It seems that another year for our Masonic Family has gone by and the appendant bodies are at their annual conventions as the gavel is passed and another takes the reigns and the leadership of our organizations is passed on. Rainbow is no different. We have had another amazing year and while we lost in membership by two, our enthusiasm has not diminished. Our Grand Worthy Advisor and all of our Grand Officers have been “Shouting for Maine Rainbow” all year long and representing our beautiful organization and state in a way that should make all of their Masonic Dads very proud. We have traveled from Canada to New York and from Rhode Island to Grand Rapids. Our girls have had the opportunity to interact with their Masonic family from all over the world, initiating two new Romanian Rainbow Girls in Grand Rapids and sharing meals and tours with girls from Brazil, Australia and Aruba and several other jurisdictions. I know that Cora Ellen and I have always commented on our “true” Masonic family here in Maine. The Grand Master asked that Gordon Kimball Jr., Executive Officer of Maine DeMolay be presented to the Grand East:

### **Executive Officer, Maine DeMolay Association**

“Most Worshipful Grand Master, distinguished guests, and brethren all: Good Morning. It is indeed a pleasure to stand up here this morning to speak to my brethren once again. DeMolay in Maine, I’m happy to report to you, is doing well. We grew in membership last year by 2. This past February we were able to start a new Chapter in Union. This was through a lot of hard work by a lot of brother Masons. This new Chapter in Union is taking a large area and is being sponsored by the Scottish Rite, Valley of Rockland. I think that shows the unity which we have here in this great state of Maine amongst the Masonic family.

This morning I would like to talk to you for a moment or two about the program, *Wreaths across America* that the DeMolay and Pine Tree Youth has adopted. This is a year-round project and every December the kids get together and go to the Veterans Cemetery up in Augusta and place the wreaths on the graves of our Veterans. First year we did this, 2011, we were able to raise enough money for 375 or 376 wreaths. This past year we did 440 wreaths, and this was due in part from all the support that we received from all the Masonic Lodges and Masonic bodies from across the state who sent us money to go toward this program. The kids did get out and raise some money for it, but we did get a lot of support from you and for that I thank you. We are going to be continuing that again next year with the hopes that this will grow and be even bigger than it was last year and I would ask all of you that want to participate, to be in Augusta and it’s usually the second Saturday of December when they place the wreaths. This is a very heartwarming experience. If you want to just come and watch the kids do this, it would make you feel very proud of them. One of the things I noticed from last year was that we needed to work harder on this because we didn’t have nearly enough wreaths to cover all the graves.

The kids noticed and asked why. I told them we are just going to work harder next year to raise more money. You know this is a very good service project for the kids and they learn a lot from it. This past February the our Grand Master was at the conference of Grand Masters in Kansas City, and I want to read this proclamation that was signed by all the Grand Masters in attendance, the Grand Master of DeMolay, the Sovereign Grand Commanders of the Northern and Southern jurisdictions, the three national heads of the York Rite bodies, and the Imperial Potentate of the Shrine.

*We the undersigned representatives of the Masonic Organizations, set opposite of our names below, having voluntarily responded to the call of the Grand Master of the Order of DeMolay, our respective organizations give DeMolay more adequate support and the plans to enlarge and expand the influence of this great youth organization.*

One of the things that we would like to do next year, if one of the lodges here would like to have a fundraiser to raise money for wreaths across America, and you do not have a DeMolay chapter or Rainbow Assembly in your Lodge, Rainbow and DeMolay would be happy to come to your lodge and do a car wash, supper or something like that. So you what the kids do. There are 24 Masonic districts in the state of Maine and very few not even half of them are represented by a fraternal organization, DeMolay Chapter or Rainbow Assembly. We really need to double our efforts and work to grow both organizations here in the state. Forty years ago we had 25 Chapters in the state and to only have 5 today is unacceptable. So I'm asking you brethren to think real hard. You don't have to do this yourself but you know the people in your community and the people in your lodge go back and speak to somebody, I really and truly believe we can make this happen. If it's a question of money, don't let that stand in your way. We have some resources that would help either organization. What we need is manpower. I really sincerely would like to ask you to work on this. This past year I got an email from 3 young men from across the state to ask if they could join. Brethren, I really would ask that you open your hearts and let's try to start some DeMolay and Rainbow chapters, and get some kids to carry on after us when we are gone. Most Worshipful, it has been a real pleasure being here today, I've looked forward to this. I've had a great experience with all the Grand Masters, but you know I've known you since before you were a Grand Lodge Officer. It's been fun working and watching you and following in your footsteps through the years. I thank you very much Most Worshipful."

The Grand Master invited RW Robert Ferguson to the podium to receive a check from the DeMolay and Pine Tree Youth Foundation to Rainbow in the amount of \$10,000 to assist in building the Merrill Rainbow Campground. The Grand Master was assisted in the presentation by RW Thomas Pulkkinen, DeMolay & Pine Tree Youth Foundation Treasurer.

The Grand Master then directed the Grand Marshal to escort all the non-masonic guests from the auditorium.

The Grand Master called the Grand Lodge from refreshment to labor.

Grand Master called for the reading of communications by the Grand Secretary.

## **Grand Master's Address to the Craft**

### **194th Annual Communication**

Good morning Brethren. This past Masonic year has been a year of transition for your Grand Lodge. Not only a physical transition with the move of the administrative offices of your Grand Lodge from Portland to Holden, but a transition of priorities and how your Grand Lodge does business with the Constituent Lodges and Masons throughout this Grand Jurisdiction.

Months before I was installed as your Grand Master, I published a declaration of values or priorities which represent my vision or goals for the Craft in Maine. I spoke of them during my visits to Lodges; they were addressed during officer candidate presentations and even published in the Maine Mason magazine just before last year's election. The discussions continued this past year as I visited the 24 districts in tyled meetings open only to Masons whereby I could communicate to the Brethren and them to me in an atmosphere that was designed to be relaxing and engaging. Creating partnerships with Lodges begins with free and open dialogue and the promise that this Grand Lodge will do everything within the scope of its resources to provide the necessary tools to aid the Lodges in achieving their goals. I promised accountability, responsibility and transparency. It is my desire to continue building relationships with the Craft which is allowing for greater ownership by all and for enhancing and adding the greatest value to individuals and Lodges. These are and shall continue to be the hallmarks of my administration.

Just one year ago, this Grand Lodge had greater opportunities before it than ever before to improve how it can best serve you, the Craft. You elected and installed an entirely new leadership team. A new Grand Master, a new Deputy Grand Master, two new Grand Wardens, a new Grand Secretary and a new Grand Treasurer. We also have a new administrative office and museum and library which are affording opportunities for fresh perspectives on Masonry in the public eye and improved services to Lodges and Masons. Your Grand Secretary and his dedicated staff have raised the bar of customer service and are providing it in ways unimaginable. Master Mason Diplomas, 50 Year Veterans Medals, Lodge Secretary instruction, correspondences and much, much more are being turned around and delivered to Lodges and individuals very rapidly. Through the new Grand Lodge information data base known as MORI, the Grand Lodge administrative offices and Lodge Secretaries are able to research information faster and much easier. Through the good offices and commitment of W Bro. Edward King, your Grand Librarian, your Grand Lodge library is established and rapidly growing. The Craft and the public now have full access to a large array of books and reference materials for its benefit. Ed and Brandy King are still maintaining and growing one of the best websites in the land. This continues to be a valuable resource for your Grand Master and his District Deputy Grand Masters where all official forms may be accessed and downloaded for our use.

Additionally in re-examining the functional priorities of your Grand Lodge, I replaced better than two-thirds of the committees of Grand Lodge with new

members. Not because ideas and contributions were growing stale or non-existent, but rather for new or fresher perspectives and active contributions by the several committees was needed to reflect the needs of the Craft commensurate with our times.

In my statement of values, I spoke of the opportunities to present a fresh perspective in revisiting the financial priorities of your Grand Lodge. Months before I was elected and installed your Grand Master, I met with the Finance Committee under the leadership of Chairman RW Thomas Pulkkinen to begin work on the budget. First it was my intention that the per-capita tax remains where it is. I was no longer going to accept the status quo of raising your per-capita by 10 percent for the sake of doing so. Secondly, that your money be allocated more wisely and more beneficial to you and your Lodges. To that end, your finance committee and I examined every committee and every initiative to question relevance and to review cost allocation. Every line item was carefully examined and justified. Monies were allocated to areas where it can best serve. Special committees were combined and others even eliminated to reflect a more productive and even frugal budget. As a result, the budget that you passed at last year's Annual Session was one of the most comprehensive budgets presented to the Craft in quite some time. The fiscal year we are upon now reflects that same scrutiny and determination to deliver the best value to you, and I am proud to report to you today that the Finance Committee of your Grand Lodge will recommend in its report to you this afternoon, for a second consecutive year, NO increase in the per capita tax. That is two consecutive years of balancing your budget without having to increase revenues through per-capita while delivering increased value to you. On the subject of finances, I want you to know how grateful I am to the Grand Treasurer for his insight and careful bookkeeping. His financial records are comprehensive and leave no doubt that he regards them as the tools that assist the Finance Committee and this Grand Master in making sound decisions with your money. Scott understands this and is an active contributor and visionary to the policies of this Grand Lodge. Thank you, Scott.

In my statement of values I also addressed that we have opportunities to help men seek a better understanding of their place in the Lodge, in the community and in their consciences. Initiatives for membership growth and for candidate, member and officer education are important. Stressing the value of these initiatives and making them more pertinent to the needs of Masons and Lodges are keys to success.

To support this, the Grand Lodge Membership Committee under the direction of RW Brother Richard Bergeron, developed a membership plan and held seminars

throughout the Grand Jurisdiction to provide proven ideas and hard resources to Lodges in the area of attracting good men to the Craft, retention of membership, restoration of membership and membership enhancement. Topics such as Fellowship Nights (or Friend to Friend programs), questions to ask when conducting a Lodge self-assessment, public open houses, and the new Maine Masonic Rookie Program carefully crafted to engage the new Master Mason were emphasized.

The men that comprise the membership committee are those who have demonstrated leadership and enthusiastic qualities within their own Lodges. They are motivated by a desire to build a successful Lodge.

I hope that you will consider opening your Lodges to the public on October 19<sup>th</sup> to demonstrate once again, that you are providing the public and prospective Masons opportunities to see the inside of our beautiful and beloved Lodge halls and moreover, to engage them in a dialogue which actively promotes our pride and contributions to our communities.

Continuing with providing value to the Lodges this past year, the Lodge leadership initiatives team under the direction of RW Brother Thomas Pulkkinen held several leadership seminars throughout the Grand Jurisdiction which presented valuable leadership resources. The Dirigo Leadership plan contains resources for Lodge officers and members and any individual that wants to acquire sound fundamental basics of leadership principles.

I am pleased to announce to you today that the current membership and Dirigo Leadership plans will continue and will be improved upon based on your feedback and desire to have them continue.

To further aid the candidate in his education, the Masonic Education and Lodge Services Committee under the direction of RW R. Timothy Martell and his dedicated team have begun the process of revamping the Pollard Plan Instructional tapes to bring these tools in-line with today's technology and learning environment. These will replace the old VHS tapes and be re-mastered on DVDs. I have reviewed the Accepted Candidate and Entered Apprentice DVDs and must say that they are fresh and clean and speak to improved candidate orientation as he progresses through his degree journey. The completed set of DVDs from Accepted Candidate to the Master Mason Degree will be available later this year. A candidate may show these DVDs to his family and friends while gaining insight and preparation into his present and subsequent degrees. The orientation DVDs also provide an additional benefit. They



may be reviewed by Lodge officers as valuable aids in developing a conversation with their Lodge candidates thus providing instruction to the officer on how to talk with and instruct the new candidate. I wish to thank Ed and Brandy King for producing these works in process. Their time, resources and talents are immeasurable.

The Charitable Foundation of your Grand Lodge has expanded its relief and betterment grant resources to address the growing needs of the Craft and of individual Masons. During these times of economic uncertainty, applications for individual relief have increased. To meet that need, your Charitable Foundation has increased the funding this year to meet the challenges being faced by our Brethren who are in need of a helping hand. I must reemphasize however, that the relief application must begin on the Lodge level and then submitted to the Maine Masonic Charitable Foundation for consideration.

On the Matching Betterment Grant side of the Foundation, your Trustees are excited about the fastest growing Masonic Outreach program in this Jurisdiction; the Masonic Bikes for Books program. To that end, the Trustees adopted a fourth matching betterment grant to increase the ability of Lodges to purchase bicycles and helmets for youngsters. Does this Grand Lodge want to take any credit for it: NO. It wants to be your partner in helping you achieve your goals whereby you take the credit. Here I must take this opportunity to thank you, the Lodges and so many individuals, that answered my appeal to contribute to the aid of our Masonic Brethren and their families during the devastation caused by Hurricane Sandy. Your tax-exempt contributions through your Charitable Foundation enabled your funds to directly help our very own. I must also thank our Senior Grand Warden, RW John Irovando, for making it his mission this past year to educate the Craft about the benefits of your Charitable Foundation. As a direct result of his speaking and informational campaign, many more Lodges and individuals are able to take advantage of the benefits your Foundation has to offer.

Another ongoing Foundation-supported program is the long-running Child Identification program also known as CHIP. This year, the team processed child number 50,000 in York Village and was captured by the local press and enthusiastic kids. Thank you Wendell Graham and your team for the continued value you are adding to this program.

For too many years the practice of Masons has been to do what is prescribed and recommended to us by those who have come before us. The men seeking out the

Craft and joining its ranks today are independent minded men who have much to offer and in turn expect something from the organization they are joining. They are even demanding it. Men are not going to join for the sake of becoming a part of something. They want opportunities to express their values. We must be asking our candidates what it is they would like to offer Masonry and what we can do to assist them in meeting their needs.

Rather than just tell them that they will get much out of the Fraternity so long as they put much into it, let us describe to them opportunities to express their individual talents and desires remembering that our Fraternity is defined by the men that make up its ranks and not a Fraternity that tells a man that he can become a better man by just becoming involved in its fixed organizational practices. We build better men when we allow men to build a better Fraternity. Encouragement, not mandates, fosters growth and happiness within an organization.

To that end, your Deputy Grand Master and I are pleased to announce that a formidable and comprehensive Mentoring initiative will be introduced to the Craft within a month. Two introductory sessions on Mentoring will be held in June and rolled out by Brother John Jenkins, a member of Rabboni Lodge, former Mayor of Lewiston and of Auburn and an internationally renowned motivational and inspirational speaker to several businesses and organizations. In fact, he is here today to address the pertinent points of mentoring and what is in store for the upcoming sessions planned for Auburn on 1 June and in Bangor on 29 June.

Why Mentoring? How will mentoring address the needs of our newest members? How will it involve our elder Masons? Mentorship is not a substitute for candidate coaching, or ritual instruction or help with the Lesson Booklets on catechism. Mentoring is about establishing and nurturing relationships with our newest Lodge members. It is going beyond the normal prescribed candidate instruction by invoking a sense of proprietorship in our new members. It is about providing the new member with opportunities to discover his place in Masonry. It also reaffirms an elder Mason's place in his Lodge by helping him to reestablish his own worth by contributing his institutional knowledge for the betterment of the new members and ultimately for his Lodge. Brother John Jenkins: I am grateful for your time, contributions and expertise here and later.

We must ever be mindful that Masonry is a values-centered organization which affords like-minded men opportunities to share similar values, hopes and concerns

for ourselves, our families and our communities. Masonry as expressed in the teachings of our three degrees provides us with the foundation to exercise our beliefs commensurate with our needs and wants in life.

We must ever be mindful that our Masonic Lodges should be regarded as places where we make, or administer, the rites of Masonry to a man. Masonry itself is defined by and through the men that exercise the philosophy of its teachings. It is who we are. Men do not join the Masons. Men become Masons and then become part of a Masonic Lodge as members. Masonry will never ask a man to change who he is rather Masonry accepts the good man and is nurtured by his contributions. The Masonic Lodge is a place where we train Masons and provide them with the valuable working tools and resources to become better men thereby enabling them to be smarter, conscientious, and well informed members of society.

Societal norms are dramatically changing and will continue to change and even evolve into new orders and ways of thinking. Society changes for many reasons; mostly out of need, but we should never change for the sake of changing. We should always remain vigilant to seize opportunities to enhance and even expand our culture. I no longer want to hear that, “we can’t do that” or “that has been tried before but did not work”. What I want to hear, in fact, what I would encourage and promote is that every Lodge recognize its own ambitions. Every Lodge through its own means has a remedy to aid solutions. Through careful self-analysis (a group conscientious effort) Lodges must determine what they want to be, how they want to be perceived and what types of men they want to attract. One size should never fit all. If you should discover that the majority of your members favor a liking for one thing over another, then I say set your sights and resources on that one thing and just do it. Be who you want to be, be who you see yourselves as wanting to be and let nothing cloud your directional compass.

I have visited many successful Lodges to offer up my validation for their good works and to remind them that they are living examples to Lodges that may be struggling to create a culture of success. I have also visited Lodges that are sadly enough, ready to throw up their hands and toss in the towel. To those Lodges I say, let me help. Let us sit down together, Brother to Brother, and have a conversation about what you value the most and how your Lodge and its culture can identify one specific thing that you can put your arms around. It is not my intent to prolong agony or deliver lip-service, but you deserve to have that chance and to task a Grand Master that cares about you. To that end, I wish to concentrate my efforts in a second term in reaching out to those Lodges in need of some soul searching. I want to sit with you, not on ceremony, but around a table where we can discuss possibilities.

I want to remind you that we have opportunities to develop a safe and compatible forum within our Lodges to aid one another. Fundamentally we must sharpen our working tools to care for our sick and in distressed Masons, their widows and orphans. Each and every one of us knows someone or a family that is affected by the current recession. More than that, there are Masons among us that are experiencing this first-hand. Our Lodges can do a great justice by helping Masons that are experiencing hardships by establishing support groups or men's discussion groups that reach out to Masons that otherwise may remain silent about their current situation. Granted, we may not be able to put money in their pockets, although we wish we could, but by encouraging men to gather and share their frustrations and pain, then perhaps we may, just may be able to restore their faith and hope that things will get better. Moreover, we as Masons can illustrate that we care about our own more than with just words of luck and that we hope things get better for you. Sometimes, just sometimes, knowing that the care that Masons have for one another lies in strength of numbers rather than a resigned attitude that Brother "so and so" will be back when things get better for him. It's just the opposite; we want Brother "so and so" to remain active and to feel that his contributions to his Lodge are greatly valued regardless of his present state of affairs. With more than 19,000 Masons in Maine, we should think of ourselves as one of the largest networking systems that can employ Masons whenever possible.

I want to remind you that we have opportunities to reach out to our ever-increasing minority population by educating this segment of our population of the true and tolerant principles of Masonry and even inviting them to join our Fraternity. They are Franco-Americans, Hispanics, African-Americans, Native-Americans, Asians, Muslims and Jews. I didn't name them all but you know who they are. They are but a handful of each that we call Brothers as members of the Craft but we can do better to increase our membership by becoming more inclusive to our friends and neighbors of diverse color, religions and ethnic backgrounds. Why? Simply because they should be afforded the same opportunities as the rest of us. Diversity lends to creativity. If we want to continue to call ourselves the world's oldest and largest Fraternal organization then we had better start putting our money where our mouth is and begin to recognize that our minority segment of our population is growing in leaps and bounds and they are here to stay. They are our neighbors, and to many of us they are our friends. They are striving to be the builders and maintainers our communities. They are men and women just like you and me, and our ancestors who came to this country during the immigration flood between 1870 and 1924 looking for a better promise of opportunity for betterment and security. Lest we forget what

our ancestors had to endure. We owe it to their memory to welcome our new immigrants and to re-establish connections with those that have long been here. One of the very first lessons in the Entered Apprentice Degree teaches us this.

Brethren, I consider it a privilege to be surrounded by so many committed Masons that make up the leadership team of your Grand Lodge. They are men who share a similar vision; a vision that is shaped by your input and your desire to be better men. I must call attention to your Grand Wardens, John Irovando and Ron Murphy. Though a Grand Master cannot choose his Wardens, I must tell you that you sure knew how to pick them one year ago. One of the first questions John and Ron asked me one year ago was, “what will you have us do Grand Master?” My answer to them was to focus on what they valued the most in Masonry and go out there and share it with Craft. Because of the men I know them to be, I knew they would execute that purpose with the best interests of the Craft in heart and mind. John and Ron, thank you for being two of the best Wardens any Grand Master could hope for and above all, for your partnership, friendship and council to me.

Right Worshipful Brother Deputy Grand Master: stand-up. Brethren, I present to you Brother David Walker who in one year will be your Grand Master should time honored tradition prevail. David has been my long-time friend. We share the same values and vision for the Craft. I am not speaking for him but about him. He has publicly pledged his support and continuation for the initiatives that are in place now Brethren, for me and for you, that speaks of continuity from one Grand Master to another. You should have no questions about what will be or what will not continue. You should take this knowledge and continue developing and practicing your ideas knowing that he is not going to order a halt of the current tools being used by the Lodges or issue mandates that dampen your creativity. He has been my steadfast partner and high esteemed counsel. Thank you my friend.

I am grateful to our Past Grand Masters. They remain active contributors to the Craft. They are our advisors, mentors, and encouragers and promoters. I must thank them for being such and for rendering to me from time to time that counsel which puts the Craft first.

Finally Brethren, how do we continue providing the opportunities that I named earlier? We must continue to listen to the young men that petition Freemasonry and to the young Masons that are laboring to build better Lodges. The Craft wants its leadership to become more responsive to the needs and wants of individuals and Lodges. The Craft understands that the leadership does not have the silver bullet to cure all the problems and challenges before us. It wants the leadership to validate its

efforts and to foster a safe, and welcoming, and engaging atmosphere for expression and creativity. The Craft is actually suggesting to the leadership ways it can help shape the current and future state of Free Masonry. It does not care who gets the credit so long as we all accomplish something together. For me, it is an opportunity to continue a partnership that seeks to enhance and add the greatest value to Masons and Lodges and the potential to create an atmosphere of building relationships that will allow for greater ownership by all.

In closing I must reiterate: let us stop asking how we can best serve the Grand Master and let us continue asking how we can best serve one another to the end that we achieve a warm, inviting, safe and encouraging atmosphere where all Masons and their Lodges may succeed.

Thank you.

The Grand Secretary addressed the Deputy Grand Master and moved that the Grand Master's address be referred to the Committee on Doings of Grand Lodge Officers and that the reports of the Deputy Grand Master, the Grand Wardens and the Grand Lecturer be referred to the same committee without reading. That motion was seconded and so **voted**.

The gavel of authority being returned to the Grand Master he called for the report of the Committee on Jurisprudence.

## **Report of the Committee on Masonic Jurisprudence**

### **DECISIONS**

The Grand Master was asked whether or not a portion of the Royal Arch Degree could be inserted into the second half of the Master Mason Degree. The Grand Master responded that, following a consultation with the Grand Lecturer and Chairman of the Committee on Ritual, he would decline permission for this insertion to be used in the second section of the Master Mason Degree. We applaud this Decision and recommend its ratification.

## DISPENSATIONS

The Grand Master was presented with forty-two Dispensations, most of them asking him to waive certain provisions of our Constitution and Standing Regulations when the clear language of those documents permit and in such other cases where similar Dispensations have been permitted by custom and usage. Several were to appear in Public parades and civic events, some were to hold meetings at other locations, often for outdoor degrees where the locations had been approved.

Two Dispensations, one for a Lodge to work 10 candidates in the Entered Apprentice Degree during one Lodge Session, and one to serve alcohol at a public function where Standing Regulation 75 requirements had not been met were denied by the Grand Master. We recommend that these two Denials be ratified.

We find that five Dispensations that were granted by the Grand Master as follows:

**King Davids Lodge #3** -- to move time of Stated Meeting to 6 PM from 7:30PM;

**Ancient York Lodge #155** -- to reinstate a member without complying with Section 51;

**Wilton Lodge #156** -- to move their Stated Meeting from the 3rd to the 4th Wednesday;

**Hermion Lodge #32** -- to move their Stated Meeting from January 1st to January 7th;

**United Lodge #8** -- to open a Stated Meeting early;

All appear to attempt to change Lodge By-Law requirements in non-emergency situations or to disregard a specific section of our Constitution. We find no basis for these Dispensations and recommend that they not be ratified.

Four Dispensations dealt with the serving of alcohol on lodge premises and we were pleased to see that proper Certificates of Insurance were present and the requirements of Standing Regulation 75 complied with. These four requests were granted by the Grand Master and we recommend that they be ratified.

We find that all the other Dispensations issued by the Grand Master to be in accord with the Constitution and Standing Regulations of the Grand Lodge and Masonic customs and usage and do recommend that they be ratified. The Committee unanimously moves the acceptance of this Report and the adoption of the recommendations contained therein.

Your Committee wishes to suggest that the Craft consider a revision and update to our Constitution and Standing Regulations in an attempt to streamline the duties of the Grand Master and those of the Grand Lodge Office. A great many requests for Dispensation are of a routine nature and occur year after year, such as outdoor degree work, appearing at civic events, etc. A clear definition of



roles and responsibilities, along with a delegation of some basic requests could reduce the burden on the Grand Master and Grand Lodge Office.

In addition, although we recommend the ratification of the Grand Master's enforcement of Standing Regulation 75, we take note that there are divided opinions on the Regulation itself. As well, the Craft over the past decade has continued to wrestle with policies regarding the use of alcohol on lodge premises. We encourage our sister committee, the Standing Committee on Amendments to the Constitution, to weigh these larger issues and raise, for the consideration of the Craft, language for SR75 which is entirely free from ambiguity and charts a direction which is consistent with the good of the Fraternity.

Let me now express my grateful appreciation to the Grand Chaplains who have worked with me and taken upon themselves this most important responsibility. They are: RW Walter W Lamb, Jr.; RW Dwight C. Whitney, Sr.; RW Ken Hanscomb, Jr.; W Rev. Dr. Stephen M. Tolander; RW David J. Billings; RW Neal R. Haines; and W Leslie M. Gray.

It was brought to my attention last year that Brother Francis S. Harvey was one of our passed Brethren that year and should be recognized for his Grand Lodge services. It is my pleasure to do just that at this time:

### **RW FRANCIS S. HARVEY**

Francis S. Harvey, husband of Shirley (Bragan) Harvey, passed away February 14, 2012. He was born Aug. 27, 1926, in Bangor son of F. Ernest and Janetta (Stewart) Harvey.

### **RW OSCAR MORRELL HARTFORD**

Oscar Morrell Hartford passed away on Saturday, Oct. 13, with his family at his side and the memories of a lifetime of accomplishments and endeavors were shared with relatives, friends and the community.

Oscar was born on May 9, 1920, to Floyd and Linda Hartford of Leeds. He worked hard and walked hundreds of miles over the years to get an education and graduate from Monmouth Academy, Class of 1937. During his early years he worked for Sawyer Farms in Greene and the South Portland Shipyard, prior to enlisting in the military.

On July 24, 1941, Oscar married Geneva Carville, a soul mate he met through her relatives. They had three sons, Tom, Dick and Bob.

Oscar's military service started in 1944 as a volunteer with a deep sense of patriotism. He served in the European Theater as a combat infantryman with the Fourth Armored Division, where he saw combat in Belgium and Germany.

Following the war, he served in Counterintelligence until his discharge in 1946. He was awarded the Combat Infantryman's Badge and Bronze Star. Later he joined the Maine National Guard and served as an infantryman until his discharge in 1951 as a sergeant first class.

Upon returning home from the war, he worked for Atherton Furniture, Lewiston, and perfected his woodworking skills, which he shared with many over the years. Eventually, Oscar found an opportunity with the Thomas White Insurance Agency, Lewiston. He thoroughly enjoyed the profession and the challenges and moved on to the Cobb Winslow Insurance Agency, Lewiston. Over time he bought that agency and several others to form the Hartford Insurance Agency, a place that grew at a phenomenal rate with his leadership and dedicated employees.

Oscar enjoyed having fun, sharing laughs, and encouraging his sons to do things he wished he could. There was never a dull moment in his life. He was active in the Masons, where he served as Past Master of Ashlar Lodge, and over time visited every lodge in the state of Maine. Brother Hartford was initiated at Ashlar Lodge #105 on September 24, 1951, was passed to the degree of Fellowcraft on October 8, 1951, and raised a Master Mason on November 26, 1951. He was Master of Ashlar Lodge in 1970. He was the Grand Senior Warden of the Grand Lodge of Maine from May 1976 to May 1977. He was awarded the Simon Greenleaf Medal in 1974 being cited "for contribution of his time, thought, and service to Masonry beyond the line of duty."

He was an instructor for the National Ski Patrol and served on the ski patrols of Lost Valley and Mt. Abram, plus several World Cup races. He was known locally for drilling the Lewiston High School band for over 10 years and guiding them to several state and New England Championships. He was active in Cub Scouts and served in many key community roles. He also found time to be an officer in Kiwanis, drill the Livermore Falls American Legion Drum and Bugle Corps, serve on the State of Maine Tramway Board, and organized blood drives for the Masons and American Red Cross. His love of the outdoors led him to being a Maine Guide.

Oscar built his own home and a chalet in Bryant Pond so he and Gin could be closer to the ski slopes and their ski patrol responsibilities. The chalet was a place with a lot of warmth and laughter, especially during ski season.

Oscar loved the outdoors and being there with his family. He had many fine memories from times spent at Sebago Lake, Mt. Katahdin, and Mt. Washington. He could always be seen carrying the nieces, nephews and grandchildren on his shoulders. Life was good.

Oscar is survived by his two sons; six grandchildren; four great- grandchildren; a brother and a sister. His wife; a son; his parents; and six brothers and sisters predeceased him.

We have but little of this world's consolation to offer. We can only sincerely, deeply and most affectionately sympathize with them in their bereavement, and assure them that He, who looks with infinite compassion upon the afflicted in the hour of their desolation, will fold the arms of His love and protection around those who put their trust in Him.

Most Worshipful Master, at your direction would it please to have us rise for a moment of reflection and short prayer.

## **Report of the Committee on Membership**

To the officers and members of the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine;

The following is the annual report of the Membership Committee for the Grand Lodge of Maine for the period January 1, 2012 through December 31, 2012. During the past year, your membership committee has worked hard trying to provide tools for the craft for the purpose of building membership.

I would first like to introduce your Membership Committee from 2012; Carl Marsano, Ryan Paradis, Thomas Pulkkinen, Chris Rugg, Lawrence Webber, and myself, Rick Bergeron.

We began by creating a program which has been used successfully in other masonic bodies and tweaked for our jurisdiction. In the past, when one thinks of membership building, most people think that refers to "Recruiting". Yes, we should be working towards attracting men of good moral character to our fraternity; however, this is only a small piece to growing membership. It often seems that the harder we work to initiate new members, the faster they leave through the back door. Membership Development Programs must address four areas:

**Recruiting**

**Retaining**

**Re-involving**

## **Restoring**

This past year, lodges in this Grand Jurisdiction Initiated 465, Passed 433 and Raised 421 new Master Masons. We Affiliated 98 brethren and Restored 99 for a total of 619 new brethren to this Grand Jurisdiction. However, we lost 365 to suspension for non-payment of dues, 150 to demits and 499 to death for a total of 1,014 losses. The net loss for 2012 was 396.

Our current membership as of April 1, 2013 is 19,113. Over the past 3 years, we have had gains of 2,056 but have had losses of 3,436 for a net 3 year loss of 1,380 brethren. Of these 3,436 losses, 1,888 were due to deaths which obviously we can do nothing about. We did however, lose 1,548 brethren over the past three years due to a combination of non-payment of dues and demits.

We must continue our efforts to attract new brethren to this fraternity but we must also do better keeping the ones we already have. How are we going to do this? To my knowledge, no one has all the answers however; I can tell you that doing nothing is not the answer. Our membership problems will not miraculously solve themselves. We must continue to try new ways to attract new members and keep the ones we have.

The recruiting efforts in 2012 consisted mainly of the statewide Open House on October 20<sup>th</sup> and encouraged lodges to hold Fellowship Nights, Public Suppers, participate in Community Events and try to instill that membership is everyone's responsibility. We spent \$13,730 on banners for the October Open House. These banners are of a quality which should allow them to be used for three or four years by simply just adding a sticker for the date change in subsequent years.

### **Open House Summary**

The Grand Master had requested that all lodges either have an Open House or some type of lodge event promoting their lodge. Of the 185 lodges, 146 requested a total of 191 banners. Of these 141 lodges, 97 submitted their reports summarizing their results. There were 550 visitors which attended the Open House. A total of 180 applications were given out and 31 turned in at the Open Houses. There were many good suggestions for improvement. Many suggested we should do better in advertising the event. The cost of advertising last year was very expensive due to the national election taking up much of the available time slots. This coming year, our advertising dollars should hopefully produce better results.

### **Masonic Rookie Program**

The Rookie Program was implemented to improve retention of the membership. It is important that we start the new mason on a path to continue to seek more light in masonry even after he has been raised. This program has not been implemented as well as we would have liked. Many brethren I speak to have not even heard of it. The Rookie Program form should be given to every Entered Apprentice the night he

is initiated. He can be working on many of the items while he progresses. If he completes the 5 required tasks and 6 of the 12 optional tasks within 12 months of being raised, the Grand Master will personally award him his Rookie pin at a special function.

### **Membership Awards**

There are many lodges doing great things. Visiting any of these lodges one can only go away feeling inspired and proud to be a Maine Mason. This year, we have decided to take a different approach to recognize these lodges. We have two plaques; one for the lodge that raised the most Master Masons and the second for the lodge that had the greatest positive growth. In addition, we have numerous certificates for those who also did an outstanding job in either of these areas. The following lodges were presented with the following:

In 2012, there were three districts that showed positive growth; the 8<sup>th</sup> (+1) District, the 22<sup>nd</sup> (+3) District, and the 23<sup>rd</sup> District (+16).

Even though these awards are based off of 2012 data, we felt we should also recognize one district for their consistent work over the past three years. This district showed gains in both 2010 and 2011 but slipped slightly in 2012. For the three year period, they still show a gain of 32 brethren. In fact, 5 of the 9 lodges in this district all showed positive growth after three years. This district is the 18<sup>th</sup> District.

This last district has been coming close to showing positive gains all three years however they have raised more brethren than any other district (159). If they could do a little better controlling their demits and NPD suspensions, they could easily be the best performing district in this jurisdiction. This district is the 6<sup>th</sup> District.

Please join me in congratulating all these lodges and districts for a job well done.

In closing brethren, there are many positive things going on in this jurisdiction. We must not stop. We must also continue to work with our other masonic organizations like the Shrine, Scottish Rite and York Rite bodies to build a strong fraternity. Share your success stories with others and support neighboring lodges and districts whenever possible.

## **Masonic Service Association**

The Masonic Charitable Foundation of the Grand Lodge of Maine, provides the resources for many of the good works that we as a Grand Lodge do, and that many of our lodges do. It supplies funds for our relief program, CHIPS program, scholarship program, and our matching funds program in each lodges. The program which is closes to my heart is the Masonic outreach program in each of the 6 veteran's homes in Maine and in the Veteran's hospital at Togus.

We have an outreach program at each one of those 6 facilities. For many years the masons in the First District have provided a monthly breakfast at the Veteran's home in Caribou, for the past 5 or 6 years, the masons in the Bangor area under the direction of Ed Davis and more recently under the direction of Ron Murphy have provided a weekly coffee at the Veteran's home in Bangor, which is our largest Veteran's Home in Maine. The Sixteenth District Officer's Association has a monthly coffee at the Veteran's Home in South Paris. The Veteran's Home in Machias is perhaps the most difficult one because it is a dementia unit and Brother Frank Theriault is our representative there. Paul Berry in Scarborough is there every single Sunday often times with the assistance of lodges in the Eighteenth District, they have a coffee hour every Sunday. You heard earlier, Dan Hill has a loyal group of volunteers who appear every Sunday at the Veteran's Hospital in Togus. He also covers the Veteran's Home in Augusta. In doing that good work they receive the help and encouragement, perhaps I should say, in prosecuting that good work they receive the assistance from the Masonic Service Association of North America.

We are honored to have with us here today, MW George Braatz, who is Past Grand Master of Masons in Ohio and the Executive Secretary of the Masonic Service Association of North America. Brother Grand Marshal, would you escort him to the East.

"Most Worshipful Grand Master, Brethren, Distinguished guests: Good morning. I can still say that for a couple of moments more here. I would like to thank the Grand Lodge of Maine for all the hospitality my wife and I have received in coming here and for this opportunity to address the Grand Lodge during this my first visit to your communication. I want to mention that hospital visitation program, and I will do that again in a moment. I want to first say that for the Masonic Service Association of North America, 2013 is a very exciting year. We have reached several anniversaries in our overall work during this year.

First of all, we have been providing disaster relief services for Grand Lodges in North America now for ninety years. Collecting and giving, over that period, nearly ten million dollars in relief. Now this includes our current appeal which began last November when Hurricane Sandy struck the east coast. We have provided about \$400,000 to the Grand Lodges of New York and New Jersey who were struck by that hurricane. We can thank the generosity of Masons, Masonic lodges and Grand Lodges all over the continent for those gifts.

Also, as an anniversary this year, this is our 90th year for the Masonic Service Association in publishing the Short Talk Bulletin, totaling some 1085 consecutive monthly issues of education and inspiration for masonic readers. It has been called the widest-distributed Masonic publication in the world. We are very proud of that publication and the length of time it has been going out to all of you. In honor of that anniversary, we are talking orders now for Volume One, the first of five projected volumes of a collection of all of the Short Talk bulletins, produced over those 90 years. This first volume will go from 1923 to 1937 and will be published this fall in a couple of editions. The editor is S. Brent Morris, who is the Managing Editor of the Scottish Rite Journal. Go to our web page please, and look for full information if you're interested in buying one of these volumes. I think every lodge should have at least one of these in their library, for future reference and research in the coming years. The third anniversary we are observing this year is the 20<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the Masonic Information Center, whose goal is to seek greater awareness for Freemasonry. Over the years it has published brochures and the latest brochure is one called, "What Has Masonry Done For The World."

This came out last September for the first time. I hoping many of you have seen it here in Maine. We are already in our second printing and more than one hundred thousand have been distributed throughout the country. It is a great brochure for Masons to read but also showing the Non-Mason. I think it would be excellent at your October 19<sup>th</sup> open houses.

As you heard another great service of the Masonic Service Association, is the hospital visitation program. It has been a cornerstone of MSA since we were created. I'm not going to repeat the numbers of the homes and visitors, and the hospital reps you have here which our state coordinator, MW Brother Wayne just reported. We are very happy with the support you have given us. It has been a pleasure for me to sit here today and to listen as Dan Hill received his award and to hear all the accomplishments he has made. He is just another example of all the hospital reps we have at approximately 175 medical centers and V.A. hospitals across this country. There are many dedicated Brethren just like you have here in Maine. We want to thank you for all the efforts you have given to support the MSA in so many ways, particularly, for those hospital reps that we have. Thank you all. Thank you all Maine."

The motion to accept the report of the Masonic Service Association was made, seconded and so Voted.

The Grand Master called for Brother John T. Jenkins to be escorted to the Grand East to address the Communication on the subject of mentoring.

## Presentation on Mentoring

“Most Worshipful Grand Master, Brothers all, Good afternoon, Praise the Lord somebody. I really appreciate the opportunity to be here. The two most important words I ever learned are the words “thank you”. So giving honor to GOD and this great institution, I am very, very, very, thankful for the opportunity to share a couple of words and ideas around the word *mentoring*. How important it is for our individual efforts and to the organization but also I know a lot about community service. Ultimately, it’s about how we interact and engage ourselves in the community at large. It’s a call for action. Now before I get into the three little points I share with you in the time I have, I’d like to share with you my journey across the hot sands - in which you all know a little about.

Now imagine in the Middle East, you have all the modern instruments of the modern day world. The symbols of wealth are if you can own a camel. Of course you can have a nice heart, ok, but if you own a camel, it’s a sign of prestige. So I figured the young prince I met was fairly wealthy. He had a whole herd of camels. So I go to the young prince and said, “Ya, I’d like to try one of your camels, ‘cause they don’t have too many of those back in Maine” - (in case you hadn’t noticed that) He said “Sure, select one.” You have to understand, they have one hump camels and two hump camels. Well I didn’t choose the two hump camel ‘cause you choose that two hump camel, they beat you back and forth as you ride. Not good. So this lesson is not about what you know, but how you choose what you know. I chose a one hump camel. So I got on that one hump camel feeling quite comfortable - camel hair of course. I said how do you make this camel go? He said well if you want this camel to go, you need to go *kersh* in his ear. And if you want him to go faster, you go *phew*, *phew* and it will go faster. And if you want it to stop, you just reach around and pull on his tail. So I go down to the camel’s ear and say *kersh* and the camel takes off, at a pretty good clip, I might say. But I’m a little adventurous, and wonder how fast this thing can really go. So I lean forward to his ear again and go *phewwww* and he takes off even faster. He’s going so fast that the force of the air pulls at your face, and makes your lips go blblblb. Not good. And your hair starts receding - that’s what happens you know. So, there I am riding this camel, my face tearing because I’m going so fast that I look and see that we are approaching rapidly a deep ravine. I’m starting to panic, saying how do I stop this thing, how do I stop this thing. Then I remember I tug on his tail. Then I yank on that camel’s tail and he goes errrrrrrrrrrk screeches to a halt at the edge of the ravine. I was so was so relieved, I said *phew*! {Loud laughter from the Brethren!}

So it’s not how much you know but how well you use what you know. And I have a great deal to learn along this journey of wisdom in Masonry of course. Three points I wanted to share about this idea of mentoring and it’s about: number one, the inward journey; number two, the relational journey; and number three, the community journey. The inward journey, well it’s about self-improvement. I want to say that in the Fellowcraft lesson it makes reference to the winding staircase we all must travel.

Not quite knowing what the next step will be. I say that it's a personal journey in that it's the consistent thing, although you don't know what that might be.

The most consistent thing I want you to keep in mind is the railing. That hand railing that goes along with every staircase is called the principals of Masonry. As long as you hold on to that handrail as you ascend and descend that winding staircase of uncertainty of life, you will always have sure footing. Because you have something to hold you up, brace you up, especially in those most difficult times. I say mentoring provides us with those tools, as we proceed through our own journey with ascending and descending that metaphorical and reality of the winding staircase in our lives. The word Maine! Talk about this individual journey of self-improvement. Maine, M.A.I.N.E. You cannot spell the word Maine, you cannot have the word Maine without the two letters, "M" and "E." Combine those two letters and make the word ME.

Very good, class. This is a fast group. I'll see you all at the mentoring seminar, ok? Say **What?** There is no Maine without me. It's calling on each and every one of us to step up to the plate, to serve, to be a mentor. It doesn't mean you have to know everything, No, it's not about ability, but about your availability. Showing up, it's 80% of any of our endeavors. In your relationships, you've got to show up, in any endeavor - availability. You need only to open up the day's paper or any newspaper, news of the day to see how desperate our community, our nation is for mentors like you. Step up and be present in some person's life. They are screaming for help. Unfortunately those screams are falling on deaf ears. But mentors who are masonic based, have the ears to hear. So it is a personal journey. America, A-m-e-r-i-c-a, you cannot spell the word America without the two letters, M and E. Put them together, and they spell the word me.

My friends, the nation is calling upon on each and every one of us in this room, to be that mentor in that person's life, regardless of age and regardless of their station in life. It's what Masonry is all about. We are all on the level. So let us level with those around us, those in desperate need, let us see and hear their cries for help. They are loud and clear because it fills the news every day. So mentoring is about self-improvement. The second point is about relational journey, a shared relational journey. That's amongst ourselves, is full of civic development and the development of the brotherhood of Masonry. I borrow wisdom wherever I can find it and often it is found for example, in a book I read regularly.

In proverbs 27-17 it says, "I AM" sharpens iron. One man sharpens another. It talks about masonry back in the ancient text as well. In proverbs 9-9 it goes on the say, Give instruction to a wise man and he will be still wiser. Teach a righteous man and he will increase in learning. Again, mentoring in the highest order is the call for today. There are registration forms downstairs and we hope you all take them back to your respective lodges.

The third point is about community - the community journey. It's beyond the walls of our lodge because we have a commitment to our lodge. Your lodge is lodged in a larger community. Our individual lodges, are lodged within a community. The cry for assistance, direction, and mentoring goes beyond the walls to our lodges but they exist in the larger sea of people in our surrounding community, which is where our reach needs to go. That is what this whole mentoring program is all about.

It says, in the book of Mathew, many are called but few are chosen. I have my own thought as well between being called and being chosen, I'd like to share with you. I say, many are called but few will answer. And of those who will answer, few will qualify. And of those who will qualify, few are chosen. And of those chosen, one, indeed all it takes is one that will step up and make a positive difference. Masonry is all about being that one - being that one that will step up to speak truth and light and enlightenment to those around us. The mentoring program highlights that as well.

And I say also in the game of tennis, nothing happens until someone is willing to serve. Nothing starts until someone picks up the challenge and serve. It becomes a game of activity and engagement, because the service goes back and forth. Mentoring is not about having all the answers, but to be available to have that chance, to have those discussions within our lodges, and within our lodges in a larger community. You know quite often in situations, people are training and developing. In athletics, you have a coach. In teaching, you have professors. We have leaders in our organization and we have Masters and a Grand Master who share in part their wisdom.

In martial arts, you have a master as well that is perceived as all wise and knowing, which is usually correct. It must be frustration hanging around someone like that because they never seem to make a mistake. So imagine a student saying to a friend, "I'd like to see that Master be wrong, just once." The student then said, "I have an idea. Want to play a trick on the Master?" So the student stands outside the building for a while and catches a small bird, so small you can't see it cupped in the student's hand. So the student goes to the Master and says, "Master, Master: what is it that I have in my hands?" The Master being all wise, all knowing, and usually correct, answers, "Ummm, well it's a small bird that you have in your hands." "Aww, but Master is the bird alive or dead?" So you see, if the Master says the bird is dead, the student opens his hands and the bird flies away, hahaha, proving the Master wrong. But if the Master says the bird is alive, the student puts his hands together and squishes the bird, ugh, dead. So the student is persistent, and says "Master, Master: is the bird alive or dead?" The Master takes a deep breath and looks at that student and says, "The future of that bird is in your hands."

My brothers in Masonry, my brothers in life: the future of Masonry is in your hands. Not just today but every day. And I say to you, let us open our hands, let us open our hearts, let us open our minds and give flight to our dreams.

## **Report of the Committee on Fraternal Relations**

Sometime ago The Grand Lodge of Croatia requested the recognition of the Grand Lodge of Maine. Because only two subordinate lodges made up the Grand Lodge and the turmoil in the area we did not immediately grant amity. They have again requested recognition. We now recommend granting recognition to the Grand Lodge of Croatia.

The Grand Lodge of Mauritius was consecrated on March 12, 2005. Mauritius is an island nation of the East coast of Africa. The Grand Lodge has nine subordinate lodges and there are three lodges with allegiance sponsored one by the Grand Lodge of England, one by the Grand Lodge of Scotland and one by the Grand Lodge of Ireland. Your committee recommends the recognition of the Grand Lodge of Mauritius.

The Grand Lodge National Francaise: The GNLF has been in turmoil for the past several years. There have been court cases and street demonstrations. Each year they write that the problem is being solved but it continues. Several jurisdictions have withdrawn amity from the GNLF. There is a new group calling itself the Grand Lodge of the French Masonic Alliance that is now requesting amity.

If you are planning to attend Lodge in Baja California, Bolivia, Bulgaria, or Paraguay, there are jurisdictional disputes in these areas.

From the Commission on Information for recognition:

"The International Free & Accepted Modern Masons, Inc. of Detroit is a "Masonic" organization covering Craft Masonry, Order of the Eastern Star, Scottish Rite and Shrine admitting both men and women. They were self-chartered in 1950 and have recently created a web page providing information about itself. They meet none of the standards for recognition."

**Following Prayer by Assistant Grand Chaplain RW Walter Lamb, the Grand Master called the Craft from labor to refreshment for lunch and declared that the Grand Lodge would resume its labors at 2:00 PM.**

**At the appropriate hour the Grand Master called the Craft from refreshment to labor.**

The Grand Master called upon MW Claire Tusch to make a presentation on behalf of the George Washington Masonic Memorial.

## **Presentation on behalf of the George Washington National Masonic Memorial**

Good afternoon Brethren,

We have heard much today about mentoring, critically important to membership development and the future of our lodges. I'm eagerly looking forward to Brother John Jenkins' presentations planned across this jurisdiction. Brethren I sincerely hope you can attend these workshops. By the way, Brother Jenkins, I'm working on a camel tomorrow and could use some help if you have the time...but I'll ask that you don't "pneww".

I would like speak with you all about perhaps one of the greatest mentors in our history, a man of character, of virtue, who in a letter to Alexander Hamilton in 1788 wrote, "I hope that I shall always possess firmness and virtue enough to maintain what I consider the most enviable of all titles...the character of an honest man." What a great example we have to emulate as human beings, and more especially as Freemasons. We can all remember when we were taught about George Washington as a boy, about his honor and integrity. What Washington tells us transforms who we are and it transmits across the ages. Worshipful Brother George Washington clearly understood that leadership must be by example...an example for us all to emulate.

And I'd like to discuss the George Washington National Masonic Memorial in Alexandria, Virginia, that we Masons have erected and maintain, dedicated to honor the memory and character of this great man and Mason, the "Father of his Country" and for the Masonic virtues he exemplified. The Memorial which was conceived in 1910 at a meeting of Grand Masters of Grand Lodges of the United States, belongs to all the Grand Lodges in the United States and thus, to all the Freemasons of the United States.



As stated in the Charter of the George Washington Masonic National Memorial Association, the purpose was: ***“To erect and maintain...a suitable Memorial Temple to George Washington, the Mason; which expresses in durability and beauty the underlying esteem of the Freemasons of the United States for him in whose memory it shall stand throughout the coming years”.***

A grateful Fraternity conceived and constructed the GWMNM as an everlasting tribute to the one man who did more and gave more for the creation of our nation than perhaps any other. The ultimate authority governing the Memorial is the fifty-two (52) Grand Masters of the United States and Puerto Rico who constitute the active membership of the Memorial Association. The Memorial is managed by a Board of Directors comprised of twenty-one (21) Grand Masters or Past Grand Masters who each serve a three year term. The George Washington Masonic National Memorial Association is a 501-c-3 Educational Foundation with two major focuses. The Association was created to *erect and maintain a suitable Memorial Temple to George Washington the Mason*. The Memorial was conceived, constructed and is maintained by contributions from the Masonic Fraternity. However, it has never been adequately endowed.

The second focus or mission of the Memorial is: ***“To inspire humanity through education to emulate and promote the virtues, character and vision of George Washington, the Man, the Mason and Father of our Country.”*** This focuses the Memorial Association on its role as a National Education Foundation through exhibitions, programs and projects that educate and inspire humanity. The design of the Memorial was inspired by the lighthouse of Alexandria, Egypt, one of the ancient Seven Wonders of the World and an ancient repository of knowledge and learning. The tower is capped with an Egyptian pyramid and surmounted with a stylized flame like finial as a reference to ancient lighthouses. Freemasonry was a guiding light to George Washington, as he was a guiding light to the Revolution and to the formation of this great country. The Memorial is a beacon that spreads the light of Freemasonry and the legacy of Washington to the world. In 1923 the Memorial Committee wrote, “The Memorial to Washington in its colossal form would typify the power and strength of Masonry. The graceful outline and proportions will symbolize the beautiful tenets of the institution and would express the unfeigned loyalty and devotion of the American Mason to the ideals of Washington.”

I know a number of you, my brothers, have had the opportunity to visit this stunning edifice. From the first time that I viewed the Memorial from the window of my plane flying up the Potomac to land at Reagan Airport, I was moved by its majesty and beauty. Walking up the hill past the nearly one-hundred foot square and compasses that identify this structure as a Masonic Memorial and climbing the many steps that leads into memorial hall with its 40 foot green granite columns and massive bronze statue of Washington in Masonic regalia, I trust that you were as awed and inspired as I was, and am every time I return. To tour the displays that

tell thousands of visitors, Masons and non-Masons, the story of our Craft, to view the collections of Washington's artifacts on display in the museum, to stand in the silent echoes of the Templar Chapel on the eight floor or take in the dramatic views of Washington, DC and the surrounding country from the observation deck on the ninth floor all contribute to a truly life changing experience.

Brethren, please join with me in viewing a short DVD about the Memorial.

**(A video was presented at this point)**

Brethren, this Memorial was erected to honor the memory of our greatest citizen and Freemason. It belongs to every Freemason of the United States...to you and me. Our task today is not only to preserve the memory and legacy of George Washington, but to preserve, promote and perpetuate the Masonic beliefs and ideals upon which this great nation was founded. This is perhaps more important and more needed today than at any time in our history. This Memorial is a fitting tribute to a man who said, *"A good moral character is the first essential in a man. It is, therefore, highly important to endeavor not only to be learned but to be virtuous."* Your continued support enables the maintenance of the Memorial in a manner that reflects honor and dignity on Brother George Washington and on the whole Masonic Fraternity.

Brethren, please take an opportunity to visit the information table outside and help yourself to the handouts. When in the Washington DC area I hope you can visit the Memorial, or better yet, make it a destination and take a candidate with your lodge and ladies for a degree experience you will always remember. I'll be happy to help you in any way that I can.

I hope the Memorial inspires you as it has me.

The Grand Master called for the report of the Finance Committee to be presented.

## **The Report of the Finance Committee**

This report conveying the preliminary Grand Lodge budget for the fiscal year beginning April 1, 2013, is being provided in accordance with Section 35 of the Grand Constitution. The report reflects the efforts of your "Finance Committee" to provide meaningful information to the Craft on the financial condition of Grand Lodge as well as on the budget and motions to be proposed by the Finance Committee at the 2013 Annual Communication.

To make the budget report (page 8 of this report) more meaningful, many related, small-dollar line items have been consolidated for presentation purposes, and the budget provisions are compared to historical costs. The graphic analysis of the Grand Lodge budget and financial condition should assist your review of cost trends and changing priorities; the effects of the Finance Committee initiatives of the past several years; as well as the Committee's recommendations and the Grand Master's initiatives for next year.

#### A Masonic Brother Remembers his Beloved Craft

Before reviewing Grand Lodge finances, the Committee would like to acknowledge and express our sincere appreciation for a substantial bequest by one of our Masonic brothers, our former Grand Treasurer, RW Bruce S. Tornquist, of Deering Lodge, and his wife Lottie. They generously remembered many Maine Masonic organizations in their wills, including a bequest of about \$136,000 to Grand Lodge. These funds have been invested by the Grand Treasurer and only the earnings on their generous donations may be used to benefit Grand Lodge and the Craft. Their caring support will benefit Maine Freemasonry for generations to come.

#### Financial Stewardship and Strength of Grand Lodge

The past year has been a year of great improvement in the management of the financial affairs of Grand Lodge. RW Scott Whytock was elected Grand Treasurer last May and he has consolidated many securities and banking accounts, thereby improving the payment process and eliminating duplicative accounts, which often had very high service charges. Through the use of the Internet, he provides detailed monthly financial reports to Grand Lodge officers. The Grand Secretary and Finance Committee now have on-line access to the financial records of Grand Lodge, and payroll processing is now done by an outside vendor.

With an entirely new slate of elected Grand Lodge officers and appointed staff, the Finance Committee has actively assisted in the transition, providing historical perspective, technical assistance and training support when helpful. The Committee has also independently reconciled financial accounts, thereby serving as a system of checks and balances during the transition.

The Finance Committee has also appreciated the opportunity to work cooperatively with the Finance Committee of the Masonic Charitable Foundation of Maine. These opportunities reflect the positive direction throughout the Craft under Grand Master A. James Ross.

The accompanying table reports the various assets held by Grand Lodge as of January 31, 2013, which includes approximately half of the payments made by Lodges with their 2012 Annual Returns.

The Tornquist, Maine Mason and Self-Insurance Funds represent about one-third of total Grand Lodge assets, and cannot be used for general operating purposes. The Moody and Permanent Funds (45% of total assets) are our emergency savings accounts and should not be used to finance today's regular operations of Grand Lodge. The latter funds should instead be prudently kept off-limits, much like our

personal retirement funds, to serve as the foundation for our financial future as well as our legacy to future generations of Maine Masons.

The remaining 23% of assets are in the general fund that is used to operate Grand Lodge. The uncommitted portion of these assets would fund roughly six months of Grand Lodge operations, which is not a large cushion by any means. This funding reserve should be increased somewhat over time, yet the goal of the Finance Committee is to fund current expenses with current revenues, which we have been able to achieve for the current as well as upcoming year without an increase of the per capita tax assessment.

The current financial picture is good, yet the long-term financial health of our Craft in Maine depends upon on how well we invest – our dollars and energies – for our future.

### Investing for Our Future

Your Finance Committee has diligently pursued the investment of the various Grand Lodge funds, thereby providing for: 1) a stronger financial position for future generations of Maine Masons; 2) a hedge against inflation risk; and 3) an increase in investment income that may grow dedicated funds, stabilize future per capita tax increases, and help to fund extraordinary events such as the celebration of the upcoming 200th Anniversary of Maine Freemasonry.

As a result of these Finance Committee actions, the growth of the stock market, and the generosity of Bruce and Lottie Tornquist, Grand Lodge investments have increased by nearly 190% since March 31, 2010, as shown in the above table.

The Finance Committee and Grand Master share the opinion that Grand Lodge needs an Investment Committee of Masons who are qualified to oversee Grand Lodge investments, to invest wisely, to protect our treasure generated from past generations of Masons, and to grow our investments for the future strength of Maine Freemasonry. Legislation forming such a committee will be considered for adoption at the 2013 Annual Communication.

**Investment Earnings Policy:** The proposed Grand Lodge Investment Committee is expected to develop policies to govern the strategic investment and oversight of Grand Lodge funds. The policy will consider a variety of risk factors as well as earnings opportunities. Meanwhile, your Finance Committee is developing an investment income policy that in essence provides that:

- 1) All income earned on invested funds held in the Self-Insurance Fund and the Maine Mason Fund shall remain in those funds to be used only for their prescribed purposes.
- 2) All income earned on Permanent Fund investments shall remain in that fund for any future appropriation at an Annual Communication to address extraordinary financial demands facing the Craft.

3) A portion of the earnings on and the growth of the Tornquist, Moody and General Funds (and any otherwise undesignated invested balances of Grand Lodge) may be recommended by the Finance Committee for appropriation at an Annual Communication to defray specific or general operating expenses of Grand Lodge. Any unused amounts shall remain in the respective funds. As a historical reference point, the Moody Fund has been employed in the past to address emergency conditions, such as to establish the Self-Insurance Fund when commercial insurers would no longer insure Lodge treasurers. (The moneys used to start up the Self-Insurance Fund were subsequently returned to the Moody Fund.) The Moody Fund was also used to fund the move of Grand Lodge offices to Holden and to implement the MORI membership system.

#### The Budget for Fiscal Year 2014

Following the practice established last year, the proposed budget is based the upon requests made by Grand Lodge officers and committees, a detailed analysis of expenses incurred in recent years, and a projection of income for next year.

#### The Bottom Line of the 2014 Budget

Despite lower revenues due to somewhat declining membership, the added annual cost of modifying and operating the MORI membership database, and the provision for part-time janitorial services needed to maintain the new Holden office, the Finance Committee is pleased to announce that barring any material unexpected developments, NO increase in the per capita assessment will be proposed by the Finance Committee for next year. This will be the second consecutive year without a per capita tax increase, although there may be an increase of a few cents in the per member cost of insurance (now \$0.93). This rate will be set when insurance premiums are determined during the summer months.

Expenses are projected to decrease year to year, and increase by only about \$24,000 over the four year period of 2010-2014, or an average of 1.8% per year.

The budget for next year continues the strong commitment to a variety of education, leadership and membership initiatives available to Lodges (item #6, reflected in salmon in the accompanying graph). While funding for these initiatives is down from fiscal year 2012, the proposed budget fully meets the respective committee needs.

The Finance Committee forecasts a modest operating budget surplus for fiscal year 2014. The continuing commitment to our highest priorities without an increase in the per capita tax is made possible by:

1) Operating under the budget precept that current operating costs should be fully funded by current operating revenues, without dipping into the principal of, or income earned on, our various permanent and other invested funds except for extraordinary events.

- 2) Requesting officers and committees to “zero-base” their budget requests each year;
- 3) Tightly budgeting and controlling Grand Lodge costs, with the Finance Committee closely evaluating needs and trimming budget provisions wherever possible;
- 4) Keeping 2014 personnel costs (#1 in dark blue) at below 2010 levels as a result of the Finance Committee’s multi-year staffing related efforts. The 2014 budget provides for merit-based salary increases being awarded to Grand Lodge officers and employees, as well as the employment of a one-day per week employee to clean the Holden building. The cost of the new position is shared equally by Grand Lodge and the Charitable Foundation as the building houses the Grand Lodge offices as well as the Foundation’s library and museum;
- 5) Reducing somewhat further the cost of Grand Lodge officer travel (#4 in light blue);
- 6) Limiting the cost of the Annual Communication (#5 in dark green). Year-to-date fiscal year 2013 actual costs are down nearly 30% from the peak spending level reached in 2010; and,
- 7) Undertaking a review, in concert with the Grand Lodge Insurance Committee, of insurance premiums paid to insurers and allocated to Lodges, building associations and other Masonic bodies. Insurance premiums paid to commercial insurers by Grand Lodge exceeded \$100,000 in 2012. The insurance review was initiated to determine whether risks are being properly classified and that premiums are being correctly allocated to all concerned. (During the review, it was determined that an insurance carrier has changed how it prices commercial liability insurance coverage on Masonic Lodge buildings; this issue was still being pursued when this report was being prepared and more information will be provided to the affected Lodges when further information becomes available.)

The above actions by the Grand Lodge Finance Committee were achieved with the greatly appreciated cooperation of the many Grand Lodge officers and committees, as well as through ongoing budget discussions with the Finance Committee of the Maine Masonic Charitable Foundation. The Lodge-related initiatives of Grand Lodge, as explained below, are being effectively complemented by the high level of support to Lodges and individual brethren being made by the Charitable Foundation. We applaud the Charitable Foundation Trustees for their efforts. We also wish to recognize the significant contributions being made by our new Grand Secretary and the exemplary leadership of our Grand Master.

#### Continuing the Budget Focus on the Future

Last year, Grand Lodge overwhelmingly adopted the Grand Master’s plan for building a stronger fraternity by fully funding the 2013 budget for Committee Expenses. That budget made a significant and much needed commitment to our brethren and Lodges for the future...the future of Maine Freemasonry. This commitment is evident in the various initiatives relating to Membership, Leadership

Development, and Masonic Education and Lodge Services (MEALS). Little had been spent in these areas in prior years.

The proposed budget for fiscal year 2014 continues funding of last year's essential initiatives in these areas and funds a new mentoring program that will commence during the upcoming year.

**Leadership Development** – The 2013 and 2014 budgets provide significant funding for new leadership development initiatives.

Since the 2012 Annual Communication, a team of Masons has developed a full-day leadership program – the Dirigo Masonic Leadership Seminar – that has been held in four venues across the state over the past six months. Registrations are being received for the fifth session scheduled for April 13th in Norway, and two additional sessions have now been scheduled for September 28, 2013, in Limestone and October 26, 2013, in Rockport. Over 165 brethren from 79 Lodges have already attended or are registered to attend the upcoming session in Norway. The 2014 budget also provides for additional Dirigo sessions for lodge officers and members elsewhere in the state in early 2014. Grand Lodge is seeking additional lodges and districts to sponsor the seminars at no cost to the lodges.

Since coming on board in August 2012, the Grand Secretary has been a regular contributor to the Dirigo Leadership Seminar series. He has also traveled statewide to meet with Lodge secretaries on the new membership data base, and on the role and responsibilities of Lodge secretaries. These meetings have been very well received and the 2014 budget provides for a second round of these visits.

The new budget also provides initial funding to roll out a new Masonic Mentoring program with two initial training sessions to be held before this summer, one in the north and another in the south. The MEALS Committee has printed additional manuals for use by the mentors, and the Maine Masonic College is planning to offer educational opportunities starting next fall on mentoring related topics that should engage current brethren in ways that will enhance the education of candidates, nurture their ties to Lodge, and benefit their personal relationships outside the Lodge.

**Membership Development** – The Grand Master has several programs to attract good men to our Craft – programs such as fellowship nights and open houses that provide the public with information and opportunities to take that first step towards becoming Masons. Lodges that actively participated in the programs last fall are now busy working many candidates.

The 2014 budget provides continued funding for television and radio messaging on Freemasonry and the open houses, as well as messaging on Facebook, LinkedIn and other social media sites that proved successful last year. Nearly 200 reusable banners were distributed last fall and additional banners will be made available to Lodges that need them for the statewide open house scheduled for October 19, 2013, to better let their communities know where Masons are welcoming visitors. The budget also funds the new Masonic Rookie Program, as well as leadership training programs on membership development and retention, such as attracting prospective candidates whose membership will benefit Freemasonry and who will benefit from becoming Masons.

Masonic Education and Lodge Services – The MEALS Committee budget for Fiscal Year 2014 provides for the completion of the new, invaluable educational DVDs that are designed to aid in the education of candidates on our Masonic degrees. The DVDs will be available at no cost to all Lodges. The DVDs and Candidate Instructor Manuals will be important aids in improving how we instruct our candidates during their degree journey, and will also be a source of confidence among Lodge leaders by providing a comprehensive visual roadmap for successful candidate education.

### George Washington National Masonic Memorial (GWNMM)

Over the past year, the Finance Committee has considered the long-standing commitment by the Masons in Maine – and throughout the country – to perpetuate the remembrance of the virtues and accomplishments of our Masonic Brother and President George Washington.

Every new Mason contributes \$5.00 to the GWNMM, and Masons in 24 states now contribute \$1.00 each year to the maintenance and operation of this beautiful Masonic memorial that overlooks Alexandria, Virginia. While the Maine Masonic Charitable Foundation makes a donation to the GWNMM each year, the Finance Committee has unanimously voted to support the adoption of the \$1.00 per member annual donation by Maine brethren, and has forwarded proposed legislation to the Committee on Amendments to the Constitution to be proposed at the upcoming Annual Communication and then be considered for adoption in May 2014. The \$1.00 would be collected each year as part of the Annual Return for each brother for which a Lodge pays the per capita tax (which excludes plural members). This new member payment could be partially offset by a reduction in the \$3.00 assessment per member for printing and mailing the Maine Mason magazine, which is now being mailed to all active Entered Apprentices and Fellow Crafts.

### Penalties for not Attending Annual Communications of Grand Lodge

The Finance Committee considered the value of various penalties charged to Lodges in accordance with the Grand Constitution. The Committee voted not to propose any changes to the penalties, with one exception, the penalty under Section 84A assessed to Lodges that do not attend the Grand Lodge Annual Communication. In recent years, increasing numbers of Lodges have not been represented at the Annual Communication. Thirty-three Lodges (18%) were not represented at the 2012 Annual Communication, of which twelve have not attended for at least the past two years. Two of these lodges have not attended for at least six straight years.

It is the duty of every Master to see that the Lodge is represented by the Master, Wardens or a Proxy – who may be any member of the Lodge, other than a brother who currently serves as a Grand Lodge officer, is a Permanent Member, or who represents another Lodge as a voting member of Grand Lodge.

Section 84A was adopted by Grand Lodge in 1976 with the hope that Lodges would opt to attend the Annual Communication rather than be subject to the penalty. The purchasing power of a dollar has eroded greatly since 1976, and \$10 can no longer be considered much of a penalty.



The Finance Committee would like to emphasize three points in advancing this proposal. First, that any member of a Lodge may serve as the lodge proxy to Grand Lodge except as noted above – the attending Lodge representative need not be the Master, Warden or a Past Master. Second, brethren may not be aware that many Lodges cover the travel costs of brethren attending the Annual Communication – this is a permissible Lodge expense. And third, each Lodge can fully avoid this penalty by fulfilling the constitutional duty to attend the Annual Communication.

The Finance Committee has unanimously voted to support an amendment to Section 84A of the Grand Constitution setting the fine at \$75, and adding a provision giving authority to the Grand Master to waive the fine for just cause. Proposed legislative language to this effect has been forwarded to the Committee on Amendments to the Constitution to be proposed this year and then considered for adoption in May 2014.

- 1) That Grand Lodge approve the report of the Committee on Finance;
- 2) That Grand Lodge approve the proposed budget for fiscal year 2014 that begins on April 1, 2013;
- 3) That Grand Lodge approve maintaining the per-capita tax assessment at \$14.10 for fiscal year 2014; and
- 4) That Grand Lodge approve the recommended policy for the use of income on invested funds.

This report's presentation was enhanced by a power point presentation when was given at the Annual Communication. The Chairman narrated the presentation.

A motion was made to accept the recommendation of the Finance Committee to reduce the contribution to the Maine Mason Magazine from \$3.00 to \$2.00. The motion was seconded and approved.

A motion was made to amend the portion of the report pertaining to the fee on late returns, from 75.00 to 100.00, seconded and approved.

A motion to accept the report of the Finance Committee report as presented, was made, seconded and approved.

A motion was made to keep the per Capita tax at \$14.10. The motion was seconded and approved.

The Grand Master called for the report of the Committee on Amendments.

## Report of the Committee on Amendments

To the Officers, Members and Brethren of this Jurisdiction:

Compared with some years, Brethren, we have relatively simple and straightforward matters to resolve as we shape our constitution to meet the needs of the Craft in this proud and productive jurisdiction.

We have one proposed amendment laid over from last year to resolve; five Standing Regulation proposals to decide and two proposed Amendments being offered for first readings that you will be asked to consider and, if it be your wish, to lay over on the table for final votes at next year's annual communication.

I would offer the reminder that bringing the proposed Amendment to a vote is a two-step process. This body must first vote to remove the proposed amendment from the table; then, once that is accomplished, we will vote on actual disposition of the proposal.

Brethren, we have before us the proposed amendment to our Constitution offered last year at our Annual Communication. It was presented by your Finance Committee and, if adopted, would add, as paragraph #16 in Section 36 (Standing Committees) a Committee on Investments, and would read as follows:

16. *On Investments,*

The Committee on Investments shall develop and approve investment policies for Grand Lodge and, after consultation with the Committee of Finance and Grand Treasurer, direct the investment of available Grand Lodge funds, including the purchase and sale of stocks, bonds and other appropriate financial instruments. Section 41 (which requires that all committee members be past masters) shall not apply to this committee.

I would entertain a motion to remove from the table this proposed amendment to Section 36.

The Committee on Amendments recommends adoption of this proposed amendment and I would entertain a motion to that end.

We will now turn our attention to deciding the fate of the five proposed Standing Regulations offered for your consideration. I would remind you that proposed Standing Regulations need not lay over for a year. If you vote in favor of a SR proposal, it becomes effective immediately.

The first Standing Regulation we must consider is a proposal submitted by our Grand Secretary. If adopted it would read as follows:

76. *Resolved*, That, subject to the provisions herein stated, a button, to be known as the Grand Lodge of Maine 5 Year, 10 Year, 15 Year, 20 Year, 30 Year, 35 Year, or 45 Year Service Button, may be presented by the Master of any lodge in this jurisdiction, or under his direction, to each Master Mason who holds membership in a lodge in this jurisdiction and the brother shall produce evidence from the Grand Secretary's office of another jurisdiction to establish his membership during the balance of the full term of the years inscribed on the Service Button. Said buttons shall be purchased by the Secretary of any lodge in this Grand Jurisdiction from the office of the Grand Secretary.

Do I hear a motion to adopt this proposal?

A motion was made, seconded, and, after some discussion and clarification, was passed.

## Elections

**At 3:00 PM EDST, the Grand Master suspended the remainder of this report until another time due to the necessity to comply with the Constitutional requirement to hold elections at that hour. He called MW Wayne T. Adams, PGM to the Grand East to conduct the election process.**

Brethren, we will take care of the unopposed officers first. The brethren of Presumpscot Lodge have proposed A. James Ross to be re-elected Grand Master to serve for another year. There are no other candidates so I would welcome a motion to re-elect our Grand Master by acclamation. A motion was made and seconded. All those in favor please indicate by raising your cards. It is unanimous. I must ask, do you accept?

Brother Ross accepted.

The Brethren of Monmouth Lodge have proposed David A. Walker to serve as Deputy Grand Master for another year. There are no other candidates. Do I hear a motion to re-elect David Walker. A motion was made and seconded. All those in favor of re-election by acclamation, all opposed? The motion carries. Brother Walker, do you accept?

Brother Walker accepted.

The Brethren of Governor William King have proposed Scott Whytock to serve as Grand Treasurer for another year. There are no other candidates. Do I hear a motion to re-elect by acclamation? A motion was made and seconded. All in favor please indicate by raising your cards. All opposed? Motion carries. Brother Whytock, do you accept?

Brother Whytock accepted.

The Brethren of Howard Lodge proposed Mark Rustin to serve as Grand Secretary for another year. There are no other candidates. Do I hear a motion to re-elect? A motion was made seconded. All those in favor of re-electing by acclamation, please indicate by showing your voting cards. All opposed? Motion carries. Brother Rustin, do you accept?

Brother Rustin accepted.

Now we come to the contested offices. Brother Randy Adams is going to serve as chief teller. I am inviting the permanent members of Grand Lodge to serve as tellers. At this time if you choose to accept, please retire to the foyer to take your direction from Brother Adams.

While the tellers were forming, the Grand Master called for the final report of the Committee on Credentials.

## **Report of the Maine Masonic College**

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine:

It is the sense of the Board of Regents that the Maine Masonic College has reached a point of being “established.” That is to say, the procedures of the past few years have taken on an air of familiarity and even a certain level of permanence. The

process of establishing a curriculum for the year, procuring lecturers and teachers, and contracting for sites for our classes no longer provokes the uncertainty and anxiety that it once did. This allows for the consideration of other aspects of the College's work such as administrative tasks and longer-range planning

One program that has advanced to a point of showing real promise is the diploma program. To obtain a diploma from the College, a student must complete a "core curriculum" and then attend additional classes peculiar to his area of study. In addition, he must complete a project that adds to the common knowledge of his chosen subject. Three Masons have attended all of the required classroom work and have only to complete a suitable project to qualify for our first diplomas. The design for a parchment diploma is now under consideration by the Board of Regents.

Equally encouraging is the increased interest among the Craft in the College and its educational offerings. At District meetings during the year, attendees were asked to indicate if they had attended Maine Masonic College classes. An impressive number of hands went up. A challenge for the College is to ensure that Masons in all parts of Maine have an opportunity to attend the classes and that we provide for a measure of continuity in the interest that we believe that we are stimulating among Maine Masons. Classes have been held from Ashland to Kennebunkport and from Wilton to Union, but the College is looking for ways to reach farther Downeast as well as north into the County. The Maine Mason magazine continues to include The Entablature centerfold in each issue. The publisher, MW George Pulkkinen, has graciously offered to organize and insert these two pages dedicated to informing the Craft of Masonic College classes and related activities.

For the third year in a row we have been able to lay out a curriculum for a full year. This permits timely planning not only for the College but also for those of the Craft who have an interest in attending classes. It also eases the problem of contracting with lecturers for the classes. . The curriculum now offers twelve classes each year and is anchored by two recurring events: the annual Convocation in July and a session in the spring devoted to a Celebration of the Arts and Sciences.

At the suggestion of RW Thomas Pulkkinen, the Board of Regents is undertaking the task of preparing a five-year plan for the College. With seven years of experience behind us, we are now in a good position to forecast where the College should be heading as well as the resources that will be needed to reach our goals. Among those goals is the acquisition of administrative support for the College and a permanent site for Board of Regents meetings and the archiving of the College's records. The Maine Masonic Charitable Foundation continues to fund the College's activities and the Board of Regents should like to be able to forecast with some accuracy the direction that the College intends to follow and the duration of contemplated activities and developments.

In the year past we totaled 3129 children who took part in our program. This program is provided to the parents of Maine children who participate in the program and is only possible with those volunteers helping with the programs. Some programs are only provided with the coordinator and one or two helpers. This not only slows down the program but probably makes people wonder, "Where is all the help?" At the schools in York which we do every year there was a total of 37 volunteers 18 at one 19 at the other, the total of children completing the program was 291. Brethren, there were 9 brothers at each program. If the coordinators had that many to help at a program it would be great. This isn't rocket science and I don't believe the coordinators would ask anyone to do something they would not feel comfortable doing.

So, what I'm saying is this, get out there and step up to the plate, it's kind of nice to hit the ball once in a while and you even get to play the whole game. We already have 28 games on the schedule with many more to be added. Check one out and see what it's like, look around and see what you would like to do. I feel that I have a great staff of lecturers who aren't afraid to try new ideas to make their schools more interesting and effective. They have worked hard and tried many new approaches to improve attendance at the schools. What seems to work in one district will fail in another.

In some districts it seems that the attendance at the schools is governed by how seriously the DDGM and the Masters of the lodges attend to their duties. It seems that some Masters forget to impress upon their officers that just sitting in the chair is not the extent of their duties. I have also noticed that the more the officers of the lodges visit other lodges in their district, the better the attendance at the schools.

I requested and have been successful in having some of the most frequently used forms for the Lecturers put on the Grand Lodge website. This makes it easier and quicker for the lecturers to get the forms they need. ## **Report of the Committee on Masonic Education and Lodge Service**

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine:

The Masonic Education & Lodge Service (M.E.A.L.S.) Committee has been busy meeting monthly all year in Augusta. We accomplished the following:

The Grand Master continued the policy of appointing Past District Deputy Grand Masters as DER's and for the most part, the results continue to be very encouraging. The MEALS Committee conducted DER training during the Grand Master's Orientation, as usual, but we knew from the beginning that this group of DER's is something Special. Unlike past DER training, this year most Masonic Districts were represented and the attendees arrived with extraordinary enthusiasm and a genuine desire to learn. It has been a pleasure to work with these extremely well informed and dedicated Masons. Thank you DER's.

Our number one priority this year has been the development of Pollard Plan Training DVD's to replace the old and tired VHS tapes. We asked Ed King to be the Director and Richard Bowden to be the photographer. Our original plan was to recruit a diverse group of Masonic speakers that would represent the demographics of this grand jurisdiction. The goal was to create four videos: Accepted candidate, Entered Apprentice, Fellowcraft and Master Mason. Ed then started writing scripts for each video. As each script started taking shape, Ed presented his work to the MEALS Committee for review and editing. While the scripts were being written and edited, we dealt with other details such as finalizing the list of speakers and establishing dates and locations for filming. Since most masonic work is done from memory, we wrongly assumed that the speakers would eagerly and quickly memorize their scripts. Unfortunately, that was not the case and after several false starts, we realized that we had to change our plan if we wanted to get the job done this year. The bottom line is that Ed King and his wife, Brandy, offered to complete the entire project by themselves using voice overs and graphics. The Accepted Candidate and Entered Apprentice videos are expected to be ready by May, the Fellowcraft and Master Mason videos should be completed sometime this summer and all four DVD's are expected to be in the hands of all lodges by September. This has been a Herculean effort and we owe Ed and Brandy a standing ovation for what they have done for all of us. Thank you.

Two years ago, I distributed the new Instructor's Manuals to the DER's and or DDGM's who attended the grand Master's Orientation in Bangor and requested that they give a copy to each of their constituent lodges. They agreed to do so but I later learned that many of the manuals were never distributed. Some have been located and have finally reached their intended lodge destinations but many lodges are still complaining that their copy never arrived. Any lodge that still does not have a copy of the new instructor's manual should talk to their DER and or DDGM for the year

2011 and ask what happened. In the event that your lodge still needs a copy of the manual and the past DER and or DDGM are unable to get you a copy, ask your current DER to contact me and I will get you a copy as soon as possible. However, please know that these books are not cheap and it takes a great deal of effort to put them together.

The 14th District requested that we conduct Lodge Officer Training but between cancellations due to weather and other scheduling conflicts, we never completed the training. The MEALS Committee will try to go anywhere in the state to conduct Lodge Officer Training upon request. We will even customize the training to meet the needs of the district. Also, there has been “some confusion amongst the workmen” about the difference between the Schools of Instruction and Lodge Officer Training. Simply stated, the Schools of Instruction cover ritual and non-ritual work in a tyled lodge. While Lodge Officer Training is focused upon the day to day functioning of the lodge and how each liner officer fits into the equation. We get into the specific duties of each officer and expose them to some things that they can do to help their Master and Wardens. We also talk about lodge budgeting, teaming, outreach and a wide variety of subjects.

The MEALS Committee and the Maine Masonic College Board of Regents worked together to plan and execute the 2012 Convocation.

### **Raymond Rideout Award**

There were thirteen submissions for the Raymond Rideout Award this year and two lodges stood out from the rest, i.e. Evening Star Lodge # 147 of Buckfield and Springvale Lodge # 190 of Springvale. In fact, both of these lodges are doing such a superb job that the MEALS Committee unanimously decided to call it a tie and hereby award the coveted Raymond Rideout award to both lodges and there will be no Runner – Up award this year. Evening Star Lodge # 147 was nominated by RW Gary Young, District Educational Representative for the 20th District and Springvale Lodge # 190 was nominated by V.W Scott Lister, District Educational Representative for the 19th District.

### **Candidate Education**

Both of these lodges have an active candidate education program that begins as soon as they meet the candidate and continues throughout the degree journey and beyond. In fact, the master of Springvale Lodge appoints a Candidate Educational Committee each year and the current chairman of this very important committee has been serving for three years. Each Accepted Candidate is assigned a mentor or Elder Brother who helps his candidate learn his lessons, once a candidate completes a degree, he is invited to participate in rehearsals for degrees that he has completed. This makes the candidate feel like he is part of the lodge team and helps to reinforce the lessons that he heard while completing the various degrees. Evening Star Lodge also has an Educational Committee. Every candidate is assigned an Elder Brother

who accompanies the candidate to the lodge the night of rehearsal for the EA Degree. This gives the candidate an opportunity to meet the line officers and Candidate Education is conducted by members of the Education Committee. Both lodges utilize a wide variety of educational resources to conduct candidate education including the Pollard Plan Videos, Instructors Manual and Masonic Educational Resources that are provided by the lodge Education Committee, DER and Grand lodge.

### **Education of Brothers**

Evening Star Lodge has three active Past Grand Lodge officers that assist in their Fellowship Night and Open House. They enlist the D E R to offer programs, when the Lodge is not performing degree work. Evening Star # 147, has an annual Table lodge that honors and celebrates a well deserving Mason in the district. They initiated the Master Mason Quarry Degree. This year the Grand Lodge Officers, with Most Worshipful, A James Ross sitting in the East, was supposed to do the degree in the quarry. The weather did not cooperate, but a well-attended, excellent degree was performed in the Lodge hall. Not many Masons are privileged to be raised by the Grand Master. They also have an extremely active Outreach Program. Springvale Lodge has an educational program after most meetings. For example: The Senior Warden gave a presentation on his trip to Haiti. He travelled to Haiti as part of the relief efforts after the earthquake. One of the brothers who attends Harvard University Medical School gave a presentation on his trip to Africa and what he was doing to fight malnutrition. One of the brothers presented a 9/11 tribute on 9/11 about how the events of that day affected his family (the brother is a firefighter). They also like enjoy playing Masonic Jeopardy.

### **Other Factors**

Springvale Lodge has spent the last six years rebuilding and the fruit of their labors is the creation of one of the best lodges in the State. Last year, Springvale Lodge won the Raymond Rideout award and this really energized the brothers to continue to work hard to be the best that they can be. The DER said "I have observed more brothers wanting to help out on the candidate education committee, present educational programs during meetings, Travel with a candidate to other lodges, and offer to assist other lodges in rehearsals and degree work. I am very proud of Springvale Lodge. I have seen tremendous dedication from all the officers and members. The lodge was nominated for "Outstanding Lodge of the Year" this year. The officers rehearse regularly on Sunday nights, but because the Grand Master was visiting on the second meeting of the new term, the officers decided to schedule another night of rehearsals for the 4 weeks until the Grand Masters visit. This is just another example of their dedication.

Springvale Lodge has opened its arms to the immigrant community by raising to the sublime degree of a Master Mason a brother from Africa. Springvale Lodge is going to initiate another member of the African community on the 26th of March.



Evening Star Lodge is currently the flagship of the 20th Masonic District. It makes its dining hall and kitchen available at no cost for approved community functions. As a result, they collected seventy-nine pints of blood in two successful blood drives; held a project graduation fund raiser which netted \$ 500.00 and was matched in a Community Betterment Grant from Grand Lodge.

Their Fellowship Night was attended by forty Masons and guest and resulted in four applications. This resulted in three newly raised Master Masons. The October open house was well attended and resulted in two applications. The lodge presented two fifty year service medals and one service star. It held a School of Instruction in the Master Mason Degree with twenty-four in attendance. Last, but certainly not least, is their highly regarded scholarship program. In the spring of 2013 Evening Star will present scholarships in the amount of \$46,200.00. This is not a typographical error. They have contributed nearly a half million dollars in scholarship aid in the last ten years.

Evening Star #147 prides itself on its ritual and exemplary floor work. The Master for 2013, Junior Warden, Senior Deacon, Junior Deacon, Marshal, Tyler, and two Stewards are NOT past masters. This is good for Evening Star, the Twentieth Masonic District and Masonry in Maine.

In closing, I would like to take this opportunity to thank the dedicated brothers who served as District Education Representatives this year. I would also like to thank all of the members of the MEALS Committee for their dedication and untiring support and once again, a special thanks to Ed King and Richard Bowden. Finally, I am most grateful to you Grand Master for your tireless and unyielding support. In my opinion, Freemasonry in Maine is in very good hands.

RW R. Timothy Martel presented the award stating that there were 14 submissions for the award and they were so close it was decided to have 2 number ones. Evening Star Lodge #147 in Buckfield and Springvale Lodge #190 in Springvale are our winners.

### **The balloting process continued.**

MW Adams declared a winner in the third ballot for Junior Grand Warden. The votes were Vennell, 235, and Haskell, 171. Brother Vennell, do you accept?

Brother Vennell accepted.

The results of the second ballot for the finance committee was May, 242, Gates, 171. Brother May, do you accept?

Brother May accepted.

The Grand Master called RW R. Timothy Martel to Grand East.

## **Presentation of the Simon Greenleaf Medal to R. Timothy Martel**

Right Worshipful R. Timothy Martel was born 9 September 1944 in Palatka, Florida. He moved to Kennebunk, Maine with his mother just five weeks later. Tim's dad was serving in the Navy at the time. Tim graduated Kennebunk High School in 1962. While in High School, he served as class president during his sophomore, junior and senior years. He was also co-captain of Kennebunk High's varsity football team.

Tim enlisted in the United States Navy in 1963 joining the nuclear submarine program. Selected to attend Naval Academy Prep, he entered the United States Naval Academy at Annapolis in June 1966 and graduating in 1970 with a B.S. in Naval Science which is a general engineering program. Tim earned his wings as a Naval Flight Officer/Mission Commander/Tactician/Navigator/Communicator. He flew three years into hurricanes and served all over the world tracking Soviet submarines in the P3C aircraft. He earned an M.S. degree in 1979 from the Naval Post-Graduate School in Monterey, California with a concentration in Manpower Requirements/Ops Analysis. He served several Admirals both in Washington, D.C. and in Brunswick, Maine. Tim retired in 1988 as an O-5 (Commander).

Tim's civilian career included 16 years at RCA, GE, Martin Marietta and Lockheed Martin as a Test Operations Engineer and Engineering Manager on Bath's AEGIS Test Team. Tim totally retired in September 2004 at age 60.

Tim and his wife Bev were married on graduation day from the Naval Academy in the academy chapel. They were engaged for seven years because they couldn't marry while at Annapolis. Tim and Bev have one child: Dr. John William Martel, M.D., PhD and his wife Christine and three grandchildren, Aidan, Aine and Ronan.

Tim was Raised in United Lodge in Brunswick on 3 November 1987. He served as Master of his Lodge in 1998 and 2011. He served the Grand Lodge of Maine as District Education Representative in 2001 and 2002 and as District Deputy Grand Master of the 14th Masonic District in 2003 and 2004. Tim has been recruited by several Grand Masters to serve on the several committees of Grand Lodge. Grand Master Adams appointed him to a special team charged to revise the District Deputy Grand Masters' Inspection reporting form. He served one year on the Committee of the Condition of the Fraternity. In 2005, Grand Master Tusch appointed Tim to the Masonic Education and Lodge Services Committee, also known as the MEALS Committee. Tim continues to serve on that committee as Chairman. Tim also chaired the Masonic Ambassador Team. In 2007 Grand Master Leighton awarded Tim the Joshua Chamberlain Leadership Award.

Tim is a highly respected and well-liked Mason not only for his ability to organize and delegate effectively, but also for his drive to make things right. He is a determined Mason but a compassionate Mason who cares very deeply for the well-being of his fellow Masons. This is very evident through his care and share visits to hospitals and telephone calls to Masons who need a cheerful word from time to time. Despite his own health setbacks this past year, Tim has persevered to continue the work of the Craft.

For being the can-do and go-to-guy for many Grand Masters including me, it is with pleasure that I present to you Right Worshipful Brother R. Timothy Martel the Simon Greenleaf Medal for Meritorious Service to Masonry.

RW Martel expressed his thanks and appreciation to the Grand Master and the Craft.

The Grand Master called MW George Pulkkinen to the podium to finish his report on the Committee on Amendments to the Constitution.

## **The Report on the Committee on Amendments to the Constitutions (Cont.)**

We also have a proposal to adopt use of the Lewis Jewel in this jurisdiction. Many jurisdictions have adopted the Lewis Jewel. The Lewis Jewel might be called a "generational jewel" because it can only be awarded to a newly raised Master Mason if his father or grandfather is an active Mason in good standing at the time of the recipient's raising. Interestingly enough, the lewis is a tool used by operative masons to lift/raise stones, hence the significance of a father (or grandfather) lifting/raising his son (grandson) to the sublime degree.

If adopted, this new Standing Regulation would read as follows:

77. Resolved, That a Lewis Jewel may be presented to a newly-raised Mason by his father or grandfather who is a Master Mason in good standing at the time of the recipient's raising. (If either the father or grandfather cannot be present, the Jewel may be presented on their behalf) Said Lewis Jewel shall be purchased from the office of the Grand Secretary.

Do I hear a motion to adopt this proposal?

A motion was made and seconded and, after a period of discussion both for and against the proposal, the motion failed.

Next, are two proposals to clarify arising questions regarding SR 36 and SR 55. In this day of ever increasing electronic communications, email has been suggested as a viable alternative to sealed envelopes. Because email provides less security than a sealed envelope, a sentence prohibiting use of email in place of sealed envelopes would be added to each standing regulation. If adopted, SR 36 would read as follows:

36. Resolved. That all written or printed notices of lodge communications, or other matters of lodge business, containing any Masonic information beyond the time and place of stated or special communications shall be mailed in sealed envelopes. Electronic messages (emails) shall not be considered sealed envelopes. Do I hear a motion to adopt this proposal?

A motion was made and seconded, and after a period of discussion both for and against the proposal, the motion failed.

Likewise SR 55., if approved, with a sentence prohibiting use of emails, would read as follows:

55. Resolved, Lodges may include in their written notices of meetings, the name, address, age and occupation of a candidate for any of the Degrees, together with the names of the brethren who have recommended him, after his application has been balloted upon and he accepted for the Degrees. Provided, however, that such notice shall be mailed or delivered in a sealed envelope. Electronic messages (emails) shall not be considered sealed envelopes.

Do I hear a motion to adopt this proposal?

A motion was made and seconded and, after a period of discussion both for and against the proposal, the motion failed.

Next is a proposed addition to SR 39 which provides for contributions to the magnificent George Washington National Masonic Memorial. As it now stands SR 39 directs that each lodge collect from each elected petitioner for the degrees, a donation of five dollars for the Memorial. The additional sentence, if approved, would allow for an additional annual donation of one dollar by all Masons toward support of the Memorial. If approved SR 39 would read:

39. Resolved. That each chartered lodge shall collect from each elected petitioner for the degrees five dollars in addition to the fee set by its by-laws for the three degrees as a donation to the George Washington Masonic National Memorial. An additional donation of one dollar per member shall be collected annually for support of the Memorial. The amount of such donations collected shall be remitted with the annual returns.

Do I hear a motion to adopt this proposal?

A motion was made and seconded and, after discussion both for and against the proposal which included the assurance the amount is offset by a reduction in the Maine Mason assessment, the motion carried.

Now Brethren, we are asked to consider two proposed Amendments to the Constitution being offered today for the first time. If accepted at this session, they will lay over for one year for a final vote at next year's Annual Communication.

The first would amend Sec. 51 which outlines means of notifying a brother of imminent suspension for NPD. As it now stands, there is ambiguity in the process for notifying a brother living out-of-state. As proposed, Section 51 would read as follows:

SEC. 51 No lodge shall suspend or expel a member from the rights of masonry for non-payment of dues; the penalty of such delinquency shall be forfeiture or suspension of membership. The member shall be notified in writing to appear at a

time and place to be named in said summons, and make such answer as he may desire. The summons shall be served upon the member, either in person or by certified mail at his last known address, not less than fourteen days before the date of the hearing if he resides in-state, nor less than thirty days if he resides out-of-state. If however, certified mail cannot be delivered to him at his last known mailing address, or his current whereabouts is unknown, the lodge may proceed to trial EXPARTE. A brother suspended from membership for non-payment of dues will be restored by the payment or remission of the amount due at the time of his suspension at any time within three years thereafter but after that time he can be restored only upon his application, after payment or remission of the amount in arrears, which shall take the same course as an application for initiation, and if rejected said applicant shall not again petition until six months after the rejection.

I would propose this amendment be entertained, referred to the appropriate committee, entered upon the records, published with other proceedings of the Grand Lodge and sent to the several lodges for their consideration, and be deemed in order to take up and act on at the next Annual Communication and I so move.

The motion was seconded and, after discussion, failed.

There is also a proposed amendment to Section 84A, offered by your Finance Committee. Section 84A provides for a penalty on any Lodge which fails to attend Grand Lodge. The penalty is now \$10.00 and has been since being adopted 37 years ago, in 1976. As proposed, the penalty would be increased to \$100.

As proposed, Section 84A would read as follows:

SEC. 84A. Any lodge which fails to be represented at any Annual Communication of the Grand Lodge as required by paragraph 3 of Section 2 of the Constitution, shall be penalized the sum of seventy five dollars (\$100.00).

I would propose that this amendment be entertained, referred to the appropriate committee, entered upon the records, published with other proceedings of the Grand Lodge and sent to the several subordinate lodges for their consideration, and be deemed in order to take up and act definitely on at the next Annual Communication, and I so move.

The motion seconded and, after discussion, passed.

MW Grand Master, I move this report be accepted and spread upon the records.

## **194th ANNUAL COMMUNICATION - DAY TWO**

**The Grand Master called the Craft from refreshment to labor.**

At the Grand Master's request, the Grand Chaplain started the session with prayer.

### **Masonic Bikes for Books Program**

Most Worshipful Grand Master and Brethren All:

At last year's Grand Lodge session, I was asked to chair the Grand Lodge Bikes For Books committee. I am very happy to report that this program has grown larger and faster than I ever expected.

In 2007, when I was a new Master looking for a good community outreach project, I stumbled across a website with details about the Bikes for Books program. I started in my local elementary school with 10 bikes and 10 helmets. This year I have been working with 47 lodges and 1 public library. I ordered 835 Huffy bicycles and 1280 Pro-Rider helmets. Some lodges are working with as many as 5 different schools covering grades from Pre-School to Eight. Including the students, their families, and school staff, Maine Masonry has had contact with nearly 30,000 people in the state. This does not include the numerous local business and corporate sponsors that have made Bikes for Books a part of their yearly contributions. Special thanks goes to

SAPPI Fine Paper, Hammond Tractor, and Maine Trailer for the use of their buildings and equipment. Maine lodges, together with the Grand Lodge Charitable Foundation, have raised and donated more than \$50,000 for the good of their communities. Hundreds of students are reading and exercising more because of this worthwhile program, and test scores at many participating schools have improved. The numbers do not tell the whole story, however.

The kindness and compassion of our state's students has shown through. Some winners have donated their bikes to those less fortunate, and students have worked together to be sure that the most deserving classmate has won a bike. At the drawing assemblies, students cheer loudly for their friends and classmates, even though they themselves did not win. The Bikes for Books program is good for the hearts, minds, and bodies of Maine's schoolchildren. Thank you, Grand Master, for the opportunity to serve the Grand Lodge of Maine in this capacity.

## **Presentation of the Josiah Hayden Drummond Medal to Christian A. Ratliff**

Right Worshipful Brother Christian A. Ratliff was born 2 April 1971 in Pittsburg, Pennsylvania. He graduated from Warwick High School in Newport News, Virginia and then went on to study at Rennselaer Polytechnic Institute in Troy, New York where he met his wife, Tandy. Following college in 1992, he moved to Maine and is presently employed by IDEXX Laboratories. Christian and Tandy were married on 21 May 1994 and they have two daughters, Brigid and Maeve.

Having been curious about Freemasonry for some time, in 1996 Brother Ratliff decided to get some answers to his questions. He made an appointment to see the Grand Secretary at the time, MW Bro. John Anagnostis, who encouraged him to petition Deering Lodge (which was just down the street from his apartment). Brother Ratliff did just that and on 24 March 1997 he was raised to the Sublime Degree of a Master Mason. He quickly became a student of the ritual and showed up every Saturday morning at the Lodge to practice with the officers and his mentor, RW Bro. Alfred E. Neff, Deering Lodge's line coach.

Since that time, he has served as Master of Deering Lodge in 2002, Master of Triangle Lodge in 2004 and again in 2007. Along with these two Lodges, he is also a member of Hiram Lodge, Scottish Rite and York Rite. In the Scottish Rite he is a

- Dispensations and Charters

The motion was seconded and so **voted**.

The Grand Master called for the report of the Commissioners of Trials.

## **Report of the Commissioners of Trials**

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine:

During the past year, the Grand Master has suspended three Masons for unmasonic conduct based on complaints filed against them by their respective lodges. A suspension notice was sent by certified mail to each suspended brother in accordance with Section 49 of the Constitution of the Grand Lodge of the State of Maine. Each brother was advised that his failure to respond would result in the suspension being automatically affirmed, and further that because of the brother's alleged conviction for a felony offense, the charges would then result in his automatic expulsion from the rights and privileges of Masonry. None of the suspended brothers responded to the notice or requested a hearing. It may be noted that two of the three brothers failed to sign for the certified letter. Copies of the letters are attached hereto.

Accordingly, no trials were conducted, and these pending suspensions are to be dealt with directly by Grand Lodge.

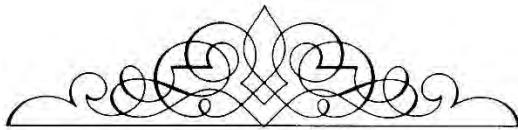
The motion was seconded and, without discussion, approved.

The motion was seconded and, without discussion, approved.

Most Worshipful, whereas, Brother Carl A. Seaward, Jr. was convicted of three counts of unlawful sexual contact and one count unlawful sexual touching by the criminal courts of the State of Maine, I move that he be expelled from Freemasonry for un-masonic conduct resulting in the loss of all rights and privileges appertaining thereto.

The motion was seconded and, without discussion, approved.



The Deputy Grand Master then moved that the 195<sup>th</sup> Annual Communication of the Grand Lodge of Maine be held in Lewiston, Maine. The motion was seconded and approved.

The Grand Master recognized Brother David Walton to address the Annual Communication.

“Most Worshipful I would like to address something that happened yesterday. Yesterday Brethren, we showed what masonry is. Lewiston is my hometown. We had several fires, over one hundred people displaced. Animals lost, and they are just like family. This Grand Lodge, on a whim, and with good intentions decided to pass the hat and raised over eighteen hundred dollars. That is the benevolence that this Grand Lodge is known for and always will be. At this time Most Worshipful, I would like to make a motion that Grand Lodge match those funds to aid the town of Lewiston.”

The motion was seconded and approved.

The Grand Master recognized RW Richard Rhoda and allowed him to address the Grand Lodge of Maine from the floor.

Bro: Rhoda: "To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge, Grand Master, and Brethren all:

Over the past 23 years I have had the privilege to serve on the board on the Commissioner of Trials or the Judge Advocate of the Grand Lodge of Maine. In that position I have been able to observe a continuum of problems developing in regards to masonic penal action. I found that the procedure to be followed is not well understood and often is not properly followed. Further I have found that the standards of society have changed over the last 150 years. Subject to the Grand Master's approval, I move that the Grand Master appoint a committee of such number that he may deem appropriate to review chapter 13 of Maine Masonic Textbooks, Masonic Offenses and Punishment. And to provide a report of their findings to the next session of Grand Lodge as to what is a Masonic offence and how to deal with the same. I would like to make that a motion, Most Worshipful."

The motion was seconded and approved.

Bro. Rhoda: "I also move that a committee be appointed by the Grand Master to review and make a recommendation at the next Annual Session of Grand Lodge defining an appropriate time period between the reports of lodge histories."

The motion was seconded and approved.

The Grand Master called for the report of the Committee on Unfinished Business.

## **The Report of the Committee on Unfinished Business**

RW Robert B. Ward reported that there no unfinished business to come before the 194<sup>th</sup> Annual Communication of the Grand Lodge of Maine.

A motion was made to accept the report of the Committee on Unfinished Business. It was seconded and approved.

The Grand Maste, having concluded the business of the Grand Lodge, declared a recess to prepare for the installation of officers.

## **Installation of Officers**

MW Wayne T. Adams directed RW Ryan Paradis to act as the Grand Marshal for the installation.

MW A. James Ross was installed as the Grand Master of Masons in Maine by MW Claire V. Tusch and MW George Pulkkinen.

MW Wayne T. Adams obligated the remaining elected officers

The elected Deputy Grand Master was installed by MW Robert V. Damon.

MW Gerald S. Leighton installed the Senior Grand Warden and the Junior Grand Warden.

MW Claire V. Tusch installed the Grand Secretary and the Grand Treasurer.

MW Wayne T. Adams obligated and installed the District Deputy Grand Masters with the assistance of the Grand Master, A. James Ross.

MW Walter M. MacDougall obligated and installed the District Education Representatives.

MW Brian A. Paradis obligated and installed the Grand Chaplain and the Assistant Grand Chaplains.

MW W. Louis Greenier II obligated and installed the Grand Lecturer and Assistant Grand Lecturers.

MW Claire V. Tusch obligated and installed the Grand Marshal.

MW Harland S. Hitchings obligated and installed the Grand Deacons and Grand Stewards.

MW Gerald S. Leighton obligated and installed the Grand Pursuivants, Grand Historian, Grand Librarian, Grand Tyler, and Grand Organist.

MW Harland S. Hitchings delivered the Charge to the Grand Lodge Officers.

MW Adams then thanked the Grand Master on behalf of himself and his Brother Past Grand Masters for the honor and privilege to preside over the Installation of Officers.

The Grand Master thanked the Past Grand Masters for their continued support and the remarkable job in getting all installed so Grand Lodge can continue on in the work of the Craft going forward. He also thanked the Grand Lodge Officers, elected and appointed. He pointed out that each one of them has the right aim, in heart and mind, and that is to do the best work for the Craft. He encouraged all to remember those aims and if so, none of them could err. He reminded all to rely on one another going forward, in everything we do. He stated, "Rely upon each other's talents and good offices and we'll always do the right thing."

The Grand Master and the Grand Secretary passed out presentation certificates of office and identification cards to all Elected and Appointed Officers.

The Grand Master thanked Past Senior Grand Warden, John T. Irovando and Past Junior Grand Warden, Ronald S. Murphy for their great work this past year and gave each of them a small token of his thanks and appreciation for their work.

The Grand Master thanked his Past District Deputy Grand Masters, Charlie Haskell and Don Pratt, for their service to the districts for which they served, and awarded them a small token of his thanks and appreciation for their service.

The Grand Master directed the Grand Marshal to escort First Lady Gerry to the Grand East.

First Lady Gerry Ross asked the Grand Marshal to then escort Grand Lodge Staff members, April and Theresa, to the podium.

Gerry Ross: "Ladies, I just want to show my appreciation. You have no idea how happy you have made my husband and all of these gentlemen who are counting on getting the Grand Lodge all in shape. You have done a wonderful job. You are so kind and nice on the phone. Everybody, really appreciates it. We appreciate you. I feel so bad that you can't join us at the ladies luncheon. You were there behind the scenes ready to help anyone who needed it. So I just wanted to give you a gift that we all received at the ladies luncheon. And again, I want to thank you from the bottom of my heart, you do a great job and we are all very, very happy with you."



The Grand Master added: “These are your Grand Lodge Secretaries. I couldn’t have said it better myself. I just want you to know that this Grand Master and Grand Lodge are very grateful to both of you for your service. We are proud to call you members of this Masonic family that we all share.”

## **Grand Master’s Closing Remarks**

A year ago I stood here and delivered a 15 minute address and I’m not going to do that this year. I think the Craft and their families know who I am by now I really want to continue moving forward and putting the Craft first. I want to continue the partnership that we have established with the lodges. Still there is a lot of work to do, you know our work is never done. My Grand Lodge Officers, know their mission and what is expected of them. But you know these men, who have been appointed know that. They reflect the high ideals of the Craft. They know how to attend to that affection with all whom they contact. So I say this now and I say it again, it takes an entire team to make this thing work.

It also takes an attentive ear to listen to the craft, in order to meet their needs. I know they will continue to do that good work. I want to thank all of you that have offered to serve, and continue to serve. We know that your time is important, and it takes you away from your family sometime. I know that you can find that happy balance, or medium with all those things in your lives. Be good to yourselves and learn a lot as I have learned this year. It has been a joy and an honor to serve as Grand Master, a very humbling experience, and I look forward to a second year.

I do want to thank our arrangements committee, Ken and Linda Richardson, and William Henry Stretton, and Joyce Stretton and Joey Stretton, for the months planning this Grand Session so all of us could have our session and enjoy ourselves at the same time. I want to thank them for their service and dedication. I’d like to thank all of you who attended all the meetings, the Brothers and you ladies for your support, your husbands and friends, I thank you. This is a people business and we want to go forward with our best foot to continue the good work of our creator and our service to one another. I’d like to thank the Past Grand Masters, who I still refer to as Grand Masters, for their ongoing guidance and support. They remain active contributors in Masonry. They are often sought out for their advice and counsel. We will forever be grateful for their service, as I am. Thank you, thank you all Past Grand Masters.

When I leave here I will be visiting a Senior Past Grand Master, Roger Snelling and his wife Rosemary. Delivering a little something to him, and give him a full report and let him know he was with us in spirit. Look at it out, it's a beautiful day, and again on behalf of all Masons in Maine, and a very grateful Grand Master, thank you, thank you so much for your contributions and service to each other in Masonry.

GOD Bless you all.”

The Grand Master asked for any further comments.

RW David Walker added this “Thank you, Most Worshipful. The only thing I have to say is we have had a clear vision and path laid out for us by the Grand Master. I agree with it, I endorse it and I hope to be able to keep it going. Let's all work together for the benefit of the Craft, as our Grand Master has directed. I look forward to working with you this coming year. Thank you.

I've also been reminded of one thing. I need to make one introduction, the lady to whom I owe most everything, my wife Audrey.”

The Grand Master then closed the Grand Lodge in Ample Form.

## **Submitted Reports Not Read During The Session**

### **Grand Secretary**

The Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine:

When the Craft decided to move the Grand Lodge Office, Library, and Museum from Portland to Holden, they presented a formidable task to MW Gerald S. Leighton who accepted oversight of the move and establishment of the new presence in Holden. Guided by his experience, a group of dedicated volunteer Brethren accomplished preparing the new office, packing and moving the records, equipment, and artifacts, and providing uninterrupted service to the Craft. Adding a note of incredulity to the endeavor, planning for and executing the Annual Communication were accomplished simultaneously. Freemasonry in Maine owes much to MW Leighton's knowledge and ability to motivate and direct people.

When MW Leighton resigned, I was appointed by MW A. James Ross to be his successor. I inherited an office that was operational and meeting the needs of the Craft and a staff who were dedicated to the tasks at hand. During my tenure I have begun the task of building upon that foundation.

Service to the Craft is the focal point of all the endeavors of this office. We have fully implemented and fine-tuned the electronic database. It is now possible for Lodge secretaries to effectively maintain Lodge records on a timely basis and eliminate the need to file monthly reports. The Annual Return is easily printed from the database for signature and submission. Grand Officers have ready access to statewide information on a need to know basis. Grand Lodge leaders have up to date information to assist in decision making.

The Grand Lodge Office has become a focal point for visiting Brethren from around the country, state, and the Canadian Maritime Provinces. During the first year here, we have welcomed 382 visitors on your behalf. We have expanded the number of items available for purchase and offer the selection through the Grand Lodge website. We have also added the ability to accept credit and debit cards.

We have streamlined the operation from the perspective of maintaining inventory supplies. We practice "just in time delivery" in so far as possible. Diplomas and certificates are produced electronically eliminating the need for stacks of blanks and allow the items to be personalized and professional in appearance. We eliminated five printers and a copier, all of which used different consumables, and replaced them with a networked workstation which meets all our printing needs.

Staff competency has grown over time as they have been involved in off-site training for Excel and have had in-house training in many areas of computer use by our "IT"

staff, King & Associates. The staff possesses strong personalities, skills, and a desire to serve the needs of the Craft. They are integral in planning and implementing the services we provide.

The office is now open five days a week, 8:30am to 4:30pm and we have extended hours on Monday evenings to 7:30pm in order that those who work during the week might have more ready access to their Grand Lodge. This has proven valuable for Secretaries in particular.

In addition to attending District Meetings, I have also begun the practice of annual Secretaries' meetings across the jurisdiction. Both of these venues offered me the opportunity to share information about the database and the general work of the office. They have also provided the opportunity to listen to the Craft and hear their ideas about how we can serve them more effectively. Several changes in the database and office procedure have been implemented as a result of these meetings. Others are on the way to fruition.

It has been and will continue to be the goal of this Office to implement the will and pleasure of the Grand Master by serving the Craft. This office is determined to use the resources at our disposal and add value to them. With that added value we participate with the Craft in enhancing Freemasonry's presence and value throughout this Grand Jurisdiction.

## **Committee on Insurance**

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine:

The 2012 year has been one of major change with regard to the Grand Lodge, and particularly as related to the existing insurance program.

With major changes in the Grand Lodge officers and Committee Chairmen, there has been a significant loss of historic institutional knowledge.

Additionally, personnel changes at the insurance agency handling the accounts has further created a need for additional review and clarification of the program, as well as direction for the future of the program.

In the 2011-2012 policy term, four new lodges were added to the master program, while the 2012-2013 term saw only 2 additions. Selective criteria by the underwriter has limited acceptability for older lodges, and arbitrary use of and age of building cutoff, regardless of upgrades and improvements is an area that needs to be addressed with the carrier if the program is to continue to grow. Obviously, many of the lodge buildings in the state are older properties. To maximize the benefits of a master program, both for the constituent lodges and the carrier, greater participation is needed.

Additionally, alternative markets for the program will be periodically solicited, and similar programs administered in other Grand Lodge jurisdictions will be evaluated.

Policy terms and pricing are also subject to current review.

With continued review and understanding by all stakeholders, the program will continue to be a benefit to the constituents.

## **Grand Librarian**

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Maine:

There's much going on here at the Grand Lodge Library-and you'll be proud of the activity. With the support and encouragement of the Grand Secretary, we're in the process of integrating into both community and professional circles and we believe this will auger well for creating a positive image surrounding our fraternity.

Thanks to the support of the Maine Masonic Charitable Foundation, we've obtained true library software and we are currently in the final stages of having a fully-interactive online catalog. You'll soon be able to search the Grand Lodge holdings by title, author, subject, key words and much more. Unlike before, this catalog will be updated constantly so within a few seconds of book being added, you'll know about it with a search on the web. Further, we'll be adding the ability for you to obtain PDF copies of many works as we move forward, combining documents obtained from the internet along with items we will scan from our own collection.

Following suggestions from librarians in public, private and Masonic libraries, our shelving is now done by topic rather than adhering to a locally-created methodology as was done in the past, consuming needless time and energy.

During this first year of my service as your Grand Librarian, the Library has had some growing pains: no library supply materials or documentation was sent from Portland thus adding much additional work while the most recent listing of books obtainable was the one placed on the web in 2006 and has been found to be missing works obtained several years before. Sadly, many books, including many of the books listed in recent Grand Lodge Proceedings, are nowhere to be found. If you know the whereabouts of any items belonging to the Grand Lodge Library, I hope you will help them find their way home.

Still further, comments like those made in an article in the Winter, 2012 issue of the *Maine Mason* by the prior Grand Librarian ("...having a place for my Masonic Brothers in southern Maine to resume borrowing books...."), have resulted in misconceptions that somehow Masons in that part of the state are now deliberately constricted. Nothing could be further from the truth. Present borrowing policies are no different than they were in the past. The capability of borrowing books for Masons in Southern Maine is no different now than it was for Masons in Northern Maine for the century during which the Library was in Portland. Since I'm either at or passing by the Grand Lodge building daily, your requests can and will receive timely attention. Thus, you may rest assured, my Brethren all: the Grand Lodge Library is **STILL** fulfilling its mission of lending books and educating the Craft. In fact, it is doing so with perhaps even more vigor than before. We continue to mail books to you at no charge, asking only that you pay the return postage.

Moreover, the Library is now available during the same hours that Grand Lodge is open-some 43 hours per week or more. Hours are Monday 8:30am-7:30pm and Tuesday thru Friday 8:30am-4:30pm. Other nights and weekends are available by arrangement. There's plenty of room for you to work and soon we'll be adding computers and even genealogical research opportunities. Still further, you can hop onto the high-speed network for any online research you need.

Please feel free to call, email or stop by the Grand Lodge building in Holden and we'll be most happy to assist you in furthering your Masonic education or satisfying your curiosity.

If you'd like to give your Library a book or two as a gift, you can head online to Amazon.com and find "Wish Lists" on the home page. Enter "Grand Lodge of Maine" and you'll see a whole bunch of books (and some videos) we'd like to add. The process is really quite simple. Gift certificates are great too. This is a wonderful way for you to help Maine Masonry. Please remember too: any donation to the Library is received by the Maine Masonic Charitable Foundation, an IRS-recognized 501(c)3 charity and will be tax deductible depending on your tax situation. Such donations further help by showing 'public support' of the Foundation, thereby enhancing its ability to be more involved.

We're moving forward and with your assistance, Brethren, our Library will be recognized as a 'crown jewel' of Maine Masonry.

## **Scholarship Committee**

To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge Of Maine:

The Grand Lodge Scholarship Committee has not held any meetings this past year, as the program seems to run itself. I went to the Grand Lodge office in Holden to meet with the new Grand Lodge staff on the scholarship program and what the committee could do to help in completing the tasks that need to be done. The Grand Lodge staff handles and processes all the letters sent to the schools and students as well as the DDGMs on the presentation of certificates from the foundation. Working with the then Grand Secretary, Gerald Leighton and the staff we worked diligently and came up with new letters, applications and list of tasks and times for us to get the scholarships information out to the schools and to the recipients .

We received several telephone calls concerning the scholarship program and how it works. We encourage the brethren to promote and call the committee if there are any questions, concerns or new ideas. I met with the Charitable Foundation's fund raising committee in Presque Isle to talk about ways we could raise funds for scholarships and see if we could get back to giving a scholarship in every public high school in the state again. We talked about a five year plan and what the Charitable Foundation would have to budget for this to happen. Currently there are 138 public high schools Times \$1500.00 scholarship the foundation would need to budget \$207,000.00 annually.

Some brethren feel that the recipients of the Maine Masonic Scholarship Program should have some connection with the Masonic fraternity. The scholarship checks are currently written out to the educational institution where the recipient goes. Some brethren feel that this could be better used if the funds were made available to the student directly. These topics are to be discussed by the foundation and then will be addressed by the scholarship committee.

With the state of Maine reorganizing several of their school districts and unions we have seen a few high schools changing their names and numbers of RSU's and AOS's, and a few high schools have even closed. We will make every effort to try and stay on course and be sure we don't leave any one out.

We will to encourage the Maine Masonic Lodges and the Charitable Foundation to continue to support this program. Any lodge or brother that wishes to donate directly to the scholarship program may do so by stating that they want their donation to go towards the scholarship program. Send your donation to the Grand Secretary's office.

The scholarship committee is pleased to serve this Grand Lodge in helping maintaining a high degree of efficiency and community involvement with the Charitable Foundation. The scholarship committee also wishes to thank the staff

on the foundation that has done so much work to keep everything in order. The committee is looking forward to working with the Foundation's fund raising committee and the new Grand Lodge office staff in keeping this program successful and growing.

## Notes to Financial Statements

March 31, 2013 and 2012

### NOTE 1 – NATURE OF ACTIVITIES AND SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

#### Nature of the Organization

Grand Lodge of Maine Ancient Free and Accepted Masons (the Organization) is a nonprofit fraternal organization, incorporated in Maine, established for charitable, educational, and other specific purposes in accordance with Masonic principles and practices.

#### Method of Accounting

The Organization's financial statements have been prepared on the modified cash basis of accounting which is a comprehensive basis of accounting other than generally accepted accounting principles. Under that basis, the only assets recognized are cash and investments except as noted below. All other assets and liabilities are not recognized unless they result from advances to or advances from other entities which are reported as due from and due to. Accordingly, revenues are recognized when received rather than when earned, and expenses and purchases of assets are recognized when paid rather than when the obligation is incurred. The only modification to the cash basis of accounting is that unrealized gains and losses are included in revenues and expenses and investments are reported at fair market value.

#### Basis of Presentation

Net assets, revenues, expenses, gains and losses are classified based on the existence or absence of donor imposed restrictions. Accordingly, net assets of the Organization and changes therein are categorized and reported as follows:

##### Unrestricted Net Assets

Net assets that are not subject to donor-imposed stipulations. Board designated funds are included in this category.

##### Temporarily Restricted Net Assets

Net assets subject to donor-imposed stipulations that may or will be met, either by actions of the Organization and/or by the passage of time. When restrictions expire, temporarily restricted net assets are reclassified to unrestricted net assets.

##### Permanently Restricted Net Assets

Net assets subject to donor-imposed stipulations that do not lapse or expire. The Organization's use of the funds is limited to the income earned.

The permanently restricted net assets consists of one donor endowed fund to provide income for general operations of the Organization.

#### Cash and Cash Equivalents

For the purposes of financial statement presentation, the Organization considers all highly liquid investments with an initial maturity of three months or less to be cash equivalents.

**Notes to Financial Statements****March 31, 2013 and 2012****NOTE 1 – NATURE OF ACTIVITIES AND SUMMARY OF AND SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES – CONTINUED****Investments**

It is the Organization's policy to value investments at their fair value at the balance sheet date. Donated investments are recorded at fair value on the date of donation.

**Fair Value Measurements**

Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. In determining fair value, the Organization uses various methods including market, income and cost approaches. Based on these approaches, the Organization often utilizes certain assumptions that market participants would use in pricing the asset or liability, including assumptions about risk and or the risks inherent in the inputs to the valuation technique. These inputs can be readily observable, market corroborated, or generally unobservable inputs. The Organization utilizes valuation techniques that maximize the use of observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs. Based on the observability of the inputs used in the valuation techniques, the Organization is required to provide the following information according to the fair value hierarchy. The fair value hierarchy ranks the quality and reliability of the information used to determine fair values. Financial assets and liabilities carried at fair value will be classified and disclosed in one of the following three categories:

- Level 1 – Quoted prices for identical assets and liabilities traded in active exchange markets, such as the New York Stock Exchange.
- Level 2 – Observable inputs other than Level 1 including quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities, quoted prices in less active markets, or other observable inputs that can be corroborated by observable market data.
- Level 3 – Unobservable inputs supported by little or no market activity for financial instruments whose value is determined using pricing models, discounted cash flow methodologies, or similar techniques, as well as instruments for which the determination of fair value requires significant management judgment or estimation.

In determining the appropriate levels, the Organization performs a detailed analysis of the assets and liabilities. At each reporting period, if applicable, all assets and liabilities for which the fair value measurement is based on significant unobservable inputs are classified as Level 3.

For the years ended March 31, 2013 and 2012, the application of valuation techniques applied to similar assets has been consistent. The following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for instruments measured at fair value:

**Investment Securities**

The fair value of investment securities is the market value based on quoted market prices, when available, or market prices provided by recognized broker dealers or by reference to quoted prices for similar assets.

The Organization's board has interpreted state law as not requiring that the purchasing power of permanent endowment funds be maintained. Accordingly, except for explicit donor stipulations specifying reinvestment of some or all of net appreciation, net appreciation on permanent endowment investments is available for appropriation and is reported as increases in temporarily restricted net assets.

**NOTE 3 – RENT EXPENSE**

During 2012, the Organization leased the Portland office from an unrelated entity, without benefit of a formal lease. The Portland office was closed in May 2013.

On April 1, 2012 the Organization entered into a lease of a new office in Holden, Maine with Holden Masonic Associates, LLC, a related party. The lease term ends on December 2016 with rent at \$1,000 per month. For the years ended March 31, 2013 and 2012, rental expense amounted to \$14,000 and 24,200, respectively.

## Notes to Financial Statements

March 31, 2013 and 2012

### NOTE 4 – SHARED EXPENSES

The Organization is headquartered in the same facility as The Masonic Charitable Foundation of the Grand Lodge of Maine (the Foundation), a non-profit organization tax exempt under IRC Section 501(c)(3). Grand Lodge personnel, including the Grand Secretary, Grand Treasurer, and clerical employees, perform services for both organizations. In addition, various office and administrative expenses, including telephone, internet service, copier and computer use, insurance, and office supplies are also shared by both organizations.

As of April 1, 2003, the Grand Lodge assumed responsibility for payment of all shared expenses, except facilities rent. Allocations between organizations are in accordance with estimated usage.

The Foundation's share of these expenses amounted to \$51,757 for the year ended 2013 and the Grand Lodge received this amount in equal monthly installments. The total of shared expenses for the year ended 2012 was \$65,243.

The recovery of shared expenses for both years has been allocated to the various expense categories on the Statement and Schedule of Revenue Collected, Expenses Paid, and Other Changes in Net Assets – Cash Basis.

### NOTE 5 – CLASSIFICATION OF EXPENSES

The statement of revenues collected, expenses paid and other changes in net assets discloses expenses by natural classification. The classification of expenses by function is as follows as of March 31:

### NOTE 6 – INCOME TAXES

The Organization qualifies as an organization exempt from income tax as a domestic fraternal association under Section 501(c)(10) of the Internal Revenue Code. Contributions to the Organization may qualify as charitable deductions if restricted to charitable, religious, etc. purposes as defined in IRC Section 6113(b)(3). Management believes there were no activities subject to tax on unrelated business income for the years ended March 31, 2013 and 2012.

Management has evaluated the Organization's tax positions and concluded that as of March 31, 2013 and 2012, the Organization does not believe that it has taken any tax positions that would require the recording of any additional tax liability. The Organization is subject to federal and state examinations by taxing authorities for three years following the filing of the return.

### NOTE 7 – CONCENTRATION OF CREDIT RISK

The Organization has cash deposits in various financial institutions including banks, investment and brokerage firms. Accounts at banking institutions (regular checking, interest-bearing checking, certificate of deposits and savings) are insured by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation (FDIC) up to \$250,000. These limits apply to aggregate deposits for each class of accounts stated above that the Organization has with each bank and may at times exceed \$250,000. At March 31, 2013, the Organization did have cash balances in excess of insured amounts at banking institutions. The Organization has not experienced any losses in such accounts and believes it is not exposed to significant credit risk.

**NOTE 8 – RISKS AND UNCERTAINTIES**

The Organization invests in various investment securities. Investment securities are exposed to various risks such as interest rate, market, and credit risks. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investment securities, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the values of investment securities will occur in the near term and that such changes could materially affect the amounts reported in the statement of assets, liabilities, and net assets.

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## **Maine Masonic Charitable Foundation Annual Meeting**

### **April 16<sup>th</sup>, 2013, Cumberland Club, Portland, ME**

The Meeting was called to order at 10:08 AM by President A. James Ross with David Walker, Wayne Adams, Claire Tusch, Robert Landry, W. Louis Greenier, John Irovando, Ronald Murphy, Ronald Fowle. Robert Hoyt, Scott Whytock, and Mark Rustin present. Thomas Pulkkinen was present as a guest. A moment of silence was observed for all the victims of Boston Marathon bombing, followed by prayer of Invocation by President A. James Ross.

The President welcomed everyone to the Annual meeting and thanked them for their attendance. Secretary's report was called for and presented by Grand Secretary, Mark Rustin. After a review of the minutes mailed out for the two meetings that were held during the year, they were accepted as distributed. There were no communications to share.

The Grand Treasurer provided an overview of the finances referring to a report provided to all before the meeting. He reported we did well compared with the budget with several areas that did not use all budgeted funds; the investments are doing well; and next year's budget promises to be more refined than this year's. The Trustees approved the report of the Grand Treasurer.

The Investment Advisory Sub-Committee reported they met twice during the year with HM Payson to review and make any necessary decisions. The Sub-Committee is pleased with the performance of the portfolio which developed a 3.8% return on investment during the year. (A complete report will be attached) The report was accepted.

The Distributions Sub-Committee reported that they distributed \$53,000 through 28 applications which makes the average \$1900. The matching grants report is as follows:

The six Veterans Home programs are all doing weekly visits with various site specific programming. There is a need for more participation on the part of local Lodges.

The per capita relief program produced the following results:

50 year members	36 Apps	\$650

The Sub-Committee believes the last category is a “sleeper” which could increase sharply over time.

The Trustees accepted and approved the report of this Sub-Committee.

The report of the Budget Sub-Committee was reviewed with the discussion led by Ron Fowle. He noted that several meetings were held to address the priorities within the parameters of the funds available. The proposed Challenge Grant program was tabled for future year discussion. Increases in funding are proposed for the Maine Masonic College, the Mentoring Initiative, and Veterans Services. He concluded by thanking the Grand Treasurer for his diligent support.

The President noted that the budget contains increased funding for relief, Community Betterment grants, the Masonic Service Association, the Grand Lodge Library, and the Grand Lodge Museum. There is \$3000 unbudgeted reserve.

The Grand Treasurer noted he has no real worries about income supporting the budget. It was noted that if Grand Lodge increases its support for the George Washington Memorial as proposed by the Grand Lodge Finance Committee, the Foundation would be able to reallocate its funds supporting the Memorial.

The Grand Treasurer led a discussion about the Rich Fund the income from which is designation to pay for a “hospital Bed” for a Brother in need. Scott suggested that it could be used to bolster funds for relief and stay within the intent of the bequest. Wayne Adams suggested that the Rich Fund be managed by HM Payson along with other Foundation Funds.

The Budget was moved, seconded, and approved with thanks to the Budget Sub-Committee.

The Grand Secretary, building manager for Holden Masonic Associates, LLC, presented the LLC budget. After discussion, the budget was moved, seconded, and approved.

Wayne Adams moved to empower the Grand Treasurer to make financial transactions on behalf of the Foundation for the coming year. The motion was seconded and approved.

Wayne Adams moved to invest funds in income accounts beyond the needs of cash flow for the budget in the Charitable Foundation account with H. M. Payson. The motion was seconded and approved.

There was a motion to remove the proposed sign purchase for the Holden property from the table. The motion was seconded and approved.

After discussion a motion was made to increase the investment in the Holden property by \$25,000 to provide for the purchase of an electronic billboard sign. The motion was seconded and approved.

The President called a short recess.


The President called the meeting back to order and led a discussion about priorities in the coming year. He informed the Board of his efforts, along with the Grand Treasurer, to pursue an invigorated approach to raising donations. They met with a professional fund raiser who advised that our focus should be inward toward the Craft. A website dedicated to telling the Foundation's story and providing ample and easily accessible opportunities to donate funds would be central to this effort. Scott re-affirmed that the approach must be comprehensive involving the Board, Officers, and the Craft detailing the need, the work accomplished, and opportunities to support the Foundation's work.

Suggestions such as specific projects to acquire donations, direct mail, and a fund for planned giving were offered for consideration. The President asked for the continuation of the authority granted him in November to pursue these ideas and bring concrete proposals to the Board for approval.

The President thanked all the members for their efforts on behalf of the Foundation and reminded them of the next meeting in June where sub-committee assignments will be made.

The meeting adjourned in harmony at 11:59 AM.

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### Independent Auditors' Report

We have audited the accompanying consolidated statements of The Masonic Charitable Foundation of the Grand Lodge of Maine (a nonprofit organization), which comprise the statement of assets, liabilities, and net cash – modified cash basis as of March 31, 2013, and the related statements of support, revenue, and expenses – modified cash basis for the year then ended, and the related notes to the financial statements.

### Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with the cash basis of accounting as described in Note 1; this includes determining that the cash basis of accounting is an acceptable basis for the preparation of the financial statements in the circumstances. Management is also responsible for the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

### Auditors' Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audits. We conducted our audits in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audits to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditors' judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. **NOTE 1 – NATURE OF ACTIVITIES AND SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES****Nature of the Organization**

The Masonic Charitable Foundation of the Grand Lodge of Maine (the Foundation) is a nonprofit Maine corporation established for charitable, educational, and other specific purposes in accordance with Masonic principles and practices. The Holden Masonic Associates, LLC was established in 2012 as a single member LLC of the Foundation. The purpose of the LLC is to acquire property from which the Foundation operates. The LLC is included in these consolidated financial statements.

**Method of Accounting**

The Foundation's consolidated financial statements have been prepared on the modified cash basis of accounting which is a comprehensive basis of accounting other than generally accepted accounting principles. Under that basis, the only assets recognized are cash, investments and property and equipment. All other assets and liabilities are not recognized except as noted below. Accordingly, revenues are recognized when received rather than when earned, and expenses and purchases of assets are recognized when paid rather than when the obligation is incurred. The only modification to the cash basis of accounting is that unrealized gains and losses are included in revenues and investments are reported at fair market value, and the liability to other organizations for investments in custodial care is recognized.

**Basis of Presentation**

All intercompany balances and transactions between the Foundation and LLC have been eliminated in consolidation. Net assets, revenues, gains and losses are classified based on the existence or absence of donor imposed restrictions. Accordingly, net assets of the Foundation and changes therein are categorized and reported as follows:

**Unrestricted Net Assets**

Net assets that are not subject to donor-imposed stipulations. Board designated funds are included in this category.

**Temporarily Restricted Net Assets**

Net assets subject to donor-imposed stipulations that may or will be met, either by actions of the Foundation and/or by the passage of time. When restrictions expire, temporarily restricted net assets are reclassified to unrestricted net assets. Management has interpreted under Maine law that the net appreciation of endowment funds are considered temporarily restricted net assets until appropriated for use by the board. Temporarily restricted net assets consist primarily of appreciation on endowments funds.

##### Permanently Restricted Net Assets

Net assets subject to donor-imposed stipulations that do not lapse or expire with time. The Foundation's use of the funds is limited to the income earned.

##### Cash and Cash Equivalents

For the purposes of financial statement presentation, the Foundation considers all highly liquid investments with an initial maturity of three months or less to be cash equivalents.

##### Investments

It is the Foundation's policy to value investments at their fair value. Donated investments are recorded at fair value on the date of donation. Investments include money market funds invested for the long term.

##### Fair Value Measurements

Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. In determining fair value, the Foundation uses various methods including market, income and cost approaches. Based on these approaches, the Foundation often utilizes certain assumptions that market participants would use in pricing the asset or liability, including assumptions about risk and or the risks inherent in the inputs to the valuation technique. These inputs can be readily observable, market corroborated, or generally unobservable inputs. The Foundation utilizes valuation techniques that maximize the use of observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs. Based on the observability of the inputs used in the valuation techniques, the Foundation is required to provide the following information according to the fair value hierarchy. The fair value hierarchy ranks the quality and reliability of the information used to determine fair values. Financial assets and liabilities carried at fair value will be classified and disclosed in one of the following three categories:

- Level 1 – Quoted prices for identical assets and liabilities traded in active exchange markets, such as the New York Stock Exchange.
- Level 2 – Observable inputs other than Level 1 including quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities, quoted prices in less active markets, or other observable inputs that can be corroborated by observable market data.
- Level 3 – Unobservable inputs supported by little or no market activity for financial instruments whose value is determined using pricing models, discounted cash flow methodologies, or similar techniques, as well as instruments for which the determination of fair value requires significant management judgment or estimation.

In determining the appropriate levels, the Foundation performs a detailed analysis of the assets and liabilities. At each reporting period, if applicable, all assets and liabilities for which the fair value measurement is based on significant unobservable inputs are classified as Level 3.

For the years ended March 31, 2013 and 2012, the application of valuation techniques applied to similar assets and liabilities has been consistent. The following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for instruments measured at fair value:

*Investment Securities*

The fair value of investment securities is the market value based on quoted market prices, when available, or market prices provided by recognized broker dealers or by comparisons to similar securities.

**Property and Equipment**

Property and equipment consist primarily of the Foundation's office building in Holden, Maine. Purchased assets are stated at cost. The provision for depreciation is determined by the straight-line method to amortize the cost of assets over their estimated useful lives. Expenditures for repairs and maintenance which do not extend the useful lives of the assets are charged to program operations. Useful lives range from four to 25 years.

The Foundation's investment and spending policy for board designated and permanently designated endowment is as follows:

The principal investment objectives of the Foundation's portfolio fund are preservation of capital earning a reasonable current income which will cover operating and charitable expenses, and growth in income.

Quality is to be stressed at all times in the portfolio. Common stock investments should concentrate on seasoned companies with proven records, above-average prospects and sound financial positions. The bond portfolio will stress companies with investment grade ratings and strong credit quality.

Growth in income is expected to result from rising dividend payments of common stock investments and occasionally from rising interest rates. Income growth will be lessened during periods of declining interest rates and economic adversity.

The fund will pursue a balanced investment program utilizing both fixed income and equity investments although it is anticipated that a majority of the assets is to be committed to equity investments. While little attention will be paid to short-term market timing, the investment manager will endeavor to anticipate long-term fluctuation in prices and will vary the equity component of the endowment fund between a range of 60% and 75% of the total fund. The lower end of this range will be used when, in the opinion of the investment manager, stock prices fully reflect long-term value and the higher end used when stock prices are considered undervalued. It is anticipated that portfolio turnover will be relatively low, and it is hoped that the equity and fixed income components as well as the overall portfolio will compare favorably with leading capital market indices (S&P 500 and Salomon Brothers High Grade Bond Index, respectively) over long periods of time. These investment objectives are reviewed annually by the Investment Committee.

**NOTE 3 – FUNDS HELD FOR OTHERS**

In 2003, the Foundation agreed to accept funds from the Demolay and Pine Tree Youth Foundation, for the purpose of managing the funds for the benefit of the transferor organizations.

Income derived from the investment of the funds is distributable to the Demolay and Pine Tree Youth Foundation, which has also retained the right to request the return of the funds at its sole discretion.

**NOTE 4 – PROPERTY AND EQUIPMENT**

Property and equipment consist of a building at a cost of \$300,446 with accumulated depreciation of \$7,781 as of March 31, 2013.

**NOTE 5 – RENT EXPENSE**

The Foundation leased its office facilities from the Masonic Trustees of Portland, an unrelated entity, without benefit of a formal lease. Annual rental expense for year ending March 31, 2012 was \$24,200. The Foundation terminated the lease arrangement on March 31, 2012 and moved to LLC's building in Holden, Maine.

**NOTE 6 – SHARED EXPENSES**

The Foundation is headquartered in the same facility as The Grand Lodge of Maine Ancient Free and Accepted Masons (Grand Lodge), a non-profit fraternal organization tax exempt under IRC Section 501(c)(10). Grand Lodge personnel, including the Grand Secretary, Grand Treasurer, and clerical employees, perform services for both organizations. In addition, various office and administrative expenses, including telephone, internet service, copier and computer use, insurance and general office supplies are also shared by both organizations.

As of April 1, 2003, the Grand Lodge assumed responsibility for payment of all shared expenses, except facilities rent. Allocations between organizations were in accordance with estimated usage.

The Foundation's share of these expenses amounted to \$51,757 for the year ended 2013 and was paid to the Grand Lodge in equal monthly installments. The total of shared expenses for the year ended 2012 was \$85,244.

Shared expenses for the current year and prior year have been allocated to the various expense categories on the Statement and Schedule of Revenue Collected, Expenses Paid, and Other Changes in Net Assets – Cash Basis.

### NOTE 7 – INCOME TAXES

The Foundation qualifies as an organization exempt from income tax under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code. Contributions to the Foundation qualify as charitable deductions. Management believes there were no unrelated activities subject to tax on unrelated business income for the years ended March 31, 2013 and 2012.

Management has evaluated the Foundation's tax positions and concluded that as of March 31, 2013 and 2012, the Foundation does not believe that it has taken any tax positions that would require the recording of any additional tax liability nor does it believe that there are any unrealized tax benefits that would either increase or decrease within the next twelve months. The Foundation is subject to federal and state examinations by taxing authorities for three years following the filing of its tax returns.

### NOTE 8 – CONCENTRATION OF CREDIT RISK

The Foundation has cash deposits in various financial institutions including banks and investment and brokerage firms. Accounts at banking institutions (regular checking, interest-bearing checking, certificate of deposits and savings) are insured by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation (FDIC) up to \$250,000. These limits apply to aggregate deposits for each class of accounts stated above that the Foundation has with each bank. At March 31, 2013 the Foundation had cash balances in excess of insured amounts at banking institutions.

Cash at investment and brokerage institutions is in money market funds and is not insured by the FDIC. The institutions where these accounts are maintained are members of the Securities Investor Protection Corporation (SIPC) which insures cash funds up to \$100,000. Balances in excess of \$100,000 are insured by the institutions' excess SIPC insurance. At March 31, 2013 cash balances in all money market funds at various brokerage institutions totaled \$520,110. The Foundation has not experienced any losses in such accounts and believes it is not exposed to significant credit risk.

### Royal and Select Masters

Add 1000 to the Common Era. Thus 2012 and 1000=3012.

### Knights Templar

From the Christian Era take 1118. Thus 1118 from 2012=894.

### Order of High Priesthood

To the Christian Era add 1913, the Year of the Blessing. Thus: 2012 and 1913=3925.

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## Masonic Calendar

**Ancient Craft Masons** commence this era with the creation of the world, calling it **Anno Lucis (A.D.)**, "in the year of light."

**Scottish Rite**, same as Ancient Craft, except the Jewish chronology is used, **Anno Mundi (A.M.)**, "in the year of the world."

**Royal Arch Masons** date from the year the second temple was commenced by Zerubbabel, **Anno Inventionis (A.I.)**, "in the year of the discovery."

**Royal and Select Masters** date from the year in which the temple of Solomon was completed, **Anno Depositionis (A. Dep.)**, "in the year of the deposit."

**Knights Templar** commence their era with the organization of their Order, **Anno Ordinid (A.O.)**, "in the year of the Order."

**Order of High Priesthood** dates from the year of the blessing of Abraham by the High Priest Melchisedec, **Anno Benefacio (A.B.)**, "in the year of the blessing."

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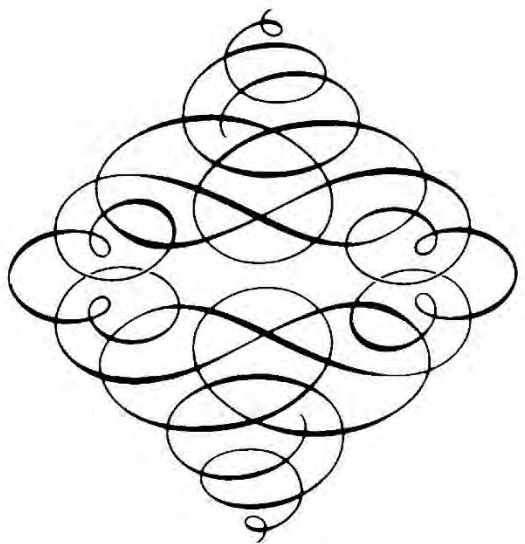
