

They are the property of the Lodge for the use of the Brethren.



One copy should be on the Secretary's desk at every meeting.



Special Communication Mt. Olivet Dedication

A Special Communication of the Grand Lodge of Maine, A.F. & A.M. was held on Saturday, September 24, 2011 for the purpose of conducting a Dedication Ceremony for the new Masonic Hall of Mt. Olivet Lodge No. 203. Grand Lodge was opened in the ante room, in Ample Form at 2:30 p. m. by Most Worshipful W. Louis Greenier, II, Grand Master of Masons in Maine. At 3:00 p.m., Wor. Victor G. Oboyski, Jr., Worshipful Master of Mt. Olivet Lodge No. 203 welcomed everyone to the dedication ceremony. There was a knock at the door of the lodge and Wor. Brother Oboyski called on the Senior Deacon to ascertain the cause of that alarm.

The Grand Marshal then conducted a suite of Grand Lodge Officers into the lodge and once around the hall. The Deputy Grand Master, Senior Grand Warden and Junior Grand Warden placed candles on a carpet in the West. The procession marched again around the lodge where the Grand Master was conducted to the East and the remaining officers were conducted to their stations. The Master of the Lodge turned the Gavel over to the Grand Master. The Grand Master was accorded the Public Grand Honors by the Brethren. The Grand Chaplain delivered a Prayer.

The Architect addressed the Grand Master and presented him with the Square, Level and Plumb. The Grand Master responded and stated that Grand Lodge would examine the building to ascertain if it was square, level and plumb. The Grand Marshall formed a procession and the working tools were presented to the Deputy Grand Master, Senior Grand Warden and Junior Grand Warden. The procession was conducted out of the lodge hall. Upon their return, the Grand Master called on each officer to report on his inspection. The Deputy Grand Master reported that the building was Square and the Craftsmen had done their duty. The Senior Grand Warden reported that the building was Level and the Craftsmen had done their duty. The Junior Grand Warden reported that the building was Plumb and the Craftsmen had done their duty.

The procession was reformed and the Grand Chaplain was conducted to the Alter. The procession marched once around the lodge while the Grand Chaplain delivered a Prayer of dedication. The Grand Master stated: "Glory be to God on high."

The Junior Grand Warden presented the vessel of consecration to the Grand Master, who then poured corn on the carpet in the West, while saying,

"In the name of the Great Jehovah, to whom be all honor and glory, I do solemnly dedicate this Hall to Freemasonry."

The Grand Marshal conducted the procession twice around the lodge while the Grand Chaplain delivered a Prayer.

The Senior Grand Warden presented the vessel of consecration to the Grand Master, who poured the cup of wine on the carpet in the West, while saying, "In the name of the Holy Saints John, I do solemnly dedicate this Hall to Virtue."

The Grand Marshal conducted the procession three times around the lodge while the Grand Chaplain delivered a Prayer.

The Deputy Grand Master presented the vessel of consecration to the Grand Master, who poured the oil on the carpet, while saying, "In the name of the whole Fraternity, I do solemnly dedicate this Hall to Universal Benevolence."

The procession was conducted around the lodge and the Grand Lodge officers each drop off at their stations. The Grand Master called for the Official Proclamation. The Grand Marshal made his Official Proclamation.

The Grand Master turned the Gavel of Mt. Olivet Lodge No. 203 over to the Worshipful Master.

Wor. Richard Oboyski called on R. W. C. Herbert Annis to the East. Brother Annis related the following story to the Brethren and their Guests:

In the early 1900's, I was appointed by M. W. George Pulkkinen to serve as District Deputy Grand Master of the Seventh Masonic District. I found two reports that indicated that Mt. Olivet Lodge No. 203 wished to surrender its Charter. In my second year as District Deputy, I attended the annual Meeting of Mt. Olivet Lodge and found that there were only five Brethren present. This did not constitute a quorum so the meeting was not held. Two weeks later, Brother Donald Grinnnell volunteered to serve as the Master of the lodge and fifteen Brethren were present for the Annual Meeting.

The following year, R. W. Alan Heath was the District Deputy and Brother Christopher Vigue was elected Master of the lodge and thirteen Brethren volunteered to fill the chairs.

Wor. Brother Vigue served as Master of the lodge for five years and, during that time; Mt. Olivet Lodge was the fastest growing lodge in the state.

Wor. Brother Grinnell donated a piece of land and since then, the Brethren of Mt. Olivet Lodge No. 203 have built a fantastic edifice. They included a Food Kitchen in the basement of the lodge hall, which has benefited this community.

The members of the lodge were accorded a standing ovation by those present.

Wor. Victor G. Oboyski, Jr. introduced R. W. Edward Ludwig and Brother Roland Luce, who have been Masons for sixty seven and forty four years respectfully for a total of one hundred eleven years of Masonic service to a lodge that is one hundred and thirteen years old. These distinguished Brethren were accorded a standing ovation by the Brethren.

The Master then spoke about the lodge itself. He stated that most of the materials used to build this lodge were donated by the Brethren and their wives He thanked the wives for their support of the lodge. The land for the lodge was donated by Wor. Donald Grinnell and his wife, Liz. Wor. Donald Moody (now deceased) donated a lot of money to the lodge and Francis Lowe of the O.E.S. left money to the lodge.

The Architect, Wor. Christopher Vigue, was the key person in the growth of our lodge. He took charge and was involved in every aspect of the design and construction of the Lodge Hall. During four of the five years of the construction of

this lodge, Chris Vigue was the Master of Mt. Olivet Lodge. Wor. Brother Vigue was accorded a Standing Ovation by the Brethren.

Wor. Victor Oboyski returned the Gavel of Mt. Olivet Lodge No. 203 to the Grand Master. The Grand Master called on Wor. Christopher Vigue for his comments.

Wor. Christopher Vigue said, "This is a Historic Day for Mt. Olivet Lodge, I am speechless." He again was accorded a Standing Ovation.

The Grand Master made appropriate remarks. He observed that you often see lodges going through hard time and you feel bad for them, until you look at a lodge like this.

Don't let it stop here.

The Grand Master closed the meeting in Ample Form at 3:50 p.m.

Special Communication Site Selection Committee Report

A Special Communication of the Grand Lodge of Maine, A. F. & A. M. was held on December 10, 2011 for the purpose of whether or not to accept the decision of the Site Selection Committee of the Maine Masonic Charitable Foundation for the new administrative offices of this Grand Lodge.

The Grand Master opened the Grand Lodge in ample form at 10:00 A.M. The invocation was given by R.W. Randy Adams. The Grand Master called on the Grand Marshal to escort the Past Grand Masters to the East for introduction. Introduced to the Brethren were M.W. George Pulkkinen, M.W. Robert R. Landry, M.W. Charles E. Ridlon, M.W. Wayne T. Adams, M.W. Gerald S. Leighton, M.W. Harland S. Hitchings and M.W. Claire V. Tusch. These Past Grand Masters were given the private grand honors led by our Grand Master.

The Grand Master called on Wor. Edward L. King to make the Site Selection Committee presentation. The presentation covered background information such as the present, past and future; explained what is Grand Lodge; the Masonic Temple in Portland – its history and status now; the liability and opportunities of both choices; and how a SWOT analysis was conducted on the potential sites. Potential sites included facilities in Pittsfield, Holden, Westbrook and Bath. The assets and weaknesses of each potential site were outlined.

In answer to a question from the floor about membership distribution the following was presented: within 30 minutes driving distance the Holden facility had 14 lodges with a membership of 2413; the Bath facility had 8 lodges with a membership of 1030 and the Portland/Westbrook facility had 13 lodges with a membership of 2145. In addition, traffic count past the Holden facility was outlined.

A Brother asked about the loss of staff from the Portland facility. Because of the distance from Portland to Holden, the present staff has indicated that they will not be relocating.

The Master of Dunlap Lodge, Brother Robert Haines, R.W. Thomas Pulkkinen and others had questions about purchase and sales agreements, assessor appraisals, inspection reports and loss of staff. Wor. Christian Ratliff spoke in favor of the selection. Brother Robert Hahn, chairman of the Masonic Temple Association in Portland, spoke on the plan to fixing the Portland facility and although expensive it was not impossible. The Temple Association had plans for events and had made connection with the Convention Bureau of greater Portland. M.W. George Pulkkinen spoke against the selection as the cost of purchasing the facility in Holden would take money from the Maine Masonic Charitable Foundation which would own the building. M.W. Pulkkinen then polled several members of the trustees of the Maine Masonic Charitable Foundation if they would invest their money in such a manner and those selected said no.

R.W. Ronald Fowle II, the chairman on the Site Selection Committee, then spoke on the issues that the committee carefully considered to include the loss of the current office stall, the investment concept for the Charitable Foundation and the reduction in administrative office cost to the Craft. He reported that the Site Selection Committee felt confident that the purchase of the Holden facility was for the welfare of the Craft in general and recommended the acceptance of the committee recommendation.

The Grand Master then called for the vote and declared the ballot open at 11:20 A.M. The ballot was closed at 11:32A.M. The results of the ballot were 263 in favor and 233 opposed.

Special Communication Fort Kent

Grand Lodge was opened in Ample Form at 11:00 A.M. by Most Worshipful W. Louis Greenier, II, Grand Master of Masons of Maine. Grand Marshal, R.W. John T. Irovando formed a procession of the Grand Lodge officers and officers of Fort Kent Lodge No. 209 and conducted them to the front side of the Lodge Hall. At the appropriate hour, the Grand Marshal led the procession consisting of the Grand Master W. Louis Greenier, II, his lady and those at the head table. The Grand Master asked that R.W. David J. Billings, Assistant Grand Chaplain, lead the benediction. After the meal was served, the Grand Master introduced M.W. Walter M. Macdougall as the speaker for the evening.

Freemasonry and the Space Within by M.W. Walter M. Macdougall

I thank our Grand Master for the privilege of speaking this evening. This is another example that our Grand Master is not afraid to take risks. I asked Most Worshipful Brother Greenier if he had any preferences as to subject, and he suggested "getting back to our Masonry." Few subjects could have been closer to my heart.

This evening I suggest that a refocusing on Freemasonry today may be more exciting, more pertinent and far more exacting than we generally imagine.

How often we have gone to lodge raveled by the exigencies of daily life and then that old ritual begins and it is as though a refreshing breeze blew around us. One of my favorite times in lodge is when it is lit only by three tapers and the altar light. Then one feels Masonic Space around them- under them and over them- a space filled with meaning, possibilities and permanence.

We need to return to a Masonry which fills us with awe for that which is truly significant and which gives us hope for humanity.

Alan Alda, Hawkeye of the MASH series, is organizing an international program to encourage and perpetuate the curiosity and awe which children naturally feel and which world-weary adults too often discourage. He tells a story from his own boyhood. He watched a candle flame and was amazed- what was going on? How did that spectral leaf of light maintain itself? How did a melted pool of wax around a wick become light? He asked an adult. The answer was: "Oh, that's just oxidation." Did the adult really understand "oxidation, or had he or she replaced that wonderful phenomenon with a lifeless word? Had the awe leaked out? How alive is awe and the excitement of knowing in the lives of the Masons or in the daily perspective of the people you know?

Let me share an incident of my own which shows that an increase in awe and the joy of discovery can be a life-long experience. I remember standing at the blackboard (that dates me doesn't it?) in a physics class, employing Newton's formulae to solve some problem involving the acceleration due to gravity. Years of exposure had taught me to manipulate those mathematical relationships, but suddenly, as I was standing chalk in hand, I understood for the first time why the acceleration due to gravity is a constant. Rather late but there it was. Understanding, even a small piece of the grandeur and reason which lies around us, brings new joy.

Masonry reminds us that there are: "Numberless worlds around us, all framed by that same Divine Artist, which roll through the vast expanse of space and are all ordered by that same unerring law of nature." And science is now showing us a universe whose dimensions and wonders are beyond even the dreams of the old ritual writers.

Recently Right Worshipful Brother Donald McDougal has been sharing a program of photographs taken by NASA space telescopes of the gigantic splendor of nebulae and galaxies in outer space. The scope of Freemasonry continually enlarges and our ritual finds new voice.

We should continually return to Masonry and to all life with the awareness that there is so much we do not yet fully understand, and that together there is so much to discover and to build. And as we do so, we must be prepared for some very large questions.

For instance take this question: From whence comes Freemasonry's figure, strength and beauty? What gives it such lasting establishment and pertinence in our lives?

Part of the answer lies in the magnificent, intellectual and moral architecture which integrates and inspires the Masonic endeavor. Early in our Masonic experience we are told that the Masonic lodge is a symbolic representation of the heavens above and the floor of living experience below. And thus, from the first, the Masonic stage is set with cosmic, yet close to home, dimensions. Moreover, at the start of the Masonic experience, there is proclaimed an affirmation which makes all the difference: "In the beginning there was Light!" In the beginning there was God, the Logos, the Word, and, therefore, creative purpose and truth exist. Life and the cosmos are not "full of sound and fury and signifying nothing" as one of Shakespeare characters proclaims. The great Mason and clergyman, Joseph Fort Newton wrote that we and the world around us are not "...a flash of glory against a dark background." Thus both we and what we achieve do matter!

We need to return to a Freemasonry which truly believes this.

Masonic ritual tells us that it was an observation of nature and her beautiful proportions that gave rise to the human endeavor to enclose space with order and creative design. We should turn once again to a Masonry which is inspired by the glory of nature and which finds in that glory a moral inspiration as did the prophet when he proclaimed: "May justice roll down like the water and righteousness like the everlasting stream."

We need to return to that Masonry which believes that there is purpose in the universe and finer possibilities for human beings.

Most Worshipful Brother Wayne Adams in a recent and most important paper identifies seven dimensions of Masonic purpose (one might call them the seven lamps of Masonic architecture). These dimensions demand our special attention if we are to respond to the needs of individuals and society in our era. One of these is the affirmation that improvement is possible. It is possible because we have the capacities for rationality and compassion. And by "we," Freemasonry means every human being regardless of race, or creed, or background. Another dimension in

Brother Adam's list is inclusiveness. We hear charges of elitism within the present Craft, and we see evidence of an anti-intellectualism. Both attitudes are divisive and destructive. We need to return to Masonry which remembers the lines of Brother Edward Markham:

He drew a circle that shut me out, Heretic, rebel, a thing to flout, But care and I had wit to win. We drew a circle that took him in.

Perhaps too many of us have failed to realize that Freemasonry not only talks about architecture; it has achieved a monumental and overarching architecture of its own - a philosophy whose dimensions are those of mind, and heart and of the hand skilled in Building. Here on earth, in this business of human life, Freemasonry, impressed by the order and beauty above, seeks to build an inspirational and instructional space within its lodges and the surrounding community. It is a space of journey, of passages, of discovery and, finally, of duty. This Masonic effort has become one of the great, supporting columns of our civilization - a civilization which depends on the connective tissue of responsibility, unity, rationality, compassion and on a growing web of wisdom. It is a space which has among its expanding dimensions such essential concerns as Temperance, Fortitude, Prudence and Justice.

In the Masonic view, the majesty and order of the heavens inspires the building of society and the establishment of civilization, but the analogy does not end there. Freemasonry is concerned with the building and enhancing of an inner space-architecture within each of us. In this space we conjure who we are, who are those other selves which exist around us, and what might we be together. It is a space which is large or small according to the presence or absence of such dimensions as caring, understanding and moral sense.

Right Worshipful Eric Kuntz, psychiatrist and humanitarian, can describe to you how the inner spaces within human beings can and do implode how they can be twisted into labyrinths of despair or anger. He can also tell us from his own practice how wonderfully powerful and beneficial are the dimensions which masons share. We need to return to a Masonry which does not see itself as just another fraternity but rather as the keeper of resplendent vision which functions on three levels: (and now let me repeat) first in inspiration from Nature and her beautiful proportions, second in the tradition of the builder within civilization - the builders who construct "taller towns than Rome," and third in opening significant spaces within the individual. We need to rededicate ourselves to a Masonry which is concerned with this larger vision in a time when a slouching society needs the backbone and the spirit of the Craft.

Finally, we need to return to Freemasonry as a Profession and as a Calling.


And this is where our Freemasonry in the twenty-first century becomes exacting. Masonry is always on the move. First because it is a partner of the enlightenment which is always growing, and second, because it champions the Liberal Arts and Sciences which are continually expanding and setting human kind free. Whether we like it or not, the scope of our calling is always taking on new challenges. As Masons, we can no longer be content in our fraternal seclusion; we can no longer be

satisfied to fill bureau drawers with the ribbons of our organizational climbing. As in crucial times in the past, Freemasonry is called to <u>larger</u> concerns. For instance, as Masonic builders and as responsible citizens, we must be aware of the ideologies which compete for supremacy in our time, we must be cognizant of the economic and social forces shaping the environment, we must make use of the lessons of history, and we must be truly aware that everywhere society needs our "good offices."

We should return to Freemasonry knowing we have a tremendous undertaking awaiting us. And because we have answered the calling of being a Freemason, we will accept the challenge. We will put aside the little foibles of our personalities - the piques and quarrels, the habits of self aggrandizement along with the bids for personal power or recognition. We will grow above our fears of that which lies outside our comfort zone. And with rejoicing, we will climb again the winding stairs with all our senses alive and in the expectation that an enlarged wisdom and an increased fortitude await.

And in those moments when Masonic Space with its sense of awe and its sense of purpose and possibility surround us, we will hear once more the Tenets of our Profession as Masons: "By the exercise of Brotherly (and Sisterly) love we are taught to regard the whole human species as one family - the high and low, rich and poor..." "To relieve the distressed is a duty incumbent on all men, but particularly on Masons who profess to be linked together by an indissoluble chain of sincere affection. To soothe the unhappy, sympathize with their misfortunes, compassionate their miseries, and restore peace to the troubled mind, is the grand aim we have in view." "To be good and true is the first lesson we are taught in Masonry. On this theme we contemplate, and by its dictates endeavor to regulate our conduct. Hence while influenced by this principle; hypocrisy and deceit are unknown among us; sincerity and plain dealings distinguish us, and the heart and tongue join in promoting each other's welfare and rejoicing in each other's Prosperity."

Most of all we need to return to Masonry where the brethren never tire of hearing these words and who leave their lodge committed to wisdom and caring, who leave knowing that they belong to a band of Builders -- knowing that they, each one of them, will make a difference.

Supreme Inspector, IORG

Most Worshipful Grand Master, very distinguished East and members of the Grand Lodge of Maine: It gives me great pleasure to bring you the greetings of our Supreme Worthy Advisor, Mrs. Linda Lee Little, the Supreme Assembly of the International Order of the Rainbow for Girls and my own personal greetings.

Maine Rainbow has had a most exciting year traveling around New England and beyond. It is always very interesting, as we travel to other jurisdictions and see how the appendant Masonic Bodies interact with their youth organizations. I know Kelsey has learned this year that "there's no place like home" since our Masonic family is truly a family and she was most surprised that in several jurisdictions, there was no representative of the Grand Master in attendance (of Shrine or Eastern Star in some cases). She learned how very fortunate she is to belong to this family.

As I sat at one Grand Assembly in particular and listened to the representative of Scottish Rite speak, I was impressed that he had done his homework about Rainbow – and then I thought – maybe we've not done enough to let our Grand Lodge and appendant bodies know how we came to be a part of this very special Masonic Family.

As Rainbow celebrated its 90th Birthday on April 6, 2012, I thought I'd share with all of you some very interesting facts about our founder Reverend W. Mark Sexson.

In 1902, he was initiated, passed and raised to the sublime degree of Master Mason in Bloomfield, Indiana.

In 1907, he was made Master of the Royal Secret $32^{\rm nd}$ Degree in Oklahoma Consistory #1

In 1911, he was crowned Knight Commander of the Court of Honor at Guthrie.

In 1913, he was made a 33rd Degree Mason and coroneted as Inspector General.

In 1931, he was elected and served as Worthy Grand Patron in the Grand Chapter of Eastern Star in Oklahoma.

In 1938, he was elected and Installed Most Worshipful Grand Master in a Sovereign Masonic Grand Jurisdiction.

He was a Royal Arch Mason

He was a Knight Templar

He belonged to the White Shrine of Jerusalem

He was a Noble of the Mystic Shrine

One evening in the spring of 1922, Reverend Sexson was asked to make an address before an Eastern Star Chapter. As DeMolay had come under his close study and observation during his Masonic activities, he became more and more conscious of the fact that an Order for girls setting forth some of the truths of Masonry would be necessary. He made an appeal for such an organization and the response from Eastern Star was "We would start it if someone would write the ritual".

The very next day, Reverend Sexson wrote the ritual giving it the name "Order of the Rainbow for Girls". The first initiation was held on April 6, 1922 at the auditorium of the Scottish Rite Temple in McAlester, Oklahoma on a class of 171 girls. The rest as they say "is history". 90 years later we are now in 48 states and several foreign countries (Mexico, Canada, Bolivia, Australia, Brazil, Italy, the Philippines – most recently Romania and Mrs. Little is in Scotland right now meeting the Grand Master of Scotland as there is interest in that country also.

Reverend Sexson clearly felt that the principals of Freemasonry needed to be shared with the young women of our county – little did he know that 90 years later we would now be the "International Order of the Rainbow for Girls".

Most Worshipful Grand Master, Thank you for attending our first ever Masonic Youth day held in October. I know that that was the first Rainbow meeting that you had been to – is it ok if I ask your membership a few questions?

How many of you had never heard of Rainbow until today?

How many of you have never been to a Rainbow meeting?

How many of you have never seen the girls do their initiatory degree?

Lastly, how many of you have served on a Rainbow Advisory Board?

I brought with me today this miniature lambskin apron to let you know just a tiny bit about our initiatory degree. Each new Rainbow Girl, at her initiation is given a

miniature lambskin apron which has been made from scraps of your Masonic Aprons. Each new initiate is told that "it is the sacred symbol that binds".

We know that we will never fully know the meaning of the Masonic Apron but our miniature apron will always be dear to us because of our Masonic Family.

One other small tidbit on our Masonic connection that I thought I would share with you: when I visited Alexandria for a leadership training we were honored to visit the George Washington Masonic Memorial. In the basement of the building we saw illustration of the laying of the cornerstone and the explanation of what is contained in the cornerstone as a time capsule. We were quite surprised of the similarities of those contents.

Kelsey has invited you to our Grand Sessions on Memorial Day weekend: we would love to have you in attendance. The Grand Officers will exemplify the initiatory degree on Saturday morning. I know that your Deputy Grand Master will be there for the whole weekend and can likely vouch for you!

Thank you for the privilege of addressing the Grand Lodge of Maine and the courtesies of the morning.

Grand Master's Address to the Craft 193rd Annual Communication

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Ancient Free and Accepted Masons, of the State of Maine:

Again it is my privilege to honor and welcome you, the members, to this 193rd Annual Communication of the Grand Lodge of Maine.

Distinguished Guests

It is with great pleasure that I welcome our distinguished guests from our Sister Jurisdictions. We are sure you will enjoy our Maine hospitality during your stay and hope you will return often. I want to thank our own in-state distinguished guests. It is a great pleasure to have all of you here for this Grand Communication.

Necrology

We have lost numbers of our members to the Celestial Lodge above. Grand Lodge has lost two Past Senior Grand Wardens: Brothers Francis S. Harvey, who served Grand Lodge from May 6, 1970 - May 6, 1971 and passed February 14, 2012, and Gerald C. Pickard who served Grand Lodge from May 6, 1987 - May 4, 1988 and passed January 15, 2012; a Past Grand Treasurer, Bruce S. Tornquist, who served Grand Lodge from December 10, 1974 - June 15, 1999 and passed June 24, 2011. These permanent members will be greatly missed for their dedication and hard work. Well done, good and faithful servants to Grand Lodge. You now abide in the Celestial Lodge above where the Grand Architect of the universe presides.

Condition Of The Fraternity

Many lodges are raising a lot of younger men with many of them taking a chair in the line. With younger men come new ideas. The older members of this fraternity have to step back and let them present their ideas with MENTORING from knowledgeable men in our fraternity. This year Atlanta, Georgia was the host of the conference on February 19, 20, & 21. The theme of the conference was "Cultivating the Masonic Experience." Sadly, I can't give you a report on membership because of the loss of our data system. Brothers Ronald Pete Forrest and Bernie Gaines have done a great job, and their report will be in the annual Grand Lodge preceding.

Youth

We as Masons need to be mindful that our youth are our future and the promise of our tomorrow. We should all make an earnest effort to spend quality time with them. We have great cadre of men that are willing and able to spend time with our youth. I thank you and God for this.

Corner Stone And Lodge Dedication

This Masonic year we have laid three corner stones. On July 31, 2011 (a very hot day), the corner stone of Saco Fire Station was laid according to ancient customs. This ceremony was well attended by the townspeople. April 14, 2012 we were in Fort Kent No. 209 (the most northern Lodge in Maine) to lay the corner stone for their new lodge building. It was well attended by the Grand Lodge officers. On April 21, 2012 the corner stone of our new Grand Lodge Office, Museum, and Library in Holden was laid in ample form. We had a good turnout of Grand Lodge officers, Masons, wives, family, friends, the local community and town officials. Lunch was served after the ceremony and was enjoyed by all.

Three Masonic Halls were dedicated this Masonic year: on September 24, 2011, Mount Olivet No. 203 in Washington; on December 10, 2011, Northern Star No. 28 in North Anson; and on April, 14, 2012, Fort Kent No. 209. These dedications were well attended by the Grand Lodge officers, Masons, family and friends. These ceremonies are a few times that we as Masons can appear in public to do Masonic work.

We had one Lodge Charted in this grand jurisdiction, Seminary Hill Daylight Lodge No. 220 in Bangor, the first in over fifty years. This lodge is the only daylight lodge in Maine and meets twice a month for lunch, a program, and a lodge meeting. The women are invited to the lunch and program and have a meeting of their own afterwards.

Outdoor Degrees

On August 13, 2011, the Thirteenth District held an outdoor degree in Lexington Township on one of the warmest days that summer. Brother Millard Kenneth Rackliffe from Siloam Lodge No. 92 in Fairfield was raised to the sublime degree of a Master Mason by Masons in this District. We want to mention also that Brother Rackliffe became a plural member of Bethlehem Lodge No.35 in Augusta on January 13, 2012, and has started in the officer line as Junior Deacon, a young mason of thirty-two years! R.W. Lester F. Smith has hosted this outdoor degree every summer for the last twelve years at his beautiful place on Mooers Pond in Lexington Township.

Grand Lodge Of Maine Business Office, Library, and Museum

Between the time that I was elected to be your Grand Master and being installed as such at the 191st Annual Communication of the most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine, certain events took place which had an effect on the Craft which hadn't been seen in over 100 years. The Grand Lodge of Maine Finance Committee did inform the Portland Trustees that they would be cutting the rent payment made to them to \$12,000.00 a year, a reduction of 50 per cent. There was also a motion accepted by the Craft directing me to form a Site Selection Committee for the purpose of finding a new location for the Grand Lodge business office. Although this motion did not contain any provisions as to how and with what resources this committee had available to act, I did form such a committee. Armed without any information or resources this committee could only base their recommendation on which area of the state possessed the best results with respect to cost estimates. The Craft, not having specific information, soundly defeated this first recommendation made by this committee to relocate to the Bangor area.

At the 192nd Communication of the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine, I informed you in my address that another Site Selection Committee would be formed. However, this time, the committee would be charged with providing specific information to you including how, what, why, when, and where, this relocation should take place. This committee was formed and included respected Masons from varying parts of our Grand Jurisdiction. Their work resulted in a presentation to the Trustees of the Maine Masonic Charitable Foundation a recommendation that the foundation purchase the former Merrill Bank building located in Holden. By unanimous vote, the Trustees agreed to purchase this building to house the Business Office, Library, and Museum of the Grand Lodge of Maine if certain conditions were met. One of these conditions being that the Craft approve a five-year lease. The matter was put to the Craft on December 10, 2011, and by a slim majority the Craft agreed to the five-year lease. The building was subsequently purchased by the Foundation on December 30, 2011.

Within hours of the vote on December 10, 2011, another serious event took place affecting the Craft. I was informed that the MEROLLS database system would not be supported after January 31, 2012, and that the Finance Committee should be made aware of this information. Immediately steps were taken to locate another alternative. These steps included consulting other Grand Jurisdictions in the country

for recommendations. The MORI system was found to be the one recommended most highly. By unanimous vote of the Grand Lodge Finance Committee it was decided to engage MORI with providing our needs. Numerous attempts were made, including personal contact, telephone calls, and certified mail to the provider of MEROLLS, all of which were unanswered or rebuffed. Fearing the loss of valuable data, an expensive process was undertaken to retain all data of the Jurisdiction. With the help several members of the Craft, MORI is in operation at this time.

With the volunteered efforts of both members of the Craft in the Portland area and members of the Craft in the Holden area, the entire contents of the Grand Lodge of Maine Business Office, Library, and Museum were packed up. The relocation was made with minimal problems and at a much lower cost than anticipated.

The staffing of the new business office was another major issue encountered. R.W. Hollis Dixon, who served the Craft for many years decided he did not wish to continue as Grand Secretary and resigned as of April 6, 2012. No member of his staff desired to continue in their position. As a result M.W. Gerald S. Leighton agreed to be appointed Grand Secretary and oversee the relocation process and training of a new staff. Under the direction of M.W. Leighton and with knowledgeable experienced Masons within the Holden area who volunteer their time and energy, the Grand Lodge Business Office is now operating efficiently five days per week between 8:30A.M. and 4:30 P.M. Two employees have been hired on a probationary basis and are being trained in all aspects of the office. Procedures of operation are being examined and updated. Suggestions are being encouraged to increase efficiency. We project the cost of renting space in the Holden building will be approximately half the cost of before. With the efforts of the Foundation Trustees and the Grand Lodge Finance Committee, a plan has been taken on to provide funds for capital improvements and maintenance of the building so that it will provide good service for years to come.

All of this did not come about without much soul searching by each and every one of us. Masons in general do not like change. The emotional attachment to the Temple in Portland is one which we all have and understand. Lodges, individuals, employees, and other Masonic bodies were affected . . . some good and some bad. It was easy to blame Masons of old with the problems encountered, but it's much more difficult in dealing with these problems today. During the course of this debate, there was no outline and no roadmap to follow. The Craft was on territory not seen in over 100 years. I can only tell you that in each and every decision made either by the Site Selection Committee, Charitable Foundation, Finance Committee, or myself, I truly know in my heart that those decisions were made with the firm belief that the outcome from those decisions would benefit the Craft as a whole.

Conclusion

I have high hopes for the future of Maine Masonry. Hopefully, the challenges that we all have dealt with and <u>resolved</u> over the past two years has cleared the way for our incoming administration to move forward... and I DO extend my very best to you for good things to come.

I am very honored to have served the Craft in the capacity of Grand Master and will be forever grateful to the officers and brethren who have served with me. I also extend my appreciation to you who have served on committees and/or stepped forward to accept the many, many tasks set before you.

To all of you: thank you most sincerely.

Report of the Committee on Masonic Jurisprudence

In Grand Lodge Bangor, Maine May 1, 2012

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine:

The report of this Committee for 2011 on page 592 indicated the difficulty the Jurisprudence Committee is experiencing by receiving dispensations and decisions only a few days before the Annual Communication of Grand Lodge. The Chairman of this Committee requested the Grand Lodge office to send them in two installments.

This year we received the first group of thirty-seven (37) in mid February. We did, however, receive in most cases the application for the dispensation, the dispensation itself if granted, and supporting information helpful in understanding situations in question.

We thank the Grand Secretary and the office staff for their effort, as we are already seeing improvement in the process. We are fully cognizant the year has been filled with much change and with much work; however, at the time of this writing the last dispensation this Committee has received was issued February 10, 2012.

We found the dispensations sent to us from the Grand Secretary's office to be within the authority granted a Grand Master; each of which assumed a solemn obligation to uphold the Constitution, Standing Regulations and Digest of Decisions of the Grand Lodge.

I am sure our Grand Master, as well as our Past Grand Masters, has taken this responsibility very seriously.

The dispensations, for the most part, fell within the following categories: permission to appear in public while wearing Masonic regalia, request permitting special "Degree Teams" to appear in their uniforms or robes and functions where alcoholic beverages would be served.

We are cognizant of the fact it is a Grand Master's prerogative to issue such dispensations, if he is so inclined. We remain, however, concerned with what appears to be a trend in past years of moving from Masonic Constitutional Law toward "Rule by Dispensation". We need to think carefully about this. In the spirit of Masonic cooperation Grand Masters have been quite generous.

We conclude this report by sharing a couple of examples to illustrate what gave us cause to stop and think:

A lodge requested a dispensation to appear at a school graduation ceremony to present several scholarships while wearing Masonic Regalia. The Masonic Fraternity has long supported and encouraged education and learning. What has happened to

the age-old custom of "it's done because it's the right thing to do"? What is the objective?

A lodge requested a dispensation for the purpose of holding a "Fellowship Night" occasion where refreshments and alcoholic beverages would be served. Is this really the time and the image we wish to project? Time to pause.

A lodge requested a dispensation to dispense with the usual lectures during the conferral of the Master Mason degree. We commend our Grand Master for not approving the request for the dispensation; it was properly disallowed.

There were several requests for dispensations which lacked supporting data and no dispensation was granted.

The Committee on Jurisprudence respectfully submits this report and moves the adoption of its recommendations regarding the dispensations placed before the Committee.

Whitney, Sr.; Wor. Mark E. Rustin; Wor. Rev. Dr. Stephen M. Tolander; R.W. David J. Billings; Wor. Robert C. Ellinwood; Wor. Leslie M. Gray.

R.W. Bruce Stevens Tornquist

It is with profound sorrow that we are called upon to report the passing of R.W. Bruce Stevens Tornquist, Past Grand Treasurer of the Grand Lodge of Maine, who succumbed to Alzheimer's disease on June 24, 2011. His wife of seventeen years, Lottie (Jackson) Tornquist, predeceased him in June 2002; they had no children. Bruce was born in Portland Maine on September 5, 1928, the son of Brother Carl Edward and Arlene M. Tornquist. He was educated in Portland schools, graduating from Deering High School in 1946. He then entered Bowdoin College, at Brunswick, where he was a member of the Alpha Tau Omega Fraternity. After graduating from Bowdoin in 1950, Bruce joined the Portland office of Equitable Life Assurance Society of the United States. There he was appointed Assistant Cashier in 1953 and was made Manager in 1971, retiring from this last position on April 30, 1975.

Bruce was very civic minded and was associated with a number of community organizations including the Long Island (Maine) Civic Association; Citizens Who Care, Inc. (environmental group); the University Church of Westbrook; Maine Charitable Mechanic Association; Woodfords Club; Bowdoin Club of Portland; Portland Stamp Club of New York; George Washington Stamp Club.

Brother Tornquist was a sixty year member of the Masonic Fraternity, having been initiated at Deering Lodge No. 183 on March 26, 1951, passed to the degree of Fellowcraft on April 9, 1951 and raised to the sublime degree of a Master Mason on May 7, 1951. Appointed Chaplain on February 18, 1957, he advanced through the chairs becoming Master on February 17, 1964 (at that time Deering Lodge had over 900 members).

In Grand Lodge he was appointed Grand Treasurer on December 10, 1974, and was formally elected to that position on May 5,1975. This was at a most trying time for our Grand Jurisdiction, it having lost by death Bruce's predecessor in office, R.W. Robert M. Fletcher on November 24, 1974, following closely the death of our then Grand Secretary, M.W. Ervin E. J. Lander, on April 19, 1975. Bruce's willingness to step into this void, and his dedicated effort in office helped greatly in restoring the usefulness of our stricken Grand Office Staff. In 1977 he was commissioned Grand Representative to the Grand Lodge of Mississippi, and on May 7, 1985, he was presented the Josiah Hayden Drummond Distinguished Service Medal by M.W. Peter C. Schmidt.

Other Masonic memberships Included Maine Conclave #1, Knights of the Red Cross of Constantine, the Past Commander's Association, Eastern Canada Priory #19, Knights of New York Cross of Honor, Pine Tree Priory #65, K.Y.C.H. (of which he was a charter member), Josiah Drummond Council #1, Allied Masonic Degree, Grand College of Rites, the Royal Order of Scotland, the Societas Rosicruciana in Civitatious Foederatis, Maine Lodge of Research and Oxford Lodge #1, Royal Ark Mariners. In the Scottish Rite he was a member of the Portland Valley and a past Most Wise Master of Dunlap Chapter of Rose Croix. He was a member of the Maine Council of Deliberation, and in September, 1983, he was created a Sovereign Grand Inspector General 33°, and made an Honorary Member of the Supreme Council. Bruce was also a longtime member of the Masonic Trustees of Portland.

On Tuesday July 5, a Masonic memorial service was conducted by the members of Deering Lodge, No. 183, in conjunction with funeral services at Jones, Rich and Hutchins Funeral Home. Burial was at Evergreen Cemetery in Portland.

Josiah Hayden Drummond Award

The Grand Master directed the Grand Marshal to escort R.W. Ronald Fowle II to the East where the following proclamation was made:

R.W. Ronald Wayne Fowle II was born June 1, 1955, in Newburyport, Massachusetts, to Ronald W. and Shirley Fowle. He came to Palmyra, Maine, to live when he was five years old. He grew up in Maine and graduated from Nokomis High School in Newport (according to son Matt, the year he graduated was a long, long time ago). He married Debbie (Doyle) Fowle September 11, 1976. They have two grown sons: Matthew of St. Albans, Maine, and Ronald W. Fowle III of Anchorage, Alaska. They have one granddaughter.

Ron and Debbie reside in St. Albans, and he is Postmaster at the United States Postal Service office in Sangerville, Maine. It's important to note that he is an Eagle Scout and is the recipient of Scouting's highest camping award: The Order of the Arrow. He very much enjoys hunting and fishing.

On March 6, 1982, he was raised to the sublime degree of Master Mason at Corinthian Lodge No. 95 in Hartland, Maine. He progressed through the line to serve as Master of the lodge in 1987. In District 22, he was District Education Representative in 1992-93 and District Deputy Grand Master 1993-95. He is a member of York Rite, Scottish Rite, and the Shrine.

In the Grand Lodge of Maine, he has served as Grand Steward 2008-10 and was elected to serve as Junior Warden 2010-2011. He is a member of the Maine Masonic Charitable Foundation and also serves on the By-Laws Committee. He has recently served as chairman of the specially-formed Site Selection and has carried out the challenges of that position with impressive aptitude and professionalism.

Brother Ron, for your dedication to our Craft and for your extraordinary service to the Grand Lodge of Maine, it is with pleasure and immeasurable appreciation that I award you with the Josiah Hayden Drummond Medal.

R.W. Fowle thanked the Grand Master and expressed that he has enjoyed his journey in Masonry and that the Grand Master has remarked several times that Masonry can change a man and that Masonry certainly had changed him. Being able to serve the Grand Lodge of Maine has been a labor of love and that he hoped he could continue for many years to come.

The Grand Master then called the Craft from labor to refreshment for lunch and declared that the Grand Lodge would resume its labors at 1:30 PM.

Labor being resumed at the appropriate hour the Grand Master called for the report of the Condition of the Fraternity which was delivered by R.W. Ryan Paradis as follows:

Report of the Committee on the Condition of the Fraternity

In Grand Lodge Bangor, Maine May 1, 2012

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine:

Unfortunately your Committee must start this report by informing you that we received only eight (8) District Deputy Grand Master annual reports. A copy of the reports was requested from the Portland office and there was no success in finding any. I made a trip to the new office in Holden and M.W. Jerry Leighton and his staff were very helpful, but could only come up with eight (8), of which most of those were only received by this committee late last week. We are hopeful that there are sixteen (16) more out there somewhere and upon receipt of them we would be happy to revise this report with any additional information.

Based on these reports, one can draw a few conclusions. Some positive and some negative, but we shall leave the majority of the conclusion drawing to each of you after a presentation of the facts.

Only two District Deputies started or ended their report by stating that his district was in excellent shape or alive and well. Both of their comprehensive reports with a brief synopsis of each lodge supported that statement. I am sure that others feel that way and some of the reports show hints that such is the case, but they did not come out and say it.

The following is a list of things that we believe should clearly go into the positive column:

Annual inspections are being held at every lodge, with the majority of lodges having a live candidate and most lodges receiving a "passing" grade.

CHIPS programs are being held with regularity throughout the State and most lodges and or districts have settled into some sort of annual event at which they perform them.

Care and Share is engaged in by most lodges with examples ranging from in-home visits to incapacitated Brethren to supplying food baskets for the less fortunate.

Some District Deputies reported that all Lodges within their District were involved in Widows programs.

The Books for Bikes program is widely used and has been received with open arms by the schools.

Two District Deputies reported they hold a "Ritual Challenge" or "Battle of the Craft" in which Lodges compete in what is described as a friendly competition of who does the best degree work and floor work.

It was reported by most District Deputies that the Constitutions and Standing Regulations are being followed and that when questions arise, the District Deputies are being contacted for advice before the Lodge makes their own interpretation.

One District Deputy reported that attendance on schools instruction averaged more than 35 this past year.

On the other side of the equation are items or areas of concern:

Some District Deputies reported that entire slates of officers were re-installed for another year in the same chairs.

It was reported by almost every District Deputy that attendance at schools of instruction remains low.

No District Deputy reported his personal concern with membership in this Grand Jurisdiction.

Masters and Wardens programs in general continue to stumble along and attendance is low.

Two District Deputies expressed concern that S.R. 25, pertaining to the examination of new Master Masons within 90 days of receiving their degree, was not being followed.

Although none of the District Deputies made any recommendations there certainly are some conclusions that we drew and can be turned into recommendations.

It was mentioned that attendance at schools of instruction was low, but one District Deputy reported that attendance is on the rise. What is it that the Grand Lecturer, District Educational Representative and District Deputy are doing different to spark interest on that District? We need to identify the successes and use them as a model.

Masters and Wardens Associations are continuing with limited success. Although a couple of Districts reported that their Masters and Wardens meetings were well attended and much was accomplished at the monthly meetings. What is the key success in these Districts? Again let's identify them and use them as an example.

There is concern over S.R. 25. If there is concern verbalized by a few, then there is a fairly good chance that this is more widespread than we know. We would recommend that this be addressed and that District Deputy Grand Masters be charged with seeing that this regulation is followed.

The reports of the District Deputies only told if the degree work in his District was passing or failing. Although this seems like an easy way to grade the ritual and floor work, it leaves us wondering if with a passing grade the work was ho-hum or excellent. As important as our ritual is to us it would seem that we need to provide detailed feedback with the report or come up with a new report that rates the work on several different levels.

Although there are several opinions on membership out there, i.e. quality vs. quantity, age of prospective candidate, etc. One thing that should not be overlooked is what we have previously already stated. No District Deputy expressed any concern over membership. We will let you draw your own conclusions on this.

As you can see there are areas of concern that can and should be addressed, of which none of them should be of surprise as you have been hearing about them for several years. You can also hopefully see that the positive reporting outweighs the negative and that things are alive and well in this Grand Jurisdiction for those who choose to participate and embrace their Masonry. Those are the success stories and the true beneficiaries of Masonry that we need to identify and emulate in this Grand Jurisdiction. The real question is how do we get more of our members to embrace the Fraternity which we all hold so near and dear to us?

As has been customary in this report we would be remiss if we did not recognize the outstanding reports of a couple of District Deputies who spent much time on their reports and gave a clear thumbnail of the status of their District. Those are R.W. Neal Haines #1, R.W. Clint Coolidge #15, R.W. Christopher DiSotto #17 and R.W. Frank Palmer #23.

The Grand Master called for the report of the Committee on Fraternal Relations which was delivered by R.W. C. Herbert Annis as follows:

Report Of the Committee on Fraternal Relations

In Grand Lodge Bangor, Maine May 1, 2012

To the Most Worshipful Grand Master, Officers, and Members of the Grand Lodge of Maine:

Your committee on Fraternal Relations has had a very quiet year. The Prince Hall Grand Lodge F. & A.M. of Alaska and its Jurisdictions has had a compact with the Grand Lodge F. & A.M. of Alaska since 1997 and requested amity with the Grand Lodge of Maine. We granted that with a blanket decision several years ago since it was in effect already and only needed communication between the Grand Secretaries to complete the amity.

The Grand Lodge National Francaise has been having internal problems that have become very public resulting in court action and street demonstrations. The Grand Lodge of Washington D. C. is holding all communication with the GLNF in abeyance until the internal problems are settled.

Likewise there are internal problems still not resolved in Baja California, Bulgaria, and Paraguay. These problems have been ongoing for several years.

We urge all Lodges to keep a current "Tylers Book" (available from Grand Lodge).

It was moved to accept the report of the committee on Fraternal Relations and that it be printed in the proceedings. That motion was seconded and so **voted**.

Masonic Service Association of North America

M.W. Wayne T. Adams was escorted to the east where he made an award to the Grand Master on behalf of the Masonic Service Association and its Executive Director George Braatz. This award was presented in recognition of the support our Grand Master has given to the Masonic Service Association during his term of office

and in particular his support of the many Maine Masons who support our veteran's homes at Togus in Augusta as well as the others spread though out Maine. M.W. Adams then also presented certificates of appreciation for Maine Masons who support the outreach programs of the Masonic Services Association. R.W. Dwynal Grass was in attendance and was escorted to the East for presentation as Coordinator of the program in Caribou. Others recognized were Edward Davis who initiated the outreach program at the veteran's home in Bangor which has become a very active program and involves a number of lodges on a rotating basis.

The Grand Master then presented M.W. Adams a certificate of appreciation for his completion of five years as the state coordinator for the programs of the Masonic Service Association. The Craft gave M.W. Adams a standing ovation for his continuing efforts.

The Grand Master called for the report of the Committee on Amendments to the Constitution which was delivered by M.W. George P. Pulkkinen.

Report of the Committee on Amendments

In Grand Lodge Bangor, Maine May 1, 2012

To the Officers, Members and Brethren of this Jurisdiction:

Once again, we have serveral matters of the Constitution to consider at this Annual Communication, brethren. I thank you in advance for your time, your patience, and your perseverance as we move to accomplish this business.

One year ago, at our 192nd Annual Communication, you, the members of this Grand Lodge, voted to entertain several amendments to the constitution, lay them over for one year and decide their individual fates at this Annual Session. We will consider them in order.

I would remind you brethren that bringing these proposals to a vote is a two-step process. This body must first vote to remove each proposed amendment from the table. Then, once that is accomplished, we must vote on the actual disposition of the proposal.

Amend Section 2 which designates who is entitled to vote in this Grand Lodge by adding a Section 2A to read as follows:

SEC. 2A Any permanent member of Grand Lodge, when representing his lodge as Master or Warden at a Grand Lodge communication, shall relinquish his permanent member ballot at said communication, it being listed as a duplicate vote.

I would entertain a motion to remove this proposed amendment to Section 2 from the table.

A motion to remove this proposed amendment to Section 2 from the table was made, seconded and so **voted**.

The Committee on Amendments recommends adoption of this proposed amendment and I would entertain a motion to that end.

A motion was made to adopt this proposed amendment, seconded and so voted.

Amend Section 35 which requires that the Finance committee prepare and present a draft budget to all lodges, permanent members and voting members of Grand Lodge during March by appending the following to the end of the first paragraph.

Provided, however, that such draft budget must be accompanied by supporting documentation explaining, justifying and analyzing its recommendations. Said documentation must disclose all motions, other than acceptance of the report itself, which will be presented by the committee at the Grand Lodge Annual communication. However, such documentation shall not be construed to prohibit the committee from altering its report, budget or motions during the interval between January and May.

I would entertain a motion to remove this proposed amendment to Section 35 from the table.

A motion to remove this proposed amendment to Section 35 from the table was made, seconded and so **voted**.

The Committee on Amendments recommends adoption of this proposed amendment and I would entertain a motion to that end.

A motion to adopt this proposed amendment was made, seconded and so voted.

Amend Section 44 which defines Rules for the Government of the Grand Lodge. We will be considering Rule 13 of Section 44, which specifies when, in Grand Lodge, a motion for reconsideration of a vote may be made.

As written, Rule13 of Section 44 states, "A motion for reconsideration may be made on the same day the decision was made, or on the next day, and not afterwards, and no member, except one of the majority which decided the question, shall be allowed to move for reconsideration."

The proposed amendment would strike out [or on the next day] so that Rule 13 would read:

A motion for reconsideration may be made on the same day the decision was made, and not afterwards, and no member, except one of the majority which decided the question, shall be allowed to move for reconsideration.

I would entertain a motion to remove this proposed amendment to Rule 13 of Section 44 from the table.

A motion to remove this proposed amendment to Rule 13 of Section 44 from the table was made, seconded and so **voted**.

The Committee and Amendments recommends adoption of this proposed amendment and I would entertain a motion to that end.

A motion to adopt this proposed amendment was made, seconded and so voted.

Amend Section 131 which defines and regulates fees demanded by lodges for the conferring of degrees. Paragraph two of Section 131 now states that no fee shall be charged in any subordinate lodge under this jurisdiction for membership through affiliation.

The proposed amendment before us today would delete paragraph two of Section 131 so that there would be no prohibition should a lodge wish to charge a fee for membership through affiliation. Brethren of a lodge wishing to charge a fee for affiliated membership would simply have to exercise the regular process for amending their bylaws.

As amended, the second paragraph of Section 131 would read:

Any subordinate lodge under this jurisdiction, on submitting proper by-law changes to the Grand Lodge, and on approval by the Grand Master, may charge a fee for membership through affiliation.

I would entertain a motion to revoke this proposed amendment to Section 131 from the table.

A motion to revoke this proposed amendment to Section 131 from the table for action was made, seconded and so **voted**.

The Committee on amendments recommends adoption of this proposed amendment and I would entertain a motion to that end.

A motion to adopt this proposed amendment to Section 131 was made, seconded and so voted.

Brethren, we also have an additional proposed amendment offered for your initial consideration, and a proposed change to Standing Regulation #75, use of Masonic Buildings. If you so vote, the proposed amendment will be entertained, laid on the table for final consideration at our Annual Session next May. The change to SR75 will, if you approve it, go into effect immediately.

The proposed amendment would add, as paragraph #15 in Section 36 (Standing Committees) a Committee on Investments. This proposal is offered by your Grand Lodge Finance Committee, and reads as follows:

15. On Investments,

The Committee on Investments shall develop and approve investment policies for Grand Lodge and, after consultation with the Committee of Finance and Grand Treasurer, direct the investment of available Grand Lodge funds, including the purchase and sale of stocks, bonds and other appropriate financial instruments. Section 43 (which requires that all committee members be past masters) shall not apply to this committee.

I would propose this amendment be entertained, referred to the appropriate committee, entered upon the records, published with other proceedings of the Grand Lodge and sent to the several subordinate lodges for their consideration. And be deemed in order to take up the subject and act definitely on it at the next Annual Communication and *I so move*.

That motion was seconded and **voted** to be laid upon the for final consideration at our Annual Session next May.

And now we turn our attention to the proposal regarding use of Masonic Buildings. It would replace the opening paragraph of Standing Regulation #75and is intended to create better opportunities for lodge buildings and temple corporations to rent and use their facilities to generate needed income while maintaining necessary safeguards. It would read as follows:

75. Resolved, The Grand Lodge of Maine will allow without event specific notification, approval or dispensation, events, programs and entertainment to be held in Lodge Rooms and Lodge Buildings. These activities may be sponsored by the Lodge as Masonic Programs for Masons only or for the public, and activities by non-Masonic organizations and individuals that pay for the facility use, or not, as each Lodge desires.

No activity/event/program shall be permitted by a Lodge or Grand Master if it violates the generally accepted norms, standards or conduct of Masonry. The type of activity, event or program to be held in any lodge, dining or other hall in a Masonic building will be decided and approved by the body having title to ownership and/or management of the Masonic facility, if such event is permissible under guidance issued from time to time by the Grand Master. Any event approved by the Lodge and not on the Grand Lodge list of permissible activities shall require prior dispensation.

Dispensations for use of alcohol in a Masonic Building once given for specific types of events shall, except as otherwise explicitly specified, be considered approved for a period of up to eighteen (18) months, unless such standing dispensation is terminated by the Grand Master for just cause.

Dispensations for use of alcohol for Masonic related events and any event not covered by the standing dispensation granted by the Grand

Master shall continue to require an event specific dispensation. However, the use of alcohol dispensation will only be valid with the specific event insurance documentation legally in force, with the Masonic building, affiliated Masonic bodies and Grand Lodge named as also insured.

The remaining sections of SR 75 would remain in effect.

Do I hear a motion to adopt this proposal?

A motion to adopt this proposal was made and seconded. M.W. Pulkkinen then asked for discussion on the motion. Worshipful Robert Hains spoke in favor of the concept of the proposed change but questioned several specific parts of this proposal. Other Brethren asked questions or made comments but the recordings were not sufficiently clear for transcription. The questions raised, however, seemed to require further investigation and it was suggested that those interested in proposing changes could meet separately and bring those changes forward at another time during this session. The Grand Master directed that the proposed motion to modify SR 75 be tabled until such time as the questions can be answered with clarity.

Thank you, Brethren.

It was moved and seconded that this report be accepted and spread upon the records. That motion was so **voted**.

Report of the Committee on Dispensations and Charters

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Free and Accepted Masons of Maine;

There has been no Masonic Lodges working under a Dispensation from the Grand Master in this past fiscal year, therefore no matters have been referred. There has also been no matter concerning suspension or revocation of charters referred to this committee for consideration this past fiscal year.

It was moved and seconded to accept the report of the Committee on Dispensations and Charters and so **voted**.

Report of the Investment Committee

The report of the Investment Committee was presented by R.W. Robert Lobley

May 1, 2012 In Grand Lodge Bangor, Maine

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine.

This will be my last report, having served as a Trustee for the last 15 years on the Grand Lodge of Maine Charitable Foundation Investment Committee.

Your Committee on Investments have met twice during the year with our Financial Managers, John Walker and Chip Weickert from the H.M. Payson Company reviewing the Portfolio in great detail.

US stock prices have generally continued their march higher over the course of the past year, fueled in large part by improving earnings and strong profit margins. The ride has been somewhat bumpy however, as Europe's fiscal problems continue to weigh heavily on investors' minds. As was the case a year ago, our Federal Reserve has continued to prime the pump with its low interest policies along with various other strategies all designed to stimulate the economy and help support stock prices.

Our approach to investing the Masonic portfolios in this environment has been to continue to focus on high quality companies that we believe have the best ability to maintain relatively high margins and in turn generate the highest cash flows, further, we seek out companies who have a solid track record of rewarding their shareholders through dividend increases, stock buybacks and debt reductions. This strategy proved a successful one as the returns from the portfolio were strong and we managed to outperform the benchmark again this year. Importantly, dividend income from the stocks held in the portfolios grew this year offsetting the declining interest derived from bonds that have matured. Ultimately, portfolio income was higher than the prior year increasing the distribution to the beneficiaries of the Foundation.

Given the relatively strong move up in stock prices, particularly since last fall, we are taking a somewhat more cautious approach choosing to reduce exposure to more cyclical companies and deploy cash in more stable enterprises. Our concern is that economic growth will remain positive by lackluster while current stock prices seem to be discounting a stronger recovery. The portfolio is fully invested and, given the very low yields offered by bonds, remains tilted to an overweight in stocks. Although the challenge to predict the future direction of stock prices remains high, we are quite confident that the companies represented in the Foundation will continue to raise their dividends.

It has been the pleasure of your Investment Committee to have served the Grand Lodge this past year.

A standing ovation was given to R.W. Robert G. W. Lobley in acknowledgement of his many years of important service to the Craft. R.W. Lobley has served as trustee for the Charitable Foundation since its inception.


The Grand Master called for the report of the Finance Committee which was delivered by R.W. Thomas Pulkkinen. R.W. Pulkkinen asked that the members of his committee stand to be recognized, in particular R.W. Guy Chapman who had served as chairman of that committee for several years, Brother Mower who agreed to serve out R.W. Chapman's term and to acknowledge that this was the last time R.W. Alvin MacDonald would be part of this committee. These Brethren were given a standing ovation for their extraordinary service to the Craft. R.W. Pulkkinen then gave a power point presentation to outline and explain the budgetary process that had been undertaken to come to the conclusion before the Craft at this meeting and illustrated the points addressed in the following report.

Finance Committee 2012 Report to the Craft

In past years, Masonic leaders have been provided detailed listings of current and next year budget line item provisions – a lot of numbers but not much information. This year, the Finance Committee budget report consolidates, for presentation purposes only, many related, small dollar line items, and also provides historical cost data. We are also providing a graphic analysis of the budget so that Masonic leaders can better appreciate cost trends and changing priorities, as well as the effects of the Finance Committee recommendations and Deputy Grand Master initiatives for next year, which combine to reduce administrative costs and significantly increase our commitment to building a stronger fraternity.

The Bottom Line

Despite the significant, negative financial effect of needing to replace the ROLLS membership database system in early 2013, the Finance Committee is pleased to announce that barring any further material unexpected developments, NO increase in the per capita assessment will be proposed by the Finance Committee for next year. The Finance Committee forecasts a modest operating budget surplus in



fiscal year 2013 due to material reductions in many expense categories, which also allow for covering the nearly \$20,000 cost of operating a new database system as

well as significant increases in funding for leadership and membership development programs made available to all lodges, as well as in Masonic education resources.

While plans for transitioning from Portland to Holden have not yet been completed by Grand Lodge officers and facility lease terms remain undefined, the Finance Committee operating budget for FY 2013 assumes the move of the Grand Lodge administrative offices from Portland to Holden before April 1, 2012. The budget allows for up to two months' rent in Portland should the March 31, 2012, move date not be achieved. The budget also provides for dedicating up to 1,300 square feet in the Holden building for Grand Lodge administrative offices, priced at the \$8.50 per square foot lease rate presented to the Craft at the December 10, 2011, Special Communication, as well as a provision to contribute to the cost of the shared use of certain building facilities. This charge approximates the long-standing Finance Committee position that rent should not be more than \$12,000 per year.

The Finance Committee recommends that one-time relocation related expenses and the cost of implementing a new membership database system be funded from available resources, rather than through increasing the per-capita tax for these one-time events.

Reducing Administrative and Officer Costs

The accompanying graph demonstrates that <u>total</u> Grand Lodge operating costs are projected to increase only by about \$26,000 over the three year period of 2010-2013, or 7.6%; however, costs absorbed by the Maine Masonic Charitable Foundation have declined during that period resulting in a higher but more appropriate reliance on the per capita tax to fund the cost of operating Grand Lodge.

Being able to hold the line on the per capita assessment that each lodge will be asked to pay in early 2013, and markedly increasing education, leadership and membership services available to lodges (item #6, reflected in salmon in the accompanying chart) while absorbing the cost of the new membership database system is made possible by:

- 1) Tightened budgeting and control of Grand Lodge costs, with the Finance Committee closely evaluating needs and reducing proposed budget provisions wherever possible;
- 2) Keeping 2013 personnel costs (#1 in dark blue) at below 2010 levels as a result of the Finance Committee's elimination of an office position in two steps over the past three years, as well as by adjusting salary scales for newly employed personnel;
- 3) Significantly reducing operating expenses (#s 2 & 3 in maroon and yellow) in several areas:
- 4) Reducing the cost of Grand Lodge officer travel (#4 in light blue), especially travel outside this Grand Jurisdiction. This is a priority of the incoming Grand Master and your Finance Committee;

- 5) Controlling what had been a burgeoning cost of the Annual Communication (#5 in dark green), with additional savings projected in future years; and
- 6) Operating under the budget precept that current operating costs must be funded by current revenues, without dipping into the earnings or principal of our permanent funds except for extraordinary events.

These actions as well as corrections to previously used Grand Lodge-Charitable Foundation cost sharing formulae have not only permitted significant increases to Grand Lodge services provided to lodges, but have also enabled the Finance Committee to appropriately **reduce** the operating costs shared (paid) by the Charitable Foundation by nearly \$30,000, or 37%, from 2011 to 2013.

Budgeting for Our Future

Two aspects of the budget warranting the greatest explanation are Grand Lodge Operating Expenses (#3 in yellow) and Committee Expenses (#6 in salmon). The <u>net</u> budget for Operating Expenses is up only \$2,280 or 3.4%. This net change reflects an \$11,200 decrease in administrative office rent using the rate per square foot advanced by the Charitable Foundation Finance Committee and the Site Selection Committee. This projected savings and other expense reductions are overwhelmed by a \$19,680 provision to <u>operate and service</u> a new membership database to replace ROLLS that Grand Lodge and lodges have been using for several years, but which will no longer be available.

Financial resources have been significantly increased for services provided to lodges under the Committee Expenses component of the budget, which the Finance Committee and the Deputy Grand Master feel must be increased materially for the good of the fraternity, and which builds upon the modest budget increase advanced by the Finance Committee for the current budget year. This section of the budget represents a valued commitment to our brethren and lodges for the future...the future of Maine Freemasonry. Improving how Grand Lodge serves and leads the Craft is highly demonstrated through the initiatives relating to Membership, Leadership Development, and Masonic Education and Lodge Services (MEALS). These essential initiatives are made possible by materially changing Grand Lodge funding priorities.

The attached budget report reflects negligible Grand Lodge spending in 2010 and 2011 – except for the printing of membership brochures and the engraving of awards – to help lodges prosper through a strong commitment to Masonic education, heightened leadership development for lodge officers and members, and assistance in growing our membership base (which has fallen from the peak of over 48,000 brethren to now under 20,000). The proposed budget provides for the following initiatives in these areas, for which planning is already in the works.

Leadership Development – A team of Masons is currently putting together a full-day leadership program – the Dirigo Masonic Leadership Conference – that will be offered at multiple sites across the state, to which all senior lodge officers and Grand Lodge officers will be encouraged to attend. The program's goal is to better focus the direction of our Craft and lodges, and provide officers with tools and

perspectives that will put the Craft to work, strengthen lodge performance and emphasize the tenets of our Craft. In addition, programs will be offered statewide for lodge secretaries, treasurers and membership teams, and the Maine Masonic College has been asked to develop educational programs on mentoring that should enhance the education of candidates, nurture their lodge ties, and improve personal relationships outside of lodge.

Membership Development – Attracting the right men to our Craft should be the role of every Mason and certainly every lodge. Increasing membership provides both manpower and financial resources to fill our chairs and committees, as well as our coffers. Fellowship nights have proven to be successful and so have open houses. The next Grand Master supports programs that attract good men to our Craft – programs such as fellowship nights and open houses that provide the public with information and opportunities to take that first step towards becoming Masons. Lodge feedback on the open houses held last October clearly instructs Grand Lodge that this is a most valuable tool that lodges want to utilize.

The 2013 budget provides additional funding for television and radio messaging on Freemasonry and our open houses, reusable banners for every lodge participating in the open house program to better let their communities know where Masons are welcoming visitors, the initiation of a new Masonic Rookie Program, as well as leadership training programs on membership development and retention, such as attracting prospective candidates whose membership will benefit Freemasonry and who will benefit from becoming Masons. The next open house is scheduled for October 20, 2012.

Masonic Education and Lodge Services – The MEALS committee is working on new, invaluable educational DVDs on our Masonic degrees to aid in the education of candidates. The DVDs to be produced during the upcoming year will be available to all lodges. The committee is also preparing to distribute additional candidate instruction manuals to lodges. The DVDs and manuals will be important aids in improving how we instruct our candidates during their degree journey, and also be a source of confidence among lodge leaders by providing a comprehensive visual roadmap for successful candidate enhancement.

Investing for Our Future

For the past couple years, the Finance Committee has diligently pursued the investment of money then being held in non-interest bearing accounts, thereby generating investment income on our permanent, self-insurance and other funds. The aim of this investment initiative is to strengthen our financial future and hedge against inflation risk. This initiative was accomplished this year with the interim assistance of the Charitable Foundation's Investment Committee, for which we are most grateful. The Finance Committee, Grand Master and Deputy Grand Master share the opinion that Grand Lodge needs to have an investment committee of qualified Masons to oversee Grand Lodge investments, to invest wisely, to protect our treasure generated from past generations of Masons, and to grow our investments for the future strength of Maine Freemasonry. Legislation has been submitted to the

Committee on Amendments to the Constitution for reading at the 2012 Annual Communication.

Providing Fidelity Insurance to Lodges

In 2009, the Grand Lodge voted to establish a self-insurance fund to partially cover losses incurred by lodges from a defalcation by lodge officers. In 2011, Grand Lodge voted to cap this coverage at \$40,000 per episode. The self-insurance fund was established through the redirection of moneys paid in 2010 and 2011 for the publication and mailing of the Maine Mason. Those funds have now been invested in an effort to build the fund balance and enhance the financial stability of the self-insurance program. During the past three years, lodges have continued to pay \$11 per year, representing the premium previously charged by the insurance carrier for this coverage, which is no longer available to Maine lodges in the commercial insurance market.

In an effort to further build the self-insurance fund and hopefully avoid the need for any large supplemental funding by lodges that might be necessary in response to a large insurance payout to one or more lodges, the Finance Committee recommends that the \$11 per year lodge insurance payment continue to be included on the annual return and that the funds collected, now about \$2,000 per year, be added to the self-insurance fund.

Expected Finance Committee Motions at the May 2012 Annual Communication

While developing events and new information may warrant changes to the Finance Committee's preliminary fiscal year 2013 budget and associated recommendations, the following motions are expected at this time:

- 1) That Grand Lodge approve the proposed budget for fiscal year 2013 that begins on April 1, 2012,
- 2) That Grand Lodge endorse the Finance Committee decision to the use money from the Moody Fund for one-time costs associated with the relocation of Grand Lodge offices and the implementation of a new membership database, rather than increase the per capita tax to pay for these expenses,
- 3) That Grand Lodge approve keeping the Per-Capita Assessment at \$14.10 for the ensuing year, and
- 4) That Grand Lodge approve continuing the \$11 "premium" per lodge per year for fidelity insurance coverage, with the payments being added to the Grand Lodge administered self-insurance

Masonic Education & Lodge Services

Grand Lodge of Maine Bangor, Maine April 28, 2012

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine:

The Masonic Education & Lodge Services (M.E.A.L.S.) Committee has been extremely busy again this year. We accomplished the following:

Provided training in March to the DER's. The attendance at this year's orientation was the best that I can recall and collectively, they have the talent and initiative to reach new heights as Masonic Educators. I expect big things from this group of DER's and I look forward to hearing about their many Masonic educational accomplishments in the future.

Last year, I distributed the new Instructor's Manuals to the DER's and or DDGM's and requested that they keep a copy and deliver a copy to each of their constituent lodges. Unfortunately, many of those manuals were never delivered to the lodges. This is very disappointing to me and to the entire MEALS Committee because the system failed to support the lodges. That said, I would like to remind every Grand Lodge Officer and Committee that our primary job is to support the Grand Master and all of his lodges. Anything short of that is simply not acceptable. If anyone has copies of the Masonic Instructor's Manual that have not been delivered to constituent lodges, please deliver them as soon as possible. I hereby request that all DER's check with their constituent lodges to determine which ones do not have the new manual, then contact me, Tim Martel at 729-1433, timbev70@comcast.net with the number of manuals that you need for your district. The intent is that every DER and every lodge have one of these manuals.

The MEALS Committee and members of the Maine Masonic College Board of Regents are teaming up to develop Pollard Plan videos in DVD format from scratch. These Masonic Education DVD's will replace the Pollard Plan VHS videos that

were created in the 1990s starring M.W. Brother George Pulkkinen. The new videos will feature a wide array of Maine Masons from locations throughout our state. We plan to start filming in May 2012 and if everything goes according to plan, we plan to complete the filming by the end of the next Masonic year. Once the DVD's are completed, every lodge, DER, DRI and DDGM will receive a copy. Worshipful Brother Ed King has graciously accepted the job of "Director" and he is being supported by R.W. Richard Bowden as the "Camera Man". They are being supported by the entire MEALS Committee. This is a very exciting project that will benefit all Maine Masons and their respective lodges.

The Maine Masonic College Board of Regents invited the MEALS Committee to team with them in developing and executing the 2012 Masonic Convocation July 28th and 29th of 2012. We are very excited about this Masonic Educational opportunity and we hope that many Maine Masons will take advantage of this wonderful Masonic Educational opportunity this year.

Conducted a very successful Lodge Officer Training event at the Turner Lodge. It was well attended and enthusiastically supported by the entire district. We were asked to conduct training for the 14th District but due the weather and personal illness, we had to cancel this offering for now. We are going to try again next fall. If any DER or DDGM would like us to conduct Lodge Officer Training in your district, please give me a call. Tim Martel, Chairman of the MEALS Committee 729-1433 or timbev70@comcast.net. Better still, we encourage all DER's to conduct their own Lodge Officer Training Program for their district. Ample assistance can be provided by the MEALS Committee upon request. We are only a phone call or email away and the do it yourself approach would save your Grand Lodge a considerable amount of money each year Furthermore, your constituent lodges would probably prefer the district approach to lodge officer training. This approach is already being successfully utilized by some of Maine's Masonic Districts. Give it a try and I am confident that you will prefer doing it yourself.

Raymond Rideout Award

There were several nominations for the Raymond Rideout Award this year and two lodges stood out from the rest, i.e. Springvale Lodge #190 Springvale, Maine and Delta Lodge #153 at Lovell, Maine Although the competition was very close, the Raymond Rideout award is hereby awarded to Springvale Lodge #190 and the Runner-Up is Delta Lodge #153 .

Springvale Lodge #190, Springvale, Maine...Springvale Lodge has an exceptional candidate instruction program starting from the accepted candidate with an informal meeting with the prospective candidate and his wife with various members, past masters and officers, one of whom works with the candidate throughout his degrees who becomes the candidates mentor. This pattern continues through the three degrees utilizing all grand Lodge provided films and various brethren for each step in each degree. The Lodge has been very successful in attracting and keeping candidates this past year in large part because of word of mouth and the ongoing

education a candidate is provided with. They rarely have had the opportunity for me to speak on Masonic Education due to being booked up several months in advance with degree work and their own various speakers on a variety of Masonic and non Masonic subjects which have included the York County Shelter Program which is one of the collective projects of the 19th District. They are progressing very well with this program after I had discussed its merits. The candidates mentor provides the opportunity and takes the candidate to other lodges performing his most recent degree as well as just to visit a stated business meeting. This lodge has been introducing the new master mason to the ritual, cipher and constitution rules and regulations. They do this by having the lodge hall open every Tuesday evening where they practice floor work, ritual and short Masonic educational programs. Springvale Lodge #190 sponsors a wild game supper in the fall and a yearly lobster stew supper for their annual meeting. They have a supper at nearly every stated meeting and at times at special meetings as well. Springvale Lodge has this past year been assisting at least two other Lodges within this district that I know of who are short of active members to do all stations in degree work as well as assisting those Lodges in candidate instruction. Springvale Lodge #190 has accepted and followed through with the Lodge Education Instructor program. He coordinates candidate and general membership instruction utilizing the Lodge Instructors manual and designing his own to better fit his lodges' needs. These have consisted of points within the ritual, floor work of the lodge to make it flow more smoothly and additional instruction in the constitution. In addition, I have given two talks at this lodge in the past year. One was a second in a series of two on the constitution and a new one about the comparison of the three degrees as they relate to the old operative stone masons guilds. Both were well attended and received.

In my view, the 19th Masonic District has shown an overall marked improvement in Masonic Education this past year over the previous one. Springvale Lodge #190 has by far outpaced the other nine Lodges within this district in overall Masonic Education. They have taken the guidance from the Meals Committee as well as my own very seriously as has been this last year shown to me. All ten Lodges show a marked improvement as well, however most not in all phases. Springvale is consistently represented in district activities such as the District Officers Association, food and fund drives for York county Shelter program, district dinner dance and in visiting other lodges. To me, to be active in all these areas is necessary to round out a full Masonic educational program. Lodge members have asked me if new VCR tapes or DVDs were coming out in the foreseeable future as the old ones were getting a little old, which I have to agree. The dedication to Masonic Education by the Master of 2011 has been further noticed by him being selected to serve as District Educational Representative for the 19th Masonic District for the upcoming year and I heartily approve of the choice by our Deputy Grand Master. If he continues to show the leadership and drive in his next job, the 19th District will continue to benefit. He is a high school teacher by profession.

In closing, I would like to thank all of the DER's for their contributions to Masonic Education, especially R.W. Roger O. Easley Sr. Although Roger has been extremely ill with cancer throughout this year, his leadership and educational contributions to "The Craft" are both inspirational and legendary. Brother Roger is a "Mason's

Mason" and it has been an honor to work with him. I would also like to thank Wor. Brother Ed King and R.W. Bro. Richard Bowden for helping us to recreate the Pollard Plan videos and the Masonic College Board of Regents for asking the MEALS Committee to team with them in developing and executing the 2012 Convocation. The Grand Master turned the gavel of authority over to M.W. George P. Pulkkinen for the conduct of the election.

The Brethren were asked to have their voting cards ready as the ballot was about to be opened for the position of DGM. The five candidates were asked to stand so that the Brethren could put a face to a name. R.W. Randall Elliot, R.W. Kenneth Richardson, R.W. Thomas Pulkkinen, R.W. David Walker and R.W. The ballot was then opened for the position of Senior Grand Warden. The candidates were asked to stand; Brother David Hasey, Brother John Irovando and Jeffery Simonton. The ballot was declared open and the ballots collected. The ballots being collected the ballot was declared closed.

The ballot was then opened for the position for Junior Grand Warden. There being only one candidate, Worshipful Brother Ronald Murphy, a motion was made, seconded and passed to declare Brother Murphy elected by acclamation. Brother Murphy accepted.

The Finance Committee ballot showed two names for two positions, Brother Glen Mower and R.W. Frank Theriault. There being no other candidates, a motion was made, seconded and passed to elect these Brethren by acclamation. Both Brethren accepted.

The Grand Master asked for the report of the Grand Lecturer which was delivered by R.W. Christian Ratliff.

Report of the Grand Lecturer

The lodge of the year award has now been named the Benjamin Gleason award. Right Worshipful Benjamin Gleason was the first Grand Lecturer for the Grand

Lodge of Maine. The 2012 award goes to Oriental Lodge #13 of Bridgton. This award represents the skill, the capacity and the concern that this lodge has for the ritual.

It was moved and seconded that the report be accepted and spread upon the records. That motion was so voted.

Report of the Grand Historian

Grand Lodge of Maine 2011 History

To the Grand Lodge of Maine and M.W. Grand Master - W. Louis Greenier II

This past year has been one filled with numerous historical events for the Grand Lodge of Maine. The Grand Lodge administrative office, museum and library was moved from Portland to Holden, as voted by the craft; the northern most lodge in this Grand Jurisdiction, FT. Kent Lodge # 209, had its lodge building taken by eminent domain, in order that a new International bridge between the U.S. and Canada could begin construction; three new lodge buildings were dedicated by the Grand Lodge; a new lodge was chartered – Seminary Hill Daylight Lodge #220; and 2 Corner Stone Laying ceremonies were conducted, as well the dedication of a 9-11 Monument in Freeport.

Just before the 192nd Annual Communication of the Grand Lodge was held in May 2011, a Special Communication was held on March 12, 2011 for the purpose of hearing the recommendation of the Site Selection Committee on the possibility of moving the Grand Lodge administrative office, museum, and library to a new location. At this communication the proposal was turned down by the Craft for the lack of financial specifics of the proposed location and move. The Site Selection Committee was then directed to re-assess the specifics addressed by the Craft and make a second recommendation. R.W. Ronald Fowle II - Past Junior Grand Warden headed the committee. He and the committee members went back to work evaluating 5 statewide potential sites. The committee developed and established uniform and comprehensive guidelines and line items for the evaluation of each site, thus all of the sites were evaluated by the same standards. Each of the locations was visited for site inspections to ensure that each location was properly and fairly evaluated.

On December 10, 2011 another special session was held at the Bangor Masonic Center to decide the location of the Grand Lodge office. R.W. Ron Fowle and Bro. Ed King made presentations of the findings of the Site Selection Committee and after questions and discussion from the Craft, the vote was taken. The vote to move the Grand Lodge administrative office, museum, and library was taken and by a 263 to 233 vote the motion passed to move the Grand Lodge office to a new site in Holden, Me. It should be noted here that 41 of the 186 lodges in this Grand Jurisdiction were NOT present for this very important Special Communication. A list of these lodges was printed in the Winter 2012 edition of the Maine Mason.

The site in Holden was purchased by the Maine Masonic Charitable Foundation on December 30, 2011. The Grand Lodge of Maine has signed a 5-year lease with the MMCF for space in this new facility.

A Cornerstone and Dedication Ceremony for the new Grand Lodge administrative office, museum, and library was held on March 21, 2012 at Holden, Me. attended by the Grand Master, Grand Lodge Officers and members of the Craft.

Another completely unique event took place in this Grand Jurisdiction this past year. A lodge building on the bank of the St. John River in northern Maine received word that a new International bridge was going to be constructed between Clair, N.B. and Ft. Kent, Me. The placement of that bridge was going to be just downstream from the present bridge and the Ft. Kent Lodge building was at the U.S. end of the new bridge. The Masonic Block, as it has been referred to locally, was going to have to be removed. The brethren of Ft. Kent Lodge had to set about finding another location for their lodge.

The last meeting in the "old" Lodge building was held at the stated meeting in April of 2011, with a celebration of the History of Ft. Kent Lodge and of the building which had housed the Lodge for 109 years. Without any doubt, this is the only lodge in the entire nation, located along the several thousands of miles of U.S. border with Canada and Mexico where this situation could possibly have occurred.

The new masonic building for Ft. Kent Lodge is now located about 500 feet upstream from the old location and was a commercial building in the past, most recently housing a dress shop with an upstairs apartment. The brethren of Ft. Kent Lodge with the assistance of a local contractor refurbished the building and were ready to hold their first stated meeting in September of 2011 in the new building. The old masonic building was torn down in June 2011 and construction for the new bridge has already begun (on the Canadian side of the river).

During the course of the year 3 new lodge buildings were dedicated – specifically Mt. Olivet Lodge # 203 on September 24, 2011; Northern Star Lodge # 28 on December 10, 2011; and Ft. Kent Lodge #209 on April 14, 2012. The brethren of each of these lodges have shown their dedication to masonry, specifically in their local towns by meeting the challenge of building or rebuilding a new lodge hall – neither fire nor international politics could deter their determination to practice their craft. How easy it might have been for these brethren to have given up their Charter and consolidated with a nearby lodge, rather than to persevere and maintain their own identity. These brethren deserve our respect and we can take their lesson home with us. Patience and perseverance shall accomplish all things.

The Grand lodge officers performed Corner Stone and Dedication Ceremonies at the Saco Fire Station and at the new Grand Lodge Office building in Holden. In September the Grand Lodge Officers dedicated a Monument to the Memorial of our countrymen for the tragedy that occurred on September 11, 2001. Hundreds of masons paraded down Main Street in Freeport and dedicated the pillars of steel from the twin towers in New York City. DGM R.W. A. James Ross delivered the keynote address following the Dedication Ceremonies.

The Grand Master has had the privilege of attending numerous Master Mason degrees throughout the state – two of special note are 1) on November 16th M.W. Greenier had the special privilege of raising his own nephew, John Branscomb in Kennebec Lodge # 5 and 2) on December 3rd DeMolay State Master Councilor Sam Goldsberry received his Master Mason Degree in Ancient York Lodge # 155. M.W. Greenier also traveled to Colorado to raise his own son, Aaron Lewis Greenier, to the sublime degree of a Master Mason – a special event in any father's lifetime.

Our M.W. Grand Master attended the Grand Lodge of Washington D.C. for their 200th Anniversary in June of 2011. He also attended the North American Conference of Grand Masters in Atlanta, Ga. and was present at the International Night on Campobello Island in New Brunswick.

The Grand Lodge of Maine honored Oriental Lodge # 13 in Bridgton with the 2011 Lodge of the Year Honor for their excellence in Ritual over the last year. On April 20, 2012 the Grand Lodge Officers were present to witness their excellent degree work and to present the award to Oriental Lodge and its officers.

Grand Lodge Programs – The State-wide Open House Program held on October 15th, met with varied results. Some lodges had great success, while other lodges did not participate. There is no doubt that the involvement of Grand Lodge with advance advertising for this event helped out greatly. Some lodges had far more success than others mainly because of the commitment of its members and active participation of its members within the local community. Reports this year are more positive than in past years.

CHIPS – This program continues to grow each year. The participation of the lodge members throughout the state has been tremendous. Some of the CHIPS coordinators are besieged with requests for programs from schools and local festivals. The amount of commitment that each of the local CHIPS coordinators have put forth this past year deserves special recognition, as does the commitment from members of the Craft that give of their time and effort to make these events a public success story. Every CHIPS event always brings the question – When and where is the next one, as I need to bring my children/grandchildren – This has to be one of Masonry's greatest successes for putting us in the public spotlight.

Bikes for Books – What a great program this has turned into, in a very short time. Lodges all over the state are participating in this program. Schools and teachers are embracing this program with open arms. The local lodges across the state are giving away hundreds of bikes to deserving kids and the kids are gaining knowledge from their efforts to read books. This program is again putting masons in the public spotlight in a most positive manner. This program takes time and commitment from lodges and their brothers all of the state.

Lodge Histories – I well knew that to duplicate last year's 100% of the lodge histories being submitted, would be an almost impossible feat. I am very much disappointed to report that only 104 lodges have completed their 2011 Lodge History – or 55% of all the lodges in this state. Of the 24 Districts in this Grand Jurisdiction only 2 Districts have all of their histories submitted – those two Districts are the #1

and #2 Districts – to both Districts I say Thank You and well done. Brethren, getting these histories written and submitted is not that hard a task. The History Committee and myself have looked at all of the submitted histories and we have seen several exceptional histories and we have seen some that, truthfully, are only marginally acceptable - but at least submitted as required by Grand Lodge. I see no reason why the remaining 45% of the lodges have not fulfilled their obligation.

To finish this 2011 History Report to the Grand Lodge of Maine I would conclude with this remark: Masonry is a philosophy – a way of life and conduct that treats all men with equal respect, regardless of personal beliefs or standing within the community. What masonry is not is a building or the attachment to worldly belongings. So Mote It Be.

The tellers had returned with the results of the 1st ballot for the station of Deputy Grand Master. Kent #209. The lodge voted to have the best history for this Masonic year was Seminary Hill Daylight Lodge #220 whose historian is Worshipful Edward King.

Report Of The Maine Masonic College 2011-2012

In Grand Lodge Bangor, Maine May 1, 2012

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine:

The operation of the Maine Masonic College has continued to mature during the year as experience has validated the most successful procedures and has revealed the failure of others. Guidelines for conducting the business of the College have been modified to improve the product that is being offered to the Brethren.

A schedule of classes was projected for the entire year 2011, with consideration given to a geographic distribution of classes as well as to the presentation of a broad range of subjects embraced within the Seven Liberal Arts and Sciences. Classes were given in Augusta, Bangor, Newport, Rockport, Thomaston, and York. Two other classes that had to be cancelled were scheduled for Houlton and Portland. In addition, a framework was approved by the Board of Regents for a diploma program whereby students might pursue a course of study in a specialized topic with help from a qualified advisor. A data base was established that would permit the College to track the progress of those students who might wish to focus their studies on an aspect of Freemasonry of special interest to them. These innovations should contribute to more continuity not only for the preparation of a curriculum but also for the progress of the Brethren in their pursuit of more light in Masonry.

The second annual Maine Masonic College Convocation was convened at the Hollywood Slots Hotel in Bangor in July 17th and 18th and proved to be as successful as the first one. Speakers were again brought in from various parts of the country and stimulated a great deal of enthusiasm and appreciation among the attendees. The Board of Trustees was gratified to see that a large number of new Masons attended this Convocation and that these Brethren contributed substantially to the discussions provoked by the speakers. Their excitement about the Convocation and Freemasonry was palpable during the two-day event. Planning for the next Convocation, to be held in July, 2012, includes presentations by the M.E.A.L.S. (Masonic Education and Lodge Service) Committee as well as by the Maine Masonic College speakers. The Convocation will follow a two-track program, with attendees opting for the presentations of their choice.

As with all complex activities, communications is a vexing problem. The College needs to improve its use of its web site in order to sustain the interest of those who attend our classes. We are also exploring ways to exploit the capabilities of Face Book and other social media. We are told repeatedly that one of the best ways to impart information regarding upcoming activities is by word of mouth. To that end, we are organizing a body of Masons who will constitute the Friends of the Maine Masonic College. They will be our outreach instrument to contact Masons throughout the state in order to inform them of future classes and presentations. News of our annual Convocations is now being announced in nationally distributed Masonic publications. We continue to be pleased with the reception given to The

Entablature, an integral part of the Maine Mason magazine for the past four years. In it we present articles of interest to the Craft as well as a forecast of Maine Masonic College activities.

The Maine Masonic Charitable Foundation has generously continued to fund our efforts and so we are able to provide classes free of charge, with attendees paying only a modest fee for meals. We have refined our budget requests over a six-year period to provide a clearer picture of our expenses and to demonstrate that we are conducting further fund raising activities that allow us to expand our activities.

The Board of Regents expects to continue refining our activities so that interesting and challenging classes can be brought to still more locations in Maine. We intend to explore more and better ways in which to communicate the plans for our activities in order to reduce the uncertainty that we have experienced on some occasions. We remain dedicated to our mission of bringing more light in Masonry.

Report of the Grand Treasurer

In Grand Lodge Bangor, Maine May 1, 2012

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine:

The accounting records for The Grand Lodge of Maine A.M. & F.M. and The Masonic Charitable Foundation of the Grand Lodge of Maine for the year ended March 31, 2011, have been audited by the Auditing Firm of Macdonald Page & Co. LLC and the results there of have been printed in the proceedings for the year then ended. Both Organizations, the Grand Lodge's and the Charitable Foundation's financial statements are prepared on the modified cash basis of accounting. The only modification to the cash basis is that unrealized gains and losses are included in revenues and investments are reported at fair market value.

Under that basis of accounting the only assets recognized are cash and investments. All other assets and liabilities are not capitalized. Accordingly, asset purchases are expensed in the year of acquisition and repayments on borrowings, should there be any, are expensed when paid. It should be noted that both audit reports expressed certified opinions.

Filings of the 990 tax returns have been submitted as required by the Internal Revenue Service.

Whereas the current fiscal year has just ended the records of the Grand Lodge are ready for audit and as soon as that is completed will be reported in the up-coming proceedings. Whereas I was relieved of the Treasurers duties of the Charitable Foundation I make o comment as to the status of the Charitable Foundation records.

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine:

I, hereby submit my last Grand Secretary's report with my thanks to the Masons of Maine for having given me the honor of serving as your Grand Secretary for the past thirteen years. I have enjoyed my work in the Grand Lodge office and I have particularly enjoyed working with the many dedicated Masons who served in the various positions in their lodges and/or in Grand Lodge during those thirteen years. During my tenure as Grand Secretary, I have worked for seven different Grand Masters and have found it interesting to observe and adapt to the various leadership styles of each of them.

During the past thirteen years there have been numerous changes in personnel in the Grand Lodge office and I truly believe that we have been very fortunate to have had some very capable and dedicated people handling the day to day business of Grand Lodge and serving the lodges throughout the State of Maine. I can honestly say that I have received many expressions of gratitude from lodge secretaries and other lodge officers for the help they have received from the staff in the Grand Lodge.

When the Masonic Temple in Portland was designed and built over one hundred years ago, it included a number of areas in the front half of the building that were designed to be income producing entities while the rooms in the rear portion were designed to serve as Masonic Lodge Halls and offices for use by a number of lodges and the Grand Lodge.

Unfortunately, there came a time, much like today, when then economy made it difficult for our declining membership to support this large, majestic building and plans were made to sell the Temple and build a smaller building on land acquired on the outskirts of the city. Separate bids were received for the purchase of the front half of the building but not the back half. The resulted in the front, income producing half being sold but the prospective buyer of the back half withdrew and the Trustees were left with the rear portion of the building without the benefit of being able to generate income to support the building.

Over the years there have been other factors which have prevented the Trustees from being able to properly maintain the building and have resulted in increased rent being charged to the various Masonic bodies that occupied space in the Temple. For that reason, we arrived at a point in time when Grand Lodge found it necessary to relocate its Administrative office, Library and Museum to another location.

On December 10, 2011, the Craft voted to move the Grand Lodge office to a former Bank building that had just been purchased by the Maine Masonic Charitable Foundation in Holden, Maine. Due to the fact that the Staff at the Grand Lodge office found it unreasonable to move to Holden in order to continue their service to Grand Lodge, the new office will be staffed with all new personnel. All of the employees in the Portland office wish the very best for those new employees that will take over in the new facility in a little over two months.

As for your Grand Secretary, I would just like to thank each of the staff members that have served our Masonic Lodges over the past thirteen years and wish them the very best in the years to come. I appreciate everything you have done over the years and I know that the Masons of Maine have appreciated your services over the years.

All but Thirty (30) days was suspended and it was ordered that he be placed on Probation for a period of One (1) year.

Complaint was made by Corinthian Lodge No. 95 against Zackery C. Estes for the purpose of charging him with unMasonic conduct. By letter dated October 20, 2011, Zackery C. Estes was suspended by the Grand Master from all the rights and privileges of Masonry.

Due notice was sent by certified mail to the defendant and he was informed that charges which are a Felony under the laws of the State of Maine or the United States of America automatically result in expulsion from all the rights and privileges of Masonry.

The sentence was suspended and defendant was placed on probation for a period of four years. This conviction resulted in Austin E. Luce being placed on the Maine Sex Offender Registry as a lifetime registrant.

On October 3, 2011 Maine Lodge No. 20 voted to charge Austin E. Luce with unMasonic Conduct. By letter dated November 18, 2011, Austin E. Luce was suspended by the Grand Master from all the rights and privileges of Masonry.

Due notice was sent by certified mail to the defendant and he was informed that charges which are Felony under the laws of the State of Maine or the United States of America automatically result in expulsion from all of the rights and privileges of Masonry.

Accordingly, it is Found: That Austin E. Luce is guilty of unMasonic conduct and the Trial Commissioners make the following

Recommendation: That Austin E. Lean should be expelled from all the rights and privileges of Masonry.

Varnum, Jr. was convicted of one charge of Conspiracy to Possess with Intent to Distribute Prescription Drugs (Felony) and one charge of Use of a Firearm During and in Relation to a Drug Trafficking Offense (Felony) Docket No. CR 000171-001 by the U.S. District Court at Bangor on May 17, 2011 and was sentenced to 24 months on Count one and 60 months on Count 2, to be served consecutively.

Felicity Lodge No. 19 voted to charge Timothy W. Varnum, Jr. with unMasonic Conduct. By letter dated October 27, 2011Timothy W. Varnum, Jr. was suspended by the Grand Master from all the rights and privileges of Masonry.

Due notice was sent by certified mail to the defendant and he was informed that charges which are a Felony under the laws of the State of Maine or the United States of America automatically result in expulsion from all of the rights and privileges of Masonry.

Accordingly, it is

Found: That Timothy W. Varnum, Jr. is guilty of unMasonic conduct and the Trial Commissioners make the following

Recommendation: That Timothy W. Varnum, Jr. should be expelled from all the rights and privileges of Masonry.

CHIP Committee Report

May 1, 2012

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine and Most Worshipful Brother Greenier. Continuing with the Maine Child Identification Program reports, the following is submitted. 2011 was an outstanding year, not only did the coordinators provide an outstanding number of programs to the citizens of Maine, they also achieved the goal of 3500 set by me and they continued on to a total of 3572.

The CHIP program started using now outdated VHS recording cameras, then obtained a computerized system from EZCHILD ID. That is in use at this time, however, updates are no longer available for the legacy version. Therefore, I have started replacing those systems with the newer version which includes more features, one being a person's medical page for medications if the persons want it.

The upgrading of the entire state will encompass at least the rest of this year and more likely into 2013 also. As we upgrade each coordinators systems, the older lap tops will be available to those using the legacy version if they require an additional system or one of their current ones requires maintenance. This will enable MECHIP to continue to offer programs to the public without the occurrence of "down for maintenance" excuse.

MECHIP in currently looking for a volunteer coordinator for two areas. First up is Washington County or Districts 2 and 3. No experience is necessary as we will train the individual as to his duties as a coordinator. The next opening is in the Bangor are districts 5, 6, and 21. Here again no experience is necessary as we will train the volunteer.

Lester Francis Smith

R. W. Lester Francis Smith was born September 1, 1936 I Anson, Maine, the son of Harry and Nellie Smith. He graduated from Madison High School in Madison, Maine, and Maine Vocational Technical Institute in South Portland. He is a veteran of the United State Marine Corps. He married Gail (Watson) Smith of Oakland, Maine, and they have five grown children: sons, Stephen, Jeffery, Brian, and

daughters Sylvia and Margaret. It's important to mention that they have nine grandchildren as well as a great-grandson.

Brother Smith retired in 1992 after a 35-year career with the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA).

He has been an active supporter of the Order of DeMolay and the Order of Rainbow for Girls and has received numerous awards and citations for his tireless dedication. One worthy project which Lester actively promoted is the "Bikes for Books" incentive program for grade-school children.

He was raised to the sublime degree of Master Mason in Benevolent Lodge No. 7 at Milford, New Hampshire, November 30, 1976, and progressed through their line to serve as master of the Lodge 1988-89. In general, the changes requested dealt with financial matter as lodges reassess their needs.

Report of the Committee On Grievances And Appeals

In Grand Lodge May 1, 2012

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine:

Your Committee on Grievances and Appeals has had referred to it an Appeal from a prior vote of this Grand Lodge at its Annual Session in May of 1999 in the matter of Grand Lodge of Maine Ancient Free and Accepted Masons vs. Alan Burnell, at that time a member of Crooked River Lodge No 152, on a charge of unmasonic conduct. Charges were brought against Mr. Burnell by Crooked River Lodge No. 152 and he was duly suspended by the Grand Master. A trial before the Commissioners of Trials took place and the Commissioners in their report recommended that Mr. Burnell be reinstated by vote of that Grand Lodge. Two members of Crooked River Lodge then spoke on the floor of Grand

Lodge stating that the members of Crooked River Lodge were divided over the Trial Commissioners recommendation to reinstate Mr. Burnell. This Grand Lodge Voted in favor of rejecting the Trial Commissioners recommendations, thus upholding the Grand Master's Suspension.

On October 25, 2011, Mr. Burnell wrote to our Grand Secretary to request that he be reinstated as a Mason. Mr. Burnell was raised in Crooked River Lodge in October of 1982 and served as its Master in 1987. Communication was received from the Secretary of Crooked River Lodge stating that the Lodge sent out a letter to its Members explaining the requirements of our Constitution and that a vote would be taken in Crooked River Lodge at their January, 2012 Meeting. Such a Vote was taken and it was favorable for the reinstatement of Mr. Burnell. The Secretary of the Lodge then contacted Mr. Burnell with the paper work for reinstatement which was promptly returned to the Lodge with a check for dues.

Your Committee on Grievances and Appeals have carefully reviewed the historical records in this matter furnished us by the Grand Secretary and we personally met with Mr. Alan Burnell in Bangor on March 13, 2012.

After fully considering the matter and all of the evidence presented by the record and after fully discussing the matter with Mr. Burnell, your Committee on Grievances and Appeals find as follows:

- 1. All of the proper steps for reinstatement under our Grand Lodge constitution have been followed in this matter.
- The Report of the Commissioners of Trials in this matter some thirteen years ago unanimously recommended reinstatement of Mr. Burnell. Since that time Mr. Burnell has led an exemplary life in his Community and the Members of Crooked River Lodge No. 152 have favorably voted that Mr. Burnell be reinstated.
- Your Committee on Grievances and Appeals unanimously recommend that Mr. Alan L. Burnell be Restored to all of the rights and privileges of Masonry.

We thank the Grand Master for appointing us to serve our Grand Lodge this year.

Most Worshipful Grand Master, we move that this Report of the Committee on Grievances and Appeals be accepted and printed in the proceedings and that this Grand Lodge adopt the Findings and Recommendations of this Committee in the matter of Alan L. Burnell.

Report of the Doings of Grand Lodge Officers

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine:

As of April 25, 2011, six days prior to The Grand Lodge Convocation, The committee on the Doings of Grand Lodge Officers had received only three of the approximately thirty three Grand Lodge reports required of its Grand Officers. This committee relies solely on the reports of the Grand Officers to make their determinations and recommendations. To base this report on insufficient information would be a disservice to the craft and its members. This situation has become increasingly worse in the succeeding years and needs to be addressed immediately.

We do hereby recommend that the Most Worshipful Grand Master Take whatever action necessary to ensure that all Grand Lodge Officers submit these reports in a timely manner so that the information will be available when required by the respective committees.

The Grand Marshal was then called to the East ostensibly for the purpose of assisting the Grand Master. The following was then presented:

Josiah Hayden Drummond Medal John Thomas Irovando

Worshipful Brother John Thomas Irovando was born in Hazelton, Pennsylvania, July 12, 1948, the son of John D. and Dorothy Irovando. The Grand Master made the following remarks:

Grand Master's Address to the Brethren following Installation

Bangor, Maine, 2 May 2012

"Masonry is a values centered organization which affords like-minded men opportunities to share similar values, hopes and concerns for ourselves, our families and our communities. Masonry as expressed in the teachings of our three degrees provides us with the foundation to exercise our beliefs commensurate with our needs and wants in life.

Our Masonic Lodges should be regarded as places where we make, or administer, the rites of Masonry to a man. Masonry itself is defined by and through the men that exercise the philosophy of its teachings. It is who we are. Brethren, men do not join the Masons. Men become Masons and then become part of a Masonic Lodge as members. Masonry will never ask a man to change who he is rather Masonry accepts the good man and is nurtured by his contributions. The Masonic Lodge is a place where we train Masons and provide them with the valuable working tools and resources to become better thereby allowing them to be a smarter, conscientious, and well informed member of society.

Societal norms are dramatically changing and will continue to change and even evolve into new orders and ways of thinking. Society changes for many reasons; mostly out of need.

Brethren, we should never change for the sake of changing, but we should always remain vigilant to seize opportunities to enhance and even expand our culture. I no

longer want to hear that, "we can't do that" or "that has been tried before but did not work". What I want to hear, in fact, what I would relish and encourage and promote is that every Lodge recognize for itself that it is its own unto itself. Every Lodge through its own means has a remedy to aid solutions. Through careful self-analysis (a group conscientious effort) Lodges must determine what they want to be, how they want to be perceived and what types of men they want to attract. One size should never fit all. Now, I am not advocating that every Lodge in this Grand Jurisdiction should become a traditional observance Lodge or a specialty Lodge, but if you should discover that the majority of your members favor a liking for one thing over another, then I say set your sights and resources on that one thing and just do it. Be who you want to be, be who you see yourselves as wanting to be and let not the shroud of antiquity cloud your directional compass which should point the way to today combined with a magnetic pull to the future.

We have opportunities to expand our philosophies by addressing men's issues by affording Masons a safe and compatible forum to address their important needs such as health and livelihood matters. Brethren, we are an organization of men and for men. While we as Masons do extremely well in enhancing the youth and the many organizations that comprise youth organizations, and we shall in earnest continue to support and even expand those initiatives, we as Masons must recognize that we need to place a greater emphasis on taking care of each other.

Fundamentally we must sharpen our working tools to care for our sick and in distressed Masons, their widows and orphans. I have directed our Grand Chaplains to develop a greater attention to this area. But what I mean in developing a safe and compatible forum to address the important needs of Masons extends further. Now hear me out for a moment. We are living in the most extreme economic downturn in our society since the Great Depression. One does not have to look beyond his own community to recognize that there are individuals that are out of work, that there are families struggling to make ends meet. For some, the loss of a job or a family business means not only the loss of income, but a loss of self-esteem and even greater than that, hope.

Each and every one of us knows someone or a family that is affected by the current recession. More than that, there are Masons among us that are experiencing this first-hand. Our Lodges can do a great justice by helping Masons that are experiencing hardships by establishing support groups or men's discussion groups that reach out to Masons that otherwise may remain silent about their current situation. Granted, we may not be able to put money in their pockets, although we wish we could, but by encouraging men to gather and share their frustrations and pain, then perhaps we may, just may be able to restore their faith and hope that things will get better. Moreover, we as Masons can illustrate that we care about our own more than with just words of good luck and that we hope things get better for you. Sometimes, just sometimes, knowing that the care that Masons have for one another lies in strength of numbers rather than a resigned attitude that Brother so and so will be back when things get better for him. It's just the opposite; we want Brother so and so to remain active and to feel that his contributions to the Lodge are greatly valued regardless of his present state of affairs.

We have opportunities to address men's health issues. I am inspired by the efforts of Arundel and Cornerstone Lodges that have enlisted the support of speakers on men's health issues. These Lodges have recognized that there are indeed health issues such as Prostate Cancer, heart disease and type-two diabetes which affects millions of men. They affect Masons too. We have men among us that face these issues every day of their lives. Should we ignore them, NO. Should we again say, oh, I'm sorry Brother so and so, we hope you bode well with your ordeal, NO. We must illustrate that we really care for and about them by providing them a forum within our Lodges to address their needs. To that end, I have entered into collaboration with the Maine Coalition for the Prevention of Prostate Cancer to give Masons and their family's greater educational opportunities by inviting them into our Lodges to speak about this.

I shall actively seek collaboration with the heart disease and diabetes support groups to do the same. All that is needed are Lodges that are willing to express an interest to welcome these groups for an hour once or twice a month. To support this endeavor, I have asked the Masonic Charitable Foundation to provide funding to support these initiatives. I'm pleased to say that the Foundation approved a generous contribution to this end. I hope that with your support and interest, I can ask them for more. You owe it to your members.

We have opportunities to reach out to our ever-increasing minority population by educating this segment of our population of the true and tolerant principles of Masonry and even inviting them to join our Fraternity. We have opportunities to help men seek a better understanding of their place in the Lodge, in the community and in their consciences. Brethren, I love the word opportunity because it abounds us; it is there for our taking. The greatest of opportunities we have at our disposal is reaching out to our neighbors that comprise our minority segment of the population.

They are Franco-Americans, Hispanics, African-Americans, Native-Americans, Asians, Muslims and Jews. I didn't name them all but you know who they are. They are but a handful of each that we call Brothers as members of the Craft but we can do better to increase our membership by becoming more inclusive to our friends and neighbors of diverse color, religions and ethnic backgrounds. Why? Because they should be afforded the same opportunities as the rest of us. Diversity lends to creativity! If we want to continue to call ourselves the world's oldest and largest Fraternal organization then we had better start putting our money where our mouth is and begin to recognize that our minority segment of our population is growing in leaps and bounds and they are here to stay. They are our neighbors, and to many of us they are our friends. In many of our communities they are our school teachers, our firefighters, our police officers, our clergy men and women, our doctors, our laborers that build and maintain our cities and towns. Moreover they are men and women just like you and me and our ancestors who came to this country during the immigration flood between 1870 and 1924 looking for a better promise of opportunity for betterment and security. Lest we forget what our ancestors had to endure. We owe it to their memory to welcome our new immigrants and to re-establish connections with those that have long been here. One of the very first lessons in the Entered Apprentice Degree teaches us that, am I not correct?

Initiatives for membership growth and for candidate, member and officer education are important. Stressing the value of these initiatives and making them more pertinent to the needs of Masons and Lodges are keys to success. Towards that end, the Grand Lodge Membership Committee under the direction of R.W. Brother Richard Bergeron has established six membership seminars throughout the Grand Jurisdiction beginning later this month and running through to the end of June. The content of these seminars will provide proven ideas and resources to Lodges in the area of ATTRACTING good men to the Craft, RETENTION of membership, RESTORATION of membership and

Membership Enhancement. Topics such as Fellowship Nights (or FRIEND TO FRIEND programs), Questions to ask when conducting a Lodge self-assessment, Public Open Houses, and the new Maine Masonic Rookie Program carefully crafted to engage the new Master Mason will be emphasized.

The men that comprise the membership committee are those that have demonstrated leadership and enthusiastic qualities within their own Lodges. They are motivated by a desire to build a successful Lodge. They are Masons of successful Lodges. The membership initiatives provide options for any Lodge wishing to better themselves. The plan may not be for the successful Lodge. Elements of the plan are taken from the examples of successful Lodges. It is my aim to encourage Lodges to want to better themselves. In the fall of this year, the membership team under the direction of R.W. Brother Thomas Pulkkinen will hold several leadership programs throughout the Grand Jurisdiction which will address leadership resources. These resources are for Lodge officers and members and any individual that wants to acquire sound fundamental basics of leadership principles. The plan will be called The Dirigo Leadership Plan, yes DIRIGO, Maine's Latin motto for "I LEAD".

We have opportunities to present a fresh perspective in revisiting the financial priorities of our Grand Lodge. The Finance Committee began working on revisiting the finances of your Grand Lodge under the direction of Chairman R.W. Brother Thomas Pulkkinen long before this Grand Session. The budget that you passed yesterday is one of the most comprehensive budgets presented to the Craft in quite some time. Every line item was carefully examined and justified. Monies were reallocated to areas where it can best serve. Some committees were combined and others even eliminated to reflect a more productive and even frugal budget. I am pleased to say again, that the current budget you the Craft passed did not ask for a per capita tax increase.

We have an opportunity to create a partnership between the Grand Lodge and the subordinate Lodges by listening to the needs of the Lodges and affording the best resources which will help them achieve success.

Brethren, to support this, I have ordered that all District Meetings be tyled or open only to Masons to in order to hold town hall styled meetings where I can communicate to the Brethren and they to me in atmosphere that is designed to be relaxed and engaging. Creating partnerships with Lodges begins with free and open dialogue and the promise that THIS Grand Lodge will do everything within its sphere of resources to provide the necessary tools and resources to aid the Lodges in

achieving their goals. I promise accountability, responsibility and transparency. These will be the hallmarks of my administration and will be carefully exercised. Above all, it is an atmosphere of building relationships that will allow for greater ownership by all and to enhance and add the greatest value to Masons and Lodges.

We have the greatest opportunity now to begin revamping our policies and procedures and best practices. You have elected a new Grand Master, and a new Deputy Grand Master, two new Grand Wardens, a new Grand Secretary and a new Grand Treasurer. Moreover, we have a new administrative office and museum and library which have an opportunity to afford a fresh perspective of Masonry in the public eye. NOTE 1 - NATURE OF ACTIVITIES AND SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Nature of the Organization

Grand Lodge of Maine Ancient Free and Accepted Masons (the Organization) is a nonprofit fraternal organization, incorporated in Maine, established for charitable, educational, and other specific purposes in accordance with Masonic principles and practices.

Method of Accounting

The Organization's financial statements have been prepared on the modified cash basis of accounting which is a comprehensive basis of accounting other than generally accepted accounting principles. Under that basis, the only assets recognized are cash and investments except as noted below. All other assets and liabilities are not recognized. Accordingly, revenues are recognized when received rather than when earned, and expenses and purchases of assets are recognized when paid rather than when the obligation is incurred. The only modification to the cash basis of accounting is that unrealized gains and losses are included in revenues and expenses and investments are reported at fair market value.

Basis of Presentation

Net assets, revenues, expenses, gains and losses are classified based on the existence or absence of donor imposed restrictions. Accordingly, net assets of the Organization and changes therein are categorized and reported as follows:

Unrestricted Net Assets

Net assets that are not subject to donor-imposed stipulations. Board designated funds are included in this category.

Temporarily Restricted Net Assets

Net assets subject to donor-imposed stipulations that may or will be met, either by actions of the Organization and/or by the passage of time. When restrictions expire, temporarily restricted net assets are reclassified to unrestricted net assets.

Permanently Restricted Net Assets

Net assets subject to donor-imposed stipulations that do not lapse or expire. The Organization's use of the funds is limited to the income earned.

The permanently restricted net assets provide income for general operations of the Organization.

Cash and Cash Equivalents

For the purposes of financial statement presentation, the Organization considers all highly liquid investments with an initial maturity of three months or less to be cash equivalents.

Investments

It is the Organization's policy to value investments at their fair value at the balance sheet date. Donated investments are recorded at fair value on the date of donation.

NOTE 1 – NATURE OF ACTIVITIES AND SUMIWARY OF AND SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES – CONTINUED

Fair Value Measurements

Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. In determining fair value, the Organization uses various methods including market, income and cost approaches. Based on these approaches, the Organization often utilizes certain assumptions that market participants would use in pricing the asset or liability, including assumptions about risk and or the risks inherent in the inputs to the valuation technique. These inputs can be readily observable, market corroborated, or generally unobservable inputs. The Organization utilizes valuation techniques that maximize the use of observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs. Based on the observability of the inputs used in the valuation techniques, the Organization is required to provide the following information according to the fair value hierarchy. The fair value hierarchy ranks the quality and reliability of the information used to determine fair values. Financial assets and liabilities carried at fair value will be classified and disclosed in one of the following three categories:

- Level 1 Quoted prices for identical assets and liabilities traded in active exchange markets, such as the New York Stock Exchange.
- Level 2 Observable inputs other than Level 1 including quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities, quoted prices in less active markets, or other observable inputs that can be corroborated by observable market data.
- Level 3 Unobservable inputs supported by little or no market activity for financial instruments whose value is determined using pricing models, discounted cash flow methodologies, or similar techniques, as well as instruments for which the determination of fair value requires significant management judgment or estimation.

In determining the appropriate levels, the Organization performs a detailed analysis of the assets and liabilities. At each reporting period, if applicable, all assets and liabilities for which the fair value measurement is based on significant unobservable inputs are classified as Level 3.

For the years ended March 31, 2012 and 2011, the application of valuation techniques applied to similar assets has been consistent. The following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for instruments measured at fair value:

Investment Securities

The fair value of investment securities is the market value based on quoted market prices, when available, or market prices provided by recognized broker dealers. If listed prices or quotes are not available, fair value is based upon externally developed models that use unobservable inputs due to the limited market activity of the instrument.

Reclassifications

Certain reclassifications have been made to the 2011 financial statements to conform with the 2012 financial statement presentation. Such reclassifications had no effect on net income as previously reported.

NOTE 3 - RENT EXPENSE

Facilities

The Organization leases its office and library facilities from the Masonic Trustees of Portland, an unrelated entity, without benefit of a formal lease. For each of the fiscal years ended March 31, 2012 and 2011, annual rentals amounted to \$24,200. The Organization terminated this lease as of March 31, 2012 and entered into a new lease of facilities on April 1, 2012 with Holden Masonic Associates, LLC, a related party. The lease term ends on December 31, 2016 with rent at \$1,000 per month.

NOTE 4 - SHARED EXPENSES

The Organization is headquartered in the same facility as The Masonic Charitable Foundation of the Grand Lodge of Maine (the Foundation), a non-profit organization tax exempt under IRC Section 501(c)(3). Grand Lodge personnel, including the Grand Secretary, Grand Treasurer, and clerical employees, perform services for both organizations. In addition, various office and administrative expenses, including telephone, internet service, copier and computer use, insurance, and office supplies are also shared by both organizations.

As of April 1, 2003, the Grand Lodge assumed responsibility for payment of all shared expenses, except facilities rent. Allocations between organizations are in accordance with estimated usage.

The Foundation's share of these expenses amounted to \$65,243 for the year ended 2012 and the Grand Lodge received this amount in equal monthly installments. The total of shared expenses for the year ended 2011 was \$80,047

The recovery of shared expenses for both years has been allocated to the various expense categories on the Statement and Schedule of Revenue Collected, Expenses Paid, and Other Changes in Net Assets – Cash Basis.

NOTE 5 - CLASSIFICATION OF EXPENSES

The statement of activities discloses expenses by natural classification. The classification of expenses by function is as follows as of March 31:

NOTE 6 - INCOME TAXES

The Organization qualifies as an organization exempt from income tax as a domestic fraternal association under Section 501(c)(10) of the Internal Revenue Code. Contributions to the Organization may qualify as charitable deductions if restricted to charitable, religious, etc. purposes as defined in IRC Section 6113(b)(3). Management believes there were no activities subject to tax on unrelated business income for the years ended March 31, 2012 and 2011.

Management has evaluated the Organization's tax positions and concluded that as of March 31, 2012 and 2011, the Organization does not believe that it has taken any tax positions that would require the recording of any additional tax liability. The Organization is subject to federal and state examinations by taxing authorities for three years following the filing of the return.

NOTE 7 - CONCENTRATION OF CREDIT RISK

The Organization has cash deposits in various financial institutions including banks, investment and brokerage firms. Accounts at banking institutions (regular checking, interest-bearing checking, certificate of deposits and savings) are insured by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation (FDIC) up to \$250,000. These limits apply to aggregate deposits for each class of accounts stated above that the Organization has with each bank and may at times exceed \$250,000. At March 31, 2012, the Organization did have cash balances in excess of insured amounts at banking institutions. The Organization has not experienced any losses in such accounts and believes it is not exposed to significant credit risk.

Cash at investment and brokerage institutions is in money market funds and is not insured by the FDIC. The institutions where these accounts are maintained are members of the Securities Investor Protection Corporation (SIPC) which insures cash funds up to \$100,000. Balances in excess of \$100,000 are insured by the institutions' excess SIPC insurance. At March 31, 2012, cash balances in money market funds did not exceed insured limits.

NOTE 8 - RISKS AND UNCERTAINTIES

The Organization invests in various investment securities. Investment securities are exposed to various risks such as interest rate, market, and credit risks. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investment securities, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the values of investment securities will occur in the near term and that such changes could materially affect the amounts reported in the statement of assets, liabilities, and net assets – cash basis.

NOTE 9 - SUBSEQUENT EVENTS

The Organization has evaluated subsequent events through the date of the opinion of these financial statements, which represents the date on which the financial statements were available to be issued.

<u>Discussion of the LLC budget</u>. Better numbers will be available after a year of experience. The cost of office space will be much clearer after a year of experience. The cost of replacement or capitalization will depend on estimates of the life of each piece of equipment and its replacement cost. That number was an estimate for this year and the Secretary was directed to have more concrete numbers for the budget request next year. The cost of money or cost of ownership will be calculated by the actual cost of the building (\$353,000) times the investment return (3.23% for next year) divided by the two entities occupying the building. The trustees directed that this number be reflected in the budget for next year.

NOTE 1 - NATURE OF ACTIVITIES AND SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Nature of the Organization

The Masonic Charitable Foundation of the Grand Lodge of Maine (the Foundation) is a nonprofit Maine corporation established for charitable, educational, and other specific purposes in accordance with Masonic principles and practices. During the year ended March 31, 2012, the Holden Masonic Associates, LLC was created as a single member LLC of the Foundation. The purpose of the LLC is to acquire property from which the Foundation operates.

Method of Accounting

The Foundation's consolidated financial statements have been prepared on the modified cash basis of accounting which is a comprehensive basis of accounting other than generally accepted accounting principles. Under that basis, the only assets recognized are cash, investments and property and equipment. All other assets and liabilities are not recognized except as noted below. Accordingly, revenues are recognized when received rather than when earned, and expenses and purchases of assets are recognized when paid rather than when the obligation is incurred. The only modification to the cash basis of accounting is that unrealized gains and losses are included in revenues and investments are reported at fair market value, and the liability to other organizations for investments in custodial care is recognized.

Reclassification

Certain amounts previously reported for the year ended 2011 have been reclassified to conform to the year ended 2012 presentation. There was no effect on the change in net assets based on these changes.

Basis of Presentation

All intercompany balances and transactions have been eliminated in consolidation. Net assets, revenues, gains and losses are classified based on the existence or absence of donor imposed restrictions. Accordingly, net assets of the Foundation and changes therein are categorized and reported as follows:

Unrestricted Net Assets

Net assets that are not subject to donor-imposed stipulations. Board designated funds are included in this category.

Included in this category are the following funds:

Charity C.H.I.P.S. Drug and Alcohol Scholarship Maine Masonic College Pension Reserve

Temporarily Restricted Net Assets

Net assets subject to donor-imposed stipulations that may or will be met, either by actions of the Foundation and/or by the passage of time. When restrictions expire, temporarily restricted net assets are reclassified to unrestricted net assets. Management has interpreted under Maine law that the net appreciation of endowment funds are considered temporarily restricted net assets until appropriated for use by the board. Temporarily restricted net assets consist primarily of appreciation on endowments funds.

Basis of Presentation - Continued

Permanently Restricted Net Assets

Net assets subject to donor-imposed stipulations that do not lapse or expire with time. The Foundation's use of the funds is limited to the income earned.

Included in this category are the following funds:

MCF Lodge Accounts Foster Scholarship Fund Dana B. Cutter Memorial Fund George R. Rich Memorial Fund Davis L. Toothaker Memorial Fund

Cash and Cash Equivalents

For the purposes of financial statement presentation, the Foundation considers all highly liquid investments with an initial maturity of six months or less to be cash equivalents.

Investments

It is the Foundation's policy to value investments at their fair value. Donated investments are recorded at fair value on the date of donation. Investments include money market funds invested for the long term.

Fair Value Measurements

Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. In determining fair value, the Foundation uses various methods including market, income and cost approaches. Based on these approaches, the Foundation often utilizes certain assumptions that market participants would use in pricing the asset or liability, including assumptions about risk and or the risks inherent in the inputs to the valuation technique. These inputs can be readily observable, market corroborated, or generally unobservable inputs. The Foundation utilizes valuation techniques that maximize the use of observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs. Based on the observability of the inputs used in the valuation techniques, the Foundation is required to provide the following information according to the fair value hierarchy. The fair value hierarchy ranks the quality and reliability of the information used to determine fair values. Financial assets and liabilities carried at fair value will be classified and disclosed in one of the following three categories:

- Level 1 Quoted prices for identical assets and liabilities traded in active exchange markets, such as the New York Stock Exchange.
- Level 2 Observable inputs other than Level 1 including quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities, quoted prices in less active markets, or other observable inputs that can be corroborated by observable market data.
- Level 3 Unobservable inputs supported by little or no market activity for financial instruments
 whose value is determined using pricing models, discounted cash flow methodologies, or
 similar techniques, as well as instruments for which the determination of fair value requires
 significant management judgment or estimation.

Notes to Consolidated Financial Statements

March 31, 2012 and 2011

NOTE 1 – NATURE OF ACTIVITIES AND SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES – CONTINUED

Fair Value Measurements - Continued

In determining the appropriate levels, the Foundation performs a detailed analysis of the assets and liabilities. At each reporting period, if applicable, all assets and liabilities for which the fair value measurement is based on significant unobservable inputs are classified as Level 3.

For the years ended March 31, 2012 and 2011, the application of valuation techniques applied to similar assets and liabilities has been consistent. The following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for instruments measured at fair value:

Investment Securities

The fair value of investment securities is the market value based on quoted market prices, when available, or market prices provided by recognized broker dealers. If listed prices or quotes are not available, fair value is based upon externally developed models that use unobservable inputs due to the limited market activity of the instrument.

Property and Equipment

Property and equipment consist primarily of the Foundation's office building in Holden, Maine. Purchased assets are stated at cost. The provision for depreciation is determined by the straight-line method to amortize the cost of assets over their estimated useful lives. Expenditures for repairs and maintenance which do not extend the useful lives of the assets are charged to program operations. Useful lives range from 4 to 25 years.

The Foundation's investment and spending policy for board designated and permanently designated endowment is as follows:

The principal investment objectives of the Foundation's portfolio fund are preservation of capital earning a reasonable current income which will cover operating and charitable expenses, and growth in income.

Quality is to be stressed at all times in the portfolio. Common stock investments should concentrate on seasoned companies with proven records, above-average prospects and sound financial positions. The bond portfolio will stress companies with investment grade ratings and strong credit quality.

Growth in income is expected to result from rising dividend payments of common stock investments and occasionally from rising interest rates. Income growth will be lessened during periods of declining interest rates and economic adversity.

The fund will pursue a balanced investment program utilizing both fixed income and equity investments although it is anticipated that a majority of the assets is to be committed to equity investments. While little attention will be paid to short-term market timing, the investment manager will endeavor to anticipate long-term fluctuation in prices and will vary the equity component of the endowment fund between a range of 60% and 75% of the total fund. The lower end of this range will be used when, in the opinion of the investment manager, stock prices fully reflect long-term value and the higher end used when stock prices are considered undervalued. It is anticipated that portfolio turnover will be relatively low, and it is hoped that the equity and fixed income components as well as the overall portfolio will compare favorably with leading capital market indices (S&P 500 and Salomon Brothers High Grade Bond Index, respectively) over long periods of time. These investment objectives are reviewed annually by the Investment Committee.

NOTE 3 - FUNDS HELD FOR OTHERS

In 2003, the Foundation agreed to accept funds from the Demolay and Pine Tree Youth Foundation, for the purpose of managing the funds for the benefit of the transferor organizations.

Income derived from the investment of the funds is distributable to the Demolay and Pine Tree Youth Foundation, which has also retained the right to request the return of the funds at its sole discretion.

NOTE 4 - PROPERTY AND EQUIPMENT

Property and equipment consist of a building at a cost of \$300,446.

NOTE 5 - RENT EXPENSE

The Foundation leases its office facilities from the Masonic Trustees of Portland, an unrelated entity, without benefit of a formal lease. Annual rental expense for each of the fiscal years ending March 31, 2012 and 2011 was \$24,200. The Foundation terminated the lease arrangement at the end of the fiscal year ending March 31, 2012.

NOTE 6 - SHARED EXPENSES

The Foundation is headquartered in the same facility as The Grand Lodge of Maine Ancient Free and Accepted Masons (Grand Lodge), a non-profit fraternal organization tax exempt under IRC Section 501(c)(10). Grand Lodge personnel, including the Grand Secretary, Grand Treasurer, and clerical employees, perform services for both organizations. In addition, various office and administrative expenses, including telephone, internet service, copier and computer use, insurance and general office supplies are also shared by both organizations.

As of April 1, 2003, the Grand Lodge assumed responsibility for payment of all shares expenses, except facilities rent. Allocations between organizations were in accordance with estimated usage.

The Foundation's share of these expenses amounted to \$65,244 for the year ended 2012 and was paid to the Grand Lodge in equal monthly installments. The total of shared expenses for the year ended 2011 was \$80,047.

Shares expenses for the current year and prior year have been allocated to the various expense categories on the Statement and Schedule of Revenue Collected, Expenses Paid, and Other Changes in Net Assets – Cash Basis.

NOTE 7 - INCOME TAXES

The Foundation qualifies as an organization exempt from income tax under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code. Contributions to the Foundation qualify as charitable deductions. Management believes there were no unrelated activities subject to tax on unrelated business income for the years ended March 31, 2012 and 2011.

Management has evaluated the Foundation's tax positions and concluded that as of March 31, 2012 and 2011, the Foundation does not believe that it has taken any tax positions that would require the recording of any additional tax liability nor does it believe that there are any unrealized tax benefits that would either increase or decrease within the next twelve months. The Foundation is subject to federal and state examinations by taxing authorities for three years following the filing of its tax returns.

NOTE 8 - CONCENTRATION OF CREDIT RISK

The Foundation has cash deposits in various financial institutions including banks and investment and brokerage firms. Accounts at banking institutions (regular checking, interest-bearing checking, certificate of deposits and savings) are insured by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation (FDIC) up to \$250,000. These limits apply to aggregate deposits for each class of accounts stated above that the Foundation has with each bank. At March 31, 2012 and 2011, the Foundation did not have cash balances in excess of insured amounts at banking institutions.

Cash at investment and brokerage institutions is in money market funds and is not insured by the FDIC. The institutions where these accounts are maintained are members of the Securities Investor Protection Corporation (SIPC) which insures cash funds up to \$100,000. Balances in excess of \$100,000 are insured by the institutions' excess SIPC insurance. At March 31, 2012 cash balances in all money market funds at various brokerage institutions totaled \$356,853. In addition, \$4,877 was in six-month certificates of deposit. The Foundation has not experienced any losses in such accounts and believes it is not exposed to significant credit risk

Inspection Reports of the District Deputy Grand Masters and Reports of Lodge Treasurers 2012-2013

The table on the following pages contains such information as was available at the time of publishing. It is entirely possible that some of the reports that are recorded as missing may have been mislaid during the move of the Grand Lodge Administrative office.

The inspection reports used by the District Deputy Grand Masters during this reporting period used a rating system of "pass/fail". All lodges inspected during this reporting period received a passing grade.

Although the table suggests that 102 lodges were not 'officially' inspected, there are statistical reports available for a large number of these lodges which may imply that they were indeed inspected but the report was not available to the office staff.

There are 61 Treasurers reports not available for review.

The reports reflect that the dues structure for this grand jurisdiction range from a low of \$20 to a high of \$100 – making the average dues just under \$43.

The fees for degrees show a wide range from \$0 to \$335.

The column of "Dues in arrears two or more years" show just under \$42,000

Report of the Grand Lodge Scholarship Committee

In Grand Lodge Bangor, Maine May 1, 2012

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine

The Grand Lodge Scholarship Committee has held one meeting this past year, as the program seems to run itself. I went to the Grand Lodge office in Portland to meet with Grand Lodge staff on the scholarship program and what the Committee could do to help in completing the tasks that need to be done. The Grand Lodge staff handles and processes all the letters sent to the schools and students as well as the DDGMs on the presentations of certificates from the foundation.

In 2008 we started our new scholarship program and it seems to be working well. The larger dollar amounts (44 scholarships of \$1500.00 each) seem to be making a significant difference in the students' tuition and loan commitments. We have now completed the 1/3 year rotation of all the schools in Maine and will start the rotation again in June of 2011. We received several telephone calls concerning the scholarship program and how it works. We encourage the brethren to promote and call the Committee if there are any questions, concerns or new ideas.

With the state of Maine reorganizing several of their school districts and unions we have seen a few high schools changing their names and numbers of RSU's and AOS's, and a few high schools have even closed. We will make every effort to try and stay on course and be sure we don't leave anyone out.

We will to encourage the Maine Masonic Lodges and the Charitable Foundation to continue to support this program. There has been some buzz about fund raising for the scholarship program through the Charitable Foundation. The Fund Raising Subcommittee has been working with the scholarship committee to see what we can do to increase the scholarships to one in every high school in Maine each year for \$1500each. The Maine Masonic Charitable Foundation funds the scholarship program and budgets about \$70,000 each year. This would have to be increased to about \$200,000 in order to give to each high school every year. Any lodge or brother that wishes to donate directly to the scholarship program may do so by stating that they want their donation to go towards the scholarship program. Send your donation to the Grand Secretary's office.

The Scholarship Committee is pleased to serve this Grand Lodge in helping maintaining a high degree of efficiency and community involvement with the Charitable Foundation. The scholarship committee also wishes to thank the staff on the foundation that has done so much work to keep everything in order. The committee is looking forward to working with the Foundation's fund raising committee and the new Grand Lodge office staff in keeping this program successful and growing.

From the Christian Era take 1118. Thus 1118 from 2012=894.

Order of High Priesthood

To the Christian Era add 1913, the Year of the Blessing. Thus: 2012 and 1913=3925.

Ancient Craft Masons commence this era with the creation of the world, calling it **Anno Lucis (A.D.)**, "in the year of light."

Scottish Rite, same as Ancient Craft, except the Jewish chronology is used, **Anno Mundi (A.M.)**, "in the year of the world."

Royal Arch Masons date from the year the second temple was commenced by Zerubbabel, **Anno Inventionis (A.I.)**, "in the year of the discovery."

Royal and Select Masters date from the year in which the temple of Solomon was completed, **Anno Depositionis** (**A. Dep.**), "in the year of the deposit."

Knights Templar commence their era with the organization of their Order, **Anno Ordinid (A.O.)**, "in the year of the Order."

Order of High Priesthood dates from the year of the blessing of Abraham by the High Priest Melchisedec, **Anno Benefacio (A.B.)**, "in the year of the blessing."
