead us in prayer.

Following the banquet, M.W. Hitchings introduced the guests at the Head Table and asked selected brethren to introduce the guests at the sub-head tables.

The Grand Master then introduced the speaker of the evening, Ill. Robert O. Ralston, Sovereign Grand Commander of the Northern Masonic Jurisdiction A.A.S.R.

G.M.: The speaker for this evening will be Illustrious Robert O. Ralston, 33<sup>o</sup>, Sovereign Grand Commander of the Ancient and Accepted Scottish Rite of the Northern Masonic Jurisdiction -- and I'm not going to give him a lengthy introduction because there are several comments I'll make when he's through. Bob, it's a pleasure to have you here in Maine. You're the "new Kid on the block" in this position. You've spent a lot of time in Maine. We thank you for that, and it's a pleasure to have you as our guest and speaker for this evening.

Ill. Robert O. Ralston: Most Worshipful Grand Master Hitchings, Distinguished Head Tables and Brethren all. I'd like to say Susann and I really do enjoy coming to Maine. It's not just the incredible seashore that you have, the incredible scenery that you have, the seafood and the shopping -- these are many of the things that Maine is known for and that's great.

But I think it's a lot more than that, Brethren. It's really you, you the people of Maine, whom we have found to be warm and friendly and caring -- even if my accent seems a little different, I hope you'll be able to understand what I have to say to you tonight.

We've never made a visit to Maine that you haven't made us feel welcome and at home, and I don't believe that this trip will be any exception to that. But you know there is something else that's very special about the Masons of Maine -- and that's your can do -- No, your will do attitude with regard to Masonic Renewal and Membership.

We admire your efforts in this area, and applaud your success. As you succeed, so ultimately will the coordinate bodies such as the Ancient and Accepted Scottish Rite succeed.

As your Sovereign Grand Commander, I am pleased to reassert that your

Scottish Rite stands ready to help and assist your efforts in any way possible -- whether it be Masonic Renewal or in charitable causes, such as a Fingerprint I.D. Program for children, or whatever you may choose to do. We pledge to you our allegiance, fealty, and support in these, and all other things Masonic.

In our 360,000 member Northern Masonic Jurisdiction, of which I'm very pleased and proud to acknowledge that Maine is one of our fifteen great states, we also have a new sense of excitement developing. Just as with the arrival of spring every year, there are always new signs of hope -- new beginnings.

With Scottish Rite, we can also look for new beginnings. Rejuvenation keeps us fresh and renews our vitality. There are many new programs on the drawing board designed to demonstrate that membership in the Scottish Rite is rewarding, worthwhile and exciting. You will hear more about these in the coming months. Some will provide direct benefits to the members and their families, and some will make us proud as Scottish Rite Masons we are able to help, aid and assist others.

I'd like to tell you about a couple of things that are on the drawing board and then tell you about a couple we've begun actual operation on. First, there's one I'd like to call the networking program, something I'm not aware of that's happening anywhere else in Freemasonry, and hopefully we'll have this in operation before the end of this year. As a Scottish Rite Mason moves from state to state in the future, we're going to acknowledge his move, of course, when he sends us his name and address that we're going to let him know the closest Valley to his new address, the secretary of that Valley and his phone number. We're also going to let the secretary of that Valley know that same information so he can contact the brother, make him feel welcome, kind of a Masonic Welcome Wagon, if you would. I think it's something we've missed in Freemasonry. In Scottish Rite with our computer systems and capabilities, we'll be able to do this throughout our fifteen state organization. I hope we'll have this in place and in operation before the year's end.

There's another one that we're looking at that I think is important, one that's been a problem for Freemasonry and probably always will be, and that's Freemasonry and religion. I realize as well as you do that Freemasonry over the years has been attacked by religious zealots or people who claim us to be a religion when we know we are not, and I very much appreciate the efforts of those that try to counter those arguments. Seems like we're always reactive rather than proactive, though. We're always responding. So we're going to be looking, Brethren, to a program that will do something different. I think that my concern is not trying to defend religion and Freemasonry but to getting more ministers into Freemasonry. If we have more ministers in our Craft, I think they'll do all the defense that we need to have done. So our Scottish Rite is going to be looking and discussing with our Supreme Council at this session the possibility of starting a program that

will bring around four hundred ministers into Blue Lodges and Scottish Rite in our Northern Masonic Jurisdiction on a yearly basis. It's a doable thing, and I hope that our Supreme Council will look on this program with approval so we can proceed with it. I think that if we get four hundred ministers more a year into Freemasonry and into the Scottish Rite, we're going to have an army of people to counter any challenges to Freemasonry in the coming years, if you would.

Now, as I look out and see the DeMolay table, I'd like to talk about a program that began about a year or two ago, and that's a program of communication with Senior DeMolays. When I went to the sessions and met with the Senior DeMolay people, I was really very surprised to find out that when a DeMolay reaches the age of twenty-one, becomes a Senior DeMolay, all communication ceases for that young man. DeMolay doesn't communicate with him. No Masonic body communicates with him. That also didn't seem right, so I talked with the International officers of DeMolay.

They agreed to provide us each year with a mailing list of the young men who turn twenty-one and enter Senior DeMolay status. Last year we took that mailing list and began a five year communication program with each Senior DeMolay in that category. We sent them a letter acknowledging the fact that they had turned twenty-one, congratulating them on their efforts in DeMolay and letting them know for the next five years they will be receiving a copy of our quarterly *Northern Light* magazine complimentary. We also offered them the opportunity to receive our video tape, "A Conscience for America," on a complimentary basis, and each of the next five years we'll send a birthday card. That card will have both Symbolic Lodge as well as Scottish Rite with the lettering on it, if you would, just to let them know that Masonry is interested in them.

We think that through this communication program, hopefully, we will be able to stay in touch with these young men as they go through some very important and formative years of their life, and the net result will be that they'll join Freemasonry and join it at an earlier age. We've definitely had in two years now some five thousand Senior DeMolays in the program, and expect in the next three years to add another five thousand. So we should have ten thousand young DeMolay men between twenty-one and twenty-six involved in this program on an ongoing basis, and we hope that it will work very well, and I hope that all of you will as you become of age, join the Craft. If you're in college and you can't do it right away, we'll stay in touch with you.

There's one other program that I think is very exciting to me. There was a new sense of excitement last fall with our Supreme Council when we adopted a new major charity for our Supreme Council, Scottish Rite Masonic Children's Learning Centers. That's a long title for a simple statement that your Scottish Rite of the Northern Masonic Jurisdiction is now committed to helping children.

Our Scottish Rite Masonic Childrens' Learning Center will be addressing such learning problems as dyslexia, A.D.D. (Attention Deficit Disorders), and Aphasia. You know, according to recent estimates, there's at least one in every ten children who are challenged by learning disabilities.

Techniques for accurate diagnosis of learning disabilities and effective instruction have been developed. However, many children are never adequately helped due to insufficient funding, facilities or staffing. Children with learning disabilities can learn and can enjoy learning -- if the appropriate techniques are used to teach them.

Early treatment not only helps children keep pace academically but also can prevent destructive feelings of frustration and failure, both with the child and the parent quite honestly. With proper help, children with learning disabilities can feel good about themselves and can begin to build their own brighter future. Serving the needs of these children has enormous potential to benefit them, their families and their communities.

One of the most appealing qualities of the Scottish Rite is our personal interest. With assistance from the Supreme Council, the local Scottish Rite Valleys will establish and be responsible for the operation of the centers. As more and more of our Valleys catch a vision of the possibilities, new centers will open throughout our fifteen state jurisdiction.

Also, we envision these Childrens' Learning Centers being located in Masonic facilities, so that Freemasonry, and its charitable nature, will all be on display for members of the community to see - to experience -- and to tell others about. Our efforts with regard to Scottish Rite Masonic Childrens' Learning Centers have already begun.

Several years ago up in the Valley of Marquette, Michigan, they started a summer program to treat children with learning disabilities. That program is still in operation.

A little over a year ago, down in Newtonville, Massachusetts, our first year round Childrens' Learning Center opened in Lowell, Massachusetts, sponsored by the Valley of Lowell.

The fourth Childrens' Learning Center is presently planned for my home Valley in Cincinnati, Ohio. They have received permission there to begin construction in their Scottish Rite facility which is down town. The Learning Centers in Newtonville and Lowell are housed in Symbolic Lodge facilities. So we are, in fact, using our symbolic lodges and our Scottish Rite facilities for these charities already.

There are other additional Valleys that already have expressed a lot of interest in doing this, and are moving forward. The Valley in the State of New York, the Valley of Rochester is beginning their plan right now for that. The State of New Jersey. They haven't quite determined where theirs will



be, but they're moving forward with one. In my home State of Ohio, not only Cincinnati but the Valleys of Youngstown and Dayton now have committees working to place theirs by the middle of next year. Up in Michigan, in Grand Rapids, where I'll be visiting this weekend, their committee is actively working. And, of course, right here in Maine, in your state, I'll say in the Valley of Bangor, you have a Committee that is actively looking into this, chaired by Royce Wheeler. I'm hopeful that will work out very soon and have a lot of success, too.

It's really catching on quickly. One of the interesting things about this is the appeal and the support we're getting from Grand Lodge, believe it or not. When we made this announcement in Cleveland, the Grand Master of Massachusetts got up and announced he would donate \$10,000.00 to support Childrens' Learning Centers in his state, and he challenged the other Grand Masters to try to come with a donation, also.

The Grand Master of New York responded a little bit later with a \$20,000.00 donation. The Grand Lodge of New Jersey, has voted to underwrite completely a Childrens' Learning Center in that state, and that would be a six figure involvement.

So, we're really gratified and amazed with the support that we're getting by the Symbolic Lodges to offer their facilities for this. I think it's something that's going to be fantastic in the future for all of us.

There are some other things that is really neat about this. We're going to join the Southern Jurisdiction in this charity. They've been working with Childrens' Learning Centers now for many many years. They have about one hundred of them in operation right now. We hope by the twenty-first century, you know that's about five or six years away, that we'll have twenty or twenty-five in our Northern Masonic Jurisdiction and between us, then, we're going to have the development of a National Charity to help children. And what we'll be able to do is have national publicity and work together in many ways that I think will make you proud to be Masons, and hopefully all of you proud to be Scottish Rite Masons, too.

Freemasonry will be on display for our Scottish Rite Childrens' Masonic Learning Centers and will not only carry the Scottish Rite emblem in its logo but will also include the square and compasses so that everyone will recognize that this is a Masonic endeavor.

Scottish Rite Childrens' Learning Centers, in my opinion, can and will make a positive difference in your communities. As we begin, I hope that you'll want to be involved in your community and do the best you can to support this endeavor. My Brethren, I see this as truly a real sense of excitement.

Most Worshipful Grand Master Hitchings, members of the Grand Lodge of Maine, I would like to extend my best wishes to you for a harmonious and

productive Grand Lodge Session, and my thanks to you for permitting me to share with you our Scottish Rite vision of Masonry helping children.

In closing, Brethren, I would share with you that in this visible Masonic office that I am privileged to hold, I am sometimes asked why I am a Freemason, and have been so since the age of twenty-one. I reply with this answer: "I am a Mason simply because I am proud to be a man who wants to keep the moral standards of life at a high level, and leave something behind so others will benefit. Only as I personally become better can I help others do the same. To me, Freemasonry is one form of dedication to God and service to humanity."

I am a Freemason in my heart, and so I will remain. I am proud of my involvement. I am proud to walk in fraternal fellowship with you -- my Brethren. Thank you and God Bless you.

*G.M.:* Thank you, Illustrious Sir, for this fine message. Now, if you'll stay right here. You may wonder why I didn't give a little introduction about our speaker this evening, but I had a reason for that. If you'll listen, now I'll give you some more information about our Illustrious Brother.

### ROBERT O. RALSTON

Ill. Robert O. Ralston, 33<sup>o</sup>, is the youngest Sovereign Grand Commander to head the Scottish Rite Supreme Council since Leon M. Abbott in 1921. Ill. Brother Ralston was unanimously elected by the Active Membership at the Supreme Council Annual Session in Boston on August 30, 1993, to succeed retiring Grand Commander Francis G. Paul, 33<sup>o</sup>.

The Grand Commander is no newcomer to the fraternity. He was raised a Master Mason thirty-three years ago in Evanston-Eversull Lodge No. 695, Norwood, Ohio. He served as Master in 1967 and then as trustee from 1968-1972. For the Grand Lodge of Ohio, he was District Deputy Grand Master 1983-1985, and a member of the board of trustees for the Ohio Masonic Home, 1988-1990.

He broadened his Masonic experience as a member of Norwood Royal Arch Chapter No. 193, Henry A. Weeks Council No. 137 (R&S.M.) and Trinity Commandery No. 44 K.T. He has also presided as Sovereign of St. Columba Conclave, Red Cross of Constantine, Cincinnati.

As a member of Syrian Shrine Temple, Ill. Brother Ralston has derived particular satisfaction from his membership on the Board of Governors of Cincinnati's Shrine Burns Institute. He is also a member of the Royal Order of Jesters and the Royal Order of Scotland.

The Scottish Rite has been a particular beneficiary of Ill. Brother Ralston's Masonic endeavors from the time he received the Scottish Rite degrees at Cincinnati in 1967. He began to work in the degrees immediately and was



named an officer of Gibulum Lodge of Perfection. He was one of the youngest men to serve as Thrice Potent Master, 1979-1981. He also became a member of the Board of Trustees for the Valley of Cincinnati, presiding twice as chairman between 1979-1992.

Ill. Brother Ralston became an Honorary Member of the Supreme Council when he received the 33<sup>o</sup> in 1981. He was elected an Active Member at the Chicago Supreme Council Session in 1992.

A successful business and professional career began at Cincinnati, where Brother Ralston had been employed in a "co-op" program at Cincinnati Milacron during his college years. He later was to become manufacturing manager and eventually vice president of Cincinnati Milacron's service parts department. From 1988-1990, he was president of the Research Design and Development Corporation in Erie, Pennsylvania, and in 1990, accepted the position of vice president of manufacturing with the Mazak Corporation of Florence, Kentucky, a post from which he has resigned to devote full time to Scottish Rite Freemasonry.

On July 27, 1963, Ill. Brother Ralston married Susann Rose Fels, and they are the parents of two children, Stephen and Julia.

G.M.: Because of your dedicated support to Blue Lodge Masonry in Maine and for going that extra mile and your inspiring message we received from you this evening, it is my privilege to present you with the Josiah Hayden Drummond Medal.

The evening was concluded by the Grand Master who gave some announcements. He thanked all for being present and then asked Rev. and Brother Edward Fenderson, Grand Chaplain, to give the benediction. When this was completed, the Brethren were dismissed.

**REPORT OF THE INTERNATIONAL ORDER OF RAINBOW  
GIRLS  
DAWN J. POST  
GRAND WORTHY ADVISOR**

Most Worshipful Grand Master, other distinguished guests and friends:

It is a pleasure to bring you the greetings of Mrs. Cora Ellen Moody, our Supreme Deputy and the Rainbow Girls of Maine.

At the onset, I would like to invite the Grand Officers, including District Deputy Grand Masters of Grand Lodge to be introduced at our Grand Sessions on Friday, May 26th at Husson College in Bangor. Many of you might already have heard that I have challenged Grand Officers from all of the Masonic Bodies to be present for introduction. One of my goals this year was to encourage fraternal relations between all of the affiliated bodies. Many assemblies set up ambassador programs with the lodges in their area. While these assemblies have supportive and special Rainbow "Dads, I would like them to know that we also have a very supportive Grand Lodge by filling the Grand East with members of our Masonic Family.

Since last you were addressed we have had many activities, functions and new programs. In July 119 of us traveled to our Supreme sessions in Baltimore, Maryland. Maine Rainbow was honored to provide the music for the sessions, a once in a lifetime opportunity. Maine Rainbow was center stage the entire session. I also had the opportunity to give the tribute to the American Flag as well as an excerpt from my GWA acceptance speech regarding membership. One focus of Supreme Assembly was on our Masonic heritage. On returning to Maine we incorporated what we learned about Masonry into a degree which many of you might have seen at your district meetings this year. I would like to thank those of you who invited us to give special programs at your functions, and Mr. Hitchings for his attendance at our Masonic Grand Family in Calais where he witnessed our initiation degree and special program.

This year Maine Rainbow has taken on two very important charity projects. CASA: Court Appointed Special Advocates and Maine Children's Home of Little Wanderers. We have made a strong commitment to work toward spreading awareness and preventing child abuse in the state of Maine. This widespread problem is grabbing our attention through the publicized deaths of children like Tavielle Kigas in Bangor, Sarah Lawrence of Lewiston and Deanna Wodsworth of Rockland. This serves to bring to the forefront the problem of child abuse yet we are working for the countless others who continue to live in an atmosphere of fear and violence. As a physical reminder of our state projects I chose as my mascot this year the mime. Abused children typically are loners who keep their fear and pain locked inside. Mimes, who are silent, remind us of our commitment with their single tear and reaching hand.

However, we are also using the reaching hand as a positive symbol of our



ability to share Rainbow lessons and values. Rainbow provides a firm foundation for girls to rely on providing public speaking abilities, leadership skills, and most importantly feelings of self worth and confidence. We know our lives must have a foundation well planned and studied to determine the path we plan to lead. Rainbow, with its basic teachings from the Masonic fraternity, works with the family, church, school and community in building a foundation for the young women of today. To illustrate this aspect of Rainbow I chose as my motto, CHILDREN OF TODAY, LEADERS OF TOMORROW. Rainbow girls are preparing to meet the challenges of the future. We have the potential to affect our world in many positive ways. As politicians like Olympia Snowe who was a Rainbow girl, as attorneys, a position I hope someday to hold, educators, volunteers and mothers we will make our world a better place. But today, here and now, we are also leaders among our peers. The youth of today are facing increasing problems of teen violence, and drug and alcohol abuse. In our troubled world it's discouraging to keep our morals, and standards, and ideals high. We are ridiculed and laughed at by those who say such things are out of date. Yet Rainbow girls stand up to this pressure, stand up as leaders by saying no and keeping their aspirations and ideals alive.

Members of the Masonic Fraternity your Rainbow daughters are working hard to make this world a better place. Their advisors are supporting their aims and working to ensure our order will persevere and prosper. Your principles that we find embodied in our lessons, are guides in our words, actions and deeds. I found this simple poem written by a dedicated Master Mason in 1864. It reminds me that both of our organizations are working toward the same goals.

By Trowel, Plum and Square,  
By Watchfulness and prayer  
Your temple rose.  
And while the mystic Three  
While Faith, Hope and Charity  
Shall Masons motto be,  
We fear no foes.

When blood shall cease to flow,  
When sickness, care and woe  
Are felt no more,  
When Slander's tongue we hush  
When Crime's huge form we crush,  
When Right on Wrong shall rush  
And overpower,

When orphans shed no tears,  
When widows have no fears,  
When Want's unknown  
When foemen foemen greet,  
When lambs and lions meet

Our mission is complete,  
Our task is done.

We still are working toward completing our mission, our task. I am very proud of being associated with the Masonic Fraternity. I hope you are as proud of your Rainbow daughters accomplishments and work. Together we will continue our mission and leave our world a better place.

State Master Councilor from the DeMolay, would you offer us a few words.

**THE INTERNATIONAL SUPREME COUNCIL

Good morning. It gives me a great deal of pleasure to be here today to represent the Maine DeMolay Association and the 176th Session of the Grand Lodge of Maine.

DeMolay, in the State of Maine, is on the move. At this point, we have eight active chapters throughout the state, and the possibility of starting two more chapters -- one, in the Calais, Houlton, Caribou area; two, there is a strong interest in the Ellsworth area.

Last year, under the excellent leadership skills of Bro. Rok Morin, State Master Councilor, we started a new chapter located in Windham, ME. The members of the Maine DeMolay Association also took on a "can do" attitude that was mentioned last night by our guest speaker [Ref. to Banquet Speaker, Ill. Robert O. Ralston]. Thanks to the loyal support of our members towards Bro. Rok and myself, the Order met and exceeded the membership goal that was set by the International Supreme Council when we reached 210% of our membership goal. After achieving such an accomplishment, the Maine DeMolay Association was recognized as leading the country in net growth.

The International Supreme Council has given us the new goal to reach for for the next year. The new goal asks for twelve new members per chapter. Dad Knox and myself sat down and went over the goal and felt this wasn't aggressive enough and we uped the goal to eighteen new members per



chapter.

We have all heard Dad Knox refer to the day when he remembers their being over thirty-five chapters throughout the State of Maine. I know that it is not possible during my term of office, but with the attitude that the Order of DeMolay has taken it is feasible that, in the future, we can see that many chapters in the state again.

DeMolay is one of the best young men's fraternal organizations in the world. It is an Order where young men make lifelong friends and have fun doing it. Dad Knox has extended his challenge to each of the Masonic Districts in the state to bring in five new initiates during our Grand Master's Membership Class to be held June 3rd at the Augusta Masonic Hall. I would like to reemphasize that challenge at this time. The DeMolays of today are the future of Masonry tomorrow. It you know a young man who would be well suited for the Order of DeMolay I challenge you to be the one that introduces him to the Order, and I challenge you to be the one that makes the difference in his life.

At this time, if I may, I'd like to make a presentation. Would like to have my Junior Councilor approach the podium.

Last year we began what would become a tradition honoring a Mason as the Maine DeMolay Mason of the Year. It is our intent to recognize a member of the Masonic Fraternity for his interest and commitment to the Order of DeMolay. Someone who unselfishly promotes our activities both at the state level and at the chapter level. This year we honor a gentleman who is actively involved with one of our chapters.

About three years ago he began coming to an occasional meeting and helped the Advisory Board with transportation. As Master of his lodge he actively promoted DeMolay to the members. As a District Representative he spoke both about Rainbow and DeMolay at the events throughout his district and initiated a "loose change fund" that he donated to Rainbow and DeMolay at his District Meeting. He traveled with us last summer to Kansas City via bus. Although he whined all the way up, now he says he had a great time.

He's a Past Master of Buxton Lodge, District Representative of the Eighteenth Masonic District, Athletic Adviser for Frank S. Land Chapter, and a chapter member of the Royal Order of Moose. It is our pleasure to present this year's Maine DeMolay Mason of the Year award to Dad Paul Deschambault.

Grand Master: Brother Marshal, would you conduct Wor. Brother Deschambault to the East, please.

Brother Deschambault is escorted to the East where the presentation is made and he's asked if he would like to say a few words.

WOR. BRO. PAUL DESCHAMBAULT: Brethren, standing before you are the building blocks of Masonry. We definitely need to support Maine DeMolay and, of course, Maine Assemblies of Rainbow. Without them, Masonry will no longer exist in the very near future. Please, do whatever you can -- time, money, support, encouragement is all they ask. By all means, when they come before you, and they say we could use a little help. Please give them your attention. Thank you very much.

G.M. State Master Councilor of DeMolay, it gives me great pleasure, on behalf of the Grand Lodge of Maine, to present you a check to help with your philanthropy, or, whatever it may be, to do to all mankind which I know you do. Congratulations, and thank you for the impressive speech you gave this morning. Thank you very much.

The Grand Master then asked the Grand Marshal to escort the guests out of the lodge hall. The Grand Master then asks R. W. Edward Emery, Chairman of the Masonic Blood Bank to escort the Red Cross Representative into the lodge for a few words. She is escorted in and greeted by the Grand Master. She then is asked to say a few words about the American Red Cross and the work they do in association with Masons and Masonic lodges.

RED CROSS REPRESENTATIVE: Thank you, I'm delighted to be here. I'm with the Red Cross, and a lot of you have participated with the Red Cross in a number of ways. Masons have been for years wonderful supporters of the Red Cross Blood Program, and I am here to thank you for that. And also, of course, ask for your continued participation and help.

You all have participated in a variety of ways and I ask for the continuation of that support by giving blood yourself. Some of you have sponsored Blood Drives and have put on blood drives at a difficult time of the year during the holidays and the Summer. And we want your help in a lot of other ways, too. I'll tell you about that in just a moment.

We're in very difficult times in blood selection today. The last few years we've seen a decline in blood collection across the nation. We've had two extremely serious blood shortages in the last two years, and there are a variety of reasons for that. One of them is that we know a lot more about blood that we're collecting, so we can make a much safer blood supply. What that means is that we eliminate a lot more potential blood donors. We screen people much more carefully than we used to; and, of course, we err on the side of safety. So, at times, we eliminate some perfectly healthy donors, but we want to make sure that the blood supply is as safe as possible. That [shortens] the supply of blood donations.

The other thing that's happened in the last few years is that companies have downsized. If we go to somebody a lot to collect blood; and a company that had a thousand people in it last year, and we go back this year and they have five hundred ... guess what-we have a lot less blood. That's made a difference too.

The other thing that's a little frustrating to donors is that it takes longer to donate blood. That makes more of a commitment to people in time as well as giving a pint of blood. The time, again, is that we're being more and more careful to make sure that the blood supply is as safe as possible, and it just takes longer. The screening process covering all the little details that we do at times seems ludicrous. This is to make sure the blood is as safe as it can possibly be. It's important for the safety because we all have to be concerned about the blood supply.

A little earlier I mentioned two critical blood shortages in the last few years. What that means is at times, both December and January, right after the holidays, and what it meant that in some cities in this country, fortunately not in Maine, there were times when they need to postpone the surgery because there was not enough blood on the shelf. That means that if you were scheduled for open heart surgery and had a blood type that was critically low you wouldn't be able to have it because the blood wasn't available. That's awful. We don't want to be in that situation at all. We want to be sure that the blood supply stays at a level that we can tolerate any additional stress on us.

Recently, we've had a wonderful outpouring of people donating blood because of what happened in Oklahoma. It was a horrible tragedy that happened there, and it reminded people that blood might be needed. So people have turned out to donate blood. That's wonderful and we greatly appreciate that. Where you can help us is we need individuals like you to remind people that there're thousands of people across this country every single day in their own personal crisis...whether it be having a premature baby who needs a blood transfusion, somebody going for chemotherapy for cancer who cannot withstand that chemotherapy without vital blood products. They can't do it without it. It might be somebody who needs a liver transplant desperately. Occasionally we hear about a liver transplant that had to be postponed because there isn't enough blood to help them. Liver transplants take a large amount of blood -- about seventy-five units. That's a large part of a donation to get through a liver transplant. They're being done all the time today. Accident victims -- if there's not enough blood on the shelf, some of them are not going to survive. There's no substitute for human blood.

Work is going on all the time. We just had a lecture the other day with what's going on with artificial blood. There are some very exciting things coming down the line, but they aren't here today. And when they are here, we're still going to need human blood for limited usages.

We really need your help for spreading the word. Spread the word about how important blood donations are. If you can't donate yourself, perhaps someone in your family can, or at work. This is helping us to put the support of the blood program that you've had in the past and the support to have some more.

What you're doing when you donate blood or somebody else donates blood or put on that blood drive for us, you're saving lives. There are no if's, and's or but's about it. When I donate blood, I'm aware that I'm having a hard time to get myself charged up to do it; so what I do is look the other way and remind myself within a few days the blood that I've given is going to be hanging by some patient's bed saving a life. There are a lot of things that cannot happen today without blood.

Bone marrow transplants are something that you've heard a lot about the last year or so and are very dramatic for people looking for matches among our patients. What you don't hear about is how much blood that patient is going to need before they're ready for the bone marrow transplant and during the blood marrow transplant. This is a new surgery that happens much more frequently that's been used very often for leukemia patients and also for some other cancers. This happens with good results. People wouldn't have a chance before may have a chance with bone marrow transplants. It's one of the surgeries that we must support and cannot have without the support of blood product and blood donors.

So for those of you who have participated in the blood program, a very special thanks to you. You're really terrific, real heroes for donating blood. To all of you I hope we can count on you in the coming year to participate in whatever way suits you best to participate somehow in the blood program. Thank you very much.

Grand Master: You know, when I became Grand Master I wanted to revitalize our Blood Bank Program and R.W. Ed Emery is chairman of that program and you have been giving blood. Let's give more, something of ourselves to save somebody's life. Thank you.

The Grand Master then declared the Grand Lodge of Maine from refreshment to labor.

The Grand Master asked the Grand Secretary to read the roll call of Grand Representatives and requested that the Grand Representatives stand and remain standing. The roll call being completed, the Grand Master thanked the Grand Representatives for their effort to keep the lines of communication open in the United States and throughout the world.

Grand Master: Grand Marshal, please escort the following brethren to the East: Milton D. Weeks, C. Wilfred Brann, and Roland Herrick. (The Grand Master presented these brethren commission as Grand Representatives and instructed them on their duties as Grand Representatives.

The Grand Master asked the Deputy Grand Master to take over the duties at the lectern as it was time for the Grand Master's annual report.

This year the Grand Architect of the Universe has seen fit to summon 842 Brethren who have been near and dear to all of us. We mourn the loss of these Brethren. These Brethren have been an inspiration for all of us and will long be remembered.

### CHARITABLE FOUNDATION

During the past year our foundation has been dispersing funds as applications have been received from secretaries of Lodges. Remember these applications must be filled out in full so that they may be processed as soon as possible. R.W. Wayne T. Adams is chairman of the Committee on Distribution and Relief and is doing an outstanding job in this area.



## CONDITION OF THE FRATERNITY

I look at the condition of the fraternity in a very positive light. Yes we still have a declining membership but our rate of decline seems to be decreasing. I am very pleased with the Membership Committee in the work they have been doing in many of our Districts. Each one of these meetings have proved successful with many new applications being received following these programs. Some Lodges have been holding their own Membership Nights with positive results. These new Brothers are well under 40 years of age which is very positive as our average age has been 64. We have had one consolidation between Bingham Lodge and Keystone Lodge in Solon. This is not what we like to see, but hopefully this merger will make a stronger bond of fraternal relations within the craft and participation in community affairs. Brethren, it is time we took a look at our lodge dues. Our expenses grow each year and many of us have paid the same dues for many years. Let's think about making a revision in our by-laws.

## BLOOD BANK PROGRAM

When I became your Grand Master I promised that the Blood Bank Program would be revitalized. Thanks to R.W. Edward Emery who agreed to serve as chairman of this committee this is happening. Like all programs this can not be accomplished by one person. We need Teamwork to make things happen. I am happy to report that most Districts have appointed a District Chairman and many Lodges have appointed their own Chairman. It is my hope that all Districts and Lodges will appoint a Chairman who in turn will report to our State Chairman. Brethren, the Red Cross is short of blood and this is a program where we can give something of ourselves to come to the relief of those in need. If your Lodge buys its dues cards from Grand Lodge it will have your Lodge Blood Bank Number on the front. Be sure to use this number when donating blood so that your Lodge will receive credit.

## DISTRICT MEETINGS

Twenty-four District meetings were held this year. All of these meetings were semi-public with family and non-member friends invited. These were very well attended with excellent programs provided by the District Deputies with the help of the District Representatives in many instances. I congratulate the Brethren for a job well done. I am also very proud to report that my Elected Officers made nearly every meeting and were given a chance to speak on Masonic related subjects.

My Blood Bank Chairman also attended nearly every meeting and brought the news of our Blood Bank Program. I was also very fortunate to have many of my appointed officers in attendance. Congratulations to my Grand Marshal. He made every District Meeting plus all other meetings where your Grand Master was received with a suite. Thanks, Brethren, for your support.

These Meetings gave Grand Lodge a chance to recognize many outstanding Brethren in the District, for Mason of the Year Award, and 50 Year Veterans Medals as well as many 55, 60, 65, 70 and one 75 star. I feel that semi-public district meetings serve a very important part in educating our Masonic Fraternity as well as the friends and ladies who attended.

### **SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAMS**

The Masonic Scholarship Program has proved to be a very successful venture in helping the youth of our state to continue their further education. During the past year of the 127 High Schools in Maine 174 Five Hundred Dollar scholarships were awarded to a High School senior going on to higher education. Which means, Brethren, during the past year through your generosity \$87,000.00 was contributed to this very worthwhile program. 28 Lodges gave their own Scholarships. Remember, my Brethren, Grand Lodge will now give matching funds for at least two of these \$500.00 Scholarships. Since this program started in 1988 Masons have contributed over \$400,000.00 to this very worthwhile project. Youth are our most valuable asset and we as Masons should be proud of these accomplishments. Keep up the good work.

### **PREVENTION OF DRUG AND ALCOHOL ABUSE AMONG CHILDREN**

This is another one of our ongoing programs which has proved so successful over the past few years. This program has been supported by Lodges, Masters and Wardens Associations, Individual Brethren, Officers Associations, and Past District Deputies Associations.

Many schools have received grants to provide money for staff training, materials, helpers and student awareness. Grants have been made to local law enforcement officers who are involved in the D.A.R.E. programs throughout the state. The Maine Masonic Foundation have issued 89 grants to schools and support systems totaling \$71,000.00 during this past year. Since this program was initiated by M.W. Ernest H. Curtis in 1988 Masons of Maine have donated in excess of \$500,000.00 to this very worthwhile cause to help the youth and communities of our State.

### **RECOMMENDATIONS**

#1. That when a member is Demitted, Suspended or Expelled from his Lodge that the Secretary of his Lodge notify the Secretaries of all concordant and appendant bodies of his standing.

#2. That District Representatives be accorded the title of VERY WORSHIPFUL. These Brethren work many hours assisting Lodges in their District and are now entitled to vote in Grand Lodge during their term and I feel we should give them a title to recognize them for this work.

#3. That the Grand Lodge Office be equipped with an Answering Service to

be used during the hours when the office is not staffed.

#4. That when an application for membership is presented to a prospective member he will receive a copy of the brochure MAINE FREEMASONRY attached to his application.

### DECISIONS

#1. It is my decision that a member holding dual membership, and wants to be dropped from his home or (primary) lodge must abide by the following rules:

*He must get a demit in good standing from his home or (primary) lodge in order to remain a Mason, and be in good standing in his secondary lodge.*

*If he is dropped for NPD in his home or (primary) lodge he is not eligible to remain a member in his secondary lodge.*

#2. It is my decision that due to the loss or destroyed records of Freedom Lodge #42 that it be forgiven and allowed to start fresh as of January 1, 1995 in regard to its loss of records. This decision is not meant to free Freedom Lodge from any fees that may be due Grand Lodge.

Freedom Lodge #42 from now on will operate under the Constitution, Standing Regulations and Digest of Decisions of the Grand Lodge of Ancient Free and Accepted Masons of the State of Maine.

#3. After reviewing a request from a Brother to add a charge in our ritual work prior to the second section, and finding no need or purpose for this charge it is my decision that it will not be used in whole or part as an addition to our ritualistic work.

### GRAND LODGE NIGHT

This year as in former years a Lodge was chosen to exemplify the Master Mason Degree for Grand Lodge. This happened on April 22nd. The Lodge chosen this year by the Grand Lecturer and his staff was Ancient York #155 in Lisbon Falls. They could not have made a better choice. The Master Mason Degree was performed in an excellent and impressive manner. Your Grand Master was very pleased with the 38 Present and Past Grand Lodge Officers present. Also to the 41 Brethren making a total of 79 in attendance. Congratulations again to the Worshipful Master and Officers of Ancient York #155 for this special night and also on celebrating your 125th Anniversary of Freemasonry.

### MEMBERSHIP COMMITTEE

This is a new committee which started in January of 1994. Since this date



this committee has held 24 Fellowship nights in all but 4 of our Districts. These have proved very successful with good participation and many non-masons in attendance. I want to thank this committee for its efforts and its many hours and miles traveled to make this program a success.

## VISITATIONS

Your Grand Master attended 163 Masonic meetings within and without our Grand Jurisdiction to help promote Masonry, with problems and take note of the needs of our Brethren.

I attended the Northeast Conference of Grand Masters accompanied by the Deputy Grand Master and Grand Secretary. This is a wonderful time to exchange ideas and share plans with those from other Grand Jurisdictions. All Jurisdictions are willing to work together and share programs together to help solve problems that many of us are faced with.

I also attended the Conference of Grand Masters of Masons of North America. This was again a wonderful opportunity to share ideas and cement fraternal relations throughout North America. At this conference your Grand Master was elected to serve on the committee to plan for the Conference of Grand Masters which is to be held in Washington, D.C. in February 1996. Needless to say I was proud to receive this honor.

On May 20th, the Grand Lodge Officers laid the Cornerstone of Morning Star Lodge #41 in Litchfield. This was very well attended by Present and Past Grand Lodge Officers as well as members of Morning Star Lodge, many visitors and ladies. This Lodge is now completed and is to be dedicated on May 20, 1995. Congratulations Brethren.

Grand Lodge Officers Night in Belfast under the direction of R.W. Charles Brown proved very successful and was enjoyed by all.

On September 17th the Grand Lodge Officers made their annual Sunday Visitation to the V.A. Hospital in Togus. We attended both of the services and visited with many patients. Following the services a joint luncheon was enjoyed in the gymnasium with the Knights of Columbus. This visitation was well attended by both Masons and Knights. I would like to thank our Representative, Norman Morehouse, for his work in making this meeting a success.

I have had the opportunity to visit our Veterans Home in Caribou twice during the past year, once in the fall and again this Spring on Easter Sunday for their morning service and breakfast. This was a very heart warming experience and attended by many Present and Past Grand Lodge Officers and many Masons from the First District who were very supportive of this facility. At the Easter Service we were privileged to have Richard Fletcher, Executive Secretary for M.S.A. and his wife Judy in attendance. Our representative, Wor. Brother Harry Kearney is doing an outstanding job and loved by all at this Home. Thanks, Harry, for all your labors.

During the year I visited many Rainbow Assemblies and also their Grand Assembly at Husson College in Bangor. These girls are special, lets make an effort to visit and support them.

I also had an opportunity to visit DeMolay, and watch them perform their work. These young men are dedicated and do outstanding work. Brethren,

youth is our most valuable asset. Lets support them and help them grow.

### CONCLUSION

This has been a very rewarding, interesting and challenging year serving as your Grand Master. This is a special year for the Masons in Maine it being the 175th Anniversary of the Grand Lodge of Maine. We can be very proud of our accomplishments that have taken place during this time.

To my elected and appointed Grand Lodge Officers, you have traveled many miles and spent many hours supporting your Grand Lodge. Teamwork is the key to success and I appreciate all your endeavors in carrying out the duties of your office. We have worked well together.

To the Grand Secretary, Grand Treasurer, and three ladies in the office, your help and friendly smile have been outstanding. Your support and cooperation have been so important to me in making my work easier and more enjoyable.

To the Past Grand Masters, your advice and counsel has always been there when called upon.

I wish to thank all the Brethren in this Grand Jurisdiction for the privilege and honor of serving you as your Grand Master. It has been a year that I shall never forget.

I would like to close by saying God Bless each and every one of you, and may health and happiness be with you always.

## GRAND LECTURER'S REPORT

Caribou, Maine

April 29, 1995

TO: The Most Worshipful Grand Master, Officers and Brethren of the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine.

Your Grand Lecturer and the six Assistant Grand Lecturers met three times during the past year for planning purposes. There were seventy-two ritualistic schools conducted by the lecturers in the twenty-four Masonic districts of Maine plus twenty-four non-ritualistic schools.

As with any organization, there have been ups and downs throughout the year. On a positive note, I am pleased to report that attendance of lodge officers at schools of instruction has improved 3 per cent. Last year there were 24 lodges with no officer attendance compared to 15 this year. We hope the improvement indicates a trend that will continue. Involvement of the District Deputy Grand Masters and the District Representatives has been a factor in most of the districts. On the less favorable side, however, there are concerns which must be reported and which I feel should be targeted for improvement. This past Masonic year, fifteen lodges had no officer attendance in any ritualistic school of instruction. I recommend a plan be developed to ensure continued participation of the lodges that have been attending and at the same time work to encourage and motivate the fifteen remaining lodges to begin attending.

We have perceived a waning interest in the Certified Ritual Instructor program in most of the districts. If the Certified Ritual Instructor program is ever to become an integral part of the schools of instruction, action will need to be taken to improve the interest and the involvement of the brethren. In whatever form we choose to promote our ritual work, I feel it should be given utmost priority. Ritual is the foundation of Masonry and the cement that binds us together. Every effort should be made to ensure its appropriate usage and its prominence in our Masonic behavior.

The Assistant Grand Lecturers and I met on April 1, 1995, to select the lodge to exemplify the Master Mason Degree for Grand Lodge night. The following seven lodges were nominated for consideration:

As always, it was very difficult to decide on one lodge. Ancient York #155 in Lisbon Falls was chosen. It is truly an honor for any lodge to be nominated, and even a greater honor to be selected. ## **REPORT OF INDEPENDENT CERTIFIED PUBLIC ACCOUNTANTS**

We have audited the statements of assets, liabilities and fund balances arising from each transactions of the Grand Lodge of Maine, A.F. & A.M. as of March 31, 1995, and the related statements of operating cash receipts, cash disbursements, and changes in fund balances for the year then ended. These financial statements are the responsibility of the Organization's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit.

We conducted our audit in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards. ## REPORT OF THE GRAND SECRETARY

In Grand Lodge

Orono, Maine

May 2, 1995

To the Grand Lodge of Maine:

Each year brings new challenges and different problems we must deal with. This year has been a good year Masonically; and again we've done well as a Fraternity. We're moving in the right direction even though we, undoubtedly, will show a loss in membership.

At the outset, let me tell you how proud I am of our secretarial staff, Lois, Julie, and Mary. They, along with our Grand Treasurer, R.W. Bruce Tornquist, took on many of my duties while I was ill. When I'd call them from the hospital or from home, their response was always, "Don't worry, everything is fine," and there was no question they did the job and did it well. I sing their praises and thank them from the bottom of my heart.

I also thank the members, lodges and all Masonic bodies for the cards and words of kindness and good cheer they sent. They were very much appreciated.

As always, there are projects to work on. This summer is the time to finally print the edited copies of the Digest of Decisions along with the study and format revision of the Constitution. This wasn't completed as planned because of my illness. Again, I thank Ill. Franklin G. Hinckley, Chmn., M.W. M. Donald Gardner, R.W. Waino T. Ray, R. W. Hollis G. Dixon, and R. W. Wayne T. Adams for their hard work and patience on this seemingly unending project. The second project is to get bids for an office computer system. This will replace the I.B.M. system we've been using with limited efficiency for several years. The third project is a Grand Lodge Credit card program. Our Grand Master is presently discussing the mechanics of the project with the people at MBNA. You'll be getting more complete information about the Credit Card program soon.

Bro. James Dufresne, the Grand Lodge Librarian, has done an outstanding job making the library more available to all. His hard work shows in the library and in his thorough report. Unfortunately, time and space allows me only to give a few details. A couple of excerpts from his report state: "During the past year over 200 visits to the library were recorded with about 50 brethren borrowing material -- 28 of these brethren are regular library users. I have sent materials as far away as Turkey, and [as nearby as] the Grand Lodge of Rhode Island who asked for some books that they needed for research.." Bro. Dufresne goes on to say: "My goal is to promote the library in as many ways as possible....Another goal is to see that Branch Masonic Libraries are established in various locations throughout the state..."

His complete report will be included in the 1994 Proceedings.

Bro. Dufresne has traveled extensively promoting the Grand Lodge Library and Masonic Libraries in general. We greet him and are very fortunate to have him on our staff.

With the monthly newsletter, you received word of two Special Communications. Both were well attended. The first Special Communication was for the consolidation of Bingham Lodge No. 199 with Keystone Lodge No. 80. The second was for the Cornerstone Laying at Morning Star Lodge No. 41 in Litchfield.

Being secretary of a lodge takes more time than anyone realizes. I sincerely believe Secretaries' Workshops are important and every lodge secretary should make an effort to attend one. In the years I've been Grand Secretary I've tried several different methods to accommodate the lodge secretaries. Each year the attendance was less than the year before.

Last year I asked secretaries to organize area workshops, get a date agreeable for them and for me, and I would travel anywhere in the state to conduct the school. There were three workshops last year -- one in Aroostook County, one in the Lewiston area, and one in the Springvale area. The best attended school was in Aroostook County even though the over all attendance was the lowest ever. These workshops can make the lodge secretary's job easier. However, he must take a couple of hours out of his schedule to attend. What am I going to do next year? I don't really know.

Again this year, we've had several secretaries retire. I wish them well and commend them for a job well done. Enjoy your well-deserved rest.

We still have a problem with getting the Annual Returns in on time. Even up to last week, we were waiting for three lodges to send in their return forms. You can't imagine the problems those three lodges created with my reports and the records for the Annual Session.

It's always gratifying to tell you that we stayed within our budget again, and won't be asking for a per capita tax increase this year. You must know, though, I'm afraid we've reached our limit. We all realize that expenses have gone up again. Postage and bulk mailing prices went up this year. Electric and telephone rates have also gone up. Therefore, I believe that this will be the last year without a per capita increase.

Finally, information gets back to me that members are unhappy and ask, "What does Grand Lodge do for me?" My answer is "What do you expect and want Grand Lodge to do for you?" If you're unhappy with Grand Lodge the person to talk with is me. I can give you answers, and if I don't have them, I'll get them for you. I invite each of you to call or write if you have problems and want answers. The office hours are posted, but I'm available at all times. As I've said before, "I never close."

### **GRAND LODGE OF MAINE CHARITABLE FOUNDATION COMMITTEE ON DISTRIBUTION REPORT, FISCAL YEAR ENDING MARCH 31, 1995**

The Committee on Distribution is pleased to report distributions relief totaling \$60,409.60 to 35 recipients this past year. This compares with \$107,390.00 last year to 47 recipients or a drop of \$46,980.40 to 11 fewer recipients. There was a 25% drop in the number of applications and, frankly, we don't know why. We responded with appropriate relief to 35 of the 36 applications. We have the resources to help many more people than we

do, and we encourage lodge Masters and Secretaries to take the time to submit an application whenever there is an older brother or a widow with limited resources and an unexpected financial obstacle. The recipients by Lodge are indicated on Exhibit A.

This past year, the Committee received several applications where, because of fluke or misfortune, there were enormous medical bills and immediate needs to just survive. We do not have the resources to respond to large, uninsured medical expenses. We do have the means to help people meet the immediate demands of keeping food on the table, fuel in the tank, and a roof over a family's head.

We frequently receive applications where it is obvious that the applicant does not have the resources to continue in his or her present situation. We cannot subsidize living expenses on a month to month or year to year basis. We frequently advise the Lodge that some fundamental questions have to be answered, and that we are ready to help in making a transition when those questions have been addressed. Help sometimes only postpones an inevitable adjustment. We try to assist in those adjustments.

Lastly, we frequently receive applications that are incomplete. We have no independent sources of information and must rely entirely on what we are provided in the application and what the lodge Secretary or Master adds in a telephone conversation. Often an application has so many blank spaces that we cannot make a decision and have to return the application for needed information. Lodges which submit complete applications are able to provide relief sooner.

This past year, in addition to responding to applications for individual relief the Foundation has made contributions, as follows:

The Grand Master asked for the Report on Fraternal Relations.

## FRATERNAL RELATIONS REPORT

In Grand Lodge  
Orono, Maine  
May 2, 1995

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine, AF&AM:

The past year has been fairly quiet in the area of fraternal relations activity, except as noted below:

### PRINCE HALL MASONRY

For the better part of two centuries, the Grand Lodges of what might be called "regular Masonry" and those of Prince Hall Masonry have been pursuing separate but parallel courses. One of the major causes for this division has been the question of the regularity of origin of Prince Hall Masonry, this being one of the principle factors in the fraternal recognition among Grand Lodges.

Prince Hall Masonry had its origin as a Boston Lodge chartered by the Grand Lodge of England (Moderns) in 1784, bearing the name African Lodge No. 459.

The turmoil after the American Revolution saw a radical change in the Masonic establishment, both in America and in England.

There had been two fiercely competitive British Grand Lodges, the Moderns and Antients in existence both of which had chartered lodges in America. The Revolutionary War caused the American lodges to sever connections with their British parent Grand Lodges, and after some interim moves, joined to form what is now the Grand Lodge of Massachusetts.

African Lodge was not acknowledged and didn't become a part of the new Grand Lodge. Not many years later in 1813 the two British Grand Lodges joined forming the present United Grand Lodge of England. Having lost contact with African Lodge No. 459 for some time, it was omitted from the rolls of this new Grand Lodge also.

Finding itself out in the cold, African Lodge made the decision to declare itself an independent Grand Lodge in 1827. It chartered other lodges which eventually became Grand Lodges until today it has Grand Lodges in many states and more than 300,000 members.

In 1988, the Prince Hall Grand Lodge of Massachusetts applied to the United Grand Lodge of England to recognize its regularity, which was refused at that time.

The application was carefully reviewed for over three years, however, and in November 1994 the conclusion was reached that while there were irregularities in the formation of Prince Hall Masonry, there are other Grand Lodges which were also organized under less than regular circumstances, and "By standards then prevailing, the formation of the Prince Hall Grand Lodge of Massachusetts could have been seen as merely eccentric and of acceptable regularity...the philosophy and practice of Prince Hall Masonry today are of exemplary regularity."

This recommendation made by the Board of General Purpose was approved by the United Grand Lodge of England.

Prince Hall Grand Lodges have now been recognized as regular by 13 American and Canadian Grand Lodges. The Grand Lodge of Maine has recently received a request for recognition from the Prince Hall Grand Lodge of Connecticut, but additional information is needed before your committee on Fraternal Relations can make its recommendation.

## **INDIA**

An unusual incident recently took place, involving the Grand Lodge of India and the United Grand Lodge of England.

Some time after India gained its independence from British rule, it formed its own Grand Lodge. When this was done, the new Grand Lodge entered into an agreement with the United Grand Lodge of England whereby the latter would not charter any more lodges in India, and the Grand Lodge of India would not place undue pressure on the remaining British lodges in India nor

their members to join the Indian Grand Lodge.

However, in 1992 the Grand Lodge of India amended its Constitution prohibiting its members from holding plural membership in British lodges.

The Grand Lodge of England considered this to be a violation of their agreement. India claimed it was a sovereign body and entitled to make its own rules. The Grand Lodge of England then withdrew recognition of the Grand Lodge of India.

India then took the matter to the local courts, which ruled that India was entitled to take the action. The matter is evidently on dead center for the moment as we've heard nothing further about it for some time.

This is the first time we've heard of the matter of recognition ending up in the courts. It could establish an undesirable precedent, and bears watching.

In a possibly related matter, the Grand Lodge of Maine received a letter dated January 3, 1995 advising of the formation of the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Ancient Accepted Masons of Upper India, and requesting recognition. We are awaiting further information on this one.

### **BRAZIL**

We are informed that when Brazil adopted a new constitution, some time ago, a new state was created out of the former Territory of Amapa. Freemasonry soon followed and the new Grande Loja do Estado Amapa was formed. It has received the favorable consideration of the Commission on Information for Recognition of the Conference of the Grand Masters of Masons in North America.

The new Grand Lodge has requested recognition from the Grand Lodge of Maine, and your committee recommends that it be extended. We are advised it does not exchange Grand Representatives.

Following the Fraternal Relations report, Brother Wayne Adams asked if he might speak to the Grand Lodge.

WAYNE ADAMS: I've sat in lodge with Prince Hall Masons as I believe you have in other Grand Jurisdictions where Prince Hall Masonry is recognized as regular; Connecticut, for example; Quebec for example. Now I understand that the Grand Lodge of Massachusetts has recognized Prince Hall

Masonry as being regular in that jurisdiction.

There is a practical reason for us to define our position now as we have done in the past. Should a Maine Mason be able to go to Connecticut, for example, and sit in lodge with a Prince Hall Mason without breaking any rules. I believe that the answer should be "Yes." Should a Maine Mason be able to go to Connecticut and visit a Prince Hall Lodge recognized as regular by the Grand Lodge of Connecticut? I believe that the answer is "Yes." Should a Prince Hall Mason from Connecticut recognized as regular by the Grand Lodge of Connecticut be welcome in our lodges as a visitor. I believe the answer is "Yes."

Whenever we have fraternal relations with another Grand Lodge, we recognize that Grand Lodge as being the highest Masonic authority in that jurisdiction. It follows that if a sister Grand Lodge recognizes Prince Hall Masonry in its own jurisdiction, we should too.

Therefore, I move that it be the general policy of this Grand Lodge, that when we have fraternal relations with another Grand Lodge, and when that Grand Lodge recognizes Prince Hall Masonry as regular in its own Jurisdiction, then we should take steps to recognize Prince Hall Masonry in that jurisdiction to the same extent; and I further move that the Committee on Fraternal Relations report to us next year and annually thereafter on the status of Prince Hall recognition in other Jurisdictions with whom we have fraternal relations.

The motion was seconded and the Grand Master stated, "It is accepted." R.W. Wallace Gage, Chairman of the Fraternal Relations Committee interrupted and made the following statement, some of which was inaudible: This Prince Hall issue has so many different ways of being looked at.

Now, in the first place, I think we have, more or less, done work (voice is inaudible) Brother Adams that goes back to 1993. I don't have a copy of that Proceedings, and when the Fraternal Relations Report was read, there's no indication that it was accepted and adopted, though I'm sure it was.

The first part of my report had to do with Prince Hall Masonry. I think we ought to remember that Prince Hall Masonry is not anything by itself. There is no entity called Prince Hall Masonry. It's a lot of Grand Lodges the same as ours. When my report was written a couple weeks ago [inaudible...something that has to do with the Masonic Service Association] there was information that the Grand Lodge of Massachusetts had granted full recognition to the Prince Hall Lodge of Massachusetts and all lodges under their jurisdiction. In other words Massachusetts Grand Lodge has recognized Prince Hall in Massachusetts, not the whole [inaudible] under the Prince Hall system. [There are more comments made by R.W. Gage that are not audible.] He then reads, "Please note that all of the Grand Lodges that have been reported as recognizing Prince Hall Masonry, have done so within their own jurisdictions, and have not [inaudible] to show recognition between jur-



isdictions."

Bro. Gage then talked about that statement needing investigation to find out specifically what that means. He went on to say, "We have no Prince Hall Grand Lodge in Maine. There is one lodge in Bangor. We don't recognize one lodge. We recognize the Grand Lodge."

Grand Master: We have a motion on the floor by Wayne Adams. All those in favor. Opposed, if any. Carried.

The Grand Master asked M.W. Steve Mitchell, Past Grand Master from Rhode Island to give the response for the out-of-state guests.

M.W. Steve Mitchell: Good Morning Brethren. Your Most Worshipful Grand Master of the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine, my home state. It's great to be back to my home. We're at home now and most particularly here at the University of Maine where I obtained one of my degrees.

You know, I knew I was getting close to "God's Country" as I was crossing the Piscataqua River in Portsmouth; and as I arrived at Kittery, the air got a little fresher. Then I knew I was in "God's Country" as I was traveling the Maine Turnpike, and behold I observed a sign, and I knew I had arrived. That sign said: "CAUTION, MOOSE CROSSING FOR THE NEXT TEN MILES."

If I might digress for just a few seconds ... I was born three miles from this campus on Indian Island and brought up on the Penobscot Indian Nation. As a boy growing up on that Reservation, the climate was rampant with alcoholism which was quite prevalent. Over fifty percent of the deaths on our Reservation before the age fifty was directly attributable to alcoholism. Over eighty percent, as I indicated, on that Reservation. So, we didn't have very much.

As a young man, a young boy, seven, eight, nine years old, I so well remember, to this day, a group of men coming to our Reservation wearing those funny red hats and taking us little children to a circus in Bangor. And those men, in those funny red hats, came year after year.

Last evening I had an opportunity to see those men and for them to put on such a wonderful dinner, as they did, for the Grand Lodge and all the distinguished guests. I'm so proud as a Master Mason to own one of those beautiful red hats. It's because of those Nobels at ANAH Temple that I had such a profound belief and desire over the years to know more about what they did, and I did that in 1973 when I was raised to the Sublime Degree of a Master Mason at Ocean Lodge No. 142 in Wells, Maine and later went on to join Palestine Shrine in Rhode Island. ANAH Temple, thank you so much for having such a profound impact on my life.

Grand Master, I have traveled around this country and New England; and I am more and more assured that Freemasonry ... and even though we hear that Freemasonry is still suffering a decline in membership ... that Freemasonry is approaching this whole concept, not within the concept of quantity, but is looking at the concept of quality, and in the words of our Eminent Grand Commander last evening, that Freemasonry needs to be proactive, prospective, that our constituent lodges need to do the very same thing and work together collaboratively as a team. It's so important, my Brothers, that we know where we're going to go, where we want to be because if you leave your driveway on a trip and you don't know whether you're going to turn right or you're going to turn left, chances are you're going to get where you did not expect to be. With very careful planning, with a very much prospective view, my belief is that Freemasonry will be able to do what is necessary to do and to survive into the twenty-first century.

I'm reminded of a man who grew up on my Reservation, who was well respected on my Reservation, who became, because of his ability and his capability to commune with nature, became the Medicine Man, the Shaman of our tribe; and a couple of young boys, as young boys tend to do, said, "You know [inaudible] and [inaudible] in my language means 'The Man.' We ought to fool Sinabe (spelling?) because Sinabe always says that he can tell what is going to happen. So, why don't we get a bird, walk to Sinabe, and you knock on the door ... yeh, we did have a few doors on our teepees and wigwams ... we'll knock on the door and we'll say, 'Sinabe, what have we got in our hand?' and we'll see what his answer is going to be. If he guesses it's a bird we're going to say, 'Is it dead or alive?' And if he guesses that the bird is dead, we will let it fly. If he guesses that it's alive, we will crush it to death."

And so, they went to Sinabe's home. They knocked on the door, and they said, "How are you, Wise One? What have we got in our hand?" The one boy had his hands behind his back.

Sinabe looked at those two young boys, and he said, "Why, you have a chickadee in your hand."

"Yes, but is that chickadee dead or alive?"

And without batting an eye said, "it is as you will it to be."

My brothers, Freemasonry is as we will it to be. It is within our grasp; it is within our power to do with Freemasonry as we will it to be. And so, my Brothers, I say to you, "Let it fly. Let it fly."

God Bless the Grand Lodge of the great State of Maine, and Most Worshipful Grand Master, thank you for the honor of responding for our distinguished guests. It is a pleasure to be here, and a pleasure to be at my old Alma Mater, the University of Maine as well. God Bless each and every one of you. God Bless you, Most Worshipful Grand Master.



Grand Master: Thank you ; it's been a pleasure to have you with us. You know it's the 175th Anniversary of the Grand Lodge of Maine. We had this medal made up, and it has a Past Master's jewel on it, and I'd be privileged to let me pin this on you if it doesn't go too deep. [The Grand Master pinned the medal on M.W. Steve Mitchell, PGM of the Grand Lodge of Rhode Island and thanked him again for his response.]

The Grand Master then asked M.W. Ernest H. Curtis, PGM, Chairman of the Committee on Finance to give his report.

M.W. Curtis indicated that this report was an amended budget because after the original budget was put together, it was determined that we should have more detail in the budget and that's what we have. The bottom line remains the same. M. W. Curtis also indicated that if any of the Brethren wanted a revised copy, there are copies for their reading on the sign up desk.

## PRELIMINARY REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON CREDENTIALS

ARTHUR O. NELSON: Most Worshipful Grand Master, I bring to you at this time a preliminary report of the Grand Lodge Credentials Committee. Lodges represented -- 172. Number of delegates -- 224. Grand Lodge officers present -- 67, and that includes Grand Representatives this year. Permanent members -- 41. It is with regret that I have to inform you that there are 23 lodges not represented. the total vote -- 624 [Noises made the next words inaudible] leaves our voting strength at 615.

Most Worshipful Grand Master, if it is your wish I can give you the numbers of the lodges or the towns that they are in that are not present with the possibility that they might be here and register or check in before we give our final report.

G. M. Yes, just read the names quickly.

Arthur O. Nelson: Lodge numbers that are not present: Lodge #2, 21, 35, 44, 47, 48, 53, 55, 66, 67, 74, 79, 85, 87, 101, 104, 119, 158, 160, 171, 189, 202, and Lodge #204.

GM: Thank you, Bro. Arthur.

Arthur O. Nelson: Most Worshipful Grand Master, I move that this preliminary report be accepted. [The motion seconded and the motion passed.]

G.M: Brother Grand Marshal, will you escort Brother James Dufresne to the East?

### JAMES ERNEST DUFRESNE

JAMES ERNEST DUFRESNE was born in Portland, Maine on September 5, 1946. He attended the Portland Schools and was graduated from Portland High School in June 1967. After serving a brief time in the U.S. Army, Bro. Dufresne was discharged because of serious back problems.

There are four children in Bro. Jim's family. A son from the first marriage and three daughters from his second marriage to Cynthia whom he met while attending Bible Schools in Lennox, Massachusetts. Several years later they moved to Saco, Cynthia's home town, and joined the Baptist Church where they are still very active.

Bro. Jim has become very active in the Saco Schools and served as president of the PTO/PTA. He later joined the State PTA Board and is presently serving as the Historian and Chairman for the By-laws and Public Relations Committees.

To Bro. Dufresne, involvement and participation are very important. He was raised to the Sublime Degree of a Master Mason in Saco Lodge No. 9 on April 11, 1989. In 1991 he started through the chairs but continuing back problems did not allow him to go beyond the Senior Deacon's chair. Still, Jim willingly fills in at Saco Lodge when and where he's needed. He is also a member of the Scottish Rite Bodies in the Valley of Portland and the Maine Lodge of Research.

In 1994, Bro. Dufresne volunteered to become the Grand Lodge Librarian. He found the library in good condition, but every new man has ideas he believes will make things better. Jim went about making his changes which gave the library a different appearance. In addition to working in the library, he has traveled throughout the state talking about the library and possibility of having Grand Lodge Library branches through the state.

Beyond all he has done in the library, Jim has faithfully traveled with the 175th Anniversary souvenir items to show and sell.

Bro. James Dufresne, for your continuing dedication and contributions to the Craft, I am proud to award you the Simon Greenleaf Medal for Meritorious Service.

The Grand Master asks Bro. Dufresne if he has anything to say.

Bro. Dufresne: Thank you very much. Masonry to me has been very important, and I enjoy being with the Brethren, both locally and statewide. It is just wonderful to work with the Brethren who are such gentlemen. I thank you very much.

The Grand Master made the necessary announcements. He also recognized R.W. Royce Wheeler for all the work he put in as chairman of the Committee on Arrangements. R.W. Wheeler explained how the arrangements had been made for those having lunch at Wells Common.

The Grand Master asked Rev. and Bro. Edward Fenderson to give the prayer and the Grand Lodge Session was called from Labor to Refreshment until 1:30 P.M. when the session would reconvene.

## **FIRST DAY P.M. SESSION**

At 1:30 p.m. the session was called to order.

G. M: The person who is going to speak to us today will be introduced by M. W. Ernest H. Curtis, PGM, Founder and Chairman of the Drug and Alcohol Abuse Prevention Program for the Grand Lodge of Maine.

M. W. Ernest H. Curtis: Thank you, Most Worshipful Grand Master. Brethren, for a number of years we have been associated with the Drug and Alcohol Education Division of the Maine Department of Education, and each year we've been able to have a speaker come and talk to us a little about what we're involved with. This afternoon we have the person that we work with and who has been very helpful for the past two years and I've asked him to come up and tell us about the current program. So it is with a great deal of pleasure that I present to you Mr. Ed Furbish.

ED FURBISH: It is an unbelievably great honor to be here today. I've got twenty minutes and I'm not going to have any trouble filling that twenty minutes. I will tell you right straight out now, "God Bless the Grand Lodge of Maine." And I'll tell you about that in a little bit more detail as I go along here.

You know there are alot of things happening with prevention in our country, alot of things and alot of wonderful things happening. This whole business of prevention is replete with research and why young people don't drink and don't use drugs. Very few of us understand why a number of young folks don't get involved with that kind of unhealthy behavior, and there's a good reason for that. And one of the main reasons that they don't is because of the Grand Lodge of Masons and the work that you do in your Masonry every time you meet.

Some people have a hard time understanding that connection. What does this have to do with substance abuse prevention? I'm going to tell you in no uncertain terms exactly why Masonry is one of the strongest activities we have in our American culture in terms of prevention of substance abuse issues with that culture.

Before I do that, I need to clarify with you one of our real basic points that we have about substance abuse prevention. [Leaves momentarily to bring in a prop which is an empty beer keg.] I want you to think for the next few minutes that that represents substance in our culture, if you would, alcohol, chemicals, drugs, pharmaceutical drugs, hard drugs, nicotine. I hope you can expand that picture up there (pointing to the empty keg) into the other unhealthy behavior that we associate in unhealthy life styles.

Could you imagine that that might even be a gun? Could you imagine that



that might be a butane cigarette lighter? Could you imagine that might be a can of Redi-Whip Whipped Cream? Could you imagine that that is a baseball bat? And you know, if you can imagine those things as substances ... I don't know about you folks, but that keg isn't bothering me right now. [A portion was omitted because of inaudible sound.] But you know the number one drug right now with pre-adolescent teenagers is butane and gasoline, butane gasoline. That thing that remains in butane lighters. After you use a can of aerosol, a spray can of aerosol Redi-Whip. You spray all the guts out of it, then you throw it in the rubbish and kids come along and they pick them up and they sniff that remaining gas that's in there. It gives them a real buzz.

If you can imagine that -- I know that many of you have worked with formica and the contact cement -- people use that to get high on. Here's my point. We don't have a problem with substance abuse, Folks, not at all in our culture today. What we have in our culture today is an issue of relationships.

Next time you hear a big conflagration on the news about gun control, it isn't going to work. Next time you hear about a big conflagration like they did in Boston about banning the sale of spray cans to people under the age of twenty-one in the hope of preventing young folks from writing graffiti on the walls. It didn't work. Next time you hear a campaign about getting rid of alcohol from our culture. It won't work. Next time you hear someone say that the issue in our culture today is not the substance, but it's the relationship to the substance, that it's the relationship right inside here that's the problem.

I don't know about you, but you could stack a pile of marijuana right here about five feet high and I wouldn't get near it. I'd run like mad because there's something in me that won't allow me to do that. Folks, that's what substance abuse prevention is all about. It's what keeps me from going there. Take all that stuff away, and we'll still find something to drink if we're predispositioned to do that and if our needs are not being met.

What's that got to do with being Masons? There's a lot to do with it. Because our research about prevention is telling us some very very important things, and I hope we'll hear them today. I know you're not going to remember them probably, but you'll hear them for just a couple of minutes, if you would.

Some things need to happen in your families, in your schools, in your community, and in your relationship with yourself. Number one, you need to create conditions for a healthy lifestyle. Every time you walk into that lodge, every time you walk into this meeting place, the conditions are such that a healthy lifestyle has to [inaudible] in that environment. We have to create the conditions. Every lodge I've ever been into is a healthy place to be. Number two, we have to foster attributes. I wish I had a little kid with me today, any little kid. If you don't find in this fourteen or fifteen year old



young person something to celebrate -- with some you have to look a little harder than others, but I could find something about that young person to celebrate. I could find an attribute in that young person.

Now who creates the condition and if we foster and figure out what the attributes are, there are four things that have to happen. Here's where the Masons come in. And this is why I say, "God Bless the Grand Lodge of Masons." Every one of us has a relationship to substance abuse -- every one of us has. Now some cantankerous types will say, "Not me! Never had a problem in my family. Never got near the stuff. Never had a problem with substance abuse in my family."

I'll say something like, "How fast do you drive Friday night when you come home from a late meeting?"

And he'll say, "I heard the State Police report that one out of seven drivers is chemically impaired on Friday nights. It took me an hour and a half to go ten miles the other night because they had to pull over one out of seven drivers." We are, we are all affected by this.

These four things that the Grand Lodge of Masons do every day without even knowing it that makes a contribution to prevention of these kinds of issues. One of them is that we improve social competence. [voice garbled] You know how to talk to people; you know how to agree; you know how to disagree. You do that every time you do Masonic work. You shake hands; you look each other in the eye; you learn to get along with people. That's what you do! That's one thing. But, boy, I'll tell you, it's tough to get along. Most of our issues today are not about competency and knowledge; it's about getting along with people. So one thing has to happen with social competence is to develop it. Masons do that all the time.

Number two is that we have a clear sense of the future. A lot of times we ask a young person, "What are you going to do after high school?"

"I don't know. Get a job; work at the Navy Yard. I don't know."

They don't have any idea what they're going to do. We like to give people a clear sense of the future. What do you suppose happens at the Shriners' Football Game? Clear sense of the future. What's going to happen is hopeful. There's hope in the world. Nations provide hope.

A couple of years ago, I played some professional football. One of the opportunities it gave me was to go to the Shriner's Hospital in Springfield. As soon as I walked in there and saw those kids, a lump came up in my throat. I realized I was twenty-five years old and realized I could never do that kind of work. Masons provide hope for the future, a clear sense of hope

So what we are, then, is a sense of hope. Next is what we need to do is help people develop a sense of autonomy. Autonomy very simply means I

O.K. "I've got alot of problems right now, but I'm going to be O.K." When you're doing work as a Mason, it makes you feel good. It makes you feel good. People need to feel good. Kids need to feel good. We all need to feel good. You see, what Masonry does, Gentlemen, it gives us an opportunity to feel good without knowing that, without knowing that. And I'll tell you, I talk to people and people don't really grasp that idea of feeling good. But that's what it's all about, and that's what we need to work on.

The last thing that we talk about is having alternative problem solving skills. You know that people who don't have problem solving skills get into difficulties. They treat everything the same way. [voice garbled] or with a chemical. Coming home every night after a tough day at the office, you say, "I need to unwind just a bit." So he takes a chemical to change how he feels. The Grand Lodge of Masons provides you with that [Alternative problem solving.] Now above and beyond that, let me tell you about some of the more detail things that the Grand Lodge of Maine does in your daily work.

There are a couple of things we know our culture needs. One of them is a clear sense of boundaries and expectations. Folks, we need it! [voice was garbled] we started at one thirty, not at one-thirty two. Now to you folks that may not be such a big deal, but as we stand here now, as the kids are running to get the bus any minute. As we sit here now, there are 206,000 kids in the State of Maine wandering around the school houses wondering what the borders are and what the boundaries are. And after they leave that school and go home there are another set of confusing boundaries. "My mother said I could; my father said I could. I hope the cops don't get me ... the teacher said and blah, blah, blah...

The Masons set clear expectations and setting boundaries demonstrates what that's about all the time. People need to have an understanding about ritual, standing ritual. All the ceremonies that you do, all of the work that you do with all of your ritual within a solid boundary like framework is setting an example. Look what those Masons are giving. Now people don't associate that at the time. They made no connection between that and substance abuse prevention, but that's what it is. It's providing a healthy atmosphere. The Shriner's Parade, the football game, the hospitals, all of that work is providing a safe, healthy climate.

I don't know if anybody has ever made an association between that and substance abuse prevention, but it's a real direct line. Honor yourself. The Grand Lodge of Masons is the greatest thing that's happened in substance abuse prevention since sliced bread. And I think alot of times we don't make the connection because there's nobody there to help us make that connection. What you're doing, the modeling you're doing is setting that example for thousands and thousands of people.

In closing, that's not the problem. The problem is with our relationships with the substance, and in order to give up the [inaudible] to help have a

healthy relationship with the substances, we need the examples that are being set in Masonry in our American culture. They've made a fantastic contribution towards what's happening with prevention in our country and in our world.

I don't know how to close. I don't know how to close. I'm serious, I don't know how to close. I love my work. I love what I do with schools and communities and having opportunities like this. I guess I'll just close by saying, "God Bless the Grand Lodge of Masons."

Following Mr. Furbish's remarks the Grand Master called the session from Refreshment to Labor and stated that a presentation called "A Lodge of Sorrow" would be performed in memory of our departed Brethren. The presentation will be made by Monument Lodge No. 96 in Houlton. R.W. Richard Rhoda, the director of the group, explained the background to the presentation and introduced the members taking part.

Following "The Lodge of Sorrow" presentation, the Grand Master asked the Grand Lodge delegates if there were any presentations they wanted to make on behalf of their districts or Appendant Bodies. The following presentations were made:

\$1,000.00 to the Drug and Alcohol Abuse Prevention Program from the 1st District Masters and Wardens Association.

G.M. called on Brother Robert Lobley to give the Report on the Committee on Amendments:

## COMMITTEE ON AMENDMENTS

In Grand Lodge  
Orono, Maine  
May 2, 1995

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine A.F. & A.M.

The Committee on Amendments to the Constitution has considered the Amendments proposed at the 175th Annual Communication in Portland, Maine, May 3, 1994 and as printed in the 1994 Grand Lodge Proceedings on pages 1042, 1043 and 1044.

I move these Amendments be removed from the table, read and voted upon individually.

1. Proposed:

Section 112. No lodges shall receive a petition from a candidate for the degrees until he has attained his eighteenth birthday, nor, without the permission of the Grand Master, until he has resided in this state one year, nor (excepting seafaring men absent only on a voyage to sea) unless he has had his domicile within the jurisdiction of the lodge during the last preceding six months. Lodges shall have the right to receive such petitions from candidates in the military or naval service who are stationed and have their domicile in this state at least one year and within the jurisdiction of the lodge during the last preceding six months.

The Committee reviewing this amendment had mixed concerns regarding this and could not unanimously recommend adoption.

I move the report be accepted and the recommendation be adopted.

2. Proposed:

Standing Resolution 27:

Resolved. That, subject to the limitations hereinafter stated, the Josiah Hayden Drummond Distinguished Service Medal shall be awarded by the Grand Master in his discretion to not more than two Freemasons during any Masonic year, whose outstanding proficiency in the knowledge of Freemasonry and distinguished service in the successful application of that knowledge for the advancement of the welfare of the Craft shall have rendered them worthy of such recognition and honor;

Provided, however, that not more than one such medal shall be awarded to Masons outside of the jurisdiction of this Grand Lodge during any Masonic year hereafter, and

Provided further, that, in addition to the two medals hereinbefore provided for that may be awarded within this jurisdiction in each year, the incoming Grand Master, following his installation, may at his discretion in any year award a medal to the Grand Master whom he succeeds.

The Committee recommends that the proposed Standing Resolution 27 be adopted.

I move that the report be accepted and the recommendation adopted.

3. Proposed:

Resolved. That subject to the limitations hereafter stated, the Joshua Lawrence Chamberlain Medal shall be presented by the Grand Master, in his discretion, to a citizen of Maine, Mason or non-Mason who best exemplifies the characteristics of leadership, citizenship, honor and integrity demonstrated repeatedly by this great Maine man and Mason. It would be awarded, not on an annual basis, but whenever the appropriate recipient is identified, and never more frequently than one per Masonic year.

The Committee recommends that the proposed addition to Standing Resolution 27 be adopted.

I move that the report be accepted and the recommendation adopted.

4. Proposed:

Resolved: That the rules disallowing the dispensation of alcoholic beverages in our lodge buildings be relaxed to allow for such use subject to the following restrictions and limitations:

1. During exclusively social functions, fellowship and banquet rooms or dining halls, and always under the control of responsible persons, the temperate use and dispensing of alcoholic beverages is not prohibited.
2. At no time shall alcoholic beverages be introduced into a lodge room, except for authorized ceremonial purposes, or into those rooms used directly in connection therewith, such as the preparation room, Tyler's room, or corridors adjacent thereto.
3. All applicable laws and regulations, both of the State of Maine and of local authorities, shall be observed and complied with at all times.
4. The foregoing is not to be construed as a mandate that the use and dispensing of alcoholic beverages must be allowed; whether such use is allowed or prohibited is for the local Masonic body and the Building Association, as the case may be, to determine.
5. This policy is not intended, at this time, to provide the opportunity for the Building and Temple Corporations and Associations to make available their social rooms, banquet rooms, kitchens, and dining halls to outside, non-Masonic sponsored functions when the use of alcoholic beverages would be permitted.
6. The use and dispensing of alcoholic beverages will require a dispensation from the Grand Master, and within seven days after the event a written report of the event be required sent to the Grand Master.

The Committee recognizes that times change, but feel we need to preserve our time honored sacred places and ideals and do not recommend adoption.

I move the report be accepted and the recommendation adopted.

## 5. Proposed:

Resolved. That each of the constituent lodges which compose the 17th Masonic District shall have concurrent jurisdiction over applications for membership who reside within the 17th Masonic District, subject, however, to all other conditions of eligibility for membership.

The Committee understands that all of the Masters and Wardens in the 17th Masonic District have approved of this amendment we therefore recommend adoption.

I move the report be accepted and the recommendation adopted.

## 6. Proposed:

The jurisdiction of each Lodge in the State shall extend over all territory of Maine and all Lodges shall have concurrent jurisdiction therein.

The Committee finds that this same amendment was proposed in Grand Lodge in Portland, Maine on May 3, 1977 and was rejected. This Committee recommends that this amendment be rejected.

I move that the report be accepted and the recommendation adopted.

## 7. Proposed:

Amend Section 112 by striking out the word "nor" in the third line, place a period after the parenthesis in line four and strike out the rest of the words after the period in lines four, five and six of that sentence. Place a period after the word "year" on the next to the last line of the second sentence and strike out the rest of the words after the period in that line and the last line of the sentence, so that Section 112 shall read:

Section 112. No Lodge without the permission of the Grand Master, shall receive a petition of a candidate for the degrees until he has resided in the State one year, (exception: seafaring men absent only on a voyage to sea). Lodges shall have the right to receive petitions from candidates in the military or naval service who are stationed and have their domicile in this State one year.

The Committee recommends that this amendment be rejected.

I move this report be accepted and the recommendation adopted.

## 8. Proposed:

Amend Section 115 by striking out the first paragraph. Also, Section 123, paragraph two to be amended by removing the comma after the word "year" in the third line and striking out the words "and in the jurisdiction of the lodge six months" so that paragraph two shall read as follows:

Each application must be made in writing under the signature of the applicant, stating his age, residence, and that he has resided in the State one year



preceding next the date of the application (except in cases above mentioned) and whether he has made application to and been rejected by any other lodge.

The Committee recommends that this amendment be rejected.

I move the report be accepted and the recommendation be adopted.

There was some confusion about the amendment which was to lower the age that a man could submit an application to the age of eighteen for membership to the fraternity. After some discussion, M. W. George P. Pulkkinen, PGM, who proposed the amendment, gave his feelings and explained why he believed the amendment should be passed.

There was still some confusion about the motion and some of the brethren asked for the rewording and clarification of the motion. The question that clarified the motion was that if we voted "yes" the motion would not pass. The Grand Master called for the vote and the motion was passed. Eighteen year olds could not make application to join the fraternity.

The amendment concerning the Josiah Hayden Drummond Medal was passed.

The amendment to allow alcoholic beverages to be served in Masonic halls brought about a great debate with questions asked and arguments pro and con given. In some cases arguments on both sides of the issue were adamant.

Again, clarification was asked on the wording on the proposal because it was stated in negative form.

The motion was made and seconded and the proposal was passed, rejecting the use of alcoholic beverages in lodge halls.

G. M: We're going to have to take a break from these amendments because the hour has arrived for the election of officers. Before the election we must have the final report of the Credentials Committee, Brother Arthur.

## CONDITION OF THE FRATERNITY

In Grand Lodge  
Orono, Maine  
May 2, 1995

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine:

One of the most difficult, yet satisfying, tasks of the Committee on Condition of the Fraternity is the reviewing of the District Deputy Grand Master Reports and the 1 and 1A inspection reports of each Constituent Lodge. This year inspection reports were received from all but one lodge and District Deputy Grand Master Reports were received from 22 of the 24 District Deputy Grand Masters. It is unfortunate that two of our Right Worshipful Sirs could not find time to write a report of the year's activities in their District.

### CONDITION

Last year the Committee selected six criteria on which the respective Lodges in this Grand Jurisdiction are checked. This year, as a matter of interest in determining whether or not progress was made in these criteria, the same six were checked. These six are Care and Share, Youth, Special Events, Publicity, Lodge Leadership Development, and Non-payment of Dues Committee. Little change has taken place in the first four categories between the two years. In the Lodge Leadership Development Program, it is interesting to note that of the 30 Lodges who were rated Excellent in ritual, 27 of them have adopted this program. Unfortunately, only about one-third of the Lodges have undertaken Lodge Leadership Development. This is an excellent program, started four or five years ago, and really helps the Master and Wardens in planning their year as leader of the local Lodge. The other program which showed a dramatic increase in number of Lodges participating was the Non-payment of Dues Committee. This is a committee established by the Master of the Lodge to assist the Secretary in contacting members who are in arrears in dues. Almost one-half of the Lodges are now using this committee which is twice the number using it last year. It has made a large difference in collecting dues in the Lodge participating. There are still some Lodges who could make good use of this committee. Inspection reports indicate an increase in young members and young officers filling the chairs. Fewer Lodges were reported to be in trouble and on the verge of closing or consolidating. This is a positive sign and perhaps a neighboring Lodge or Lodges could provide assistance in awakening a troubled Lodge.

### LODGE RATINGS

The following table shows inspection ratings in the Lodges in Maine for the past three years. No particular trend seems to be emerging, although it was gratifying to note that there was no Lodge this year with a poor rating on

ritual.

We continue to urge the Master of each Lodge to attend Schools of Instruction with his officers. This is one of the tools the Grand Lodge provides for improvement in ritual. The Assistant Grand Lecturers are a dedicated group of men and do a fine job of conducting schools. Please make time in your busy schedules as officers to attend Schools of Instruction.

#### DDGM REPORTS

Once again the District Deputy Grand Master Reports were outstanding. They seem to improve each year in content and recommendations. The District Deputy Grand Master is the one person in the District who is the best informed on the health and well-being of Masonry in his District. We rely heavily on these reports for information regarding the Condition of the Fraternity in this Grand Jurisdiction. The District Representative in most Districts is a big help to the District Deputy. His duties in assisting with the Educational Program of Grand Lodge have greatly enhanced the knowledge of Freemasonry to the newly raised Brethren. The selection of outstanding DDGM Reports to be recognized for their superiority was difficult. The Committee finally decided on reports from Districts 7, 10, 14, 19, and 23 as the most outstanding.

#### CONCLUSION

This past year we have observed and participated in several Fellowship Nights where non-masons were invited to the local Masonic Lodge for a supper and program. These were, for the most part, extremely successful and many new members resulted from them. If we are to succeed in bringing Masonry back to the popularity it enjoyed in the 50's and 60's, then we must change with the times. It is our opinion that we must become more family oriented, provide more semi-public functions, participate in more community activities and be more visible in the general atmosphere of society. As one of our District Deputies stated in his report "Far too many Masons are content to look upon Masonry as if it were the clear quiet surface of a pond." We wish to express our thanks to the Constituent Lodges, District Deputy Grand Masters, and District Representatives for providing us with the information which made this report possible.

We recommend that the recommendations contained in the District Deputy reports be sent to the proper committees by the Grand Secretary's office.

## COMMITTEE ON INSURANCE

In Grand Lodge  
Orono, Maine  
May 2, 1995

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine, A.F. & A.M:

During this past year we have been in contact with 104 Lodges, reviewing their insurance needs and upgrading their coverage. Each year we will be in contact with at least 50% of the Lodges to help them find adequate insurance at the lowest cost the insurance market can offer.



Over eighty Lodges this year increased their coverage to meet the requirement to have replacement cost insurance. This is extremely important, as it eliminates a Lodge from being penalized for depreciation. Lodges have realized the need to carry more insurance on their contents and include replacement cost coverage.

During the past ten years many new Lodges have been built and their cost for insurance has reduced. Many Lodges have made extensive repairs and beautified their Lodges, both internally and externally. A new Lodge or one that is in fine physical condition with updated heating, plumbing and electrical wiring pays less for their insurance coverage, because they have less internal hazards to expose them to losses. The external structure has less losses because it can withstand the wind and cold and prevent leakage of water through the roof. The better maintained Lodges will have less liability claims resulting from accidents on entrance ways, stairs, parking lots, chairs and rugs.

There have been very few claims presented by Masonic Lodges, thereby creating a good loss ratio for the insurance companies. The low loss ratio helps all Lodges to buy insurance at a far less cost than most other fraternal organizations.

We are extremely pleased when reviewing the last ten years of our progress. Most Lodges today carry a lot more protection on their Lodge and its contents, broader liability coverage and pays less per \$1,000. coverage than they did ten years ago. Thousands of dollars are being saved on their insurance cost plus having millions of dollars more protection.

We want to remind all Lodges that the Grand Lodge of Maine carries \$1,000,000. liability protection on all Lodges constituted by the Grand Lodge of Maine... BUT this coverage carried by Grand Lodge does not include other Masonic Bodies such as DeMolay, Rainbow, Trustees of a Building Fund, or OES and others. The Grand Lodge of Maine also carries Workers Compensation Insurance and a Bond to cover dishonesty for every Lodge.

## COMMITTEE ON MASONIC JURISPRUDENCE

In Grand Lodge  
Orono, Maine  
May 2, 1995

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine:

Your Committee on Jurisprudence has had copies of the various dispensations issued by the M.W. Grand Master this past year, have reviewed the same and find all of them within the Grand Master's prerogatives and in order.

Several decisions were also referred by the Grand Master of the Committee for their consideration and report to you.

We approve of his decision with respect to Freedom Lodge #42 and its loss or destruction of its records prior to January 1, 1995.

With reference to the Grand Master's decision denying the use of a special charge before the second section as an addition to the ritual, we find this decision to be well grounded. Any changes in the ritual are within the purview of the Committee on Ritual, a standing committee of this Grand Lodge, which is charged with the preservation of the ritual and the perpetuation and continuity of accurate interpretation.

The Committee has reviewed the Grand Master's decision regarding the interpretation of Section 135 of the Grand Lodge's Constitution which states:

**"A brother may be an active member of more than one lodge within the jurisdiction of this Grand Lodge, but he may not hold more than one office in any lodge at the same time."**

The Grand Master's decision that the membership of a brother in more than one lodge is somehow interdependent or that by becoming a member of more than one lodge that one membership becomes primary and the other is secondary is erroneous and not supported by the Constitution.

There are no classifications of membership. Dual membership (indeed the Constitution does not limit the number of active memberships that a brother may have) is a prerogative that a brother may seek but having obtained it, he is not under an obligation to maintain multiple membership. His membership in one lodge is not in any way dependent upon or conditioned on his membership in another. The only disability imposed on multiple memberships is that a brother may hold only one office in a given lodge at the same time.

G.M: Good Morning Brethren, we have a great deal of business to conduct this morning and hopefully we can get through it without much delay. Let us continue with the report on Amendments. Grand Secretary, will you read I believe number 5 of the recommendation of the Committee on Amendments. (These amendments are all listed in the Report of the Amendments Committee just prior to the Election of Officers & the final Credentials Committee Report.)

Proposed Amendment #5 concerned concurrent jurisdiction in the 17th Masonic District.

This amendment concerning concurrent jurisdiction in the 17th Masonic District passed.

Proposed amendment #6 concerning statewide concurrent jurisdiction was rejected.

Proposed Amendments #7 & #8 were rejected.

**PROPOSED AMENDMENTS FROM THE FLOOR TO BE VOTED ON  
IN MAY 1996**

1. Proposed:

Amend Section 135 of the Constitution to read: A Brother may be an active member of more than one lodge within the jurisdiction of this Grand Lodge. He may hold office in each lodge to which he is a regular member according to the By-laws of each said lodge.

2. Proposed:

Moved that the Ritual Committee pursuant to Section 36, Paragraph 14, study and consider the feasibility of preparing, publishing and distributing a ritual in plain English except for those sections dealing in the obligation, words and grips dealing with the modes of recognition.

3. Proposed:

Moved the following Amendment to Section 2 of the Constitution entitled *Officers and Members-Rank and Title* by inserting following the words Right Worshipful District Deputy Grand Masters - *Very Worshipful District Representatives*.

## 4. Proposed:

64. Resolved, That when a member is demitted, suspended or expelled from his Lodge, that the Secretary of his lodge notify the Secretaries of all concordant and appendant bodies of his standing.

## 5. Proposed:

65. Resolved, That when an application for membership is presented to a prospective member he will receive a copy of the brochure Maine Freemasonry attached to the application.

## 6. Proposed:

Any two or more lodges in the same masonic district may share concurrent jurisdiction with each other after certification to the Grand Secretary that they have voted to do so at an annual meeting after notice of their members. Any lodges sharing concurrent jurisdiction with another lodge or lodges as provided herein may vote to terminate concurrent jurisdiction by the same method.

## 7. Proposed:

Section 36, Subsection 10a (Replace paragraph three with the following:

"The Grand Master shall appoint District Educational Representatives for one year terms, taking into consideration recommendations made by the Committee. The Committee shall forward to the Grand Master its recommendations by January 1, each year."

## 8. Proposed:

Moved that it be the general policy of this Grand Lodge that when we have fraternal relations with another Grand Lodge, and when that Grand Lodge recognized Prince Hall Masonry as regular in its own jurisdiction, then we should also take steps to recognize Prince Hall Masonry in that jurisdiction to the same extent:

And I further move that the Committee on Fraternal Relations report to us next year and annually thereafter on the status of Prince Hall recognitions in other Grand Jurisdictions with whom we have fraternal relations.

PGM, George P. Pulkkinen proposed to have the defeated amendment to Section 112 regarding the eighteen year old minimum age for membership be laid upon the table for another year and voted on again in 1996. This proposal was rejected.

## THE MAINE MASONIC FOUNDATION FOR THE PREVENTION OF DRUG AND ALCOHOL ABUSE AMONG CHILDREN

The fund raising program for the Maine Masonic Foundation has not produced as much revenue this year as we have been able to do in recent years. However, with a small reserve of funds carried over from previous years we have been able to continue and expand on our services. Once again, I would express our appreciation for the financial support from the Charitable Foundation, the \$5,000.00 grant from the Grand Royal Arch Chapter and the numerous gifts from many Lodges, District Deputy and Officers Associations. ## WALLACE MARSH GAGE

WALLACE MARSH GAGE was born on June 29, 1918 in Nashua, New Hampshire. His parents were Edwin and Julia Gage. Wally, as he's known to most of us, attended the schools in Nashua, joined the Sea Scouts, and was the first to earn the distinction of being awarded the rank of Quartermaster (an honor equivalent to Eagle Scout in the Boy Scouts) from the State of New Hampshire.

In 1945 he married Marilyn Benedix, whom he met at Chelsea Naval Hospital where she was serving as a Cadet Nurse. Wally and Lynn presently reside in Tenants Harbor and have five children and nine grandchildren.

Bro. Gage went on the school at Admiral Farragut Academy where he became a member of the Cadet Fire Brigade. This group of young men were sent to give assistance where it might be needed when the Hindenburg crashed. After graduating from Admiral Farragut Academy, he enrolled in the New York State Maritime Academy and graduated in 1939.

Wally was soon employed by Mobil Oil and worked on their tankers. During World War II he took a leave of absence to join the Navy and retired with the rank of Lieutenant Commander in the U.S. Naval Reserve. Following World War II, he returned to Mobil Oil where he retired in 1976 after 37 years of employment with that company.

Wally's Masonic membership is extensive. He was raised in Mineola Lodge No. 985, Mineola, New York in 1953. On moving to New Canaan, Connecticut in 1959, he affiliated with Harmony Lodge No. 67 and was Junior Warden when his work took him to Westfield, New Jersey. There, he affiliated with Atlas Lodge No. 125 and became Master of that lodge in 1976. Moving to Maine in 1978, he affiliated with Eureka Lodge No. 84, and was its Master in 1984.

His Masonic career goes on with involvement in Scottish Rite, York Rite, Shrine and many other appendant bodies. He is Grand Lodge Historian and charter Master of the Maine Lodge of Research. And there's more than time will allow to list.

Presently Bro. Gage is serving the Grand Lodge as Chairman of the 175th Anniversary Committee and has put in countless hours writing the Grand Lodge History, organizing banquets, and taking care of the necessary details to make our Anniversary year successful.

Bro. Wallace M. Gage, you have given many years of dedicated service to Freemasonry. That's self-evident. Because of your loyalty and service to your family, your community and Masonry, I'm extremely proud to award you the Simon Greenleaf Medal for Meritorious Service to the Craft.



BRO. WALLY: Most Worshipful Grand Master, I don't have much to say right now because I am speechless and that doesn't happen very often. I have been a Mason now for forty-two years, and I have enjoyed every minute of it. Receiving an award like this is beyond anything I could possibly imagine. All I can say is Thank You - Thank You all - it has been a pleasure to work with you. In all the states I have worked in and the fact that my father was a lifelong Mason this gives me a great deal a pleasure and I can only say Thank You very much.

This year the members of the Committee dedicated themselves to getting back to basics. It has been a difficult but rewarding quest. At times there were seemingly insurmountable stumbling blocks, but we overcame most of them and are looking forward to continued improvement. We changed from meeting quarterly to meeting once a month or more in an effort to keep ideas and changes moving ahead.

## **COMMITTEE TO PREPARE FOR THE 175TH ANNIVERSARY OF THE GRAND LODGE OF MAINE A.F. & A.M.**

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine, A.F. & A.M:

The name of this Committee should probably be changed to the 175th Anniversary Committee, as preparations have pretty much been completed and the celebration well under way.

The kick-off event in the celebration took place last October 1, 1994 with a banquet and reception held at Kora Shrine Temple, Lewiston, to commemorate the Masonic convention held on October 14, 1819 at which the decision was reached to form a Grand Lodge of Maine. Over 300 were on hand and featured guests were Masters and representatives of those lodges which founded the Grand Lodge (now numbered 1-31)

MW Donald Vose, Past Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of Massachusetts was speaker of the evening. Copies of the newly released history "Freemasonry in the District of Maine" covering the period 1762 -1820 were distributed to Brethren attending. The balance are now on sale at the Grand Lodge office.

The 175th Anniversary Medal was first issued, with the Masters of founding lodges receiving one with a dark blue ribbon and a "Founder Lodge" bar. The same medal without the bar may be worn by members of these lodges, and Past Masters may wear the PM emblem on the ribbon. Members of other Maine lodges (numbers 32-219) are entitled to wear the medal with a light blue ribbon, and Past Masters may also wear the PM emblem.

It is suggested that lodges may wish to purchase a medal for their outgoing Masters, for candidates raised during the Anniversary period, and as a token of appreciation for outstanding service or for such other reason as the lodge may choose. The only restriction on purchase and wearing of the medals is that the individual must be a member in good standing in a Maine lodge during the Anniversary period.

Also on sale are hooded and plain sweat shirts, T-shirts and mugs all with the 175th Anniversary logo.

The Grand Master has asked that during the 175th Anniversary period which extends until December 31, 1995, each lodge plan to present at least one program observing this important milestone. Such programs may be presented by individual lodges or by District, but if the latter is done, each

lodge should take an active part. It is suggested that programs be presented in conjunction with District meetings, family nights, table lodges, St. John's Day or some other special occasion.

The Committee has prepared a series of short talks on interesting experiences involving Maine Masons during the 175 years of Grand Lodge history. These will be available from District Deputy Grand Masters for use in place of or in addition to speakers at such 175th Anniversary programs. The subjects are such as will be of interest to general audiences as well as to Masons.

As a part of the Anniversary celebration, the Grand Lodge will remember one of its outstanding Masons of not too many years ago, in a memorial for MW Ralph J. Pollard, Maine's only Honorary Past Grand Master. It will recall his many accomplishments and his long years of service to Maine Freemasonry, all the while working under physical handicaps which would have made a lesser man give up in despair.

When MW Brother Pollard died in 1975, his obituary in *The Maine Mason* noted that he had three great loves in life, for his Family, his Country and Freemasonry. The Grand Lodge memorial service will have all of these represented. It will be held on Sunday afternoon, July 9th at 2:30 P.M. at his graveside in the German Protestant-Cemetery on Route 32 in Waldoboro.

A major Grand Lodge event will take place on September 9th in Bangor, beginning with a parade scheduled to get under way at 10:00 A.M. from Lower Exchange Street, and end at the Bangor Civic Center. All Masons are urged to take part. It is one of the few opportunities Masonry has to appear in public.

A banquet and reception will follow at 2:00 P.M. at Anah Shrine Temple, Main Street, Bangor near the Civic Center. Ladies and guests are invited. Reservations (\$15.00) must be made in advance, not later than August 15th. Reservation forms are available at this Grand Lodge Annual meeting and at the Grand Lodge Office in Portland.

Copies of the condensed history "The Grand Lodge of Maine, 1820-1995" will be given to all Brethren attending the banquet and reception.

Souvenir philatelic covers with the 175th Anniversary logo and cancelled at Portland on June 1st, the day the Grand Lodge was formed, will be available from the Grand Lodge Office after that date.

Further information on the 175th Anniversary celebration, including planned lodge/District programs which are brought to the Grand Master's attention will be listed in the monthly Grand Master's newsletter if sufficient notice is given.

G.M: Brother Grand Marshal, you will present to me Rev. and Worshipful Tom Weir, Director of Hospital Visitation.

Brother Tom, Thank you for coming and the podium is yours.

Most Worshipful Grand Master, thank you very much for the opportunity to say a little bit about the Masonic Service Association's Hospital Visitation Program. We are very proud of the work that is done in Maine led by M.W. John E. Anagnostis, our State co-ordinator as well as your Grand Secretary. We're also very proud of Harry, David, Bob, & Norm who are the representatives at the V.A. Hospitals and the State Veterans Homes in Maine.

I know the people of Maine as well as the Masons of Maine are very proud of what Maine has done for its veterans. I hope you will go visit either the V.A. Hospital at Togus or one of the three state veterans homes.

I would like to tell you this morning, for just a minute or so about a Maine veteran and Mason who has done very well. His name is Bob Wall and he was raised in Keystone Lodge #80. He had a career in the Air Force and after he retired he was a fisherman. He fell from a dock on to his boat and broke his back. Since that time he has been a paraplegic. He can move his head; he can move his arms, but not his fingers.

To run his computer, and for the first few years of the computer revolution Bob ran the V.A. Hospital Voluntary Service Program on his own computer. He has plates on his hands with a peg and a hole if he can hit something with that peg or like he is steering a car (he is actually licensed to drive a car, but he doesn't,) his steering wheel has a plate with a peg on it and he fits that hole on his right hand over that peg and he can steer that automobile. Bob has a remarkable job. He has about seventy volunteers in the hospital and he runs them like a drill sergeant.

His wife Shirley deserves fully half of all the credit that Bob will ever get. After the accident Bob was put into a nursing home and they decided to make him comfortable until he died but Shirley, who was a Physical Therapist in the hospital was not willing for Bob to become useless. She pushed him, she bought a van with her own money and fitted it out to transport him. They got married and she is with him all the time in the hospital.

About three weeks ago they were on the way to the hospital, and just before they passed in front of the Federal Building in Oklahoma City they saw an enormous column of smoke go up. What they didn't realize was that Bob's deputy, an Oklahoma Mason named Martin Cash, was in the V.A. Office, on the sixth floor, that morning.

As one of the survivors in that office, and they didn't all survive, he heard the explosion and ducked to avoid the flying glass from the plate glass windows. When he looked up the office, about six feet away from him, on to where it had been, was gone. Martin Cash lost an eye, he suffered a concussion, cuts from flying glass and some other injuries, but he will pull through and I am certain he and all Masons who work at Veterans Hospitals will appreciate your prayers. Martin was there that morning on your behalf helping a veteran who didn't know how or just couldn't get things together to apply for the benefits he was entitled to.

Most Worshipful Grand Master, we are proud of Maine, and I have to tell you that I have never been to Maine when I didn't enjoy it and this time especially. The only difficulty was that one of your Past Grand Masters was just making life miserable for me about the apron I was wearing yesterday. I won't tell you who he is but you did receive your hat and gavel from him. He even suggested that I should petition for membership in Maine to make an honest apron out of Brother McLellan's apron.

Thank you very much for the courtesies you have shown Becky and me and for what you do for the Veterans in Maine.

G.M: Thank you, Brother Tom, for being here.

At this time Brother Paul H. Deschambault, District Representative of the 19th District, asked to present a proposal for consideration at the 1996 Annual Communication. He read the proposal, it was voted to accept, and can be found with the proposed amendment. This amendment concerns concurrent jurisdiction within districts.

This year's numerical loss is 602 the percentage being 1.97%.

At the close of the calendar year, the total membership was 29,791. Forty lodges reported a gain in membership, 139 a loss and 18 remained the same.

Hiram Lodge No. 180 remains the largest, with a membership of 585. Naskeag Lodge No. 171 remains the smallest with 46 members. Lynde #174 reported the largest gain with eight. Rising Virtue No. 10 suffered the greatest loss (19). Average membership is 151 and 59 lodges reported fewer than 100 members.

## REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON MEMORIALS

In Grand Lodge  
Orono, Maine  
May 3, 1995

To the Most Worshipful Grand Master, Members of Grand Lodge, Officers and Members of Subordinate Lodges, and to all Grand Lodges with which we are in Fraternal Correspondence:

We read from the Old Testament book of Ecclesiastes that "There is a time to be born, and a time to die".

It is with regret that I announce the deaths of two Grand Lodge Officers, Richard H. Haskell and Philip J. Libby.

Rt. Worshipful Richard H. Haskell was born February 22, 1915, the son of Robert H. and Margery Chapman Haskell of Bath, Maine. He died September 1, 1993, at Mid Coast Hospital after a long illness.

He graduated from Morse High School in 1932 and attended the University of Maine. He married Mary Kenney on August 31, 1940, and they had a son, Richard D. Haskell who died in 1990.

During World War II, Brother Haskell served as a Chief Warrant Officer in the U.S. Navy. He worked at the Bath Iron Works for a short time, and then went to work at New England Telephone Company, where he worked as an outside plant engineer in Bath and Portland. He retired in 1977.

He became very involved with the Thespians, a theater group in Bath. He was good at acting and directing and also served as the group's business manager and president.

Rt. Wor. Haskell was raised to the Sublime Degree of a Master Mason in 1957 at Solar Lodge in Bath, and served as Wor. Master in 1965, and Chaplain in 1966.

He graduated from the University of Maine and worked for the State of Maine Highway Dept. Bridge Division, as a civil engineer.

He was a veteran of World War II, serving in the South Pacific. He married Virginia Foss on June 1, 1943, and from this marriage, they were blessed with one daughter, Mrs. Stephen (Judith) Brown of Freeport, and three sons, James, of Ocala, Florida, Steven of Anthony, Florida, and Richard of Salt Lake City. They also had 8 grandchildren.

Wor. Brother Libby served as a lay speaker for the Fairfield Center United Methodist Church where he was very active for many years. When they moved to Unity, Maine in 1981, after retiring, he became active in the Unity Union Church.

He was active in many Masonic and Eastern Star lodges, currently serving as a Grand Chaplain in the Grand Lodge of Maine since 1990.

Philip was always interested in genealogy and was past president of the Libby Family Association.

A funeral was held at the Unity Union Church, with the burial at the Maine Veterans Memorial Cemetery, Augusta.

Let us be ever mindful, my Brethren, that we all have an important part to play as Master Masons. The ways in which we live our daily lives does influence the lives of those around us.

Since we last met on May 3, 1994, we acknowledge the deaths of 842 Brethren from this beautiful *State of Maine*.

We pray that our ever-loving God, will receive all into that Celestial Lodge above, where they may find eternal rest and peace.

## STEWART MACLAINE LAURENS POLLARD

Outstanding accomplishments often go unnoticed in a person's hometown. We, in the jurisdiction of the Grand Lodge of Maine, sincerely believe that Bro. Pollard is a native son who is most deserving of the honor we bestow upon him today. It is unfortunate that "Stew" cannot be with us. He had planned to attend this session but regretfully had to cancel because of ill health. However, we wish him a speedy recovery and want Margaret, better known as Peg, his son Charles and his family to know our thoughts are with each of you during this Annual Session.

Brother Stewart MacLaine Laurens Pollard was born in Lyman, Maine on May 31, 1922. He was educated in the public schools of Wenonah, New Jersey; Lowell, Massachusetts; and Waldoboro, Maine. He is a graduate of Peekskill, New York Military Academy and Bowdoin College.

Soon after graduation, he served in the United States Army for twenty-nine years, his specialty being in Infantry Intelligence and Operations. Stew, as he is fondly called, served in Japan, Germany, Korea and Viet Nam during his military career. After the attack on Pearl Harbor, Stew was reported missing in action for a period of time. He was spared, though, because he had been sent on a special assignment and wasn't in his barracks when they were demolished by the bombing of December 7, 1941. He served with the Occupation Forces both in Japan and Germany and was assigned to a unit in Korea during that conflict.

While in Korea he received a Battlefield Commission, was awarded fourteen medals and service decorations, and the Silver Star for Gallantry in Action. His last tour of duty was in Viet Nam.

Upon retirement from the United States Army in 1970, he served for five years as the National Secretary/Treasurer of the National Sojourners, Inc. He was also the Executive Secretary of the Masonic Service Association of the United States for many years.

Brother Pollard was raised to the Sublime Degree of Master Mason on November 8, 1944 in King Solomon's Lodge, No. 61 in Waldoboro and affiliated with Ralph J. Pollard Lodge No. 217 of Orrington on May 4, 1967. That lodge was named after Stew's father. Bro. Stew holds dual and honorary memberships in lodges throughout the United States, Europe and the Far East. His Masonic involvement doesn't end there, however; he also was active in the York and Scottish Rite bodies.

The military and Masonic honors Bro. Pollard holds can be traced where the military and Masonry are in evidence throughout the world. It is, therefore, with humble pride and humility – but with heartfelt sorrow

he can't be here to receive this honor in person -- that I present Worshipful Bro. Stewart MacLaine Laurens Pollard the Josiah Hayden Drummond Medal for your service to mankind and Masonry wheresoever dispersed over the face of the earth.

## COMMITTEE ON GRIEVANCES AND APPEALS

In Grand Lodge  
Orono, Maine

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine:

STEPHEN EVERETT DORSEY, JR., at the time a member of Deering Lodge No. 183 of Portland, Maine, was charged in the Cumberland County Superior Court on 4 counts of Burglary, a Class C Crime, charging that Mr. Dorsey entered business premises in Freeport with the intent to deprive the owner of property contained therein. Mr. Dorsey was reportedly found in the premises but was not in possession of any property. Mr. Dorsey entered into a plea bargain with the District Attorney whereby 3 of the 4 counts were dismissed and Mr. Dorsey entered a guilty plea to Count 3 only on March 5, 1979. The Court, having learned of his diabetic condition requiring insulin maintenance, and that he was despondent and drinking due to the break up of his marriage, issued a six months suspended sentence to the Maine Correctional Center and placed Mr. Dorsey on Probation for One Year.

On June 11, 1979, charges were filed against Mr. Dorsey by Deering Lodge and certified to this Grand Lodge and on June 16, 1979 Mr. Dorsey was suspended by Grand Master Roger P. Snelling until the next annual communication. A Masonic Trial was held at the Masonic Temple in Augusta, Me. on November 10, 1979 at which Trial Mr. Dorsey did not appear although properly notified. By subsequent vote of this Grand Lodge on May 7, 1980, Mr. Dorsey was indefinitely suspended from all the rights and privileges of Masonry and given due notice of such vote.

On September 21, 1994 Mr. Dorsey wrote to the Grand Secretary asking that he be considered for reinstatement to Deering Lodge. On February 24, 1995 Mr. Dorsey again communicated his request to the Grand Lodge asking to be allowed to appear before this committee.

Mr. Dorsey appeared in person before this Committee on April 19, 1995 in the Grand Lodge Offices, with Vaughn Dyer, a Past Master of Deering Lodge and with Brother Russell McCrum, Mr. Dorsey's present father-in-law. Mr. Dorsey was forthright in his explanation of his diabetic stupor on the night of the alleged entry, his efforts made toward his successful rehabilitation from the use of alcohol, his remarriage and present family life, raising his two sons, and his strong desire to rejoin his Masonic family at Deering Lodge. Mr. Dorsey and his witnesses emphasized his 14 year marriage and his relationship with his two children and with his peers. Mr. Dorsey

that he now regretted not defending himself and explaining his actions at his Masonic Trial at which he did not appear. Mr. Dorsey stated that at the time he was depressed and could not afford to hire counsel to appear in his behalf and further stated that this was the reason he entered into the original plea bargain with the Court.

After due consideration, a careful review of the prior proceedings and a careful examination of Stephen E. Dorsey, the Committee unanimously feels that Mr. Dorsey is worthy of the consideration of this Grand Lodge for restoration to Membership in Masonry.

**MOST WORSHIPFUL GRAND MASTER,** In accordance with the unanimous vote of the Committee on Grievances and Appeals, I move that Stephen Everett Dorsey, Jr. be restored to all the rights of privileges of Masonry.

**TO THE MOST WORSHIPFUL GRAND LODGE OF MAINE:**

One year ago at Grand Lodge in Portland, Maine, a majority of this Committee made the recommendation that John J. Berg, a former member of Crooked River Lodge #152 in Bolsters Mills, be restored to the rights and privileges of Masonry. This Grand Lodge one year ago denied the request of Mr. Berg. Since that vote, members of Crooked River Lodge have spoken to members of this Committee stating their firm belief in Mr. Berg's rehabilitation and again pointing out the fact that Crooked River Lodge unanimously voted by secret ballot to support Mr. Berg in his request for reinstatement. Members of Crooked River Lodge have asked that this matter be again presented to this Grand Lodge and have asked for the opportunity to speak on behalf of Mr. Berg.

It is now the unanimous vote of this Committee that John J. Berg be restored to all of the rights and privileges of Masonry.

**MOST WORSHIPFUL GRAND MASTER,** I move that John J. Berg be restored to all of the rights and privileges of Masonry.

# THE ANNUAL REPORT OF THE GRAND LODGE COMMITTEE ON THE HISTORY OF MASONRY IN MAINE AS OF APRIL 15, 1995

In Grand Lodge

Brethren, during the fifteen-or-so years over which I have reported to you, the general trend has been toward improvement in the degree to which lodges have kept up with their histories. It is perhaps timely that while assuming new duties for Grand Lodge, I step aside in favor of an energetic, new committee headed by Bro. John Baggett, for this year shows decided recidivism. The number of unreported years is up from 732 to 781! The number of lodges which are currently up to date is down from 67 to 60! The number of years of history owed ranges from one to twenty-eight. This is a trend which must be reversed, and it is gratifying to know that your Grand Master has planned to address this problem.

While you are here, Brethren, check the status of your lodge with the Grand Secretary. He will have my report listing lodges by name, number, location and years in arrears. Some have submitted recent years but have skipped earlier years. There may be a problem with some of your lodge history being missing from the Grand Lodge vault. If so, you can erase some of your arrearages by resubmitting missing histories instead of rewriting them. If you can show that histories were lost by your Grand Lodge, you will not be held responsible. The arrearages listed include all known missing years. Your committee may have made errors, so bring them to the attention of Bro. Baggett.

## GRAND HISTORIAN'S REPORT

In Grand Lodge  
Orono, Maine  
May 3, 1995

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine:

In recent months, the Grand Historian's time and efforts have mostly been devoted to the historical material for the programs of the 175th Anniversary of the Grand Lodge of Maine. The result has been production of the booklet "Freemasonry in the District of Maine, 1762-1820" covering the establishment and progress of Masonry before the formation of the Grand Lodge in 1820.

The material was gathered mostly from the old lodge histories found in the archives of the Grand Lodge. Putting them together was one of the most interesting pieces of historical research I've done yet. Those old Masons had a grasp on the meaning of history, that they were writing for future generations, and were able to separate the wheat from the chaff. The booklet was released on October 1, 1994 at the reception and banquet celebrating the Masonic convention held in Portland in 1819, at which decision was reached to form a new Grand Lodge when Maine should separate from Massachusetts and become a State.

The second part of this historical production has recently been finished and is now in the hands of the printers. Its title will be "The Grand Lodge of Maine, 1820-1995". and as indicated, it is a condensed history of the Grand Lodge from its formation to the present. It is scheduled for release at the reception and banquet to be held on September 9th at Anah Temple, Bangor.

The Grand Master has asked each lodge and/or District to devote at least one program during the anniversary year 1995 to the Masonic history and background in Maine. To help in developing and presenting a program, there have been prepared a series of short talks which will be available for use in place of or in addition to a speaker. Good Masonic histories usually do a fairly good job of telling the story of the work and organization of the Craft, but they often miss out on things that would make the most interesting reading - the parts played by Masons in those events which go to make up history itself.

To try to bring some of these stories out from darkness to light, we've picked a few from places you'd least expect to find them, from Grand Lodge Proceedings, from Lodge histories, from Secretary's minutes, from newspaper clippings, etc. They're all true stories, doings of Maine Masons during

the 175 year life of the Grand Lodge.

As further commentary on people in history, if we should mention such things as Guadalcanal, Anzio, Halsey, Iwo Jima or Patton, names so familiar to many of us, to our grandchildren, it would likely bring a blank stare. Those names and places have done much to shape history, and their places should not be forgotten.

Freemasonry today is what the Masons of yesterday have made it. We may remember Simon Greenleaf, Josiah Drummond and a few others, but there is another who many of us still remember, who contributed much to Maine Freemasonry in the 40 or more years he devoted to its service. We refer to Ralph Pollard who is best remembered for the "Pollard Plan" for candidates' instruction, and is still used today. His contributions go far beyond this. To remember him and the part he played in Maine Masonic history, a memorial will be held at his graveside in Waldoboro's German Protestant Cemetery on July 9th as a part of the 175th Anniversary program.

It's been customary when a major anniversary year rolls around, for the Grand Lodge to produce a history "lest we forget". Looking back, we all too often find it given in the form of a lengthy speech at some banquet, and lasting two hours or more. Today's individual has a fairly short attention span, and after about 20 minutes, the speaker has lost his audience. For this reason, we are foregoing the historical address in favor of a two part condensed history in paperback form. One of these has already been given out to Brethren attending last October's celebration, and the second distributed to Brethren at the September 9th banquet and reception forthcoming. We hope this will encourage members to take them home to read at their leisure.

In reviewing the Lodge histories submitted in accordance with Standing Regulation 2, it's apparent that some of the writers are spending a good bit of time and effort on them, yet are receiving little recognition or thanks. We'd again like to suggest that a qualified Brother be appointed Lodge Historian on the same basis as the other lodge officers, including installation as such. An increasing number of lodges are already doing this recently. Several have asked about aprons for the Historian. We are inquiring of several Masonic supply houses and will pass along the response. At least two have Historian's jewels available already.

Selection of the winning lodge history is becoming more difficult each year. While many histories are either long overdue or copies of the secretary's minutes or otherwise lacking, we are gradually finding more really good ones. Again this year, some of the best ones were prepared by previous winners and we are pleased to add one more winner for 1994:-

## ANNUAL REPORT FROM THE GRAND LODGE LIBRARY

In Grand Lodge  
Orono, Maine  
May 3, 1995

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine, A.F. & A. M.

The many changes made in the library this past year will prepare it for growth in usage and accessibility to materials for the future. The changes started with the library's physical appearance. The furniture has been arranged to make the library a place of comfort and warmth; a place to study and do research. The next change comes in the arrangement of the stacks. The books will soon be shelved and cataloged using "A SCHEME OF CLASSIFICATION FOR MASONIC BOOKS," being an extension of the Dewey Decimal System by Frank J. Thompson, 33rd Past Grand Master, Grand Secretary and Grand Librarian of the Grand Lodge A.F. & A. M. of North Dakota. This system will allow the Brethren who visit the library to more easily locate books, articles, and periodicals.

The Grand Lodge Library has a collection of over 1,400 books. Unfortunately I have had to pull about 240 of these books because of their brittleness, due to age. Not wanting to lose them totally, I am working to save these valuable volumes. I am in hopes of being able to scan them and have them on disks in the future.

We continually receive books, periodicals, articles, video & audio tapes from various sources. I will include later in this report a list of this year's acquisitions. The M.W. John Anagnostis has donated a great deal of material to the library this past year. A detailed listing of these items is too extensive for this brief report. THANK YOU MOST WORSHIPFUL! An anonymous brother put together an IBM compatible computer and gave it to the library in memory of Bro. William Bowie (?).

At the last meeting of "The Maine Lodge of Research" it was voted to have placed in the library the file cabinet containing the reports submitted to that body. Access to this material should then be easier for anyone doing research. This falls in line with the plans that I had for our library as a place for one to be able to do independent studies. The Grand Lodge Library's membership with research lodges throughout the United States and England also adds to our resources.

During the past year over 200 visits to the library were recorded with about 50 brethren borrowing material; 28 of these brethren are regular library users. I have sent material as far away as Turkey. The Grand Lodge of Rhode Island has asked for some books that they needed for research. Library material has also been borrowed by mail by our brethren from Florida and throughout Maine.

My goal is to promote the library in as many ways as possible such as through the MAINE MASON with an article called "From the Stacks" and in the monthly news letter from the office of the Grand Secretary. I also make myself available, as a speaker, to address various lodges on the topic of "Your Grand Lodge Library". As of the end of April I have spoken to a meeting of District #11, at Lafayette Lodge #48, Readfield; United Lodge #8, Brunswick; and Ocean Lodge #142, Wells. I have been asked to address the brethren of Moses Webster Lodge #145, Vinalhaven, this summer. I am ready to speak to other lodges on this subject, with advance booking required.

Another goal is to see that Branch Masonic Libraries are established in various locations throughout the State. I am aware that it is not easy for many brethren to come to Portland in order to borrow material. "The County", for example, needs a branch library. If you or your Lodge would like to assist in reaching this goal, please contact me.

Remember that the library is for all people, non-Masons as well as Masons. We are open daily Tuesday through Friday from 11:00 A.M. to 4:00 P.M. and on nights that the Scottish Rite has degree work. If you need access to the library at other times, please let us know and we will do what we can to accommodate you.

As your Librarian I have established communications with the Librarians of other Grand Lodges throughout the country. These contacts will allow me



to avail myself of their experience in order to do a more concise job. Cynthia Alcorn, the Librarian of the Grand Lodge of Massachusetts and Tim Frankel, from the Museum of Our National Heritage in Lexington, MA., have already assisted me in many inquiries. Our library is on the list of the "NORTH AMERICAN MASONIC LIBRARIANS CONSORTIUM".

LAST BUT NOT LEAST! I am sorry to lose the assistance of M.W. Robert V. Damon, PGM. He had to make a decision to relinquish his duties because of time constraints and distance.

(12) Voted - To accept the 1995 Foundation Budget, a copy of which is annexed hereto as Exhibit C.

(13) Voted - To authorize the Grand Master as President of the Foundation to appoint a Finance Committee with the same powers and duties with respect to the Foundation budget as the Grand Lodge Finance Committee has with the respect to the Grand Lodge budget.

**TO THE TRUSTEES OF THE GRAND LODGE CHARITABLE FOUNDATION:**

As in previous years your Investment Committee of the Foundation met with the Investment Advisor of Standish, Ayer & Wood in May, September and January to discuss economic conditions and any major changes in the portfolio. I also stopped at the Grand Lodge office a few times during the year as well as having a meeting of the sub-committee in Waterville on April 10th to discuss the future. Besides the aforementioned meetings and numerous telephone calls, we met several times with the Junior Grand Warden R.W. Wayne Adams to discuss the possibility of establishing a Pooled Life Income Program. This program would have to be a separate entity from the Foundation and would provide contributors an income, to the contributor, for life and the remainder of the fund would be pooled for the future of charity for the Grand Lodge of Maine. This required some legal support; however, we were stalled when we could not find an agency to handle the investments and dispensing of quarterly cheques to individuals. The program is not completely dead but is at a standstill at the moment.

**INVESTMENT POLICY**

The status remains the same and is conservative. The principal objectives being the preservation of capital, good earnings and a reasonable growth. Our asset allocation remains the same in all our investments about 60-65% equities and 30-35% in fixed income.

The Foster Fund Scholarship is now all invested and has a projected income of \$17,074 or 5.21% per year. The beneficiaries of the schools in Buckfield, Sumner, Hebron and Hartford Lodges seem to be satisfied with the arrangements.

**NEW ITEMS**

Your committee has noted that the Standish, Ayer & Wood (SAW) Fund had a loss in 1994 of about 2.5% in capital and some less income than usual particularly in the global investments and small caps fund. This has accelerated our interest in pursuing other investment advisors. Besides this we are studying a considerable increase in advisor costs. A decision on these matters will be made in the coming months.

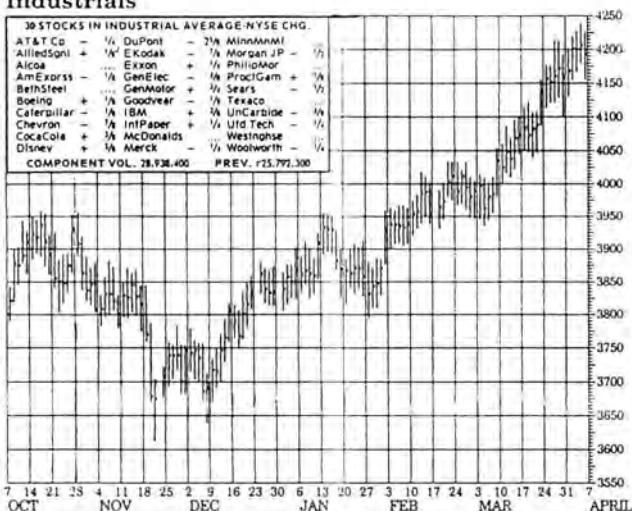

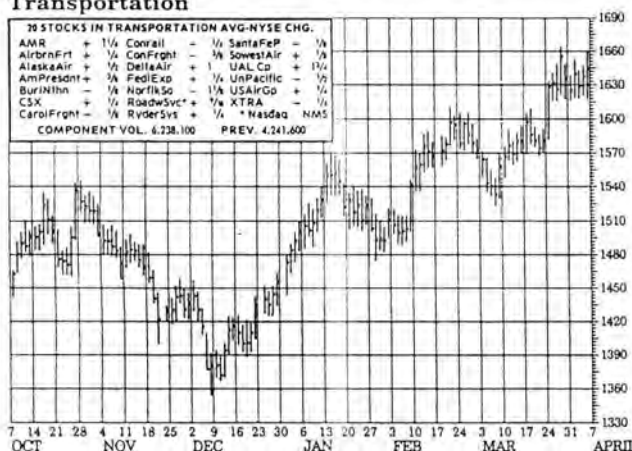

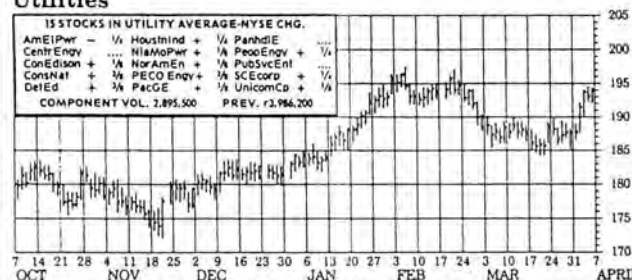

### **Order of High Priesthood-**

To the Christian Era add 1913, the Year of the Blessing. Thus: 1995 and 1913=3908.

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## MASONIC CALENDAR

**Ancient Craft Masons** commence this era with the creation of the world, calling it **Anno Lucis (A.D.)**, "in the year of light."

**Scottish Rite**, same as Ancient Craft, except the Jewish chronology is used, **Anno Mundi (A.M.)**, "in the year of the world."

**Royal Arch Masons** date from the year the second temple was commenced by Zerubbabel, **Anno Inventionis (A.I.)**, "in the year of the discovery."

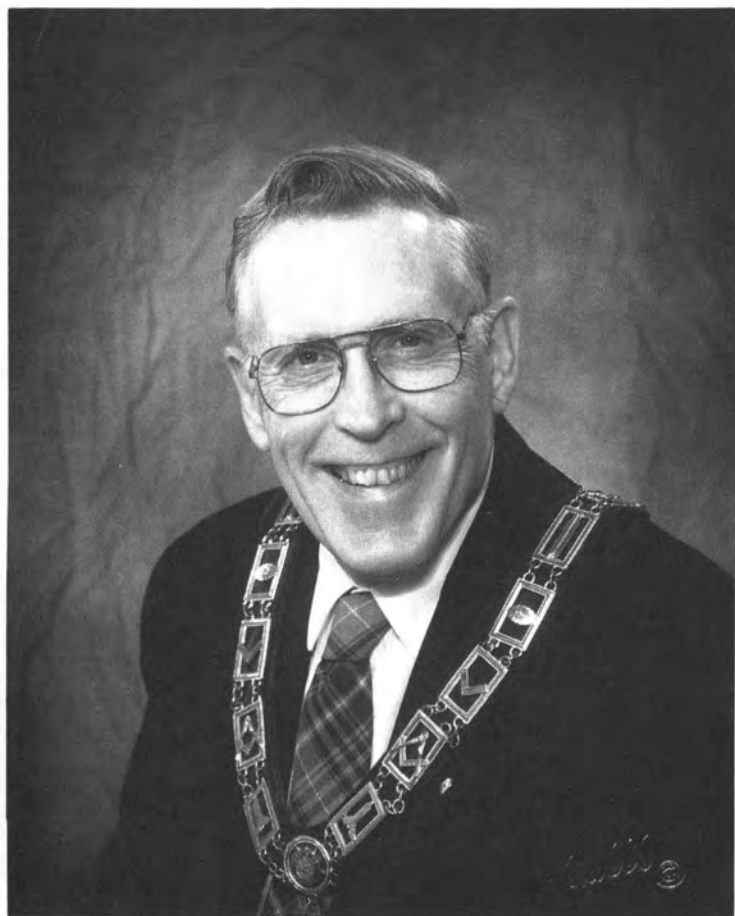

## GRAND LODGE BANQUET

Monday, May 6, 1996

With the sound of the gong, the 177th Annual Communication of the Grand Lodge of Maine was opened by our Most Worshipful Grand Master, Harland S. Hitchings. This year we returned to Portland for the session and the banquet was held at Verrillo's Restaurant and Convention Center. The prayer was given by Rev. and Brother Edward Fenderson, Grand Lodge Chaplain, and the evening session was under way.

Following the banquet, M.W. Hitchings introduced the guests at the Head Table and asked selected brethren to introduce the guests at the sub-tables.

The speaker for the evening was M.W. Donald M. Robey, PGM of Masons of Virginia and Executive Secretary of the George Washington National Memorial in Alexandria, VA.

*G.M. introduction:* M.W. Donald Maynard Robey was born in Alexandria, VA the youngest son of Steve Maynard and Laura C. Robey. Bro. Robey is married to Doris, and they have one son, Steven Maynard Robey, and two grandsons.

The Robeys have lived in Alexandria, VA, less than one mile from the George Washington National Memorial since 1955. This evening Bro. Robey will tell us the interesting story about how a magnificent memorial, built on Shuman's Hill in Alexandria, came to be. Bro. Robey...

M.W. BRO. ROBEY: [Opened his speech with several humorous stories]

I've come to talk to you about the George Washington National Memorial. Many of you know what it is, but there are some probably that don't. It is the memorial that was erected to the memory of George Washington and to all the Freemasons of this country. It came about, really in 1899, the One Hundredth Anniversary of the death of Washington.

Most of the Grand Masters, I won't say all because they weren't all there, but there was a great entourage of Grand Masters that came to the Alexandria area and went to Mount Vernon and laid a wreath at the tomb of the general. They were hosted by the Alexandria-Washington Lodge. At that time they met above city hall in Alexandria, and it was a great Masonic occasion. There was a big banquet room there and they were treated to just a fine occasion. We have typed transcripts, at least, of everything that they said and did there.

One big thing that came out of that meeting was that the Grand Masters were very disturbed that all these magnificent relics of the general's — stacks of many books with the general's handwriting and signatures in them, apron, the trowel, and so many things that are connected with George Wash-

ington's life and his lodge came in possession of -- they were concerned about that old building being a wooden roofed and beam building, that they just thought it was unbelievable that with the risk of fire they could maybe lose all these valuable relics, and that was when the seed was planted about *building a fire proof building.*

I don't think they had any thought at that point that it would end up to be the magnificent memorial it is today. Back then in 1910 when the seed was planted, was when the association was formed. In 1922 the ground was broken and in '32 the building was dedicated as it is today. They had a cornerstone laying in 1923, which was a grand Masonic occasion. That's how the building came to be.

#### THE PUBLIC'S INVOLVEMENT WITH THE GEORGE WASHINGTON MASONIC NATIONAL MEMORIAL

I appreciate the opportunity to be here this evening to share with you some of my thoughts concerning the public image of Freemasonry. Since taking on my position at the Memorial, I've become more acutely aware of how little most people know about our fraternity.

I became a member of the Board of Directors at the Memorial in 1989. Unfortunately the physical and financial outlook for the Memorial seemed pretty bleak at that time. Our Board consists of twenty-one Grand Masters or Past Grand Masters selected from a rotation schedule of all of the Grand Lodges who are active members of the Association. The rotation schedule was set up so that the Board has an equal representation of Grand Lodges from all parts of the country. Each Director serves a three year term and is not eligible for re-election, unless he is appointed to the Executive Committee.

The Executive Committee consists of six Board members who basically serve as a finance committee and to deal with the decisions that need to be made concerning the use and operation of the building. This Committee meets at least four times each year and are really the "Hands-on" managers of the Association.

In 1989, the Executive Committee changed our policy regarding whom we may lease rooms to in the Memorial. I use the term "lease" very generically. In actuality, we allow organizations to use the rooms in the Memorial, provided they agree to "reimburse" us for any expenses incurred from their use. When I was elected Secretary-Treasurer in February 1993, I did a study of the fees being charged for use of the rooms. After taking into consideration all of the expenses we were faced with and applying a percentage to each room based on the actual known expenses, it was necessary to raise the rates each tenant was being charged to use our facilities. This made several of our tenants unhappy and a few even moved their activities to another building.

I began a program, as funds became available, of upgrading the systems in the building. In many of the public display areas the audio-visual systems had ceased to function at all. Some areas never had any modern systems installed for our visitors. Most of the appendant organizations that have displays in the building were very cooperative and actually enthusiastic about having new systems installed in their rooms.

Over the past three years we have made major strides in renovating and upgrading the building. Two major projects involved the installation of air conditioning systems in the dining room and the library on the sixth floor. These projects both opened new opportunities for us at the Memorial.

The Philalethes Society sponsors a Masonic Leadership Center in the Library. This consists of a Computer system with a scanner and the ability for anyone to call in and request information on a particular subject and have it ready for them to download to their own computer in a matter of minutes, if we have the data they've requested. We are already building up a major resource for everyone based on the requests we have received thus far.

The dining room being air conditioned, opens up many doors for us with groups who wish to use this area for various events. Many of the Masonic groups are now having dinners before their meetings and all have refreshments after their meetings, even in the middle of hot summertime. The dining room is used by various cultural groups who use other rooms in the Memorial for refreshments during their intermission periods. We still operate under the "no alcohol allowed" policy at the Memorial. This causes some loss of revenue but is something we have to live with for the present time. We get a lot of requests for weddings that we cannot fulfil, because they want to have a "champagne fountain" for the reception following the wedding. Several non-profit organizations have made inquiries about banquets in the dining room and some form of musical event in either the Assembly hall or Auditorium after dinner, but when they find out they cannot have an open bar, they look elsewhere for a facility that will allow them to serve alcohol.

In March of 1995, we did allow the U.S. Department of Defense to have alcohol served in the Memorial at a major diplomatic reception the Secretary of Defense held for the Military Attaches from the various Foreign Embassies in Washington. Permission for this event was obtained directly from the Grand Masters at the Annual Meeting of the association in February 1993.

For two years running we have allowed the First Nighter Group in Alexandria to hold a Non-Alcoholic New Years Party at the Memorial. Seven performances were held during the course of the evening and we had over 4000 people through the building during the evening and ended up with a fireworks display on the front grounds for the enjoyment of everyone in Alexandria.



The Alexandria Symphony played three performances in the Auditorium the week-end before the Grand Master's Conference, this year. They had overflow crowds for every performance. They use the auditorium several times each year.

Bishop Ireton Catholic High School, which is located just West of the Memorial has been using the auditorium for three years now to hold a Symphony by their Orchestra. They have a capacity crowd each year. I personally welcome most of the groups that use our facilities. After this performance started this year, one of the Priests asked to speak to me. He said that he had read somewhere that Masonry was an interdenominational organization, but read in the Brochure that we distribute to our visitors that we have a Christian Chapel in the Building. I informed him that we do accept members from any religious persuasion, provided they have a belief in a supreme being who has control over all of our lives. I told him I felt one of the most outstanding attributes of Masonry was the fact that we are "Tolerant" of all religious beliefs. I explained to him that we are not allowed to discuss a particular religious belief during a meeting of the Lodge because of the many personal beliefs of our members. I asked him if he would like to see the Chapel. His answer was "Oh no, I'm not a Mason!" I explained to him that the chapel is not restricted to Masons and that it's one of the major display rooms on our tour of the Memorial which is seen by over 50,000 people each year. After the program that evening I had the pleasure of taking him and two other priests up to the Chapel which is a recreation of a twelfth century Norman cathedral which is sponsored by the Grand Encampment of Knight's Templar. They had nothing but praise for the beauty of the room, especially the beautiful story told by the four stained glass windows which are the prominent feature of this room. You never know when you're going to make a friend.

In November of this year, the Mother's Against Drunk Driving group will use the dining room for a major fund raising auction of donated articles to benefit the work of their organization. This will be the first event they have held in the Memorial but I think it will become an annual event. When I quoted the compensation we expect from them for the use of this area, which included free parking, they couldn't wait to sign an agreement.

I could go on and on telling you the various non-masonic groups who are using or have scheduled to use our building for an event. Many of those with whom we come into contact, don't know anything about the Masonic Order at all.

I receive some of the most fascinating questions from these people who have heard many, shall I call them, "myths", concerning Freemasonry. I try to answer them as best I can, but to many, I just have to tell them that there's no truth in what they've heard.

Our beautiful Virginia Ritual speaks about the "Enemies of Masonry" in several places. I would just say, don't underestimate the meaning of this



phrase in our work. There are those in today's society who will say anything about us at all, knowing that we will more than likely not take issue with anything they say.

Just west of the Memorial near the Virginia Episcopal Seminary, is a beautiful building which is now the home of the Beth-El Hebrew Congregation. They formerly owned a building in Old Town Alexandria that was damaged by fire. The building had to be torn down because of the extent of the fire damage. They decided to build their new building away from the old town area because of the parking problems they had always experienced. While they were buying a tract of land and in the process of constructing a new Synagogue, the Methodist Congregation, located in Fairlington, allowed them to hold their services in their building until they could move into their new facility.

Each year since this happened, these two congregations get together for a Fellowship Dinner to renew old freindships and make new ones. In 1996 it was the Hebrew Congregation's turn to host this event. A Masonic friend of mine who is a member of this Hebrew Congregation stopped to see me at the Memorial one day. He said he was concerned at the number of young men he knows, works with, socializes with and worships with who have no idea what Freemasonry is all about. Not knowing that he was leading me into a trap, I agreed with him and we discussed many of the things that we are doing at the Memorial to promote Freemasonry to those people who know nothing about it. As you have probably already guessed, I agreed to be the after dinner speaker at the Annual Fellowship Dinner this year. The subject I agreed to speak on was entitled "What Freemasonry has to offer to a young man in today's Society."

On the scheduled evening for the event, I arrived early to meet some of the people in attendance. I was met at the door by my Masonic friend who had made the arrangements for my being there. To my astonishment he escorted me to the reception area where I enjoyed a glass of fine Chardonay Wine. I was also surprised to learn that over 200 people were expected to be in attendance at this event. My throat suddenly became a bit dry, but not from the wine.

Following a delightful dinner, I was introduced by the President of the Men's League of the Hebrew Congregation who proudly stated that he was a 32nd degree mason and how proud he was to welcome me to this event. I did the usual things to open my presentation. I even proposed my toast to the ladies who were present to get the evening started off with some humor.

After telling them some of the things I had prepared about the Memorial and George Washington's involvement in the local Masonic Lodge, I opened the floor to any questions they may have. **I should have known better!**

The first question was "What is Freemasonry?"

I told them Freemasonry, or "Masonry" as it is generally known, is the oldest and largest fraternal organization in the world, a universal society of friends who seek to become better men through their association with one another and their families. It's over 250 years old with traditions dating back some 3,000 years, it is the prototype of most modern fraternal societies and service organizations. I explained to them that in a society whose moral values are being severely tested, Masonry brings men together for fellowship and the promotion of integrity and good citizenship. I reminded them that Masonry requires a belief in God and urges its members to be faithful to their own religious beliefs, but yet, is not a religion.

I was careful to tell them that this doesn't mean that religion plays no part in Masonry -- because it plays a very important part. That a person who wants to become a Mason must have a belief in God. No atheist can ever become a Mason. Meetings open with prayer, and a Mason is taught, as one of the first lessons of Masonry, that one should pray for divine counsel and guidance before starting any important undertaking.

I explained to them that Freemasonry does not tell a person which religion he should practice or how he should practice it. That is between the individual and his God. That is the function of his house of worship, not his fraternity. And Masonry is a fraternity, and not a religion.

I told them it encourages its members and their families to be good citizens and to choose their own best means of political expression, but is not a political organization. That its charitable activities and good works are for the benefit of all humankind, but it is not a benefit society or a welfare institution. I'm still not sure that I answered his questions about "what it is", I think I mainly touched on "what it is not!"

The next question was **"Where and when did Freemasonry start?"**

I explained that because Freemasonry is many centuries old, scholars do not all agree about precisely when and where it began. The most commonly accepted theory is that the origins of Freemasonry reach back to medieval times when the great cathedrals of Europe were built. The stonemasons who created these awe-inspiring Gothic structures formed craft guilds to protect the secrets of their trade, to help one another, and to pass on their knowledge to worthy apprentices. And in 17th century England, these guilds began accepting honorary members, men of learning and position. These new members were not working stonemasons or even associated with the building trades. As "accepted Masons," they eventually grew into a separate organization known as "Free and Accepted Masons."

I told them of the formal organization in England, in 1717, when the first Grand Lodge was formed. I tried to explain to them that a Grand Lodge is an administrative body in charge of Masonry in some geographical area, and that in the United States, there is a Grand Lodge in each state and the District of Columbia. In Canada, there is a Grand Lodge in each province and

that each Grand Lodge has a "Grand Master" as its presiding officer. I informed them that local organizations of Masons are called "Lodges" and that each Lodge has a "Worshipful Master" as its presiding officer.

The next question was **"How did Freemasonry get to America?"**

Not being too sure of my facts, I merely said that in a time when travel was by horseback and sailing ship, Masonry spread with amazing speed. By 1731, when Benjamin Franklin joined the fraternity, there were already several Lodges in the Colonies, and Masonry spread rapidly as America expanded to the West. I did tell them that Masons and Masonry played an important part in the Revolutionary War and an even more important part in the Constitutional Convention and the debates surrounding the ratification of the Bill of Rights.

The next question involved confusion about my **dual use of the word "Lodge."**

I tried to explain that the word "Lodge" means both a group of Masons meeting in some place and also the room or building in which they meet. I told them that Masonic buildings are also usually called "Temples" because much of the symbolism Masonry uses to teach its lessons come from the building of King Solomon's Temple in the Holy Land, and that the term "Lodge" itself comes from the structures which the stonemasons erected against the sides of the cathedrals during construction. In winter, when building had to stop, they lived in these lodges and worked at carving stones.

I informed them that there is some variation in detail from state to state and country to country as to the seating layout in our lodge meeting rooms. But, the focal point of every lodge room is always an altar in the center of the room on which rests a "Volume of the Sacred Law." In the United States and Canada, this is almost always a King James translation of the Holy Bible, which, of course, consists of the old and the new testaments.

The next question was about **how the affairs of a Lodge are managed.**

I explained that the presiding officer of a Lodge is the Worshipful Master. I told them that "Worshipful" is an English term of respect which means the same thing as "Honorable." That he is called the "Master" of the Lodge for the same reason that the leader of an orchestra is called the "Concert Master" or of a Circus is called the "Ring Master." It's simply an older term for "Leader." In other organizations, he would be called the "President." I tried to explain that the Senior and Junior Wardens of a Lodge would then be the First and Second Vice-Presidents. That the Deacons of a Lodge are messengers and the Stewards have charge of banquets and refreshments.

The next question was **"Do you ask people to join?"**

My answer to that question was, "you will not be asked to join," not directly, anyway. And, most importantly, that they shouldn't wait for someone to ask them! I explained: that some men who would like to become Masons, never do because they're unaware that a Mason is not permitted directly to solicit new members; that it's not uncommon to hear a man say that he waited in vain to be invited into the fraternity; that many men are surprised that no one has ever asked them to become a Mason; and that they may even feel that the Masons in their community don't think they're "good enough" to join. But, I assured them, it just doesn't work that way. I advised them that for hundreds of years, Masons have been forbidden to ask others to join the fraternity, that we can talk to friends and family about Masonry. We can tell them about what Masonry does. We can tell them why we enjoy it. But we can't ask, much less pressure, anyone to join.

My explanation for this long standing rule regarding solicitation was that it isn't that we're trying to be exclusive. But becoming a Mason is a very serious thing. I told them that joining a Masonic Lodge is making a permanent commitment in life to live in certain ways. Most importantly, they are: to live with honor and integrity; to be willing to share with and care about others; to trust each other; and to place our ultimate trust in God. I explained that our ancient philosophy is based on the fact that no one should be "talked" into or "invited" into making such a decision.

The next question I received concerned **requirements for membership.**

I explained to them that membership in a Virginia Masonic Lodge is open to men 18 years of age or older. I told them that in most states the minimum age for acceptance is still twenty-one, and that those accepted for membership must be of good character and reputation, and believe in a Supreme Being and the immortality of the soul.

I related that a candidate for membership must first be recommended by two members of a Lodge, but not necessarily members of the Lodge he wishes to join. That his application or "Petition for the Degrees" is read at a meeting and referred to a committee, who interview the applicant, normally in his home, so that the applicant's wife and family may become familiar with the organization and its activities. That after the committee reports back to the Lodge, the signers of the petition have an opportunity to speak on their knowledge of the moral character of the petitioner, and the applicant is then voted on by a secret ballot of the Lodge members and, if accepted, begins the process of becoming a Lodge member.

I told them a Masonic Lodge is not particularly expensive to join or to hold membership in. The total fee to join my Lodge is \$175.00 and our dues are about \$35.00 per year, depending on any Assessments imposed by the Grand Lodge during the year.

I enlightened them concerning the fact the Lodge members may also join Masonically-related organizations outside the Lodge. These groups include

the York Rite, Scottish Rite, Shrine, Grottos, Tall Cedars and many others depending on the personal interests of a member. I told them that many men join a Masonic Lodge and never become members of any of the other Masonic organizations.

I explained that there are also related organizations for women, the most widely known being the Order of the Eastern Star, the Order of the Amaranth and the Ladies Oriental Shrine. Similarly, for young men there is the Order of DeMolay, and for young women in Virginia, the Order of Rainbow and Job's Daughters.

The next questions was "What is the process of becoming a member?"

I told them of the three basic degrees in Masonry; Entered Apprentice, Fellowcraft, and Master Mason, which are conferred at three separate meetings over a period of several weeks or months. That the solemn process is an enlightening and interesting experience for the candidate with no hazing or embarrassing moments. That between meetings he is given further instruction concerning the meaning of the ritualistic ceremony in which he has participated. That he will be asked to memorize some key passages of the ritual before advancing to the next degree, and that a member of the Lodge is assigned to assist each candidate in learning the required ritual work. I explained that this memory work is primarily to acquaint the candidate with what he must know in the future to attend a Masonic Lodge anywhere in the world.

I told them that the only secrets we really have in Freemasonry are the details of the Ritual work used when a candidate is received into our order. I did tell them that the Masonic ritual dramatizes its philosophy of the importance of a moral life by using the tools of ancient stonemasons as symbols to teach these ideals, and that during the ceremony a Mason is taught to build his life and character with the same care and precision that stonemasons used to construct the great cathedrals centuries ago.

The next question was "What do Masons do after they become members?"

I explained that most Masons are dedicated to becoming better men. That like many people, Freemasons try to live in accordance with high moral principles, as all good citizens should. I told them that we don't claim to have a monopoly on these ideals, but that we do join together in lodges to help each other *intensify* our devotion to these values and that it upholds our belief that we are all a part of a Brotherhood of Man under the Fatherhood of God.

I told them that taking part in the work of Masonry reminds its members over and over again of the importance of these qualities. That it lets men associate with other good men of honor and integrity who believe that hon-



esty and compassion and love and trust and knowledge are still important in today's society.

I tried to explain that in some ways, Masonry is a type of support group for men who are trying to make the right decisions in life, and that it's easier to practice these virtues when you know that those around you think they're important too. I believe this is one of the major reasons that Masons enjoy being together.

**Several wanted to know who the people are in Freemasonry.**

I told them that men of every walk of life belong to Masonic Lodges. They may be highly visible as Shriners in costumes, or as lodge members wearing Masonic aprons in civic processions, Masonic funerals, or at special Masonic ceremonies such as the laying of a cornerstone for a public building. That, for example, George Washington presided at the Masonic cornerstone-laying for the United States Capitol in 1793.

I explained that the recognized Masonic fraternity in the United States includes two and one half million members in about 14,000 lodges. There are about four million Masons and more than 100 Grand Lodges worldwide. And in nearly every country in Europe, now emerging from Communist rule, Masonic Grand Lodges are being reactivated after being suppressed for many years.

That George Washington and 13 other Presidents of the United States, as well as 18 Vice Presidents and 35 Justices of the Supreme Court of the United States have been Masons.

That Washington took his first Presidential oath of office on a Bible borrowed from a Masonic Lodge in New York City, and the oath was administered by Chancellor Robert R. Livingston, another Mason and, at the time, Grand Master of Masons in New York.

I gave them a sampling of some famous Masons in various walks of life, then and now:

And many others too numerous to list.

### The next question asked about **Community Involvement**.

My response was that the basic teaching of Freemasonry is charity. That the tradition of its members helping one another and humankind in general is practiced extensively.

I explained that in the United States alone, Freemasons provide over 1-1/2 million dollars a day, year after year, for charitable causes. These dollars go to support scholarships, medical research, hospitals for crippled and burned children and facilities for those who have speech disorders or mental illness. That Masonic groups also help people with serious eye problems and with respiratory difficulties. They also provide retirement homes for members, their wives and widows.

That Masonic volunteers are active in Veteran's Hospitals, sponsor summer camps for children, work with the handicapped and perform many public service activities in their communities. I mentioned that we in Virginia are proud of the fact that we are the largest donors of units of blood to the American Red Cross. Over 30,000 units were donated in 1994.

I spoke of how, in New York, Freemasons created and support the world-renowned Masonic Medical Research Laboratory at Utica, where basic research is conducted by professionals in the areas of heart disease, problems of aging, cancer, hypertension and even blood substitutes.

I told them that when the ideas of liberty, equality and fraternity were novel,...Masonry helped promote them. That Masonic Lodges were in the forefront years ago supporting the establishment of free public schools. George Washington was a member of the Board of Trustees of the first free school in America, and it was located right there in Alexandria.

Following this event everyone I spoke with said they were happy that they finally were able to learn something about the Masons. Several said they had no idea that so many of the famous people I mentioned were active Masons. Brother Paul Bessel, the Librarian at the Memorial, went with me to this particular event and I saw several young men waiting to speak with him as I left the building that evening. I saw faces of genuine interest in the audience that evening.

Doctor David Kruger is the Sovereign Grand Inspector General for the Scottish Rite in Virginia. He and I are members of the same Lodge in Alexandria. He is a member of the Beth-El Hebrew Congregation, but was not in attendance on the evening I spoke, due to a prior commitment. He called me at the Memorial a few weeks later and asked "What did you tell them about Freemasonry at Temple Beth-El?" I explained briefly what I had said and told him of some of the questions I received. He said he had received calls from six friends of his who are members at Beth-El, all wanted petitions for their sons who were present. He said that each of these men told

him nearly the same story. Each of the sons had "in a way" scolded their father for not telling them about the importance of their becoming Masons. All six of these petitions have been turned in and the men are waiting to receive the degrees.

The one thing I learned from this, is that we have to do a better job of letting the general public know who we are and what we stand for. As I welcome any groups of the Memorial now, I make a distinct point of letting them know that no one will ask them to become a Mason. We distribute all of the literature we receive from the Grand Lodges which tell the story "What you need to know about Freemasonry." We appreciate all of the Grand Lodges who so willingly share this literature with us.

Although the Memorial is ideally suited to pass along information about Freemasonry to those who request it, I believe this opportunity is present for many of the Lodges in this country if we will just open our doors for more public and civic events. The problem seems to be that most people don't know we're there and that the Lodge Hall is available for their use.

I look forward to the next few years when we hope to get the Auditorium Air conditioned and have a fully functional Energy Management System to keep our costs down. The citizens of the City of Alexandria know who the Masons are now and that the George Washington Masonic National Memorial was erected by all the masons in this country in memory of its most notable member, George Washington.

I wish that every Masonic Building in this country could be in this position in their community. It will take a lot of work, it won't be easy, but it can be done if we want to take Freemasonry into the Twenty-First Century as a viable force for good in our communities.

### DONALD MAYNARD ROBEY

Donald Maynard Robey was born August 4, 1933, in Alexandria, Virginia, the youngest son of C. Maynard and Laura C. Robey.

He was educated in the Alexandria public school system and graduated from George Washington High School in 1951. He served an Electrical Apprenticeship with the Eugene W. Zimmerman Corp, in Alexandria. In 1965 he became affiliated with the Truland Systems Corporation in Arlington and worked in Field Operations as a Senior Project Manager until 1979 at which time he was transferred to their Engineering Office as a Manager in the Engineering Group. He retired from Truland Systems Corp. in 1993 with twenty-seven years of service.



Brother Robey was married in December 1952 to the former Doris M. Durrett. They have one son, Stephen, and two grandsons.

Donald M. Robey received the degrees in Freemasonry in Alexandria-Washington Lodge No. 22, being raised January 1968. He served that lodge as its Worshipful Master in 1975. His Masonic service includes that of District Instructor of Work, District Deputy Grand Master, and in 1978 was appointed Associate Grand Steward of the Grand Lodge of Virginia.

He holds memberships in both Research Lodges in Virginia and Honorary memberships in ten lodges in Virginia, a lodge in Massachusetts and a lodge in Kentucky.

Other Masonic memberships enjoyed by Brother Robey include the Alexandria Scottish Rite Bodies, Mount Vernon Royal Arch Chapter No. 14, Old Dominion Commandery No. 11, National Sojourners, The Royal Order of Scotland, Martha Washington Chapter No. 42, O.E.S., Red Cross of Constantine, The York Rite College, Tall Cedars of Lebanon, Philalethes Society, and an Honorary member of the Virginia Craftsmen. He serves the Grand Lodge of Valle De Mexico as their Grand Representative.

In 1982, Bro. Robey was nominated for the office of Grand Junior Deacon, to which office he was elected and installed. At the Annual Communication in February of 1987, he was installed as the 143rd Grand Master of Masons in Virginia.

In February 1989, Alexandria-Washington Lodge No. 22 elected him as its representative to the George Washington Masonic National Memorial Association. By virtue of this election, he became a member of the Executive Committee of the Board of Directors of the Association.

Due to his efforts to promote the cause of the International Order of DeMolay, in August of 1993 he was elected an Honorary Member of the International Supreme Council of the Order of DeMolay.

In October 1995, Most Worshipful Donald Robey was coroneted a 33<sup>o</sup> Inspector General Honorary by the Supreme Council, 33<sup>o</sup> for the Southern Jurisdiction of the United States.

Because of Brother Robey's association with the George Washington Masonic National Memorial, at the 1993 Annual Meeting of The George Washington Masonic National Memorial Association, he was elected Executive Secretary-Treasurer. Since assuming this position, many changes have been initiated. The Memorial is now open to any organization to use the facilities provided reimbursement is made for costs incurred. Professionally managed fund raising efforts have been undertaken to pay for the much needed renovation of the building which was erected in the 1920's. A Video Documentary of the Memorial has been completed to promote awareness of the Memorial.

G.M: It is with a great deal of pleasure that I present to you the Josiah Hayden Drummond Medal for your outstanding service to Masonry.

It means a great deal to me and I do appreciate it. Thank you very much.

A brother from Lewy's Island Lodge asked to be recognized and given permission to approach the head table. His request was granted and M.W. Hitchings was presented with gifts from the members of his lodge

M.W. Hitchings accepted the gifts and expressed his gratitude to the members of his lodge for their kindness.

After the announcements were made, the benediction was given by Rev. and Worshipful Brother Edward Fenderson.

It is with sincere regret that I report the deaths of three Grand Lodge Officers

since our last Annual Communication.

### **R.W. HAROLD STUART BAKER**

Rt. Worshipful Harold Stuart Baker was born October 13, 1916, in Bloomfield, New Jersey, and died June 5, 1995 in Williston, Florida.

He was raised to the Sublime Degree of a Master Mason in Riverside Lodge #135, Jefferson, Maine, on June 18, 1947, and served as Worshipful Master in 1953. He also served as Secretary of Riverside Lodge from 1956-1973.

Brother Baker served as D.D. Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of Maine from 1958-1959, and served as Senior Grand Warden in 1964.

He moved to Florida in the 1970's and affiliated with Orman Lodge #117 in Williston, Florida on September 1, 1975, where he continued his dedication to Masonry till his death in 1995.

### **R.W. MERRILL RAYMOND KITTREDGE**

Rt. Worshipful Merrill Raymond Kittredge was born July 21, 1908 at Greenville Junction, Maine, the son of Raymond W. and Nellie Fickett Kittredge. He died on August 14, 1995 in Bangor, Maine.

He received his education in Bangor schools and Gilman Business School. Brother Kittredge was employed by Stickney and Babcock Coal Company from 1933 until 1949, at which time he purchased the Bangor Window Shade and Drapery Company. He operated this Company with the assistance of his son Ronald until his death.

He was raised to the Sublime Degree of a Master Mason December 14, 1931 at St. Andrews Lodge #83 in Bangor, Maine, where he served as Worshipful Master in 1941 and as secretary from 1944-1969.

He served in three Scottish Rite Bodies in Bangor and was a member of the Maine Consistory. He was a member of Anah Temple Shrine and also a member of all York Rite Bodies.

Brother was honored as a 33rd degree member of the Supreme Council of the Scottish Rite. His service to the Grand Lodge of Maine began in 1950 when he served as Grand Senior Deacon and as District Deputy Grand Master in 1951, 52, and 1953. In 1954 he was elected Junior Grand Warden. He received the Josiah Hayden Drummond Distinguished Service Award in 1974.

Surviving are one daughter, Judith A. Carter of Falmouth and one son Ronald J. Kittredge of Brewer; three grandsons, Matthew Carter of Auburn, Alabama, Mark Carter of Baltimore, Maryland and Thomas A. Kittredge of Brewer; one brother Hollis of Freeport.

Funeral Services were held at Brookings-Smith Funeral Home in Bangor with interment in Pine Grove Cemetery in Bangor.

### PAUL LLEWELLYN POWERS

Paul Llewellyn Powers was born in Lisbon, Maine, a son of Frederick and Mattie Powers, and died on December 15, 1995 in Sarasota, Florida.

He attended Lisbon schools and Boston Latin School and Bryant & Stratton Commercial College in Boston, Massachusetts. He also attended the Maine School of Commerce, Portland and graduated from Northeastern University and Boston University School of Law.

M.W. Brother Powers was admitted to the Maine Bar and Massachusetts Bar in 1932 and the U.S. District Court Bar in 1933. He was a member and one-time president of the Cumberland County Bar Association, and a member of the Maine State Bar and the American Bar Association. He was trial justice in Freeport from 1936-1957. In 1934, Brother Powers married Gertrude Bickford who became very active in the Order of the Eastern Star.

From 1933 on, he conducted a general law practice which served Cumberland, Androscoggin, Sagadahoc and Lincoln counties. Along with his very active law practice, Brother Powers was also involved in many civic activities.

He served as moderator of Freeport for many years, was president of the Chamber of Commerce, chairman of the Town Finance Commission, trustee of the local library, chairman of the Boy Scouts and American Red Cross, and president of the Freeport chapter of the American Field Service. He organized and led the movement for the town manager form of government and was chairman of the Freeport Republican Committee for several years.

Brother Powers began his Masonic career when he was made a Master Mason on November 6, 1933 in Freeport Lodge #23 in Freeport, Maine. In 1941, he was elected Worshipful Master of Freeport Lodge. He was made a Royal Arch Mason on January 23, 1952 in Cumberland Chapter #35, Yarmouth. He was made a Royal and Select Master on May 20, 1952 in Portland Commandery #2 held in Portland. He was a member of all the Scottish Rite Bodies and was coronated an honorary member, Sovereign Grand Inspector General, 33rd Degree of the Northern Masonic Jurisdiction, A.S.S.R. M.W. Brother Powers was a member and Potentate of Kora Shrine Temple in Lewiston and a member of Put Stevens Court, Royal Order of Jesters. He was also a Past Patron of Casco Chapter, Order of Eastern Star at Freeport.

His career as a Grand Lodge Officer began with his appointment as District Deputy Grand Master of the 14th Masonic District in 1942-43. He was appointed Grand Steward in 1948-1949 and in 1954 was elected Grand Master



of Masons in Maine. The Josiah Hayden Drummond Medal was presented to M.W. Paul L. Powers by M.W. Aubrey L. Burbank on May 3, 1956.

Brother Powers is survived by his wife of 61 years, Gertrude Bickford Powers of Sarasota (since this report was prepared Mrs. Powers has passed away), four daughters, Dalene McNeely, Stephanie Whitmont, Pamela Christy, and Paula Perron, six grandchildren and four great grandchildren. Memorial services were held at 2 P.M., December 21st, at Pine Shores Presbyterian Church, and there will be a memorial service at Freeport Masonic Lodge #23 in the Spring.

The Grand Lodge of Maine is much richer because of the influence of these three brethren. May they rest in peace forever.

In my travels this year I have found that Lodges are having more candidates and that younger men are becoming officers and working to improve Masonry. This is as it should be. We need these young men to join and take part that we may grow and prosper.

The Committee on Membership have worked diligently and traveled many miles working on Fellowship Nights which have proved successful. From these meetings many applications have been asked for and new Master Masons have been raised.

The Committee on Masonic Education and Lodge Service have been very busy and have produced excellent new materials. They have held many meetings and have assisted not only the District Representatives in their work, but have helped greatly at the Constituent Lodge level to educate the Masters, Wardens, Officers and Brethren. At my suggestion we are using Teamwork and it shows.

### BLOOD BANK PROGRAM

Two years ago I made the commitment to renew the Blood Bank Program



which had become nearly out of existence. I contacted R.W. Edward Emery and he agreed to serve as the State Chairman. Ed has done an outstanding job. He has traveled to many of our District meetings and brought the message to all. Many Districts appointed District Chairmen and some of the Lodges appointed a Lodge Chairman. Thanks to the help of all the Brethren this program is growing with more blood being donated each year. Congratulations to all of you for donating something of yourselves to save the life of another. Remember your blood bank number is on your dues card. Give it to the Red Cross volunteer when you register to donate blood.

### **DISTRICT MEETING**

District Meetings were held in each of the 24 Districts this year. Each of these meetings were semi-public with non-masons, ladies and family invited. I believe it has been an excellent opportunity for non-masons and family to hear our story and gain additional information on who we are and what we stand for. It also seems like a good time to honor ladies with a meal, and an interesting program. They do spend a lot of nights home alone as we attend our Masonic meetings. Each of these District Meetings have been well attended. Many of these meetings had over 100 in attendance with the largest being 165. I would like to thank the District Deputies and District Representatives who in nearly every case provided an excellent program of entertainment. During the last two years at each of the 48 District Meetings I have provided an opportunity for each one of the Elected Officers to speak at these District Meetings and each of them had an excellent message to present. I would like to thank all Present and Past Grand Lodge Officers who supported these meetings. Your being present helped make these meetings a success. I would also like to congratulate my Grand Marshal who made each of these meetings and many others where your Grand Master was received with a suite.

### **SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAMS**

This has been another very successful year for our Scholarship Program. In Maine there are 127 High Schools. Of these schools at least one Five Hundred dollar scholarship was awarded to a Senior going on to higher education. Many lodges furnished their own scholarships, while others took advantage of matching funds with Grand Lodge and each Lodge contributing two hundred and fifty dollars. Since 1988, through your generosity, Brethren, \$500,000.00 has been contributed to the youth of our State to help them further their education. As I have said many times youth are our most important asset. Let's continue to support this worthwhile project.

### **PREVENTION OF DRUG AND ALCOHOL ABUSE AMONG CHILDREN**

This program which was started in 1988 has been an ongoing program with each Grand Master since its inception. Brethren you have faithfully support-

ed this program through the help of Constituent Lodges, Officers Associations and Past District Deputies Associations. Your support to help the youth of our State in saying no to drugs has been overwhelming and you are to be congratulated. This year the Maine Masonic Foundation under the able direction of Past Grand Master Ernest H. Curtis was awarded 77 grants to schools and other support systems totaling \$80,000. Let's continue this support to help our youth during these trying times.

### GRAND LODGE NIGHT

This year Tyrian Lodge #73 of Mechanic Falls was chosen as the Lodge to exemplify the Master Mason Degree for Grand Lodge. This took place on April 12th. This Lodge was carefully chosen by the Grand Lecturer and his staff of Assistant Grand Lecturers. It was a great evening with 34 Present and Past Grand Lodge Officers in the Suite and 65 Brethren on the sidelines making a total of 99 brethren present. The work by Tyrian Lodge was exemplified in a dignified and impressive manner. The Master Mason Lecture was performed in its entirety by the Master in an excellent manner. The Yonder Book charge was also done in an excellent manner. I would like to congratulate the Officers and their dress code. They looked real sharp and their floor work was outstanding. The candidate had an excellent lesson, and I am sure is going to be a great addition to our fraternity. The Grand Lecturer R.W. Louis Greenier was present and 3 of his assistants. As Grand Master I had the privilege of helping with the presentation of the plaque to this outstanding Lodge. All the officers of Tyrian Lodge were presented to the east to receive this award.

### MEMBERSHIP COMMITTEE

As this time I would like to thank the Membership Committee for the many miles they traveled and hours spent on this very worthwhile project. We have seen many men ask for applications and become Master Masons because of these Fellowship Nights that this committee has offered in many Districts throughout the State. This program is working with information made available about what we as Masons do and what we stand for. I know this committee is making a difference in our membership. Congratulations on your efforts.

### VISITATIONS

During the past year your Grand Master has attended 172 Masonic meetings both within and without our Grand Jurisdiction. Some of these are as follows: I attended the Northeast Conference of Grand Masters, Deputy Grand Masters and Grand Secretaries in Massachusetts. This proved to be a successful meeting with a chance to share ideas and programs. The Grand Masters Conference of North America was held at Crystal City outside Washington, D.C. Your Grand Master was honored by serving on the Committee for planning this Conference. At one meeting which was held at the George Washington National Memorial I had the privilege of presenting a check

from Maine to help support this memorial. This has been a wonderful year of growth in the construction of new Lodge Halls in Maine. Grand Lodge rededicated the Corner Stone of the Court House in South Paris on its 100th Anniversary. On August 26th laid the Corner Stone of a new Lodge Hall being constructed by Meridian Splendor Lodge #49 in Newport. On April 13th Grand Lodge dedicated this new Lodge Hall for Meridian Splendor #49 with over 100 people in attendance. On April 20th Grand Lodge laid the Corner Stone of Waterville Lodge #33 in Waterville. On April 27th for the first time in many years the Grand Lodge of Maine was asked to lay the Corner Stone of a Municipal Building of a new Fire House in Boothbay. This was a special day with the Governor and nearly 400 Masons and Non-masons in attendance. Marsh River Lodge #102 has moved into their new Lodge Hall in Brooks which began construction last fall. Several other Lodges are breaking ground this summer for new buildings. I have traveled to an Outdoor Degree in Buckfield where Evening Star Lodge #147 held their Master Mason degree in a quarry. This was a very impressive degree. I attended many receptions for outstanding Masons in their Districts. Grand Lodge Officers Night was held in Searsport at Mariners Lodge #68 under the able direction of R.W. Charles Brown. This was well attended and the work was impressive. International Night was held in St. Stephen, New Brunswick at Sussex Lodge. There were 100 people in attendance. Both the Grand Master of Maine and the Grand Master of New Brunswick were in attendance and many of the Present and Past Grand Lodge Officers from both sides of the "RIVER". This was a wonderful evening to cement fraternal relations between two great countries. I was asked and accepted the invitation to be in the East to exemplify the Master Mason degree in many Lodges. For this I thank each one of you for this honor. On September 9, 1995 a huge parade was held in Bangor to honor the 175th Anniversary of the Grand Lodge of Maine. Your Grand Lodge Officers, many of the Blue Lodges, DeMolay, Rainbow, Eastern Star, Scottish Rite, York Rite and many units from the Shrine marched in this Parade. Following the Parade a banquet was held at Anah Temple. I wish to thank all who helped and attended this occasion. Teamwork makes things happen. This year I attended many Rainbow and DeMolay meetings. Youth are very important to us let's show this support by going to their meetings and make them feel wanted.

### RECOMMENDATION

I would recommend that only non-alcoholic beverages be used for the toasts at Table Lodges.

### CONCLUSION

These past two years have been years that I shall always remember and cherish. I thank you Brethren for the privilege of serving you as your Grand Master. My Brethren we have labored together in the vineyard and through Teamwork have helped Masonry prosper and grow in this Grand Jurisdiction. To my Elected Officers, Appointed Officers and Committee Members, your support and attendance has been outstanding. I have called on many of

you for assistance and you have never failed me. On October 14, 1995 Lewy's Island Lodge #138 honored me with a reception in Princeton. There were 350 in attendance and a wonderful evening was enjoyed by all. The entertainment was Joe Perham, Master of Granite Lodge #182 in West Paris. Thank you Brethren and ladies for traveling those many miles to be with us.

No Grand Session can be a success without the help of the Arrangements Committee, and I would like to compliment the two committees both this year and last year for their able assistance. To the Grand Secretary and Grand Treasurer your advice and assistance have always been there when I asked for it and I thank you. To Lois, Mary and Julie no Grand Master could ask for a better group to work with and keep me on track when I needed it. I have enjoyed the opportunity to work with you.

To the Past Grand Masters, I thank you for being always ready to give council when called upon. Lastly to my wife Charlotte without whose support this Grand Master would not be standing here before you today. I know most of you here today have the same support at home and understand from whence I speak. Brethren we owe a lot to those special ladies let us never forget them.

To each and everyone of you here today and to those who cannot be with us, God Bless you and may health and happiness be with you always.

## GRAND LECTURER'S REPORT

Caribou, Maine

May 2, 1996

TO: The Most Worshipful Grand Master, Officers and Brethren of the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine.

Your Grand Lecturer and the six Assistant Grand Lecturers met three times during the past year for planning purposes. There were seventy-one ritualistic schools conducted by the lecturers in the twenty-four Masonic districts of Maine plus twenty-four non-ritualistic schools. There was no school of instruction in the Fellowcraft Degree held in the tenth district.

This has been a year of uncertainty concerning the Grand Lodge proposal to study the feasibility of preparing, publishing and distributing a written ritual in plain English. Uncertainty as to how this change will alter our role as lecturers and affect the direction we will be taking in our Masonic teachings is a matter of concern to us. ## REPORT OF THE GRAND SECRETARY

To the Grand Lodge of Maine:

Each day brings more interesting thoughts and ideas into the Grand Lodge Office. This indicates that we are making progress in many areas of Masonry. In the Grand Lodge Office this year we've had a new Computer System installed. The installation began last November and the training followed. Lois, Julie and Mary have almost mastered the programs and are working very well with their computers. I'm working at it but have not mastered, nor do I ever see a time that I'll master the programs. Every once in a while I complain because I can't do what I want and exclaim, "If I were using my typewriter, I'd have this done by now."

The next step is to put all the office forms on a disk so we'll be able to send it to the secretaries who have computers that are compatible with ours. That's one of my objectives for this summer. It would work easily and well. The program we're working with is Lotus Pro. In a little while the secretaries will be getting a questionnaire asking about their computers and programs.

Another program that was initiated this year was the Credit Card Program. It was a little shaky at the start; but as time went on, we ironed out some of the problems. Allow me to clear up some of the questions that have arisen. The credit card works like all the other credit cards on the market. It is legitimate and was carefully explored before our Grand Master put it into effect. Each time that the Grand Lodge Credit Card is used, there is a percentage that goes to the Drug and Alcohol Abuse Prevention Program and the Scholarship Program. It works for all of us, and if you're interested in more information, please see me.

We also made great progress with the Secretaries' Workshops this year. I'm happy to report that I ran workshops in Caribou Lodge, Buxton Lodge, Ocean Lodge, Mariner's Lodge, and Rockland Lodge; and have one scheduled at Pleiades Lodge later on this month. For the most part, the workshops were well attended. The interest was high, and the questions and comments were excellent. The host lodges opened their doors for us on Saturday mornings and graciously served coffee, donuts and muffins. I thank them all for their cooperation and for being gracious hosts. For the secretaries who couldn't attend, we can hold workshops throughout the summer if you wish.

Again this year, several secretaries have retired. I wish them well and hope they enjoy their retirement. The new and young secretaries who have taken their places need to know that I'm always happy to talk with them and assist

## DEMOLAY IN MAINE REPORT

In Grand Lodge  
Portland, Maine  
May 7, 1996

Most Worshipful Grand Master, Distinguished Guests, Brethren:

It is with a great deal of pleasure that I bring you this annual report of the Status of DeMolay in Maine. As you heard from our State Master Councilor, the Chapters and State Officers have been, and continue to keep a busy schedule.

I am pleased to report that during the past year, we issued Letters Temporary or temporary charters to two new chapters, one in Ellsworth, the other in Presque Isle, expanding our presence into Eastern and Northern Maine. We continue to have an excellent working relationship with Maine Rainbow, of course the fact that the Grand Worthy Advisor who addressed you earlier is my daughter had absolutely no influence on that at all. Somehow when you get teen aged boys and girls together, they manage to get along quite well, without assistance from us older folks.

Like all of our Masonic Family, membership is not growing as fast as

some would hope, but I like to think that we are concentrating on quality instead of quantity. Our State Officers are excellent examples of the kind of young man that DeMolay takes pride in saying that they are one of ours. Our State Master Councilor, encouraged by his peers across the country and supported by many of your lodges, is pursuing an International Office. That fact in itself is something to be proud of.

These young men need our continuing support and encouragement to accomplish the goals they are setting for themselves. As their Executive Officer, I am probably the toughest person they have to deal with, because I expect near perfection, because I know what they are capable of doing. Sure, some of their hair is a bit longer than ours - mine was a LOT longer than my Dad's when I was 10 or 20 years old, and I heard about it every time I saw him, and yes, some of them do wear earrings - which I suspect is a demonstration of their independence - just as many of us in this room probably have tattoos for the very same reason.

Our State Officers have been invited to perform the Initiatory Degree in Moncton, NB, Canada for the Annual Canadian DeMolay Supreme Council Session. This would be the equivalent of our Grand Lodge Officers performing degree work for the National Convention of Grand Masters. We are extremely proud to be accorded this honor, and we will represent the Maine Masonic Family to the best of our abilities.

Looking into the future, we see several areas for potential DeMolay Chapter development. Wor. Br. Paul Deschambault, who I have recently named as my Assistant Executive Officer, has been contacted by Masons from the Oxford/Norway and Biddeford/Saco area. Last evening I spoke to several brothers from the 5th Masonic District, and we also have a renewed interest in Dexter, which could very well be the impetus to reactivate our first chapter in the State, Maine Chapter, which was originally based in Dover-Foxcroft.

This activity creates a need for regalia, which in today's dollars would cost a new chapter several thousand dollars to outfit. I would request that if your lodge at one time sponsored a DeMolay Chapter and had regalia sitting in a closet some where, please contact me so we can collect it into a common site, and redistribute it to areas where we can make some good use of it. I realize that many lodges contributed a fair amount of money to buy this gear originally, but I would really like to see it being used. And if your lodge ever re-activates the chapter in your town, we'll be sure your original equipment comes back to you.

The plans of your next Grand Master, to incorporate an active committee to promote our Youth Organizations of Rainbow and DeMolay is an exciting prospect. We have already set a goal of our own - that within three years Maine DeMolay will have a Chapter in every community where there is now a Rainbow Assembly. But we can only do that with your help.

I have several questions I would like to pose to the brethren here today, but

some of them are going to be difficult to answer.

How many of you received the latest Maine Mason? That one was easy. Some 28,000 copies of that went out across the entire state of Maine. Now, how many of you read your Maine Mason? That one wasn't too hard either, was it? Now the tough one. On the back page of that issue was a form that asked each recipient of that issue to recommend a young man, aged 13 to 20, for membership into DeMolay, or to send a donation of money that would assist a young man in joining. How many of you know a young man, age 13 - 20? A relative, a friend's relative, a boy from church, your paper boy??? Now the tough question. How many of you sent that form in with at least one name on it? I know how many our national office in Kansas City received, and it is discouraging. You would think that out of 28,000 or more Masons, at least one of them would know a young man who would benefit from, and would be a positive contribution to a local DeMolay Chapter in Maine.

Gentlemen, I will close with a short story. It is an analogy, and our M.W. Grand Secretary would be happy to define analogy to you later, but the analogy compares our Masonic Fraternity to having eggs and ham for breakfast, and the two words - commitment and involvement. When we have eggs and ham for breakfast, we know the chicken was involved in contributing to that plate. We also know that the pig was committed with his contribution of the ham. And together they combine to make a wonderful breakfast. Individually, they really aren't much. Just as our fraternity needs people who are involved, we also need those who are seriously committed to seeing us survive for our sons and grandsons, and the future generations behind them. With all of us working together, assisting each other in all of our efforts, and not worrying so much about ourselves, we will succeed.

### REV. CLOVIS ALVA FRAME

Clovis Alva Frame was born in Salesville, Ohio on July 28, 1914, the son of Ralph E. and Flora Young Frame. He received his Bachelor Degrees in History and Theology in Muskingum College and Boston University; his Master's Degree in History in Ohio University and Case Western Reserve, and majored in Bible and Music at Moody Bible Institute. He was ordained in the United Methodist Church and served in the ministry of that church for fifty years.



He received his commission as Ensign in the U.S. Navy in March of 1942 and two months later married Dorothy M. Carr in Providence, Rhode Island. Their union was blessed with a daughter, Pamela Galda, and two sons, Robert and Bruce. They have two grandchildren.

Clovis attended Chaplain's School at the Norfolk Naval Base and served as Chaplain for twenty years, retiring in 1962 as Commander. His service in World War II was centered largely in the South Pacific with shipboard and hospital duty. He later served at various bases in the United States.

In 1965 the Frames moved to Houlton where Brother Clovis taught History in Ricker College for a period of nine years after which he taught at the University of Maine in Presque Isle.

In 1968 he answered a call to serve as Pastor of the Hodgdon Methodist Church. At that time the church was in serious financial difficulty with attendance at a very low level. He agreed to serve for a token salary and through his efforts and with the assistance of his wife the church was given new life. He continued as Pastor for a period of seventeen years during which time the church prospered and became a vital element in the life of the town.

Brother Frame was raised to the Sublime Degree of Master Mason in St. Paul's Lodge No. 14, F & A.M., in Newport, Rhode Island on August 20, 1945. He affiliated with Monument Lodge No.96 in Houlton on November 12, 1969, and in 1970 was appointed Senior Steward. He continued through the chairs, serving as Master of the lodge in 1975. In 1976 he was appointed District Deputy Grand Master of the First Masonic District, serving capably for two years. He was appointed a Grand Chaplain in the Grand Lodge of Maine in 1973, a position he has filled with the same attributes of care and devotion to duty which have characterized his life's work. He was awarded his Fifty-year Grand Lodge Veteran's Medal on November 8, 1995.

A man of God, Right Worshipful and Reverend Clovis A. Frame has been an inspiration to the members of our Fraternity and a declaration to the world at large that Freemasonry and religion go hand in hand.

R.W. Bro. Clovis A. Frame expressed his sincere gratitude for the recognition bestowed on him and told the brethren that he enjoyed his many years as Grand Chaplain, but because of physical problems he felt it time to retire. He thanked the Grand Master again for the presentation and recognition.

At twelve o'clock the Grand Master called the meeting from labor to refreshment. He made several announcements and asked Wor. Brother Larry Hathorne to give the prayer.

## FIRST DAY P.M. SESSION

The Grand Lodge was called to order at 1:30 p.m. by M.W. Harland S. Hitchings, who asked M.W. Ernest H. Curtis, PGM to introduce Bro. Jason Grant, a member of Ashlar Lodge No. 105, to speak to the Craft about his trip and involvement with Masonry in Germany.

NOTE: Bro. Jason Grant's essay was condensed in order to save time and space.

### MASONRY ACROSS THE WATER: ONE BROTHER'S JOURNEY TO THE GRAND LODGE OF GERMANY, A.F. & A.M.

M.W. Grand Master, R.W. Deputy Grand Master, Grand Officers and Permanent Members of the Grand Lodge, representatives of the several subordinate Lodge of Maine, distinguished guests of the Grand Lodge, Brethren all, I give you my fraternal greetings and also my heartfelt thanks and appreciation that I have this opportunity to share my thoughts and experiences with you at our Annual Communication. I would like to thank M.W. Ernest H. Curtis and the M.W. Grand Master who invited me to this Grand Session.

Imagine if you will, Brethren, the night of your initiation. I'm sure you all have particular memories of the time when you first received light in Masonry. My first step into the Fraternity took place in March 1993. I could hardly have predicted then, that my progress in Masonry would eventually lead me across an ocean where I would have the experience of a lifetime.

A long time dream of mine came true in August 1994 when I traveled to the Federal Republic of Germany to study at the North German Organ Academy with Professor Harald Vogel. I received a J. William Fulbright Commission my senior year at Bates College where I majored in music and minored in German which proved to be an excellent background for my international study.

Before I traveled to Germany, I spent the summer working and preparing myself for the trip which included inquiring about Freemasonry in Germany. I did some research in the Grand Lodge Library and obtained a letter of introduction and a certificate of good standing from the Grand Secretary's Office. The Grand Secretary also gave me some addresses and telephone numbers to call when I arrived at my destination. With this information I was ready to travel in foreign countries.

When I arrived in Bonn, the government seat of Germany, I spent a week in an orientation program, and then continued on to Bavaria for a seven week language course, courtesy of the Fulbright Commission in the beautiful city of Regensburg.



After getting over the initial period of culture shock, I became very excited about finding the lodge and attending some meetings in Regensburg where I would be staying until the end of September. Without the address I could not have found the lodge. From the outside it looked quite like all the other old multi-storied buildings along the city's narrow cobblestone streets. There were no masonic signs to designate the building as a lodge. The only visible identification that it was a lodge were a buzzer and a mailbox marked simply "Lodge." European Masonry is for the most part out of the public eye. It takes a great deal of effort to find the lodge and to attend a meeting in Germany than it does in the United States.

After I found the lodge hall, I telephoned Bro. Guenter Ulshoefer, Secretary of the Lodge "Three Keys-Revealed Light" No. 54 in Regensburg. Bro. Ulshoefer was very friendly, and we spoke for a few minutes, completely in German, which made me feel less like a stranger and more like a fellow countryman. Unfortunately, I didn't attend any meetings in Regensburg because I had to move to Bremen before the Stated Communication began in the fall.

I stayed in Bremen with the Lehmanns, a wonderful host family, for three weeks. Not once in those three weeks did I seek out the lodge hall or contact any of the brethren. It simply was not a priority for me. Masonry would have to wait a while longer.

In mid-October 1996 I made my final move to the tiny village of Uttum in a region known as East Friesland. This would be my home for the next nine months.

My initial mental and emotional reaction to Uttum was "What in God's name am I doing here?" There were no banks, shops, or grocery stores, and certainly no Masonic lodges. As time went on, I learned to appreciate my situation and to overcome the inconveniences of village life.

By the end of October, I felt ready to seek out the Fraternity. I knew that the closest lodge was in the city of Emden, less than ten miles to the south. At the beginning of November, I spoke with Worshipful Bro. Dietmar Riekena, a Past Master of the lodge, "True Loyalty/East Frisian Union" No. 330, AF & AM, in the Orient of Emden. I told him a bit about myself and that I was interested in visiting the lodge. He seemed very pleased by this and asked me what degree I was.

At first I was surprised by this question -- I think most American Masons would be -- but I told him that I was a Master Mason. He told me that they met on Mondays for informal "club night" and their formal meetings were usually on the third Monday of the month. His friendly invitation made me feel that I would be very welcome among them whenever I should visit.

I decided to attend the next Club Night. I traveled by bus to Emden and then continued on foot. Arriving at the address given to me, I found a build-

ing that looked simply like a large, multistored house, which did not surprise me, based on my previous experience in Regensburg, but what did surprise me was the plaque near the entrance facing the street. I saw the square and compasses, the name of the lodge and its date of establishment. No doubt that was the right place. I rang the bell and was greeted by one of the brethren. I introduced myself and he turned and announced to the rest of the brethren "It is our American visitor." I was greeted warmly by all present, and I felt immediately at home among them.

I spoke about why I was living in Uttum and about my Masonic membership in Maine. They in turn spoke about German Masonry and their lodge activity. I was invited to attend their next formal meeting and I heartily agreed. It was a wonderful, if informal, introduction to Masonry within the Grand Lodge of Ancient, Free and Accepted Masons of Germany.

For a more complete understanding of the fraternity in our distant sister jurisdiction, it's necessary to give a brief explanation of German Grand Lodge structure, both past and present. The following is a quote from the article "Enthusiasm and Sacrificial Courage Built the Lodges Anew" by Brother Rolf Appel, from *Humanity: the German Freemason Magazine*, vol 20, no.3,. This is my own translation from the German:

"Because of the many German states in the 18th and 19th centuries, Freemasonry developed variably, both organizationally and ideologically. Until the ban by the National Socialist (Nazi) regime, there were ultimately nine regular and two irregular' Grand Lodges within the German Empire, whose spiritual orientation ranged from the far right Christian Nationalist to the far left Atheist Pacifist. Not quite 80,000 members were organized into approximately 650 lodges ... besides these existed also some quite large lodges not bound to any Grand Lodge, which claimed their own sovereignty.

"Each of these Grand Lodges develop their own ritual system and governed their relations with each other as well as with the Grand Lodges of the world independently."

German Freemasons were not always content with this splintered state of things. No fewer than ten attempts were made to unify the several Grand Lodges between 1790 and 1875. None of these attempts, ranging from Grand Master Associations to a national grand lodge, were long lasting.

After World War II, the remaining German Freemasons endeavored to bring the fraternity back to life in their country which was divided by the British, French, American and the Soviets into four allied occupational zones. Light was brought back to old lodges, and new ones were erected as well. Masonic renewal did not really occur in the Soviet zone, which became East Germany, because the Communists repressed the fraternity as did the Nazis before them. Some of the old Grand Lodges were being revived, but many influential brethren dreamed of a more unified structure to govern these once independent masonic entities. The end result was not the dissolution of

of the old grand lodges, but the creation of a central body to govern the whole, the United Grand Lodge of Germany, which was consecrated on June 19, 1949.

Today, the United Grand Lodges of Germany, Brotherhood of Freemasons has its headquarters in Berlin, where it is composed of five grand lodges. The largest of these is the Grand Lodge of Ancient, Free and Accepted Masons of Germany with its headquarters in Bonn. This grand lodge corresponds most directly to our own, and the lodge in Emden is one of its subordinates. The other four include the Grand Land Lodge of Freemasons of Germany, also known as the Order of Freemasons, which confers Christian degrees in addition to the three Craft Degrees; the Grand National Mother Lodge of the Three Globes, the American Canadian Grand Lodge, AF & AM, and the Grand Lodge of British Freemasons in Germany. These last two are English speaking and are composed mainly of military personnel stationed in Germany. Unlike the pre-war, pre-Nazi era, these several grand lodges work together in harmony and all international matters, such as correspondence and the granting of recognition to other grand lodges, are governed centrally by the United Grand Lodge of Germany.

I now turn to more localized history, specifically, the history of Freemasonry in Emden. The first lodge there was officially opened in 1763, during the reign of that illustrious monarch, patron of music and masonic brother, Frederick the Great of Prussia. This lodge was named "Pax et Concordia" and was composed mainly of brethren who were officers of the Courbiere Battalion stationed in Emden during the war of 1756-1763. Documentation about this lodge is insufficient. The only proof of its existence is the original charter of 1763, which hangs in the present lodge hall. It is unknown even where they held their meetings. A new lodge, however, was opened in 1789, called "True Loyalty," and was composed of some of the original members of Pax et Concordia Lodge. This lodge remained in operation until 1841. In that same year East Frisian Union Lodge was founded in the city of Aurich, and in 1850 relocated in Emden. In 1928 True Loyalty Lodge was reactivated and both lodges continued their labors until 1935, when Adolf Hitler's Nazi regime put an end to Freemasonry in Germany.

Masonic labor resumed in Emden in 1946 when brethren from the two former lodges consolidated to form True Loyalty/East Frisian Union Lodge No. 330. Today there are approximately 21,000 brethren working in about 475 lodges in Germany, compared with the pre 1935 figures of 80,000 brethren in 650 lodges.

One of my most cherished memories of my stay in Germany was the night I first attended a formal meeting of the Emden Lodge, two weeks after my first Club Night. The purpose of this meeting was to hold the annual Lodge of Mourning. I looked forward to the occasion and to the many surprises that surely awaited me. We all enjoyed a few minutes of fellowship before the opening, and then I was taken aside by the Junior Warden, Bro. Wilhelm Krautwurst, for the purpose of examination in the entered Appren-

tice Degree.

Bro. Krautwurst asked me if I was familiar with German ritual. I was not, but I told him that I knew Maine Ritual. He then requested me to ask myself the questions and give the answers from the Entered Apprentice lecture, in English, and that would be sufficient, since he knew enough English to follow what I would say. I then found myself in a very strange situation ... a Maine Mason, being examined for the first time anywhere, sitting in a German lodge, unfamiliar with German ritual, and examining myself in English. I blanked out for a moment, and couldn't remember a single thing!

It was such a relief when I finally recalled the first question, "From whence came you as an Entered Apprentice?" He then examined me for the sign, word and grip.

The modes of recognition in the various degrees remain essentially the same in both jurisdictions, except that they may differ in the order they are given. Our dueguard is nonexistent there. German Masons salute with the sign.

Next I found that I had left a very important item of regalia back home ... my apron, thinking that visitor's aprons would be provided. I learned that German Masons bring their aprons and white gloves with them whenever and wherever they go to lodge. I still remember Bro. Ulrich Gemmer rummaging around to find an apron for me to wear. Our German brethren wear white gloves from the time they are initiated as Entered Apprentices.

At first I felt embarrassed, but the brethren were understanding when I explained our particular customs concerning aprons and gloves. My advice to any Mason traveling abroad is, as one English brother said to me, "Bring your gear."

At last I approached the door of the lodge, gave the password to the Tyler, and took a seat among the brethren for the opening ceremony. As I looked about the room I knew that I was truly in a foreign jurisdiction. It was unmistakably a lodge room, but notably different than the ones in my home state. The altar is not located in the center of the lodge. It is found in the East, directly in front of the Master. The carpet, upon which are delineated the symbols and emblems of the first and second degree occupies the center position. Around the carpet stand the three tapers, which in Emden are fashioned as the three great pillars of Wisdom, Strength and Beauty. I was very surprised by the line of officers and where they sat. For example, the Master sits in the Oriental Chair, as usual, but the two Wardens sit in the West. The Deacons are practically disposable, quite optional officers, and there are no Stewards, no Chaplain, and no Marshal. The Master of Ceremonies, who could be described as a combination Senior Deacon/Marshal, compensates for this apparent "downsizing."

The ritual is, for the most part, not done from memory. It's read. The Master and Wardens have desks with lamps arranged to conceal their books and it works quite well.

The time requirements for advancement from one degree to the next do not progress speedily. Once a brother has been initiated as an Entered Apprentice, he must wait one year before he is passed to the Degree of a Fellowcraft. It isn't just a matter of time and learning a portion of the lesson. The initiated brother must be an active participant in the lodge meetings and activities. He must also address the lodge with an original lecture on a topic of his choosing. When deemed ready to advance, the brother is passed and must serve for a year as a Fellowcraft. He must continue to be active in the lodge, and must visit three other lodges during that year. Finally, he may be raised to the Sublime Degree of a Master Mason.

The Master Mason Degree is the pinnacle, the crowning of the degrees of what the Germans call blue Masonry. The Entered Apprentice Degree is the foundation upon which all else is based. Entered apprentices are full members of their lodges. Business and balloting take place in the first degree, as well as the installation of officers, The Lodge of Mourning, and the reception of the Grand Master. In fact, the Grand Master cannot be received in any other degree. He is not even acknowledged as such in a Master Mason's Lodge. Lodges are opened in the second and third degrees only when conferring the same.

Another interesting ceremony which is opened on the First Degree is the Ritual of Affiliation. In America, affiliation is a matter of applying, balloting and signing the by-laws. In Germany affiliation is essentially degree work. I found this out personally on May 15, 1995 when I became a member of True Loyalty/East Frisian Union Lodge No. 330. I'm proud to be the only Mason in the United States who wears an Emden membership jewel. As a token of my appreciation that evening, I presented a Grand Lodge of Maine 175th Anniversary Medal to the Master of my new lodge, Wor. Hans-Joachim Schuetzeck. He wore it proudly on his lapel for the remainder of 1995, and it is now displayed in the lodge's curio cabinet.

The fraternity in Germany is active, especially in bringing back the light where it had been extinguished during darker times. Lodges are being reactivated in the former East Germany and new ones are being chartered with many brethren from the West serving as temporary officers.

In July of 1995, a lodge in Lithuania was consecrated by the Grand Lodge of Ancient, Free, and Accepted Masons of Germany, and there is a second lodge there under dispensation. Efforts are now being made to open lodges in Latvia, where, as in Lithuania, Masonry has been suppressed under the late Communist regime. The fraternity in Europe is on the move.

I left Germany at the end of July 1995, but I carried a treasure trove of memories and warm feelings back home with me. I have kept in touch with True Loyalty/East Frisian Union Lodge, on behalf of Ashlar Lodge, and they have reciprocated. I hope that such friendly relations continue between my Auburn and Emden Lodges far into the unseen future, and I look forward to the time I can extend the hand of Brotherhood to one of the brethren from



oversees who may knock at the door of my lodge.

Brethren, I am truly glad that you have journeyed with me in your minds as I have recounted some of the things I experienced during the most exciting year of my Masonic life which began barely three years ago. I sincerely hope that many of you will one day have the chance to greet brethren from other nations upon the five points of fellowship, that fellowship which transcends all national boundaries, language barriers, political opinions, religious convictions, and racial distinctions. With light shining upon us, we would recognize each other, wheresoever dispersed, as Masons who adhere to the tenets of our profession, and who gladly proclaim with one accord, "Behold! how good and how pleasant it is for brethren to dwell together in unity!"

### **GRAND LODGE OF MAINE CHARITABLE FOUNDATION COMMITTEE ON DISTRIBUTION REPORT TO THE TRUSTEES, FISCAL YEAR ENDING MARCH 31, 1996**

The Committee on Distribution is pleased to report distributions relief totaling \$78,028.43 to 37 recipients this past year. We have the resources to help many more people than we do, and we encourage lodge Masters and Secretaries to take the time to submit an application whenever there is an older brother or a widow with limited resources and an unexpected financial obstacle.

We received applications where there were enormous medical bills and immediate needs just to survive. We do not have the resources to respond to large, uninsured medical expenses. We do have the means to help people meet the immediate demands of keeping food on the table, fuel in the tank, and a roof over a family's head. In addition, we try to cover expenses that are not covered by insurance. For example, we have helped with transportation expenses for a brother who had to travel some distance three times a week for dialysis. We helped in another situation where it was necessary for the recipient and his brother to travel to Boston three times; first for tests, then for pre-op preparation and finally for a bone marrow transplant where the recipient's brother was also the bone marrow donor. There are many expenses that even comprehensive health insurance does not cover.

We do not have the resources to provide a continuing income supplement. In each case, we try to find some single item or expense where we can help and where the recipients can point and say, "The Masons helped me by paying for this".

I cannot end this report without saying that we are plagued by incomplete applications. We rely entirely on the information provided in the applica-

tion and what the lodge Secretary or Master adds in a telephone conversation. We are able to respond to complete applications with accompanying bills faster than we can respond to incomplete applications.

This past year, in addition to responding to applications for individual relief the Foundation has made contributions as follows

The Grand Master requested a report from the Credentials Committee and Brother Arthur O. Nelson gave the following oral report:

### REPORT OF THE CREDENTIALS COMMITTEE:

In Grand Lodge  
Portland, Maine  
May 7, 1996

There are 181 lodges represented; 181 lodges give us delegates of 543 votes; we have 70 Grand Lodge Officers; there are 70 more votes. We have 46 permanent members. The total for these figures is 659. There are five dual memberships subtracted and this leaves us with a net vote of 654. Today we have with us 66 Grand Representatives. Lodges not represented are thirteen which is a very good report over last year. Last year we had twenty-two lodges not represented. Most Worshipful, I would be pleased to read off the numbers of the lodges that are not here today. (G.M. granted permission to read just the numbers of the lodges.) The lodge numbers are as follows: 43, 56, 70, 74, 79, 101, 124, 131, 145, 160, 185, 188 and 189. Thirteen Lodges not represented.

Most Worshipful Grand Master, I move that this report of the Grand Lodge Credentials Committee be accepted. The motion was seconded and passed.

G.M.: Brother Grand Marshal, you will present Br. Raymond J. McLellan to the East please. The Grand Master greeted R. W. Brother Raymond J. McLellan and read the following biography previous to the presentation of the Greenleaf Medal.

### RAYMOND JORDAN MCLELLAN

Raymond Jordan McLellan was born in Windham, Maine, on October 31, 1939, a son of Horace Jordan McLellan and Thelma Mae Pugsley-Spearin McLellan. He attended Windham schools and graduated from Windham High School in 1958. In September of that year, he entered the Apprentice Program at Bath Iron Works Corporation and graduated in 1963. He was promoted to Planner/Estimator in 1965 and maintained various positions with the company, retiring in April of 1995.

On July 21, 1962, he was united in marriage with Lois N. Smith of Standish, Maine. They have one daughter, Linda Rae. His family also consists of one brother and three sisters.

He is a member of The First Congregational Church of Yarmouth, Maine and has served on the Board of Trustees, Diaconate, and as Moderator.

Ray was raised to the Sublime Degree of Master Mason in Casco Lodge No. 36 in Yarmouth on November 17, 1964, serving as Worshipful Master in

1972. He has assisted his lodge in many capacities, for which he received The Builders Trowel Award in 1979. He was awarded an honorary membership in Presumpscot Lodge No. 127 in Windham in 1993. He was a regular blood donor for his lodge for several years until he became medically unable to donate.

Brother Ray served as secretary of the 17th District Master's and Warden's Association from 1971-1973 and honored as their "Mason of the Year" in 1973. He was appointed District Deputy Grand Master of that district in May 1992.

Exalted in Cumberland Chapter No 35, Yarmouth, October 13, 1965, he served as High Priest in 1972, 1981, 1983, 1984 and 1986. He has served as secretary since 1987. Appointed Grand Principal Sojourner in May of 1986, he also served the Grand Chapter as Degree Master of The Grand Chapter Degree Team until 1994. He served as District Deputy from April 1988 until May 1991, was elected Scribe at the Convocation, Deputy Grand High Priest on April 30, 1994, and Grand High Priest on April 29, 1995.

He was greeted in Portland Council No. 4 on February 3, 1976, served as Illustrious Master in 1981/1982 and continues to support that body in the role of Jeremiah.

Knighted in Portland Commandery No. 2 on January 4, 1973, he served as Commander in 1980 and presently serves as Prelate.

R.W. McLellan is a member of Maine Council Order of High Priesthood; Past Officers Association, Maine No. 1; Maine Council Order of Thrice Illustrious Masters; Pine Tree Priory No. 65, Knights of the York Cross of Honor; an officer of Eusebius Conclave No. 3, Knights of the Red Cross of Constantine; a member of Kora Temple A.A.O.N.M.S. as well as Past President and Past Degree Master of the Kora Craftsman Club; Past President of the Merrymeeting Shrine Club; Past President and Past Degree Master of the Bath Iron Works "Brothers in Work" Degree Team.

In Scottish Rite, he received the degrees in the Valley of Portland and Maine Consistory 32nd degree in 1982, and is presently serving as Deputy of Yates Lodge of Perfection as well as Joshua in the cast of the 16th degree. He is chairman of the Membership Committee and Co-chairman of the Family Life Program.

He is a member and Past Worthy Patron of Winnegance Chapter No. 119, O.E. S. in Yarmouth.

On the lighter side, Ray has been chief cook and biscuit baker at the monthly Casco Lodge public baked bean suppers for more than thirty years. His enjoyment of cooking and willingness to work has added up to many hours in lodge kitchens. He also enjoys fishing, hunting and gardening.

Bro. Ray, in appreciation for all the work and all the things you've done for Masonry, it is my honor and privilege to present you the Simon Greenleaf Medal.

R.W. McLELLAN: Most Worshipful Grand Master, Brethren all, there are times in one's life when you become very humble and this is the moment. Most Worshipful, I thank you for this award and for what little I've done for Masonry, I've received a lot more in return. I feel very honored. Thank you very much.

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine A.F. & A.M:

The Committee on Amendments to the Constitution has considered the Amendments proposed at the 176th Annual Communication in Orono,

Maine, May 2, 1995 and as printed in the 1995 Grand Lodge Proceedings on pages 1312 and 1313.

I move these amendments be removed from the table, read and voted upon individually.

1. Proposed:

Amend Section 135 of the Constitution to read: A brother may be an active member of more than one lodge within the jurisdiction of this Grand Lodge.

He may hold office in each lodge to which he is a regular member according to the by-laws of each said lodge.

The Committee recommends that the amendment be adopted.

I move that the report be accepted and the recommendations adopted.

2. Proposed:

Moved that the Ritual Committee pursuant to Section 36, Paragraph 14, study and consider the feasibility of preparing, publishing and distributing a ritual in plain English except for those sections dealing in the obligation, words and grips dealing with the modes of recognition.

The Committee recommends that the amendment be adopted.

I move that the report be accepted and the recommendations adopted.

3. Proposed:

Moved the following amendment to section 2 of the constitution entitled Officers and Members-rank and title by inserting following the words Right Worshipful District Deputy Grand Masters - Very Worshipful District Representatives.

The Committee recommends that the amendment be adopted.

I move that the report be accepted and the recommendations adopted.

4. Proposed:

64. Resolved, that when a member is demitted, suspended or expelled from his lodge, that the secretary of his lodge notify the secretaries of all concordant and appendant bodies of his standing.

The Committee recommends that the amendment be adopted.

I move that the report be accepted and the recommendations adopted.

5. Proposed:

65. Resolved, that when an application for membership is presented to a prospective member he will receive a copy of the brochure MAINE FREE-MASONRY attached to the application.

The Committee recommends that the amendment be adopted.

I move that the report be accepted and the recommendation adopted.

6. Proposed:

Any two or more lodges in the same Masonic District may share concurrent jurisdiction with each other after certification to the Grand Secretary that they have voted to do so at an Annual Meeting after notice of their members. Any lodges sharing concurrent jurisdiction with another lodge or lodges as provided herein may vote to terminate concurrent jurisdiction by the same method.

The Committee recommends that the amendment be adopted.

I move that the report be accepted and the recommendations adopted.

7. Proposed:

Section 36, subsection 10A (Replace paragraph three with the following: "The Grand Master shall appoint District Education Representatives for one year terms, taking into consideration recommendations made by the Committee. The committee shall forward to the Grand Master its recommendations by January 1, each year.")

The Committee recommends that the amendment be adopted.

I move that the report be accepted and the recommendations adopted.

8. Proposed:

Moved that it be the general policy of this Grand Lodge that when we have Fraternal Relations with another Grand Lodge, and when that Grand Lodge recognized Prince Hall Masonry as regular in its own jurisdiction, then we should also take steps to recognize Prince Hall Masonry in that jurisdiction to the same extent.

And I further move that the Committee on Fraternal Relations report to us next year and annually thereafter on the status of Prince Hall recognitions in other Grand Jurisdictions with whom we have Fraternal Relations.

The Committee recommends that the amendment be adopted.

7th PROPOSAL The Committee on Masonic Education proposes the names for District Representatives and Grand Master makes final selection. Some discussion followed with clarification. Passed.

8th PROPOSAL Recognize the Grand Lodges that recognizes Prince Hall Masonry. There was need for clarification on this proposal and much discussion followed. A motion was made to table the proposal. Passed to table.

Proposal to change the Constitution section that deals with changing the amount of the fine for late returns and membership printouts. *There was a great deal of loud discussion and opposition to the proposal.* The motion was defeated.

The Grand Secretary read a proposal to change the meeting times for the Advisory Council. This is a standing regulation and takes effect immediately. The motion was passed.

Thanks to you brethren, our Masonic Scholarship Program continues to grow; continues to make a real difference in the lives of the young men and women who will soon be making decisions that will affect our local communities, and the entire world.

Thanks to you brethren, the Masons of Maine gave a minimum of 182

Scholarships during 1995. We say minimum because there are many lodges who go quietly about their business of aiding youth with financial assistance to ease the cost of higher education.

We know specifically of 182 - \$500. scholarships. They break down as follows:

There were 29 fully funded Grand Lodge Scholarships.

There were 117 - \$250/\$250 matching scholarships funded by individual lodges and the Grand Lodge.

There were 36 independent scholarships reported, making the 182 total. We know, unofficially, of many more.

This year's numerical loss is 603 the percentage being 2.06%.

At the close of the calendar year, the total membership was 29,150. Forty-four lodges reported a gain in membership, 132 a loss and 19 remained the same.

Hiram Lodge No. 180 remains the largest, with a membership of 560, Naskeag Lodge No. 171 remains the smallest with 44 members. Three lodges, Tuscan #106, Greenleaf #117 and Ocean #142 tied for the number reporting the largest gains with six. Hiram No. 180 suffered the greatest loss (24). Average membership is 151 and 64 lodges reported fewer than 100 members.

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine:

The Committee on the Condition of the Fraternity has reviewed the annual reports of the District Deputy Grand Masters of the twenty four [24] Masonic Districts of this Grand Jurisdiction. We have also studied the Form 1 and Form 1A reports of the individual lodges in each District. Although there were three lodges which were not inspected due to bad weather conditions or other problems, we did find adequate information to assess the condition of the fraternity.

### CONDITION

Once again, we reviewed the information concerning the six criteria contained in the lodge reports which deal with G.L. programs and made the following observations: Only 38% of the lodges have a Care and Share Program; this seems to be a very low figure considering how many elderly Brethren and Widows we have. Over 80% of the lodges report that they support Youth Activities, hold Special Events, or are involved in them within their district, and provide for some Publicity. These figures are very positive, however, some of these activities are limited. Many lodges provide monetary donations but no other support for youth organizations and most of the publicity which is reported by the lodges is based on their scholarship and the publicity from that is generally very limited. We still find that only one third of the lodges are participating in the Lodge Leadership Development Program. The number of lodges that have a Non-Payment of Dues Committee has increased slightly to 35 percent.

The reports of the District Deputies paint a very positive picture of many lodges which are active and seem to be trying new and interesting programs. They also report a number of concerns which need to be addressed. Poor attendance at the Schools of Instruction is one of the major concerns and generally, the newer line officers, who need these schools are not attending. Several recommendations for change have been made. It is clear that lodges are having a problem with getting new officers to fill the chairs, as evidenced by the fact that forty five [45] percent of the lodges have five [5] or more Past Masters in the chairs. Candidate education, membership and a lack of knowledge of the Constitution and Standing Regulations are other concerns which have been expressed in the reports of the District Deputies.

There are a number of excellent programs which have been developed by Grand Lodge Committees. We believe that more utilization of these programs by our lodges could prove beneficial.

There are still a few lodges which are in trouble and some that are considering mergers with neighboring lodges. In some of our cities, it has become evident that membership trends no longer support the same number of lodges as in the past. The condition of Masonic buildings throughout the state is good. A few lodge halls have been lost to fire and are being rebuilt. Some older and larger buildings are being sold and new, smaller buildings being constructed.

### LODGE RATINGS

The following table shows the ratings given to lodges at their annual inspections for the past three years. Overall, the ratings show that a lot of good work is still being done by our lodges. However, the increase in excellent ratings is shadowed by a decrease in the remaining categories.

### DDGM REPORTS

Once again, we wish to highly commend the District Deputy Grand Masters for the quality of their annual reports. They are in the best position to evaluate the condition of the fraternity and this they do very well. They report positively but candidly and they provide recommendations which appear to have significant merit. They also attest to the valuable work which is being done by the District Representatives and the Assistant Grand Lecturers. It is important to note that the concerns which have been expressed about our Schools of Instruction do not reflect a problem with the quality of their work. As always, we found it difficult to select the most outstanding reports of the District Deputies. After careful consideration, we find that the annual reports from the 5th, 6th, 14th, 17th, 18th and 20th Districts are truly outstanding.

### CONCLUSION

We find the condition of the fraternity to be generally in good shape with many talented, intelligent and dedicated Masons working very hard to improve upon our programs and activities in order to meet the needs of a rapidly changing society. A great deal of good Masonry is being practiced in all parts of our beautiful state and we believe that this fraternity will meet the challenges which lie ahead. Our Lodges need to be more proactive in promoting Freemasonry through the enlightenment of the public as to the good works of our Fraternity.



We propose that the recommendations of the District Deputy Grand Masters be referred to the appropriate Grand Lodge Committees for their serious consideration. The District Deputy Grand Master of the Seventh Masonic District has included a poem in his report which should be referred to the Committee on Masonic Education and Lodge Services. It is a very good poem and we believe that it could be a valuable tool for their use. It should be read by every lodge officer of every Lodge of this Grand Jurisdiction.

### THE ANNUAL REPORT OF THE GRAND LODGE COMMITTEE ON THE HISTORY OF MASONRY IN MAINE AS OF MARCH 12, 1996

In Grand Lodge  
May 8, 1996  
Portland, Maine

Your Committee wishes to acknowledge with grateful appreciation, those lodges that are current with their lodge histories. Perhaps you might consider, as a lodge project on a one time basis, helping a neighboring lodge that is seriously delinquent with their lodge history.

We regret to report that the unfavorable trend, which has steadily crept upward in recent years, continues at an alarming rate. The number of years owed is up from 781 last year to 817 this year. The number of lodges current dropped from 60 last year to 56 this year. The number of years of history owed varies from 1 to 29 years, with 19 lodges owing 10 or more years, and 16 others owe 9 years each. The fact that records of lodge histories were checked earlier this year than in previous years will account in small part for some increase. However, we would remind you that the cutoff date by which lodge histories must be in Grand Lodge is March 1, and this report is due in Grand Lodge before April 1. Please keep these dates in mind for next year's reports.

Brethren, it is the fervent hope of this committee that the deplorable situation clearly shown by the disturbing statistics of this report will serve to impel to action those lodges guilty of neglecting their sworn and sacred duty to "strictly comply with the Constitution and Regulations of the Most

Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine." If your lodge is among those listed below as owing an excessive number of years of lodge history to Grand Lodge, your attention is respectfully invited to S.R. 2, and Standing Committees, Rev. 94, Para. 4, Sec. 36, of the Constitutions and Regulations of the Grand Lodge of Maine, for your guidance and compliance. D.D.G.M.s, District Representatives, and this committee are ready to assist you in any way necessary to begin correcting this ever worsening problem. One fact looms clear! We must begin now! Lodges with 10 or more years of unreported history may already be too late to recover valuable historical data. Brethren, this situation is approaching a crisis, and we urge you to give this important area of our duty and masonic obligation your earliest attention upon your return to your lodge. Only you can begin to preserve for future generations the very heart and soul of the life of your lodge as it was actually lived.

Brethren, records have been carefully examined to try and make this report as accurate as possible. If you have any questions, please bring them to our attention. Members of this committee will be at Grand Lodge on May 7th and 8th, and will gladly assist you in any way possible should you so desire. These are your records. Feel free to check them while you are at Grand Lodge.

## FRATERNAL RELATIONS REPORT

In Grand Lodge  
Portland, Maine  
May 8, 1996

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine, AF&AM:

The subject to be covered in this report is closely connected with Masonic history, covering a period of better than two hundred years.

The Constitution of the Grand Lodge of Maine in Section 36 describes the duties of the Standing Committees, including paragraph 8, which concerns the Committee on Fraternal Relations, which is charged with making recommendations in cases where other Grand Jurisdictions ask fraternal recognition by this Grand Lodge.

While this sounds like a fairly simple process, it can become involved in all sorts of customs, practices, codes, injured feelings, etc., some of which must be explained briefly to fit them into place.

Maine has been fortunate in having MW Josiah H. Drummond as Chairman of the Committee for some 38 years and MW Ralph Pollard for 25 years. Bro. Pollard served with distinction, and was accorded both national and international recognition. He left a good deal of guidance in resolving some of the more difficult issues involving fraternal relations, which he liked to call "Masonic foreign policy", and leaving Maine with a strong reputation in the field.

After simmering on the back burner for over two centuries, a matter which has come to be known as Prince Hall Masonry emerged in 1989, and has received considerable attention since then.

### BACKGROUND

On September 29, 1784, a charter was issued by the Grand Lodge of England (Moderns) to a group of men in Boston, Mass., to form a Lodge to be known as African Lodge No. 459. Brother Hall whose first name was Prince was one of the charter members. Incidentally, Bro. Drummond mentioned the delivery of this charter in his "History of Portland Lodge No. 1".

Having received the charter, records show that African Lodge was in fairly frequent contact with the Grand Secretary's office in London until the early 19th century. After 1802 however, the records show no further contact.

Since 1751, there had been two fiercely competitive Grand Lodges in England, known as the "Moderns" and the "Ancients" both of which had established Provincial Grand Lodges in Boston, and had chartered Lodges in America, as had Scotland.

The Revolutionary War caused the American Lodges to sever relations with their British parent Grand Lodges, and after some interim moves, they formed their own Grand Lodges, one of which is now the Grand Lodge of Massachusetts.

African Lodge was not acknowledged however, and did not become a part of the new Massachusetts Grand Lodge. Not many years later in 1813, the two British Grand Lodges merged, and formed the United Grand Lodge of England.

Having lost contact with African Lodge No. 459 for some time, it was omitted from the rolls of this new Grand Lodge also, but was not formally erased.

Finding itself out in the cold, African Lodge made the decision to declare itself an independent Grand Lodge in 1827, adopting the name "Prince Hall". It later chartered other Lodges, which eventually became Grand Lodges, until today there are some 44 of these descendants of this Massachusetts Prince Hall Grand Lodge, with a membership of approximately 300,000.

For the better part of two centuries, the Grand Lodge of what might be called regular Masonry and those of Prince Hall Masonry have been pursuing separate but parallel courses. One of the major causes for this division has been the question of the regularity of origin of the Prince Hall Grand Lodges, this being one of the principal factors in the fraternal recognition process among Grand Lodges.

In 1988, the Prince Hall Grand Lodge of Massachusetts applied to the United Grand Lodge of England to recognize its regularity, which was denied at the time. This application and the circumstances involved were carefully reviewed for over three years however, and in November, 1994, the conclusion was reached that while there were irregularities in the formation of Prince Hall Grand Lodges, there were other Grand Lodges which were also organized under less than regular circumstances, and standards then prevailing, the formation of the Prince Hall Grand Lodge of Massachusetts could have been seen as merely eccentric, and of acceptable regularity. The review concluded that... the philosophy of Prince Hall Masonry today, is exemplary."

This recommendation made by the Board of General Purposes was approved by the United Grand Lodge of England on December 14, 1995, and thus the Prince Hall Grand Lodge of Massachusetts and its descendants have a claim to regularity of origin.

It should be remembered that Prince Hall Grand Lodges are independent from

each other, as are all other Grand Lodges elsewhere. Each is free to apply for recognition to any other Grand Lodge it may choose, or may decline to do so for reasons of its own.

In its report of the examination of the Prince Hall matter, the United Grand Lodge of England points out that recognition is a series of bi-lateral relationships between Grand Lodges, and should they extend recognition to each other, the mutual recognition between them cannot bind a third Grand Lodge.

This brings us to the purpose of this report!

Some time ago, the Prince Hall Grand Lodge, F & AM of Connecticut requested recognition by the Grand Lodge of Maine AF & AM. At the time the request was received, there were a few unresolved matters which have now been settled.

After thorough review and conversation with the Fraternal Relations Committee of the Prince Hall Grand Lodge, F & AM, your Committee on Fraternal Relations recommends that the Prince Hall Grand Lodge of Connecticut, F & AM be accepted as regular, and be recognized as such by the Grand Lodge of Maine, with rights of visitation, appointment of Grand Representatives and exchange of information.

## MASONIC EDUCATION & LODGE SERVICE ANNUAL REPORT

In Grand Lodge

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine:

This has been another year of growth and change for this Committee. We have continued to work toward goals we set forth last year and have set new goals as well.

One highly important task has been to enhance the training of our District Representatives. This was accomplished through a number of training seminars, held both regionally and statewide. Attendance has been very good, and we hope in the future to reach all twenty-four of our Representatives. Those Representatives who did attend have told us that they were much better prepared to meet the needs of the craft. One indication of the success of this endeavor was the record number of recommendations for the Raymond Rideout Award presented for excellence in Masonic Education. It is the wish of the Committee that ALL Lodges in this Grand Jurisdiction make use of the tremendous resource available to them in our District Representatives.

One of our goals was met in the reprinting and re-distribution of the Instructors Manual. A copy of this manual should now be available in every Lodge in the Grand Jurisdiction. Efforts are nearly complete to add to this manual, a series of questions and answers, based on the Manual itself, to



better enable the instructor to measure the effectiveness of his training in each section.

The Committee sponsored development of the instructional manual, "My Name is Hiram Drummand", which will be used extensively in future training sessions which will be made available to those Officers and Brethren of our Lodges.

The Committee has also put together a Resource Manual for District Officers which has been presented to District Deputies and will be presented to District Representatives in an upcoming seminar. A sub-committee has been hard at work creating a format for District Officers Training Seminars which will be used at a seminar to be held on the 18th (May) of this month.

Work has also proceeded in the production of a series of Instructional videos, based along the lines of the Instructors Manual, which the Committee hopes will be used in conjunction with the Manual, to further the goal of making sure all Master Masons, new and veteran, know what it is to be a good Mason and why it is so vitally important. These videos should be available in the fall of 1996, to all Lodges.

We have found that even while meeting as a Committee on a monthly basis, far more work than can be done by smaller groups meeting more often. The Committee decided last year to create a number of sub-committees in order to maximize its efforts. We have received the support and assistance of many Brethren, without whom our effectiveness would have been greatly diminished. We would like to thank all who worked with us and would like to name each one, but to do that would be to risk missing someone and all are much too important to do that.

We would also like to recognize our District Representatives for their hard work and dedication, usually without fanfare or recognition. We ask that they stand now and receive the recognition which they richly deserve.

The Committee would also like to thank M.W. Harland Hitchings for his support during his two years as Grand Master, and extend to him our congratulations and best wishes for the future.

In closing, we would like to thank all who have been so supportive of our endeavors in the past, promise that we will continue the effort and look forward to an exciting future of growth and enlightenment in this Grand Jurisdiction.

## GRAND HISTORIAN'S REPORT

In Grand Lodge  
Portland, Maine

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine:

As the celebration of the 175th Anniversary of the Grand Lodge AF & AM was still underway when the 1995 Annual Communication was held, we propose to include the balance of the program not reported earlier, as well as a brief summary of the overall celebration.

The kick-off event was the banquet held at Kora Temple, Lewiston, on October 1, 1994 to commemorate the first Maine Masonic convention called to consider separation of Maine's lodges from the Grand Lodge of Massachusetts, and formation of an independent Grand Lodge when Maine should become a separate State as was then anticipated. The proposal was agreed upon and permission of the Grand Lodge of Massachusetts obtained.

Guests of Honor at the banquet were the Masters of the 29 Founding lodges. The special 175th Anniversary Medal was issued to them and made available to members of Maine lodges. The speaker of the evening was MW Donald Vose, PGM of the Grand Lodge of Massachusetts, Maine's Mother Grand

### Lodge.

As a later part of the 175th Anniversary celebration, the Grand Lodge remembered one of its outstanding Masons whose name will be remembered along with Greenleaf and Drummond. M.W. Ralph J. Pollard, PGM was thus honored by a Memorial Service held on July 9, 1995 at the Waldoboro Cemetery where Bro. Pollard and his devoted wife "Miss Millwee" are buried. Guests of the Grand Lodge were MW. Bro. Pollard's son, R.W. Stewart Pollard, a noteworthy Mason in his own right, and his lady Peg. Speakers included the Grand Master, Deputy Grand Master, Grand Historian and RW Bro. Stewart Pollard, who spoke on MW Brother Pollard's life as a Mason, an Educator, a Patriot and a father. A wreath was laid by the Grand Master and Deputy Grand Master, sprigs of Acacia by the Worshipful Masters of King Solomon's Lodge No. 61 and Ralph J. Pollard Lodge No. 217. A carnation was deposited on the grave of "Miss Millwee", Brother Pollard's devoted wife, by the Worthy Matron of Millwee Chapter No. 198, OES.

The final major celebration of the 175th Anniversary took place on September 9, 1995 in Bangor, beginning with a morning parade down the streets of Bangor, ending near Anah Temple. All branches of the Fraternity were well represented. The day concluded with a banquet and reception at Anah Temple. Speakers included M.W. Harland Hitchings, Grand Historian Wally Gage and Guest Speaker R.W. Royce G. Wheeler, 33rd, PSGW, and Active Emeritus, A.A.S.R. Following toasts to the President, the Craft, the Grand Master and Grand Lodge of Maine and the Tyler's Toast, the 175th Anniversary Celebration closed with the singing of "Auld Lang Syne", as has been customary at earlier Anniversary celebrations.

### ADDENDA

During the 175th Anniversary Celebration of the Grand Lodge of Maine, there were several publications issued for historical and informational purposes. There are still limited numbers available at the Grand Lodge office for those who may be interested. A brief description of each is given below:

#### "FREEMASONRY IN THE DISTRICT OF MAINE, 1762-1820"

Compiled by the Grand Historian, this is a story of early Maine Masonry from the time it was introduced in 1762 until the time the Grand Lodge was organized in 1820. Primarily a collection of brief histories of the Founder Lodges.

#### "HISTORY OF THE GRAND LODGE OF MAINE, 1820-1995"

Condensed story of Maine's Masonic history from the formation of the Grand Lodge to the present.

#### "PINE TREE CRAFTSMEN, 1820-1995"

A collection of true stories of the "adventures" of Maine Masons, selected from Lodge histories, Grand Lodge Proceedings, News items, etc. Distributed via District Deputies for use as short talks for use as enter-

tainment at Anniversary programs, District meetings, etc. Suitable for general audiences as well as Masonic.

"BANGOR DAILY NEWS SUPPLEMENT" Published September 5, 1995 for general public information on Freemasonry, its numerous branches, and in particular, its charities, activities and philanthropies.

In addition to programs and activities conducted by the Grand Lodge, Districts and individual lodges were urged to conduct and participate in 175th Anniversary programs on their own, and many did. The Grand Lodge assisted by providing souvenir napkins, placemats and other materials for decoration and promotion with the 175th Anniversary logo, also mugs, sweat shirts, T-shirts, medallions, stationery, etc.

Appreciation is extended to the Committee and the many who helped to make the celebration of the 175th Anniversary of the Grand Lodge of Maine a successful one.

One of the most time consuming of the Grand Historian's duties is to review the Lodge histories required to be prepared annually and forwarded to the Grand Lodge by all constituent lodges.

The purpose is to give recognition to those who show effort and ability, and where necessary, to offer suggestions for making a more interesting and meaningful record of our time for future days.

### **JOHN R. ZAISER, SR.**

John R. Zaiser, Sr. was born on June 2, 1930, in Salem, New Jersey, a son of J. Norman and Ella C. Zaiser. He has one brother, Jim, a professor at Bucknell University.

Jack attended schools in Salem, graduating in 1948. He earned his Eagle Badge in Scouting. He attended Rutgers University for two years before joining the Navy, and was stationed on the west coast in San Diego for four years.

In 1952 he married Erma Young, his high school sweetheart. They have two sons and three daughters, eleven grandchildren and five great grandchildren.

Jack worked at Atlantic City Electric Company after his discharge from the Navy, later going to E.I. Dupont Company working in Waste Water Disposal. He was scoutmaster of Troop #77 in Lower Alloways Creek Township, coached Little League, and was on the Board of Trustees of the Presbyterian Church in Salem. ## INSURANCE REPORT

In Grand Lodge  
Portland, Maine  
May 8, 1996

To: The Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine:

The Grand Lodge Insurance Committee has had an extremely busy year. Lodges have had their share of claims from small losses to a total loss on Carrabassett Lodge #161 in Canaan. As to date, all losses that we have knowledge of have been reported, settled and paid. In the past several years we have had two Lodges completely destroyed by fire.

A lot of time this year we spent on finding new insurance markets for our Lodges and establishing new credits to help reduce the cost of insurance because of our increasing economy. Over half of our Lodges are insured with the same insurance company. Each year a few more Lodges elect to join the group. If we can accomplish the task of having 75% of the Lodges insured with the same insurance company we will be able to have a special package policy with the Masonic Emblem imprinted on the policy. This would enable us to negotiate for additional credits, lower premiums and more coverage.

The Lodges that have let us review their policies and coverages and adopted our recommendations are saving over \$65,000 collectively on their insurance, with broader protection and higher limits. The two Lodges that were totally destroyed collected thousands of dollars more by taking our advice on their insurance.

The Grand Lodge of Maine carries the following insurance coverages to assist all Lodges.

1. A \$1,000,000. Comprehensive General Liability Policy, which covers the Lodges activities, such as, but not limited to, meetings, rehearsals, visitations, premises liability and products liability which covers food and items being sold by the Lodge to raise money. This covers the legal liability for both the Grand Lodge and all Lodges constituted by the Grand Lodge of Maine in case a suit is filed against them because of a bodily injury or property damage claim resulting from a Lodge function or activity.
2. Workers Compensation Insurance Policy. This covers all people who are paid to perform a duty or to accomplish a task for the Lodge such as, but not limited to, janitors, secretaries, treasurers, etc. This covers all paid employees and workers while carrying out their duty to the Lodge and/or the Grand Lodge of Maine.
3. A \$50,000. Fidelity and Surety Bond. The Bond covers all Lodges in

case of Employee Dishonesty with the Lodges' monies. Every Lodge has someone who has to take care of their monies, whether it is dues money or money for meals, etc. Regardless how much or how little a Lodge has to transact, each Lodge is covered up to \$50,000. per loss. The Grand Lodge of Maine has \$100,000. coverage.

Most Lodges carry a package plan of insurance that includes physical damage coverage to their building and their contents of every description, along with Liability protection.

The important reason for a Lodge to carry their own liability coverage is the fact that it creates an insurance package whereby credits can be applied to reduce their insurance cost. These credits can easily reduce the cost of insurance by 40%. In many cases, if the liability coverage was not included to make a package plan, a Lodge could easily pay over 60% more for their insurance.

In 1995, Oscar M. Hartford and his wife, Gin, traveled all over the State of Maine to take pictures of every Lodge. Two or more pictures were taken of every Lodge to include all sides and the surroundings of the Lodge and parking area. An outside inspection was made in order to appraise the buildings for insurance values. We now have two large books containing the photos of all Lodges and a lot of very important information to the physical appearances of the Lodges. This enables us to be able to establish what credits can be given on the Lodges insurance to help reduce their cost. It took us over two weeks of traveling and over 5,000 miles to accomplish a task that is going to be extremely helpful to guide Lodges on their insurance values. We can now appraise every Lodge, apply all the credits they deserve and find the lowest cost of insurance that is available.

We did find some Lodges that are in need of repairs, renovations and an outside improvement on their appearance. This is necessary to be done to help attract men into the Lodges. If any Lodge needs information or guidance on their insurance coverage and cost, we can give you all the assistance you need.

## MAINE MASONIC BLOOD PROGRAM

In Grand Lodge  
Portland, Maine  
May 8, 1996

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine:

First I want to thank the Brethren and anyone else that donated blood and used the Lodge I.D. Numbers in 1995.

In 1994 we used the numbers 937 times, 1995 they were used 1,114 times, an increase of 177. I feel the total would have been much more if all Masons donating had used their I.D. numbers.

The Red Cross agreed in March 1996 to provide me a list of lodges that had Drives in 1995. The totals for these were 783 units, for a Grand Total of 1,897 units.

Lodges that had blood drives were Monument #96, 99 units; Nollesemeic #205, 71 units; Cumberland #12, 100 units; Saco #9, 97 units; Harmony #38, 33 units; Standish #70, 31 units; Ocean #142, 48 units; United #8, 60 units; Belfast #24, 92 units, Messalonskee #113, 26 units; Euclid #194, 48 units; and District #9 at Rockland 78 units.

## RITUAL COMMITTEE REPORT

In Grand Lodge

Portland, Maine

May 8, 1996

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine:

Two changes in our Official Cipher have been forwarded to the Ritual Committee during the year.

One concerns the penalties, a topic on which anti-masonic persons have vehemently attacked Freemasonry. Having in their possession an expose

printed many years ago, they have leveled much criticism on a gentle Craft. Some Grand Jurisdictions have addressed this concern in a variety of ways, ranging from no change to the complete elimination of the penalties from the degree work.

It is important that the penalties remain in the Ritual, for they also teach an important Masonic lesson.

More importantly is the impression and effect these words have upon the candidates of our lodges.

Most Worshipful Harland Hitchings has forwarded a proposal to the Ritual Committee to address this matter. Your Committee has given this proposal careful consideration.

This concern is not addressed however, by merely inserting at the appropriate place the words symbolically and ancient. The inquiring mind will naturally ask himself symbolic of what?

We recommend the following be presented just before the W.M. speaks, saying "This due guard should always be given...

e.g. E.A., page 19, paragraph 3, and at the same location in the subsequent degrees.

The penalties of your obligation come to us from much earlier days when authorities and governments inflicted terrible punishments. Today they teach us the loss of regard with which we are held by our brethren, the loss of our self respect as men of honor and truthfulness, are to be feared more than the worst which can be inflicted upon us physically.

The second proposal for change forwarded to the Ritual Committee was that it study and consider the feasibility of preparing, publishing, and distributing a ritual in plain English. Our understanding is the intent was not to change the ritual, but rather to provide a written version.

This remains a matter which must have the deepest scrutiny since it has long range implications for Freemasonry in Maine. We must remain concerned with what we are really doing to the Craft by such a move.

We are aware that a written version of the ritual would make it more convenient for a lodge officer. This certainly is a positive support point these days.

Will it assist the need for the Craft to understand the purpose and meanings of the ritual? Will it ensure a higher level of proficiency with which the ritual is delivered? What control and/or assurance does this Grand Lodge have that the integrity and security of a written version of our cipher would be safe-guarded?

This committee remains concerned with what we may really be doing with such a move at this time. Since this issue is but a part of a larger concern this committee intends to address still more, it would be premature for us to recommend the adoption of this proposal.

Our recommendation is that this Grand Lodge not approve this proposal.

## COMMITTEE ON GRIEVANCES AND APPEALS

In Grand Lodge  
Portland, Maine  
May 8, 1996

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine:

Your Committee on Grievances and Appeals has reviewed six (6) matters referred to us by the Grand Lodge Commissioners on Trials on April 25, 1996 as follows:

SETH HIGGINS, JR., a member of Dirigo Lodge No. 104, being approximately 64 years of age was charged with gross unmasonic conduct by letter dated September 19, 1995. He was a past master and a trusted family member. He was charged with unlawful sexual contact with a 13 year old female. Upon proper Notice a Hearing was held before the Commissioners on Trials at the Auburn Masonic Temple on April 22, 1996. A copy of the Court record showed a finding of Guilt and a sentence of 4 years with all but 30 days suspended. The Commissioners unanimously voted to expel Mr. Higgins.

Your Committee on Grievances and Appeals reviewed the findings and find that all was in proper order. We agree with the verdict and the recommendation.

Most Worshipful Grand Master, I move that Seth Higgins, Jr. be expelled from all the rights and privileges of Freemasonry.

DARRELL M. COOPER, a member of Rising Virtue Lodge No. 10, was charged with unmasonic conduct by letter dated May 30, 1995. He was charged with attempting to commit bank fraud of \$18,500.00. Notice of

Hearing before the Commissioners on Trials was properly given and a Hearing was held at the Auburn Masonic Temple on April 22, 1996 at which time the Court record was produced showing a plea of guilty entered in the U.S. District Court on January 12, 1995. and a six months sentence.

The Commissioners unanimously voted to expel Mr. Cooper.

Your Committee on Grievances and Appeals has reviewed the findings and find that all was in order. We agree with the verdict and the recommendation.

Most Worshipful Grand Master, I move that Darrell M. Cooper be expelled from all the rights and privileges of Freemasonry.

GARY S. TIBBETTS, a member of Tuscan Lodge No. 106, was charged with gross unmasonic conduct by letter dated June 7, 1994, alleging five counts of gross sexual assault upon two young men, one being under the age of 12. Notice of Hearing was sent and received. A Hearing before the Commissioners on Trials was held at the Auburn Masonic Temple on April 22, 1996 at which time the Maine Superior Court record of Mr. Tibbets conviction on May 29, 1994 and an accompanying sentence of 12 years with all but 4 suspended, was produced and examined.

The Commissioners on Trials unanimously voted to expel Mr. Tibbets.

Your Committee on Grievances and Appeals has reviewed the findings and find that all was in order. We agree with the verdict and the recommendation.

Most Worshipful Grand Master, I move that Gary S. Tibbets be expelled from all of the rights and privileges of Freemasonry.

EDWARD C. ROBINSON, JR., a member of Pacific Lodge No. 64, was charged with gross unmasonic conduct by letter dated February 1, 1994 alleging two counts of murder, Class A. Notice of Hearing was sent and received. A Hearing before the Commissioners on Trials was held at the Auburn Masonic Temple on April 22, 1996 at which time the Maine Superior Court conviction dated September 18, 1990 and a life sentence on each count was examined.

The Commissioners on Trials unanimously voted to expel Mr. Robinson.

Your Committee on Grievances and Appeals has reviewed the findings and find that all was in order. We agree with the verdict and the recommendation.

Most Worshipful Grand Master, I move that Edward C. Robinson, Jr. be expelled from all the rights and privileges of Freemasonry.

EARLE W. HALEY, a member of Anchor Lodge No. 158, was charged with gross unmasonic conduct by letter dated May 8, 1994, alleging gross sexual assault and 3 counts of unlawful sexual contact. Notice of Hearing was sent by Registered Mail on April 5, 1996 and was returned as "addressee not known". A Hearing before the Commissioners on Trials was held at the Auburn Masonic Temple on April 22, 1996 where the Maine District Court record showing a plea of guilty to all counts and a sentence of 7 years with all but 30 months suspended.

The Commissioners on Trials unanimously voted to expel Mr. Haley.

Your Committee on Grievances and Appeals has reviewed the findings and find that all was in order. We agree with the verdict and the recommendation.

Most Worshipful Grand Master, I move that Earle W. Haley be expelled from all rights and privileges of Freemasonry.

ROGER L. GRANET, a member of Rabboni Lodge No. 150, was charged with unmasonic conduct by letter from the Lodge dated April 13, 1992 alleging unmasonic conduct during a Demolay event and drunkenness by the excessive use of intoxicating liquors during a Demolay event on February 28, 1992. Mr. Granet was Demolay Dad Advisor at that time. Mr. Granet was suspended by the Grand Master on September 9, 1992. Mr. Granet sent a letter to Grand Lodge explaining his understanding of the event in question, denying his use of alcohol and stating that he was sick from use of a prescribed medicine and that he was in addition a diabetic who had consumed too much sugar that evening. Notice of Hearing before the Commissioners on Trials to be held on March 26, 1993 was mailed and delivered. Mr. Granet requested a postponement to April 1993 and the Hearing was postponed indefinitely. On August 1, 1993 Mr. Granet requested that a Hearing be held on October 1, 1993. Accordingly a second Notice was mailed and delivered. Mr. Granet then requested a postponement until the next sitting of the Commissioners. On April 2, 1996 Mr. Granet called and asked to meet with the Commissioners and to give his statement. On April 3, 1996 Mr. Granet met with the Chairman of the Commissioners and in writing waived formal Notice of Hearing, acknowledged receipt of the charges and gave a statement in the same tenor as his November 1992 letter to Grand Lodge.

The Commissioners on Trials met at the Auburn Masonic Temple on April 22, 1996, reviewed the statements of Mr. Granet and reviewed the minutes of the March 3, 1992 meeting of the Knights of the Sun Demolay Chapter Advisory Council where the event in question was discussed. The Advisory Council stated it would take no action unless and until more corroborating evidence was presented. None has since been presented.

The Commissioners on Trials unanimously voted a suspension from September 9, 1992 to the annual meeting of the Grand Lodge in 1996, for a total suspension of 3 1/2 years subject to the stipulation that Mr. Granet not

participate further in supervising youth activities.

Your Committee on Grievances and Appeals has reviewed the findings and find that all was in order. We agree with the verdict and the recommendations.

Most Worshipful Grand Master, I move that Roger L. Granet be suspended from all the rights and privileges of Freemasonry for the period commencing September 9, 1992 and ending at the conclusion of this Grand Lodge Session, with the stipulation that Roger L. Granet not participate further in the supervision of youth activities.

Most Worshipful Grand Master, I move that this Report of the Committee on Grievances and Appeals be accepted in its entirety.

### REMARKS BY THE NEW GRAND MASTER

It is our privilege to be living in an era when we, as freemasons, can not sit back and take life easy but instead must ask, and ask most seriously, *what came we here to do.*

I have been remembering one of those evenings after lodge, sitting around a table in my lodge's dining room conveniently close to the kitchen and another cup of coffee.

If there were nothing more to Masonry than such good fellowship then the fraternity would still be a national treasure--

Someone reminiscing about the special train they ran once to a masonic event. Then someone laments that things aren't as they were and there begins one of those discussions we get into all too often about the fading of the fraternity.

Lloyd Treworgy, the older, beloved, and wise Past Master, uttered a prophecy:

"I SEE A TIME OF DARKNESS COMING -- A TIME OF INCREASED SELFISH INTERESTS, A TIME OF RISING VIOLENCE, A TIME WHEN INSTEAD OF EQUALITY THERE IS A GROWING DIVISION BETWEEN THOSE WHO HAVE AND THOSE WHO HAVE NOT, A TIME WHEN ALL MORAL VALUES ARE HELD TO BE RELATIVE, A TIME WHEN WE LOCK OUR DOORS, AND THERE IS FEAR IN THE SHADOWS." AND THEN HE SAID, "IN THAT DARK TIME THAT IS COMING, THE CRAFT WILL RESPOND TO THE CALL FOR THE BUILDERS. AND IN THE FACE OF DARKNESS THE LIGHT OF LOVE AND RELIEF AND TRUTH SHALL BE REKINDLED FOR SUCH IS OUR CALLING"

I do not know whether we have reached that time which the past master foresaw, but I do know that many of us feel a new pulse stirring the craft. There is a new conviction that what we believe and what we do and teach is seriously needed by our society. Every day as we look around us, we hear a new call for the builders and we witness the growing response.

It is certain that the 29,000 freemasons in this jurisdiction and three million freemasons elsewhere need to ready themselves for a giant task. Certain it is that what lies ahead is a challenge for the whole masonic family. Everywhere and in every heart there must be a renewed search for the meaning of our teachings. Every hand should practice the application of the square of moral relationships, the plumb of humble rectitude, and the level of equality, for despite the darkness, a new house must be built-- the house of humanity filled with the divine light of love, relief and justice, and I believe, as did the old past master and as you believe that freemasonry will take its part in the construction.

When I look around me here and see the quality of those who are responding, there can not be any doubt of the strength and ability which is being brought to the task nor is there doubt about what we as members of the masonic family came here to do. And if any person be in doubt as to our united purpose let them listen to this portion of the prayer given in the ceremony of dedication.

It is from thee, oh God, that we have received the heart to feel, the hand to labor, the eye to behold, the ear to hear, and the tongue to proclaim. Teach us, then to delight in them; to improve them as thy blessing. May we ever be ready to relieve the distress of our fellow creatures who need our assistance. May love dwell in our hearts and truth guide our lips. May our virtues shine together with a brighter light, and the everlasting glory of God be upon us.

Knowing the trust you have reposed and the honor you have conferred upon me, I know no words which can express my feelings except to say: May the blessing of the Grand Architect be upon you and all you love, and, as the prayer says, MAY THE GLORY OF GOD BE UPON THIS MASONIC ENTERPRISE.

Following these remarks by the Grand Master he had M.W. Harland S. Hitchings presented and commended him on two excellent years in the Grand East of the Grand Lodge of Maine A.F. & A.M. and presented him with the Josiah H. Drummond Award for Outstanding Service to the Fraternity.

## HARLAND SAMUEL HITCHINGS

Harland Samuel Hitchings was born in Bangor, Maine on January 13, 1922. He is the son of the late Samuel and Katharine Hitchings. He was graduated from Orono High School, Higgins Classical Institute, and the University of Maine in Orono.

On June 4, 1944 he married Charlotte Estelle Magoon, daughter of the late Maurice and Estelle Magoon of Skowhegan, Maine. They have two children, David Hitchings of Blue Hill and a daughter, Katharine Vose of Calais. They have three grandchildren; two grandsons and a granddaughter.

He worked for the Department of Inland Fisheries and Wildlife for twelve years, as a Game Warden. He later went into business for himself as Hitchings TV and Electrical. He became a Coordinator for the Safety Division of the Department of Inland Fisheries and Wildlife, and is currently serving that Division. He is responsible for Washington and Hancock Counties. Brother Hitchings has certified two thousand students in the Hunter Safety Course. Harland owned and operated Hitchings Apiary for several years, using the bees for pollination on blueberry fields in Washington County.

### Masonic Affiliations

Brother Hitchings was raised a Master Mason in Lewy's Island Lodge #138 on April 6, 1955, served as Master in 1980. He was Chaplain 1981-1994. He was chosen Mason of the Year for the 2nd Masonic District in 1989. He is an Honorary member of St. Croix Lodge #46. Brother Hitchings was appointed and served as District Representative for 1981-82. Grand Sword Bearer in 1981; Grand Senior Deacon 1982-1983; District Deputy Grand Master 1984-85; Grand Senior Warden 1986; Assistant Grand Lecturer 1991. He was elected Deputy Grand Master 1992-93. He was appointed Grand Representative to Santa Catarina, Brazil, near the Grand Lodge of Maine on June 11, 1984. He has served on several Grand Lodge Committees: Photography, Doings of Grand Lodge Officers, Public Relations, Prevention of Drug and Alcohol Abuse among Children and is a Trustee of the Grand Lodge Charity Fund. He is a member of the Grand Lodge Speakers Bureau.

He was exalted a Royal Arch Mason in St. Croix Chapter #17 in March 1977, and was Excellent High Priest 1982-83-84, District Deputy Grand High Priest 1989-90-91, and Grand Scribe of the Grand Royal Arch Chapter in 1992, Grand Representative to the Grand Chapter of South Australia. Anointed in Maine Order of the High Priesthood and Member of Maine Council of Thrice Ill. Masters, Greeted a Royal and Select Master in St. Croix Council #11, Illustrious Master in 1987.

He was knighted in Hugh De Paynes Commandery #11 K.T. in 1977, Commander 1987-88-89-90; Knighted in Tammerlane Conclave #4, Knights of the Red Cross of Constantine. Elected on March 7, 1987, to the Past Offi-

cers Association Maine #1, Member of the Cross and Crown Tabernacle #L111, Member of Maine College Societas Rosicruciana, Holy Royal Arch Knight Templar Priest, member of Pine Tree Priory #65, Knights of the York Cross of Honor, Maine Chapter of Knights Preceptor, Member of Pine Cone Council #31, Member of Oxford Lodge #1 Ark Mariners, Member of the Lodge of Research; Member of the Dirigo York Rite College #103, and served as President of the Past Commanders Association in 1991.

Brother Hitchings is a member of the Scottish Rite of Bangor and is a 32nd Degree member of Maine Consistory Valley of Portland. He became a member of Anah Temple in Bangor, Maine on June 14, 1976; Assistant to the Potentate; Member of Anah Temple's Past Masters Degree Team; Past President of Washington County Shrine Club; Past President of Schoodic Shrine Club. Brother Hitchings is also a member of Orion Chapter #45 Order of the Eastern Star.

Brother Hitchings is a Past Master of the Princeton Grange, Past President of the Lion's Club, Past President of the Men's Club and Past President of the Rod and Gun Club of Princeton. He is an avid Amateur Radio Operator Licensee, past president of the International Repeater Group of Maine and New Brunswick, and past president of the St. Croix Valley Radio Club. He served as Fire Chief for the Princeton Fire Department for several years.

His fishing days have been many, and he still likes to hunt, but now it is with a camera instead of a gun.

Brother Hitchings is affiliated with the Princeton Baptist Church, and was baptized in the Congregational Church in Burlington, Maine.

Brother Hitchings and his wife Charlotte reside at 25 Main St., Princeton.

M.W. Hitchings thanked the newly installed Grand Master and wished the best for him and his officers in the year ahead, and presented him with the Grand Master's Traveling Jewel.

## TO THE TRUSTEES OF THE GRAND LODGE CHARITABLE FOUNDATION:

It has been the custom of the Investment Committee to review the funds in this Foundation on an annual basis. We will continue to do this and to inform you of any major changes in our finances. Over the past thirty years during which I have been associated with this fund, it has more than kept pace with inflation and other economic factors. As this is a tax-free foundation with a 501 (c) 3-IRS status, we have never paid any taxes. During the past thirty years we have funded many charitable causes and probably have given to charity as much as seven million dollars. (\$7,000,000.00) and we continue to do so. A miniscule amount of my dues to my Lodge goes to this fund. Actually I, as an individual, have possibly contributed less than \$75.00. Actually what I am saying is that "time and perseverance" are the secret to wise investing. However, if one spends "more than they earn" it leads to destruction.

1995 was a fabulous year in every sense of the word and everyone in every walk of life. It was a very successful year if one were involved with the financial markets and Wall Street. Low interest rates fueled the common stocks, of which we have approximately 65% and the bond market came back from the 1994 lows. On top of this there were no wars, almost full employment, a good gross national product and all in all a profitable year for investors.

The committee had the usual meetings with Standish, Ayer & Wood (SAW). We had felt as a committee for sometime that we should get some other advisors as well so we had several meetings with H. M. Payson & Co., (HMP) in Portland and in the spring of 1995 transferred to them about \$600,000.00. They have drafted an investment policy statement which we have all studied and which is similar to SAW which basically says that we shall invest with 65% in common stocks and 35% in bonds and cash.

In 1994 we placed the Foster Scholarship money with Legg-Mason-Wood-Walker Inc. (L-M) and it has grown almost \$100,000 since that time.

We also had a Relief Fund Account which we had managed ourselves for many years. It included some dedicated funds which were bequests to the Grand Lodge over many years. This fund has grown to almost \$700,000.00 over time and we will continue to distribute that to our advisors.

Altogether you can see from the table that our total assets are approximately \$7,521,653.00 whereas it theoretically only cost us \$4,474,972.00. This is what "time and perseverance" does.

INVESTMENT POLICY

As stated earlier our basic investment objectives have been to have 60-65% in equities and 30-35% in fixed-income bonds. These are embraced by the preservation of capital, good earnings and reasonable growth. All of our advisors have this as a guide to their investing.

It should be remembered that the Cutter & Rich and Foster Funds and some others are for specific purposes and are not included in the income for this foundation to disperse.

1995 was a great year for growth because even the Standard & Poor's growth was over 30%. In spite of this tremendous growth on paper we may have some downturns ahead. However, we are conservative investors and our capital should not erode much even with a severe correction in the Dow Jones Industrial Average. Even if the Dow reaches 7000 by the turn of the century, that is only four years away.

I have included some graphs showing the Dow Jones industrial, transportation and utilities averages as well as the Standard & Poor's Index of 500 stocks, Russell 2000 Index of Smaller Company stocks and the NYSE Average daily volume. One year ago the Dow Jones Industrial Average was around 4200---today it is around 5600 which if subject to a 10% correction would not hurt us very much.

As always we are grateful for the meticulous records and detail kept by the Grand Treasurer as well as other records by the Grand Secretary and the support of the Grand Master, his officers and this committee. We, as an invest-

ment committee, are happy to be of service to this Grand Lodge.

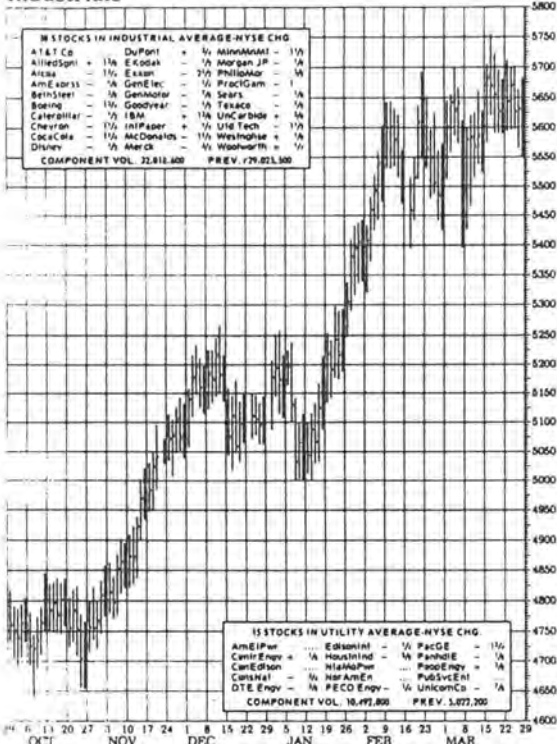

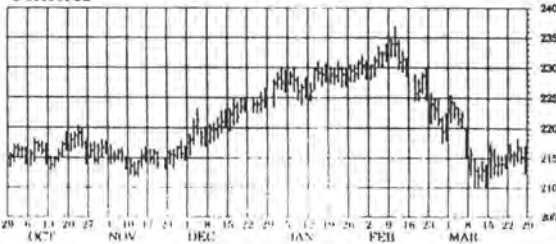

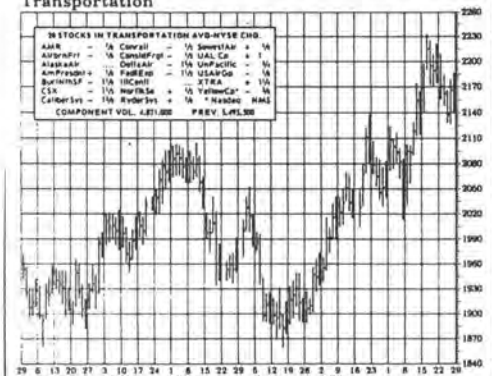

Add 3760 to the Common Era. Thus 1996 and 3760=5756. After September add another year.

### **Royal Arch-**

Add 530 years to the Vulgar Era. Thus 1996 and 530=2526.

### **Royal and Select Masters-**

Add 1000 to the Common Era. Thus 1996 and 1000=2996.

### **Knights Templar-**

From the Christian Era take 1118. Thus 1118 from 1996=878.

### **Order of High Priesthood-**

To the Christian Era add 1913, the Year of the Blessing. Thus: 1996 and 1913=3909.

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## MASONIC CALENDAR

**Ancient Craft Masons** commence this era with the creation of the world, calling it **Anno Lucis (A.D.)**, "in the year of light."

**Scottish Rite**, same as Ancient Craft, except the Jewish chronology is used, **Anno Mundi (A.M.)**, "in the year of the world."

**Royal Arch Masons** date from the year the second temple was commenced by Zerubbabel, **Anno Inventionis (A.I.)**, "in the year of the discovery."

**Royal and Select Masters** date from the year in which the temple of Solomon was completed, **Anno Depositionis (A. Dep.)**, "in the year of the deposit."

**Knights Templar** commence their era with the organization of their Order, **Anno Ordinid (A.O.)**, "in the year of the Order."

**Order of High Priesthood** dates from the year of the blessing of Abraham by the High Priest Melchisedec, **Anno Benefacio (A.B.)**, "in the year of the blessing."
